Mills County Club Members Sell Commercial Lambs At Fort Worth

Forty-three Mills County FFA and 4-H Club members sold 560 commercial lambs in Fort Worth last week Monday to complete their commercial lamb feeding program for the past year.

The lambs were graded here on Saturday before being shipped to market. Thad Boswell of Cassidy Commission Company graded the lambs, according to announcement by Thurman Head, Vocational Agriculture teacher and FFA advisor for Goldthwaite School.

Of the 560 lambs, 379 received blue ribbon, 83 red ribbon and 98 white ribbons.

Blue ribbon lambs sold for \$17.00 to \$17.50 per cwt.; red ribbon lambs brought \$15.00 to \$16.00 per cwt., and white ribbon lambs sold mostly for \$15.00, while a few brought only \$13.00 per cwt.

Mullin Elects City Officials Next Tuesday

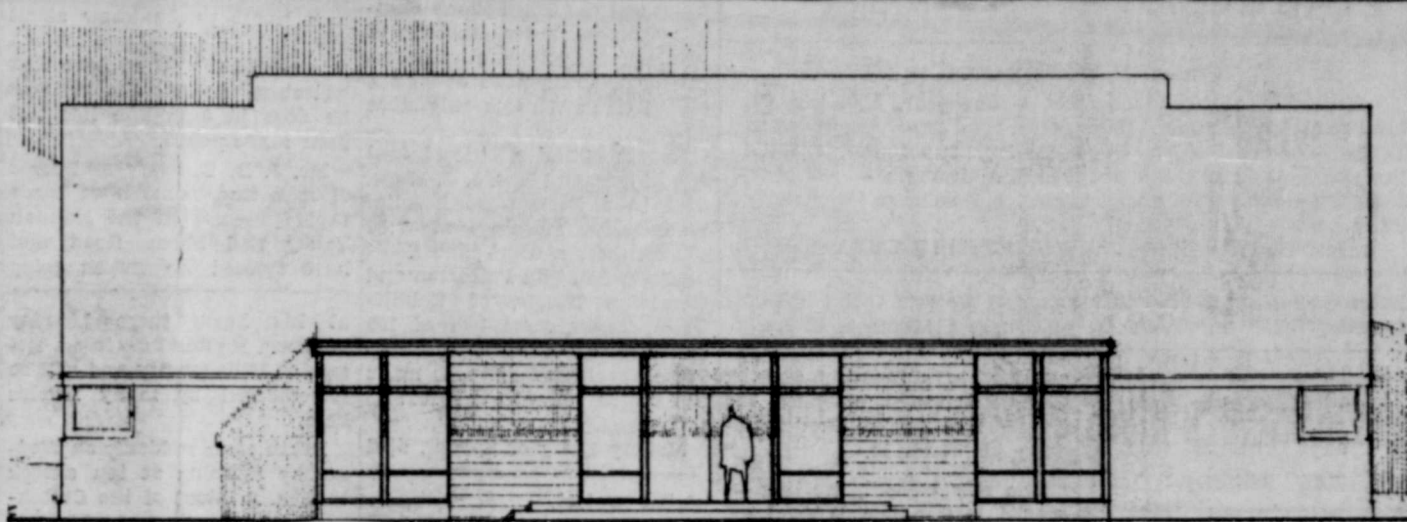
Voters in the City of Mullin will name a slate of city officials in the regular city election to be held next Tuesday, April 2. The election will be held in the GI building.

Officials to be named include: Mayor, five aldermen, city marshal and tax assessor-collector. G. C. Henry is the lone candidate for mayor. He has served in that capacity the past two years.

Six candidates are on the official ballot for aldermen. They are: Herman Locke, Audrey Keating, J. E. Phillips, John Plummer, Carl Hohertz and C. E. Ferguson.

There are no candidates on the ballot for the office of City Marshal and that of tax assessor-collector. Write-in votes are expected to name these two officials.

All officials will be elected for a two year term.

