Visitors To Tech Engineering Show To See Operations

All Laboratories Will Be Running During 2 Days Of Second Annual Show; Machines Demonstrated

All laboratory equipment of the civil engineering department of Texas Technological college will be in operation and on display during the second annual Engineers' Show here April 11 and 12. Hugh Hancock, student who is in charge of that division of the event, announced Wednesday.

"The equipment we have is up to date and fairly complete," said Hancock. "It is used as an adjunct to class work in design. We hope to give some idea as to the importance of testing all materials of construction. Due to the use of tests it is possible to build more economical structures than ever before. The tests we are equipped to make are required by the bureau of public roads on all Federal aid projects."

Test Concrete's Strength
"Of late years much study and research have been given to making strong concrete. We can now design a mix and predict with a fair degree of accuracy what the strength of the concrete will be. We have a machine in our laboratory with which we can apply a load to a concrete cylinder, 6 by 12 inches, equal to the weight of an average size locomotive."

Included in this display will be a brick rattle, an hydraulic laboratory, used for gauging water flow, and a test of briquets.

B.C.D. Favors Cotton Co-Op Center In Lubbock

Meeting Will Be Held On Tuesday To Discuss Plans

General Sentiment Of Farmers And Business Men Of Section To Be Taken; To Hear Dallas Man

Board of directors of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development went on record as favoring the organization of district two of the Texas Cotton Cooperative association, with headquarters in this city, at a meeting of the officials Wednesday morning, but action toward underwriting the \$27,500 cost for such a set-up was deferred until further sentiment of farmers and business men can be obtained.

B. Sherrod, J. A. Hodges and R. A. Overstreet were appointed to compose a committee to ascertain the general sentiment of those who will be affected by the organization.

May Hear Westbrook

Dean A. H. Leidigh, of Texas Technological college and a member of Governor Moody's committee to work out the Texas set-up, was named by the directors to locate Lawrence Westbrook, of Dallas, also a member of the governor's committee, and extend an invitation for him to come to Lubbock and speak at a mass meeting next Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Definite action is expected to follow this meeting.

Lubbock can secure the headquarters of 67 counties of this district by its chamber of commerce underwriting the cost of organizing 4000 new members for the cotton organization at \$5 each, which will amount to \$20,000, and for also underwriting \$7,500 cost for establishment of a branch office.

The proposal was outlined here last Monday by C. O. Moser, of Dallas, vice-president of the American Cotton Cooperative association.

Dallas Senator Declares He Will Not Become Candidate For Lt.-Governor; Only Anti-Smith In Race

DALLAS, April 2.—Senator Thomas B. Love today denied what he termed "baseless press reports" that he would withdraw from the race for governor and become a candidate for lieutenant governor in event Dan Moody should announce for a third term.

"There are at this time 17 candidates in the race for governor of whom I am the only candidate who voted with the majority of the people of Texas in 1928 against Al Smith," Love said. "Why should I object to anybody else who voted for Al Smith running also if he wants to? Let there be no misunderstanding. I shall be in the race for governor to the end and I will win."

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Plans For Drive For Legion Home Talked Tonight

Meeting Is Scheduled For Hotel Lubbock At 7:30 To Review Campaign; Seek To Raise \$12,000

Analysis of the campaign for a local American legion home, to be started April 14 in this city, will be reviewed tonight at 7:30 o'clock at the regular meeting of Allen Brothers post at the Hotel Lubbock.

The local Legionnaires will seek to raise \$12,000 for the new structure, to be erected on a lot immediately north of the municipal building which has been donated for the purpose by the City of Lubbock.

The "40 and 8" campaign organization composed of 48 local business men, will manage the drive for the Legion.

"We plan to help the boys to build their home and at the same time use the occasion to let the children of this city know the meaning of American citizenship," said M. H. Duncan, superintendent of city schools. "Beginning next Monday, the public schools of the city will begin a study of the World war to use it as a means of causing our boys and girls to think more seriously of their duties, privileges and opportunities as American citizens."

Schools To Aid. In the grade schools each teacher will conduct the campaign from April 7 to April 18, and, by making the World war a center of interest in their work, the teachers will try to impress the pupil as vividly as possible just what our soldiers had to go through with during the war and what the hardships and privations they had to endure mean to us today. During these two weeks the teachers will center the work in geography, history, language and the other studies around the World war. In the high school and junior high school the civics and history teachers will conduct the campaign and do the work as indicated.

"We feel that the teachers should contribute to the fund from one to two dollars each, and the principals should contribute from three to five dollars each. We should make donations from all the schools amount to seven or eight hundred dollars."

