Garageman Begins Career As A Boy Helping Dad

James Jackson was just a little boy when he first became interested in helping out at his father's place of business, Hi-Way Garage. James' dad, the late J.C. Jackson, purchased the garage business along with the late Homer Winnett from Hooks Beavers in the very early 50's.

Originally called Hart Garage, Hi-Way Garage was located on the Plainview Highway just west of Bob's Farm Supply until about five years ago.

Beginning his mechanic's training by "washing parts," James recalls he graduated into the more difficult work of overhauling generators and working on starters. He doesn't recall when he made that step up in responsibility.

James says he never gave very much thought to going into any other line of work. He became a full time mechanic after graduation from high school.

Laughing, he remembers getting to work very early one morning and completing two or three things.

"Then I found out I'd done them wrong and they had to be done over. I thought I knew it all but I found out I sure didn't."

Even veteran mechanics learn something every day, he believes. "You just don't get too old to learn something."

When there's time to spare, and the mechanics have little leisure time in an agricultural area, James enjoys working on

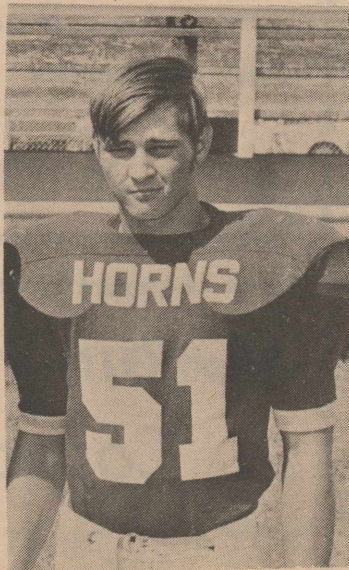

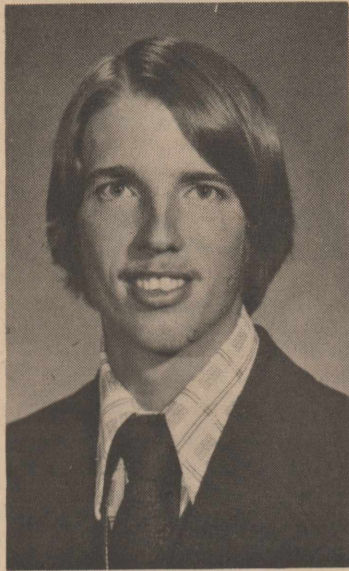

a prize possession—a 1929 Ford pickup.

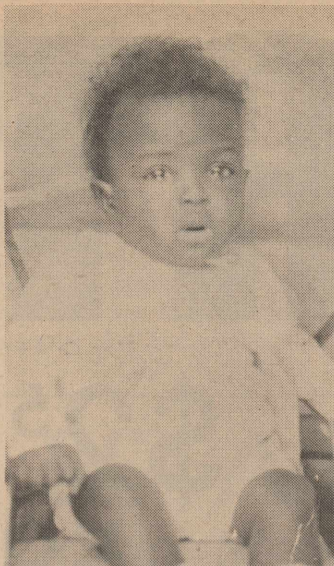

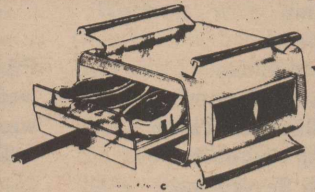
