

Thinclads To Compete In Regional

Seven Olton thinclads will be in the preliminaries at Lubbock Friday, following qualification at the Hale Center Regional Qualifiers Track meet Saturday. One alternate will go with the team.

Qualifying in the regional meet were Bennie Akin, who placed first in the 440 yard run with 49.8, Mike Parsons, who ran the mile and set a new school record with 4:36.3 and Charles A. McClain who placed first in the high hurdles with 14.5 and the intermediate hurdles with 39.5, which is a new school record.

Also qualifying were Sel Sanchez who jumped 12 foot in the pole vault event and the sprint relay team who placed second with 44.1. Team consists of Akin, R. L. Copeland, Emily Marquez and Carlos Talamantez, with alternate Ronnie Sanders.

McClain also placed third in the broad jump and fourth in the high jump events.

Preliminaries will begin Friday at 12:30 and will be held at Texas Tech in Lubbock. Saturday, April 19 will be the Regional meet which will also be held in Lubbock. Finals will begin at 12:30.

Farmers Busy Irrigating, Planting Time Nearing

As planting season nears, a check with area farmers revealed that most of them were still in the process of irrigating before beginning to plant. However, there were some who had planted and "are watering it up."

One such farmer is Henry Aigaki, who planted corn before irrigation and is watering now. He said he had "quite a bit up at this time, but I'm not ready to brag about it."

Aigaki said he used atrazine and a rotary hoe to incorporate it with the soil before planting. He said he was still watering other land. He farms northwest of Olton.

Southeast of town, Dewey Hukill said he was trying to finish watering and that had been a "particularly hard year to complete this chore."

Beds are too wet to plant corn as yet but he will be doing just this as soon as possible. He said in the last two days several farmers had planted castor beans and more will be planted next week, along with more corn.

Mrs. Don Huguely said that her husband was still watering and hadn't planted anything.

Uil Gunter, west of town, said he planted castor beans dry which was a first time for him, but he said he had known of it working for others.

He did it as a time saver, saying that he is "behind all those others that are behind."

Mrs. Vernon Britton said they were irrigating 24 hours a day, six days a week and "That's ALL we're doing."

She said it would be some time before planting began, as they had just finished the grain land and beginning on the cotton ground irrigation. She concluded, "we are just praying for a good rain." The Brittons farm northwest of Olton.

North of Olton the Travis Bundick farm has been irrigated and he is hoping for no rain as he would like to start planting next week. Soil temperature is still too low at this time, he said.

Mrs. Garland Rose, south of town, said they were still watering and would be for some time. He has been working on the planter and will begin planting corn soon.

Oliver Rose is reported to be through watering and will begin planting into as soon as possible.

Elmer McGill, southwest of Olton, said he was "still waiting for water to get out to the other end." The land is reported to be practically "drinking" water, running very, very slow. He said he was a week or 10 days later than he likes to plant his corn.

With temperatures rising steadily each day, except for a cold front now and then, planting operations will be in full swing in the area soon and farmers will be looking forward toward the harvest of what they hope to be a bumper crop.

12 Accidents Are Reported

Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$6,410.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1969 shows a total of 32 accidents resulting in no persons killed, 10 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$18,895.00.

The final entry in the 1968 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,481 persons killed, 216,972 persons injured, and an estimated property loss of \$836,802,000.00 was sustained.

Since the death count of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gone steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1975 they will have increased 100 per cent."

Olton Mustang Eddie Hooper gets another star in his crown of honors which are continuing to be bestowed upon the young man.

