'43 Golden Tornado Football Schedule Is Announced

The Executive Committee of District Three Conference AA, adopted the 1943 football schedule last Friday night at a meeting held in Big Spring. Changes in scheduling were made necessary by the withdrawal of Colorado City from Conference AA because of lowered enrollment. Lamesa was changed from the Armistice holiday game with Midland as formerly set up, was changed to a week later and Abilene was bracketed in the Armistice day place. Lamesa was unfortunate in having lost the Thanksgiving day game with Colorado City and is now scheduled to close the local football season on November 19th with Midland.

The officers of 1942 for the district executive committee were re-elected as follows: V. Z. Rogers, Lamesa, Chairman; W. C. Blankenship of Big Spring Vice-Chairman; and Murray H. Fly, Odessa, Secretary-Treasurer. No assessments for expenses were necessary for 1942 because of the nominal expenses incurred by the committee during the past year.

Rationing Order Placed On Dried Beans And Peas

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. (AP) —Secretary of Agriculture Wickard tonight directed the rationing of dry edible beans, dried peas, lentils and dehydrated and dried soups along with the processed and canned vegetables and fruits to be rationed beginning March 1.

These foods were added to the ration list, Wickard said, because of "extremely heavy demands, by the American armed forces and the Russian Army."

Pending start of rationing, retail stocks of these commodities were frozen tonight.

Wickard, the food administrator, said supplies of beans, peas, lentils and dried soups had dwindled considerably in recent weeks because of short supplies of meats and other high protein foods. Consumers turned to vegetables as meat substitutes.

These commodities will be rationed under the new point-system ration books to be distributed next week. The point values will be determined by the Office of Price Administration.

Preliminary Glider Training Is Halted

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19. (AP) —Preliminary training of glider pilots by the Army is being suspended and emphasis now is being placed upon advanced training for men who will fly motorless planes, the War department disclosed today.

It was explained that preliminary courses had graduated more pilots than could be accommodated heretofore in advanced training courses.

The preliminary training at various points throughout the country had included instruction in such matters as dead-stick lands of small power planes. In the advanced courses the men learn to fly two and three-place gliders.

The department said with the new emphasis on the advanced training some schools previously giving preliminary courses may be closed entirely, while others will be converted to provide advanced training. Department spokesmen said that the names of the schools and whether they would be converted or closed were not available except from the individual schools themselves.

BEHIND THE WAR NEWS

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 20, 1943

New and grave portents of disaster for shaken and retreating Nazi armies in southern Russia can be read into German high command reports of unseasonably high temperatures hampering their withdrawal to the Dnieper line. Sacrifice of heavy equipment, munitions and stores through inability to move them over flooded streams, mud-clogged roads or sodden fields must result on an incalculable scale even if troops escape behind the river.

Normally spring thaws are due in the middle of March in the lower sectors of the Dnieper drainage basin below Kiev and Kharkov. Fifty-degree temperature are reported now, however, starting the runoff of melting snow and ice prematurely.

It is east of the north-south span of the Dnieper between Orsha in the north and Kiev in the south, and north of its southeastward trend below Kiev to find its way around the great Dnieper plateau to the Black Sea that the main tributaries of the river lie. It is in that vast area, too, east of the Dnieper bend and west of Kharkov to Kiev that the major portions of Nazi southern armies are attempting to extricate themselves from Russian traps.

Due Normally In April

Northward, where the Russian encirclement drive to crack the Orel redoubt of the Nazi "hedge hog" system in the center is making ominous progress, spring thaws are not normally due before late April.

For that reason, new emphasis noted on the Soviet efforts to take Orel and ominously threaten Bryansk and the whole Nazi supporting line in the center to Smolensk and Vitebsk is especially significant. Russian forces at Belev, due north of Orel, are reported on the move again, indicating that Russian strategy contemplates shifting the attack scene from the south to the center once the spring thaw sets in southward.

Main Russian Forces

Tremendous as have been the Russian forces thrown into offensive action at Stalingrad, in the Caucasus,

against the Don-Donets basin and northward around the Kursk-Orel hinge between the south and central fronts, there is every reason to believe that Stalin's major reserve concentration is in the Moscow theater. That is the natural locale for it because of direct multiple rail and road connections between the Moscow hub and any part of the fighting front from the Baltic to the Sea of Azov. It is also the sector from which more crushing blows could be dealt the invader than have yet been delivered in the south.