The board of trustees of Goldthwaite Independent School District has ordered an election to be held on Saturday, April 6, to approve \$93,000.00 bond issue to finance proposed school improvements to meet requirements recommended by the Texas Education Agency and approved by the State Board of Education. Election was called by the school board after it had received a petition signed by 107 residents of the district requesting the board to call the bond election.

In addition to the gym the improvements call for new vocational agriculture building, new band hall and new physical education building for the elementary school.

FM 573 Contract Is Awarded To San Marcos Firm

A contract for 5.8 miles of construction on FM 573 in Mills County has been awarded to a San Marcos firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

M. E. Ruby and Acme Bridge Inc. submitted the low bid of \$108,159 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from 4.7 miles southwest of Mullin, southwest to FM 574 at Ridge is expected to take 100 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard, District Highway Engineer at Brownwood. Glenn G. Trotter, Resident Engineer at Comanche will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

The petition is now being circulated and if it is filed within the prescribed time and with the proper number of signatures an election will be called on the wet-dry issue in the precinct.

Justice precinct three includes all of county commissioner's precinct three, the Mullin area, with the exception of justice precinct six, Priddy, which is already wet.

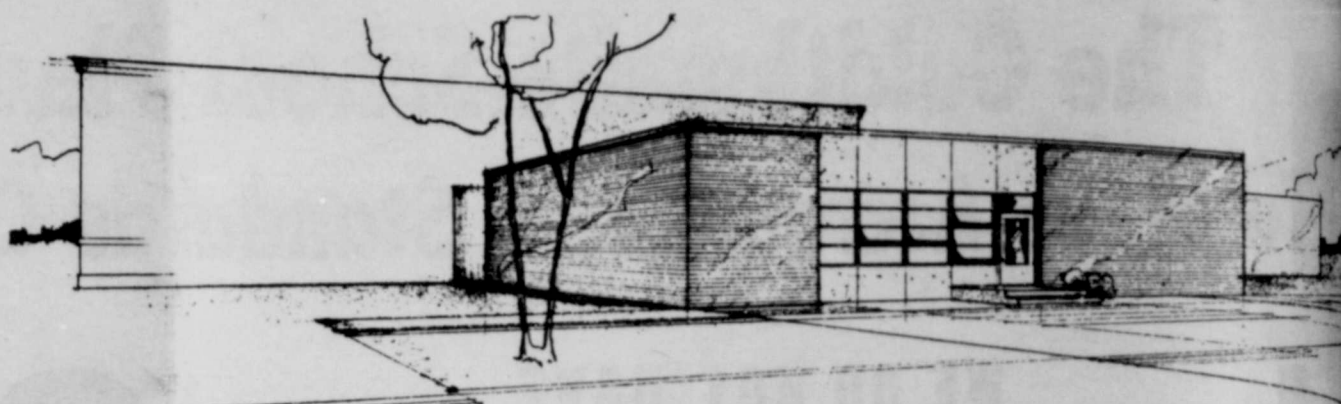

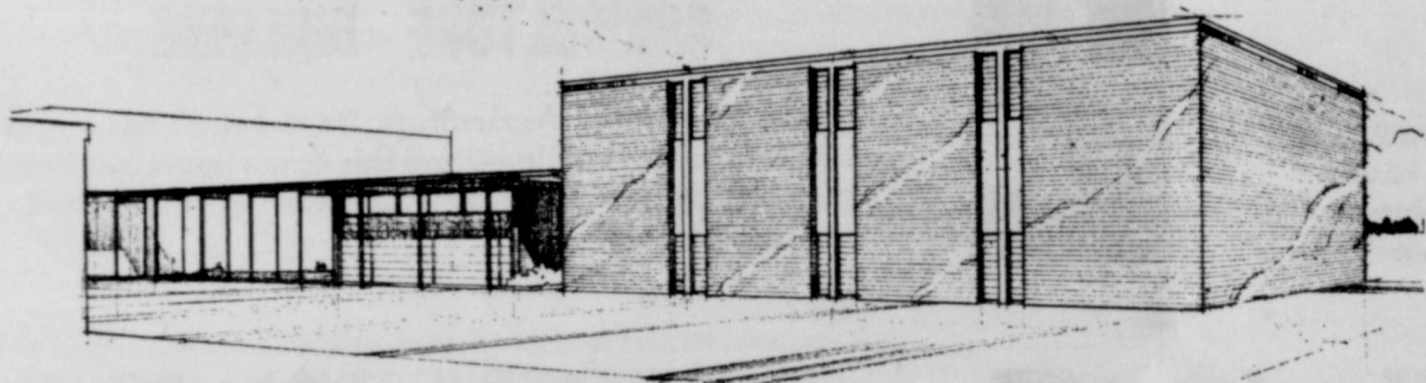

NEW PE BUILDING FOR ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

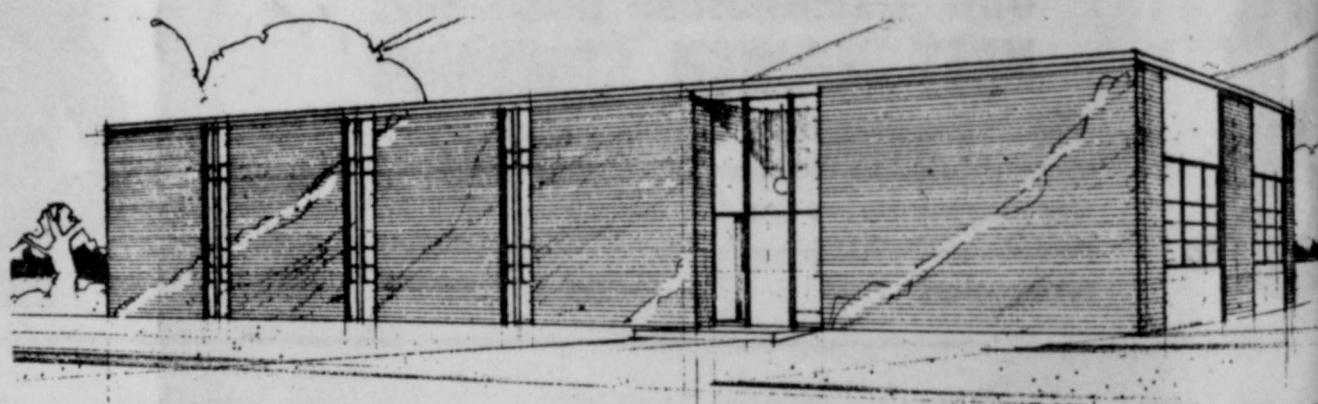

NEW VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE BUILDING

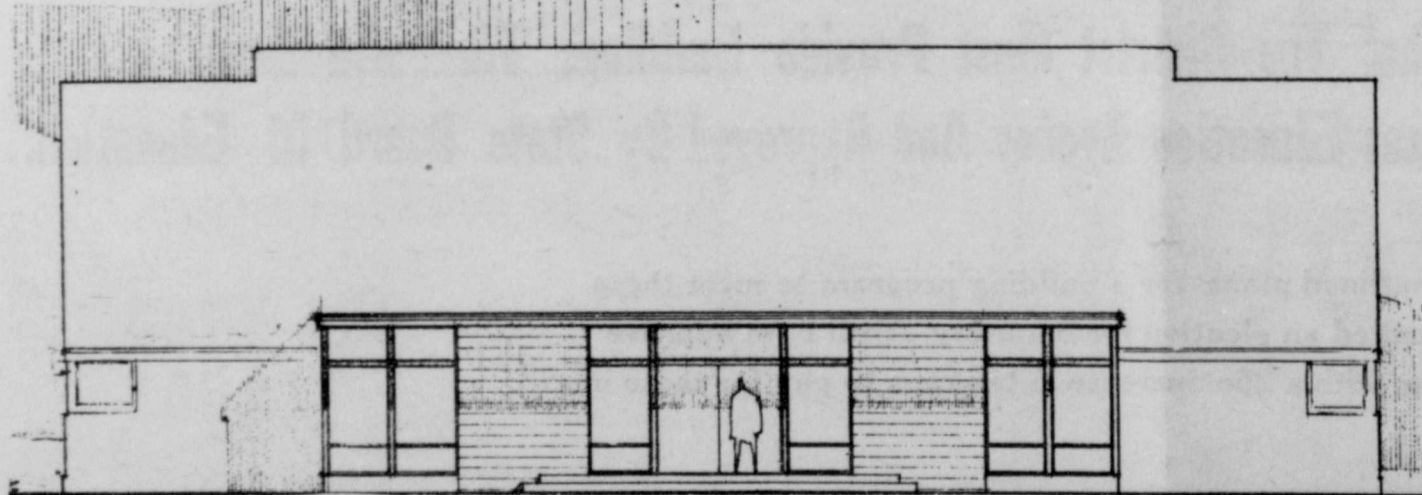

Present tax rate is \$1.50 per \$100 valuation — with \$1.10 going for maintenance and operation and 40c going to retire bonded indebtedness. The 25c increase would be divided with 15c for bonded indebtedness and 10c for maintenance and operation. So, the new rate of \$1.75 would provide \$1.20 for maintenance and operation and 55c for bonds and interest.

Screwworm Fly News In Brief

Mills County stock raisers are nearing their goal in the screwworm eradication fund drive with only \$424.43 still needed. It was announced Tuesday by officials.

