## Payne To Make Clean Breast Of Amarillo Blast Frank Hawks Sets Trans-Continental Flight Mark

### Airman Makes First Daylight Hop Over U.S.

Lands at Municipal Airport in Los Angeles Fourteen Hours and Fifty Minutes After Leaving New York

#### Makes Five Stops

Roscoe Turner Mark Clipped by Over Three Hours; Last 260 Miles of Flight Made Through Western Storms

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 6.—Frank L. Hawks, who began a trans-continental flight from Curtiss Field, New York, at 5 a. m. today, landed at the municipal airport here at 4:50:43 p. m.

Hawks spent 14 hours 50 minutes 43 seconds en route and stopped five times to refuel his Travelair plane.

Clips Record Time

There was no transcontinental speed flight exactly comparable to the one made today, but Hawks clipped three hours 52 minutes and 11 seconds off the 18 hour 42 minutes 34 seconds record Roscoe Turner made on a one stop east-west crossing of the country last May 27.

Hawks, besides holding the record for the fastest crossing of the continent ever made, holds the non-stop east-west record of 19 hours 16 minutes 33 seconds.

Flies Through Storms

Hawks stopped at Columbus, O., St. Louis, Wichita, Kansas, Albuquerque and Kingman, Ariz. The last 260 miles of the flight were through storms.

The pilot said he was tired and "glad to get here." He arrived several hours before sunset, thus completing the first flight from the Atlantic to the Pacific in full daylight. He was met at the field by Turner and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Hawks.

Hawks proposed to remain here several days adjusting his 300 horse power Wright engine, and to take off Sunday on a return flight. He said he would stop at the same cities and hoped to better the 14 hours 45 minutes record made by Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, Easter Sunday. The Lindberghs stopped but once en route to New York.

### Poultry Group To Meet Here

Mr. Christgau's address was principally concerned with giving details as to how the turkey crop of the South Plains can be handled.

### Aviators Near Former Record

Jackson and O'Brien in St. Louis Plane to Reach 420 Hour Mark Late Today in Endurance Record Attempt

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 6.—Cheerful and still expressing determination to set a new world's record for sustained flight, Dale (Red) Jackson and Forest O'Brien tonight were near the 400th hour in their endurance plane Greater St. Louis.

Late tomorrow they will pass their former world record of 420 hours and 30 minutes, set a year ago, and will have less than a week to go to break the 554 hour record of the Hunter brothers.

"We are not ready to come down for some time," The fliers told the ground crew over their short wave transmitter today. No mention was made of Jackson's illness from a cold of which he spoke last night.

Lungren Silent on World Flight Plans

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Aug. 7. (AP)—Velling his plans in mystery, Ted Lungren today prepared for a take off Friday for a race against time around the world.

The first day's flight will be to Harbor Grace, N. F., with a hop to Berlin to begin Saturday.

Carefully looking up his big single-engine monoplane today when he arrived from the west, Lungren went to New York for a series of business conferences about who was to be his co-pilot or his radio operator. He was accompanied by Roger Q. Williams, Atlantic flier who was reported to be planning to go with Lungren. Williams, however, reiterated his assertion that he was to stay behind.

### British Soldiers Sail for Hankow

SHANGHAI, Aug. 7. (AP)—(Thursday)—One hundred ten British soldiers comprising rifle and machine gun units sailed for Hankow today and fifty more will follow Friday due to the uncertain communist conditions at Hankow.

Four destroyers, carrying about 400 marines, arrived today from Sasebo, Japan, and will proceed immediately to Kiukiang, Kiangsi province.

Hankow dispatches today said foreign communities there have completed plans for emergency evacuation in the event it should become necessary.

### Child Drowns In Iron Tank At Abernathy

Lucile Cope, Fifteen-Month Old Daughter of A. Cope, Falls Into Horse Trough Unobserved Wednesday

#### First Aid Is Used

Boy Scout Brother of Young Victim Attempts to Revive Sister by Artificial Respiration for Several Hours

FIFTEEN-month-old Lucile Cope, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Cope, living three miles east of Abernathy, carried herself to a watery death yesterday afternoon when she toppled and fell into a sheet iron horse trough at her farm home, according to word received here last night.

Refusing to admit that death had taken his young sister, Lynn Cade, 15-year-old Boy Scout, worked untiringly for several hours at first aid and artificial respiration in a desperate effort to save the life of the infant victim. Physicians were summoned from Lubbock and Abernathy and aided the scouts in the futile battle against death.