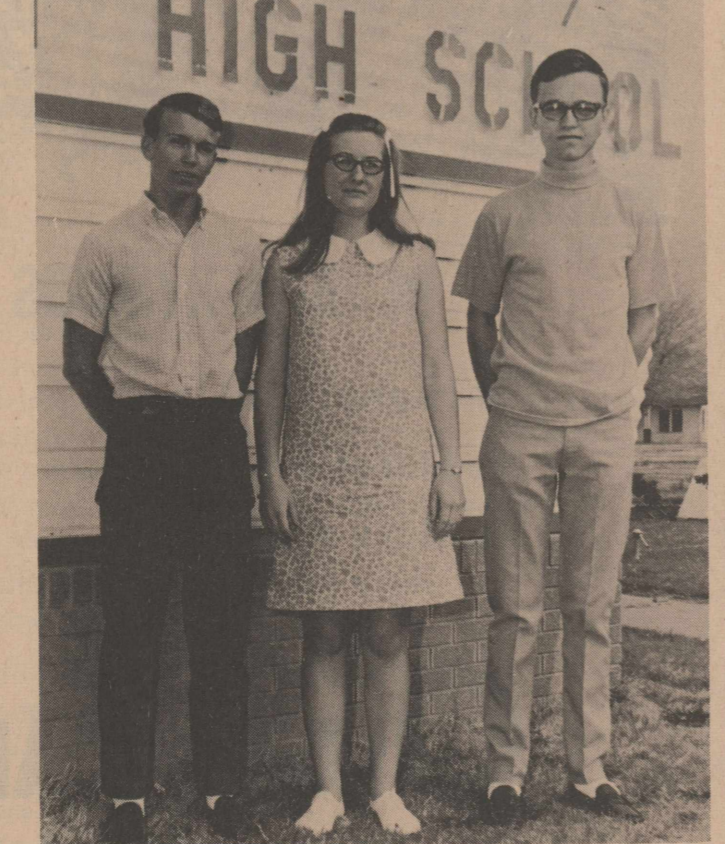
He has been chosen by the North/South All-Star selection football committee to participate in the All-Star activities and game at the Dallas Coaching School, Aug. 3-7.

Board Of Trustees Adopts Drug Policy

The board of trustees met in regular session Monday night, and adopted a policy regarding the use of narcotics by students in the Olton schools.

Other business included that of canvassing the votes, administering the oath of office to the three elected officials, discussion of the telephone system and summer work, and hearing reports on attendance, lunchroom and the hiring of several new teachers.

The policy regarding drugs or narcotic drugs adopted reads, "Any student known to have a dangerous drug or narcotic drug in his possession, or known to be under the influence thereof, while in school or while participating in a school-sponsored function after due notice to the violator and after hearing before the Board of Trustees and if found

guilty, the student shall be expelled for the balance of the semester and no credits be given to the student for the semester."

"Any student who shall have been convicted of a misdemeanor or felony for the possession, use, or sale of a dangerous drug or narcotic drug while outside the school, will be expelled by the Board of Trustees for the current semester and no credit be given to the student for the semester."

The board adopted the policy by unanimous vote.

Votes were then canvassed by the board and the oaths of office were signed by incumbents Gerald Allcorn, Elmo Bryant and Royce Collins.

Officers were elected, with Winston Bley being named as president for a fourth term, O. J. Neeley, vice president, and Elmer McGill as secretary.

A self-evaluation program was approved by the board in order that the school might remain a member of the Southern Association. Littlefield and Olton are the only schools in Lamb County who belong to

the Association. In order for a school to be a member, certain accreditation standards must be met.

Teachers secured for the next school term include Mrs. Paul Walden, who will teach English in high school, Mrs. Wandie Hutson, who will teach in elementary, and Mrs. Bill Burton, first grade teacher.

Two new coaches were added to the staff and the wife of one of the coaches will become girls' physical education teacher.

Ray Kennison will serve as assistant in charge of defense under the new coach Blakely. Kennison is from Clovis, N. M. and has been working with Blakely. James Farris will serve as an assistant coach and he is also from Clovis, where he has been associated with Blakely.

Baseball Assn. Conducting Fund Drive

Olton Baseball Association members announced Tuesday that efforts are being made to finance and build a baseball park to serve boys in the Pee Wee division. Boys are eligible to play in Pee Wee League baseball provided they have completed the first grade at school.

The proposed park will be located just west of the Little League Park and concession stand and rest room facilities will accommodate both parks.

Immediate plans call for construction of a backstop, dugouts and cyclone fences down first and third base lines. Additional facilities will be added as funds are available.

Workers are making a fund drive this week. A list of contributors will be published each week in The Enterprise.

Persons who have not been contacted who would like to contribute to the fund drive may make a donation to Olton Pee Wee Baseball through Olton State Bank.

Rev. Godsey is a former pastor of Trinity Baptist Mission and was pastor of La Primera Mission Bautista in Plainview until two years ago.

At the time of the accident, Rev. Godsey was hauling pipe to families for putting in wells to get pure drinking water. He is a missionary for the Big Bend Area.

