Easy Does It

As the philosophers of the ages have said, the ultimate in beauty is truth.

This is what Shakespeare meant when he wrote: "To gild refined gold, to paint the lily. To throw a perfume on the violet. To smooth the ice, or add another hue. Up on the rainbow, or with taper light, to Seek the beautiful eye of heaven to garnish, is wasteful and ridiculous excess."

And it is what Flo Ziegfeld must have had in mind when he said that he could glamorize any girl who was physically normal and who would wash her face and brush her hair.

To these illustrious names we may now add that of Philip B. Cortney, a graduate electrical engineer who began his career in the steel business, became a banker and is now, of all things, president of Coty, the world famous cosmetic firm, who warns against "exaggerated claims, lush and over romantic appeals, and promises of any kind which take unfair advantage of the adolescent's deep anxiety concerning personal appearance and social success."

In a statement of policy just issued for the guidance of his organization, Mr. Cortney insists that its approach to the teenage market must be "based on the concept that the beauty of a young girl should be natural, fresh and feminine and should not be marred by the reckless use of cosmetics."

Further, he expresses the firm's conviction that it is the moral duty of every businessman who serves this youthful market to support the aims of parents and teachers, among which he stresses the training of intelligence, the shaping of character, the sharpening of creative expression and the development of physical fitness and good grooming habits.

"The great worlds of music, literature, painting, like enjoyment of nature," says Mr. Cortney, "should become part of the common experience of young Americans. In pursuing these purposes, young girls will acquire the riches of mind and spirit which will make them truly glamorous and interesting women. An excess of scent and overuse of makeup can never be substitutes for these essential ingredients of charm and attractiveness."

Perhaps we shouldn't mention it, and perhaps it's too late, anyway, but we can at least hope that this message gets through to some of the older girls, too.

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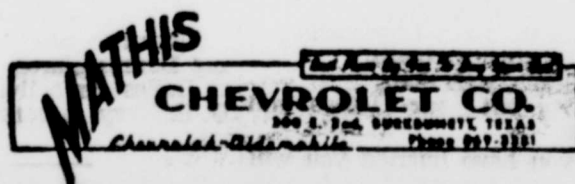

Manager**News From The County Agent**

Eleven Wichita County 4-H Club boys and girls entered electric entries in the Wichita County Electric Show last week. She show was judged by Gad Garland, Rural Representative for Texas Electric Company. Ribbons were awarded as prizes.

Cloudy conditions and frequent rains during the past few days have caused excessive shedding of small squares and bolls, especially, where cotton has been irrigated just previous to the period of rainfall. The weather conditions also stimulated the spread of bacterial blight. Insect activity increased in many localities, with bollworms and boll weevils the principal pests of cotton.

Several farmers in the county are spraying cotton for insects. Farmers are urged to check their cotton weekly for insects.

Twenty 4-H club boys and girls from Wichita County received 1200 baby chicks on Friday. They will feed the broilers for a period of nine weeks. In October each individual will enter five cockles and five pullets in the Dallas Fair. This is the largest broiler show in the state.

David Johnson and Roy Childers 4-H club boys from the Iowa Park community 4-H club will attend a District 4-H Electric School in Vernon. The training school will be held on Tuesday, August, 14th. Roy Childers will give an electric demonstration to the group.

The average age of farm operators in Texas continue to increase steadily. In 1940 their average age was 46.9 years; it increased to 49.4 in 1950 and to 52.5 in 1959.

Younger farmers now make up a much smaller proportion of all operators in Texas. More than 1 out of every 10 farms

in 1930 was operated by persons less than 25 years of age. In 1959, persons who had not reached this age made up 1 out of 100 farm operators. Farm operating has been proportionately more important at the older age levels. In 1959, more than 1 out of 12 operators in Texas was 65 or older. In 1959, older farmers made up 1 out of every 5 farm operators in the State.

