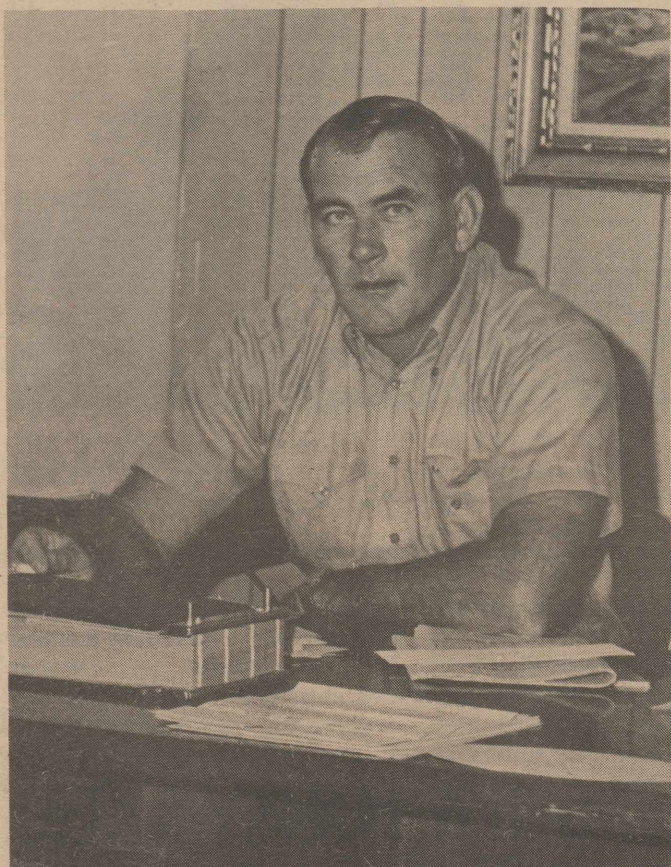

Hi-Plains Insurance Seeks To Serve Area Clients

Hi-Plains Insurance Company hasn't been requested to insure such glamorous objects as Lloyd's of London, the firm that indemnified the late Betty Grable's legs, the voice of the late Enrico Caruso and presently protects Liberace's talented fingers.

Glamour may be missing from the properties insured by the local company but there is no lack of appreciation and concern for their clientele.

New to the insurance business this year, Charles Black is eager to assist the company's clients in any way and "will find the answers" if he doesn't know them yet. A veteran "oilman" with 20 years experience, Black operated Hart Oil and Butane before entering the insurance field in May.

Hi-Plains Insurance was founded a year ago in September when W. B. "Dub" Holley, Clinton Billingsley and Gene Trotter purchased three-quarters interest in Clevenger Insurance Company. Wister Clevenger had shared ownership of the company with Harry and C. W. Reeves of Tulia.

In October, 1972, the firm bought Wozencraft Insurance Agency. Hi-Plains moved to the Wozencraft location on Broadway.

"Parent company" of the firm was Farmers Insurance Agency which was founded in 1955 by Joe Newman. In 1959, Newman and Norlan Dudley opened an agency at the present location, operating as an American Independent Agency and representing national stock companies. Wozencraft purchased the company from Newman in 1970.

Clevenger and the two Reeveses began their firm in January 1965.

Wanda Marble, secretary for Hi-Plains, began working as a secretary for a Lockney insurance firm in 1958. She and her farmer husband, Max, moved to Hart in 1969 and Wanda began working in insurance again in March, 1970. She received her solicitor's license in 1970.

Both Charles and his wife, Wanda, have recording agent's licenses which enables them to write fire and casualty policies. Through broker agreements they may secure hospitalization and life insurance for their clients.

Hi-Plains represents eight major insurance companies plus specialties companies.

Longhorns Pull Stinger From Swarm Of Hornets

Hart Longhorns scored 20 points in the second quarter Friday, to take a come from behind win over Sudan. The Hornets led 14-6 in the first quarter, but fine running by Jimmy Brown, Barry George, James McLain and others helped pace the Horns to a 32-14 victory.

Brown scored three touchdowns for Hart. Barry George scored twice on passes from James McLain. Hart finished with 437 yards total offense while Sudan managed 206. Danny Williams and Mitch Chester each scored once for Sudan.

The "Maroon Gang" received the opening kickoff and took the ball on their own 35. Five plays later, Hart fumbled and Sudan recovered at the Horns' 46.

Horn's defense proved too much for the Hornets and Sudan punted. Hart took the

ball on their own 10 and four plays later, Brown left the Hornets behind as he raced 79 yards to paydirt. Try for extras failed and with 7:19 left in the first period, the Horns led 6-0.

