Spanish Fliers Finish Long Flight Safely

APPOINT HUBBARD C. I. A. PRESIDENT

UNIVERSITY MAN CHOSEN TO HEAD DENTON COLLEGE

LINDSEY BLAYNEY IS TO REMAIN PRESIDENT UNTIL JUNE

(By The Associated Press.)
FORT WORTH, Feb. 10.—Dean L. H. Hubbard of the University of Texas, was elected president of the College of Industrial Arts, Denton, at a meeting of the board of regents here today. He succeeds Dr. Lindsey Blayney, resigned.

Hubbard's election followed immediately reading a letter from Governor Miriam A. Ferguson suggesting to the board that "precaution" be shown. The letter enclosed petition from Denton citizens declaring Blayney's administration of the college had been blameless and telegrams from various club women, both requesting the election of the president be re-opened.

Dean Hubbard was elected on the second ballot. J. W. Dezan, the only man who voted against him moving to make the election unanimous. On the first ballot two votes were cast for Hubbard, two for R. L. Marquis, one for J. F. McConnell of Clarksville and one for W. F. Dougherty of Hillsboro.

Relieve Blayney
The board adopted resolutions which in effect relieved Dr. Blayney from his duties, effective at once. It was declared to be "the sense of the board" that the president elect be expected to make all recommendations for the selection of the faculty for the summer school and the next term, and in the preparation of the catalogue.

The resolution adopted by a four to two vote, Dean Connell, Mrs. Joseph and Mrs. Capps, favoring, was introduced by Mrs. Joseph after.

Fletcher Cowart was hurt internally. The others were cut and scratched.

The car was a "deadhead" taking employees to and from their work. The roof on one side of the car was crushed by the boulder which blocked traffic on two tracks. Dynamite was used to remove the obstruction.

Frank Farrell Dies In New York Today

ATLANTIC CITY, Feb. 10. (P)—Frank J. Farrell, former owner of the New York Yankees, died suddenly of heart disease today at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel.

He had been suffering with bronchitis for several days and on advice of physicians came to Atlantic City last Friday. Mrs. Farrell accompanied him and he was apparently recovering when the end came.

Farrell was sixty years old. He owned the Yankees for ten years and was interested in the New York politics and horse racing for many years.

RIOT SQUAD HELD IN MINE ROW

(By The Associated Press.)
BRANTON, Pa., Feb. 10.—A riot squad was on duty at police headquarters today as the result of 500 striking anthracite miners marching yesterday on two washeries in protest against the hydroelectric production of coal.

The squad, which will be on duty until the strikes end, is to have shotguns and tear gas bombs. Persons participating in demonstrations similar to yesterday's will be arrested for inciting riots.

Police received a second call to break up a disturbance late last night when 300 striking miners engaged in a free for all fight near here. Two miners were slightly injured. No arrests were made. The trouble started when automobile trucks bearing New Jersey registration plates appeared to carry away coal. One group of miners accused the other of "boot-legging" coal.

The trouble was not connected with the demonstration at the washeries. Union officials today denied charges made by Steve McDonald, former president of the Central Labor Union and the owner of Washeries, that officials started the demonstration yesterday which ended when the miners were dispersed by police armed with shotguns.

Four Children Are Victims of Flames

COATSVILLE, Pa., Feb. 10. (P)—Four children of Benjamin Eiters, the eldest 8 years old, were burned to death today when fire destroyed Eiters' home at Gostown near here. The fire was discovered by Mrs. Eiters, alone in the house with her six children. Her husband, a night-worker, had not returned from work. The mother managed to save two children, but was unable to enter the house to rescue the others.

LAND IN BUENOS AIRES TODAY TO END LONG JAUNT

FIRST AIRMEN TO JUMP ACROSS ATLANTIC ARE SAFE ON GROUND

(By The Associated Press.)
BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 10.—The Spanish trans-Atlantic aviators arrived here at 12:17 o'clock this afternoon from Monte Video, completing their 6,232 mile voyage from Palos, Spain. Commanders Franco's plane made the journey from Monte Video in 58 minutes. As they arrived there the Spanish aviators received an ovation from the crowd along the water front. After changing clothes they made a triumphal journey to the government house where they were received by President Alvar and members of the cabinet.

