77% of City Taxes Paid By Oct. 31

With the city's total tax roll set at \$84,434.70, over 77 percent of the taxes were collected by the end of October, according to Mrs. Mary Lake Segler, city secretary. During October, \$65,046.54 was turned in by city taxpayers, and the total discounts amounted to \$1,914.63. In October, those persons paying their city taxes got a 3 per cent discount; in November, the discount is 2 per cent, and in December it is 1 per cent.

Real Estate Business Doing Well Here

Houses are selling well. Many lots are being purchased as future home sites. Acreage plots are being grabbed up. People are steadily moving into this area.

It is believed that when National Steel Company builds its new plant at nearby Ingleside the Rockport area will benefit from this influx of workers.

Virtually everyone living here thinks that the future holds great prospects for a big increase in tourism and also that this section will attract large numbers of retired persons looking for a picturesque place to live where the climate is mild and where there is some space to move around.

In an attempt to get some facts and figures about the sale of homes, lots and acreage plots since the first of the year, The Rockport Pilot did some checking with local real estate firms and subdivision developers. Following are the results of this survey:

Carl C. Krueger, Jr. of Key Allegro Development and Sales, developers of Key Allegro Island where many homes are built on man-made canals and where most dwellers have a boat docked at their back door and fishing can be enjoyed without leaving your backyard, turned in the following report for sales and construction from Jan. 1 through Oct. 31:

Homes and home sites, 81 sales for \$1,319,492.

Completed, 10 for \$388,350.

Under construction, 7 for \$342,000.

Total sales and construction, \$2,049,842.

Total homes now completed on the island, 182.

The next report was from Mrs. Juanita Wagley who stated:

"Sipe Real Estate, Inc., with a sales force of four, reports good business all year, but particularly brisk the past 60 days. This firm has so far this year handled the sale of more than 50 homes and well over 100 individual lots, several acreage tracts, and commercial property including a downtown restaurant, a marina, and a tract of land on Fulton Beach where construction of a five-story condominium is planned to begin early next year.

"Sales of homes have been about equally distributed throughout all sections of the county, with perhaps the greatest number of individual lots sold in Copano Cove and Copano Ridge subdivisions where more than 40 lots have been sold by Sipe, Inc. this year.

"Home sales during the past 60 days have included five in Copano Cove and Copano Ridge, four in West Terrace, two in Oak Terrace, and six in Rockport and Fulton.

"Oak Terrace Subdivision, being developed by Wagley Lumber Co., continues to grow, with 14 new homes constructed this year. This 160-acre development, opened about four years ago, now contains 73 homes, all of brick construction."

The third report was submitted by Ed Harper of Security Real Estate, Inc., who reported that since the first of the year this firm has had a total of \$1,319,250 in sales. This includes lots, houses, business buildings and acreage plots. Some of the homes and lots were located in City by the Sea, a venetian type subdivision just south of Rockport.

The fourth report came from Port Little of the Port Little Company who said that so far this year the total business of his firm has reached a total of \$401,940.12.

The fifth and final report came from Palm Harbor Sales which stated they "have kept a steady pace this year and even with the extra rainfall slowing construction on Unit Two, 11 lots have been sold (continued on page 8)

County \$15,822 Over Budget

During the first 10 months of this year Aransas county is \$15,822.29 over the budget, according to the latest financial report by County Auditor Robert D. Mosier, Jr.

The budget for this period was \$364,295.50 whereas the expenditures were \$380,118.29. The listing of individual funds by budget and expenditures was as follows:

General: \$200,506.50 budget, \$203,006.45 spent; road bridge: \$135,900.00 budget, \$139,650.03 spent; jury: \$3,316 budget, \$2,855.83 spent; mosquito control \$9,245.89 spent; library: \$2,055.00 budget, \$5,571.84 spent; and law library: \$666.60 budget, \$533.45 spent.

Youth Killed By Rigged Shotgun

The lifeless body of Edward Sanchez, 17, of Aransas Pass, was found early Wednesday morning behind a service station called Gas House No. 8 at the north end of Aransas Pass.

He had been killed by pellets from a 12 gauge double barrel shotgun which had been rigged to go off if the rear door was opened.

According to the Aransas County Sheriff's Department, Thomas Henry Knight, owner of the service station, had rigged the gun after his station had been burglarized several times.

