

"Cooler Weather, Cloud Coverage Factors..."

Water Situation Improves In City

In July, Colorado City residents were looking at the possibility of rationing water.

Now, however, the situation seems to be improving. And, it hasn't even rained.

According to City Manager James Campbell, water consumption is down considerably from July.

"Cooler weather and cloud coverage have been contributing factors," said Campbell. "It looks like we've made it for this year."

Campbell said that Lake Colorado City is presently at 2056.09 feet, which is only four inches less than it was on July 19.

Water usage in the Colorado City system hit an all time high July 14 when some 3.427 million gallons were consumed.

Three million gallons per day is the maximum the water plant is capable of producing Campbell said, and "we were working a little harder..."

Consumption figures for the month of August are not yet available, Campbell said, but usage is down over July.

"We've been real lucky this summer," said Campbell. "A lot of times when we have heavy consumption we have a major water break in the lines."

However, he explained, this summer there have

been no major water breaks, therefore large amounts of water have not been lost.

Several Texas cities and towns resorted to water rationing this summer because the weather was so dry.

"We've been fortunate because Texas Electric Service Company has been pumping out of Lake Champion to keep the level of Lake Colorado City up," explained Campbell. "They deserve all the credit for us not having to ration water."

According to a spokesperson for TESCO, if the plant was not able to pump out of Lake Champion "no one really knows where we would be—it would be drastically lower than it is now."

However, TESCO is pumping out of Lake Champion at the rate of 10,600 gallons per minute, or 600,000 gallons an hour.

"It takes three hours to pump what the city would use in a day," a TESCO spokesperson said.

What happens to the rest of the water?

Hot, dry winds in the summer causes large amount of water to evaporate, it was reported. In fact, more evaporates than what is used.

However, at the present rate, TESCO has the capacity to pump out of Lake Champion until January. During the winter months, the level of Lake Colorado City gains because the weather is cooler and not as much water is lost to evaporation.

Airport Meeting Friday

Persons interested in the Colorado City jetstrip airport (formerly Webb Air Force Auxiliary Airstrip) or the original airport (located north of Colorado City) are invited to an aviation meeting set for tomorrow (Friday).

According to Larry Winders, Chamber of Commerce manager, all pilots and interested persons are encouraged to attend the meeting.

Winders noted that possible expansion and renovations of the airport will be discussed at the meeting which will get underway at 7 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce office, located at the Colorado City Civic Center.

Lake Champion has been a life-saver this summer to keep up the water supply.

"If it wasn't for Lake Champion, we would be rationing water," a TESCO spokesperson said.

But with the heavy pumping out of Lake Champion, isn't there a possibility that the reservoir will run dry?

Although TESCO is pumping heavily out of Lake Champion to keep up the lake level at Lake Colorado City, the chance that Lake Champion may run dry is not really a concern.

Without any rainfall, TESCO has the capacity to

pump out of Lake Champion until January at the present rate of consumption.

But it's doubtful that the situation will become that dire, it was noted.

In 1971, Lake Colorado City was drastically low, it was reported by TESCO, and all the water that could have been pumped out of Lake Champion was pumped out. Thus, TESCO was considering alternate methods of obtaining water. One of the alternatives being considered was using irrigation water from the farmers. But, before extreme measures had to be taken, the rains came.

EMT Delivers Boone Baby

Monday night, Johnny Lindsey had an experience he doubts he'll ever forget.

Lindsey, who works in the administrative offices of Root Memorial Hospital, was on ambulance duty Monday when a call was received reporting a woman about to have a baby.

When the ambulance-driven by Weldon Hardegree—arrived at the home, Lindsey examined the woman to find that the baby was on the way.

"Just as we backed into the hospital ramp, the lady had the baby," said Lindsey. Nurses at the hospital took over after the baby was born.

"It's an experience that I'll never forget," said Lindsey.

After Lindsey returned to the hospital and was recovering from his unexpected ordeal, a member of the hospital staff informed that a second baby had been born—twins.

