## Farm Bureau Convention At Dickens School Tonight

### Resolution, Election On Tonite's Agenda

Tonight at 7:30 the Dickens County Farm Bureau will open its annual convention to adopt resolutions pertaining to the Dickens County farm family and its relationship to state and national legislation.

Also at the meeting new directors will be elected and any other business tended to that duly comes before the meeting. The resolutions passed at tonight's meeting will be sent to the state convention in Galveston next month. It is by all the counties sending such resolutions that the state resolutions are formulated for state legislation and for the national Farm Bureau.

**Drive Now Underway**  
The annual Farm Bureau membership drive is now underway in the county, having started last Friday. Students from the five high schools are helping in the drive aimed at contacting everyone in the county who is in any way connected with agriculture.

C. W. Nickels, president of the Dickens County Farm Bureau, urges everyone interested in agriculture, whether a bureau member or not, to attend the meeting. He adds that it is the most important meeting of the year for the farmer as far as the local voice in state and national agriculture legislation is concerned.

## Free Chest X-Ray Offered

### Glenn Is Registrar For Draft Board

Bill L. Glenn of Spur has been appointed registrar for the Kent-Dickens-Stonewall county draft board in the Spur area.

Boys who reach the age of 18 can register in Spur by calling on Mr. Glenn at the City Hall.

A registrar is maintained in the area so that men will not have to travel to the draft board office at Jayton.

A local board is maintained for the three-county area because one board can take care of the work. The state director of Selective Service says that "a board in each county in many areas would prove to be a waste of government money."

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director of the draft system, expressed public appreciation of the services of Mr. Glenn.

"People of the Spur area should appreciate the service he renders to them," General Wakefield said, "as he is doing this work without pay as a public service to his country."

All males are required to register under the draft law on their 18th birthday or within five days thereafter. Maximum penalties that can be applied for failure to register are \$10,000 fine, or five years in prison, or both.

### HD Clubs Sponsoring Free Health Service Friday, Saturday, Monday

Every Dickens county 15 years of age or over will have an opportunity this week end to have a chest x-ray made for free.

The State Health Department's mobile x-ray unit will be in Spur Friday, Saturday and Monday, Oct. 29, 30 and Nov. 2, under the local sponsorship of the Dickens County Home Demonstration club. The ladies of the club will supply the clerical helpers and assist in other ways while the unit is here.

The x-rays are to be made at the Godfrey Motor Company's show room from 8:30 a. m. until 5 p. m. the three days. It has been requested that the residents of Spur have their x-rays made on Friday if possible to leave Saturday and Monday open for the rural people.

The free service is made available to the public as a means of detecting lung and heart disorders and diseases in their early stages. The people who are x-rayed will not be notified if there is no sign of disease in

case an x-ray shows a disorder, the person's own doctor will be notified, who will in turn notify the person.

It is pointed out that to have the x-ray made no disrobing or further examination is required. The entire procedure takes only a matter of minutes.

## PLAN STARTED TO FINANCE COUNTY AGENTS, TRAPPER

### GROUP TUESDAY NIGHT DONATES \$370 TO START SALARY FUND

The persistence of Dickens county in insisting that the Extension Service and trapper be retained in the county took a positive and definite step this week as a fund was started to pay the wages of the county agricultural agent, home demonstration agent and trapper for at least six months.

At a precinct 3 meeting held in Spur Tuesday night the fund got underway with \$370 being donated by the approximately

20 families represented. By yesterday the fund had jumped to \$470.

Tuesday's meeting was called in Spur to discuss just what could be done to retain the three county employees that had been fired by the commissioners court because of lack of funds.

Jim Barron acted as chairman of the meeting. The two definite actions taken were the starting of the Extension Service & Trapper Fund, and the agree-

ment that the commissioners court be petitioned to call a county-wide election to definitely reveal the wishes of the majority in the county.

It was pointed out in the meeting that the commissioners would be necessary. These included an overall cut in county salaries (the commissioners gave themselves a raise just two years ago); and the issuance of script

until the time when tax rates now applying to bonds nearing maturity could be applied to a bond issue to cover the script. No action was taken one way or the other by the group concerning a write-in campaign against Commissioner Arner Watson.

