

House Passes Compromise Tax Measure

\$1,500 And \$750
Exemptions Retained;
Basic Rate 10 Percent

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—The house gave prompt approval today to the \$3,533,400,000 compromise version of the new defense tax bill, clearing the way for final action tomorrow by the senate.

Without a roll-call vote, the house adopted recommendations of a joint senate-house conference committee which worked out the compromise on changes made in the record-breaking measure by the senate.

Flurries of criticism developed against some of those changes, particularly the reduction of the individual exemptions from \$2,000 to \$1,500 for married persons and from \$800 to \$750 for single persons and the elimination of the requirement that all married persons file joint income tax returns.

Rep. Crowther (R-N.Y.) protested that certain provisions of the bill, such as those lowering the exemptions and imposing a \$5 annual use tax on passenger automobiles would make the measure "an employment agency." He said that lowering of the exemptions last year had forced the internal revenue bureau to hire 3,900 additional clerks to handle the increased number of returns and added that the bureau had reported the proposed automobile tax would necessitate 5,800 more employees to administer.

As finally agreed upon by a joint senate-house conference committee yesterday, the compromise version calls for new and higher levies all down the line. One of the most important changes is a reduction in personal income tax exemptions—from \$2,000 to \$1,500 for married persons, and from \$800 to \$750 for single persons. The basic income tax rate would be increased from 4 to 10 per cent, in the lowest bracket.

The measure also provides for new, stiffer excises levied on "luxury taxes" on many necessities and luxuries, after October 1. Corporation surtaxes likewise are to be upped.

President Accepts Gorilla As Gift

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt agreed today to accept as a gift a huge African gorilla, presented by Free French authorities as a symbol of the ferocity of their fight against nazism.

"It is the largest and we believe, the most ferocious gorilla that ever left Africa," wrote General De Laminat, high commissioner of French Equatorial Africa. "What will be done with the beast was not disclosed, but probably will wind up in the Washington zoo. It was captured in the French Congo by Philip Carroll, an American citizen, who is now on the way to this country with it."

Hamburg Target Of British Bombers

LONDON, Sept. 16 (AP)—A powerful force of 16 British bombers attacked shipyards, factories and railroads of Hamburg last night, authoritative sources said today.

Many large fires were reported started in the raid, which lasted several hours.

Other British forces attacked the German ports of Cuxhaven and Wilhelmshaven and the French port of La Havre.

FOLKSTONE, Eng., Sept. 16 (AP)—Flying thousands of feet up and barely visible between patches of clouds, an RAF armada passed over the Dover Strait just before sunset today and headed to attack the coast of German-occupied France.

British, Russians March On Teheran

Allies Act Because Of Delay
In Expelling Nazis; Shah Quits

LONDON, Sept. 16 (AP)—British and Russian troops tonight were reported marching on the Iranian capital of Teheran as the nation's ruler, Reza Shah Pahlavi, abdicated under the threat of such action.

The British and Russians accused the shah and his government of dilatory tactics in carrying out an agreement to expel or deliver to the allies all German, Hungarian, Italian and Rumanian nationals.

This afternoon, it was learned authoritatively, British and Russian troops were marching on Teheran with plans for immediate occupation of the city.

A Teheran dispatch, not immediately clear here, said that Russian forces already had occupied the town of Karaz, 28 miles northwest of Teheran, but stated that a British military attaché had gone to inquire into the reason for the Russian move. This dispatch was filed before announcement over the Teheran radio of the shah's abdication, and before it was stated authoritatively here that the British and Russians were cooperating to occupy Teheran.

The shah's abdication was announced before an extraordinary session of the Iranian parliament, the Teheran radio stated, the official version being all health.

The shah, who ascended the throne in 1925, was reported to have fled the capital, but his whereabouts were not disclosed immediately. It was announced he would be succeeded by his 21-year-old son, the European-educated Crown Prince Shahpud Mohammed Reza.