"Each pupil who gives as much as 10 cents will have his name placed on an honor roll that will be kept permanently in this American Legion home."

HELP THE CENSUS-TAKER

THIS is a plea for public co-operation with enumerators of the 1930 Federal census over the South Plains.

The plea is being made, not because The Morning Avalanche is any more interested in the welfare of census-takers than it is in any other group of public workers, but because co-operation in the gigantic task is essential to the South Plains—Lubbock and every other city therein.

In brief, it is our opinion that the South Plains should show just as large a population as it can show—and make the showing with accuracy and dispatch. We also feel that the final figures on value of homes and farms, total percentage of native-born, white citizens and other information will react sharply to the benefit of this territory.

The business man who does not realize the handicap this section labors under as a result of the 1920 figures is an exception. It is hard to convince the North and East that Lubbock, with 4,081 citizens in 1920 now has a population of about 22,000—and the same thing holds good for every city in this section. It is likewise difficult to convince the world at large that progress has been as marked as it really has been during the past 10 years.

The Morning Avalanche confidently expects Lubbock and the South Plains to show as much advancement and growth in the next ten years as it has in the last decade—if not more. It behooves the public, therefore, to assist in just as much information and just as high a population as it is possible to do. Co-operation with census enumerators will help the same along.

If Lubbock were located, say in Massachusetts or Maine—where populations fluctuate largely in ratio with births and deaths—this newspaper would consider the thought behind this editorial as worthless.

But in a growing territory—where you have more of everything tomorrow than you do today—the horse is of another color.

Let's all help to show Uncle Sam as near what we have as possible.

HEROES

The name of Brown, we are led to believe, won the game. A five-column photograph shows us Brown in the act of carrying the bill over.

But who is the unidentified youngster with the long legs who is one step ahead of Brown in the photograph? His name is Smith, and he isn't a hero. He doesn't count.

Brown carried the ball over the goal line five times, and all this fellow Smith had to do to lose at his side and block tacklers who had designs on Brown. He merely cleared the way and reduced Brown's duties to the simple business of trotting behind and clinging to the ball.

Insignificant Smith! Victorious Brown! Dispatches from the front inform us that the gallant Four Hundred and Twenty-first stormed the ridge and cleared out a nest that had threatened the line for weeks. Actually, stormed the position, right up that steep hill!

Glorious achievement!

Of course there were many batteries in the rear that bombarded the ridge for an hour before the advance and laid down a creeping barrage that destroyed every living thing on the ridge and before it, but these batteries merely killed off the enemy and made the advance possible. That was all.

Two brothers get jobs and feed the family in order that a third may be relieved of obligation and may get an education. The public prints praise him. The child, thus favored, makes the most of his opportunity and achieves distinction. He is the family hero—the neighborhood hero. Nobody mentions the two who made him what he is—who sacrificed themselves to confer greatness upon him. They were mere interference.

The spotlight covers little territory. It reveals the man who stands high. It seldom reveals those who hold him up. The history of war is a biography of generals. They carry the ball. The lesser patriots who furnished the interference figures in history only as statistics.

HAPPINESS AND WEALTH

In all societies man feeds more upon "abstractions" than upon facts. He is most content who finds his kingdom in his mind. Such was the teaching of the days when the right to the pursuit of happiness was written into the Declaration of Independence, and the doctrine is not yet dead. Yet the tangible and negotiable things are what appeal to most people in this age of utility and comfort.

There are any number of men and women, both young and old, in whom is happily blended theoretical and practical factors in the securing of happiness. The right to happiness can well be viewed through the bestowments which have come through an era of prosperity and progress. The ratio of happiness may not be higher than when the dictum of the Declaration was written, but it is certainly just as high in some people.

Despite spectacular crime and pillage, there never was a day of worthier enterprise with higher awards than exists in this country for the young man who is willing to do one thing—buckle his best intelligence to honest work.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

FAILURE OF NAVAL PARLEY FORSEEN

WASHINGTON, April 2.—No gift of prophecy is required to see in advance that international negotiations like the London naval conference are almost sure to fail. A country which is not afraid of some other country does not need to ask the latter to limit its armament before limiting its own. Such a request, in itself, is equivalent to an admission that the country which makes it is afraid to cut down unless the other cuts down, too.

Hence, when five sea powers' representatives meet to discuss limitation of their navies, the very fact that they do so proclaims their suspicions of one another.

Each delegation is after all the advantages it can get for the country it represents. It genuinely desires all around reduction, to save money—but it wants to maneuver the representatives of some rival (or potential rival) power into agreeing to a greater reduction than it is willing to promise in behalf of its own home land.