A spokesman from precinct 1 told the group, however, that an active write-in campaign against Commissioner Roy Ward is being organized. Horace Nichols was reported as being the write-in candidate in that precinct.

The Extension Service & Trapper Fund was started on the assumption that such a method of paying the salaries would be satisfactory with the Extension Service. District Agent Scofield of Vernon was in Spur yesterday and said that the details and requirements of such a plan were forthcoming from College Station.

## Bulldogs Win District Opener On 1st Downs

### General Election Is Tues., Nov. 2

Tuesday, Nov. 2, is General Election Day in Dickens County, the state and the nation.

Of primary, and in general, singular interest to most voters of the county will be the state constitutional amendments. Only four Republicans and one Communist Party candidates appear on the two-foot-long ballots, along with the Democratic nominees and the eleven proposed constitutional amendments.

Supt. Cook states that several conditions have prevented having the carnival down town. Among the things he mentioned are the cold weather, the crowded conditions—both cars and people—in the down town area due to the fall rush, the failure to secure a suitable trailer for the beauty contest, etc.

"We hope and trust that we will get the cooperation of our people as we are only trying to help give our children something to do on Hallowe'en night," states Cook. "Also, all the money that is made in high school goes to the respective classes, and in the grade schools the money goes into their general fund to be used as the faculty sees fit to improve their program," adds Cook.

Reports going around town had it that the game went on the district records as a tie and a winner would be declared on first downs only if to establish a district champion. However, Coach Sam Hawkes states that according to the district 5AA rules, Spur actually won the game regardless of how the two teams end up the season. Post also won their game over Tahoka by the same rule. This game also ended in a 13-13 deadlock.

### Duck Creek Soil Conservation District News Notes

During last week's regular monthly meeting of the Board of Supervisors, officers were elected for the coming year. They include E. F. Shugart, chairman; Charles P. Witt, vice-chairman; and Giles McCroy, secretary.

In combining the wind erosion problem facing our district, the supervisors urge that operators of our lands maintain as much stubble on top of the soil as possible both crops and native grass or weeds. On cotton stubble land that is subject to blowing, they urge that action be taken to get the land in a rough cloddy condition, which can be accomplished in most instances, by using a chisel or sub-soil type plow in the cotton molders.

The recent rain helped fall planted cover crops of small grains and mixtures of small grain and vetch. Many district cooperators took advantage of the moisture to plant cover crops on their cotton plow land which was subject to surface blowing if it had been left without cover.

Cecil Estep, district cooperator near Highway is still receiving benefits from the growing of rye and vetch as a soil improver. ing crop on some of his poorest land. Better soil conditions, less blowing, and increased yields have resulted from his eight years experience in growing rye and vetch.

Homer Hill, who operated the Lillian Dickson Farm, has inter-planted grain sorghum stubble with small grain in an effort to combat blowing this winter and spring.

SCS technicians note that blue panic grass had made a very good recovery since the recent rains. Although many cooperators had their blue panic washed out or covered up during the spring rains they have observed the grass enough to recognize it's value in this area as a grazing crop and soil builder and thus are planning to replant next spring.



## "TANGANYIKA" ERUPTS SAVAGE AFRICAN JUNGLE ADVENTURE

"Tanganyika" opens on a note of sheer savagery and never once wavers from its dedicated course. As a result, this thrilling Universal-International adventure delivers a veritable eruption of pulse-pounding excitement to the audience at the Palace Theatre, where it opens Wednesday with Van Heflin, Ruth Roman and Howard Duff in starring roles.

Combining the fury of man, beast and nature in a series of brushes with death and disaster, the story is set in the darkest jungles of East Africa and narrates the story of one man's battle against a mysterious terror that has torn Tanganyika territory apart.

Heflin, vigorous, virile and vicious when he has to be, dominates "Tanganyika" as the hunter obsessed with ridding his land of terror. Ruth Roman, prim at the start, unbends with the rigors of the trek and the encounters with peril and matches Heflin's courage and strength with her own. Duff is a perfect balance to Heflin with his portrayal of a man of mystery. And in Jeff Morrow, who plays the white master of the Nkumbi, and fourth Thursday of each month through January, 1955.

Lice give livestock the most trouble during the fall and winter months. They are busy now. Don't let these pests rob you of livestock profits for they can be controlled either by spraying or dipping.