Once Orel goes down, there is small chance that Bryansk long can remain in enemy hands. The usefulness of Bryansk and of Roslavl and Smolensk farther to the northwest for either attack or defensive purposes is already badly impaired by events in the south.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1943

Bad news from Tunisia underscored the past week for Americans but a war balance struck on events there and in Russia for those seven days yields a heavy credit showing in Allied favor.

American defeat in the first clash with Rommel's veterans in central Tunisia takes on a less ominous cast on more complete information. It becomes virtually certain, for example, that the Nazi attack was purely a limited local operation. It widened the Tunisian communication corridor for the foe and so crippled Franco-American forces thrown back 60 miles or more that a considerable time must elapse before the flanking threat can be renewed.

It also is now clear by delayed eye-witness reports of the four-day battle that it was in no sense an American rout but an ordered and orderly retreat. That is highly important. It means that in its first major battle test an untried American Army proved its mettle. Out-matched in weight of armor as well as numbers, it fell back sullenly and unwillingly under orders intended to conserve its personnel and equipment to fight again under more favorable circumstances.

Promises Well For Future

That represents both unshaken morale in the ranks and effective staff work. It promises well for the future of the American forces mustering in western North Africa not only to help oust the enemy from the south shore of the Mediterranean; but to poise an invasion spearhead at the European continent itself.

Russian recapture of Kharkov was the dominant event of the

week on the eastern front. Even more startling Soviet successes seem in the making all the way from Orel in the north to Taganrog in the south as well as deep in enemy lines west of Kharkov. Nevertheless, the Russian Kharkov victory appears to the best informed American

and British official observers as the highlight of the current Russian campaign for definite reasons.

Stripped of Springboard

President Roosevelt and Secretary Stimson concurred that loss of that powerful bastion and others like Rostov stripped Hitler of the springboards essential to a summer renewal of his attack on Russia.

Authorized British official comment placed the same significance on the Kharkov recapture but from a somewhat different angle. General Sewell, who does a daily analytical review for the British information service, was particularly impressed by the fact that Nazi SS units were reported met and overcome in the final actions at Kharkov. Recently he expressed doubt that Hitler had yet been forced to tap his general reserve, the behind-the-lines manpower pool upon which he relied to mount a new offensive in Russia next summer. Kharkov changed his mind.

The frittering away of that reserve in defensive operations in Russia would end all apprehension of a new Nazi attack. It would nail the Nazis to the defensive for keeps not only in Russia but on all fronts except at sea.

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP) — John Wesley Jones dutifully purchased his \$5 tax stamp for his car and pasted it on the windshield, but as time passed he noticed it was slowly but surely disappearing. He suspected roaches or even termites, but whatever the cause he felt he couldn't afford to buy another one or pay a fine for failure to have one.

Policeman A. B. Clark came to the rescue and after a careful examination of the remains of the stamp, wrote an entry on the police record that Jones "has a \$5 sticker on his car but something has almost eaten it off. Eight Vegetables Under Incentive Payment Plan

Fifty dollars an acre is the incentive payment Texas farmers can expect if they grow between 90 and 100 per cent of their farm goals of eight different vegetables for the fresh market.

Carrots, snap beans, lima beans, beets, tomatoes, cabbage, onions, and green peas grown for the fresh vegetable market have been added to the incentive payments program as the U. S. Department of Agriculture seeks to help farmers meet or exceed their goals of wartime crops in the face of higher production costs.

County goals of each vegetable for the fresh market will be 10 per cent higher than the 1942 acreage.

Farmers who have never grown carrots, snapbeans, lima beans, beets, tomatoes, cabbage, onions, and green peas for sale fresh also can participate in the program, the Texas USDA War Board said. Goals for farmers who did not grow these crops last year, and for those who grew fewer than 3 acres in 1942, will be at least 3 acres per farm, provided they grow them in 1943.

Regardless of the goal set for his farm, each farmer will have an opportunity to earn the \$50-an-acre incentive payment by planting one acre more than 90 per cent of his goal, the War Board said. No penalties will be exacted for failure to meet 90 per cent of farm goals of any of the eight vegetables.

Planting period for the crops included in this phase of the incentive payment program begins February 1 and ends September 1, 1943. If a farmer plants the same land to two or more of these crops during that period, the acreage will be counted only once for the incentive payments. The farmer, however, will be expected to do his usual amount of double and triple cropping.