Found in the right trouser pocket of Sanchez was a hook-bladed knife. Lying nearby, according to police, was a tool which is used to put grease in transmissions and which authorities said they believed is the tool used to take the lock off the rear door of the service station.

The door had a large hole through the panel near the hasp and lock. The gun was on the floor on the inside and a shell in the right chamber had been discharged.

Pellets from the gun entered Sanchez's body in the area of his stomach.

BIDS OPENED ON NAVIGATION WORK

Aransas County Navigation District commissioners opened bids, the Loyd W. Richardson Construction Co of Aransas Pass was apparent low bidder on construction of harbor facilities at the Cove and Little Bay, with bids of \$272,915 and \$122,668 respectively.

Only one other firm, Bauer and Smith of Port Lavaca submitted on the Cove work and their bid was \$491,750, almost twice as much as the Richardson bid. Bauer and Smith made no bid on the Little Bay work.

The trouble with this is that the seas may now be cluttered with Englishmen whose wives yearn to be ladies, if only in title. Cape Horn may look like the Dan Ryan expressway at 5 p.m. Where will the line be drawn? Who will rate a knighthood and who won't?

Maybe the solution is to make them all peers instead of mere knights. A peerage would entitle them to sit in the house of lords, which Prime Minister Wilson would like to revamp anyway.

If the enticement of a peerage temps enough Englishmen to put to sea, thus proving that Britannia still rules the waves (and also easing the burden on national insurance,) Mr. Wilson will have a new house of lords in little more than a year, assuming favorable trade winds.—Chicago Tribune.

EDITOR'S VIEWPOINTS

KEEPING SPANISH "PURE"

Salvador de Madariaga, who probably is Spain's most distinguished living writer, is worrying about the corruption of the Spanish language through the introduction of English words into it. Yet only dead languages, such as Latin, are immune to such threats.

The infusion of foreign words into English is one of the real strengths of our language. It has made it a more colorful and useful language—and, as a sort of by-product, has established a certain language bond between us and many of the peoples of the world.

English has borrowed from virtually every language—including the Spanish. The word "canyon" comes directly from the Spanish, and so does the slang word "vamoose," which is from the Spanish "vamos," meaning "let us go."

Trying to keep a language "pure" probably is an admirable goal; but no country can hope to succeed at it and still be an active member of the community of nations—which is an even worthier goal for Spain to pursue in these times.—Grand Rapids Press.

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS
 BY VERN SANFORD

For the past decade the cartridge industry has been in a great state of unrest. New cartridges have been introduced and some old favorites discarded. Armed services adopted a new military cartridge. But there have been several time-honored cartridges which have rocked right along. They continue to be best-sellers despite all the fanfare accorded to their so-called replacements.

The venerable .30/06 is one cartridge that has had its supremacy challenged. But it has successfully stood off all comers. Today it continues to be the best selling cartridge on the market.

Quite a record for an ancient fellow that's almost 60 years old.

Of course there has to be a reason for this august position on the cartridge list. And with the .30/06 there is no mystery. It continues to sell and be used because it is one of the most versatile cartridges on the market.

Texas deer hunters, for example, find it works quite well on local whitetails, and also does a good job on the bigger mule deer of Colorado, Utah and Wyoming.

It will serve as an antelope weapon and even can be used to plunk jackrabbits or maybe woodchucks. It works equally well on the open prairies or in brush, at long ranges and short.

Ever so often a cartridge is introduced that, according to the publicity, will "replace the .30/06." Latest to make this challenge, and closest to carrying it out, is the .308. It has replaced the .30/06 as our official U. S. military cartridge.

But the .308 hasn't come close to overtaking the .30/06 yet, and perhaps it never will.

One cartridge that is stocked wherever ammunition is sold is the .30/06. You can go into the smallest town, where a few boxes of ammo are collecting dust on the shelves of the general store, and sure enough, there it will be, in the most prominent spot. This is one reason why the .30/06 has been popular. Gunners know there never will be any problem obtaining ammo for it.

History of the .30/06 dates back to 1903, although it wasn't officially named until 1906.

During the Spanish-American war over Cuba, the United States forces used the .30/40 Krag. After the shooting was over, military men decided something more potent was needed.