The flight of Commander Ramon Franco and his companions has been one of the outstanding achievements of aviation. It is remarkable not only for the great distance but for the regularity with which the Spanish aviators adhered to their strenuous schedule.

Is Columbus Of Air
Hailed as the "Columbus of the air," Franco started his voyage from Palos, Spain, whence Columbus set out on his first voyage of discovery in 1492. The fliers left Palos on January 22nd, arriving at Las Palmas, Canary Islands the same day. They flew to Porto Praya, in the Cape Verde Islands, a distance of 1,954 miles on January 24.

After a short rest and due preparations they accomplished on January 30 the longest and most difficult of their hops across the wide expanse of the Southern Atlantic to the island of Fernando du Noronha, off the Brazilian coast, a distance of 1,437 miles.

VERNON MAN TO PAY FOR CRIME

John Joiner Must Serve Long Sentence for Slaying of Odell Man Recently

(By The Associated Press.)
VERNON, Feb. 6.—John Joiner, charged with the murder of Arlie Crain, at Odell, January 24, was found guilty by a jury in the 46th district court early this morning and sentenced to serve 99 years in the state penitentiary.

The jury retired at 12:05 midnight and returned the verdict in less than 30 minutes. Joiner sat calmly in his chair and seemed unmoved by the verdict. He was placed in county jail.

The offering of testimony in the case was concluded yesterday at 5 o'clock and a night session was held to hear the arguments.

Joiner was arrested at his bowling alley in Odell by Sheriff Edmundson, following the fatal shooting of Crain in the street in front of the establishment at 2:00 a. m. Sunday, January 24. He and his wife, Mrs. Ha B. Joiner were jointly indicted for murder in connection with the killing by the grand jury in special session and the case was rushed to trial.

Charges against Mrs. Joiner were dismissed at the opening of the trial on the recommendation of the District Attorney.

District Attorney, Story, in his arguments last night made a strong plea for the supreme penalty, the electric chair.

UNVEILS THREAT MADE IN SPEECH AGAINST RIVALS

EUROPEAN SITUATION IS GROWING MORE TENSE; AMBASSADOR GONE

(By The Associated Press.)
ROME, Feb. 10.—Replying in the Italian senate today to yesterday's address by foreign minister Stresemann of Germany, Premier Mussolini said: "I confirm the letter and spirit of my previous speech, not excluding the accent upon my phrase referring to the possibility of the Italian flag going beyond the Brenner frontier which Stresemann can interpret as he chooses."

"Stresemann, in his speech, merely confirmed all the points I made," the premier continued.

He Raps German
Mussolini asserted that Italians would interpret his phrase in regard to the Brenner Pass as meaning that Italy would never endure violations of the treaties of peace guaranteeing a frontier won by blood. He said that Dr. Stresemann had not denied a single one of the charges he made in his speech of last Saturday, and denied categorically that Italy ever would ask for a supplementary guarantee pact in regard to the Brenner frontier.

The premier declared that it was impossible to compare the question of the Italian minority in Jugoslavia with that of the German minority in the Upper Adige territory.

"It is hardly necessary," he added, "to repeat that our policy in Upper Adige, which I call 'Roman equity,' will be continued." He concluded by declaring the German population in the territory did not constitute a national minority, that Italy would not accept any discussion of the matter in any assembly or council (an apparent reference to the league of nations).

Italian Diplomat Gone
ROME, Feb. 10. (P)—The absence of the Italian ambassador from Berlin, confirmed today, has no bearing on and is not related to the present controversy between Italy and Germany.

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TEACHER STABBED NEAR MESQUITE

(By Associated Press.)
DALLAS, Feb. 10.—Stabbed 20 times and left for dead, Miss Emma Aydt, 25, school teacher, lived today to tell police of the attack.

She said she was riding toward Mesquite with a companion who suddenly drew a knife and announced he was going to kill her and himself.

"He began slashing me with the knife," she related. "I was driving and he cut me many times before I could get out of the car. I fought him off the best I could until I could free myself. Then I ran down the road until some men came along in a car and brought me to town."

The man, believing he had killed her, went to the home of a friend and announced he had killed a woman and was going to kill himself. He was detained until Mesquite officers arrived.

Taken to an emergency hospital man, told officers he had no knife and collapsed when he saw Aydt in the operating room. Aydt said she had known him several years.

