## Deport Council Working On Handicapped Ramps, Sewer Lines

The Deport City Council attended to several items of business Monday night, including a continued study on equipping main street with wheel chair ramps. Hayter Engineering will be looking into the matter for the city.

The problem is complicated because of the height of the sidewalks in Deport, and the fact that the State Department of Highways cannot allow ramps to extend out into their right of way.

Hayter Engineering's proposal for the Water Line grant was approved, and the firm will also be checking into the matter of a Flow Meter.

The revised time sheet was ac-

cepted instead of a time clock.

The council decided to pay for the ball park lights as long as baseball season is in, and to gravel the road and clean out the ditch.

It was decided that a sewer line on Evans Street will be placed on property behind the house of Gerald Enox's rent house.

The audit was accepted, and it was decided to finish carpeting City Hall. A motion was made and carried to run a sewer line up to the property line of Roy IWhite.

Drawing was held for placement on the election ballots, with the results reading "1. Rhonda Burns, 2.

Judy Whittle, 3. Eric Pearson, 4. John Lee Roach, 5. Nancy Gresham.

Beepers will be leased for City of Deport employees so that they can be contacted during times when they are out of the office on jobs.

The council decided to pay a portion of the Mayor's expenses for trips to NARC meetings June 15-19 to Atlanta City and May 1st, 2nd to Texas A&M.

The city also decided that they will be contacting car dealerships to get bids for a new city pickup truck.

In executive session the council decided that employees of ten years or more be given 3 weeks of vacation.

## Pfc. Brad Farris Visits With Students

PFC Brad Farris, who has relatives who attend Deport schools, visited with the fifth grade Tuesday morning.

Attired in combat fatigues, he was deluged with questions concerning his experiences in combat.

PFC Farris when asked if he was ever scared, grinned and replied "Yes, there were two days there when I didn't think I'd ever see Texas again".

Pfc. Farris continued telling the children about sleeping in a fox hole, and what it was like to do a parachute

jump. He described artillery fire, and the Iraqi prisoners of war he saw.

He expressed to the children just how much their letters meant to him, and to all the other servicemen who received them during the conflict.

The worst thing about the war, he said, was that a country had to be nearly destroyed because of one man.

The children then looked at the pictures he brought with him that he had taken during the conflict.

## Board Sets Substitute Salaries

Establishment of substitute salaries and sick leave pay for retiring teachers headed the list on the agenda of the Prairiland CISD school board Monday night.

The board voted to pay each retiring teacher at the rate of \$30 per day for each day of sick leave that had earned and accumulated while teaching at Prairiland school.

Superintendent Max Ballard stated that "the board believes this will be an incentive to encourage teachers to be in school so that substitutes won't have to be hired while they are out".

The substitute salary was schedule for \$32 per day for 7 one half hours work and custodial substitutes set at \$34 per day for eight hours of work. This was amended to reflect the minimum wage increase.

The board passed a resolution which will allow purchasing in co-operation with Region VIII Service

Center in regards to buying computer items and other education supplies. This will allow the school to purchase some items cheaper.

The Career Ladder Committee was appointed. It consists of Dr. Richard Nash, Dr. L.C. Stout and Dr. Gary Ballard.

The board authorized Superintendent Max Ballard to let bids on a 15 passenger van.

They also amended the budget to allow for the purchase of a new school bus.

During the meeting they discussed various summer maintenance and renovation projects that may take place at all three campuses.

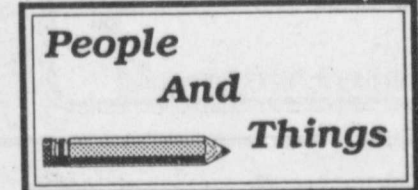
Superintendent Ballard gave the finance and tax reports and discussed the pending finance legislation in Austin.

Minutes were read and approved and payment of the bills approved.

## Country Cooking

Country Cooking is being shared this week from the kitchen of Almer and Alma Norwood of Cunningham.

Being married for 62 years, they have lived all their married life in Cunningham. Almer and Alma have a very large family and due to space, we will not be able to mention everyone's name. They are the parents of Darold and wife, Ida Mae, and their two children; James and wife, Pat, and their three children; Conard and wife, Delores, and their two children; Talma and wife, Susie and their two children; Danny and wife, Sharon and their three children; Cindy and husband, Charles Nichols and their two children; and the late Gene and his surviving wife, Geneva and their three children. They have 18 great-grandchildren.

Summertime is around the corner and many people enjoy cook-outs, weiner roasts, camping and picnics. I knew Alma had a very special recipe she has used for over 35 years for hot dogs and I asked her to share with us, so those of you who are tired of plain hot dogs can try this recipe at your next cook out.