Fall Unobserved

The child fell into the tank unobserved while playing about the premises about 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon. Missing the little girl, Mr. Cope began a search and found the soaked body in the trough. It was estimated that the victim had been in the water about fifteen minutes when found.

Other than the parents and Lynn, the child is survived by another brother and sister. Funeral arrangements had not been made last night.

### July Is Driest Ever Recorded

Rainfall for Last Month Only .12 Inch as Compared to Normal Moisture of 2.18 Inches, Records Reveal

Last July was the driest ever recorded at the Texas Agricultural Experiment station here, D. L. Jones, superintendent said.

Precipitation here is July totaled only .12 inch as compared to normal July rainfall here of 2.18 inches. It is shown a summary of weather conditions as recorded at the experiment station. A departure from the average of 2.06 inches thus is represented. Precipitation from January 1 to August 1 was 5.65 inches, a departure from normal of 4.9 inches.

Temperatures here during July were: Maximum 100 degrees, minimum 50, mean 80.4.

### Two Meetings Held on Co-Op On Wednesday

Sessions Held at Shallowater and McClung in Connection with County-Wide for Membership in Cooperative

Two community meetings were held Wednesday in Lubbock county as a part of the county-wide drive for members in the Texas Cotton Co-operative association. The only afternoon gathering convened at 3 o'clock at McClung and the other meeting was held at 8:30 o'clock at Shallowater.

Glen Gregg and R. J. Murray, district chairman, attended the Shallowater meeting. J. I. Kilpatrick and Dan Blair are chamber of commerce captains assigned to the community. Clayton Vance is community chairman.

About 50 farmers attended a meeting at Liberty Tuesday afternoon and R. S. Johnson are C. of C. captain and community chairman, respectively.

### PLAN NEW BUILDING

Asbury Methodist Church to Have Educational Addition

Construction of a 10-room educational building for Asbury Methodist Episcopal church at a cost of \$1,500, was authorized Wednesday by the city building inspector.

The permit, issued to J. W. Glasgow, provided that the building would be of the frame type, 44 by 84 feet in size and completed within 60 days. It will be at 2003 Avenue T.

A permit authorizing addition of six rooms to a house at 2404 Broadway at a cost of \$6,000, was issued to A. M. Hensley, contractor. A. M. Clayton is the owner of the residence, which now has six rooms.

Wednesday's authorizations increased the valuation of permits this year to \$1,397,510. One hundred sixty-six permits have been issued. Four issued this month total \$10,150.

### Fix Quotas in Straightening Of Rio Grande

International Boundary Commission Recommends That U. S. Pay \$8 Per Cent and Mexico 12 of Cost

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 6. (AP)—The international boundary commission today recommended that the United States pay 8 per cent and Mexico 12 per cent of the \$6,000,000 that will be required to straighten the Rio Grande river from El Paso to Fort Quitman, Texas.

The commission's recommendations, submitted simultaneously to the American and Mexican governments, were made public this afternoon by the foreign office.

Based on Benefits

The prorata sharing of the costs as recommended by the group is based on the proportionate benefit to each country from the straightening of the river.

### Confession to Be Made When Brother Comes

Amarillo Attorney Describes Self as 'Meanest Man in World' in Disjointed Remarks to Officers

#### Two Letters Found

Suspect Admits Writing of Missives Found on Person at Arrest; Upholds Reputation of Stenographer

STINNETT, Aug. 6. (AP)—A. D. Payne, Amarillo attorney, tonight told Chief of Police W. N. McDowell he would make a clean breast of the death of his wife, Mrs. Exa Payne, in a bomb explosion in Amarillo last June 27.

In disjointed remarks, Payne described himself to McDowell as the "meanest man in the world" and upheld the reputation of Mrs. Verona Thompson whom he described as "as clean as driven snow."

Payne was arrested last night and brought here for safe keeping after Mrs. Thompson, formerly his secretary, had signed a statement.

Potter and Hutchinson county officials tonight awaited the arrival of Sidney Payne, brother of A. D. Payne, who said he would make a confession after he had talked with Sidney. It was reported the brother had been making a trip through South Texas and would not arrive here until tomorrow.