Menus for the Family

By SISTER MARY

Breakfast — Stewed prunes, cereal, in cream, scrambled eggs with dried bread, milk, coffee.

Luncheon — Baked salsify, toasted muffins, apple sauce, ginger bread, milk, tea.

Dinner — Breaded veal cutlets, peas in casserole, creamed string beans, endive salad, peach tapioca, rice wheat bread, milk, coffee.

At potatoes stand in cold water for hour before paring. This freshens them without soaking out any of their valuable properties. Do not let them soak in cold water after paring. Cook as soon as possible. They must of course be dropped into cold water as pared to prevent discoloration.

Baked Salsify.

One bunch salsify, 3 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup milk, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 2 eggs.

Wash and scrape salsify. Cut in slices and drop into acidulated water to prevent discoloration. Drain and put into boiling water to cover containing 2 tablespoons lemon juice. When half cooked add salt. Cook until tender, about 3 minutes and rub through a strainer. Add butter, salt, paprika, milk and yolks of eggs well beaten. Beat well and fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a well-buttered baking dish and bake surrounded by hot water for 40 minutes. Serve at once.

REPUBLICANS WILL ENTER PRIMARY THIS YEAR

DALLAS, Feb. 10. (AP)—Though normally considered as an "off" year politically, 1926, is just as full of political dates as any other year.

Because of the necessity of educating its workers to the requirements of the Terrell primary law, the republican party headquarters here has compiled and sent out to its county chairmen the various dates in the calendar of politics, explaining the steps necessary in preparing for the primary and the election. These dates are considered of importance this year because of the general belief that the state campaign will be of unusual warmth.

The political calendar follows:

April 1. Before this date, the county collector shall furnish the county election board, consisting of the county clerk, county judge, and sheriff, a list of all persons who paid poll tax or obtained exemption.

June 7. On or before this date candidates for party nomination shall file with their state chairman application for a place on the ballot. Such a request may be made for the candidate by 25 qualified voters.

June 14. State executive committee of the party shall meet on this date to direct the state chairman to certify to county chairmen, the names and residences of all candidates for state office to go on the primary ballot and to name the place for holding the state convention on the second Tuesday of August.

June 14. County executive committee meets and issues call for precinct convention to be held on primary election day (July 24) for the purpose of electing delegates to the county convention to be held on July 1. The chairman for each precinct who is the member of the county committee from such precinct and the hour and place of holding these precinct conventions, should be announced.

June 19. On or before this date candidates for party nomination for offices to be filled by the voters of a single county or portion thereof, or for county chairman, must file application for place on primary ballot with county chairman. This request may be filed by 25 qualified voters residing in the county.

June 21. County executive committee meets to determine order of names on primary ballot, estimate cost of primary and apportion same. The county chairman with approval of the county committee appoints a subcommittee of five with himself as chairman to meet July 12 to make up the ballot.

June 28. On or before this date candidates in the primary election must pay ballot fees assessed against them.

July 12. Sub-committee of county executive committee meets to make up primary ballot.

July 19. Before this date each county chairman obtains from the tax collector complete lists of voters in his county, arranged by precincts, paying \$5 therefore—such list to be used in primary election. Primary election is not legal unless such lists are obtained and used for references by the election judges during the election. On or before this date, also, persons who have moved from one ward to another in cities over 10,000, before the delivery of certificated lists of voters to precinct chairmen, shall appear before the tax collector and obtain a corrected tax receipt or certificate of exemption.

July 29. On or before this date, persons who have moved from one precinct to another or from one county to another, and who desire to vote in the primary election, must apply to the county tax collector for a record of the transfer. This applies only to those who move to cities of 10,000 or more population.

July 24. Primary election day. Polls open 8 a. m.; close 7 p. m.

July 31. County executive committee meets to canvass returns from primary election. On this date also county conventions are held to elect delegates to district and state conventions.

August 1. On or before this date, all candidates, all managers of candidates, and others who have expended money in behalf of any candidate or any political party during and preceding the primary must file a statement of expenses with the county judge.

August 9. State executive committee meets to canvass returns of the primary.

August 23-24. Some provisions as to transfer of voters as under July 19 and 20.

August 28. Second or run-off primary in case one candidate for any office has not received a majority of votes.