We would like to encourage all club boys and girls to plan now to enter exhibits in the Texas-Oklahoma Fair held Sept. 24-29. Some of the things that might be entered are beef steers, beef heifers, animals, lambs, swine and crops.

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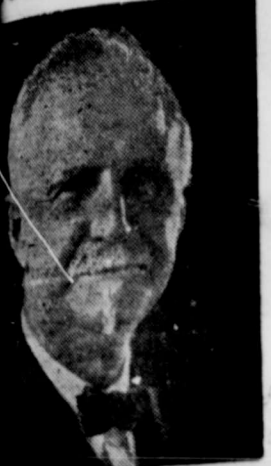

W. Babson Weekly Report

Babson Discusses The
Business Cycle Of
Your City

Every community has its own business activities. Some basic industries of a city, such as the manufacture of textiles, steel, or other products, are usually included. The building industry depends largely on population growth. The money distributed to the state to the unemployed, which is constantly increasing. The automobile and other businesses, which are constantly draining money out of the city to support Detroit or Texas. The liquor business, which does the city no good and perhaps much harm. Our City Going Ahead Or Falling Behind?

The answer to this question depends largely upon the percentage of unemployment over the entire year. If your town has little unemployment insurance money to depend upon, if most everyone works, your city is a good one to live in. On the other hand, the more is true, then you should be moving elsewhere with your children. Hence the question, "Are you living in the best state?" The state which has probably the best record is Utah. The Mormon religion teaches everyone to work. During the last war Utah was the only state which asked no Federal money. The Mormons believe that a person cannot get regular employment at some given town should go out and work without pay to make a better Utah. They have written many books, but one which had the largest circulation is "Fundamentals of Christianity." Actually, 80% of the books were purchased by Mormons.

Mutual Funds Give Safety. At now many families are moving to California, which is profiting from the defense industry, including the manufacture of missiles, airplanes, submarines, and electronics. Of course, we will never have full disarmament. As a last resort, people would fight with rocks and rocks. Yet I do expect that nuclear warfare will be strictly limited. California is temporarily suffering from a movement, notwithstanding the fact that it would be good for the nation as a whole.

Are you readers live in a city with activities which are fully diversified, that is, not dependent too much on any one industry. The diversity of your employment depends largely upon diversification. As does the safety of your investments. One should not put too much money in Mutual Funds, though they surely provide protection through sound diversification. No one ever got rich buying Mutual Funds. There is an old saying: "We don't eat our cake and have it."

Importance of Natural Resources. After graduating from high school or college, settle in a location which has great natural resources. This may be a fine spot, either on the seacoast or some large river or lake. The center of good agricultural land always offers opportunities for young people. Discount houses, shopping centers, and even chain supermarkets may be temporary. There will always be opportunities for young people of character who are anxious to work. My experience shows that poor young people rise to the top while the "all-to-do" boys often sink to the bottom. Another favorite saying of my father is "Only the wheel of opportunity keeps revolving. The great natural finance corporations tell the so-called "poor boys" the best financial risks, if they have good wives. "A woman usually makes a man or a man."

What Should My Boy Do?
If your boy intelligently decides that he should move to some other state, do not hold him back after you have visited the territory. ANOTHER GLIMPSE AT POLICY

(Editor's Note: Robert Morris, Past President of the University of Dallas, was formerly chief counsel of the Senate's Subcommittee on Internal Security.)

During the last two weeks the country was given another fleeting glimpse of the underlying policy that is dealing, with each passing month, to the eclipse of our wonderful nation. The glimpse was once again a stolen one and the severe curtain of executive privilege was hurriedly drawn lest the American people wake up to what our planners have in store for them.

Washington correspondent Willard Edwards, an experienced and discerning reporter, wrote two articles on June 17 and 18 on Walt W. Rostow's policy paper, that represents the ultimate in current planning. Rostow is chairman of the State Department's Policy Planning Board and his report represents the collective thinking of himself and a large staff of his planners.

