Exposition Will Open Gates On Thurs. Oct. 23

Several Matters Discussed With Reference To The Handling Of Exhibits

A meeting of the officers and directors of the Dawson County Fair Association was held last Thursday night at which time several matters were discussed and acted upon. Among other actions was the decision to award \$5.00 in cash to each Educational Exhibit entered, with the understanding that unless they were satisfactory and met certain standards this year, they would not be allowed to enter the fair in 1942. These educational exhibits are open to 4-H, Future Farmers and Home Demonstration Clubs.

It was also decided to attempt a control of the dust problem in the exhibit buildings by the use of chemicals.

The directors discussed the fair catalog which will be printed within a short time, and took up other routine matters.

The fair will open on Thursday, October 23, and run through the following Saturday night. It will be held at the Fair Grounds in south Lamesa.

The same carnival attraction that was featured last year will be here again to furnish the midway attraction.

Golden Tornadoes Will Go To Plainview For Tilt With Bulldogs Friday

Game Promises To Be The Toughest Thus Far For Charges Of Coaches Gregg And Neill

The Lamesa Golden Tornadoes travel to Plainview this week end to meet the Plainview High School Bulldogs at 8 P. M. Friday night. The game of this week will be returned next year at the corresponding time of the football season. Lamesa, lost to Plainview last year by one touchdown in a hard played game.

Plainview played last week without the service of their star back, Speedy Mason, and lost to Abilene 25 to 0. Assistant Coach Jim Neill who scouted the game reports that the score does not reveal the strength of the Bulldogs, who played to much hard luck last week. It is predicted that the Golden Tornadoes will have their hardest competition to date from the Plainview team.

Only one District 3-AA team has lost a game this season and that was Midland to Ysleta week before last. Lamesa, Abilene, Sweetwater, Big Spring and San Angelo all won their games last Friday. Colorado City was tied by the powerful Green Wave of Monahans. Odessa and Midland were not scheduled. The district teams are beginning the season in a way to indicate that it is one of the strongest districts in the University Interscholastic League.

Odessa will come to Lamesa on Friday night, October 3, for the Tornadoes first conference game. Odessa authorities have asked for the largest block of reserved seats tickets ever requested by visitors to McCollum Field and of course have been provided with duets for the Odessa fans who will occupy the east section and top portion of the middle section of Lamesa's commodious grandstand. Reserve seat tickets will be placed on sale at Lamesa drug stores on Monday.

The Odessa game will be the first conference 3-AA game for Lamesa and the second conference game for the Bronchos, as they play Colorado City this week end at Odessa. The Bronchos have been voted by district coaches as the district's likely winner along with Sweetwater. Lamesa has been placed in the top bracket for district honors which makes the Odessa-Lamesa game take on added interest.

Five Hundred Dogs Enter Various Contests When Wolf Hunters Hold Meet

Four Day Gathering Is Held At Cedar Lake With Visitors Coming From As Far Away As Tulsa

The annual West Texas-New Mexico Wolf Hunters Association meeting at Cedar Lake this week, while disappointing in attendance, saw the number of hounds far exceed anything previous.

A checkup Tuesday night revealed that approximately five hundred dogs were quartered at the north end of the lake, ranging from puppies of unknown vintage, to dogs reportedly worth \$1,000 each.

The bench show held Monday night attracted an estimated crowd of one thousand visitors, many of them driving out from Lamesa and Seagraves to witness the event.

Hunts have been held each morning, at which time the dogs were judged by field judges. Off the record hunt have been held nightly and it is reported that quite a number of wolves have been caught in the hunts each night.

\$75,000.00 Set Aside By Texas Road Commission

Contract Expected To Be Let At November Meeting Of Texas Highway Body

The road from Lamesa to Brownfield is at last to be completed, according to information just received by County Judge Vernon D. Adcock, from District Engineer S. C. McCarty.

Mr. McCarty advises that an appropriation of \$75,000.00 has been made by the Texas Highway Commission for the purpose of constructing the surfacing of Highway 137 from Punkin Center to the Terry County line.

As has already been announced Terry County has already let contract for their part of the road and construction is now under way in that county. The road has been completed for some time from Lamesa to Punkin Center and with this section mentioned above, the road will then be completed all the way from Lamesa to Brownfield.