Good land preparation, fertilization based on soil test and planting the right corn hybrid are credited with being major contributors to San Jacinto county's top corn yield for 1954. Wade Parker used Texas Hybrid 30, 200 pounds of 16-10-0 at planting time and 100 pounds of ammonium sulfate as a side dressing and harvested 91 bushels of corn an acre.

There is still time to plant winter legumes in Texas. Properly fertilized and inoculated legumes literally are "on-the-farm" nitrogen factories. They will also provide soil cover when it is badly needed.

The application of plenty of the right kind of fertilizer will materially increase the value of small grain pastures.

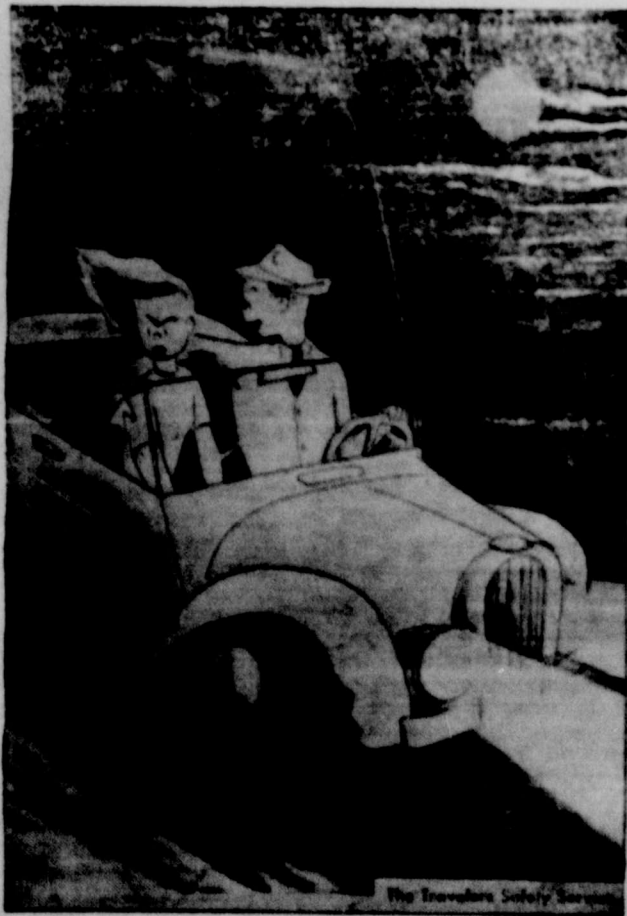

## EMERGENCY, SPECIAL, REGULAR LOANS AVAILABLE TO FARMERS THRU FHA, SAYS STATE DIRECTOR

Texas farmers can obtain three types of operating loans from the Farmers Home Administration, Walter T. McKay, Texas State Director, said recently. The credit is available immediately and can be used to finance current farm and living expenses as well as the production of next year's crops.

The three kinds of operating loans are emergency loans, special livestock loans, and regular production and subsistence loans. The production and subsistence loans are made only to operators of family-type farms. The emergency and livestock loans are made to operators of family-type farms and other farmers and ranchers as well. All of the loans are made only to farmers who are unable to obtain the credit from other sources.

The regular production and subsistence loans help small farmers to improve their farming operations. These loans may

be made to buy farm and home equipment, feed, seed, lime and fertilizer, and to pay other farm operating and family living expenses.

There is a statutory limit of \$7,000 on each production and subsistence loan and the total outstanding debt for these loans cannot exceed \$10,000. Repayments are based on the income received each year after reasonable expenses are met. In no case may the loan run for more than 7 years.

When the main purpose of the production and subsistence loan is to improve the farmer's operations, a limited amount of funds may be included to refinance debts secured by liens on livestock and farm equipment.

Special livestock loans are made to producers and feeders of cattle, sheep, and goats, except commercial feed lot operators. These loans are made to

meet unusual expenses necessary to successful livestock operations, such as the purchasing or production of feed, and replacing, hiring, or repairing farm machinery and equipment. Live-stock loans are not made to expand operations or to pay existing debts, except incidental current bills.

