



Wheel Of Jury Fortune

Wheel Turns Out Juries Clerk Prepares Voter Names For Drawings

There's a smallish brown contraption, made of steel, that's going to have a definite impact at Mitchell County Courthouse.

Its appearance is something like a container for drawing numbers in a giveaway drawing or a game of bingo.

But this will be for a different type of drawing--pulling names of prospective court jurors.

The jury wheel comes officially to Mitchell County through recent state legislation specifically repealed the jury commissioner system of picking prospective jurors.

The new legislation repeals all laws regulating the formation and functioning of jury commissions, according to Texas Attorney General Crawford Martin.

Martin's legal ruling particularly affects Texas counties like Mitchell which have less than 10,000 population.

Mitchell and these other counties under 10,000 have been using the jury commission system--a system by which an appointed commission of citizens selects the names of persons who will be called as potential jurors as court cases require.

Members of the commission are appointed by the presiding judge with the assistance of the sheriff. And the commission select prospective petit jurors from sources such as property tax roll, voter list,

telephone book and previous jury lists.

But there is a process of "selection", whether in a degree of minimum or maximum. And with the wheel will erase this selective procedure.

Only in the case of grand jury selection will the commission process continue.

With the jury wheel, the names of every qualified voter within the county will be placed in the container. And prospective jurors will be drawn from this pool of names as the need arises.

Under the new law the jury wheel must be filled with the

names of registered voters between Aug. 1 and Aug. 15.

The brown steel wheel has already been purchased and delivered to the Courthouse here. And names are being typed now on small rectangles of paper to be placed into the container.

Size of the Mitchell County wheel will allow for 6,000 names to be placed in wheel. But the current voter list which District Clerk Bill Erwin is typing onto jury wheel slips numbers 3,452.

Sometime during the period of Aug. 1 - Aug. 15 the law will require District Clerk Erwin, County Tax Assessor-Col-

lector Montie Hardegree, Sheriff Lewis Claxton and County Clerk Marie Bassham (or represented by their deputies) to put the names of all the registered voters into the new jury wheel.

After the names of all registered voters--each on the same size paper slip--are placed in the wheel's cylinder, the two locks on the cylinder door will be locked.

Sheriff Claxton will keep one key and District Clerk Erwin will keep the other.

These 2 officials--district clerk and sheriff--will turn the jury wheel, mixing the names

thoroughly, draw the names, then notify the prospective jurors as the courts issue jury calls.

Because new law allows the voting by 18, 19 and 20 year olds, names of these youths who have registered to vote will be included in the jury wheel. However, the attorney general has ruled that this does not interfere with the law that requires persons sitting on juries to be 21 years of age.

So, although an 18-year-old person's name may be drawn as a prospective juror, he still will be excluded from jury service until otherwise changed by law or court decisions.

Museum Attendance Up It Will Be Open Every Day Now

Is Colorado City Historical Museum attracting attention?

In less than 10 months 6,138 visitors have registered at the museum.

The count is included in a report from the museum committee to City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. and City Council.

Since the museum opened last October in its newly remodeled home at corner of West Third and Oak, across street from City Hall, until July 20, the

6,138 visitors had registered, according to J. Ralph Lee, museum committee chairman.

Because of the increasing number of museum visitors, the facility will be open every day now until school starts.

That's a 7-day per week operation for the museum, Monday through Sunday, with weekday hours from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. For Sunday, the museum will open at 12 noon following church and will remain open un-

til the 5 p.m. closing time.

Actual attendance at the museum has been considerable more than the 6,138 visitors registered from October to July 20. The count reported by the committee is only for those persons who take the time to register. Numerous persons visiting the museum do not register and are not included in the count.

Registration for almost 2 years at the museum--from Aug. 16, 1969, until July 20,

1971--includes a wide representation of Texas and the nation.

A total of 176 towns and cities within Texas are represented by the visitors. In addition to Texas, they have come from 42 different states.

Eight foreign countries also are included in the list of registered visitors--Mexico, Germany, Canada, France, England, Scotland, Guatemala and Costa Rica.

It's Concrete--- But Productive

Watermelons out of concrete during a drought year? If you don't think so, then take a look at the concrete slab at Farmers Gin & Supply on the South Side.

Spreading in 3 directions across the 21 by 18-foot slab and down its 42-inch side wall is a healthy watermelon vine (bottom photo).

Three green melons, each between 18 and 30 inches long, are nestled in the northwest area of the vine (shown in left photo). Smaller melons are on the opposite end of the vine, near the gin building. On ground at the bottom of the concrete ramp are more smaller melons.

All come from the main vine that climbed out of a crack in the thick concrete.

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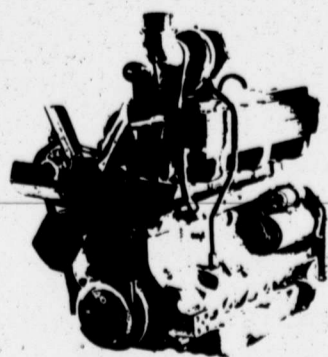

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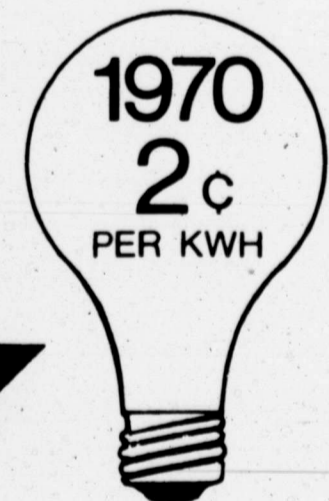
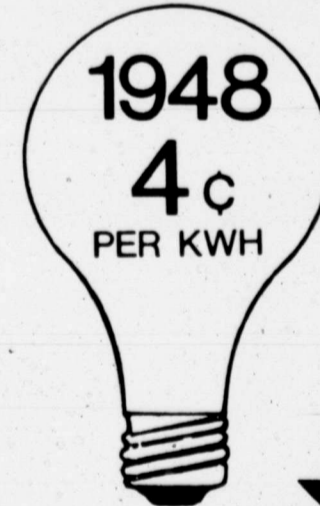
