Talco Has Rash Of Burglaries

The Talco Elementary School was burglarized and an attempt was made to blow up Cecil's Grocery on Main Street in Talco over the weekend.

No complaints have been filed in this burglary at the school, according to John Kirkpatrick, city marshal, or in the burglary that occurred at the school two weeks ago.

A Texas Ranger Red Arnold was in Talco Monday investigating the attempted fire bombing. The two bombs had been set on top of the ice storage machine in front of the grocery, and had been lit, but failed to explode.

Damage to the elementary school in the first burglary has been estimated at \$300, and an attempt was made to set fire to the school.

The burglars at the Talco elementary school last weekend gained access by breaking a window in the cafeteria, where they took ice cream and peanuts. The burglars also entered the auditorium, where they tampered with the stage lights and sound equipment, but no damage was done.

Kirkpatrick said that there has been a rash of vandalism and burglaries in Talco in the past two weeks, but that no complaints had been filed. Law enforcement officials cannot file complaints in burglary cases, Kirkpatrick said, and the police can do nothing unless a private citizen files a complaint.

One other fire bomb exploded in Talco recently at

a private residence, with damage limited to a mail box, and there has been some glass breakage at some businesses. No complaints have been filed.

A case involving two minors who were apprehended with a can of gasoline on the roof of the Post Office in Talco was turned over to postal authorities, who released the boys to the custody of their parents. One boy escaped capture.

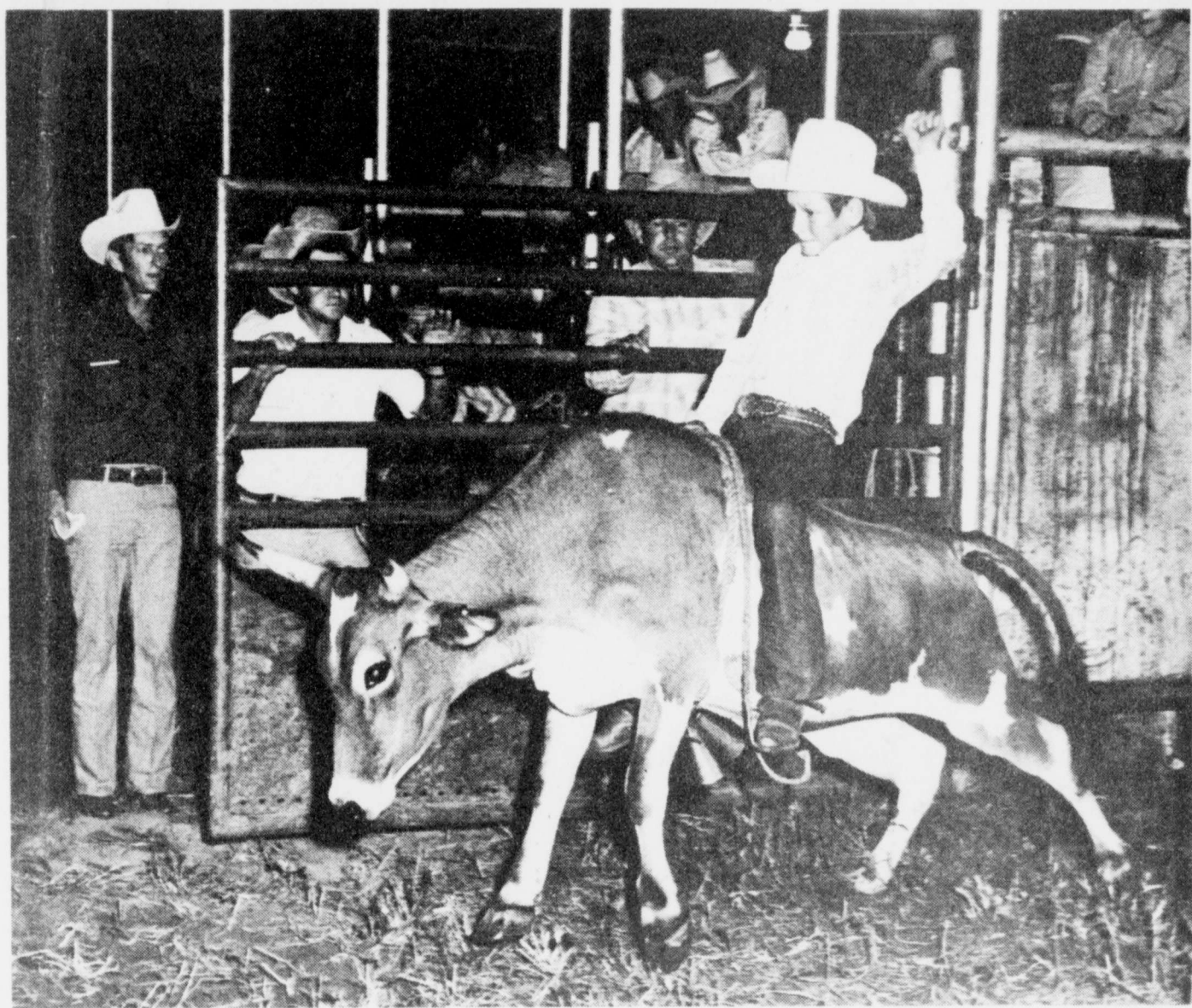
Ten County 4-H Members In District Judging