Ella Boone gave birth to twin boys, one weighing 3 pounds, 10 ounces and the other weighing 3 pounds, 1 1/2 ounces.

Lindsey said when he attended emergency medical technician classes, the students were instructed on emergency childbirth.

However, Lindsey said it was stressed in the course that it was not likely anyone would be delivering babies, at least not in Colorado City.

"The main point they wanted to get across was that you'll always be close enough to a hospital that you won't have to worry about delivering a baby," said Lindsey.

But, Lindsey said he couldn't take much credit for the delivery.

"The mother has the most to do with it, naturally," he noted, "but next time I think that I'll be a little more prepared."

Annual Farm Tour Slated For Sept. 7

The Annual Mitchell County Farm Tour will be Sept. 7, according to County Extension Agent Bob Benson.

Persons interested in attending the tour should meet at the Colorado City Civic Center at 8:30 a.m.

Sept. 7 to board the buses for the tour.

Coffee and donuts will be served at the Civic Center, hosted by the Chamber of Commerce, before the tour begins.

Benson noted that there will be no charge for the tour but those wishing to attend the noon lunch at the Civic Center should buy tickets for \$3.50 from the Chamber of Commerce.

Guest speaker at the luncheon will be Dr. Jarvis Miller, the new president of Texas A&M University. Dr. Miller has served as administrator with the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station since 1967 and was director since 1972.

About 225 people are expected to participate in the farm tour, which will take participants to see various crop demonstrations carried out this year, said Benson.

Sponsor of the farm tour is the Mitchell County Rural Development Committee, composed of Benson; Don Stewart, Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service executive director; Van Mills, district director of the Soil Conservation Service; David Marion,

1,939 Students In County Schools

School is now in session across the county with 1,939 students registered in Colorado City, Loraine and Westbrook Schools.

Colorado City students began class Tuesday with 1,425 attending the first day as compared to 1,491 last year.

"We figure we'll meet the same number as last year by next week," said Colorado City Superintendent of Schools Charlie Uselton.

At Kelley Elementary, enrollment was down the first day this year with 361 attending in comparison to 377 last year.

The kindergarten class was smaller than expected with 92 students attend-

ing. Last week, it appeared that an additional kindergarten class would have to be formed to accommodate the expected number of kindergarten students. Since the number of first-time students was smaller than anticipated, another class will not have to be formed.

However, 138 first graders turned out Tuesday, which is 16 more than was expected. Thus, another first grade class may have to be added, said Uselton.

For the first day of school, there were 131 second grade students at Kelley, about the number that was expected.

Hutchinson Elementary School was the only school in the Colorado City system which had more students this year than last for the first day. This year, 312 were present the first day while there were 107 last year.

In the third grade, there were 188 students Tuesday. There were 104 fourth graders and 90 in the fifth grade.

At Middle School, there were 325 present this year for the first day in comparison to 353 last year. Sixth graders number

109 this year and there are 97 in the seventh grade. There are 119 eighth graders.

Colorado High School had 427 students this year for the first day of class. Last year, there were 454.

The freshman class has 109 members. There are 107 sophomores, 105 juniors and 106 seniors.

Uselton noted that each of the four schools will probably increase enrollment within a week.

Loraine Superintendent of Schools L. R. Dunn reported that "we had a very smooth opening of school."

Loraine students began classes Monday with a total of 346 enrolled. There are 176 enrolled in kindergarten through sixth grade and 170 in seventh through 12th grades.

Last year, Loraine had about 320 the first day of school.

Dunn noted that there should be about 360 students attending Loraine by next week.

Working on the second week of school, Westbrook has tallied an enrollment of 168 students in grades kindergarten through 12th grade.

High School Principal Jerry Reynolds advises that Section B has almost been completely sold but many seats are left for Section A.

Also during Pigskin Preview, memberships for the Wolves Booster Club went on sale. Cost is \$5 per person or \$7.50 for a couple.

The Booster Club plans to hold meetings each Tuesday night.

Reynolds had praise for the Wolves, telling the almost full West Side of the Stadium crowd that they should be proud of these young men for their behavior under trying circumstances during the scrimmage against Freshmen last Friday.

