## PROMINENT JUNCTION BUSINESS MAN DIES.

At 2:10 Friday morning, James Lee Ragland passed away at his home in Junction, after an illness of about two weeks. For twenty years he had been prominently identified with the business and livestock enterprises of Junction and Kimble County, and few men have, during such a period, gained a stronger hold on the whole citizenship.

Jim, as he was familiarly known, was a splendid example of the adage "the best way to have friends is to be one;" for it was his greatest pleasure to assist the needy and extend a helping hand to the sick and disabled of the community. Not only was he always ready to help the unfortunate, but he was alive to the needs and aspirations of the community in which he lived. Every progressive movement found in him a loyal supporter, and during his twenty years in Junction he has played his part in the development and progress of the town.

He was born at Smiley, in Gonzales County, April 6, 1887, and came to Kimble County with his family in 1903. In 1909 he married Miss Willie Maddux, daughter of J. M. Maddux and wife of Menard. To them were born two sons, Louis and Gerald, and two daughters, Marjorie and Madeline.

Surviving him are his parents Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Ragland, three brothers, G. R., B. B. and Tom and four sisters, Mesdames Mollie Williams, of Smiley, Lee Lowry, Coleman Highsmith and Howell Wright, his wife and four children.

His family, parents, his brother, G. R., and sisters, except Mrs. Williams, were with him at the time of his death. B. B. and Tom Ragland arrived a few hours later.

He was a member of the local Masonic Lodge, and of the Shrine at San Antonio.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. R. E. Parker at the Methodist Church, and the body was laid away by the Masonic Order with impressive ceremony.

One of the largest crowds ever attending a funeral in Junction was at his funeral.

To his wife and children and other relatives, the Eagle, with the host of friends, extends sympathy in the hour of their great loss.

## DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT KERRVILLE FRIDAY.

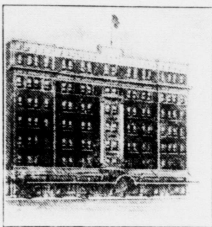

## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE. ASKS FOR TAX REMEDY.

Some weeks ago the Eagle carried a reprinted article from the San Antonio Express showing the tax dodging counties of the State and showing the manner in which these counties make low renditions and get a bonus for being a part of the State. Many counties in the West and Southwest receive little or nothing from the State, compared with the taxes paid. A map in F. M. Chase's window is drawn by the State Tax Commissioner, and is easily understood.

A mass meeting was recently held at Brady and resolutions presented to the Commissioners' Court, asking for a lower rendition in that county to the end that McCulloch might not pay more than its just share of the State Taxes.

The local Chamber of Commerce has discussed the matter and the following resolution has been sent to the Governor and it is hoped that he will submit the tax problem to the present called session of the Legislature for consideration.

"Hon. Pat M. Neff,  
Governor of Texas,  
Austin, Texas.

Dear Sir:

Resolved that we, the Chamber of Commerce of Kimble County, Texas, in a mass meeting assembled this 11th day of April, 1923, feeling grievously wronged at the methods of assessment for State Taxes in Texas, we are forced to pay at a higher assessment, and by reason of said higher assessment, pay more taxes to the State of Texas than 29 certain counties in this State, averaging only about 15 per cent of value, and who in addition draw out of the State Treasury a sum of money greater than the total of all taxes they pay to the State.

We feel that this system of taxation is unjust, unfair and discriminating. Now therefore, we do hereby petition the Honorable Pat M. Neff, Governor of Texas, to submit the question of equalization of taxes in Texas at the special session of the Legislature, which convenes on the 16th of April, 1923, to the end that provision be made for the establishment of a Board of Equalization for taxes in this State, in so far as the equalization of taxes, one county with another, is concerned."

3 per cent companies.

**State Parks:**

S. B. 377.—Making provision for acquiring and improving as a State park that tract of land on the Brazos in Washington County, the site of the First Capitol of Texas, to be known as Washington State Park.

 **Suffrage:**

S. B. 136.—Providing for absentee voting in general elections as well as primary elections and permitting it to be done from without the State in such elections.

S. B. 121.—providing that county and precinct chairmen shall take office the first Saturday following the run-off primary.

**Taxes:**

S. B. 281.—Releasing Hidalgo County from payment of State taxes for 25 years in order that storm protection may be constructed.

S. B. 343.—Providing for the collection of taxes delinquent in what is now Willacy County.

H. B. 12.—imposing a tax of 1 cent per gallon on gasoline and its substitutes of gravity lighter than kerosene.

H. B. 328.—Levying a tax of 2 per cent on the gross production of sulphur in the State.

S. B. 350.—To refund taxes paid by counties on marble, sand and shell used for public purposes.

**Water Improvement Districts:**

H. B. 287.—Validating water permits issued by one water improvement district to irrigate land in another district.

H. B. 295.—Prescribing the method of selecting directors in water improvement districts.

H. B. 566.—Permitting the exclusion of lands from water improvement districts where they cannot be irrigated by gravity and providing a method for their subsequent inclusion.

**Voting Machine:**

H. B. 653.—Appropriating \$27,000 to purchase the electric voting machine used in the House of Representatives.

**COMMITTEE TO ASSIST  
IN NAMING PRESIDENT.**

Election of the successor to Dr. Robert E. Vinson as president of the University and final arrangements for the loan from Brown-Crummer Company of Wichita, Kansas, will be the main questions occupying the attention of the University board of regents in their spring meeting here on April 21, it was announced at the University.

Seven members of the faculty of the University have been named to serve as an advisory council to the board of regents in determining selection of the man who will head the University. The members are: Dr. J. T. Patterson, Dr. M. B. Porter, Dr. E. C. Barker, E. C. H. Bantel, Dr. C. G. Haines, Dr. W. S. Sutton and Dean Spurgeon Bell.

The regents in their April meeting will confer with the joint legislative committee regarding final arrangements for the Brown-Crummer loan to finance projected building plans at the University. Whether the loan will go through depends upon the results of the conference. Nothing definite will be done concerning the loan until after the conference.