An out-of-state cowboy, Jim Clemmens, came from Blanchard, Louisiana to compete in the rodeo, and went home with \$90 in prize money in the bareback bronc event, and the All-Around Cowboy Trophy.

Randy Upchurch of Paris was second in the junior bareback with 49 points and a check for \$54, and Bobby Cody of Hugo scored 48 points for third place and \$36.

Rebels Tie Clarksville

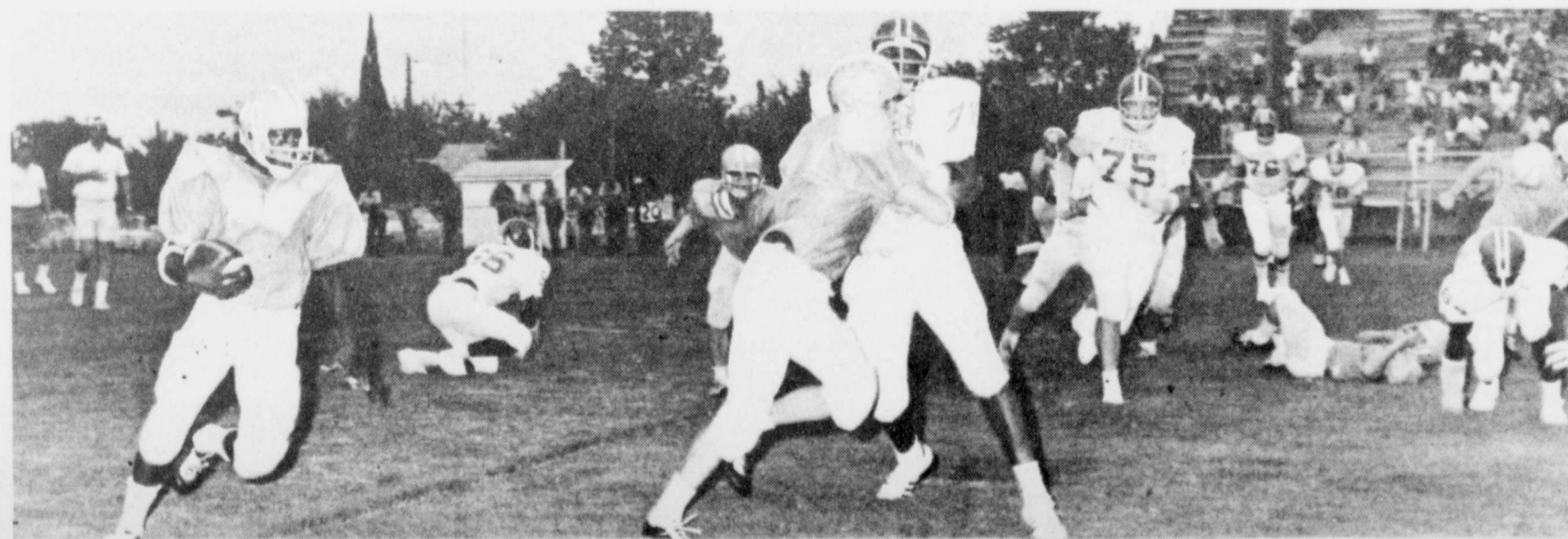
Rivercrest Rebels tied the Clarksville Tigers in the first Rebel scrimmage game of the season with a score of two-two.