Mr. McCarty stated that they hoped to have plans complete so that a contract can be awarded at the November meeting of the Highway Commission.

Try These New Cake Recipes...

Miss Mattie Phenix, County Home Demonstration Agent

WHITE CAKE
3-4 cup butter
1-2 cups sugar
3 cups cake flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk
1-2 teaspoon almond extract
1 teaspoon lemon extract
4 egg whites
Cream the butter, add the sugar and beat well. Sift the flour, baking powder and salt, and add alternately with the milk and egg whites. Beat the egg whites until stiff and fold into cake. Bake in two layers in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 25 to 30 minutes.

BOILED ICING
2-4 cups sugar
1-2 cup light corn syrup
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 cup water
2 egg whites
1 teaspoon vanilla
Cook sugar, corn syrup, salt and

water together to the firm ball stage (248 deg. F.). Pour the hot syrup slowly into the well beaten egg whites, beating constantly. Add vanilla and continue beating until the frosting will hold its shape when tossed over the back of a spoon. Tint as desired with pure food color and spread on the cake. Note: Should it become too stiff to manipulate easily, a small amount of hot water may be added.

ONE-TWO-THREE-FOUR CAKE
1 cup butter
2 cups sugar
3 cups flour
4 eggs
1 cup milk
3 teaspoons baking powder
1-8 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon lemon
Cream the butter and sugar and add beaten egg yolks. Alternately add the flour (mixed and sifted with the baking powder and salt) and the milk. Lastly, fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites and the flouring. Bake in loaf pans in moderately hot oven (375 deg. F.) for 25-30 minutes.
To vary this standard recipe add two squares of melted chocolate to the milk and use two tablespoons

Farmers Digging Trench Silos

The trench silo will solve the feed problem of many Dawson County farmers during the coming months. With continued showers much feed will be lost or will be severely weather damaged. But weather conditions will not stop the putting of feed in a silo. Silos can be filled during wet weather. Feed put in a trench silo will not

1 teaspoon vanilla
2 teaspoons lemon extract
Break the chocolate into small pieces and melt over warm water. Cream the butter and add the sugar slowly, beating vigorously. Beat the yolks of the eggs until thick and add to the sugar and butter mixture. Add the melted chocolate and mix well. Sift the flour, salt, baking powder and cinnamon and add alternately with the milk and extracts, beginning and ending with the flour mixture. Beat the whites until they are stiff, and fold into cake. Bake in to 8 inch layer cake pans in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about 30 minutes. Ice with fudge frosting.

SPONGE CAKE
5 eggs
1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1-2 tablespoon grated lemon rind
lemon extract may be substituted
1 cup flour
Separate whites and yolks of eggs. Beat yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar gradually, then lemon juice and rind. Cut and fold in the sifted flour, and cut and fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in an ungreased pan in a very moderate oven, 300 to 250 degrees F. Main principle: Use care in mixing eggs and sugar in order not to cook eggs in lumps. Sift flour several (3-5) times, fold egg whites in carefully.

GOLD CAKE
1-2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
8 egg yolks
1 3-4 cups pastry flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1-4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-2 cup milk
Cream the butter and add the sugar gradually. Beat the egg yolks until thick and add to the butter mixture. Mix and sift all dry ingredients and add alternately with the milk and vanilla extract, beginning with the flour. Bake in three 7 inch square layer cake pans in a moderate oven (360 degrees F.) for 30 minutes.

LEMON FILLING FOR GOLD CAKE
3 tablespoons cornstarch or
1-4 cup flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 cup cold water
1-2 cup boiling water
1 tablespoon butter
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 teaspoon lemon extract
2 egg yolks
Mix the cornstarch, sugar and salt. Add cold water and mix until free from lumps. Add the boiling water and cook until thick and clear. Continue cooking for three minutes, mixing lightly. Combine the remaining ingredients, mixing lightly, and add to the first mixture. Cook 1 minute and cool before placing between layers of cake.

