During the past few years, and especially since there is quite a bit of irrigation in our community, we have heard it said often: "I wish there was some way the farmers in this area could raise some crops in addition to cotton and maize that would make them money."

We have not only heard that wish but we have heard some advance ideas that if followed through might be what the area needs to raise the dollar value of crops and hence the standard of living for farmers as well as townspeople who depend upon farm income for their livelihood.

Such an idea was advanced this week by R. H. Phillips who brought us five of the nicest onions we have ever seen. The five weighed 3 pounds. Mr. Phillips said he raises onions like that every year so he knows the land here will grow them. Mr. Phillips says he believes an acre of onions would bring the farmer \$500.

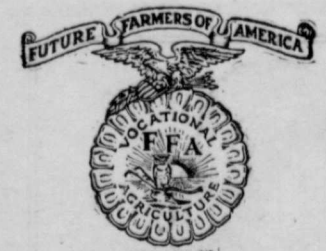
Of course Mr. Phillips was just guessing when he quoted the \$500 an acre figure, but I have been told it is entirely possible. I know that cotton won't bring anything near \$500 an acre here.

I have been told that raising cotton is not nearly so big a risk as onions, potatoes, beans, peas, or any other vegetable crop. I don't know about that but I will say that it is somewhat risky to raise cotton. For instance, a sandstorm can wipe out a cotton crop in just a few minutes—so can hail. And it could do it more than one time during a year. Every crop planted involves some risk no matter what it is. So it would be reasonable to suppose that farmers would be willing to try something new once in a while if that something new holds out promise of being better than what he is doing.

I am sure that we all hear "trade at home" until we sometimes wonder why some good reason is not advanced occasionally as to why we should trade at home. Usually the business man who does more "hollering" about people trading out of town is as guilty as the next fellow.

People this day and time are educated through advertising in various forms to want a certain brand of merchandise. So the remedy for the home town merchant who would like to get his share of business should tell the people and prove to them that his merchandise is what they need and want. He can do it as well or better than the merchant in the away place—and at a much less cost.

Wheat Harvest Half Completed Crop Running Behind Last Year

Woodrow Pratt, grain buyer, says he believes the peak of the wheat harvest was reached last week.

Up to now the wheat crop is not coming up to that of last year. The acreage planted to wheat was not as great this year as last and the dry weather in the winter and spring caused some acreage to be abandoned. Up to now Coon and Pratt have shipped out approximately four carloads of wheat whereas at the same time last year eight cars had been shipped.

Charles Finley averaged 35 bushels to the acre on irrigated wheat this year, according to Pratt. Wheat on the average is better than quality this year, Pratt says.

July 1 Deadline For Wheat Allotment

The ASC county office is accepting wheat allotment applications for certain farms. A producer who intends to seed wheat for 1960 on a farm on which no wheat was seeded for harvest as grain in 1957 and for which a 1958 and 1959 allotment was not established, irrespective of whether or not wheat was seeded for harvest as grain in either 1958 or 1959, and who desires to be considered for an allotment must make application for an allotment according to W. R. McGuire, Chairman of the ASC Committee. Application forms are available in the ASC county office for use in filing a request for an allotment. The producer must apply in writing by July 1.

Fertilizer Use Important To Crops

College Station.—Determining your fertilizer needs will probably make the difference in whether your crop will show a profit or loss money, says William F. Bennett, extension soil chemist.

Several methods can be used to determine the fertilizer needs of the soil for a given crop. They are soil tests, plant tissue tests, field trials and deficiency symptoms. The ideal way is to use all of these methods together in determining fertilizer needs, said Bennett.

A soil test is the cheapest, most convenient way to determine fertility needs. It is also the most accurate way with the exception of extensive field trials. By determining nutrients needed and the proper ratio, soil tests can be used to determine how to make the most profit from money invested in fertilizers. Before taking samples of your soil, contact your county agent for information on how to take samples.

Plant analysis can be used to supplement soil analysis as a basis for fertilizer recommendations, he said. At the present time, plant analysis testing is still in the experimental stage.