Livestock loans are made for periods up to 3 years. Any balance remaining on these loans after the three years are serviced for collection based on the repayment ability of the borrower. Other creditors are not asked to subordinate their liens, but are expected to stand by and to agree that a reasonable part of the applicant's normal income from livestock can be used in repaying the loan.

Emergency loans are made to farmers and ranchers who because of losses suffered from the drought or local economic conditions need credit to continue their operations.

These loans may be used for

the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, machinery repair, replacement of equipment, and for other essential farm and home operating expenses. Emergency loans may not be made to pay existing debts. Ordinarily emergency loans to meet current operating expenses are expected to be repaid out of the year's income. Repayment on advances for other purposes are scheduled in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay.

It is not the policy of the Farmers Home Administration to foreclose on borrowers because of their inability to make payments when the payments are due, except where there appears to be absolutely no chance of the borrower's future success or where a borrower has violated the terms of his loan agreement.

There is no limit set by law on the amount that a farmer or rancher can borrow under the special livestock and emergency

loan program. The amount that can be borrowed under these programs is determined by the farmer's needs and his ability to repay. No loan is made unless it appears that an applicant has reasonable prospects for success.

For each loan made, the Government obtains the best security available including a first lien on all crops to be produced with the loan and on all livestock and farm machinery purchased with the loan.

While special livestock and emergency loans cannot be used to refinance existing debts, the loans can include funds to pay interest on existing chattel and real estate debts and to pay creditors for the annual depreciation on chattels serving as security for the loans. In addition, local businessmen who are creditors benefit from loan funds used to purchase local supplies and services.

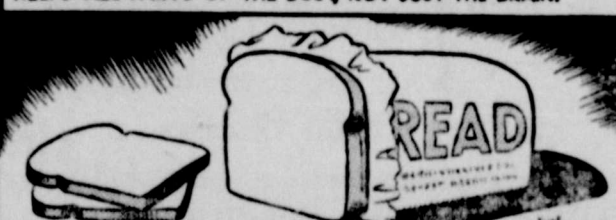
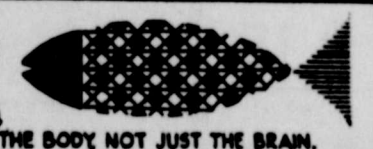

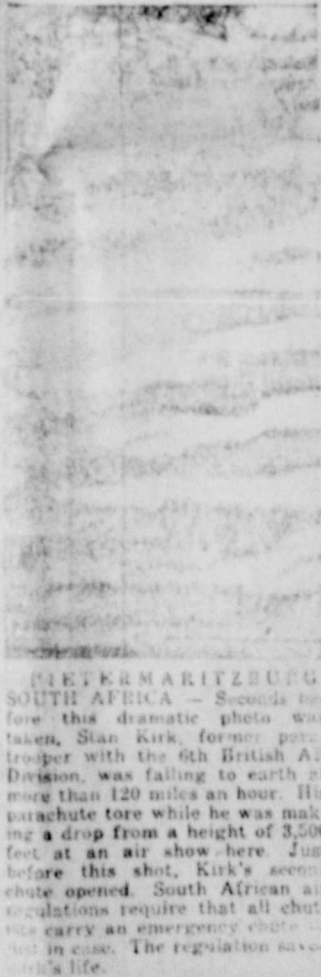

### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

While RR stands for railroad, in Washington it also stands for Randall Report.

Many believe Randall Report is attempt to Rail Road through Congress final destruction of U. S. Protective Tariff laws.

Much fuzzy oratory will be unleashed incorporating economic theories, philosophies, theories on universal brotherhood, perhaps even Yogiism. It will be confusing to follow.

Already confusion has been created. For example, some farm spokesmen claim that tariff abolition will give foreigners dollars needed to buy U. S. farm products.

Perhaps some facts should be injected into all the fantasy. Between 1949 and 1950, due to war conditions, trade figures mean nothing. But immediate prewar and postwar years in Commerce Dept. records are revealing.

For example, in 1930 U. S. exported \$289,500,000 worth of finished foodstuffs, imported \$200,000,000 worth. In same year imports of crude foodstuffs totaled \$289,125,000, exports \$175,255,000. Even this left a combined trade deficit of \$200 1/2 million.