August 28. District conventions, immediately following which chairmen and secretary shall certify district nominations to secretary of state.

Sept. 6. State executive committee meets to canvass second primary vote and to prepare complete list of delegates elected to state convention from each county.

Sept. 7. Statement of expenses must be filed with county judge.

Sept. 7. State convention to canvass vote of state officers, announce resulting nominations, to certify such nominations to the secretary of state, adopt a platform, elect state chairman, and elect executive committee.

Oct. 28-29. Same provisions as to transfer of voters as under July 19 and 20.

Nov. 2. General elections. Polls open 8 a. m.; close 7 p. m.

Nov. 12. Candidates must file statement of expense account with county judge.

MEXICANS REGRET INCIDENT AT GRANGER

SAN ANTONIO, Feb. 10. (AP)—Protest of the action of a restaurant owner at Granger, in refusing to serve him yesterday, will be made to Governor Miriam A. Ferguson and to the Mayor of Granger by Alejandro P. Carillo, Mexican consul general here.

When Carillo entered the cafe, accompanied by ten other Mexicans, he was told by the proprietor's daughter, that they could not eat there. Then the proprietor appeared and said that the visitors would be served in the kitchen, but not as regular patrons. The party left town and dined at an Austin hotel.

The consul said today he greatly regretted the incident and that he was certain it didn't reflect the sentiment of Granger nor of the state. Carillo, before the incident occurred, had addressed the Mexican colony of the town, urging respect for the American laws and authorities and pleading for good feelings.

"I told the restaurant owner that if he would go to Mexico we would show him how to treat all gentlemen in our cafes, regardless of their nationality," he said.

A report of the incident will be sent to the Mexican embassy at Washington.

MITCHELL BACKS AVIATION CHIEF

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Secretary Davis' investigation of activities of air service officers is aimed primarily at Major General Untrick, head of the army air force, in the belief of William Mitchell and the former colonel has rallied to the defense of his old time chief.

Describing General Patrick as "the only member of the old regime to see the light and come out and tell the truth about it," Mitchell said the general is being made the victim of an espionage system within the department. The new investigation of the air service officers, Mitchell contended, is "aimed at any change in existing conditions," and was undertaken at the insistence of the War Department chief.

A circular, said to have been issued to obtain congressional backing for the bill providing establishment of an air corps and now subject of a department inquiry, was given to Secretary Davis, Mitchell declared, by a clerk who "presumably acted as a spy." The former officer said the circular presented a summary of a memorandum prepared by General Patrick for use of congress, and that it was distributed by a reserve officer.

Mitchell characterized the "espionage system" as a continuation of one that existed during the war and that any man is disloyal "who does not agree with what the clique in the War Department wants him to say."

RABBI WISE RAPS ITALIAN PREMIER

PITTSBURGH, Penn., Feb. 10. (AP)—Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York, seen in Premier Mussolini's successor to Kaiser Wilhelm and the most menacing and war-like figure in the world. In a lecture here last night, the New York Rabbi berated the United States for extending credit to Italy and ridiculed the manner in which the Italian war debt to the United States was settled.

"The world waited too long to check the Kaiser," Dr. Wise said. "Will it wait too long to subdue Mussolini? The time to stop the madness that may plunge us into another world war is now."

"It seems rather hard for those of us who take the American tradition of liberty seriously to find American money in the form of loans bolstering up this opera bouffe Napoleon."

In Italy today there is neither law nor freedom. Why cavil at Mexico and go arm in arm with Italy? Italy can gain its place in the world only after purging itself of the menace of Mussolini."

Coolidge Favors Dry Law Bureau, He Says

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—The treasury proposal to establish a bureau of prohibition has the approval of President Coolidge, who believes that such a step would aid in enforcement of the Volstead act.

AUSTIN, Feb. 10. (AP)—Two official women of Texas, perhaps for the first time in the South, are giving orders to one official man, and the man doesn't want to obey.

Governor Miriam A. Ferguson and Mrs. Emma G. Meharg, members of the state board of education have ordered the state superintendent of instruction, S. M. N. Marrs, to certify textbooks of the American Book Company, whose contract was ratified by the state textbook commission. Marrs has intimated he will go to court before he obeys in the instructions of the women.