Acreage of vegetables grown under contract for canning, dehydration or freezing cannot be counted in figuring either farm goals of the eight vegetables for the fresh market or for the incentive payments, the War Board said. To earn the payments, the vegetables must be sold fresh. The incentive payment plan for these vegetables, the board explained, is separate from the price support program also announced this week for tomatoes, green peas, sweet corn and beans for canning.

—BUY WAR BONDS AND STAMPS—

Feed Crops Aided Under Incentive Payment Plan

Maximum production of feed and feed crops will mean thousands of additional dollars to Texas farmers under the incentive payments program.

Designed to obtain greater production of crops vital to war, payments are offered to the nation's farmers as compensation in achieving goals despite increased production costs.

Commenting on the program, the state USDA War Board said that most of the additional money to be realized by Texas farmers would come from increased production of peanuts, grain sorghums and soybeans.

Payments on these crops range from \$30 per acre for peanuts and 15 per acre for soybeans to \$8 per acre on grain sorghums but are applicable only on the acreage over 90 per cent and up to 100 per cent of the farm goal. Under the war production plan sheet, acreage goals are established for individual farms.

Although the soybean and grain sorghum goals probably will be increased, no increase in the state peanut goal is anticipated, the board said in pointing out that Texas farmers already were being asked to plant 1,300,000 acres, which is one fifth of the national goal and 22 per cent more than last year's record high of 1,060,000 acres.

Farmers planting between 90 per cent and 110 per cent of their peanut goals will be eligible for the additional payments.

Goals already established in the state for soybeans and grain sorghums are 50,000 acres and 4,969,000 acres, respectively. The national soybean goal has been increased from 10 1-2-million acres to 12-million acres while the grain sorghum goal has been stepped up from 10-million to 12-million acres and Texas farmers likely will be asked to share the increase in both crops.

The increase in oil crops is needed to meet more adequately the increasing needs for oil and proteins while grain sorghums are needed to increase the feed supply for the Nation's expanding livestock program.

Other crops under the program which apply to Texas farmers are sweet potatoes and Irish potatoes. Farmers in approved areas will receive payment of 50 cents a bushel on the normal yield of the acreage planted to sweet potatoes over 90 per cent of the farm goal and up to 110 per cent of the goal.

4-H Club Boys Get Results From Hybrid Corn

Feed supplies which Texas farmers grow in 1943 will be decisive in attaining the state's production goals for beef, pork and lamb in 1944. Stocks appear to be sufficient for the animals in prospect for the 1943 production, but growers may be more dependent upon home grown feed crops in 1944 than is the case this year. Texas livestock production this spring includes a 30 per cent increase in pig farrowing over the same period last year. As comparable increases are likely in state which normally have surplus feed, shipments to state which have a shortage probably will be reduced.

Larger production of feed this year, however, is forecast in the report of a demonstration with No. 12 hybrid corn by 29 Milam County 4-H Club boys in 1942. According to County Agricultural Agent J. W. Stufflebeme, Jr., each boy was given without cost enough of the seed corn by the Chamber of Commerce and a bank at Cameron, sponsors of the program, to plant one acre. The hybrid was paralleled by an acre of standard corn which was used as a check plot.

The Irish potato payments, which was announced several days ago, also is 50 cents per acre and applies to potatoes planted after February 1.

When the corn was harvested the production of 22 demonstrators was weighed, and the yield from seven demonstrations was estimated. The production weighed shows an average of 51.8 bushels of hybrid compared to 34.4 bushels an acre of standard variety, or an increase of 25.5 per cent. On the remaining demonstrations, the yield was estimated at 34.3 bushels against 26.7 bushels of the standard, or an increase of 20.3 per cent.

Average yield for the 29 demonstrations was 47.8 bushels compared to 35.7 for standard corn. The Cameron Chamber of Commerce will furnish \$65 worth of seed corn for demonstrations in 1943. Record books turned in by 28 of the demonstrators showed a net profit of \$921.96 for the club boys, Stufflebeme reports.

DALLAS, Feb. 15. — Rep. Hutton W. Sumners (D-Tex) today called on Texas newspaper publishers to help restore a true democracy in the United States by wiping out bureaucratic government.

The Dallas congressman, chairman of the House Judiciary committee, speaking before the Texas Newspaper Publishers association here, said that federal bureaucrats have all the power kings ever had.