Following the kickoff, the Hornets got the ball on their own 31. Sudan drove to the 42 and scored when Mitch Chester threw a screen pass to halfback Danny Williams who raced in for the TD. Donald Johnson took a pitchout from Chester, and threw for two points to halfback Mark Hanna with 5:02 left, in the first, making the score 8-6, Sudan.

The Horns got the ball on their 35 and McLain threw to George who caught the pass at Sudan's 30 yard line. The Horns could get no further and McLain punted to the Sudan four. The Hart defense settled down and stopped the Hornets at their 49 and the ball went over to the Horns.

On third down, McLain threw to George, but the pass was picked off by Hanna who returned the interception back to the Hart 13 yard line.

Sudan finished the drive in the second period with Chester scoring from one yard out. Extras failed. With 11:04 left in the half, Sudan led 14-6.

On the kick, the Horns took possession on their 44 and drove 56 yards for the score behind the running of Brown and Gilbert Rodriguez. Brown raced the final 30 yards for the Horns' second score. The extras failed and Hart trailed 14-12.

Sudan drove from their own 38, to the Longhorn 34 where, on fourth down, the "Maroon Gang" held. Taking possession and three plays later, McLain threw to George for a 65 yard touchdown. Extras failed and with 1:44 left in the half, it was Hart, 18, Sudan, 14.

Richard Tamplin returned the kickoff from the 20 to Sudan's 36. Three plays later, Chester stepped back and threw a pass intercepted by Terry Hill and returned to the Sudan 33.

McLain ran 14 yards on second down and grabbed a first on the Sudan 15. From there, McLain threw to George for six points with four seconds left in the half. Brown raced for the extras and the score was 26-14, Hart.

Third quarter was scoreless as both teams fought for every yard they could grab. Defense rose to all occasions to stop the offensive drives. Sudan made the longest drive of the third period as they marched from their 20 to the Hart 45 where they were forced to punt after Donald Johnson fumbled on third down but managed to recover.

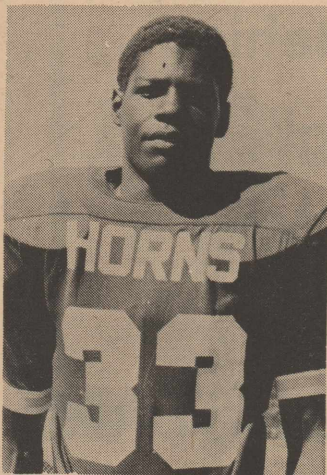
The Horns got the ball on their own 15 and marched 85 yards for their last score, behind the running of Brown, McLain and George. Brown finished the drive with 9:19 remaining in the last quarter, racing to paydirt from the six yard line. Extras failed but the Horns iced the victory, 32-14.

Sudan punted to Hart when they could not sustain a drive and the Horns, with the aid of a pass interference call, marched to the Sudan 29. The Hornets held and the ball went over on downs. Chester tried to go to the air but one of his passes was deflected by Horn defenders. Danny Carson grabbed the ball for the Horns at the Sudan 35. From there, the Horns moved to the Sudan 27 where a fumble was recovered by the Hornets.

Sudan drove to the Hart 30, behind the running of Chester, Hanna and Hedges. A fumble ended the drive with Carson covering the loose ball. The game ended with Hart in possession and a final score, Hart-32; Sudan-14.

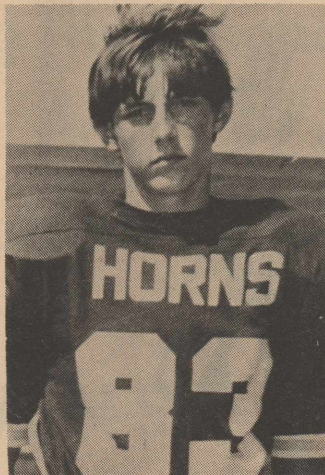
The Horns will host Farwell Friday. Kickoff time is 8 p.m.

1 lb. vanilla wafers

Beat eggs; add sugar, butter, pineapple and pecans.

Crush wafers and line bottom of pyrex with half the wafers. Pour pineapple mixture over the wafers, cover with rest of wafers. Refrigerate over night. Serve with whipped cream.

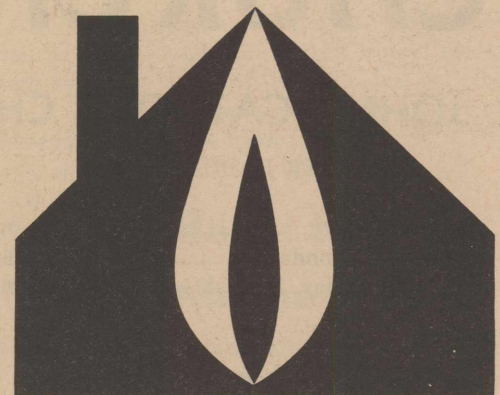
