"You need a large field to get a big yield this year," stated Carl Crow, about the wheat situation in Briscoe County. This is emphasized by the fact that last year this county had 80,000 acres of wheat and this year there is only 15,000 acres. About 5000 acres of this total are irrigated.

According to Leo White, the bulk of the wheat acreage is not irrigated and in 1948, the dry land wheat that was harvested was on summer fallowed land. This shows that the practice of working the land and storing moisture in the soil during the summer will pay dividends on a dry year.

The dry land wheat is yielding an average of about five to fifteen bushels per acre while the irrigated wheat, which is harvested about 10 days later, is making about twenty to thirty bushels per acre. Some summer tilled land here has made as high as 25 bushels per acre. Most of the wheat is testing good. There has been just a little moisture dock, according to Mr. Crow. Most of it is testing 60 and above except for a minority which is testing as low as 57 because of weeds. The moisture content has been good, running about 12 per cent.

Bob Hill stated that the Silvertown Co-Op had shipped out 10 cars of new wheat up until Tuesday. He said that the wheat is coming in fairly steady. The market Wednesday was \$1.99 per bushel.

Approximately 50 per cent of the wheat has been harvested in this county, according to County Agent Leo White.

BUS OFFICE BLASTED IN LUBBOCK TUESDAY MORNING WITH DYNAMITE

LUBBOCK—Four office rooms in the terminal of the Texas-New Mexico and Oklahoma Motor Coaches in Lubbock were damaged by a dynamite explosion Tuesday morning. No one was injured.

The building has been picketed since the drivers went on strike May 21, over a wage controversy. Since that time the busses on the firm's routes have been operated by non-union drivers. During the first days of the strike one driver on the Amarillo-Lubbock run was beat up when the bus stopped at Tulia. Highway patrolmen provided an escort to Amarillo.

Company officials said a window in the office of Hurley Carpenter, assistant general manager, was broken and a half stick of dynamite with a short fuse was tossed into the room.

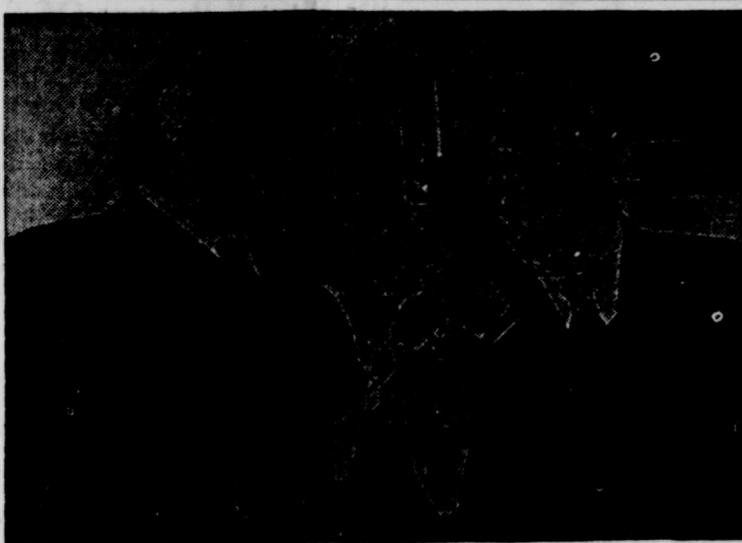
L. P. Rheudasil, acting assistant superintendent of drivers, reported he heard the glass break, but abandoned an investigation when he saw the explosive with the lighted fuse.

Bus service to Amarillo had not been disrupted early Tuesday afternoon, according to agents at the Union Bus Center. Busses over the line have been running late since inexperienced drivers replaced the striking drivers in May. Otherwise service is normal, the agents said.

Violence first appeared in the strike the night of the walkout when a non-union driver was dragged from his coach at Abertnath and beaten by a half-dozen assailants. The next day, a coach was sabotaged in Amarillo by sugar placed in the gasoline tank.