Informed quarters here said they thought Teheran would be occupied without Iranian opposition. The capital was not included in the zones which previously had been agreed upon for occupation by British and Russian troops. The Russian zone was a strip running north of the capital, and the British territory was laid out in the southwest to include Iran's valuable oil fields.

I was stated by an authoritative British source that occupation of the capital had been pending for several days.

Authoritative quarters for days had stressed the "impatience" of both Britain and Russia at what they called the shah's "pro-axial" leanings and efforts to delay as long as possible the fulfillment of the allied demands.

Aluminum Plant On Gulf Coast Planned

DALLAS, Sept. 16 (AP)—Senator W. Lee O'Daniel said yesterday that a Texas gulf coast plant to treat aluminum-bearing ore shipped in from South America and Arkansas is being considered by national defense authorities.

He added that the plant would cost many millions.

There also is a chance, he declared, that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and other agencies would approve a plant to smelt East Texas iron.

Board Studies 'Captive' Coal Mine Strikes

Steel Firm Heads
Called To Testify
In Serious Tie-Up

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers (CIO), rejected in Washington today a request of the defense mediation board that captive soft coal mines be reopened immediately.

The heads of some of America's largest steel companies have been summoned to appear before the national defense mediation board at Washington tomorrow in connection with a labor dispute which has closed more than 30 "captive" coal mines whose product is essential to the nation's armament drive.

The "captive" mines produce coal used exclusively by the steel companies which own the mines. Some of the mills have only three to six weeks reserve stock of coal.

Upwards of 40,000 United Mine Workers (CIO) have struck for a union shop. The mediation board stepped in quickly to take jurisdiction in the dispute, and asked that the strikers return to work.

The affected mines are in Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Kentucky, Illinois and Tennessee, and are owned by the U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic, Weirton, Wheeling, Crucible and Youngstown Sheet and Steel companies.

An unrelated dispute among anthracite miners stirred eastern Pennsylvania. About 16,000 hard coal miners, members of the CIO-UMW, spread a work stoppage movement in protest to an increase in union dues and assessments. Dues have been upped from \$1 to \$1.50 a month, assessments from \$2 to \$4.

In Chicago, a fact-finding board named by President Roosevelt investigated the strike threat of 1,200,000 railroad workers, members of 19 Brotherhoods, who seek wage increases which the carriers estimate would add \$900,000,000 a year to their operating expenses.

The unions already have authorized the strike, but such a walkout legally may not be put into effect until 30 days after the fact-finding board has reported.

At Elizabeth, N. J., several hundred CIO employees of the Breeze Corporations, Inc., airplane armor manufacturers, struck yesterday protesting against what they said were long-drawn out wage negotiations. Company officials called it an unauthorized strike. The workers asked a minimum of 75 cents an hour, with increases of from 10 to 15 cents an hour in various classes. The present scale was not announced.

**Clark Would Break
'Movie Monopoly'**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Senator Clark (D-Idaho), personally convinced that films are spreading war propaganda, declared today that the practice warranted legislation to force the motion picture industry to separate its production, distribution and exhibition agencies.

As chairman of an interstate commerce sub-committee which has been hearing testimony concerning movie policies, Clark told reporters he would ask the group to consider recommending revision of the Sherman anti-trust law "to destroy what apparently is a monopoly in the motion picture industry."

1918's Vets Stage Parade At Convention

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 16 (AP)—The American soldiers who shouldered rifles in France in 1918 substituted came today as they swung jauntily down Milwaukee streets in the American Legion's brilliant convention parade.

Milwaukee got up early, hurried through breakfast and, hours before the start, massed 10 deep along the entire three-mile parade route.

The march started promptly at 9 a. m. to continue without interruption for at least 12 hours. The first section passed the reviewing stand shortly before 10 o'clock. Convention officials said about 50,000 would participate.

Scattered clouds filled the sky and there was a threat of showers as the 1940 national champion Edward H. Monahan Post band of Sioux City, Ia., moved toward the reviewing stand, followed by National Commander Milo Warner, past national commanders and distinguished guests.

