C. C. Thompson of Colorado City, attorney, banker, rancher-farmer, has been honored nationally as one of the eight outstanding former 4-H Club members. The eight received 4-H Alumni Key awards on Dec. 2 at ceremonies during the 49th National 4-H Congress in Chicago.

Thompson received the "Man of the Year" Award in Texas Agriculture in 1969, and that year was also named Colorado City's "Top Citizen."

His wife accompanied him to the National Congress. At the interview there, Mr. Thompson said he got his start in 4-H work when a lad in Loraine, starting with his first 4-H project feeding out a calf.

The Thompsons said they had never seen so many fine young people gathered at one place as was seen in Chicago, they were the cream of the crop, all interested young citizens, eager and ambitious to learn, not the type that is so publicized these days.

Mr. Thompson was judge of Mitchell County in 1924-31, and has received many honors both in the county, state and national, but none that means more to him than this one bestowed at the National 4-H Congress, he stated.

HOMEMAKING CLASSES REPORT ON CURRENT SCHOOL STUDIES

The Homemaking classes are in the food preparation phase of their yearly study. Each of the four levels are studying and preparing meals on the level commensurate with their own level of ability and experience.

The Freshmen Foods Groups are preparing breakfasts, simple luncheon and supper dishes while learning the basic principles of preparation.

The Sophomores are divided in groups of four which represent family groups and are planning one luncheon or dinner lab per week for six weeks. These different types of dinner menus are: a teen-age luncheon, a working mother's dinner, a low calorie meal, a high protein dinner and a low-cost meal. Each group tries to also include techniques and foods which are new to each girl, thus increasing her own ability in preparation and her own knowledge of the wide variety and selection of foods.

The Junior Class groups are doing an international study of foods while also doing study and experience in Children's groups. Their studies of foreign foods includes a historical review of the particular country whose food they prepare and to date, the groups have done a Spanish dinner, a French, Hawaiian, and an Italian meal. They are planning a pre-Christmas cookie party for the school Kindergarten class climaxing a 3-week unit on mini-lessons and story telling for that group. The Senior Class group who

have just completed their "Make It With Wool" experience are going into a "Studies of Careers" and "Consumer Affairs Study" which will be in-depth studies to include research papers, bulletin boards, films or audio-visual aids and the teaching of the unit to the Junior Class group.

This curriculum planning and development is under the direction of Mrs. Curtis Latimer, the Homemaking teacher.

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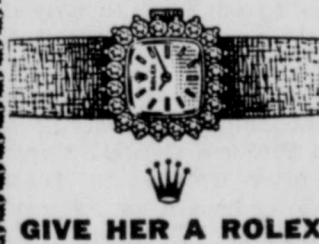

Before the Civil War, a farmer produced enough to feed and clothe himself and three others. By World War II he was producing enough for 11 others. But in a single lifetime all the preceding years of man's labor on the land. Many scientific factors such as machinery, improved seed, pest control, harvesting methods that can do the work of 80 men. Thus farmers are investing 8 times as much capital as they did 30 years ago. Irrigation and fertilizers boost yields far above the earlier standards.

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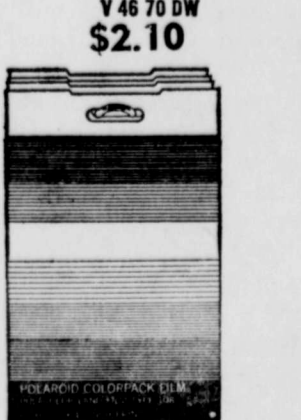
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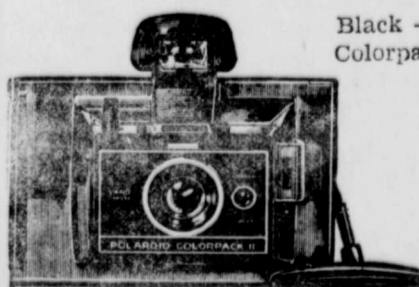


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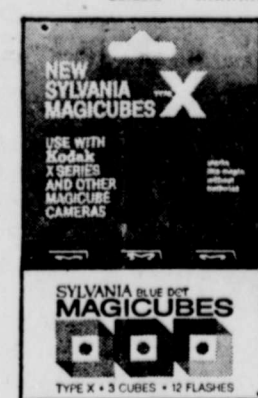
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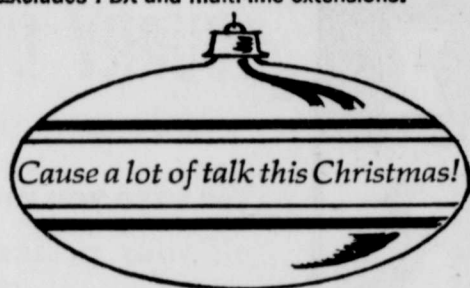
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Ruth Class Holds Christmas Party

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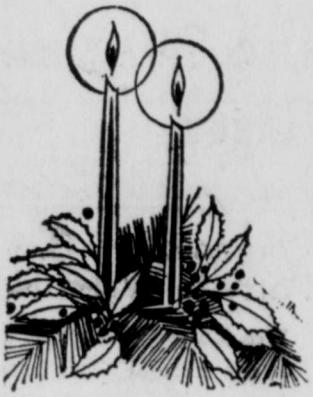

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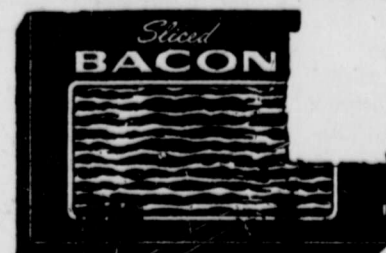
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