FmHA To Guarantee Emergency Livestock Loans

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available next week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), a rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Frank B. Stroud, FmHA County Supervisor, said the agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for

six months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Stroud said that interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.

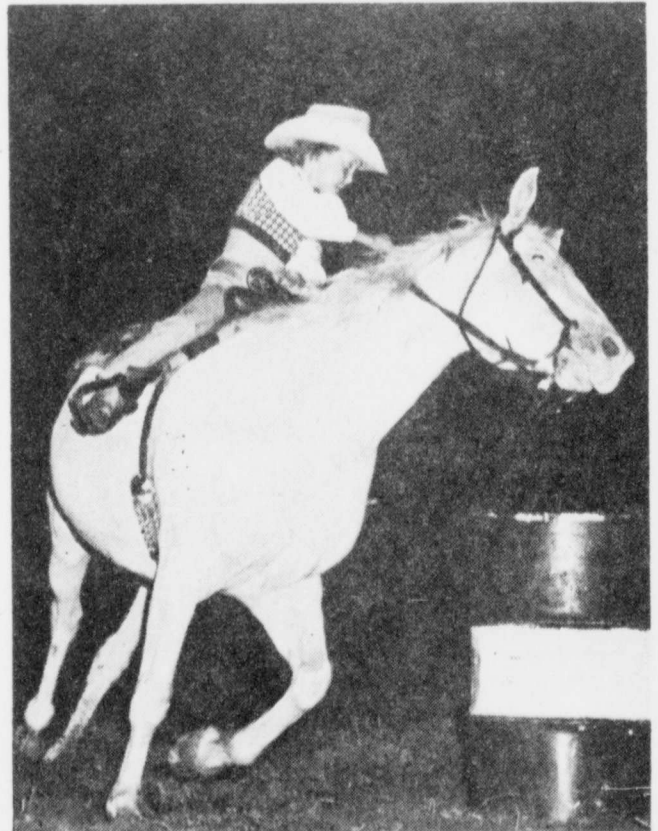
The maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans can be repayable in one-three years, although renewal for

two years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Stroud said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise, fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens, turkeys, eggs and dairy products. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation, and a majority portion of the borrower's time must be devoted to the livestock or poultry production.

In the case of a corporation of partnership, assistance can be extended only when the majority partners or stock-

The cattle feeding industry is still in a depressed economic condition, says a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Feedlot losses have continued since last August but daylight is now on the horizon," says Dr. Ed Uvacek. "Some feedlots may already be in the breakeven zone. Unfortunately, much of the equity capital of the commercial feeders has been used, so financing is still a real problem."

As a result, the loss situation of feedlots is now being felt by cow-calf producers in the form of reduced prices for replacement calves. Demand for light-weight calves is extremely low. Feedlots can buy the weight cheaper than they can put it on; consequently they are buying more larger type replacement animals, points out Uvacek.

Two things seem certain, according to the Texas A & M University System specialist. First, cattle numbers on feed as of July 1 will not provide a very large marketing level for the fourth calendar quarter of this year. Uvacek estimates marketings at about 5.5 million head, or 15 percent less than last year. And, placements of cattle into feedlots during the April-June period were down about 29 percent from levels a year ago.