Progress report from the program's headquarters released last Friday pointed out the following:

Sterile fly release totaled 93,269,050 for the week of March 10-16.

Fifteen screwworm cases were detected in Texas last week. Non-screwworms totaled 45 with 42 in Texas, 2 in New Mexico and one in Mexico.

There were four screwworm cases reported without samples. It is time to spray, say eradication officials.

Don't report screwworms by telephone before a sample is collected.

Eradication officials note that the time of year has arrived when many of the routine animal husbandry activities that produce wounds are being performed. Calving, shearing, farrowing, dehorning and castrating are everyday activities and the screwworm generally thrives as wounds, cuts and scratches abound. Treatment of wounds is a must if screwworms are to be prevented from popping out all over the state. Officials advocate that all livestock be sprayed every two to three weeks, or at least whenever they are worked. Either 0.25 per cent Co-ral or 0.5 per cent ronnel (Korlan) is recommended.

If care is not taken by each and every producer, the money that all producers have invested could be a complete waste.

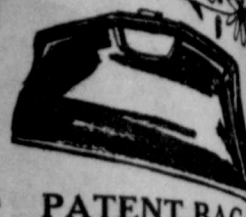

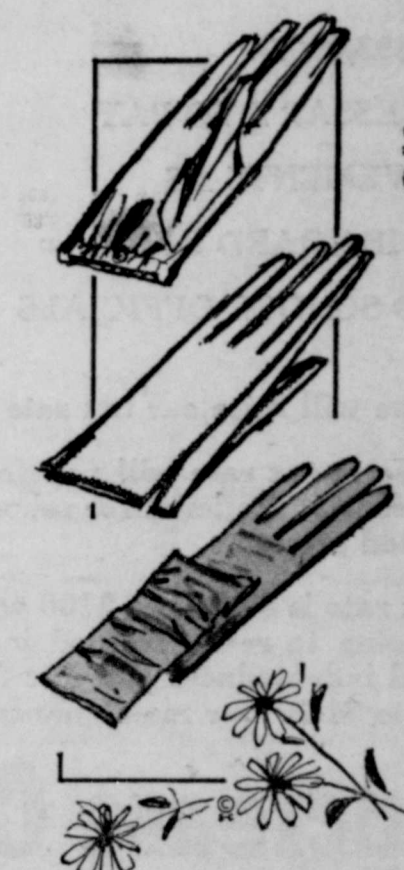