Alma first began using this recipe when her children were in school at Cunningham. She made pan after pan of hot dogs to sell at fundraising activities at the school. Since the school consolidated and her children are now grown, she still makes this recipe when the community has an activity to raise money. She averages cooking these about three times a year. She also cooks a big batch every New Years day for her family. She says they are usually tired of turkey by then and the hot dogs are very good. We hope you enjoy the recipe.

Alma still likes to garden, shop, cook and loves to walk. Since her retirement she's kinda "taking life easy". Alma worked as head cook at Cunningham and Prairiland for a total of 10 years. She says her cooking has

slowed down, but remembers that with a family as large as hers, she has certainly cooked many meals. She rears years ago she would get up each day and cook a huge meal, and that several would always come in to eat. Almer says now they just "junk" eat mostly. Anything to eat is alright with him as long as she has something sweet to eat, so Alma tries to keep his sweet tooth satisfied.

Both Almer and Alma enjoy gardening. They are like lots of other folks, they don't need to be in a garden but just love to watch things grow. Alma likes to eat tomatoes. She recently came across a new recipe for canning tomatoes that is quick and easy and said if you would like the recipe just call her. She also likes to can peas, but they have to be shelled so she tries to find someone she can talk into helping do this job.

Alma enjoys shopping, and does most of it in Paris. She says she can find more things she likes there than in Dallas. She also loves to walk. Almer used to be her walking partner but he has quit her, but she still tries to keep up the pace of about a mile a day.

Alma is also sharing her Easy Cake recipe which she enjoys and she tries to take this cake to the Deport Nursing Home at least once a month. She said the Strawberry Pie is also quick and easy and does not have to be cooked. We hope you enjoy her recipes.

I have two requests this week: one for a Jeff Davis Pie and one for a Vinegar Pie. Please share with us.

I am also sharing a couple of recipes from Mrs. R.W. Weisinger for her Peanut Brittle and her Graham Cracker Cake.

### Hot Dogs

2 packages hot dogs, any brand  
1 onion browned in oil  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1/2 cup catsup  
tomato juice, enough to cover the hot dogs  
2 tablespoons hot sauce  
Mix all together. Cook slowly with lid on, about 30 to 45 minutes.

### Strawberry Pie

1 small carton of frozen strawberries  
1 can Eagle Brand milk  
1 9 oz. carton cook whip  
1/2 cup lemon juice  
1/2 cup pecans  
Mix milk, juice, add berries and nuts. Fold in cool whip and turn into a graham crust.

### Easy Cake

1 box white cake mix, Duncan Hines  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup oil  
1 cup sweet milk  
4 eggs, add one at a time  
1 teaspoon lemon flavoring  
1 teaspoon butter flavoring  
Mix well. Put in a stem pan or bundt pan. Place in cold oven, bake 45 minutes at 350.

### Peanut Brittle

In sauce pan,  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup Karo  
Bring to boil, then add 2 cups raw peanuts. Cook until mixture begins to change color. Add 1 teaspoon soda and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Stir quickly and pour onto a greased plate. It will be very brittle and will break easily.

### Graham Cracker Cake

3/4 cup milk  
1 lb. marshmallows  
1 lb. graham crackers  
1 lb. seedless raisins  
1 pint mixed candied fruit and peels  
4 cups nuts  
1/2 lb. candied cherries  
1/2 lb. candied pineapple  
Melt marshmallows in warm milk and mix with remaining ingredients. Pour into the graham cracker box which has been lined with foil and covered over top of cake with foil. Put a heavy weight on top of cake and keep weighted for several days. It will slice nicely.