STINNETT, Aug. 6. (AP)—Officers tonight were trying to break through the steadfast silence of A. D. Payne, charged with the murder of his wife in Amarillo, June 27. Payne was brought to the Hutchinson county jail here last night when mob violence was feared at Amarillo.

In custody 24 hrs. Payne talked freely of his business, friends and private life but refused to say anything about the death of his wife or the murder charge filed against him.

Hope for Confession

"We'll get a confession from him, maybe by midnight," District Attorney Thompson of Amarillo told a newspaper reporter. Thompson said that Payne, in a statement last night admitted he wrote himself two printed letters. When arrested Payne had on his person two penciled letters ready for mailing to the sheriff and chief of police. Purported to be from safe blowers confusing they had placed the explosives that killed Mrs. Payne in her automobile by mistake.

Newspapermen Are Credited with Exposure

AMARILLO, Aug. 6. (AP)—Incriminating evidence uncovered by two newspapermen today had caused a formal charge of murder to be filed against A. D. Payne, Amarillo attorney, for his alleged part in causing the tragic death of Mrs. Payne when the family automobile was blown to pieces here June 27.

Payne, arrested last night after Mrs. Verona Thompson, formerly his secretary, had signed a statement.

## Kansas Gives Big Lead for Senator Allen

Republicans Repudiate Gov. Clyde M. Reed When Frank (Chief) Hauke Is Given Heavy Primary Majority

TOPEKA, Kas., Aug. 6. (P)—Kansas Republicans by primary vote have overwhelmingly endorsed Senator Henry J. Allen, strong supporter of the national administration, and apparently repudiated Governor Clyde M. Reed, who has clashed frequently with Federal Farm Board agricultural policies.

Reed, who sought support from the agricultural sections particularly, appeared badly defeated by Frank (Chief) Hauke, youthful World War veteran and former football star. Senator Allen, who was appointed by Reed to fill the senatorial seat of Vice President Curtis, ran away with the race made yesterday against three opponents.

**Getty Runs Second**  
Allen with unofficial reports from 1,849 out of 2,829 precincts had a total vote of 89,239. Of his opponents, James F. Getty, Kansas City, had received 25,610 votes. Ralph Snyder, Manhattan, president of the Kansas farm bureau, 48,123, and W. H. Sproul, Sedan, congressman from the third district, 34,000. Returns from 1,783 precincts gave Hauke, 111,623; Reed, 48,896.

The nominal Democratic vote held no particular interest. Only four nominations on the state ticket were contested. All of the incumbent congressional candidates for re-nomination were conceded safe majorities. A close race was on for the Republican nomination in the third district seat vacated by Congressman Sproul. On returns from 247 out of 315 precincts Harold McDougall of Coffeyville was in the lead with 11,249 votes. Other candidates and totals: George F. Boesley, Girard, 19,471; Hugo T. Wedell, Chanute, 1,624; Walter Chappell, Chanute, 3,025; Alfred Coad, Parsons, 2,203.

In the Democratic gubernatorial H. Woodring, Neodesha, like Hauke, a former commander of the American Legion, 18,773; Noah H. Bowman, Garnett, 13,000.

In the race for the Democratic senatorial nomination to oppose Allen, George McGUI, Wichita, had 14,130 votes; Charles Stephens, Columbus, 13,157.

Republican congressmen, apparently safely re-nominated, include W. P. Lamberton, first district; U. S. Guyer, second district; Homer Hoch, fourth district; James G. Strong, fifth district; Charles I. Sparks, sixth district; and Clifford R. Hope, seventh district.

**Ayres Unopposed**  
W. A. Ayres, Democratic representative from the eighth district, was unopposed for re-nomination. At the general election he will be opposed by Miss Stella E. Haines of Augusta, a clubwoman and now representative in the state legislature.

## RACE AGAINST TIME Workers Repair Damaged R-100 at Quebec Airport

ST. HUBERT, Que., Aug. 6. (P)—Two hundred feet above the turf of St. Hubert airport three airship riggers raced against time today to complete repairs to the stabilizing fin of the British dirigible R-100. While a stiff wind pulled and tore at the men they held, and a large crowd watched below, the three men raced a large patch over the hole left when the fabric of the fin tore over Sather Point. Que., while the ship was flying from Cardington, England, last Thursday. The fin, which prevents the ship from rolling, is about ten feet thick where it joins the envelope. The fear, however, reached from the envelope to the very edge of the fin, where there is a thickness of only four inches.