The Edwards articles were based on authentic sources and have not been denied by State Department spokesmen. According to our planners, the Soviet Union is mellowing and becoming a "nature" nation; that there is a diffusion of power away from Moscow in the Communist block; that Soviet Russia is coming to realize that the severity of the class struggle concept is becoming outdated.

Therefore, the urge that we should try, not to overcome Communism, but to help it in this evolutionary process. "Capitalism will not triumph over Socialism. Rather the victory will be one of men and nations voluntarily cooperating under the principles of the United Nations Charter," writes Mr. Edwards of this extraordinary but official assumption. This same conciliatory treatment is recommended for Red China. The Chinese Communists can be encouraged to evolve

"into a peaceful state by showing them we have no aggressive intentions." In the meantime "unnecessary provocations" are to be avoided.

The corollaries neatly fall into place. Each one should bring joy to Khrushchev. Edwards writes of these:

"Gentle treatment of the satellite nations is advocated. No official attacks should be made against their regimes, whatever the provocation, and even criticism should be softened. Western Europe, at the same time, must be encouraged to closer relationship with the satellites and urged to furnish aid to them.

"East Germany, the policy draft says, cannot be forever insulated from dealings with the United States and business must be transacted with them.

"Above all, no encouragement or support must be given to armed uprisings in eastern Europe."

Government intelligence officials, dealing with the realities of our times, are naturally disturbed. Some have expressed themselves in opposition to Rostow's thinking. Edwards quotes these too:

"They note no lessening of Communist intransigence nor of grim determination to 'bury' the free world. They see in the Rostow recommendations a total misconception of the nature of Communism conspiracy; a naive brushing off of its treachery as evidenced in a long history of broken treaties and agreements while steadily pursuing the goal of world conquest."

When Walt Rostow was called before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee he refused to produce this basic policy report. He invoked the overworked doctrine of Executive Privilege and was upheld. Instead he fussed over the outlines of our policy and skillfully concealed the sinister nature of his report.

Meanwhile our wonderful nation, led by the Rostows, moves toward its dissolution and toward merger, with a minority status with Soviet power. This is apparent with all our moves from Geneva to Laos.

Willard Edwards and his sources are to be congratulated. They demonstrate again what one or two persons can do to slow up the process by making it known.

Starting to School is a big event in every child's life, reminds Thelma Wirges, county HD agent. The experience will be a happy one, if your youngster is physically, mentally and emotionally ready for it. Children should not be entered in school unless they can meet certain practical tests to show they are ready. These tests are suggested by the White House Conference on child health and protection. First of all a child needs to know his own name and address well enough to repeat to others if necessary. Physically, he needs to be fairly independent and well trained. He should be able to dress and undress himself, take care of toilet needs, and eat wholesome food without assistance. If he is able to run, climb and use his hands easily in simple construction and play, he will be more at ease with other youngsters. Check on his intellectual readiness. He should talk readily, using sentences, understand and carry out simple directions and show a healthy curiosity and desire to experiment. It will help

if he knows the names and uses of the common objects in his environment.

Health check-ups are very important. Be sure to include eye, ear, nose and throat examinations and dental check. Plan for necessary vaccinations and immunizations. Build up general health with lots of rest and nourishing foods during the remainder of summer.

School will mean a new social situation. He will be happier if he has learned to play with other children, respects their possessions and assumes some responsibility for his own belongings.

The emotional adjustment is difficult for a child who is still very dependent on others, shows marked fears, temper outbursts or moodiness. If he looks forward to school as a happy experience, and has learned to stay contentedly in another home or school for limited periods, he is ready to go.

Check safety training too. Make certain your child knows the danger of passing automobiles, and how to walk safely on the streets or highways. He needs to realize the danger of sharp instruments, matches, electricity and machinery in motion.

Only one month to go before school starts. Check that beginner now and help prepare him for a happy start.

