Farm Bureau Representatives Are In Utah And Colorado Learning Of Methods; Miss M. Murfee Comments

(Special To The Journal)

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah—July 14.—Details of the organization, operation and methods of procedure of various commodity cooperative marketing associations in Utah and Colorado have been obtained by members of the Texas Farm Women's Special since they left Texas a number of days ago. In Colorado the party gave study to the cooperative marketing of wheat, potatoes, beans and beef. In Utah ways and means of handling eggs, poultry, cherries, milk and butter were investigated. The party will next visit the farming and distribution centers of California where cooperative marketing has been in operation over a period of years, and where the standard of living on the farm homes ranks the highest in the United States.

The party is made up of thirty outstanding farm women of the state, the tour being sponsored by the educational department of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association under the direction of Miss Susan Landon, Miss Mae Murfee of Lubbock, Texas, representing the county of Lubbock, is a member of the party, through the cooperation of the following organizations and agencies: Chamber of Commerce and County Federation of Women's Clubs.

The party left Dallas July 9th and will return on July 26th. In commenting upon the tour to date, Miss Murfee said:

"An exceptionally interesting, educational and valuable trip is being had and we are accumulating a vast amount of material which will be of interest and value to the communities of Texas, and a direct application to farm prosperity, and the raising of the standard of living upon the farm homes of the state.

"We have studied the bean, wheat and potato cooperatives of Colorado and just finished a study of the poultry, egg, butter and creamery cooperatives of Utah. From each have we gathered facts and figures showing the manner and method of organization, the problems met, the progress made and its effect upon the grower members. We have likewise secured at every stop a hearty reception and many entertainments have been provided for us in order to make the tour as interesting as possible.

"The outstanding fact that has been noted in the success of the various cooperatives studied," she said, "is that major consideration and attention has been given to both the improvement of the quality of the commodity and its standardization when offered for merchandising in the commodity market. The fullest extent of cooperation is reported on behalf of the membership in the various commodity organizations, and much of the credit of success is given to this factor.

"It is interesting to note, also, the large percentage of the commodity lines handled by the various cooperatives, even through in operation only a few years. As we enter the farming centers of California, even more valuable data will be obtained, as in these centers cooperative marketing has been in operation over a period of years and developed to a high point of efficiency and

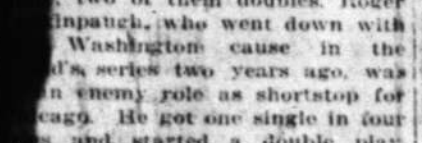

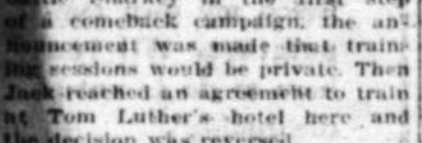

Orators In History

Great judicial dramas—trials which have lived on in history—are discussed in a recent issue of La Semaine Littéraire for the purpose of remarking that the ancient orators of Athens and Rome are no more. England had a Burke and a Carlyle, and America remembers the history of Patrick Henry and the Daniel Webster, but all these owe their fame to legislative oratory rather than to forensic achievement in the courtroom.

At first it might be assumed that the historical significance of the case at trial rather than the forensic oratorical powers of Cicero and his prototypes accounted for the immortality of the oratory of these latter, whereas just the reverse is true. 'Twas immortal oratory which lent immortality to the trials of Caligula and of the Athenian orators. By the same token men of secondary rank were accidentally exalted to historical recognition by the oratory of those who accused or defended them in the courtroom.

That latter is true of several clients or adversaries of Cicero. Who would know today, for example, of the extortions of Verres or the profligacy of Claudius if the great master of Roman eloquence had not pilloried them before posterity as classical examples of official rapacity and political degeneracy?

Neither did the modern trials of men like Lucheni, the assassin of the Empress of Austria, or Caserio, the assassin of President Carnot, involve elements of intrinsic historical interest. These trials were little else than proceedings to decide the fate of criminals who were abnormal fanatics, mentally unbalanced and largely irresponsible for their acts. Their crimes called for no great discussion of principles. The offenders had no political program, no class doctrines, they were merely primitive creatures dominated by a cruel instinct to kill.

Indeed, it is difficult to define exactly what constitutes a great historical trial. However, many might be cited in France during periods of great moral and political ferment that left a permanent imprint upon political institutions. They sometimes started serious popular agitations; in other instances they crystallized public opinion and settled for all time an issue that had previously been a source of constant and tumultuous discord.

Great judicial dramas reveal the manners and habits of a people better than memoranda, letters or documents and at least as well as the great masterpieces of the stage. But it is not the rank of litigants, the atrocity of crimes or the eloquence of advocates that constitute a great historical trial; it is rather the content of the case itself, the milieu in which conflicting principles are debated, the historical moment where great popular interest clash or social forces come to a head—in a word, it is the ensemble of surrounding political circumstances and settled for all time an issue that had previously been a source of constant and tumultuous discord.

Looks Up

The ducks, usually, went the way of the quail, the wild turkey, the buffalo, the virgin forest. We have paid dearly for our forefathers' prodigality, and just now we are beginning to correct their errors.

The only charge that could be preferred against some of the bathers we've seen on the beaches this season is false pretenses.

The Plainisman, like most average Americans, is bull-headed. Whenever somebody tries to FORCE him to do something he just naturally gets his back up, spraddles out his hind legs like a mule, and directs them to the nether regions. And, furthermore, the Plainisman feels the same way when a bunch of foreigners—who should have their hands full attending to their OWN petty affairs of government—TRY to tell this government how to run ITS affairs. That's what has happened in the cases of Sacco and Vanzetti. These two Reds—and they're acknowledged to be such—were found guilty in OUR courts of murder and sentenced to die. A bunch of Hanyaks in Europe and in South America immediately got excited, and, aided by a flock of misguided 'humanitarians' who hate to see any murderer go to his just reward, have raised so much sand in regard to the matter that Governor Fuller, of Massachusetts, doesn't know whether to 'shoot or give up the pistol.' And he's the man to decide whether Sacco and Vanzetti die and if so, when. The Plainisman hopes Governor Fuller decides that the jurors and the judges who have heard and reviewed the Sacco-Vanzetti case are right and that he orders the guillotine of the land to be UPHELD TO THE LETTER.

If Sacco and Vanzetti really committed the murder of which they have been found guilty, the Plainisman hopes they pay the penalty for it. The fact that they are radicals, should not, of course, enter into their innocence or guilt as murderers. Yet it certainly should not be held up as a defense for them.

The tax on land is 83 percent of their total taxes, while those engaged in business, insurance, and other commercial activities, pay out in taxes from 24 percent to 31 percent of their total profits.