## Military Future of Giant Dirigibles Assured as Super-Carriers of Planes

CLEVELAND, Aug. 6. (P)—As super-carriers of airplanes the military future of the giant dirigibles was described today by David S. Ingals, assistant secretary of the navy for aeronautics, as assured beyond doubt.

In presenting the Gordon Bennett international balloon race trophy to Ward T. Van Orman before

an aviation meeting of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, Ingals said he believed the modern dirigible "practically invulnerable when operated at sea."

The two airships contracted for the navy, one of which is to be completed this year, he said, would far surpass the airplane for observation at sea, and would be able to scout twenty times the area of a cruiser.

"The airplane with only one or two engines and a few hours of fuel is obviously greatly restricted and limited in its operations and must restrain itself with reasonable distance of surface vessels to afford a base," he said. "The rigid airships may cruise for days and days and for thousands of miles affording, through radio communication, information of inestimable value to our fleet."

"Each rigid airship is capable of carrying within its hold five or six airplanes and of launching them and taking them on board again during flight," he continued. "These planes are the striking force of the rigid airship and may be used to bomb machine guns, enemy planes, bases and ships."

Ingals praised Orman for the work he had done in free ballooning, an art which he described as "still a very important factor in our rigid airship development."

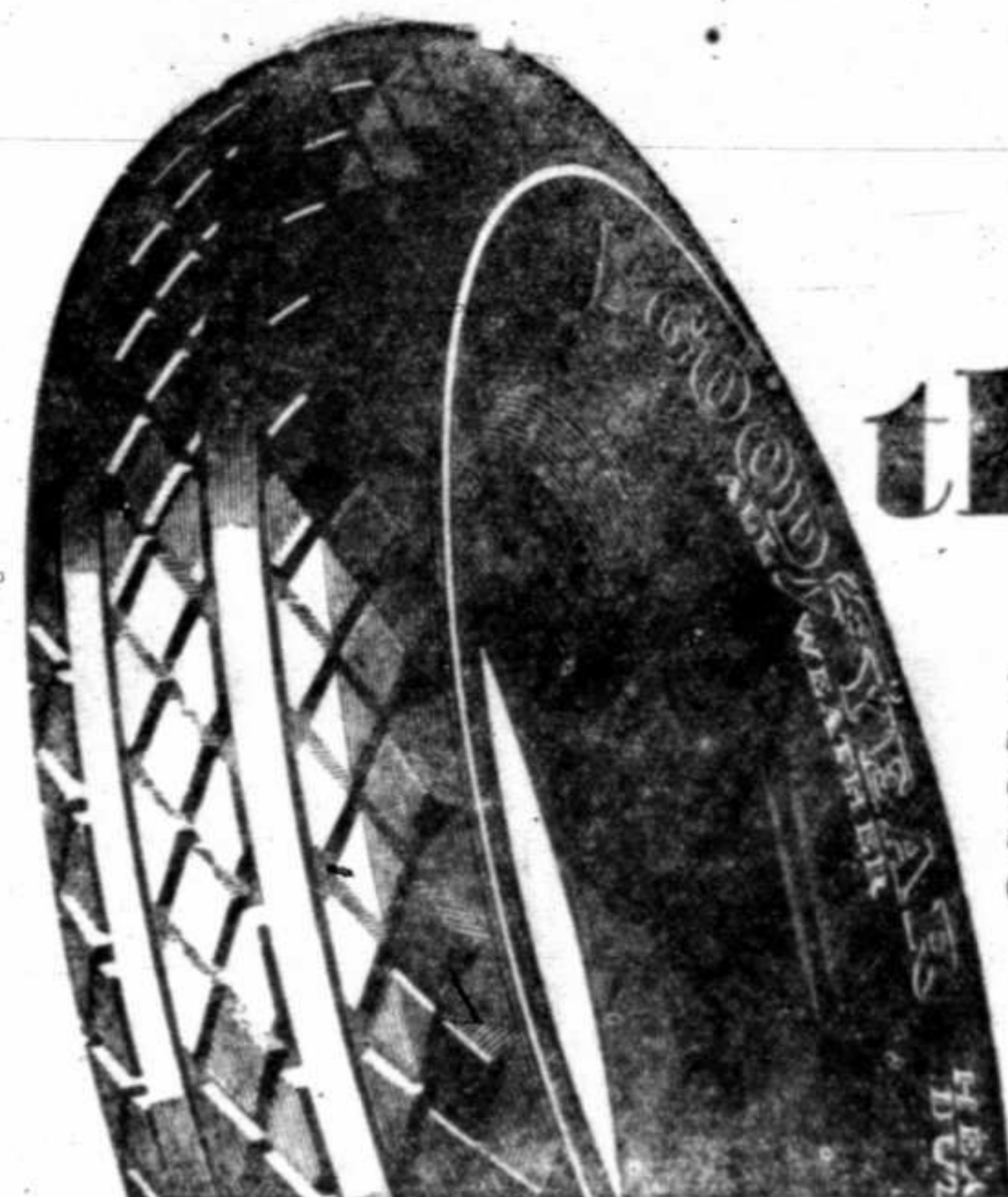

## FERGUSON AND THE PRESS

TURNING his famous oratorical lash on the newspapers of Texas, James E. Ferguson announces he is "amused at Sterling's tirades that the big newspapers are carrying on for him against me," but adds, "I can't stay mad very long because I know it is being paid for at so much an inch."

If Mr. Ferguson really knows whereof he speaks he can win the August election (in his wife's name) because he can run every newspaper publisher in Texas—including Mr. Sterling, who is publisher of the Houston Post-Dispatch.

Mr. Ferguson, if he is as much of an "editor" as he has claimed to be through his Ferguson Forum, should know that any newspaper, publishing paid advertising in news or editorial form, is violating the federal postal regulations.

If he "knows" that the "tirades" are being published at so much per inch, why doesn't he prove it and thus punish his political opponents in the way for which he is so famous?

Marcellus E. Foster, former editor of the Houston Chronicle and now editor of the Houston Press, reported recently in the columns of his paper that a survey of Texas thus far fails to reveal a single daily newspaper in support of the Ferguson campaign. While all the daily papers in this state are not indulging in active campaign for Ross Sterling, a great many of them are—including all of the state's influential publications not afraid to take a public stand.