The third member of the board of education, State Comptroller S. H. Terrell, declined to vote on the resolution giving instructions to Marrs, leaving the two women to handle the official.

Five Year Sentence Given Texas Slayer

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Texas, Feb. 10. (AP)—A verdict of five years imprisonment was returned here today against L. W. Pearce, charged with the killing of Clayton Hudson in the railroad strike of 1922. The case went to the jury at six p. m. yesterday.

French Want Peace With Druse Rebels

LONDON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Special dispatches from Jerusalem report that the French government has declined to supply men and money for a further campaign against the Druse tribesmen and has instructed High Commissioner De Jouvenal to make the best peace terms possible and at the earliest date.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT MUST FAIL TO ANSWER MUSSOLINI IN SAME LANGUAGE, STRESMANN DECIDES

(By Associated Press.)

BERLIN, Feb. 10. — "The German government must decline to reply to Premier Mussolini in a tone which is better suited to mass meetings than to diplomatic conversation with other nations."

Foreign minister Stresemann made this declaration in the Reichstag yesterday in opening his reply to Saturday's broadside from the Italian premier regarding the situation in South Tyrol.

"We have no quarrel with the Italian people, who according to Mussolini's words, written in 1920, have no interests in compatible with the Germans," Dr. Stresemann continued.

Differences Stressed.

"German-Italian differences, as Mussolini then stated, always were due to misunderstanding rather than to conflicting economic or political interests."

Going back to the genesis of the South Tyrol problem, the foreign minister pointed out that the Italian government, before the advent of the fascist, and also the king, had promised the inhabitants freedom of language, religion and culture. He insisted that Germany had no political interest in the problem, but merely a cultural one.

Deplores Newspaper Talk.

Deplored what he termed irresponsible newspaper utterances and the unauthorized attempts by small groups of Munich business to inaugurate a boycott of Italy, he stated that the government was unalterably opposed to such childish measures and was concerned in maintaining the best relations with Germany's neighbors.

He characterized Premier Mussolini's speech as filled with arrogance, contradictions and vehemence, which attempted to hide the inner weakness of his arguments.

"Mussolini Ungrateful."

He insisted that Mussolini, who had accepted German hospitality earlier

in his career, and now derided German tourists, was ungrateful.

Amid derisive laughter from the nationalist and communist department Dr. Stresemann said:

"Threats are incompatible with the spirit of the League of Nations."

When the laughter continued he repeated the sentence, emphatically: "Incidents such as this show more clearly than ever the need for the league, where those who desire peaceful progress can unite," he declared.

Tyrol Demands Appeal.

VIENNA, Feb. 10. — The provincial diet of Tyrol at Innsbruck adopted a resolution today demanding that the Austrian government appeal to the League of Nations against Premier Mussolini's "threat," referring to his speech of last Saturday on Italian-German relations.

Ponzi To Give Self Up To Hands Of Law Battle In Illinois

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Feb. 10. (AP)—Charles Ponzi is in Jacksonville and intends to give himself up at the sheriff's office as soon as he can retain counsel to defend him, friends of the "financial wizard" said today.

Ponzi was indicted by the county grand jury here yesterday on charges of violating the state law regulating business under a declaration of trust.

Some western critics gave Tim Lowrey the preference over Brown in Big Ten circles, while McMillen of Princeton was generally rated higher in the All-America selections.

In addition to being a great center, Brown was the ideal fighting captain, who inspired a never-say-die spirit that did much to make the 1925 Michigan team an outstanding eleven.

Coach Yost regards it as the best team he ever coached; quite some compliment when you consider the many famous teams he has turned out.

ALL-AMERICAN SELECTION Recently in discussing football with Coach George Little, who had such a big first year at Wisconsin, I brought up the play of Bob Brown.

Little, who formerly assisted Yost in football at Michigan, is familiar with the play of Vick and Blott and helped develop Bob Brown.

"To me Brown was the outstanding center of the Big Ten, if not the entire country," said Little.

"As a defensive player against the line attack and forward pass, Brown had no equal in the country."

"Brown's play and fighting spirit was the spark plug that made Michigan a great team. If I had been selecting an All-America team in the guise of writer, Bob Brown would have certainly been placed at center."