During the scrimmage, there was what seemed like to Colorado City fans, a great deal of unorthodox play like conduct on the part of the Freshmen team. Time after time, flags were thrown for spearing, diving into a player head first after the play was over. According to one count, Freshmen was flagged 17 times for spearing and other infractions.

Then as Wolves Center Mike Womack lay on the ground injured, Freshmen players cheered.

Despite all this, Wolves coaches and players kept control of the situation. I believe that's what you call discipline and character. That's what it takes to be a winner and our coaches and players are winners both on, and off, the field.

Pensions Affect Social Security Benefits

A social security benefit paid to the spouse of a worker who retires, becomes disabled or dies will be stopped or reduced if the spouse also gets a pension from his or her own public employment not covered by social security. Don Minyard, manager of the local social security branch office announced.

The change in law took effect for husbands and widows applying for spouses' benefits beginning in December 1977, but wives and widows were given a 5-year grace period until December 1982. As a result, women who become eligible for a public employee pension from their own work in non-covered employment, such as the federal civil service, before that date will not have a social security spouse's benefit offset.

Both husbands and

wives who were receiving spouses' benefits before December 1977 are not affected by the change. Also, a worker who is eligible both for a social security benefit based on his own work record and is eligible for a government pension will continue to be eligible for both payments with no offset.

Under prior law, wives and widows did not need to prove dependency on their husbands in order to receive spouses' benefits, but husbands and widows had to prove dependency on their wives.

The supreme court struck down this distinction as unconstitutional in

March 1977, thus requiring that the social security administration pay benefits both to wives and

husbands of workers with-out regard to whether the spouse was dependent on the worker.

Resident Approaches 75th Year Of Calling Mitchell County "Home"

From her vantage point of 95 years, there is not much of Mitchell County history Mrs. Ila Loveless has not seen, first hand at that!

She was a young mother when she arrived here with her husband in 1904 from Erath County, following her parents, Jessie and Dora (Price) Northcutt (who arrived a year ear-

lier) to the community where she eventually raised her family, practiced nursing for 30 years and carved a niche with the pioneer families of Mitchell County.

Being farmers and all, there is probably not any quirk in our West Texas weather that Mrs. Loveless has not learned to cope with. Perhaps her still slim and small stature has

something to do with the twister in 1907 which scared her out of "10 years growth" but anyway she looks 95 going on 62. Her daughter brags that her father could span her mother's waist with his hands when she was younger and she has kept a youthful figure over the years. "Good, clean living" got her to 95, though, she says.

In all of those years, the most outstanding event was the birth of her twins, Hap and Jit Loveless, both of whom still live in Colorado City. This is not to say that the births of her other two children were any less special but to the young pioneer mother, delivering her babies at home, a multiple birth proved to be quite a memorable job.

Mrs. Loveless, as mentioned before studied nursing for 3 years and worked as a nurse in hospitals and privately for 30 years. She had been drafted in World War I to serve as a nurse although she would have had to leave her children for awhile. As luck would have it, the war ended that day!

Mrs. Loveless and her late husband were members of the Plainview Baptist Church for many years. Their oldest son, Frank, who now lives in Coahoma, attended Jim Hood School at Plainview and the other children attended local schools.

Jessie (Jit) and Albert (Hap) Loveless and Gladys Loveless Meskimen make up the rest of her immediate family but she has 5 grandchildren, 14 great grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

"I also have a sister who is older than I am," Mrs. Loveless added. She is Mrs. Emma Humphreys, 97, who formerly resided in Colorado City with her late husband, John. She moved to Rule in 1967.

When Mrs. Loveless was growing up in Texas, she attended rural schools, sometimes walking 3 miles to and from school and sometimes riding horseback or mule-back, as the case may be. Sometimes she would ride her

brother's little Spanish pony, and in spite of the fact that it sometimes threw its rider over its head, Mrs. Loveless recalled that it was "such fun."