Field trials are the final test in determining the value of the grade and amount of fertilizer used. Unfertilized strips of four to six rows or 20 feet in width should be left across the field. Double the normal rate being used or decrease it by half the normal rate on several rows to see if a different rate would be more profitable. These strips will indicate whether the fertilizer is being used properly.

Deficiency symptoms often help diagnose a situation and aid in determining fertility needs. Deficiency symptoms often are similar to the effects of a lack of moisture on plant growth, he added.

The 17-year-old soldier attended Loraine High School.

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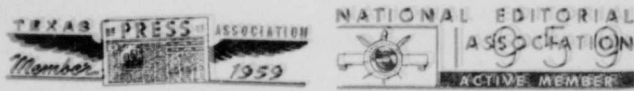

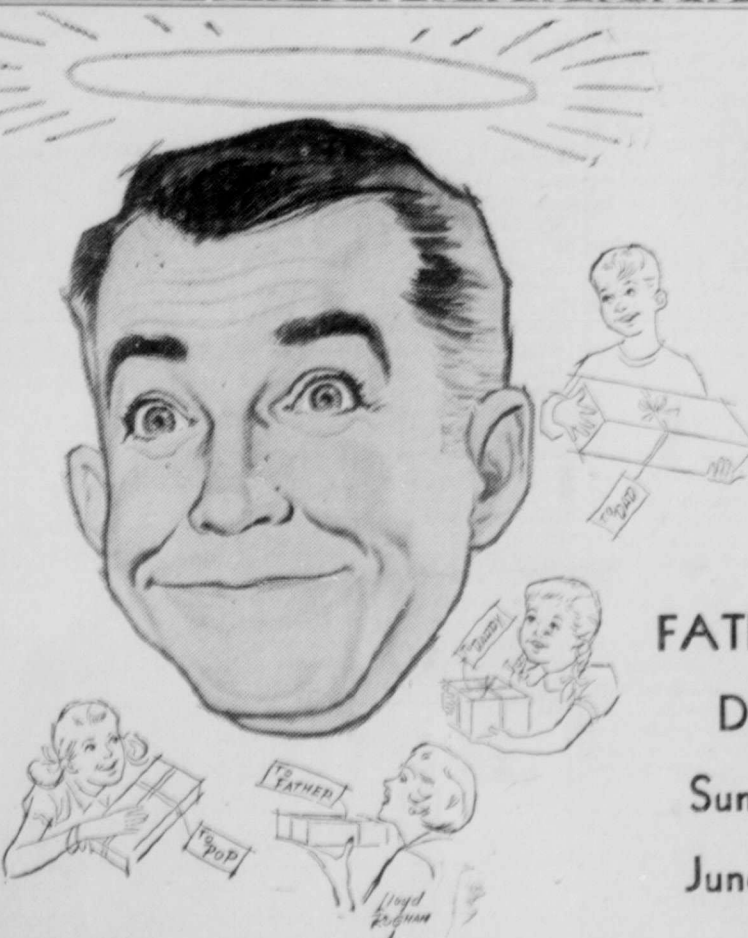

Questions and Answers

Q. My wife and I are both veterans, eligible for GI loans. If we go in together on a real estate loan for business purposes, would the amount of VA's guarantee be doubled?

A. Yes. On a real-estate loan for a business, the maximum VA guarantee for an individual veteran is \$4,000; so you and your wife could get an \$8,000 maximum guarantee. However, VA's guarantee may not exceed 50-percent of the total loan.

Q. I want to take a college course under the War Orphans Education Act, but cannot complete it by age 23 since I did not even become eligible until I was 21, when my father died. May schooling continue beyond age 23 in my case?

A. Yes. In cases where the veteran-parent dies after a son or daughter is 18 but not yet 23, the eligible orphan has until five years after the death of the parent to complete school. In no case may schooling extend beyond the 31st birthday.

Q. Can the proceeds of a GI insurance policy paid to a beneficiary be attached by creditors?

A. No. Such proceeds are exempted by law from the claims of creditors. They may not be seized or attached to pay debts.

Q. I'm a Korea veteran, with an "RS" type GI term insurance policy, which I am going to convert to one of VA's permanent plans. Can I borrow against my permanent plan insurance as soon as it is issued?

A. No. You must hold your new permanent plan insurance one year before you have the right to borrow on it.