A SCHOOLBOY'S VOCABULARY

In a discussion of the use of slang by school children, an English instructor at a teacher's school declared that, "if we want our children to speak good English, they must obviously hear good English at home." No one must assume, however, that a child, just because he has heard correct English only, will speak correctly. He will make no mistake in the use of such concrete terms as "tree," or "man," but when he finds that "he" and "him" are applied to the same person, he will use the forms indifferently and is as likely to say "Him go" as "He goes." With this qualification, one must agree with the lecturer that the way to learn a language is to hear it. His only complaint is that the schoolboy learns two languages, one from his parents and another from his playmates. He is in fact bilingual, with one vocabulary for the street and another for the home. It is to the street lingo, with its slang, that his teachers object.

The exposure to such influences may not after all be serious or lasting. Then, there is the question what constitutes slang. "Bootlegger" was once so classed, but it now bids fair to become as permanent a possession of the language as "skyscraper," while similar words, as "speak-easy," "blind-tiger," and "hole-in-the-wall," which have dropped out of use, are undoubtedly slang. In most cases of this kind there is already a word in the language that would have expressed all the speaker wished to convey. Some years ago the word "ringer" was applied to any person very similar to another in appearance, as in the expression, "a dead ringer for so-and-so." It was connected somewhat with the verb "ring in," but there had always existed in the language the word "double" to express the same idea. The habitual user of slang may be accused of ignorance of his own language.

The claim that slang is more expressive than the ordinary word for the same notion is open to criticism. It is the nature of slang to be new and so not always clear to the one who hears it. He may be, like the compiler of a dictionary of slang who, read in an American newspaper that "a man seen out in the rain with a j-u-m-b-l-e" and defined the word "jag" as "a small umbrella." But it is probably this very novelty that appeals to the schoolboy.

Our soil is productive, but we can't get very far selling the raw product. The Harvest Queen Mill and Elevator company is an asset to Plainview. It has a pay roll. **FEDERAL OIL CONSERVATION MEN
RECEIVE LETTERS FROM LEADERS
IN INDUSTRY TO HELP IN WORK**

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. —The federal oil conservation board today received from leaders of the industry a final symposium of suggestions for preserving the nation's petroleum resources, preparatory to drafting its report to President Coolidge, who created the board.

Guided by Secretary Work's address as chairman of the board in which he said it was desired to know how oil deposits should be safeguarded through a national policy, spokesmen for several branches of the industry offered varied proposals including elimination of waste within the trade and the revision of affecting laws.

The conference which will conclude tomorrow, will close the board's long investigation of all phases of the industry. Cabinet members who department are concerned with use and conservation of oil in behalf of the nation have been assigned as chairmen of various meetings scheduled for the two days.

Secretary Work asked for opinions, "whether there is sound reason for presuming there is, or is not, an inexhaustible supply of petroleum in the United States; whether the industry and the government are true haste and waste and destroying our natural resources, whether consumption and production are economically regular, and as to other phases of the industry."

Leasing Acts Rapped

The secretary expressed disapproval of the oil leasing act of 1921, declaring it had resulted in exploitation and that two attempts to have it modified to vest discretion with the Secretary of Interior had failed.

Possibly of a petroleum shortage at any time unless present laws are changed was predicted by Henry L. Deberry of New York. He believed present production of petroleum is wasteful and in excess of real needs and that the case was the law permitting intensive individual development of pools. As a remedy he suggested adoption of the unit plan of oil pool development.

C. F. Kettering, General manager of the research division of the General Motors Corporation said that scientific researchers expect the automobile mileage per gallon might some time be multiplied three or four times, but he suggested development of fuels contains anti-knock compound so that more effective engines could be produced.

**NEW YORK STRUCK
BY HEAVY SNOW**

(By The Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. — New York's six million inhabitants were virtually snowbound today. The great city lay as a giant paralyzed as the second blizzard within a week disrupted train service, all but paralyzed surface and motor transportation and buffeted shipping within and without harbor.

At noon nine inches of snow had fallen since last night and the storm was raging more fiercely than ever with a 52 mile gale.

Blizzard Is General

The blizzard was general throughout approximately the same districts as those which were buried under the storm last week. Six persons were known to be dead; three members of the crew of the schooner Ralph Brown driven ashore near Gloucester, Mass.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (AP)—North-eastern United States, not yet dug out from under the snow banks left by last week's blizzard, today was swept by another storm of equal fury. Train schedules were disrupted and surface car and motor traffic was all but paralyzed.