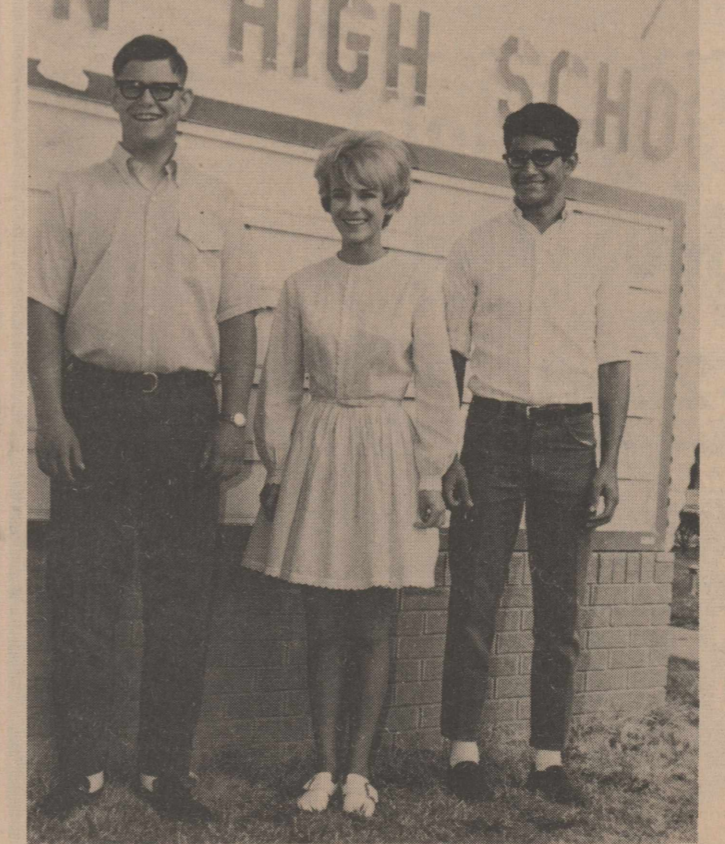

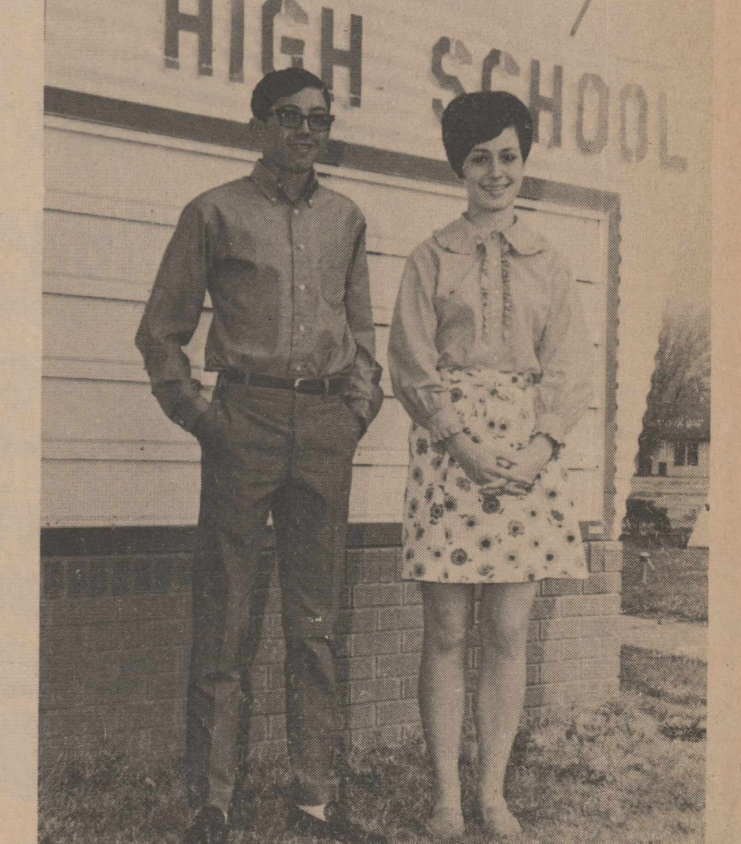

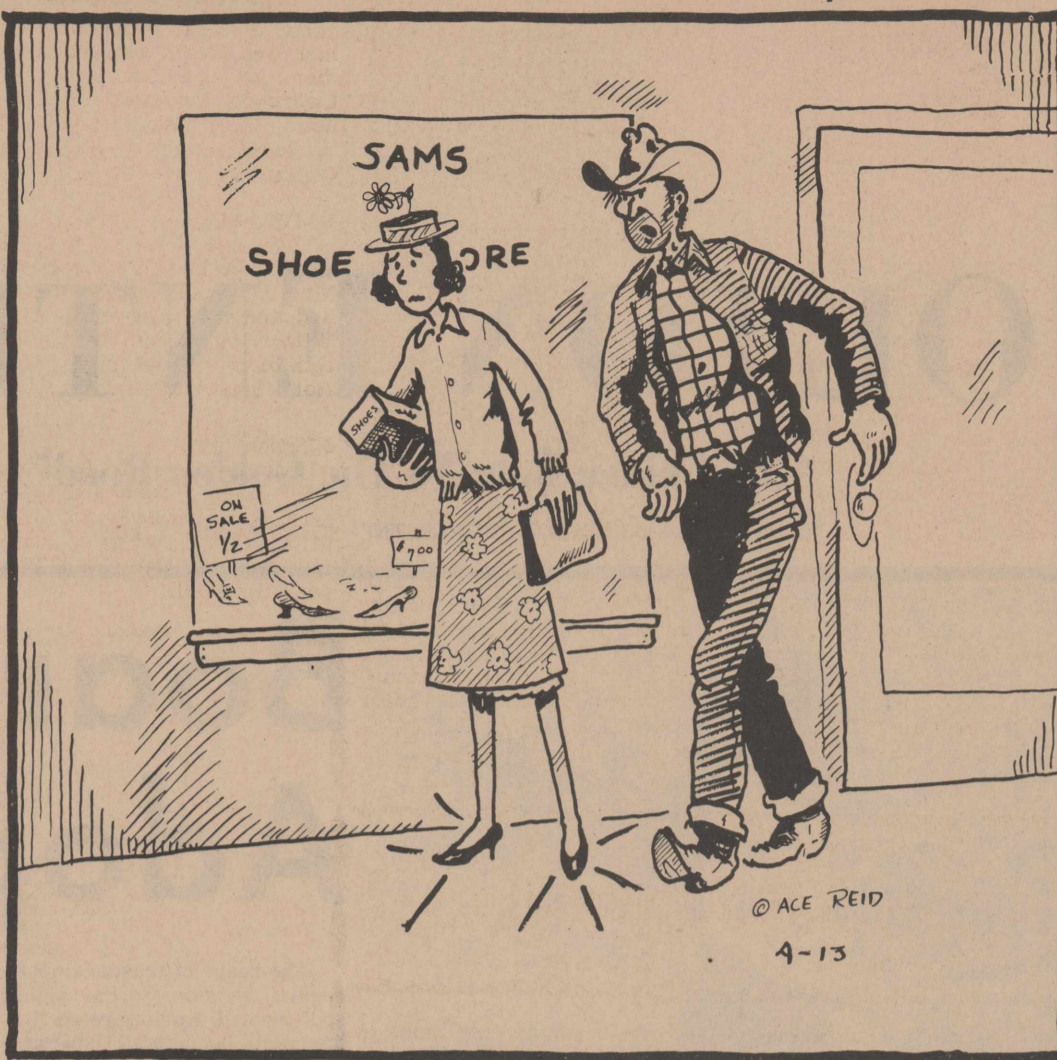