Policyholder Questions Answered by the Institute of Life Insurance

Q. What is an "actuary"?
A. An actuary is a technical expert in the mathematics of life insurance. He calculates the premium rates, policy reserves, dividends and other benefits of life insurance policies, health insurance, annuities, pension plans and



other types of insurance. The chief actuary of a life insurance company has the major responsibility for the financial soundness of the company's insurance plans. He also may have other executive responsibilities with the company.

Q. I am a 45-year-old bachelor, with no dependents or close relatives. I'm sure that I will never marry. I have a secure job, make a good salary, have a liberal retirement plan and some group life insurance where I work. I also have several thousand dollars in the bank. Is there any reason why I should buy an individual life insurance policy?

A. There are several reasons. First of all, you can't be sure that you will never marry. Many people marry for the first time when they are considerably older than you.

Even if you never marry, you may well find that a permanent life insurance policy is a big asset to you in your business career—for example, if you should decide to change jobs, or go into business for yourself, or take out a mortgage loan, or make an investment that would increase your financial responsibilities.

STOCKS AND BONDS

When you buy a share of stock, you own an interest in every single thing a firm has; when you buy one of its bonds, you don't own any part of the company. The bond or debenture is merely a promise to pay.

Suppose out of 1,000 shares outstanding, you own one share. Then you have an undivided one-thousandth share in the company, not in any particular thing but in every piece.

When you buy a bond, you own no part of the company. The firm promises to pay the loan back when the bond matures.

As a rule, bondholders have little to say directly about the firm or how it picks its officers and manages its business. Of course, lenders exercise indirect influence since they must have confidence in the firm and its management before they will

part with their money. Bondholders get their interest before any stockholder gets his dividends; and should the firm go broke, they get paid out of its assets before the stockholders get a nickel.

Preferred stock, as a rule, yields fixed dividends before the common stockholders get anything, but preferred stock dividends are payable only if declared by the corporation.

As a rule, common stockholders risk more and therefore stand to make greater profit (or loss.)

The legal invention of the entity called a corporation has made vast public investment in industry and commerce possible. By allowing anybody to buy in or to lend to the firm, a corporation has made large scale research, production, and marketing possible while each investor can study and decide where he wants to risk his capital.

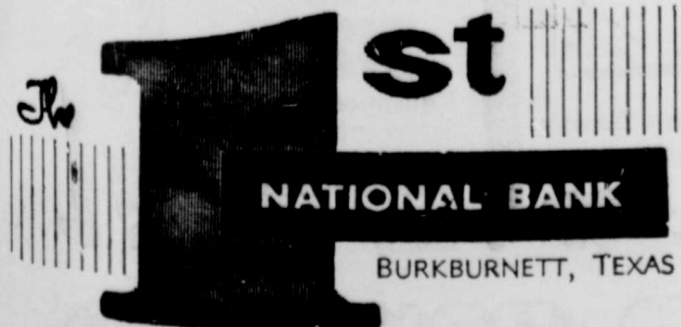

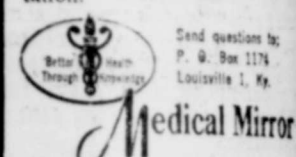
Birth Defects—Drugs

Q. From a recent TV program on birth defects I learned that certain drugs have a bad effect on an unborn child. Can you list these for me?

A. A simple listing of agents which could affect the unborn child would have very little meaning because timing is all important. The limb buds of the embryo begin to develop in the fourth week of pregnancy. The palate begins to close in the sixth week. The dividing wall within the heart emerges during the eighth week. Thus, if the mother receives an "insult" (this could be a drug, a virus infection, or physical injury) during the critical development of some vital structure, a defect might be produced in that part. The same "insult" at any other time would be very unlikely to cause similar results.

Q. Do people ever experience warning signs before a stroke?
A. Some do. Persistent headache is the most common sign. Other warnings include numbness, weakness, slurred speech, and disorientation.