If the postal regulations are being violated, as Mr. Ferguson says he "knows" they are, he can deal a lot of misery to the operators of every leading newspaper in Texas. The list includes the Dallas News, the Houston Chronicle, Post-Dispatch, Press, Abilene Reporter and News, El Paso Herald and Times, Amarillo Globe and News, San Antonio News and Express, and as many other leading sectional papers as anyone cares to enumerate, including the Lubbock Avalanche and Journal. All Mr. Ferguson needs to do is to put his facts where his oratory is—and put a stop to these "typical" papers which dare to oppose his candidacy (in his wife's name).

The Morning Avalanche, pledged to support Ross Sterling in opposition to the Fergusons, offers Jim his first field for investigation. We will be glad to have Mr. Ferguson inspect our records in this regard, for if Sterling campaign matter is going into Texas papers "at so much an inch," this paper hasn't been included in the budget. In fact neither Mr. Sterling, nor Mr. Ferguson have yet purchased a line of advertising in the Avalanche or Journal during this campaign and certainly Mr. Sterling has never intimated that he'd pay a red cent for any support he might receive in these columns. He, or no one else, would be permitted to broach such a proposal and those who know Mr. Sterling realize full well the utter folly of such a charge.

The Avalanche and Journal sell advertising. If the copy is not offensive to public thought or morals and if it is not libelous in any detail, Mr. Ferguson, Mr. Sterling or any other person may purchase paid space in Lubbock's newspapers. Neither of the two, however, nor anyone else, can purchase one line of editorial support or news content. We continue to furnish both, at our expense, to the readers of these newspapers—and further claim that every other honorable paper in Texas is doing the same thing.

If Mr. Ferguson is sincere in his charges against the Texas press—and if, as he says, he "knows"—we'd be glad to see him prove his statements. A prosecuted press should be exposed—and in this regard we say to Mr. Ferguson:

"Do your stuff, if you can—and if you prove your charges you will have done Texas a great service!"

But until Mr. Ferguson does something more concrete in this regard than he has up to this point—unless he starts talking facts instead of fancy—we brand his charges as a thousand-fold more ridiculous than he has branded his rival's campaign.

## PRESIDENTIAL DISCRETION

Heat waves alone do not explain President Hoover's decision to avoid the wheat states on his vacation trip to the Yellowstone and Glacier national parks. He will not rush in where congressmen fear to tread.