Quit Struggling

"We've laid on our backs and called on Uncle Sam to do the job

for us," he asserted. "We've quit grappling with our problems. The result is we've got 2,500,000 federal employees, whose payroll is \$5,000,000,000 per year. Part of this is due to the war, but even before the war there were 1,000,000 federal employees with an annual payroll of \$2,000,000,000.

"These employees are falling all over themselves. We can't get on a train or plane for them.

"We expect our boys to die on the battlefields of the world and yet we take a chance on the kind of government they'll come back to. Shame on us!

"We've been wanting to go the easy way, for it's more difficult to go through the state. But the easy way is down hill. I'm not talking about what might happen, but about what is happening, and I'll take my part of the blame

'Common Sense' Urged In Draft

AUSTIN, Feb. 12 (AP) — Local draft boards in Texas have been instructed consider all cases under the new selective service rulings with "common sense," Gen. J. Watt Page, state selective service director, said today.

He explained that men of military age engaged in non-deferable activities listed by the War Manpower commission should not flock to defense centers to get jobs in war plants.

Jobs Lists Available

"It is not the purpose of the order to encourage mass movements of workers to busy defense centers which are already over-crowded," he said.

Page said a list of essential activities is available at any U. S. Employment service office.

The state office notified local boards today to re-classify all physically qualified registrants in the 18-37 age bracket and in non-deferable occupations, without consideration to dependency status, April 1.

Time Set For Change

In further amplification of the order, Page said:

Since the new policy does not become effective until April 1, time is allowed for a systematic transfer of manpower from non-essential to

And this is not just something to make a speech about, but something to do something about."

Must Be Stripped Down

Sumners said the federal organization must be stripped down to federal powers, so it can take care of the strictly federal business.

"It's a great thing to have your opportunity to be of service at a time like this," Sumners told the publishers. "You can do a job for your nation no other group of similar size can do."

In referring to increasing powers of the executive branch of the government, Sumners several times said he was not talking about "the present President, but of the office."

"Eighteen years ago I noted the tendency and tried to warn the people, but I was ignored," he said. "The fact the people are concerned now is a helpful sign."

Major General A. D. Bruce, commanding officer, tank destroyer center, Camp Hood, thrilled the publishers with a pictorial showing of equipment being developed to fight enemy tanks. Much of his talk was off the record.

"American brains are bringing out weapons far and beyond anything the Germans and Japs have developed," General Bruce said. "Give Americans good weapons and teach them to shoot them, and you don't have to worry about their morale."

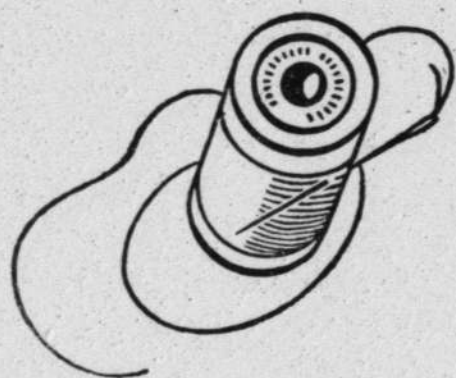

Board Seeking Adjustments For Food Handlers

Candy manufacturers, processors and bakeries have been allotted 70 per cent of their usage of sugar for 1941. This amount was intended for civilian consumption. There manufacturers, processors and bakeries have been able to sell all of their products near them. As a result the smaller communities, such as ours, have not received their fair part of these goods. The local Ration Board has reported this matter to the District Office at Lubbock. In order to adjust the matter, the District Office has required certain information of Dawson County Food Merchants. This information should be compiled and turned into the Dawson County Rationing Board not later than March 1st. The information is as follows:

1. The names of wholesalers or jobbers and manufacturers who have either ceased delivery or have delivered very little of candy, chewing gum, preserves and cakes.
2. A statement of the amount of goods in dollars and cents delivered to the food merchant in May 1941 to January 1, 1942 and a statement of deliveries from May 1942 to January 1, 1943. Figures for each item of candy, chewing gum preserves.

tion form.

Sale of all rationed foods was stopped at midnight Saturday, and will not be resumed until March 1, when the point rationing starts.

