SEVEN BILLS BY
GRAND JURY

While the number of indictments returned by the grand jury which adjourned Friday afternoon is a little above the average for Runnels county, the report of the grand jury speaks well for the county, and shows that crime here is held to a minimum.

The grand jury returned seven indictments, six of which were for felony charges. In its report the body says:

"We have carefully investigated all alleged violations of the law which have been presented to us by the officers and other citizens of the county. We have examined thirty-nine witnesses, and found seven true bills of which number six are felonies and one a misdemeanor.

"We have visited the jail and find same kept in a clean and sanitary way and no complaints were received from the prisoners as to their treatment. We find that there is some repair badly needed in way of making cells more secure and re-adjustment of cell openings, and we recommend that if possible, some means of heating other than the use of an oil stove be installed in what is termed the lunatic compartment, and that a suitable floor covering be provided for this compartment.

"We desire to compliment the custodian of the court house for his efficient service in taking care of the grounds and building which we find in very orderly condition.

"We find that our peace officers have been very diligent in the discharge of their duties and have spent much time in trying to curb violations of our liquor laws. They have met with many difficulties in regard to enforcing these laws and we want to urge our citizenship as a whole to lend their best efforts in assisting our officers in any way possible, that our county may in the future be free of bootleggers and their wares than it has been in the past.

"We have received a report from all of our county officers and desire to thank each of them

for filing these reports promptly and in the good order they appeared.

"It has been gratifying to us to note the sincere interest and careful work of our county attorney, Mr. C. P. Shepherd, and our sheriff, Mr. Jim P. Flynt, in presenting matters before this body. These officers have saved us no little time and work by having the cases presented us in well prepared form.

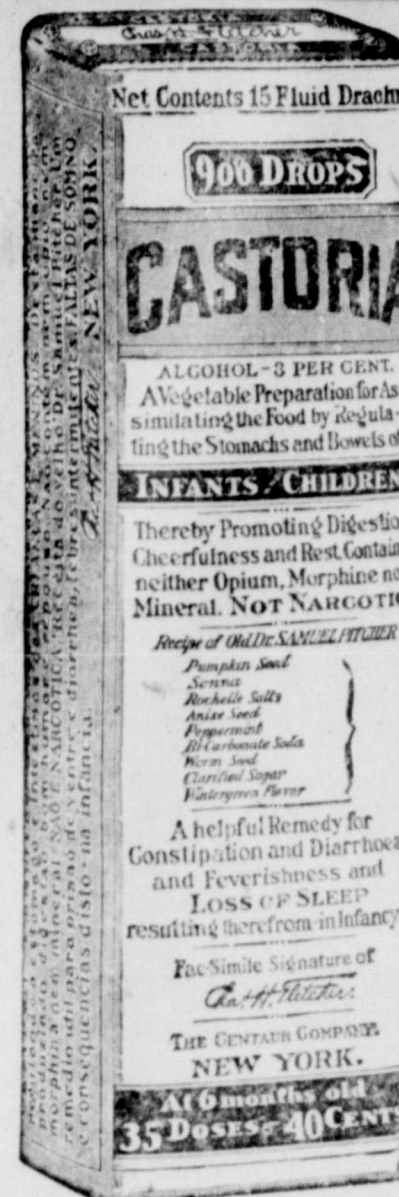
the waterfront, according to L. D. McMaster, secretary of the Galveston Commercial Association.

HOW LONG IRRIGATION DITCH LASTS, DISCUSSED

(By Associated Press)

EL PASO, Jan. 6.—How long a good, well built, irrigation ditch will last is hard to tell, according to officials of the United States Reclamation Service. Irrigation ditches have been used in the Rio Grande valley for centuries and are still good for many years more, they say.

Aequia Madre, the "Mother Ditch," or canal, near this city was built in 1680, and is still in use, according to L. R. Flock, assistant engineer of the reclamation service.

"A score of other ditches a few miles from here have been in use for 200 years or more, and one of the main canals, which runs partly thru the residence district of El Paso is more than 100 years old.

"Ditches in Juarez, just across the Rio Grande from here, which fill all the ditches, are just as old, and most of them are even older than the ones on the American side of the river," he said.

"Ditches are named after saints and animals, as a rule. 'Turtle,' 'Snake,' 'Cat,' 'Tree,' are some of them. One group of ditches is called 'The Three Saints.'"

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY WILL DISTRIBUTE BIBLES

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The 1923 budget of the American Bible Society for the translation, publication and distribution of Bibles will be \$1,160,000, an increase of \$40,000 over 1922, Frank H. Mann, General Secretary, announced today.

Estimated requirements totalled \$1,405,244, but a cut of \$244,467 was made because income for the full amount was not in sight.

The amount voted will be used in furnishing the Scriptures in more than 150 languages and dialects in practically every country of the world.

TO BUILD NEW DORMI- TORY AT SIMMONS

(By Associated Press)

ABILENE, Jan. 6.—Construction of the new men's dormitory at Simmons College, which will replace Cowden Hall, destroyed by fire May 14, 1922, will begin soon, with possible completion for the opening of the fall term next September, according to President Sandefer. The total cost of the building, he said, will be \$150,000. It will be constructed on the same order as the \$300,000 structure for men completed at Baylor University last year. The three floors will be divided into suites, he said, each suite having a shower bath and outside entrance.

Those who do not have clothing to contribute and wish to help are of buying clothing, as the money requested to give money instead can be used to a better advantage in supplying the clothing, bedding, etc. The home lost \$75,000, and such things as are necessary to take care of the 266 boys who were burned out of house and home will be appreciated.

FIRST 1923 SNAKE STORY A BIG ONE

The Democrat-Voice says that A. K. Wesley, W. D. Burkett, C. G. Burkett, Oscar Burkett, Joe and Jasper Burkett, W. O. Harwell, H. J. McFerrin, John and Sam Arrowood, went hunting last Sunday, just to close the old year, and raided two snake dens. One of the dens delivered up 36 rattlesnakes and the other 98 rattlesnakes, and the job was handled without any snake medicine.

NEGRO ROAD HAND IS KILLED AT COLEMAN

COLEMAN, Jan. 6.—J. L. Jackson, a negro road hand, was crushed to death Thursday afternoon at two o'clock on Hord's Creek on the Abilene crossing North of Coleman when a pit being excavated for a bridge caved in. The negro with other hands was working in an eighteen foot pit, when the foreman observed the danger and gave the warning of a cave in. All the hands escaped from the pit except the one negro. One other negro was caught by the avalanche of dirt and buried from his waist down. Had he been a second delayed in getting out of the pit he would have been crushed also.
