White, National Chairman, declared today in answering an inquiry from Senator Harding as to the party's stand on the administration's foreign policy.

SAILS FROM STATES TO HAWAII IN SMALL YAWL

HONOLULU, T. H., July 31.—Harry Pidgeon, of Wilmington, California, recently emulated the example of the late Jack London, in sailing a thirty-four foot yawl single handed from San Pedro to Honolulu in twenty-six days. On his arrival here he was accorded all the attention the customs service usually gives to trans-Pacific steamers.

When Pidgeon's yawl came off the entrance to the harbor a customs inspector went out and boarded her. He was the first man Pidgeon had seen in three weeks, and from him Pidgeon learned Senator Harding had been nominated.

Pidgeon did not even have a dog as a companion. He said he had heard so much of the islands he came to see them and to take some pictures.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., July 31.

—Striking miners in Indiana and Illinois have been ordered back to work by President Lewis of the United Mine Workers of America.

In a telegram Mr. Lewis directed that every local union be instructed to call meetings and take steps to get men back to work.

SAVES CHINA-GIRL FROM AWFUL FATE OF SLAVE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Shuffling homeward thru the fog in the San Francisco Chinatown the other night a Chinese youth noticed a piece of white paper flutter through a circle of light from a street lamp and fall to the pavement. He picked it up and read its message, in Chinese characters:

"I am a slave girl. I wish to get away from my cruel masters. I have been kept a prisoner six years on the fourth floor of 1115 Stockton street. My name is Loi Mui. I was brought here from China when I was a little girl. I have a friend who says if I can send word to the man who passes in blue clothes with a star they will help me. I want to go back to China. Please help me."

The young Chinese to whom the note had fallen happened to be an American Chinese. He knew that it was dangerous to interfere with the girl's captors and to inform the police might mean death for him and his family.

His better instincts guided him to the Hall of Justice with the note. His name will never be known to anyone but the police.

Police Captain O'Meara, with federal officials and a representative of a Chinese mission raided the place an hour after the letter was dropped out of the window. They battered down three windows and as many doors and on the fourth floor found Loi Mui.

The girl is held in the city prison while federal officers investigate her story. She may be deported. She said she was sold as a slave in China when she was 12 and brought to this country afterwards. Detectives say she was held by the Hop Sing tong, one of the strongest factions of Chinatown.

GALVESTON TAX ROLLS STILL GROW

GALVESTON, July 31.—The tax rolls of this city have been increased \$4,700,000 over last year's figures, according to an announcement by the city commission, which has been sitting as a board of equalization.

The biggest jump, according to the announcement, was that of the Galveston Wharf company, whose taxable valuation was increased from \$4,000,000 to \$5,700,000, an increase of \$1,700,000.

FUTURE WHEAT DROPS TO \$2.14

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 31.—The future wheat market closed today at \$2.14, or nine cents under yesterday's market. It is the first time since the food control act expired that wheat has sold under \$2.21 as a minimum price.

PUSHING FIGHT AGAINST POLES

PARIS, July 31.—The Bolshevik cavalry have advanced on the East Prussian frontier, according to reports received from the French military mission at Warsaw.

According to the reports the Bolsheviks are fraternizing with the Germans, receiving aid from them.

The mission reports that the Germans and the soviet are negotiating at Suwalki.

The northern wing of the Bolshevik army is menacing Warsaw, which is threatened to be attacked at an early date.

General Joseph Haller, who was trained under the French, has been given the supreme command of the Northern Polish armies as the first step towards reorganizing the Polish military front, which is being carried out by the English and French missions.

Large authority has been placed with the French staffs. The Warsaw mission reports that the morale of the Polish army has been stiffened as a result of the allied support.

BAILEY'S LEAD IS NOW 3655

DALLAS, July 31.—Returns received by the Texas Election Bureau up to noon Saturday continued to reduce Bailey's lead over Neff. Returns from 246 counties, 138 of which are complete, show that Bailey's lead has been cut to 3655.

