An experiment in Dallas County may prove to be the fertilizing chemical that owners of black lands have been looking for since continuous planting of cotton has depleted the soil. Waterless ammonia applied as a liquid may be the soil stimulant needed for the nitrogen-starved black lands. It is 82 per cent nitrogen and costs \$3.75 per acre. Amazing results are reported on corn and onions.

These boys with the test tubes are now getting somewhere. They come up with a new chemical called 2,4,5-Trichlorophenoxyacetic acid. A dose causes poison ivy and other broad-leaved plants to instantly keel over. Picnickers and lovers of nature allergic to poison ivy are grateful, despite the unpronounceable name.

Recently the Lamar County Commissioners Court was advertising the poor farm to the highest bidder. This newspaper speculated on what would happen if county hospital expenses were not reduced and what the head of the house would tell his extravagant family. The court rejected all bids offered and we now wonder if they were not high enough or that august body has decided to keep the poor farm just in case—

Amount of trash, bottles and rubbish dumped on highway right-of-ways in District 1 is reported in this edition. They are sure a dirty bunch over in Grayson County with 446 cubic yards; Fannin was second with 228 yards; Red River wasn't far behind with 198 yards, with Hunt having 188. Among the larger more populous counties, Lamar was lowest with 111, which speaks well for Lamar. It would be interesting to know what percent of that "rubbish" was empty beer cans and beer and whiskey bottles. "If you drive, don't drink."

Graduating classes over this area are due the plaudits of the people of those communities. Most of them have done good jobs of acquiring a high school education. Some will seek more schooling while others will step out into the busy work-a-day world. 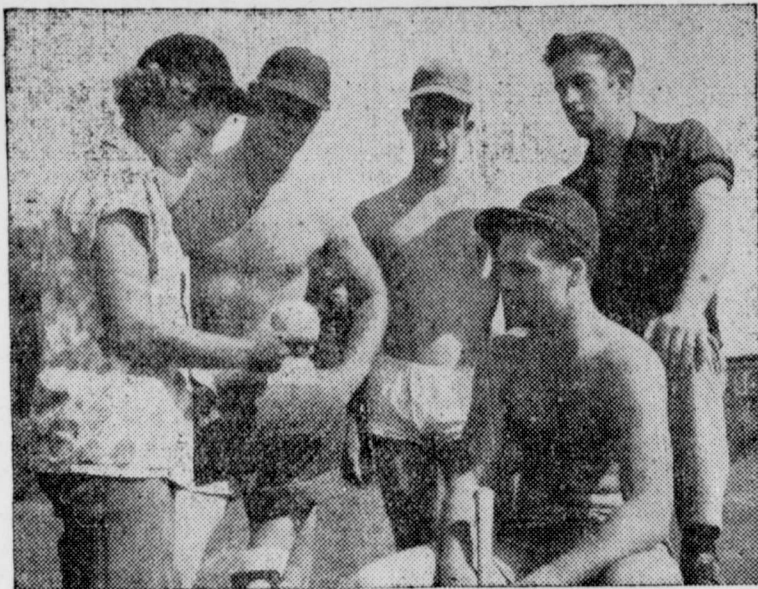

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Alcorn Worrying Over Crop Controls But Not Like the Average Farmer

Editor's note: Achin Alcorn, philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sulphur, has heard about the prospects for crop control next year, and is worrying us with his worries, as follows:

Dear Editor: Ever since I got word the government was considering on going back in the crop control business, I've had me up a mail box out here, and while a coffee can nailed to a mesquite tree may not come up to the standards of the United States Post Office Department, the thing works, at least mail has been showin up in it addressed to me, and as long as a thing works I don't care what standards it fails to come up to, we've even had Presidents that didn't come up to standard in some respects but the country held together, and yesterday I got a notice from the AAA to figure up the average amount of acreage I've had in various crops the past five years, and I don't mind sayin the thing has me stumped.

It ain't no easy job for me to sit down and say exactly what crops I've grown the past five years. You can start out plantin twenty acres of a crop, but if the grass starts closin in on you and you got somethin more important to do than plow, you may not wind up with more'n four or five acres, scattered here and there throughout the field where the grass didn't get no toe hold, but as for actually gettin out there and measurin it down to the quarter-acre, I ain't never done it and don't intend to.

For example, in 1944 it seems to me like I planted cotton in a ten-acre field north of the house, or how did cotton stalks get there and what are them furrows down there, but if I sold any cotton off

of it I believe I'd have remembered it, but things escape your memory, especially when you're tryin to make a crop and still not neglect the United Nations, the European crisis, etc. Also, me and my wife are still arguin over whether that was volunteer corn in my Johnson grass or volunteer Johnson grass in my corn in 1945, and since there ain't no place on the government form for Johnson grass, and I want to be honest about this thing, I'll admit I don't know what to put down, and if you leave a government form blank you've rocked the foundations of bureaucracy, it's like talkin about your wife's kinsfolk, you'll never hear the last of it, hound you about it the rest of your life. A government clerk with an unfilled-out form or your signature on the wrong line is worse than a busted first cousin.