Driving down on a northeast gale, the blinding wall of falling snow largely nullified efforts of thousands of men to clear streets and railways of the previous fall which already has cost millions of dollars.

The gale swept out to sea, piling up mountainous waves which hampered shipping along the North Atlantic. Wireless companies reported numerous calls from ships requesting radio compass bearings.

Stations and outlying villages were particularly hard hit, many being completely isolated.

Washington Snowbound
WASHINGTON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Eight and one half inches of snow today covered the streets of Washington, disrupting traffic and delaying thousands of persons in getting to their work. Stalled automobiles were scattered about waiting for a thaw.

Trains Are Stalled

NEW YORK, Feb. 10. (AP)—A score of railway trains were stalled in snow drifts, some of which were ten feet deep in the snowbound northeastern section of the United States this afternoon. Snow was still falling.

Eight trains were stalled in New England and a dozen more snowed in on Long Island. All schools in New York and many in surrounding states closed. County courts closed on Long Island.

CAMPAIGN IS OPEN FOR MORE HOGS IN COUNTY

The supply of hogs in Lubbock county is just about one-tenth of what it should be, in the opinion of Col. C. C. French, representative of the Fort Worth Stock Yards Company, who was here Monday for the luncheon when prize winners in the More Feed campaign were announced. Mr. French is an authority on hogs and their culture, has made a special study of hogs and baby beef, and claims the distinction of being the originator of baby beef clubs that are being sponsored by county agents and others throughout the state.

As a result of the visit of Mr. French here, the Lubbock chamber of commerce has joined in a movement to supply at least in a measure, this great need, and will receive applications from farmers throughout the county for the purchase of one or more hogs. The animals will be of a pure bred strain, and will be purchased especially for breeding purposes by Floyd Sherwood, manager of Armour and Company at Sioux City, Iowa. The hogs will cost Lubbock county farmers the actual market price plus a small charge for dipping, and freight charge of approximately \$2.50 a head, Mr. French said. The average weight of the gilts to be shipped here will be about 165 pounds, and the average price would be about \$25.

On the face of the fact that Texas ships in from other states nearly \$10,000,000 worth of pork and similar products each year, it seems that it is high time for farmers to awake to the opportunity with which they are gifted, Mr. French said, and he commented with the remark that as long as farmers apparently do not make any effort to feed themselves on the farm, they cannot hope to prosper.

Applications will be received at the chamber of commerce here and will be handled at absolutely no cost to the farmer or anyone else, but this is a step in the program of diversification urged by the organization. Any farmer may order any number of gilts but orders will be held until a car is filled. Cash must accompany the order or be available in a local bank at call of the chamber of commerce. The following application may be filled in and mailed to the Lubbock chamber of commerce by those who wish to take advantage of the opportunity.

For importation of high grade gilts selected, immunized and dipped (I or we), the undersigned, here make application for importation of _____ gilts to Lubbock as shown below, and understand that said gilts are to be shipped from Sioux City, Iowa to Lubbock, and that said gilts are to be selected grade gilts, being shipped especially for this importation movement from the very best gilts at Sioux City, and that the cost of same shall be the exact cost as marked on the day of purchase and it is understood that a charge of \$1.00 per hog is to be made for transportation against hog flu, hog cholera, hog pneumonia, and dipping, and that freight is to be paid by the undersigned at a cost of approximately \$2.50 per head.

Out of the past 22 days there has been only one day without rain in the midland and Southern districts has overflowed its banks. Many thousands of acres of ground and parts of several towns are flooded, stopping street car traffic. The weather indications continue to be for rain.

Shannon Is Up
BELFAST, Feb. 10. (AP)—The flooded river Shannon now is three miles wide in places and its tributaries also are greatly swollen. Boat traffic continues to be a regular feature of the flooded areas.

a resolution offered by Connelley ousting Blayney as the administrative head of the school, failed of passage two to three. Connelley, Deagan, and Mrs. Capps voted for this resolution and Fitzgerald, Mrs. Turner and Mrs. Joseph voting against it.