according to Little League rulings.

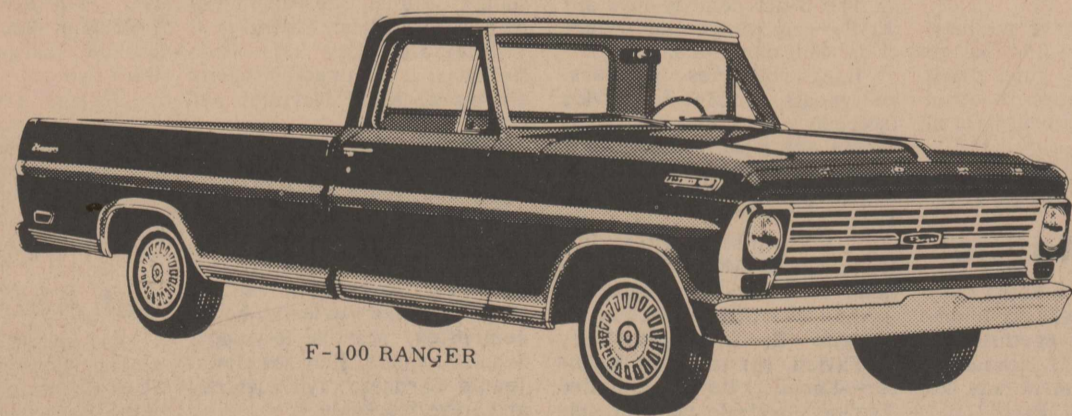

Should the Army Rule Out God?