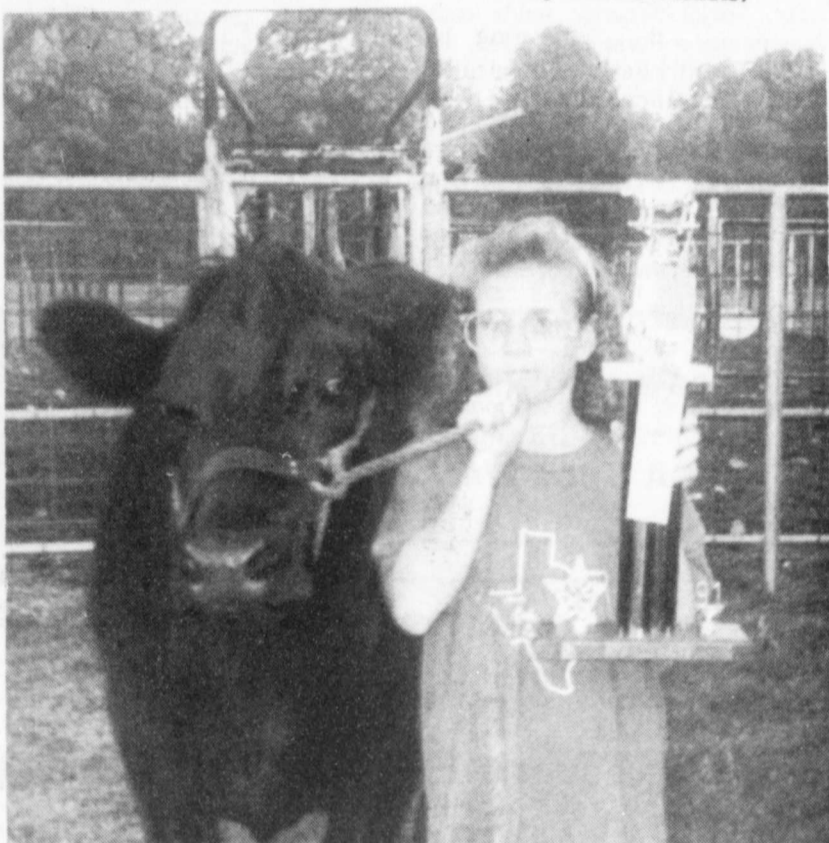

### Auto Theft Is Crime Of The Week

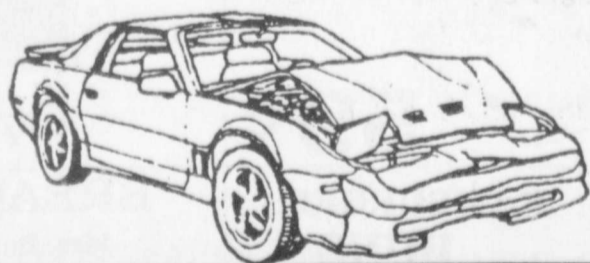

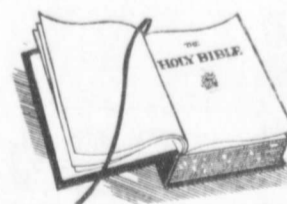

## Social Security Notes

By Ray Hudson, District Manager

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income beneficiaries must report any changes in mailing address or risk having their checks suspended.

This is especially true of those who use direct deposit, because they are not using a mailing address to receive monthly checks. However, notices of changes and reminders of reporting requirements cannot be sent to a bank, so having a correct mailing address on file is extremely important.

In addition, in January of each year, Social Security sends each beneficiary a Form SSA-1099, the Social Security Benefit Statement. If the U.S. Postal Service returns a Form 1099 as undeliverable, that person's benefit may be suspended for lack of a good address, even if the beneficiary is using direct deposit.

First, however, Social Security will double check for a recent change of

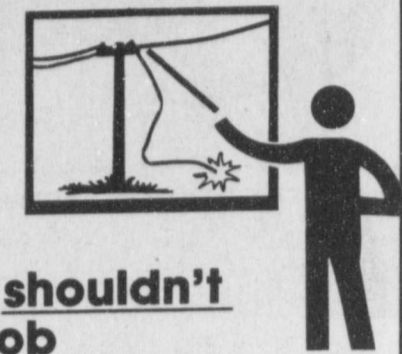
address. If none is found, and the benefit is paid by direct deposit, Social Security will ask the financial institution for a correct address. The post office is asked to check its change of address records, and local telephone directory assistance is contacted.

Using the best available address, Social Security sends a first-class notice that benefits will be suspended unless the beneficiary contacts Social Security. If no response is made, benefits are suspended until the agency hears from the person.

Avoiding this procedure is very simple. A person should be sure to let Social Security know whenever his or her mailing address changes. A simple phone call will get it done.

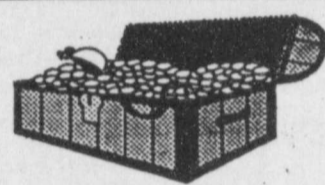

**MEDICAID ELIGIBILITY**

**M**edicaid is a government program set up to cover all or a portion of nursing home and other health care expenses incurred by individuals who cannot afford these costs themselves. Eligible individuals must be at least age 65, satisfy federal public assistance tests, or be disabled. The Medicaid program is administered jointly by the federal and state governments.

Medicaid financial eligibility standards permit an individual, couple, or family to keep a certain level of income and resources. An institutionalized spouse can keep monthly income of \$30 or more (as set by the state) as a personal needs allowance. The total monthly income of the spouse who remains at home normally can't exceed \$1,500 (inflation adjusted).

Resources owned by the individual trying to qualify for Medicaid are divided into two categories - exempt and nonexempt. Exempt resources include a home, car, personal and household items, property essential for self-support, and a few other items. All additional income and resources are nonexempt and are counted in determining Medicaid eligibility. A spouse is allowed to keep a share of nonexempt resources equal to the greater of the state established level (between \$12,000 and \$60,000) or half the couple's nonexempt resources (not to exceed \$60,000).

Even with these resource and income levels, spousal impoverishment is a real concern of many elderly couples. The use of Medicaid-qualifying trusts and other transfers of resources may help you preserve assets while becoming eligible for Medicaid. However, you should seek professional advice before making any transfers to be certain you accomplish what you intend.