Secondly, a changed attitude toward refilling the lots is necessary before any price strength can develop in the feeder market, notes Uvacek. "This might develop fairly soon if feeders see some profit opportunities, if government guaranteed loans can be made effective rapidly, and if marketing of feeders is not bunched because of drought conditions."

Texas Highway Engineer B. L. (Luther) DeBerry, a native of Bogata, will be the speaker September 24 for the fall Rural-Urban Dinner.

Leslie Taylor, chairman of the Rural-Urban Relations Committee of the Chamber of Commerce of Lamar County, announced the speaker last week after a meeting of the committee. The committee also elected Roy Chadwick, superintendent of the North Lamar Independent School District, as new chairman of the committee.

DeBerry's appearance at the Rural-Urban Dinner, to be held at 7 p.m. September 24 at Thomas Justiss Elementary School in Paris, will be made

in conjunction with National Highway Week. He will be the guest of honor earlier that afternoon at a reception in the Garden Room of the First National Bank.

Taylor will emcee the program, and C. Glynn Lowe will introduce DeBerry. Special guests at the dinner meeting will be Highway Department Personnel from the area.

The Rural-Urban dinners are free to men of Lamar County. They are staged by the Rural-Urban Committee with county businesses financing them. The catered meal this time will be both beef and pork barbecue.

DeBerry was born at Bogata in 1914. He attended public schools there. With the Texas Highway Department later, he worked in Sherman, Paris, Clarksville and Greenville.

After work with the U.S. Corps of Engineers and U.S. Navy in World War II, he was named resident engineer at Emory with the THD in 1946. He became senior resident engineer at Greenville in 1950 and transferred in that capacity to San Antonio in 1953. He was named Lufkin district engineer in 1958. In 1960 he became Dallas district engineer.

He became assistant to Texas Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall in 1968. He succeeded Dingwall in February 1973.

DeBerry's mother, Mrs. Luther DeBerry, lives at Idabel, Oklahoma. His uncle, Tom DeBerry, was for many years state senator from this area.

DeBerry has been honored in the Paris area a number of times, the latest being a community recognition banquet in Paris February 23, 1973.

Ag Building Going Up At ETSU
More than \$2 million in low bids for construction were awarded to low bidders Friday, August 16, by the East Texas State University Board of Regents meeting here.