Overruling the protests of atheists such as Mrs. Madalyn Murray O'Hair, Postmaster General Blount has determined that the words, "In the beginning God . . ." will appear on the six-cent postage stamp to be issued in commemoration of the historic Apollo 8 flight around the moon.

The stamp is to go on sale in Houston on May 5 and elsewhere in the country on the following day.

The postmaster general said that he had received a great number of letters from citizens who wanted the Scripture quotation to be included in the design of the stamp.

God Ruled Out

But, while the recognition of God is attested by the issuance of this commemorative postage stamp, God has been ruled out of another segment of American life.

Chaplains of the U. S. Army have been forbidden to mention God in their lectures which are delivered to soldiers for the purpose of instilling moral responsibility.

The foreword to character guidance manuals, in use by the army for many years, declares that the program is based on the American philosophy, expressed in the Declaration of Independence, which "regards man as a creature of God."

"As such," the manual continues, "every soldier is responsible and accountable to the Creator for the way he performs his civic and military duty, for the maintain-

ing of his own and the nation's honor, and for the quality of service he renders to his country as a soldier."

But now, because of a complaint from the American Civil Liberties Union, the Army has ruled that a chaplain may not mention God or religious philosophy in the required lectures on moral responsibility.

"Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord," the Bible says.

"Them that honor Me I will honor, and that they despise Me shall be lightly esteemed," declares the Lord.

Is not this a time when we should be calling on God for help in solving our problems—both foreign and domestic—rather than excluding Him from our lives?

What can we expect as a nation if we allow this trend to continue?

If we forget God, will He forget us?

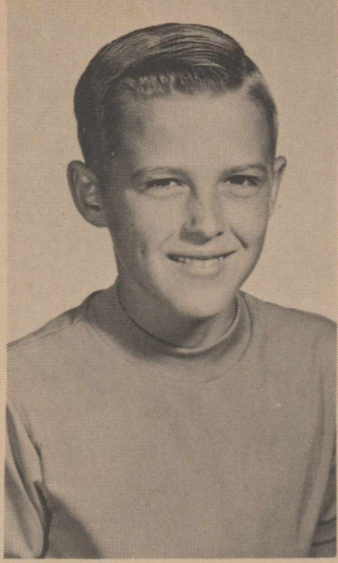
Should This Be Changed?

What is your opinion of this U. S. Army order?

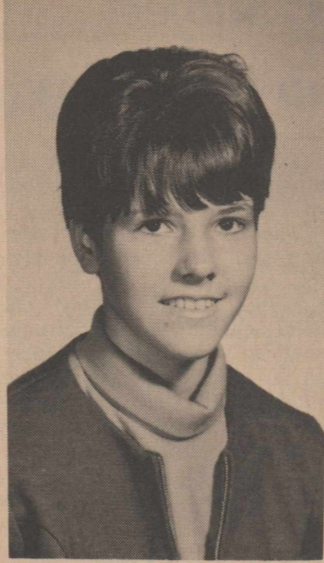
If you think that an effort should be made to have the army rescind this order and permit chaplains to mention God in these lectures, write to me in care of this newspaper, telling me what you believe should be done.

Bob Price Writes

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price questioned the role of Government price supports, subsidies or acreage controls in "agriculture as it exists today."

Speaking to members of the Texas Grain and Feed Association Saturday morning at their annual convention in Dallas (Sheraton Hotel), Price reviewed the current wheat and feed grain situation in Texas and then turned to the question of legislation to replace the current farm program.

Price said Texas wheat and feed grain producers received almost \$150 million in wheat certificates and feed grain price supports and diversion payments in 1968 in addition to market receipts from the sale of those crops. Nationwide, he said, 55 million acres are being diverted from grain production and total payments to farmers will exceed \$3 billion. Price said there was general agreement that for the next five to 10 years at least, little if any of the acreage that was diverted in 1968 and 1969 will be needed.