Louisiana, which is campaigning to take the 1942 convention to New Orleans, grouped its units behind a huge banner declaring "New Orleans wants the Legion convention in 1942."

Business sessions, which got off to a rousing start yesterday, with the applauding of every inference of intervention in the foreign conflict, were suspended for the big show.

**Spy Activity
Told In Trial**

NEW YORK, Sept. 16 (AP)—Tasks ranging from "enlisting the services of members of the U. S. Air Corps" to reporting on new anti-bomb devices of U. S. warships were assigned to spies in this country by the German gestapo, according to evidence introduced today at the trial of 16 men on charges of espionage conspiracy.

Government exhibits included a message transmitted from a Long Island secret radio station to the Hamburg gestapo office on July 24, 1940. It said:

"Dunn says four battleships of Texas class and ten destroyers going Caribbean to scout for England. Six hundred reservists; 600 enlisted men. The Todd Drydock has contracted to lay laminated anti-bomb deck on U. S. destroyers, 20 new destroyers, 20 World war destroyers, explosion tanks place before bomb reaches lamination."

William G. Sebald, American counter-espionage agent who was assigned by the gestapo to build and operate the station—and who did so with the aid of the Federal Bureau of Investigation—said the message was given him for transmission by Frederick Duguesne, a defendant. He said Dunn was Duguesne's alias.

**High Navy Man
Hints At War**

NEW YORK, Sept. 16 (AP)—Ralph A. Bard, assistant secretary of the navy, said today that "events of the last few days strongly indicate" that war may be forced upon the United States.

Speaking at graduation exercises for 429 ensigns aboard the training ship Prairie State, Bard said that German submarines were coming ever closer to our shores and that four-engined bombing planes had sunk ships within a few miles of land in this hemisphere.

Little work went on in that section, for many were enjoying an all-day fiesta falling as a blessing after the opening program Monday evening and in anticipation of the climactic ceremonies starting Tuesday at 8 p. m.

German Officers Shot In Paris

PARIS, Unoccupied France, Sept. 16 (AP)—A German non-commissioned officer was shot at here today after a German firing squad had executed 10 French hostages for attacks on other German soldiers.

At the same time it was learned that another German non-commissioned officer was seriously wounded Monday night before execution of the hostages. The German shot at today was not hit.

The assault today occurred in a subway station. Several shots were fired. Identity of the German was not disclosed.

The man wounded was said to be in "very serious condition." He was attacked on the Boulevard Strasbourg, in the heart of the city's commercial district and near the East Station where another German sergeant was wounded Sept. 2.

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**Cairo Suffers 1st
Air Raid Of War**

Cairo is a holy city of the Moslem world, much as Rome is to Catholics.

RANGER, Sept. 16 (AP)—Robbery of a filling station proprietor by four men armed with sawed-off shotguns today spurred a search for three accused army deserters who escaped from the Camp Wolters guardhouse, kidnaped a soldier and his girlfriend and made off with their automobile.

The four men took \$25 from the filling station proprietor six miles east of here last night. Officers said they also robbed a couple in a nearby tourist camp of \$5 and their automobile, leaving behind a stolen car.

**Senate Acts
Fast On New
Bond Bill**

House-Passed Act
Rushed To Committee;
Passage Urged

AUSTIN, Sept. 16 (AP)—Receiving a compromise road bond servicing bill from the house, the senate today moved swiftly to consider the proposal in committee and on the floor apparently with a view to rapid disposal of the problem for which the special legislative session had been convened.

The upper legislative chamber recessed until later in the afternoon and suspended a constitutional rule so that its state affairs committee could work on the house bill which sought to answer the controversial road bond question in a somewhat different manner than a measure recently approved by the senate.

Senator Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo, moving that the rule be suspended, asserted:

"The house bill is almost the same as the senate bill now in the house, except for a few changes. We ought to consider it in committee, get it out of committee and then pass it."