Result of this was the 1903 Springfield and the .30/06 cartridge chambered for it. But the results weren't entirely satisfactory.

When the Germans far surpassed it with the Model 1905 version of their 8X57 military cartridge, designers went scurrying back to their planning boards.

From this experience came the Model 1906 rifle and the .30/06 cartridge.

Actually, all that happened was the .30/03 cartridge had its neck shortened 1/10th of an inch; a 150-grain sharp-point bullet replaced the original 220-grain bullet; and velocity was jacked up to 2,700 feet-per-second.

As a sporting cartridge, the .30/06 got its biggest boost when Theodore Roosevelt took a slightly modified version of the rifle on a big-game hunt to Africa in 1910.

Its biggest popularity came when the .30/06 was chambered for bolt-action rifles. But back in the early days Winchester even had a lever-action gun chambered for it, the Model 1895 being converted to take .30/06 ammo.

For a long time hunters stayed with the 150-grain bullet, although the .220-grain bullet could be fired in the 1903 rifles.

Then some 20 to 25 years after it was introduced, the .30/06 started to get a new look. Many new cartridges were designed for it, making the rifle more versatile.

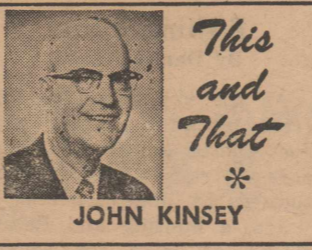
The 150-grain bullet was supplemented with a 180-grain bullet. Then some better 220-grain bullets began showing up. For example the Western boattail, with just a bit of lead exposed at the tip, and the Remington delayed mushroom.

After World War I there were some bolt-action guns available chambered for the .30/06, most of them imported from Europe.

First American bolt-action gun chambered for it was the Newton, built in 1915. But it never really enjoyed success.

Remington came out with its Model 30 Express for the .30/06 right after World War I, and in 1925 Winchester brought out its Model 54 in both .30/06 and .270.

All along, the .30/06 had been the official military cartridge until the 1950's when the .308 was introduced. But even this official military sanction of another cartridge hasn't slowed down the sporting sales of the .30/06.

This and That

With the Chamber of Commerce sponsoring a Public Relations Seminar this week, it seems timely to list a few definitions of public relations.

Wright and Christian in their book "Public Relations in Management," say:

"Public relations is a planned program of policies and conduct. An institution's relations with the public are determined by how it lives rather than by merely telling its story."

Edward L. Bernays, public relations rounsel for Kelvinox, states:

"Public relations is simply the task of interpreting your company and its products to the public."

Abraham Lincoln said, "Public sentiment is everything. With public opinion nothing can fail; without it, nothing succeed."

Three definitions from unknown sources are as follows:

"Public relations is to business what good manners and morals are to an individual."

"Good public relations is to business what melted butter is to popcorn."

"Public relations in the broad sense is not a specialized activity like merchandising, customer services, publicity, personnel and selling. It is rather something that cuts through all of these activities as the theme for each."

Paul Garrett, vice president of General Motors Corporation wrote:

"We need not so much a fresh definition of public relations as a fresh point of view with regard to it. A good position with the public for any

company must start with good policy. Next comes the application of policy by the public."

Fortune Magazine stated, "What is good public relations? Good public relations is good performance—publicly appreciated. It is a corporate way of life. Business must first do a job that people can think well of, and then intelligently and deftly call attention to it. For most people appraise business not only by the price and quality of its product but as a neighbor and citizen."

My own definition of good public relations, taken from the Bible, is, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

As the sky began to turn from black to lighter gray Joe Chetta and I were well across Aransas Bay, heading towards St. Joseph Island.
Joe, a hunting and fishing friend of mine for several years, is a native of Houston who finds the abundance of fish and wildlife in the Rockport area an irresistible magnet.
Gloria, Joe's wife, who is becoming quite a fisherman herself, was left on the bank this trip because we were heading for the sloughs for some red fishing.
Just as the sun began to break over the horizon, I cut the motor and started to pole into the first slough just north of Jay Bird Point.
I didn't use the anchor. Instead, I nosed the boat's bow into the reeds and lowered the motor for an anchor. Joe made the first cast. His cork immediately starting easing under the water. He set the hook and then, nothing! A clean miss.
"Joe," I said quietly, "these are not trout we're after. Let them run with it. Give 'em time to swallow the hook."
The next cast, he followed my instructions to the letter and landed a 15-inch red. By this time I was rigged and made my first cast. Wham, a 13-inch red was released. It went on this way for three hours. A red or drum every cast. At 10 a.m. we headed home.
Our stringer consisting of 31 reds and 12 drum. The largest red went about 4 pounds. I would guess that we threw away 50 redfish that would go 12 to 13 1/2 inches.