He pointed to recommendations made by the President

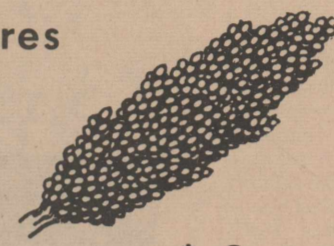
of one of the largest banks in the country that "the time is now propitious to seek a farm program that is responsive to agriculture as it exists today and will become tomorrow."

Such a program, he said, must recognize the existing economic facts, and trends and be oriented toward elimination of Government from the agricultural market place "to the degree possible...we will recognize that many facets of our current program are really consumer programs, and we will treat them as such."

Price concluded that a new farm program to replace the existing program by 1971 must envision solutions to the problems that past programs have perpetuated. Such a program, Price believes, would include further retirement of 60 to 80 million acres of crop land, necessary policing for competitive marketing, elimination of unfair trade practices and accuracy in labeling and quality inspection. Such a program would also include research facilities and data collection services and Government support of a healthy international trade.

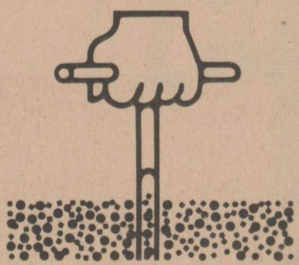

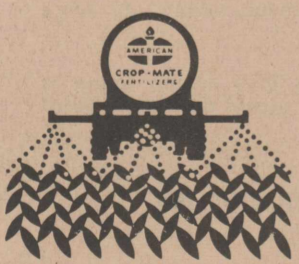

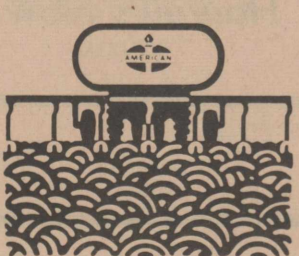

1 c. quick oatmeal
1 can cream of chicken soup - undiluted

Mix together hamburger, water, salt and oatmeal. Chill 30 minutes. Form into balls. roll in flour and brown on all sides in a small amount of shortening in a skillet. Add the soup and simmer for 20 minutes uncovered.

SALMON LOAF

1 lb. can pink or red salmon
1 1/2 c. bread crumbs
3/4 c. chopped celery
2 eggs beaten
1/2 c. milk
Fine grain cayenne
1/2 c. liquid (salmon juice and water)
1 T. lemon juice
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt.

Drain salmon, remove bones and skin and flake. Grease bread pan. Beat eggs, add 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 cup liquid. Combine salmon, bread crumbs, lemon juice, egg mixture, salt and cayenne. Make into loaf and place in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes or until brown and firm. Loosen edges from pan, invert on warm platter and garnish with celery tops or parsley.