Appealing for cooperation of the public in simplifying the problem of registration, Ration Board Officials, said registration of each individual can be quickly accomplished if applicants for the new book will have declaration forms for processed foods properly filled in, except for the signature, and will have their copies of Book 1, used in rationing of sugar, coffee and shoes, will not be retained by registrars, however, but will be returned to applicants after coupons for excess stocks of coffee which each adult had on November 28, 1942, have been removed, officials emphasized.

One declaration form may be used by an entire family and any adult member of a family may apply for books for all members of the family living in the same household.

The OPA offered the following as a guide in point rationing:

Foods to be rationed March 1: Canned and bottled fruits and fruit juices (including spiced fruits); frozen fruits; dried, dehydrated fruits; canned and bottled vegetables and vegetable juices, all types and varieties; and frozen vegetables.

Foods not to be rationed under the processed foods program: Canned fruits and frozen vegetables in containers over 10 pounds; fruit cakes; fruit juices in containers over one gallon; fruit puddings; jams; jellies; meat stews, even though they contain some vegetables; olives; paste products such as spaghetti, macaroni, noodles, whether or not they are packed with added vegetable sauces; pickles; potato salad; preserves; relishes and vegetable juices in containers over one gallon.

Foods To Be Declared

Goods to be declared: Cans, bot-

ties and jars eight ounces or larger of commercially packed fruits, vegetables, juices and soups, chili sauce and catsup owned today, minus five for each person included in the declaration; also the number of pounds of coffee owned on Nov. 28, 1942, minus one pound for each person included in the declaration whose age is stated in war ration book one as 14 years or older.

Foods not to be declared: Canned olives; canned meat and fish; pickles; relish, jellies, jams and preserves; spaghetti, macaroni and noodles; or home-canned foods.

Consumers must fill out the form even if they do not have more than five cans per person.

OPA has cautioned against counting cans of fish and meat, sale of which was suspended Wednesday night. Canned fish and canned meat will not be rationed until opening of meat rationing, date of which has not been set.

OPA officials have suggested housewives make the count by spreading their pantry supplies on the kitchen table and eliminating all the excluded items. The smaller cans containing less than eight ounces, including many containers of baby foods, should be put back on the shelf. If the housewife then counts out five cans for each member of the family from the remainder and restores them to the shelves, she will have left the exact number of containers she must state on the declaration form.

An eight-point stamp is to be removed for each can stated on the declaration sheet, leaving the five, two and one point stamps in the book. A coffee stamp is to be removed from War Ration Book 1 for each pound above the limit of one pound for each person listed on book one as 14 years or older.

Blue stamps in the new book will be used in rationing of canned and bottled fruits, vegetables, juices and soups, frozen fruits and vegetables and dried fruits. Red stamps are to be used later in rationing of meats.

OPA officials have emphasized that removal of stamps from the book is not a "penalty," but "simply the fair way of including excess stocks now on pantry shelves as part of the ration of the family that possesses them. It simply would not be fair to let those who have stocked up for their future needs have a full ration in addition to all they have in the pantry.

Stevenson Asks Farm Freedom

AUSTIN, Feb. 20. — Texas' ranchman Governor Coke R. Stevenson said today the acute shortage of protein feeds endangering the war meat supply from the southwest could be solved if the farmers were "turned loose."

The best he could learn from telephone conversations with officials in Washington, he said, was that "they can not decide which bureau it is that is holding up the release of needed feedstuffs."

Could Solve Problem

Stevenson said many farmers were writing him suggesting that if it were not for restrictions on planting they could solve the problem themselves.

He cited a letter from a farmer who was in danger of losing his peanut bonus because he had inadvertently planted too much corn.

"This farmer said they made him plow up 73 acres of corn to plant peanuts that he knew would not mature," Stevenson asserted, adding:

"Sure enough he plowed up his corn, planted the peanuts, and the peanuts didn't produce. If they had let him alone, there would have been just about 73 acres of corn."

Lamb and Kid Crops

Stevenson's comment today followed testimony before a state Senate committee that Texas will lose half its lamb and kid crop, and

much of its calf crop, if concentrated feeds such as soybean meal are not made available in three weeks.

The committee was told that one bottleneck is that large supplies of soybeans are being held off the market because the government promised midwestern farmers a bonus if they would not sell their beans until spring.

At San Antonio Richard Klappenbach, Jr., rancher, added that "thousands of sheep, goats and cattle will die in this section of the state" if feeds are not released.

"The ranchers need someone handling their problems who understands what the ranchers are up against," he declared.