Barkley Named Keynoter, Rayburn Commended

In recognition of their long and valiant service to the Democratic Party and to the nation as a whole, Senator Alben W. Barkley, of Kentucky, and Representative Sam Rayburn, of Texas, minority leaders of the Senate and House, respectively, have been named unanimously to fill key posts at the Democratic National Convention, convening in Philadelphia at 2 P.M., Monday, July 12.

The party executive committee, meeting in Philadelphia recently, elected Senator Barkley as temporary chairman and keynoter and commended Representative Rayburn to the convention as permanent chairman.

Representative Mary Norton, of New Jersey, was commended to the convention as chairman of the credentials committee, a more im-

portant post than ever before held by a woman. Commendation by the executive committee is usually tantamount to election by the convention.

The executive committee authorized Senator J. Howard McGrath, of Rhode Island, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, to select a temporary committee to begin the preparation of a platform draft. It also authorized Senator McGrath to make other necessary convention arrangements.

R. M. Haverly, Chairman, Briscoe County, ACA Committee announced this week that wheat loans will be made to farmers on farm-stored and warehouse-stored wheat from time of harvest through December 31, 1948. The loans will mature on April 30, 1949, or earlier upon demand. County and terminal rates will be established at levels reflecting to producers 90 percent of parity as of July 1, 1948. The interim loan rate for Briscoe County is \$1.93. This rate will be adjusted on delivery, Mr. Haverly said.

For additional information, producers are requested to contact the ACA Office in Silvertown. Mr. Haverly also informs that the 1948 grain sorghum loan rate will be \$2.31 per 100 pounds as a national average, compared to \$2.12 in 1947.

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Don't Blame Profits...

The president of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, at the organization's recent annual meeting, said, "Fire insurance as developed by the stock companies of the United States has always been a progressive business. It has pioneered in the field of new risks; it has grown up by continually extending protection where no protection existed before. No business is more interested in perpetuating private enterprise than is fire insurance. First, because that type of enterprise preserves the form of government under which we all enjoy liberty of action; second, because only under our constitutional form of government that encourages private enterprise could fire insurance grow and render the service it does."

Fire insurance itself is a fine example of free enterprise. People buy it, voluntarily, because they want to protect themselves against the possibility of serious loss. It is highly competitive, with scores of companies out for business. The whole idea behind it is to give top service at the lowest cost. It has the flexibility that is an inherent part of the free enterprise system. When trouble comes, it is ready for action, taking care of its obligations and often going beyond the letter of the contract.

Without fire insurance, who could afford to put his savings in a home or a business and take the risk of being wiped out in a few hours? This essential protection stands between the homes and enterprises of the United States and sudden ruin. It is geared to handle losses of a few dollars—or conflagrations costing millions. And it is always on the job.

"Backward America"—Bunk!

All the proponents of socialism, communism and the other what-have-you isms argue that their systems offer the "common man" greater security and material benefits. As Al Smith used to say, let's look at the record.

England has gone in for socialism in a big way. And what has happened? Once a great coal exporting nation, she can now hardly produce enough for her own needs. Her electric power industry has gone downhill and rates are higher than under private ownership. Her whole socialized economy is as shaky as a tree in a storm.

Russia, of course, has gone whole hog in its version of a "people's government," to own or control all productive activity, and only a miserable minimum of consumer goods is produced. Her retail stores—all of which belong to the state—are stocked with only a few necessities and even these are strictly rationed. Prices, measured by average earning power, are far higher than in this country.

"Backward America," on the other hand, still clings to representative government and a capitalist economy. The "tragic" results of this are seen on every hand—the most efficient industries on earth, the highest standards of living in the world in spite of inflation, more leisure and opportunity for all, retail stores groaning with every kind of commodity, and a competitive system which has to please the people or go out of business—no "take it or leave it" system.

The socialists have a sad story. It just doesn't make sense. And yet they are working here to have government monopolies supplant private enterprise. Will we fall for it?

Free Enterprise On The Job...

A short time ago a survey was made on the way families are attempting to meet current living costs. Heavy majorities reported that they were buying only necessities, doing without things, and trying to make food and clothing go farther. They also reported, generally speaking, that it is necessary to spend a higher proportion of their income for food.