Apparently the president does not intend to base himself on heckling such as that which the wheat growers have been subjecting Chairman Leage of the federal farm board because wheat prices are down. There was a tone of finality and relief to that announcement that there would be no more speeches from the rear platform or elsewhere.

Much as Mr. Hoover would like to convince the wheat growers that nothing his administration could have done would have kept the bottom from dropping out of their market, he realizes it is not within his poor forensic powers to regain their lost confidence by a few speeches.

In Mexico City they hold bullfights to raise funds for roads. That isn't so far different from the American custom. Here they hold a legislative session.

## On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

UNCLE SAM'S NEW CRUISERS WILL BE AIRCRAFT CARRIERS  
By Charles P. Stewart  
(Central Press Staff Writer)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—America's new six-inch gun cruisers, under the London naval treaty, essentially will be small aircraft carriers—miniature Lexingtons and Saratogas—according to British experts who describe them in a good deal of detail in English technical publications.

This may be one of the not infrequent cases in which the neighbors know more about our business than we ourselves know.

From what I hear at the navy department, Uncle Sam's contractors are still thinking over the problems raised by the London treaty. However, possibly some of them have talked tentatively with overseas specialists—fishing for their own ideas and trying to ascertain the latter's opinions concerning their own. Such chats do occur among fellow-craftsmen.

If the new vessels are to be "miniature Lexingtons and Saratogas" it is possible to visualize them pretty well, by examining either one of our big aircraft carriers through a dimming glass.

Originally the Lexington and the Saratoga were to have been battle cruisers—a battle cruiser classing as a capital naval vessel, like a battle-ship, but faster, and to possess this greater speed, somewhat less heavily protected.

The Washington five-power treaty of 1921-22 forced us to take them out of this category, however, and, as they were still under construction, both were altered to adapt them to aircraft carrying purposes.

To a landman's eye, the most obvious change was the shifting of the funnels and masts and the protrusion from their time-honored position amidships to the extreme starboard, so as to leave the upper deck almost entirely clear for the taking off and landing of planes.

The ships proper (practically twin craft) are 830 feet long, with a 106-foot beam, but their flying decks have an overhang, fore and aft, which gives them an extreme length of 880 feet.

Their speed is between 33 and 35 knots, and, by bringing them up into the wind and blowing ahead under full steam a plane is enabled to take off with a run of rather less than 200 feet.

The complement of planes per ship is about 72, of which 34 are bombers.

Displacement—33,000 tons; huge vessels. Cost—planes and all, about \$43,000,000,000 each.

In congress, from some sources, there has been considerable complaint of the expense of the new carriers' upkeep, but naval men appear to be fairly well satisfied with them. It is true that they do require large staffs of officers and men. Also that, being pretty vulnerable, they need more than the average amount of protection in action. Nevertheless, they themselves provide a tolerable share of this protection with their own planes and batteries; besides which, being so fast, they are exceptionally capable of avoiding danger.

The American six-inch gun cruisers described in British accounts, are planned, as represented in these overseas versions, on about a 9,000-ton basis, of 33 knots speed, and designed like the bigger carriers, with all their upper works exaggerated to starboard, leaving their decks clear, but of course, with far less room for maneuvering of planes than the larger vessels. It is true, it is necessary planes can be catapulted. The relative smallness of deck space in one respect should be an advantage, as affording a more difficult target to enemy airmen.

One British authority speaks of as many as 75 planes contemplated as the complement per cruiser—a ridiculously large number, however. Such ships might, some American experts say, provide accommodations for as many as 20 planes; certainly not more than that.

Two is the ordinary number for British craft of the eight-inch cruiser type, but these vessels, to be sure, are not designed especially for aircraft carrying.

The American ships' tonnage, as English naval writers publish the story, will consist of nine six-inch guns mounted in three turrets, piled pyramidally at the starboard side of the flight deck of each vessel.

The cost per cruiser is estimated (by the British) at around \$12,000,000.

## Your Health

FAMILY DOCTOR CAN STILL CARE FOR 90 PER CENT OF CASES

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a new series of articles by Dr. Morris Fishbein on "Frontiers of Medicine" which will describe important advances in the history of medicine and problems that face doctors today.

Dr. Morris Fishbein, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygiene.