ANGEL FOOD CAKE
1 1-2 cups cake flour
2 cups sugar
1 1-2 egg whites
1-2 teaspoon salt
1 1-2 tsp cream of tartar
1 1-2 tsp flavoring
Measure and sift the flour three times with about 1-3 of the sugar. Beat egg whites and salt until foamy, add cream of tartar and beat until the foam will just "peak" (work quickly) add rest of sugar rapidly and continue beating about 1-2 minute. Stir in the flavoring with a few strokes. Add the flour mixture rapidly enough to incorporate within three minutes, continue stirring about 1 minute. Fill an ungreased tube pan not more than 2-3 full. Bake 50 minutes at 335 deg. F. When done invert the pan and allow cake to cool before removing from pan.

A NEW CHOCOLATE CAKE
4 oz. bitter chocolate
3-4 cup butter
1 1-2 cups white sugar
3 eggs
2 1-2 cups cake flour
1-4 teaspoon salt
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 cup milk

suffer any damage from weevils or rats; winter rains and spring sandstorms will not affect feed in a silo; and there will be no fire hazards. Feed from one acre stored in a trench silo is equal in feeding value to two acres of feed in a stack. Too, the feed in a silo remains constant in its value. Feed stored in a stack loses moisture, palatability; is constantly being damaged by rain and sand, and is ever subject to heavy fire losses. Feed in a silo will remain as good as the day it was put in, while stacked feed is deteriorating every month.

Dawson County farmers realize that our years of plenty are followed by years of short crops. They also realize that feed, especially bundle crops, are cheap in good years, and then in the dry years, bundle crops are high in price. The plentiful feed crops of 1941 will more than pay for their storage in the lean years that are to come. And the trench silo is the ideal way to store this cheap feed crop.

The number of trench silos in Dawson County is increasing more this year than in any other year. C. A. Meyers, Route 1, Lamesa, has enlarged an old silo and dug two new ones. Pat Boatright, Route C, Lamesa, has put in a new silo and filled it. T. A. Kellam, Route 2, Lamesa, has dug two new silos. Lee Billingsley, Lamesa has dug a silo on his farm on the Key Road. Fred Henderson is filling his new silo in the Grandview community. J. S. Allen, Route 2, Lamesa, is digging three new silos to complete a battery of four on his farm east of Key. Many more farmers are filling old silos and others are digging silos for the first time this year.

Threshed grain can be stored in silos. It will not be damaged either. Grain in a silo loses its fertility and cannot be planted, but does not lose any of its food value. Heads can also be stored in the trench.

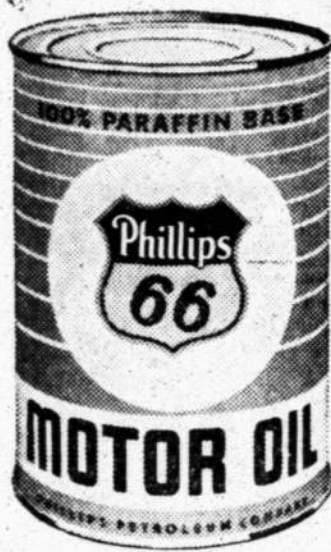

Don't Limit Fall Gardens To Few Vegetables

Don't limit your fall garden to turnips and greens alone, cautions J. P. Rosborough, horticulturist of the A. and M. College Extension Service. Carrots, beets, English peas, radishes, beans, collards, cabbage, mustard and lettuce will grow as well in fall gardens.

Now is the time, Rosborough says, to rid the garden of weeds and plow it three or four inches deep. Chop up clods until the earth is thoroughly pulverized. If this is done now the soil will be ready for planting as soon as moisture permits.

If there is adequate moisture, vegetables which can stand the heat of September and October may be planted now. But don't make the mistake of planting those which will not withstand heat. In addition to mustard greens and turnips, he suggests onions, white potatoes and radishes. In areas where frost is

not likely to occur until late November, the potatoes should be planted now. Bliss Triumph is a quick maturing variety.

When this planting is done, fill an old tub or box about two thirds full of dirt, mixing equal parts of rotted manure and loam. Then plant about one-quarter ounce of cabbage seed, covering not more than a quarter inch deep. When the weather is cool the plants will be large enough for transplanting. Copenhagen market is a good variety.

Cool season vegetables should not be planted until October because heat burns the plants. A hundred feet of carrots, using Nantes or Danver's Half Long varieties, will provide a supply throughout late winter and early spring. Beets, using the Detroit Dark Red variety, should be grown as a fall, winter and spring vegetable. Thin when the plants attain three inches. Spinach thrives best in limy, well-drained soil, and under cool climatic conditions.