"We were called here to decide one issue only and I believe we ought to do it and go back home. There is no reason for delay."

Senator William Estess of Galveston, vice chairman of the state affairs committee, announced a meeting of the group shortly after noon.

**Armies Feint
For Opening
In Mock War**

Speed and steel of the highly mechanized Second Army's Red attacking thrust deep into western Louisiana today (Tuesday) but without coming to a real test against the bulk of the Third Army's Blue defending force.

Fighting only at Alexandria, La., on the southeastern end of the line, Lieut. General Walter Krueger apparently was swinging his third of a million men into a short, compact line to meet the full force of the 700 tanks which form the attacking Red force of about 170,000 men.

The Reds took Alexandria yesterday but the Blues re-won it in a counter-attack and still were holding it today.

Meanwhile the bulk of the Red armored units was fingering its way south from Shreveport, La. The advance sits up nearly 100 miles from Shreveport yesterday, being slowed little by air attacks which were hampered by bad weather.

Massed somewhere along the Sabine river on the Louisiana-Texas border was the Blues' hardest-hitting division, apparently hoping to turn the tank offensive into a pocket between the Blue line and the 700 tanks cramps south and west of Alexandria.

General Lear seemed in no hurry to test his tanks' striking power in a pitched battle until he could straighten his line, bring up artillery and organize his supply system.

The War Today— Hitler Will Likely Seek Other Routes To Victory Before Taking On U. S. Navy In All-Out Fight

By DEWITT MACKENZIE
(Herald Special News Service)

This being the day the United States navy starts operating under orders "to capture or destroy" every axis raider that so much as casts an eye on lease-lend cargoes enroute between America and Iceland, an editor suggests that I put myself in Herr Hitler's place and figure out how he will meet this difficult situation.

Always glad of new ideas, still we must beg to be excused from taking the place of any individual who is to all intents at war with our country. We don't care much either to be in the uncomfortable position of tugging with the U. S. navy, for which we have a very wholesome respect—and venture to suggest that the fuhrer has too.

However, there's no harm in guessing what the Nazi chief has in mind. It would seem more profitable though to take a look at his entire war problem, since his action in the Atlantic must be governed to considerable degree by what happens in Russia.

Much will depend, as was pointed out in yesterday's column, on the German position in Russia, a couple of weeks from now—or whenever the pre-winter weather begins to lay a heavy hand on military operations. In trying to assay the general war outlook we must keep in mind these vital points:

Herr Hitler likely will have to hold a line through the Baltic and the Black Seas, but if he can bring home his present great offensives, and get himself into a favorable strategic position, he will be able to maintain his defenses much more

easily and therefore will be able to release forces for operations elsewhere.

On the other hand, if the Bolsheviks can stand the Nazis off—even hold them where they are now—then Hitler will be compelled to keep a great army in the Russian field, and so will have to curtail operations elsewhere.

In order to get himself properly set, or so it seems to me, the Nazi leader must capture Leningrad (and what a job that is proving to be); he must maintain at least his present position in the center of the line opposite Moscow; he must capture Kiev and roll the Red forces in the Ukraine clear back to the Don river, thereby putting himself in position to make a drive down through the Caucasus to Persia.

I was chatting yesterday with General H. S. Sewell, the British military expert, and he feels that Hitler's most likely move, if he gets a favorable break in his present operations, will be to the east. The general points out that if the Germans are able to gain control of the Black sea, and if they can manage Turkey so as to have no active opposition from her, their way will be open to the Caucasus and the rich oil fields of the Caspian. Once in the Caucasus, the Nazis would threaten the whole British structure in the Middle East.