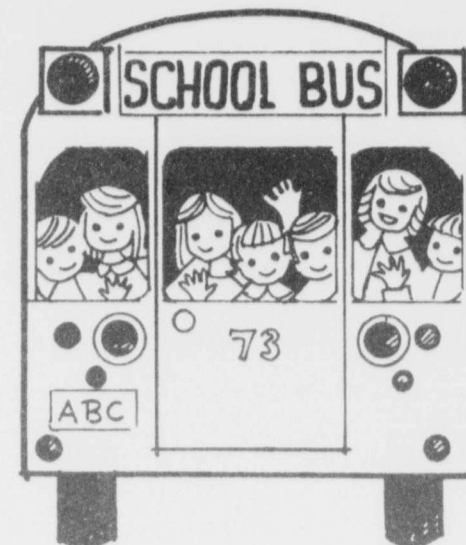

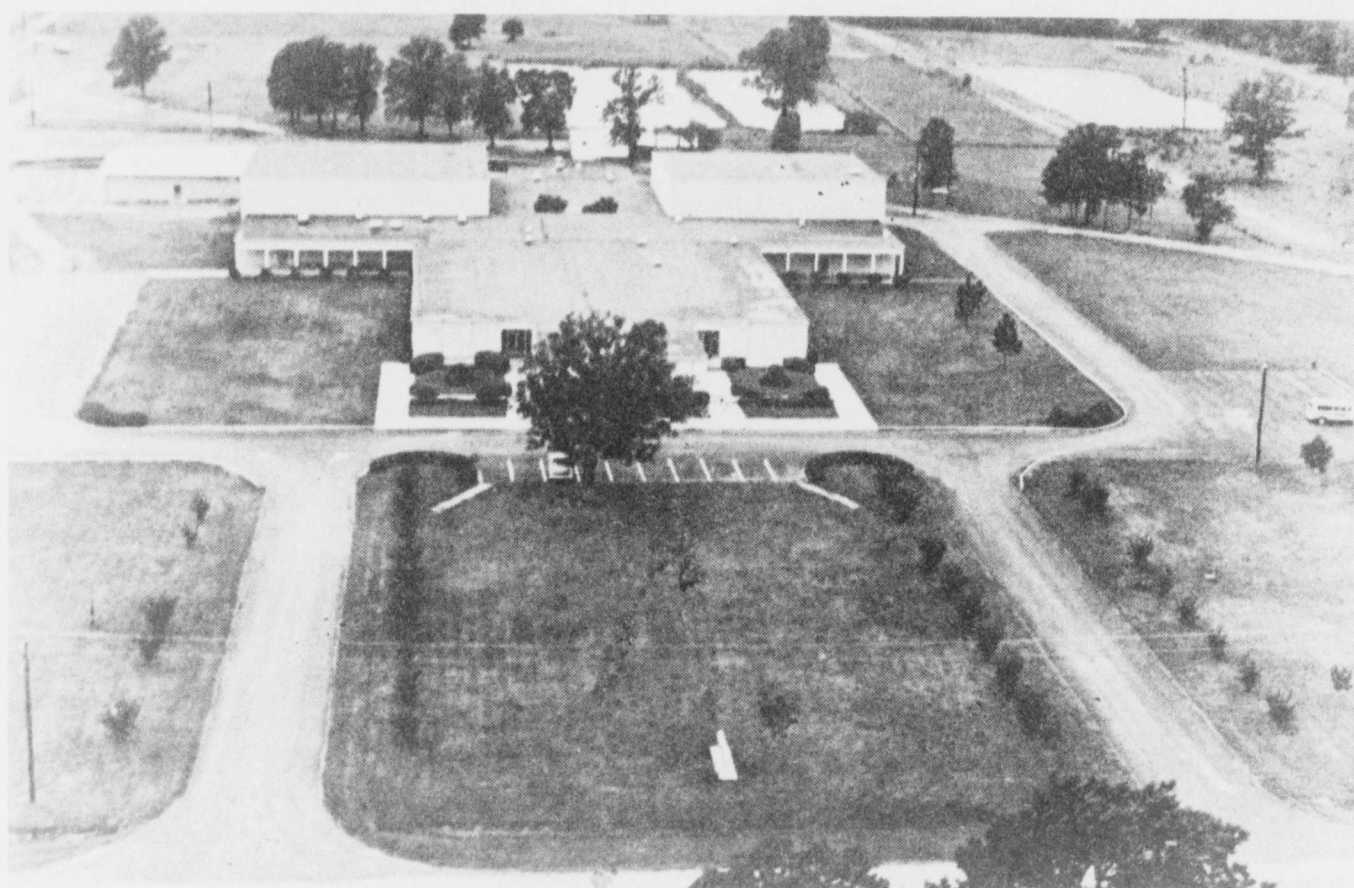

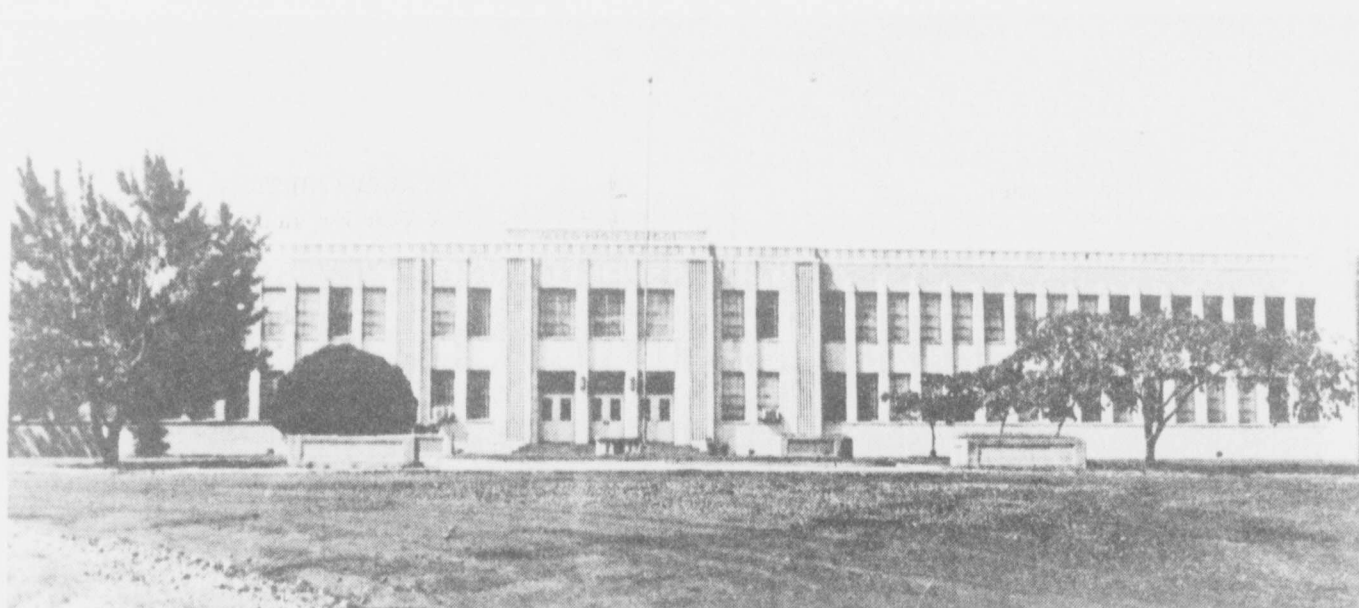

Gardening Made Easy

By Barrie L. Kridler

We've had a lot of alarmed people calling about their trees dripping sticky sap and wanting to know what is wrong with their important shade producing trees. It's not really what's wrong with the trees but rather how do you get rid of the aphids (plant lice) that are causing the mess. These usually green but sometimes red, brown or grey insects secrete a sticky sweet substance "honey dew" and this is the substance that falls in little droplets on cars, sidewalks and outdoor furniture. As the substance ages a mold will grow on it and then your "sugar coated" belongings turn black or grey! Flies and honey bees can be drawn in large numbers to feed on the honey dew, especially in the morning when the tree is wet with dew. Oaks, pecans, hickories and elms are usually hardest hit by this phenomenon but willows, ash, sugar and hack berry, apple and maple trees can also be the host for these insect population explosions.

A spraying of malathion or diazinon will take care of the pests but spraying huge trees is costly and it's hard to get good coverage. A heavy rain storm with wind will wash most of the offenders to oblivion and they don't do too much harm to healthy trees, so you may choose to ignore them - just move the car and outdoor furniture for a while until they are gone. If you

have some weak trees it would be best to spray them and feed with a good tree food like Fertilome to build up their strength before winter.

Early cushion mums are starting to show color so begin to add more in the bare sunny spots you have. Many shades of red, yellow, bronze, pink and purple exist to choose from along with pure whites to add sparkle next to the deep dark shades. Since mums are perennial they are a wise investment and will furnish masses of color for years to come if a little care is given them. Their most important cultural aspect is sunlight - they need at least half a day to grow full and stocky with lots of buds and blooms. Soil should be well drained but contain lots of humus in the form of peatmoss, leafmold, compost or well rotted manure. This organic matter will hold moisture and food for the fine feeder roots to seek out and use. Chrysanthemums are heavy feeders and appreciate a monthly feeding of a good organic base plant food like Fertilome with Iron. Whether you buy the small \$.25 starter plants or larger full grown gallon bucketed plants, you'll be amazed at the quantities of bloom and the ease of culture. Be sure to add them to the fall landscape - they are as much "Fall" as the daffodil is "Spring." HAPPY GARDENING!