Each of the countries which sent delegations to London is not jealous of all the other four, but each is jealous of at least one of the others. These jealousies, cross-crossing, involve all five.

Experienced diplomats (unless they actually want war, which sometimes is the case, but not now) do not like peace conferences overly well. Their theory is that they tend to make latent, subconscious jealousies and suspicions acute, and obvious to everyone; therefore worse.

This was the best illustrated in London by developments between France and Italy.

These two countries had not thought of one another as maritime rivals before the conference began. Early in the negotiations, however, it was revealed that English reduction was hampered by Gallic sea strength. Would the French curtail? They were asked; which reminded them, for the first time, that they could not do so very well, Italy being so strong. "Strong!" exclaimed the Italians. "Not nearly strong enough—now you mention it. We must start warship building." "Against us?" cried the French. "Whom else?" replied the Italians. And today French and Italian newspapers positively are weighing the possibilities of war.

That none of the groups of London conferees represented an unadulterated national peace sentiment was patent even before they left for the British capital; otherwise their respective governments already would have closed up their various war and navy departments and ministries without waiting to consult together.

Doubtless they showed their practical horse sense by refraining from doing so. Nevertheless it did not indicate a 100 per cent peace determination.

Briefly, all the delegations, with all their governments and peoples behind them, without exception were more less insincere from the outset.

They knew it before they got to London. They probably did not confess it even to themselves, but a considerable admixture of insincerity was inherent in the situation.

Prime Minister MacDonald might have been an exception, but he is a good many generations ahead of his time. It is hard to believe that the practical President Hoover was fooled much; he hoped for the best doubtless.

A peace conference, until the world is ready for peace, is like rubbing liniment on the outside, in an attempt to cure an internal cancer.

Indeed, the liniment is irritating. The only thing to do is to take out as much of the sting as possible with a soothing lotion, in the form of a make-believe peace pact, and wait until a real cancer cure is discovered.

INHERITANCE IS CHIEF FACTOR IN DETERMINING COMPLEXION

Everybody knows that skin color is likely to be inherited. Human races are classified into white, black, yellow, brown and red—an inaccurate classification, since the skin color of any race is the result of black, yellow and red pigments brought to the skin by the blood.

The skin color is also susceptible to such influences as exposure to the sun. Observers feel that the color of the skin is determined by the depositing of pigments of the blood controlled through the glands of internal secretion and that these are in turn controlled by the hereditary mechanism.

Because of frequent mixtures of races there are now all grades of color visible in various populations. The experts in the study of heredity have attempted to work out the rules which govern the inheritance of color. Actually, insufficient amounts of study have been made to establish these laws as certain, although it is generally recognized that the first cross between white and black brings a brown mulatto or yellow mulatto, and that thereafter there are variations without, however, any appearance of a perfect black or white descendant.

The various grades of coloration vary so greatly that it is not infrequent to have difficulties in ascertaining the presence of various amounts of blood of different races.

The same factors apply to the inheritance of hair. Human hair may be straight, wavy, kinky or curly. Because of the tremendous mixtures that have gone on for hundreds of years between people with hair of various types, it is not possible to postulate certainly any type of hair for a child in any given family.

However, the evidence thus far assembled seems to indicate that if a person with wavy hair marries another with wavy hair, the children are likely to have straight, wavy or curly hair in approximately equal proportions. In the same way, if a person with straight hair marries another with straight hair all three types may occur, but the majority will have straight hair.

If a person with curly hair marries one with straight hair, most of the children will have straight hair. If the father's hair is straight; but most of the children will have curly hair, if the father's hair is curly.

The figures cited were based on the records of mixtures of Filipinos with Chinese in which the Filipinos had curly hair and the Chinese straight hair. R. R. Gates is inclined to believe that these results for Filipinos are reserved in Americans.