If a drive down through the Caucasus isn't feasible, indications are that Hitler will put the screws on Turkey and try to get passage of his army across that country in order to get at the lower Caucasus and Persia. There is widespread belief in the Balkans that should the Turks refuse, Hitler might attack them, probably utilizing Rumanian and Bulgarian troops in the assault. Should Hitler concentrate on the Middle East, his operations elsewhere probably would be restricted—barring the Atlantic over which is passing a constantly increasing stream of aid for the allies. Some way he must halt the traffic, else it will overwhelm him.

Now while he ultimately may feel compelled to go all-out in raiding the American-Islandic route, thereby precipitating open fighting with our warships, he has given plenty of indications that he would vastly prefer to avoid a clash which would bring us into the war and unleash our navy on him.

One would expect him first to try a fresh drive against British shipping as it is coming to England from Iceland. He undoubtedly is holding a large fleet of submarines in reserve and when the Russian fighting eases off with the coming of winter, he will be able to release bombers to renew their assault on merchant ships and harbors.

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Navy Takes Over New Assignment To Defend Ships

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Stripped for action, the United States Atlantic fleet took under the protection of its guns today all lease-lend cargoes in transit on the Atlantic between the North American continent and Iceland.

The zero-hour for this new phase of operations was 12:01 a. m., and the widely accepted view in authoritative quarters here was that it meant the start of actual convoy duty by U. S. naval vessels along a 2,000-mile stretch of the north Atlantic.

Literally, the new naval policy as announced by Secretary Knox was to provide protection "as adequate as we can make it" in the designated area, with all fleet units under specific orders "to capture or destroy by every means at their disposal" every axis raider encountered.

With the Atlantic fleet charged with the responsibility of safeguarding British and all other cargo vessels in the expanses west of Iceland, the Royal Navy could concentrate its efforts on guaranteeing safe passage through the perilous 800-mile stretch between Iceland and the British Isles.

In a companion move to ease Britain's shipping burdens, American merchantment were given explicit permission to carry arms and munitions to many parts of the vast British Empire.

The state department announced a ruling by Attorney General Biddle last night which held that President Roosevelt's neutrality proclamation at the outbreak of the war in 1939 did not bar American ships from transporting implements of war to any portion of the British Empire except the United Kingdom, India, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Union of South Africa and areas blocked by neutrality act "combat zones."

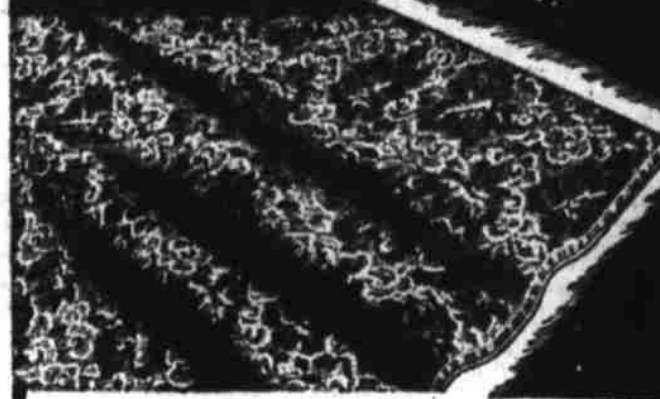

Clovis Trips B'Spring, 5-2, To Win WT-NM Championship

Brooks Creep Toward Nat'l League Title

Add Half-Game To Lead Over Cards In 17-Inning Affair

Surely but slowly, agonizing steps at a time, the Brooklyn Dodgers are creeping toward the National league championship.

They capitalized yesterday on a chance to add a half-game to their lead over the idle second-place St. Louis Cardinals. But it took the Dodgers 17 innings—and on that basis you can't say that their foes are giving them something for nothing.

The Dodgers are two games out in front today for two reasons—they battle to the final out; and the Cardinals have been beset by one of the worst sieges of injuries that ever befell a major league club.

No one can say where the Cardinals might have been if they had had Terry Moore, Enos Slaughter and all their other regulars for the entire season as Brooklyn has had. For 18 innings the struggle yesterday was a scoreless pitching duel between Paul Derringer, ace of the Cincinnati Reds, and Johnny Allen, ex-American league who was supplanted in the 18th by chubby Hugh Casey.