The game opened with the Bulldogs kicking off to the Pirates. Rockport returning the ball 22 yards to put it down on their own 33-yard line.

The Pirates started down field with very little trouble, and Ruford Huff ran 54 yards for a Rockport touchdown. Martin Moss kicked the extra point.

The Bulldogs moved down to the Pirates' 13-yard line within a few plays following Rockport's 35-yard kickoff.

Then a Bulldog fumble was recovered by Rockport, giving the Pirates the ball on their own 4-yard line.

Deep in their own territory the Pirates were forced to punt, with Robert Brooks kicking 40 yards. The Bulldogs returned it to the Pirate 38-yard line.

As the Bulldogs moved closer to the Pirates' goal line there was a fumble, recovered by the Pirates on their own 13-yard line.

Rockport started down the field and got one first down after another.

Wages of Household Workers Must Be Reported

Employers of domestic help were reminded today by H. M. Cleveland, district manager of the Corpus Christi social security office, of the need to file a report of their employee's earnings every three months.

Domestic work in a private home is covered under social security if the employee is paid \$50 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter.

Employees sometimes work only part of a day each week cleaning house or taking care of the yard. If an employee just worked four a week and is paid a dollar an hour, the wages would amount to more than \$50 in a three month period, Cleveland explained.

Household workers include maids, cooks, baby sitters, housekeepers, and yardmen. The tax rate is 4.4 percent each for employer and employee. The employer may deduct the employee's tax from his wages. The employer then matches the amount of the employee's taxes from his own

funds. The wages are then reported on Form 942 which is available at any office of the Internal Revenue Service. This report is due the month following the end of a calendar quarter.

Occasionally an employer doesn't realize that household work needs to be reported, Cleveland said. Get more information as to whether or not a worker is covered by social security from the office at 1802 South Staples Street, Corpus Christi.



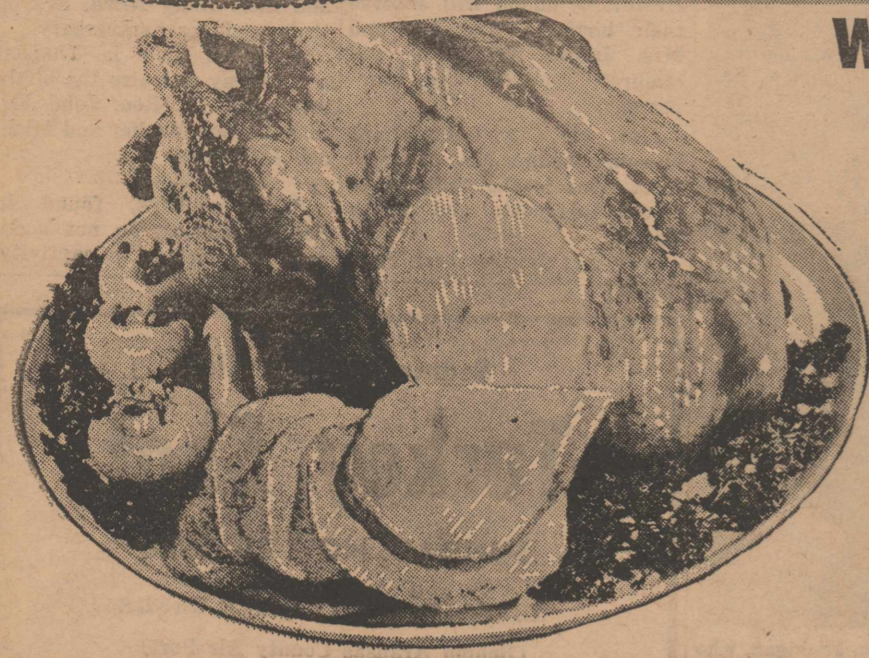