In areas where hard freezes are apt to occur, a frame garden 6x20 feet made of planks with a cloth or glass sash cover will produce mustard, lettuce, onions, radishes and carrots until Christmas.

Be prepared for bugs by following suggestions given in the Extension Circular L-19, "Guide for Controlling Vegetable Insects."

Mahon Back In Washington, D. C.

George Mahon, Congressman from this District, was back in his Washington office this week after having spent three weeks visiting in various portions of his District.

Early last week while enroute to Washington, he visited Army maneuvers in Louisiana, where a half million soldiers are engaged in mock warfare for the purpose of increasing the efficiency of our armed forces. Mahon reported that he saw a few of the enlisted men from the 19th Texas District.

In commenting on the maneuvers Mahon said that the West Texas boys were measuring up to their full responsibility. "It is not a pleasant task for the boys to face severe hardships occasioned by the maneuvers," he said, "but I can testify from observation that the boys can really take it. The thing that impressed me most was the physical toughness and the high moral quality of the men. The modern youth does not lack the physical stamina and the hardihood of his predecessors."

"The soldiers are the ones, and about the only ones, who are making real sacrifices for national defense. They deserve 100 per cent cooperation from labor and capital and from the people generally."

Mahon is a member of the War Department Appropriations Committee, and he visited the maneuvers in company with Army officials and other Committee members.

Social Security Workers Are Warned About Knowing Their Working Number

Workers holding social security account number cards were today cautioned by Robert M. Mayne, manager of the Big Spring office of the Social Security Board, to exercise more care in guarding against the loss of their account number cards and in showing their cards to every employer for whom they work.

"We find," Mayne stated, "that a substantial number of workers, through carelessness or lack of foresight, are causing themselves or their survivors a great deal of unnecessary worry and trouble in establishing their rights to benefits under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of the Social Security Act. This is brought about in many instances by the worker himself when he loses his card or for any reason does not have his card available when he goes on a new job. Every worker subject to the provisions of the act is required to have a social security account number, and every employer covered by

the act is required to report all employees, their account numbers, and total earnings on the employer's tax returns. Failure on the part of either to comply with the requirements only serves to confuse the worker's old-age and survivors insurance account, resulting, in some cases, in a reduction of benefits payable since the amount of benefits is based on the worker's total earnings. Negligence on the part of either may even result in the loss of all benefits," Mayne stated. "A case in point: In order to qualify for benefits a worker must have a certain number of quarters in which he earned at least \$50 per quarter. Suppose then that Joe Johnson, a worker, dies leaving a widow and three children under the age 18, each of whom will be entitled to monthly benefits if Joe has fulfilled the requirements. "In due time, Joe's widow calls at the field office of the Social Security Board and files her claim.

She furnishes proof of marriage, proof of death, proof of date of birth of her three children, and the field office sends a request to its records division in Baltimore, Md., or a photostatic copy of Joe's wage record. At the same time, the field office requests Joe's last employer to furnish a statement of all wages paid to Joe during the lag period in order to bring his wage record completely up to date. Let us assume in this case that eight quarters of coverage are required. Joe's wage record, however, shows only six or seven quarters. Unless satisfactory evidence can be produced to show that Joe did have eight quarters of coverage, neither the widow nor the children will receive benefits. The widow does not know where Joe worked because his employment was intermittent or because Joe worked out of town. Nevertheless, she, with the assistance of the field office, undertakes the task of establishing Joe's true wage record back to January 1, 1937, when the law became effective. Here and there, through relatives, friends, employers, unions, and Joe's fellow workers and through request for assistance from other field offices, it may be shown that Joe did have two, three, or even more quarters of coverage than is required. Such proof usually discloses that all of this unnecessary work and worry could have been avoided had Joe taken better care of his social security account card and presented it to each of his employers, or if each employer had insisted that Joe present his card as required.

"Mothers and wives can be most helpful in guarding against loss of social security cards and in checking with working members of their families to make certain that they have presented their cards to every employer," Mayne stated. "Account number cards should be placed with other valuable papers and should be readily available when needed. "Workers should not carry them around in their pocket books unless they are seeking employment," Mr. Mayne added.