For nine innings Allen held the Reds to one scratch single. The Dodgers put men on bases in seven of the nine frames without scoring. They kept right on challenging and in the 17th, when darkness was enveloping the contest, they finally managed to turn the affair inside out and win, 5-1.

The game at Cincinnati, which reduced the Reds to a one-percent advantage point held on third place, was the only action in the National league.

In the American league the New York Yankees were out, 9-4, but beat the Cleveland Indians, 4-3, for Lefty Gomez' 18th triumph.

The Boston Red Sox padded their second-place cushion by beating the Chicago White Sox, 6-1.

The St. Louis Browns toppled the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3.

Dutch Leonard pitched steady, eight-hit ball to lead the Washington Senators to an 8-5 triumph over the Detroit Tigers.

Nazis Take Veterans From Occupied Lands
LONDON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Demands of the Russian campaign were declared by a reliable source here today to have compelled Germany to withdraw "nearly 600,000 seasoned troops from the low countries and occupied France."

This source said the troops withdrawn were veterans and were replaced by younger recruits and soldiers over 35 years old.

There is reason to believe, however, that western Europe still is garrisoned by approximately 800,000 men, the same number that has been there for several months, it was said.

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Pioneer's Fielding Defeats Bombers

The curtain was dropped on the final scene of the West Texas-New Mexico 1941 season here last night as a battling club took a flaming victory over a valiant foe. Clovis' Pioneer Bombers, 5 to 2, and thereby clinching an uphill drive that started near mid-season and finished with the last engagement in the seven-game finals playoff.

Largest crowd ever to attend a baseball game in Big Spring, totaling 1,718 paid admissions, saw the Bombers' hopes for a league championship crash. The pennant-winning Big Springers were stopped by a combination of breaks, plus top-flight ball playing by the opposition.

Clovis would have been hard to handle by any club. Everything the Bombers did was right. Mel Kramer was not particularly spectacular on the mound but he received a brand of support by his mates that would have given victory to any pitcher. He delivered a steady game over the route, limiting the Bombers to five hits.

Big Spring's ace in the hole, a perfectly coordinated pitching staff, did not click as in games past, but that could not be considered reason for the loss. Two errors in the first inning contributed to the Big Spring defeat but they could not take the blame for the final setback. Rather, it was one of those things that make baseball what it is—Clovis had it for the night, Big Spring didn't.

Big Spring hitting was stopped short by a Pioneer fielding show that could not be beat. Time after time the Bombers connected for long drives that normally would have been good for singles and doubles, but Clovis pounced on them in a manner that has likely not been equaled in Roberts Field.

Big Spring's heavy swingers pounded Kramer's tosses far out into the outfield but a department consisting of Mel Steiner, Manager Grover Seitz and Bill Daniel was always waiting. To top it off, the Bombers sapped up a couple of homers, both over the rightfield fence.

Three Big Spring hurlers saw service against Clovis. Charlie Wheeler started but after giving up four hits was retired in favor of Bob Kohout. During Wheeler's stay on the mound, three Clovis scores came in, two of them unearned.

Kohout was hit for a homer by Walt Schmidt and walked Kramer before making way for Willard Ramsdell in the fifth. Ramsdell was scored on once but limited the Bombers to two hits in five innings. But Ramsdell's work could not rub out counts already in.

What was really the handwriting on the wall appeared as Earl Larimer, leading off in the initial inning, landed safely on first on a bad throw by Hayden Greer. Steiner fled out to Mel Reeves at centerfield and Seitz, on with a hit, was stopped in an attempt for third for the second out. Paul Schoendienst singled to score Larimer and was in turn driven in as Daniel was errored to first.