REVOLUTION IN MEXICO GROWS

MEXICALI, Lower California, July 31.—Governor Cantu, of Lower California, is assembling and placing troops in position in preparation of a strong defense to be made against the proposed invasion by the Mexican federal troops.

Gov. Cantu said that the independence of Lower California was not his object in mobilizing forces, which indicates that he will launch a rebellion against the provisional Mexican government and attempt to overthrow the Huerta regime.

JAPAN LONG ON COTTON

GALVESTON, July 31.—Because of unsettled conditions thru out Japan, that country will not buy heavily of the 1920 cotton crop of this country, T. Hiroshima head of the Galveston branch of the Goshu company declared, today.

Japan may even ship 200,000 bales of cotton back to this country to obtain the benefit of the higher prices paid here, he said. At present native merchants are overstocked, not only on raw material but also with large quantities of piece goods, he added.

GALVESTON, July 31.—Hearing on the injunction suit, seeking to enjoin the state from enforcing martial law in Galveston, has been set for August 10th. The suit was filed in behalf of the four city commissioners of Galveston.

HARDING'S FRONT PORCH SPEECH

MARION, Ohio, July 31.—Senator Harding's "front porch" campaign began today with a pilgrimage of the delegation from Mansfield, who came to pay their respects to the Republican nominee and hear him discuss the national issues. Most of the delegates counted themselves as "home folks" as Mansfield is only forty miles away, and many are personal friends of Mr. Harding. Farmers, stockkeepers, professional men and laborers marched together, and the delegation was made up of both men and women to emphasize the united support pledged to the Republican candidate.

Many did not wait for the formal hour set to call at the Harding residence, but went at once, and kept the senator busy shaking hands and renewing acquaintances. Two airplanes piloted the pilgrimage to the candidate's home and sailed over the crowd as Mr. Harding was delivering his porch speech.

The porch which becomes one of the landmarks in presidential history, has a capacious stretch, and the Harding lawn is no longer lawn, but an expanse of white crushed limestone, pebbly carpet-laid to preserve a solid surface upon which it is expected thousands will take part in the front porch campaign.

In his opening speech from his front porch, Senator Harding told delegations today that the greatest usefulness of the nation demanded the leveling of class and sectional barriers and the independence and mutuality of interest of all our people.

\$50,000 LUMBER FIRE AT EAGLE PASS

EAGLE PASS, Tex., July 31.—Lumber and building material valued at \$50,000 was destroyed by fire at Camp Eagle Pass.

Mrs. A. J. Pfeffer, of Winters, passed thru the city Friday afternoon en route to Navasota on a visit to relatives. Mr. Pfeffer brought her to the train.

FIRE LOSS WILL REACH \$1,500,000

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 31.

—Estimates on the loss in last night's fire which destroyed a section of the Mammoth warehouse, is placed at nearly one million and a half dollars. Approximately thirty thousand bales of sisal valued at \$780,000 and other merchandise valued at \$200,000 was included in the property destroyed.

Damage by smoke and water is estimated to amount to nearly \$200,000. Officers of the corporation stated that all goods stored were covered by insurance.

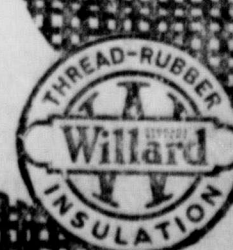

BEAR HEAVY LOAD

Some of the Trials of Present-Day Executives.

Man Who Complained That There Were No Efficient People in the World Had Some Excuse for His Bitterness—Trouble Is Moral.

Several years ago, when I had just been promoted to my first real job, I called on a business friend of mine. He is a wise and experienced handler of men. I asked him what suggestions he could make about executive responsibility, writes Bruce Barton, in the Red Book.

"You are about to make a great discovery," he said. "Within a week or two you will know why it is that executives grow gray and die before their time. You will have learned the bitter truth that there are no efficient people in the world."

I am still very far from admitting that he was right, but I know well enough what he meant. Every man knows who has ever been responsible for a piece of work or had to meet a pay roll.