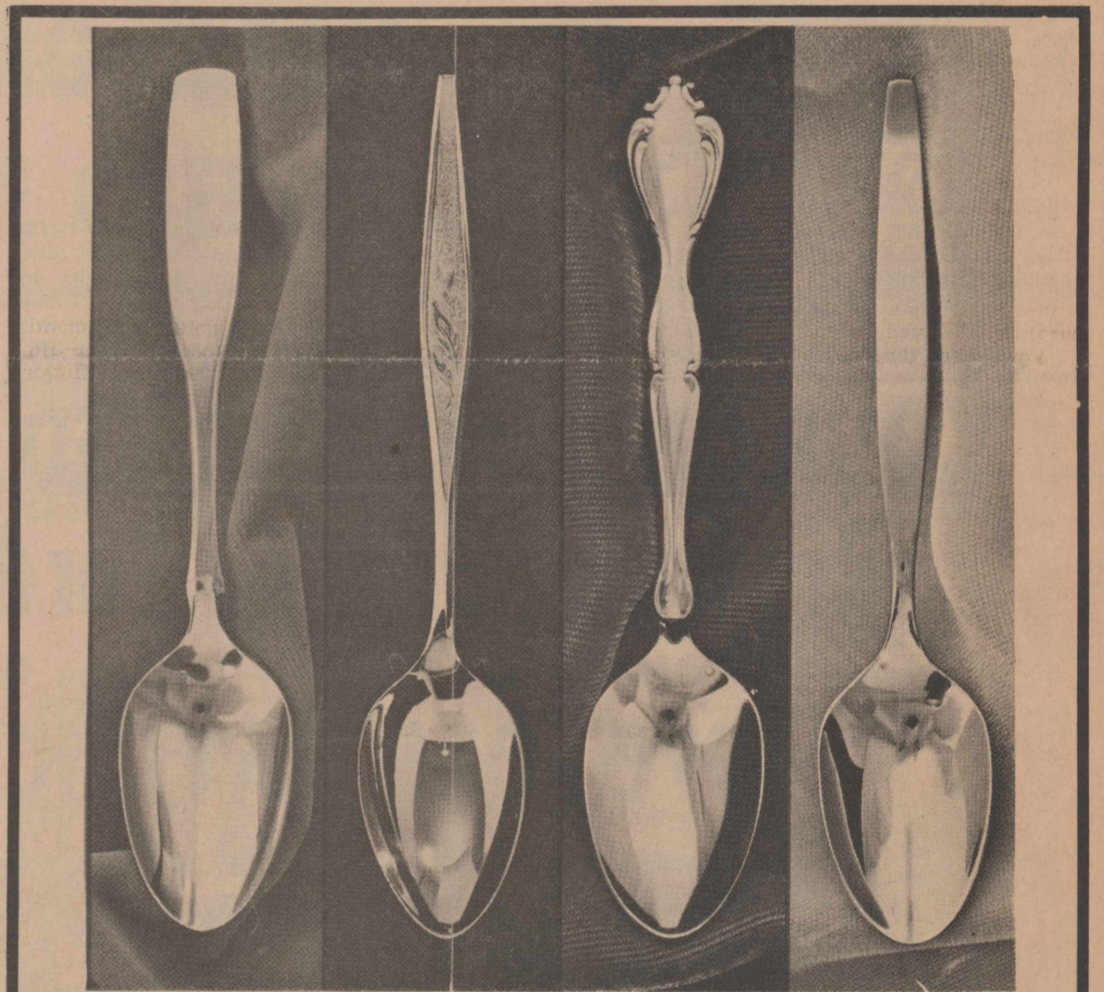

THENCE West along the South lines of Sections Nos. 58 and 59, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey to a point in the East line of Block 1, W. E. Halsell Sub-division, Lamb County,

said point also being the Southwest corner of Section 59, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey;

THENCE North along the East line of Block 1, W. E. Halsell Sub-division to a point which is the interior Southeast corner of Section No. 32, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Sub-division which point is also the Northwest corner of Section no. 7, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey, Lamb County, Texas;

THENCE East along the North lines of Sections nos. 7 and 6 of Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey, to a point in the North line of said Section no. 6, of said Survey, said point also being the Southwest corner of Section no. 22, Block S-3, Lamb County, Texas;

THENCE North along the West line of Section 22, Block S-3, Lamb County, Texas and the East line of Section 32, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Sub-division to its intersection with the North boundary line of Lamb County, Texas and the point of beginning."

The legislation shall provide that the District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for the needy residing within the District and shall have power through its Board of Directors to issue and sell as the obligations of such hospital district bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition and repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes and to levy a tax creating an interest and sinking fund to pay the interest on and principal of such bonds as same mature, to provide for the operation and maintenance of the District and its hospital system, and for the acquisition of necessary sites therefor by purchase, lease or condemnation, provided that said tax shall not exceed 75¢ on the \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within the District.

The legislation shall also provide that such District shall not be created unless or until an election is held at which such election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxing electors the proposition of whether or not Olton Hospital District shall be created with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75¢ on a \$100.00 valuation of all taxable property within such District, and a majority of the qualified property taxing electors vote in said election in favor of the proposition.

The legislation shall further provide that the management and control of the District shall be vested in the Board of Directors, the initial members of which shall be named in said legislation. The legislation shall provide that their successors shall each serve for a period of two years and shall be elected for staggered terms annually.

The above enumeration of provisions to be contained in such legislation is not intended to be exclusive but only to express the general purpose, nature and substance thereof. Such legislation will also make other provisions and confer other powers in connection with the general purpose and nature thereof above stated.

Tips On Cotton Planting Given By Foundation

Time is nearing when High Plains farmers will begin planting this year's cotton crops. One of the most useful guides in planning this year's cotton farming program can be the 1968 Annual Research Report of the High Plains Research Foundation. Information contained in cotton research results can make the difference in profits for the farmer using proper management guides.