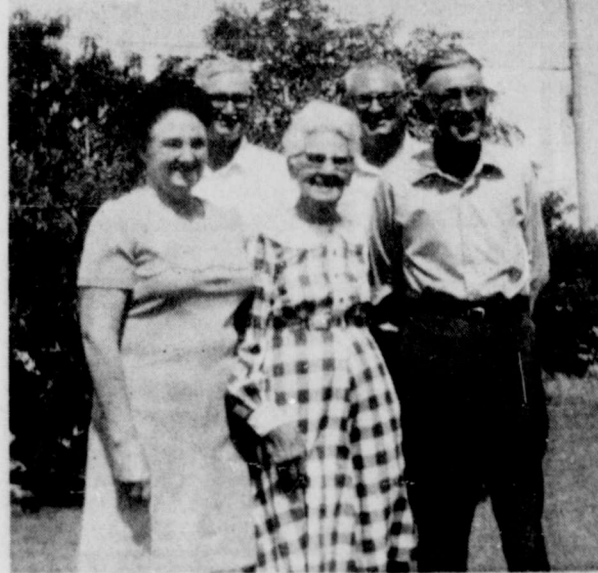
"To me, school was the most wonderful thing that ever happened," she said. Socially they had a society and literary at school on Friday nights to which everyone went. "We said a speech and we thought we were pretty good," she remembered.

Church going was also an important social event for the farm families during those early pioneer days. Mrs. Loveless was raised in the Baptist Church. Her grandfather, who lived with her family for many years, was a strict Baptist minister who didn't put up with nonsense like cards, dominoes, dancing and secular books.

Lots of things have changed since those days. Prices among other items: Mrs. Loveless once paid 3c a yard for a lawn dress! "I know I've lived along with it," Mrs. Loveless said, "but the changes in the county have been so gradual." She stated that the development of the farms has been the most dramatic change in Mitchell County during those 74 years of residency. Mrs. Loveless and her husband farmed in the area until 1965.

From talking to Mrs. Loveless, I would say that her enjoyment in life comes from helping others. Although her activities are limited, she crochets beautiful afghans to give away and even makes up some of her own patterns. "I wouldn't call it a hobby," Mrs. Loveless said of her favorite pastime. After all it's still work.

"The most important thing she has learned in 95 years is 'to keep my mouth shut,'" she chuckled. Her most memorable person? "I think my brother did alot to inspire me because he studied alot and knew alot." She added, "He pulled himself up by the bootstraps," she paused, "but then we all did back then." Quite a tribute to the courageous newcomers to West Texas at the turn of the century.

Chamber Of Commerce

Questions can surprise, and they can cause you to think...after the answer is given.

The question came during a conversation here in town the other day. It was, "How can you be so enthusiastic and optimistic when everything seems to be going wrong, including the weather?"

My answer was, "I have faith."

Perhaps to some, that simple answer is enough, but there is more to be said. Faith alone will not make things happen. To stand with arms outstretched shouting, "give me faith" will do little except exercise the lungs. If, however there is a renewal of faith in self, a determination that problems can be solved, that opportunity exists in the very fact that there is a problem, that optimism will return.

Someone once said that nations survive to the degree that they meet the challenges that face them. So it is with cities and people.

This country has become strong because it has people that are determined to overcome crisis. It has an economic system that is second to none. Our forefathers built this nation on faith-and that faith shall prevail.

Come to think of it...I gave a pretty good answer. Webster defines profit as "Gain, a valuable return; to derive benefit: to

be of service to benefit: the excess of returns over expenditures in a transaction or a series of transactions, (Specifically) the excess of the selling price of goods over their cost."

Therefore, anyone who works or renders a service in return for benefit (money or goods) is in the profit area of business. Workers are profit oriented. If you doubt this, see if you can get anyone to work for nothing!

Yet most of the persons engaged in this area of business take issue with the employed for making a profit. There are two questions involved here. Why expect a business to pay you a profit and not care if they make one for themselves? Without a profit there is no way that anyone can make a living. Secondly, the worker has only his time and skills to sell for a profit. Business must provide the location (buildings), the machinery, the utilities, the raw materials to convert into a finished product.