Some farmers maybe can tell you exactly what they planted in 1946 and how much they made down to the penny, but farmin with me ain't no assembly-line production outfit, it's a way of life, and when I get through a year's farmin I'd just rather forget about the details, don't even want to know how much I lost, don't want to know what I did wrong, don't even want to speculate on whether another plowin would have saved this crop or that one. Just want to forget about it and hope this year turns out better.

If you have any notions about what I could put down on this form to satisfy the government, will appreciate hearin from you. Some of my neighbors is afraid the government is gonna cut down on their acreage, not let 'em plant as much as they want to, but such thoughts don't worry me. It ain't how much I can't plant, it's how much I have to, that keeps me worried.

Heretofore, melon production has been restricted to local markets, although nearby areas have been in large-scale production for several years.

Norwood added that the minimum requirement of 500 acres probably would be exceeded.

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Titus County Has Turned to Crop Diversification

Titus County is shifting from a 1-crop economy to a diversified agriculture featuring truck crops and pasture products.

The fact came out during an improved pasture tour sponsored by the Production and Marketing Administration and Harris A. Green, local administrative officer of the Agricultural Conservation Association.

"This once was strictly a corn and cotton county. Now we produce cotton, corn, sorghum, oats, singletary peas, peanuts, sweet potatoes, milk, chickens, eggs and beef cattle," Green explained.

He estimated Titus County's beef and dairy cattle population had jumped 33 per cent during the last ten years.

"I'd say we've got 12,800 head of dairy cattle and 17,500 head of beef cattle now," he said.

Sparkling the switch to livestock and diversified crops is a growing dairying industry. The county now has seventy-five Grade A barns.

"This increase in livestock and dairying calls for more and better pastures. I figure this county has improved around 45,000 acres of pastures during the last five years," Green said.

Farmers attending the tour had a first-hand chance to examine some of the improved pastures. Local places visited included the 161-acre Q. C. Gaddis farm, the 168-acre L. H. McCann farm and the 789-acre Sarah E. Scott farm.

Basic practices used in building pastures on the three farms included spreading of lime and superphosphate and planting of legumes.

Principal legumes were hop and white Dutch clovers, Kobe and sericea lespedeza, Austrian winter and Dixie wonder peas, hairy vetch and Korean lespedeza.

Green estimated that the local ACA had put out 10,000,000 pounds of lime and 2,000,000 pounds of superphosphate on Titus County pastures since 1944.

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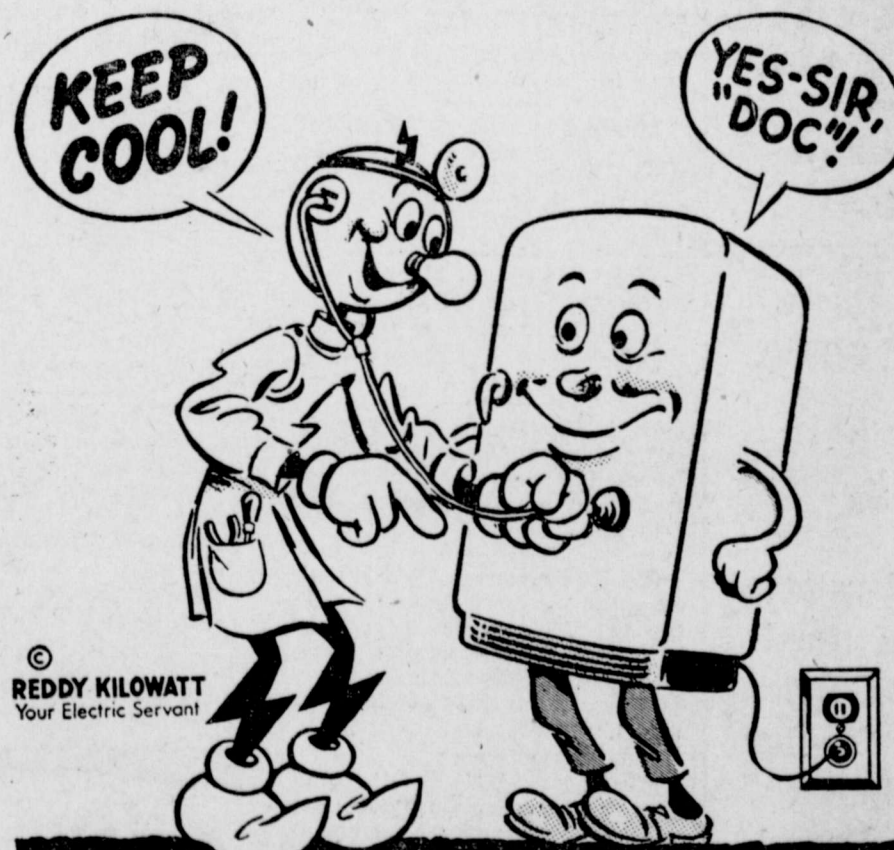
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CHECK YOUR REFRIGERATOR

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1. Check door gasket to see that it makes a tight seal.