But that was peanuts compared to what happened when protection, creating reciprocal trade treaties got underway. By 1933 imports of manufactured foodstuffs totaled \$518,000,000, exports \$497,511,000. Crude foodstuffs imports totaled \$323,227,000 and exports dropped to \$58,751,000 leaving a trade deficit balance in food of over \$400 million.

At war's end, this trend continued. By 1953 finished food imports

climbed to \$808,423,000 with exports only \$682,412,000. Crude foodstuffs imports climbed to \$1,749,505,000, with exports totalling \$759,752,000, leaving a deficit in the balance of trade on foodstuffs of \$1,783,823,000. In 1952 the deficit was \$1,954,492,000.

It is also evident that large share of lost export farm market is not due to lack of dollars in foreign nations, but rather to their own increased productivity, substantially financed by U. S. aid programs.

For example, canned and dried fruit exports was once big volume business. In 1935, typical prewar year, 7,700,000 cases of canned fruit were exported. In 1952 exports totalled 2,500,000 cases. In immediate prewar years dried fruit exports averaged 500,000 tons. Postwar average 104,000 tons.

Here are interesting figures. In past 10 years foreign orange production has increased 19 1/2%. U. S. increase is less than 1 1/2%. In past 10 years, British Commonwealth alone has increased canned fruit production from 6,212,000 cases to 15,379,000 cases, an increase of 500%.

Records of 20 years of reciprocal trade treaties show U. S. farmer has in peacetime, suffered by tariff tampering, and has only survived by yoke of price supports and subsidies imposed on necks of all Americans. In meantime, imports of manufactured goods produced by cheap labor in foreign plants of U. S. firms has steadily increased.

So they now say in some Washington quarters that if present tariff wrecking drive succeeds, the Bureau of Indian Affairs should be combined with the Agriculture Department, so that Ezra Benson can be in charge of all the vanishing Americans.

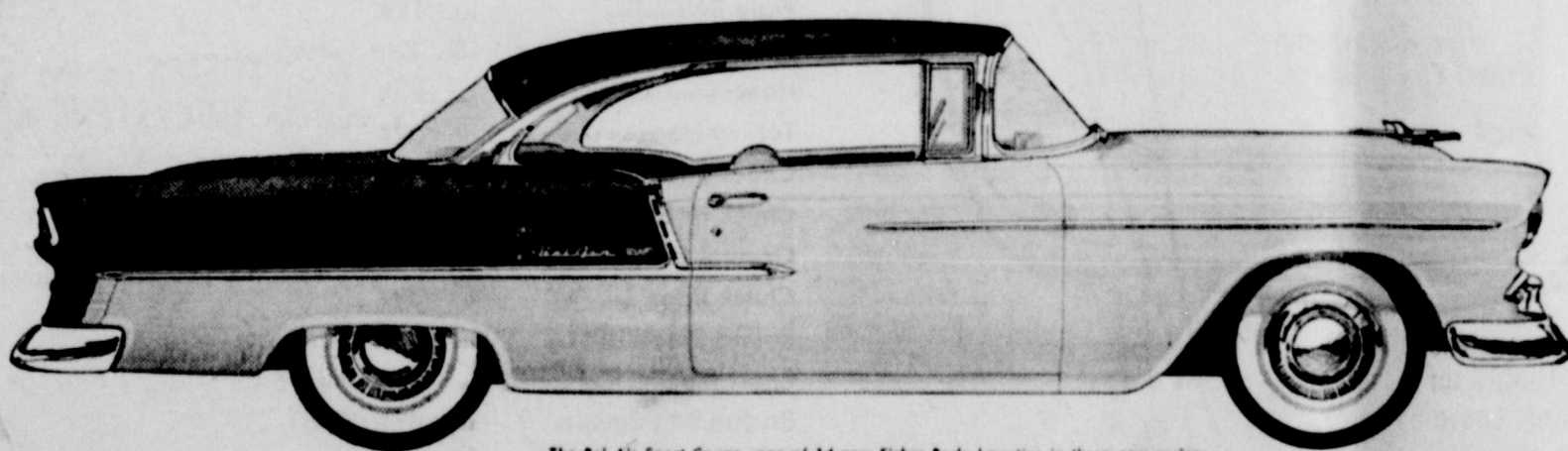