So we see that two groups are concerned. One with no investment involved and the other with all of the investment necessary to run the enterprise, both hoping to realize a profit from their efforts. And, this is the way it must work. Without a profit business cannot pay employees, and without a profit (wages or salaries) employees cannot afford to work.

The profit motive is ingrained in all of us from the day we are born. Yet, the current trend is to abuse any firm or business that operates efficiently enough to produce a profit. The hue and cry today is for the government to regulate and run business.

A surprising number of people today think that business makes as much as 28 per cent profit when in reality, it makes about five per cent. Even an individual realizes more than that from a pass book savings account. The Postal Delivery Service is a good example of a government run industry. Prices keep going up with no increase in service and larger deficits each year...to be paid by us tax payers.

Of every dollar spent by major production corporations, 31c goes to wages, salaries and fringe benefits. This leaves 69c for all of the other things required to make a business function, including five per cent for profit. Do you suppose that anyone who works for wages would be satisfied to accept those conditions applied to his income?

Progress depends on production and profits. Take Robinson Crusoe on his desert island as an example. No money, no buying, no selling, just natural resources and one man working for survival. For awhile, perfect balance: if he stopped fishing

he would die. But once he caught some extra fish (a profit) he could risk taking some time to make a net. He "invested" his profit in more productive fishing equipment. That gained him time to make other tools to use in building his whole comfortable little one-man economic system. Productive effort makes profits and profits make progress.

While there may be arguments as to whether the profit system is the best-we think it is. If you don't think so, compare any other nation and their progress in the last two hundred years with the progress in the United States. And while you're comparing, don't forget that we started with nothing. We've come a long way, baby. We all profit from profits.

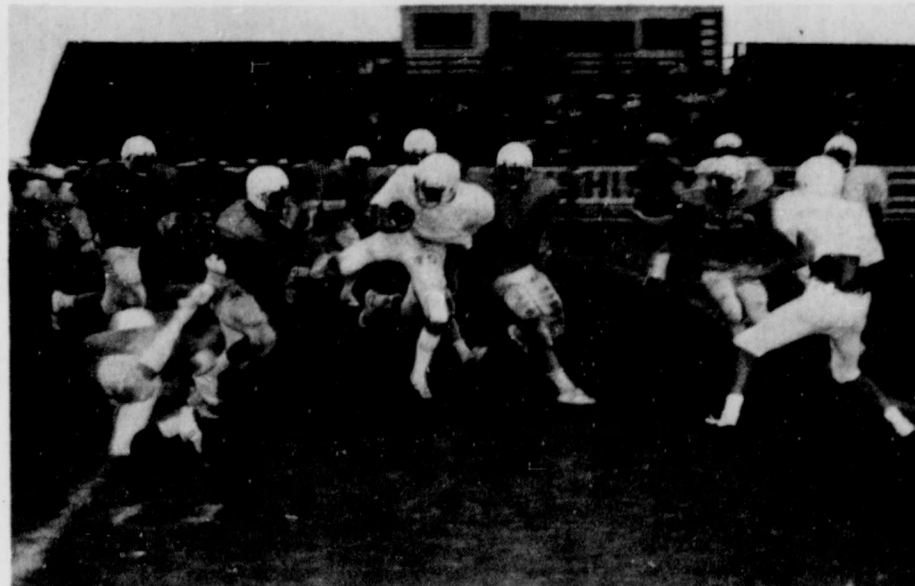
Blow Out Causes Accident

Bell Telephone Increases Charges

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has been granted an increase which will affect the charge of customer moves, connections and changes in service.

However, the increase will not affect basic residential and basic business service rates.

There will also be no increases in long distance rates, directory assistance charges, pay telephones or WATS service.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company filed the tariff in compliance with the Public Utility Commission's final order issued Aug. 2 granting a \$124.5 million increase. The phone company had requested a \$214.3 million hike.

A new alternative rate system, referred to as Residential Measured Rate Service, will be offered in

portions of 15 exchanges on an optional basis and will be available within six months.