This is the inevitable consequence of an inflation which has not yet spent its course. Some groups have managed to increase their earnings sufficiently to offset price increases. Some have bettered their positions. Millions of people, on the other hand, have been forced to steadily reduce their purchasing, and there is no relief in sight.

It is easy and perhaps natural to blame business for creating this problem. From various quarters, we hear ominous talk of the

size of industrial profits. Retail stores have been picketed by people with angry banners protesting the going prices of food, clothing and just about everything else. Natural or not, this attitude is based on serious misconceptions. For the truth is that the net profits of industry, the money which can be retained by the owners of the tools—millions of investors who have put their savings in industry—are one of the smallest items in the cost of doing business. And surveys of retail trade, including both the chains and the independents show that most stores earn a profit of only one to five or six cents, according to type of goods sold, out of each dollar they take in. Certainly, there is no margin there that will permit price cutting.

Business of all kinds is as worried about high prices as any consumer. It knows that mass production and mass distribution cannot survive if people cannot afford to buy. Prices have gone up in spite of its efforts to hold them down.

Winners In Texas Swine Production Contest Announced

Winners of the Texas Swine Production Contest of the Texas Swine Breeders Association were announced in Dallas Friday at the annual meeting of the association's educational committee.

Presentation of awards, including the president's cup, gold watches, gold and silver certificates, will be made Tuesday, October 19, at the 1948 State Fair of Texas, it was announced by Lucian Jones, association president.

E. W. Blum, Coryell County, was declared winner for the state and for the second district, and will receive the president's silver trophy and gold watch at the State Fair. His entry was a litter of twelve cross-bred Poland China and Durocs, weighing 3,262 pounds when 175 days old.

Other district winners who will receive watches, as well as gold certificates, at the State Fair, are Richard Detton, Carson County, for ten purebred Chester Whites weighing 2,470 pounds when 175 days old; C. L. Browning, Jr., Bexar County, nine purebred Durocs, 2,364 pounds; and Jerome Harbich, Lavaca County, twelve purebred Durocs, 2,712 pounds.

Other gold certificate winners include Frank Huseman, Castro County, for eight purebred Poland Chinas, 2,018 pounds; Euel Evans, Bell County, eleven purebred OICs, 2,381 pounds; J. C. Taylor, Coryell County, ten purebred Hampshires, 2,306 pounds; and E. J. Ballmann, Jr., Falls County, eight purebred Durocs, 2,090 pounds; and F. A. Huck, Jr., Bexar County, fourteen purebred Poland Chinas, 2,193 pounds.

Silver certificate winners are Edmund Wilke, Garza County, twelve crossbred OIC and Herefords, 1,980 pounds; R. D. Kamp, Lamb County, eight purebred Poland Chinas, 1,880 pounds; and J. B. Bearden, Coleman County, six OICs, 1,870 pounds.

Blum's winning litter was fed under the supervision of W. P. Graham, Coryell County Agricultural agent of Gatesville.

At the meeting Friday the educational committee voted to repeat the contest starting next fall.

Questions and Answers

Q. Have I any recourse to civil courts if I do not like VA's decision on my claim for disability compensation?

A. No. The law specifically provides that the decision of the Administrator of Veterans Affairs in such matters is final and conclusive.

Q. I am an ex-G-I of World War II and receive disability compensation. If I take a three hour a day job, will my compensation be discontinued?

A. So long as your disability remains compensable, it will be continued. The fact that you are employed does not bar payment of compensation if you are disabled as result of a service-connected condition.

Q. I lost the use of my legs in line of duty during World War I, and would like to know if I can get a car from the Government?

A. Under existing law, the authority to furnish automobiles is limited to World War II veterans.

Q. What kind of insurance is National Service Life Insurance?

A. NSLI is mutual insurance. All premium payments go into a trust fund maintained by the Treasury Department. This money is invested in Government, interest-bearing securities. The interest accrues to the fund. The fund is known as the National Service Life Insurance Fund.

"Whitey" Baccus Of Lockney Will Show New Ford

The 1949 Ford, which reveals a radical departure from traditional Ford styling and engineering, will be made public June 18 by "Whitey" Baccus, authorized Ford dealer, Lockney, Texas.