Recently another friend of mine built a house. The money to build it represented a difficult period of saving on the part of himself and his wife; it meant overtime work and self-denial, and extra effort in behalf of a long-cherished dream.

One day when the work was well along he visited it, and saw a workman climbing a ladder to the roof with a little bunch of shingles in his hands. "Look here," the foreman said, "can't you carry a whole bundle of shingles?"

The workman regarded him sullenly. "I suppose I could," he answered. "If I wanted to bull the job."

By "bull the job" he meant "do an honest day's work."

At 10 o'clock one morning I met still another man in his office in New York. He was munching a sandwich and gulping a cup of coffee which his secretary had brought in to him.

"I had to work late last night," he said, "and meet a very early appointment this morning. My wife asked our maid to have breakfast a half hour early so that I might have a bite and still be here in time."

"When I came down to breakfast the maid was still in bed."

She lives in his home and eats and is clothed by means of money which his brain provides; but she has no interest in his success, no care whatever except to do the minimum of work.

"The real trouble with the world today is a moral trouble," said a thoughtful man recently. "A large proportion of its people have lost all conception of what it means to render an adequate service in return for the wages they are paid."

He is a generous man. On almost any sort of question his sympathies are likely to be with labor, and so are mine. I am glad that men work shorter hours than they used to, and in certain instances I think the hours should be even shorter. I am glad they are paid higher wages, and hope they may earn still more.

But there are times when my sympathy goes out to those in whose behalf no voice is ever raised—to the executives of the world, whose hours are limited only by the limit of their physical and mental endurance; who carry not merely the load of their own work, but the heartbreaking load of carelessness and stolid indifference in so many of the folks whom they employ.

Perhaps the most successful executive in history was that centurion of the Bible. "For I am a man of authority, having soldiers under me," he said. "And I say to this man go, and he goeth; and to another, come, and he cometh; and to my servant, do this, and he doeth it."

Marvelous man!

The modern executive also says, "Go," and two often the man who should have gone will appear a day or two later and explain, "I didn't understand what you meant." He says, "Come," and at the appointed time his telephone rings and a voice speaks, saying, "I overslept and will be there in about three-quarters of an hour."

Sugar Hog Punished.

A man who came out of the drizzling rain into a Cincinnati lunchroom late at night and ordered a cup of coffee and two rolls, complained when he got check for 14 cents, saying that the bill of fare said that coffee was 6 cents and rolls 4 cents. The proprietor explained that there was a charge of four cents, because the man, sweetening his coffee, was too free with the receptacle that dispenses one spoonful of sugar when he should have used only a half spoonful. "I watched you," the proprietor said. "You dumped five spoonfuls of sugar in your coffee."

Planting Trees on Prairies. In order to demonstrate to farmers on the plains the advisability and feasibility of planting trees on the prairies of the West, the Canadian Forestry association is sending a demonstration car on a tour of the three western provinces. A railway coach is being fitted up with a moving picture outfit, lecture hall, and a miniature nursery. The car will travel over the bulk of the western railway lines.

The American people wait to be aroused by public sentiment before they put over any great

undertaking. Public sentiment is being aroused against the rats in the plague zone, and we who are far from the zone should take a hand in the rat killing.

The health department has advised some very effective ways of destroying the rats, and a concerted effort at this time would not rid the country of the unsanitary condition caused by the rats, but would put a stop to a great waste.

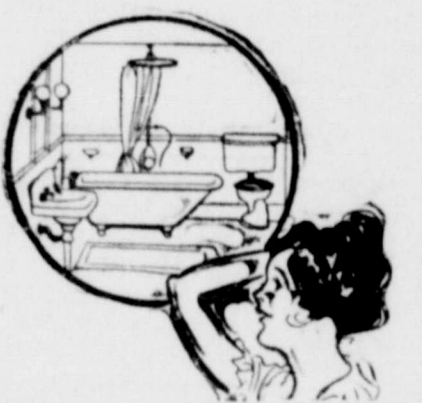