Priced between 60 and 70 per cent of single party flat rate in each exchange, the service will offer 25 free calls and a charge of 8c per call for each call over the minimum.

The new service will not be available in Colorado City but will be offered in portions of the following exchanges: Austin Metro exchange, Amarillo, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas Metro, Fort Worth Metro, Galveston, Harlingen, Houston Metro, Lubbock, Midland, San Antonio, San Benito, Tyler and Wichita Falls.

New rates became effective Aug. 14 and any changes in billing will be reflected in customers' bills dated Aug. 15 and mailed Aug. 22.

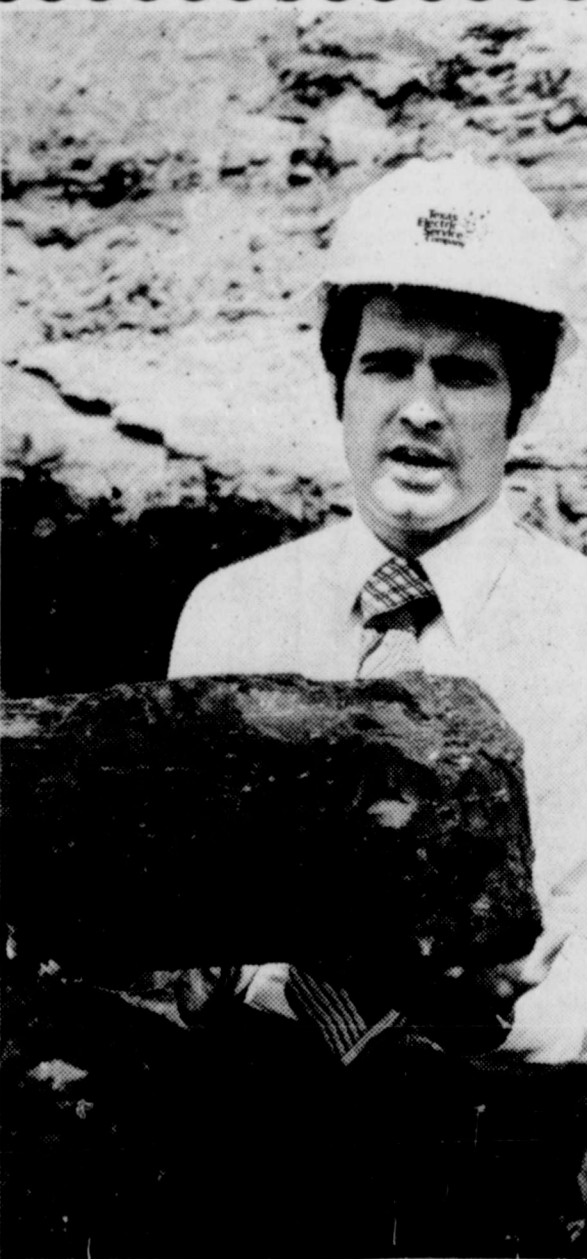

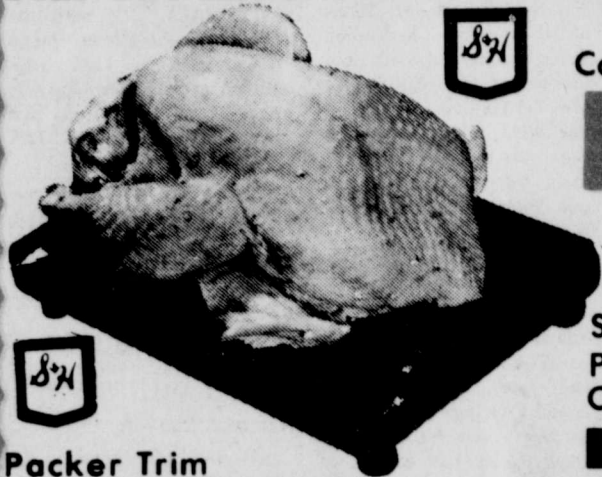

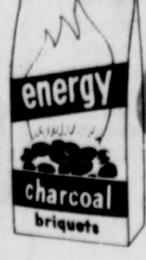
