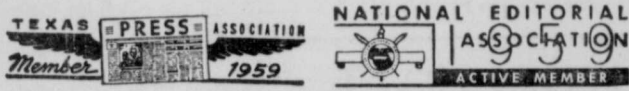

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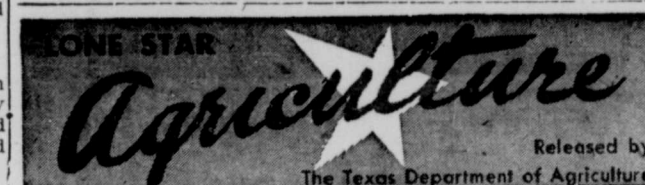

Chemical Warfare Against Slinkweeds on Texas Rangelands

The lowly turpentine weed, also known as perennial broomweed and by the Texas ranchers who despise it most as "slinkweed," faces possible conquest through the use of herbicides.

Tests during the past two years by West Texas rancher Robert K. Field of Bronco in which he aerially sprayed weed-infested pasture land at various periods of growth have proved that turpentine weed can be successfully subdued.

Turpentine weed infestation means compound trouble for ranchers. During a drought or when grass cover has been reduced by heavy grazing, the weed moves in on the bare spots. Besides crowding out grass and stealing a lion's share of early-season moisture, severely reduced grass cover, turpentine weed is a dietary hazard for cattle. Cows eating the weed in certain stages of its growth often lose their calves before or shortly after birth.

On Texas ranch land such as that of Fields which suffered the effects of the "50s" crippling drought, "slinkweed" moved in quickly on the barren land. Although under normal weather conditions and sound range management the grass would eventually crowd out the weeds, Field was not content to wait nature out.

After having tried other methods unsuccessfully, various mixtures of herbicides 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T were used at various stages of weed growth. It was discovered that aerial spraying in the spring just as plants reach the full leaf stage is apparently the time for maximum eradication. In Fields tests it took about two months for the

herbicide to take its full toll and completely kill an estimated 85-90 percent of plants sprayed.

After the weed competition was reduced, the grass made rapid growth and produced a good seed crop, growing at twice the rate of grass on untreated areas.

In treated areas where the turf was in good condition with clumps of grass less than a foot apart, there was little regrowth of the weed the following season.

However, where there were open spaces of three or four feet the weeds staged a comeback. If possible, it is recommended that grazing on treated areas be deferred during the following growing season in order that the turf will have a chance to recover and crowd out weeds that might otherwise grow back on bare spots.

The application most complained for current use in springtime rangeland spraying is 4 pound of 2,4-D in a gallon of fuel per acre. Estimated cost is about \$1 per acre. Most satisfactory results are expected when soil moisture is high and soil temperatures are cool 50-65 degrees at the time of spraying.

Use of chemical herbicides, with all their effectiveness, are capable of doing heavy crop damage if sprayed in the vicinity of susceptible plants such as cotton. The user should be fully familiar with their destructive properties and should at all times use extreme caution in their handling. In some Texas counties, use of herbicides is regulated by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Anyone planning to use herbicidal chemicals for weed control should first contact the nearest TRA office or their county agent for full information.

Questions and Answers

Q. The television station in my town, in cooperation with our local college, is telecasting a college course for which credit will be given by the college. I am eligible for War Orphans schooling. Could I take this telecasted course under the War Orphans Education Program?

A. No. The law does not authorize War Orphans trainees to take courses given over radio or television.

Q. I have a 10-percent service-connected disability for which I receive compensation from VA. I have recently married. Can I get extra compensation now that I am married, since my wife is a dependent?

A. No. The law does not authorize payments for dependents of veterans whose service-connected disabilities are found to be less than 50-percent in degree.

Q. I will be going back to school this fall, under the GI Bill. I want to change my course. Would I be eligible for VA vocational counseling to help me choose a new course better suited to my aptitudes. I have never changed courses.

A. Yes. In filling out your application for a change of course, indicate that you want vocational counseling. VA will schedule an appointment for you.

Q. I am considering paying my GI insurance premiums once a year in advance. What if my death were to occur shortly after making my yearly advance payment. Would the money not be used for premiums go to my beneficiaries?

A. Yes. VA would refund to your beneficiaries any money not applied to premium payments actually due.