Blayney is Defended. Defending Dr. Blayney, Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald, as soon as the resolutions were announced, declared that he wanted "the world to know, and I ask the press to state, that Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald refuses to counter-act or support by acquiescence or otherwise any resolution which humiliates a gallant soldier of America who was one of the first men in Texas to fight for the civil and religious liberties of humanity."

Fitzgerald's declaration brought on remarks from other members of the board, Mrs. Capps declaring that some of the resolutions adopted recently by women's clubs, especially the Fort Worth association of university women were "disgraceful" and "insulting."

Mrs. Joseph, in presenting the name of Dean Hubbard, praised him as an educator, praised his personality, his tact and his scholarship, and read a letter from President W. M. W. Spohn of the University of Texas, in which the board was urged to elect the University man. Dr. Spohn's letter cited five reasons for Hubbard's election, mentioning his educational qualifications, including a master of arts degree from the University of Texas, a candidacy for a doctor's degree, his private life, his membership in the Episcopal church, and at the foot that he was "instrumental in founding the Rotary club at Belton," his experience in school work and "ability to work with people and to get cooperation from both faculty and students," and the further fact that he is assisted by Mrs. Hubbard, a charming woman, a Virginian by birth, who has lived in Texas some 15 years.

GENEVA, Feb. 10. (AP)—Germany has launched her great peace offensive in Geneva.

League Application In. Following his reichstag speech, in which he interpreted Premier Mussolini's recent address on the Southern Tyrol question as a threat against Germany and Austria, foreign minister Stresemann, today made formal application for Germany's admission to the league of nations.

Everything indicates that Germany will utilize the league to the greatest extent possible to secure advancement of the German ideas and German interest that she believes are legitimate.

Attached to the application was a copy of the note agreed upon at the Locarno conference giving the Allied interpretation of article 16 of the league covenant as affecting Germany, and agreeing that her obligations under the article would be tempered to conform with her partial disarmament and geographic situation.

Friday's special session of the league council will probably convene a league assembly for the election of Germany on March 2.

GERMAN-ITALIAN RUMORS MANY

LONDON, Feb. 10. (AP)—Added interest has been given the German-Italian situation by a Rome report that the Italian ambassador has left Germany.

There is no confirmation of the report. Much interest was evidenced in political quarters over the utterance yesterday of Dr. Stresemann, particularly with reference to Premier Mussolini's speech Saturday as being fit for the "vulgarity of mass meetings, filled with arrogance, contradictions and immoderate language. More than passing attention was given to the foreign minister's statement that while Germany had no political interest in the problem in Southern Tyrol, she had a cultural interest there.

Suspecting a plot by Bavarians for armed rebellion, Fascist troops have made fifty arrests and seized arms and ammunition in the former Austrian territory of Trentino.

ROME, Feb. 10. (AP)—Premier Mussolini spent the greater part of the night preparing the speech he will deliver in the senate this afternoon or tomorrow in reply to the German foreign minister's address on Italy-German relations and the situation in the Southern Tyrol.

Official circles predict that Mussolini's speech will constitute one of the most important decisions of Italy's international policy since the advent of the fascists regime.

DALLAS BARBECUE STOCK IS BEING PREPARED

DALLAS, Texas, Feb. 9. (AP)—The fattest calves now are being prepared for the Southwest's greatest barbecue which will be served members of the American Medical association at its national convention here in April.

Seven tons of meat to feed 10,000 doctors is to be prepared. Out on the Staked Plains of Texas 80 pure blooded beavers are being nursed and fed a diet that will turn them into the most succulent of steaks. Down on a farm in Navarro county 20 cords of hickory and pecan wood is being seasoned for the fire over which the meat will sizzle. This wood gives the beef a much desired flavor.

From his herd of 20,000, Dr. John H. Dean of Dallas, has selected 80 cows and calves and has turned them into a separate pasture where the grass is knee deep. The calves will not be weaned, because the milk is adding to the succulence of the meat. Their mothers are being fed sorghum and cottonseed cake, and by the time the baby beavers are dressed it is expected they will weigh 500 pounds each.

Ten days before the date of the barbecue, April 20, the calves will be shipped to Dallas, slaughtered and placed at once in cold storage. The meat will be cooked in especially constructed pits at Fair Park, and an expert staff of barbecue chefs, aided by ten carvers and 80 waiters, will cook and serve the meat.

Shooting Reports Untrue, Say Local Undertakers Today