"New standards of beauty, comfort, economy and performance in the 1949 Ford passenger cars advance them far ahead of others in the low-priced field," Mr. Baccus said. "Styling of the new Ford definitely establishes it as the car of the year."

To develop and produce the 1949 Ford passenger cars, Ford Motor Company has expended more than \$37,400,000 in tools, dies, jigs and fixtures.

STYLING—The modern design has been molded along functional lines, resulting in a long, low sweeping silhouette. The grille is distinctive, the hood massive but shorter and the body so wide the rear fenders have been eliminated. There are clean, unbroken lines from front to rear.

COMFORT—Comfort has been one of the primary objectives in the new Ford. There is more room in the "lounge car" interiors than in many cars with much larger over-all dimensions. Front seat widths have been increased six inches and the rear seat nearly eight inches. The body has been moved five inches forward with the seats cradled between the axles for a much smoother ride.

A new type of suspension system—"hydra-coil" springs—replaces the traditional transverse springs and the front axle. This system is centered around air-plane shock absorbers mounted within low frequency coil springs. In the rear, extra long longitudinal springs are complemented by air-plane type shock absorbers.

The drive shaft tunnel has been decreased by adoption of the Hotchkiss drive and the hypoid rear axle. These engineering changes also minimized the transmission of road noises into the car.

Engine vibration has been reduced by literally floating the power plant on rubber mounts.

A new heating system available in the new Fords brings year around comfort to driver and passengers. Fresh air is scooped into the car through large intakes just behind the grille.

The system, which has an automatic temperature control, can be used as a fresh air ventilator, a fresh air heater or as a recirculating heater. Fresh air plus the pressure effect obtained by the car's forward motion reduces fogging and drafts.

State Health Department Suggests More Salt in Hot Weather

There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fog.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose.

"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Cox says, "but alcoholic drinks should be avoided."

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Veterans' News

The Veterans Administration has revised its contract requirements to provide a firmer control over tuition rates charged by many private schools for training veterans under the GI Bill.

The changes, effective July 1, 1948, are being made in an attempt to correct and eliminate abuses in tuition charges that have been uncovered in recent months. With the new contract standards, VA hopes to make certain that the federal government is not paying for more than the veteran actually receives during his training.

VA emphasized that the new contract requirements affect only the following institutions whose enrollments consist mostly of veterans: (1) schools established since the passage of the GI Bill, and, (2) schools whose charges increased materially since the GI Bill programs began.

No change was made in VA's policy of accepting charges made by other private profit schools not affected by the new ruling.

Veterans Administration has eliminated nearly two-thirds of the number of forms used to process veterans' benefits in the past 21 months.

Since the VA forms reduction program went into effect on June 30, 1946, the number in use dropped from 19,841 to 7,603 by April 1, 1948—an average decrease of about 580 forms a month.

VA estimates that the minimum number of forms required for effective operations will be between \$3,500 and \$4,000.

In addition to forms reduction, the VA program has been designed to (1) improve administrative

procedures through standardization, consolidation and revision of forms, and, (2) reduce printing and binding costs by careful layout and design specifications.

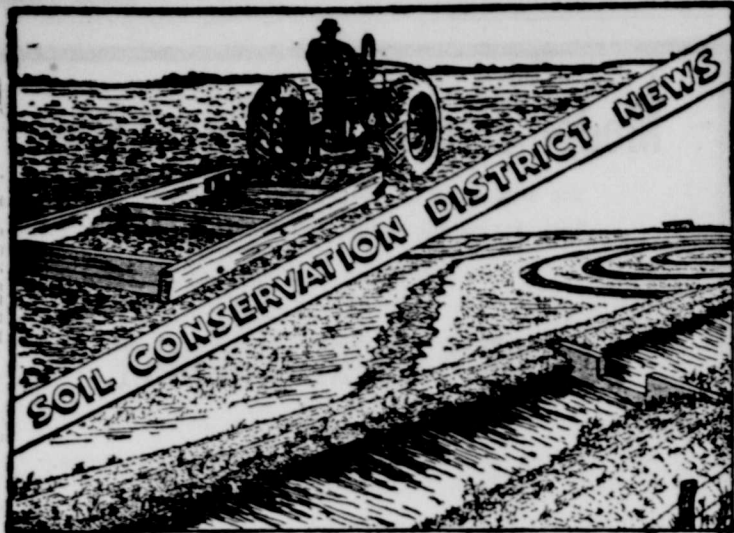

'Farewell Rite' Is Marriage Ceremony

Navy Commander Annuls Japanese Wedding on Return to U. S.