Then additional lead was piled on Big Spring when Schoendienst, leading off in the fourth, homered. Big Spring's Greer led off in the fourth, was thrown out at first, bringing up Dick Ratliff. Ratliff singled and advanced to second on an error by Seitz. Larry Drake hit to put the runner on third and Eddie Stevens drove in the score, but Drake was stopped at second. Jack Lindsey doubled neatly to put Stevens over the payoff bag.

With the game practically assured thing for Clovis, Schmidt singled in the seventh, moved up on a sacrifice by Kramer, then romped across for the last run of the West Texas-New Mexico season as Harrison singled.

It was a silent group of boys that walked away from the Big Spring dugout. They had played their hearts out during a grueling season. Had given the customers grade A baseball—had nothing of which to be ashamed. They lost to a fine club—a club that fully deserved the laurels it gained.

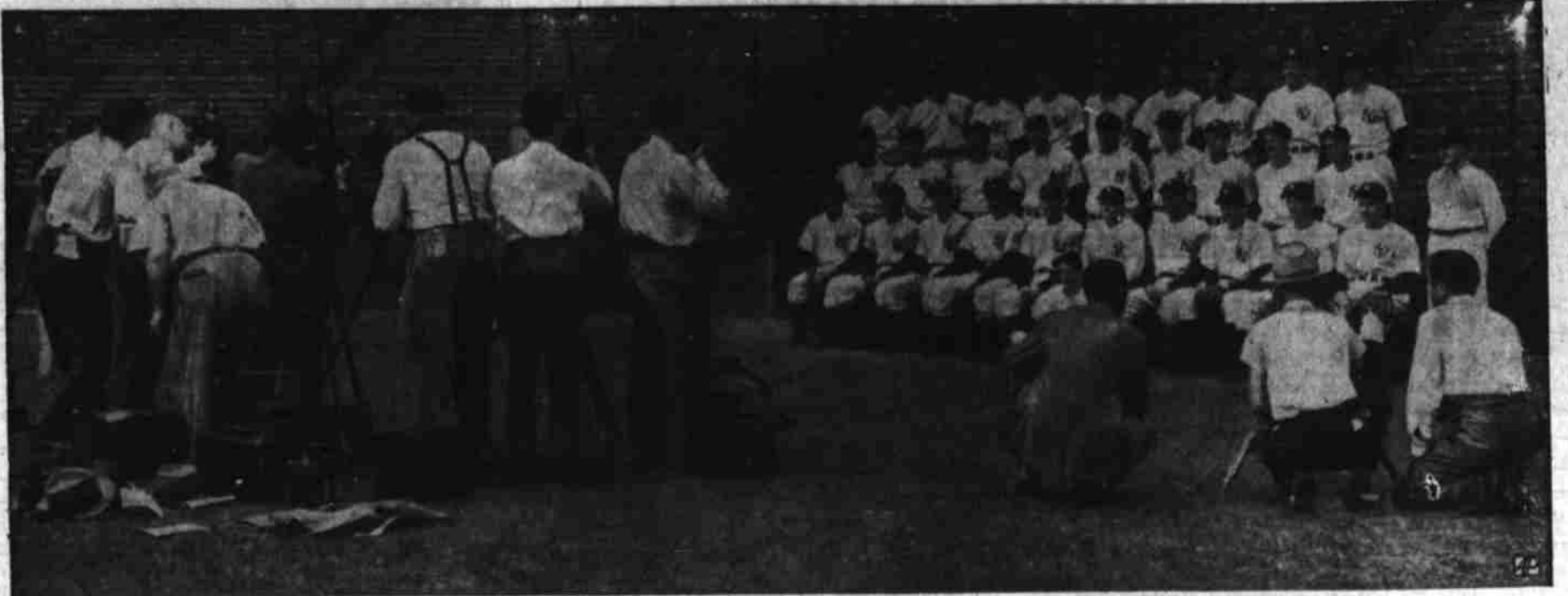

Britain Welcomes American Outposts

LONDON, Sept. 16 (AP)—The
broadening of American frontiers
beyond the coastal limits of the
United States, such as establish-
ment of the defensive outpost in