In modern practice the general practitioner still attempts to diagnose and treat the vast majority of conditions which come to him. Today at least 90 per cent of men in practice in this country are still general practitioners. An investigation made by the Committee on Medical Education revealed that 90 per cent of the diseases which come to the physician can be diagnosed and treated by a general practitioner.

This 90 per cent, however, includes all of the common digestive disorders, the coughs and colds, and the minor injuries which make up the majority of human complaints. It includes also the care of the acute infectious diseases which are easily recognized, such as diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles and pneumonia. It includes certain forms of surgery in various portions of the body for which the technique has long been established. Unless complications ensue, the general practitioner can handle these quite satisfactorily.

The general practitioner has been trained in the care of mothers before childbirth and in the care of the not too complicated cases during childbirth. He can take care of a fracture, a dislocation, or an amputation. If the condition is not so unusual as to challenge his experience and his knowledge.

There are, however, many purely medical conditions which demand the special knowledge of one who is equipped for finer examinations. The specialist in internal medicine concerns himself with disturbances affecting the heart and lungs, the circulation, the organs within the abdomen, digestive disorders, degenerative disorders, and other complications of human physiology, which are puzzling to the general practitioner. In the diagnosis of heart disease, it is possible for any general practitioner who has kept himself up to date to determine whether or not diseases of the heart are present, the nature of that disease, and the competency of the patient to perform certain work.

On the other hand, the heart is hidden away in the chest where it cannot be seen, and all of its functions and the changes which it undergoes must be determined from evidence which is secured only with the greatest of difficulty. It is possible by tramping the chest to outline roughly the borders of the heart and thus to know whether it is enlarged or smaller than it ought to be. It is, however, possible to use the X-ray to determine the borders of the heart exactly. It is possible by listening to the heart to determine whether or not the valves are functioning satisfactorily and to know whether it is likely that they are constricted, thus permitting an insufficient amount of blood to pass through; or dilated, permitting blood to leak back after it has passed through. When such changes occur murmurs arise which can be heard by a stethoscope.

It took a dozen officers to restore order.

Mrs. Levecchio was slashed this morning on her way to work. Mrs. Davis who said she had been the common-law wife of Joseph Levecchio brother of Angelo, was arrested shortly after the attack.

Mrs. Davis said Joseph left her five weeks ago in obedience to his mother's urging to end the relationship and had gone of Chicago to aid his brother.

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## British Claims Are Challenged

Antarctic Land Discovery Is Discussed by Geographer and Geologist to Members of Institute of Politics

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 6. (P)—Many of Great Britain's claims in the Antarctic, particularly in the Falkland Islands, are challenged on the basis of right of discovery, Dr. Laura H. Martin, geologist and geographer of Washington, D. C., told members of the Institute of Politics today.

In an address before the conference on "Problems of Sovereignty in the Arctic and Antarctic," Dr. Martin said Great Britain asserted Dominion over several polar areas extending beyond parts discovered by Englishmen.

The recent flights of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd in Antarctica have again brought to the fore the question of whether the United States might claim land in the Antarctic on the basis of discovery, Dr. Martin stated.

The United States has so far never claimed land in the Antarctic, she pointed out, nor acknowledged Great Britain's claims to the region used for Admiral Byrd's base and his flights.

From twelve poles, sixty-foot high, twenty-four projectors with a total of 100,000 candlepower light will make the whole gridiron as light as day.