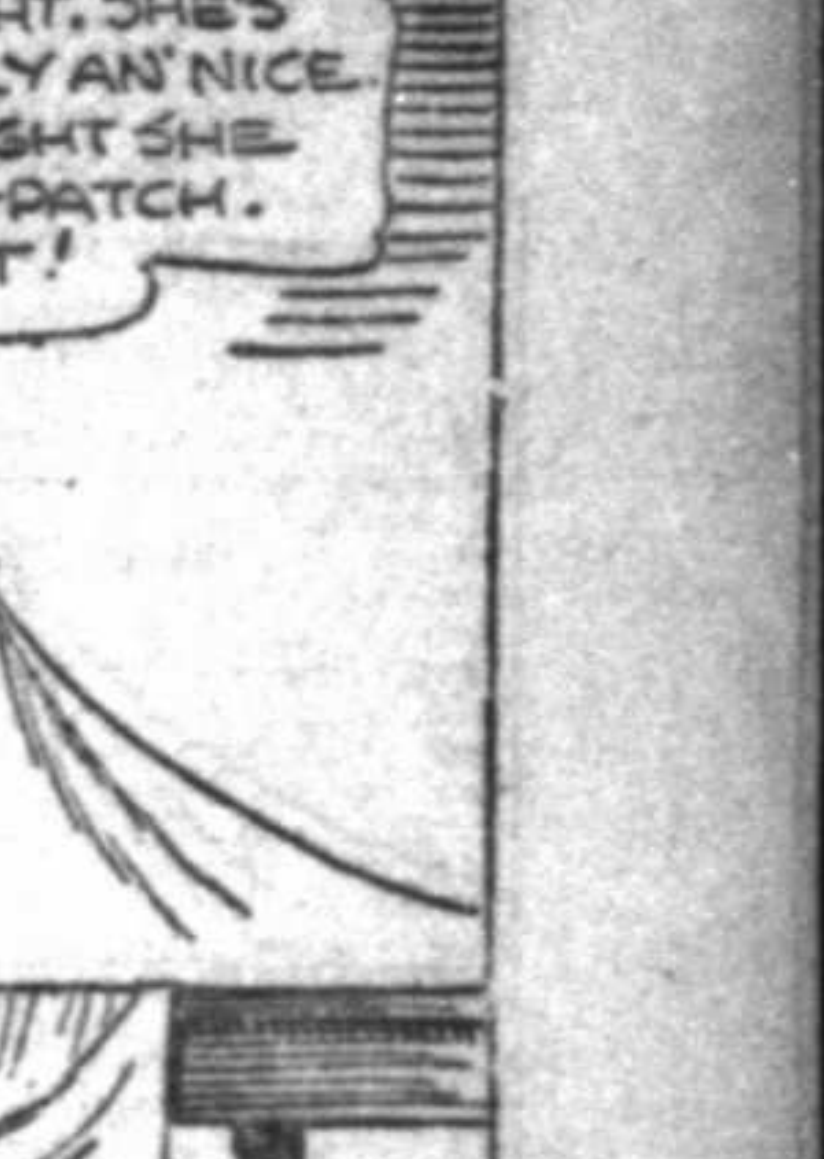

Satin Ribbon Is Latest Clue In Murder of Woman
(By Associated Press.)
CHICAGO, April 2.—A black satin ribbon today was the latest addition to the list of instruments of death and the chief clue in the strange slaying of young Mrs. Mildred Helmsing.

Mrs. Helmsing's body was found by her husband, Reuben Helmsing, when he returned home from work last night. Around her neck was knotted a black satin ribbon he had never seen before.

Several things, including bruises on the face and wrists and the absence of her pocketbook, indicated she had been strangled by a thief whom she surprised at work. But there were several other points which tended to disprove this theory.

No sounds of a struggle were heard by other tenants in the apartment building in which the Helmsings lived—not even by the woman in the apartment below, who said she was home all day.

Mrs. Helmsing, who was 26, was a former student at the University of Illinois while her husband graduated from the University of Nebraska.

Local Man Facing Pro Law Charge

Apprehended Wednesday morning by Deputy Sheriff O. B. Conley on the second floor of the Temple Ellis building, J. J. Crow, of Lubbock, is in the Lubbock county jail on charge of violation of the prohibition law.

Officers allege that Crow had one-half of a gallon of whiskey when he was first seen in the office building. At sight of the officers, Crow is said to have thrown the jar, which was wrapped in paper, on the floor, breaking it and spilling the contents. A sufficient amount of the liquid is said to have been mopped up for evidence.

Crow's bond was set at \$1,500, to await action of the grand jury, at an examining trial Wednesday morning in the court of Justice of Peace G. R. Scott.

STREET CARS BOMBED

Tax Collections Show Increase of Over \$125,000,000

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, April 2.—The treasury department's final statement for the month of March today showed income taxes aggregating \$627,924,917 were collected during the first quarter of the present calendar year, sending the total for nine months of the fiscal year to \$1,812,187,944, an increase of \$125,274,244 over the same period of the previous fiscal year.

It was indicated at the treasury today, however, that the total income tax for the year would fall between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000 short of the estimates made when President Hoover submitted his first budget to congress last December. Collections for the second quarter, it was explained, would drop \$50,000,000 from those of the first quarter.

The treasury estimated in December that receipts from income tax in the 1930 fiscal year would amount to \$2,480,000,000. The collection of \$1,812,000,000 for the first nine months, however, plus an indicated collection of \$550,000,000 from the same source for the next three months would fall below the amount indicated last December.