SAN FRANCISCO—Frederick T. Ebersole, a former navy commander who said he unwittingly went through a Shinto wedding ceremony with a red-haired army intelligence assistant while stationed in Tokyo, had the "marriage" annulled.

Ebersole, 34, a socially prominent San Francisco chain store executive, said he thought the ritual was a Japanese farewell ceremony. But his "bride," Elizabeth Church, in Seattle, had the elaborate scroll presented her after the ceremony translated. It was a Shinto marriage certificate.

"Miss Church told me she wanted her name cleared, so I went to a lawyer and had the 'marriage' annulled," Ebersole explained.

Ebersole, who has a wife and three children, said he and Miss Church had become interested in Shinto customs while in Japan. He was separated from his wife at the time, he said. They have been reconciled since the war.

Ebersole said he and Miss Church had received orders to come home at about the same time. A Japanese friend told them he had arranged "a beautiful Japanese going away ceremony for us," Ebersole said. The ceremony was conducted in the friend's house by a Shinto priest in flowing oriental robes and conical hat.

"He was mumbling words that we could not understand," Ebersole said. "Attendants were playing on flutes and sounding brass gongs. We just stood there. Then the priest handed Miss Church what looked like a mimeographed piece of paper with Japanese characters on it. I didn't know what it said." Ebersole added that he and Miss Church then returned to their respective quarters.

Ebersole's wife said she would accept his explanation.

New Process Produces Oils From Discarded Grape Seeds

TROY, N. Y.—If you've ever wondered what to do with old grape seeds, here's one answer.

Valuable utility oil may be extracted from discarded grape seeds and employed in the manufacture of such products as soap, plastics, lubricating oil, salad dressing, awnings and even airplane wings, according to Dr. Frederick W. Schwartz, professor of analytical chemistry at Rensselaer Polytechnic institute.

Dr. Schwartz explained that the more than 15 million pounds of grape seeds thrown away annually by the grape industry in America should be salvaged and processed for important oils.

In fact, he pointed out, grape seed oil may eventually be used as a substitute for linseed oil, which is fast dwindling in supply.

The grape oil, when applied to surfaces of awnings and metal airplane wings, improves the pliability of such products, he stated.

"We are now suffering from a shortage of fats," Dr. Schwartz said, "yet we throw away large supplies of excellent waste material. The grape seeds contain from 6 to 20 per cent of oil, which can be cheaply extracted for only 5 or 6 cents per pound. Furthermore, the seeds abound in food content usable for cattle feed."

Election Losers Discover Brush With Low Costs \$\$\$

DELAVER, WIS.—Painting the town with their protests over defeat of their candidate for mayor had an unhappy ending for six young Delavan veterans of World War II.

Police Chief Harold Barker said the six had used white lead to paint "Lest we forget" on the street in front of the home of the re-elected mayor and council president. Three went on to daub paint on windows of a garage and lumber company and on a \$3,800 automobile, Barker said.

The latter three—Meredith Knilians, Joe Murphy and John Atwood—were fined \$25 each on disorderly conduct charges by Justice of the Peace Roy Meracle and were ordered to pay for damages to the car. Meracle ordered James Watts, Darwin Tucker and Jack Fabricius released because they took part only in the street painting.

The veterans had supported Eugene Williamson, a veteran, who was defeated by Mayor John Thorpe, 942 to 553. Clarence Anderson, owner of the garage and car which were painted, had backed Thorpe.