Presently most farmers are in the midst of the pre-plant irrigation schedules. According to Jim Valliant, Foundation soil scientist, the pre-plant irrigation is important to insure adequate moisture for seed germination and early plant growth. He added that research at the Foundation has shown irrigation water applied a month to three weeks ahead of planting date is most satisfactory. Optimum planting date for maximum yield and highest quality cotton in the area is from April 25 to May 10.

Other tips in planting cotton, for optimum yields and quality, Valliant suggested planting of top quality seed in land with adequate seed bed preparation. "Plans already should be made for adequate weed control," the scientist said.

Valliant said that optimum planting time for best yields is when the soil temperature has reached a 10-day average of at least 60 degrees at the eight-inch depth.

He also noted that farmers might consider results in past tests in which lint yields from cotton irrigated at the pre-square stage showed significant increases.

The 1968 report reveals that irrigating every other row at the pre-square stage of growth produced higher yields and returns than solid irrigation at pre-square or solid first bloom stage of growth.

The every other row irri-

gation produced 497 pounds of lint per acre compared to 402 pounds and 439 pounds of lint for the other two methods respectively. "Also tagging of the blooms showed that 88 to 93 per cent of the lint was produced from the first four weeks of blooming," Valliant pointed out.

This skip-row irrigation method at pre-square showed an increase in lint produced from the first two weeks of bloom. "The pre-square irrigated cotton produced 336 pounds of lint from the bloom set in the first two weeks while the first bloom irrigated cotton produced only 304 pounds during the same period," Valliant said.

The national piano playing tournaments are conducted in 750 centers from coast to coast and 75,889 piano teachers and students took part in 1968. Candidates play against a standard of excellence and not against each other. Purpose of the tournaments is to stimulate interest in artistic piano playing with goals and awards appealing to hobbyists and professionals of all ages.

Judges include 250 outstanding artists, composers and teachers. Gannaway has maintained a private piano studio in Brownfield for 17 years after receiving the Bachelor of Music Degree from Hardin-Simmons University. He has attended an extensive number of piano workshops, primarily those of-

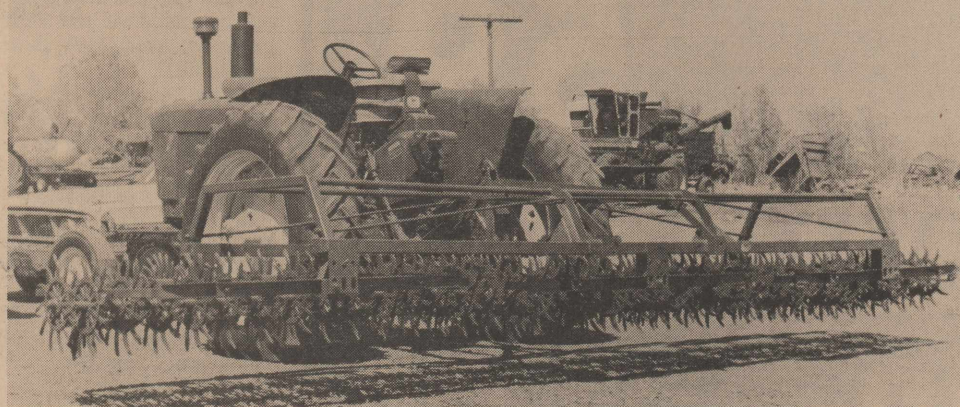

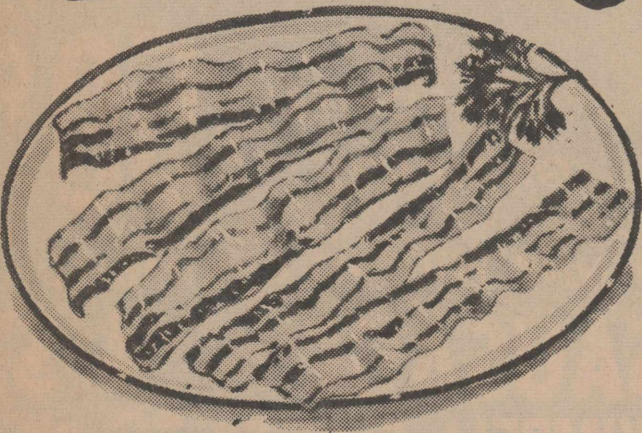