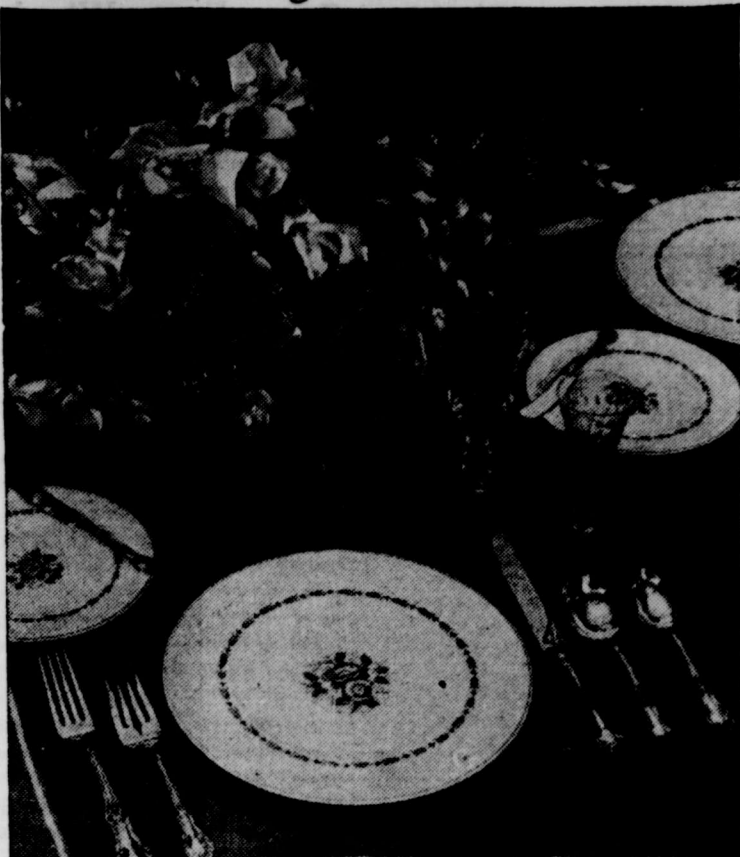

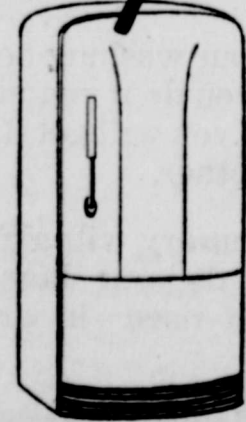

TORONTO—Canada's largest daily and largest weekly newspaper will henceforth be operated in the interest of charity. Never again will the Toronto Daily Star and the Star Weekly be under private ownership.

This remarkable disposal of two famous newspapers was brought about by a remarkable man—the late Joseph E. Atkinson, owner and publisher of the newspapers.

Atkinson willed the newspapers in perpetuity to the Atkinson Charitable Foundation. For the foundation the newspapers will be controlled and operated by seven foundation trustees, all or nearly all employees of the Stars.

Hundreds Join Gold Rush in New Jersey

Searchers Excavate Fervently For Buried Treasure

Highlands, N. J.—A seashore gold rush was underway as hundreds of people converged here in a hunt for buried treasure.

The reported discovery of six more 18th century gold coins on the banks of the Shrewsbury river, near the Atlantic ocean, gave impetus to the search.

About 400 men, women and children streamed over the beaches beginning at chill dawn in a big beachcombing operation. Armed with rakes, screens, shovels, pails and assorted digging implements, many sifted the sands in this legendary pirates' port of call.

A Newark coin dealer, Fred W. Burnet, said from descriptions of the coins found he believed them to be old Portuguese doubloons, possibly pirates' treasure. He estimated that, in good condition, the coins probably are worth about \$75 each.

Fifteen of the coins have been discovered altogether since William Cottrell, 75, first picked one up while strolling on the beach. The oldest is dated 1735.

The coins were turned up near the area of the previous finds, some below the high water mark.

Stories of pirates' treasure flew thick and fast in this resort town of about 2,000 population. A crowd gathered to watch the excavations of the hopeful hunters.

Many believed the coins had been dug from the river bottom when the Shrewsbury was dredged about 12 years ago. Sand from the dredging was pumped along the banks and has been washed and blown away during the years.