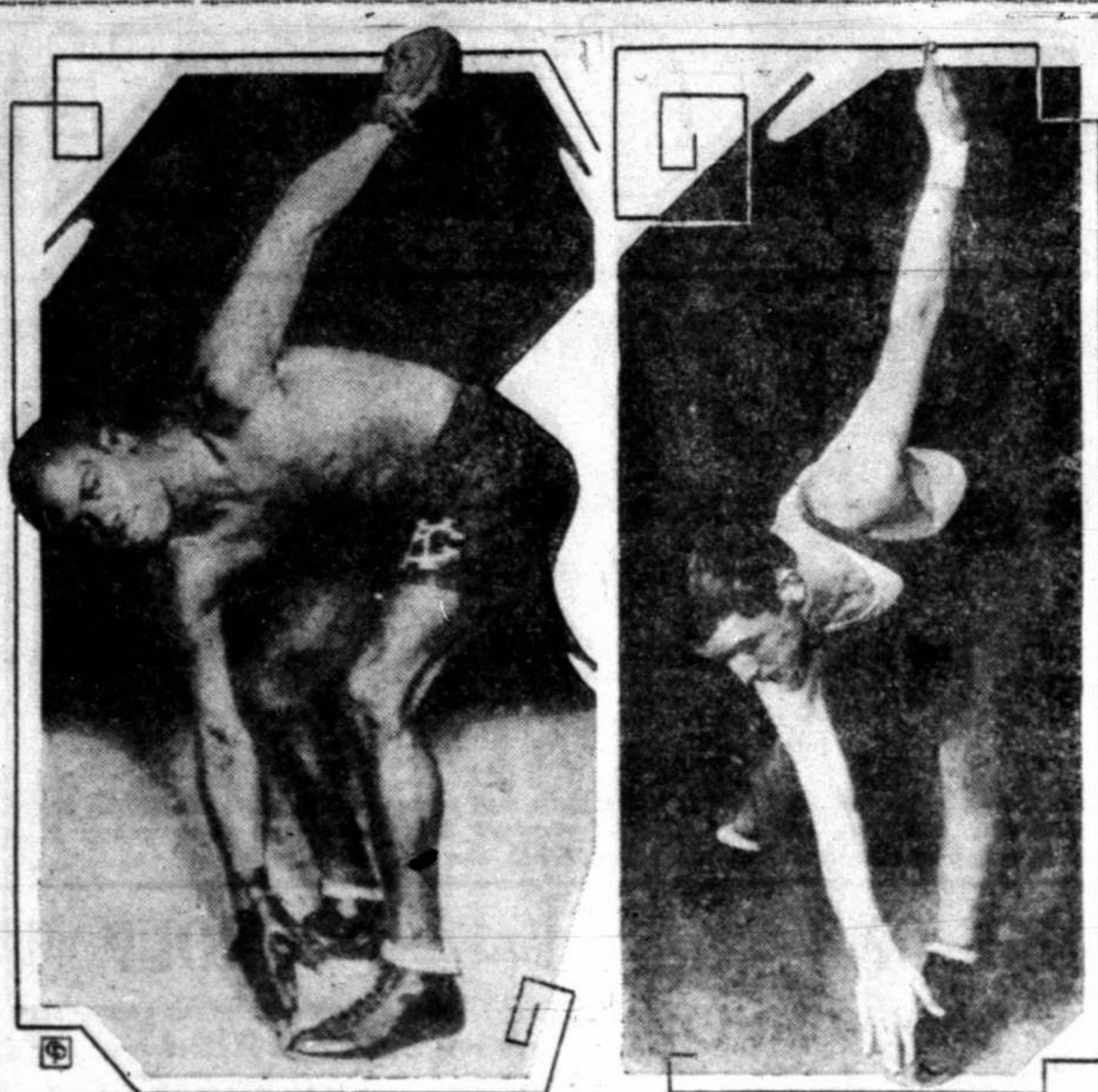
These who have seen night football say that details of play can be seen even more clearly than in day time. Players stand out in relief and in contrast with the outer wall of darkness.

## Incumbents in Missouri Are Assured Wins

Sixteen Representatives in Congress Sure of Winning Nomination; 14 Candidates Unopposed in Primaries

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 6. (AP)—All sixteen of Missouri's representatives in congress, ten Republicans and six Democrats, were assured of re-nomination in yesterday's primary on the basis of Associated Press tabulations today.

Fourteen were unopposed and thereby were assured of places on their party ticket in the November election, and the other two, Representative Thomas J. Halsey, Republican, sixth district, and the veteran C. C. Dyer, Republican, twelfth district, St. Louis, had safe leads. Halsey was leading S. S. Slicker, 3,245 to 421 in 108 out of 183 precincts and Dyer was leading his negro opponent, W. W. Moore, 3,358 to 1,189 in 69 out of 100 precincts. Of five other congressional contests on the Democratic side, only one remained in doubt. Two of three former Democratic representatives defeated in the 1928 Republican landslide were ahead by safe margins in attempted comebacks. These were C. C. Dickinson, sixth district, who led D. A. Dickey 9,546 to 2,194 in 133 out of 183 precincts; and Sam C. Major, seventh district, who was leading his nearest rival, James E. Ruffin, 14,200 to 6,947 in 195 out of 240 precincts.

**Contest In Doubt**  
The contest in doubt was the race between former Congressman James F. Fulbright, Democrat, fourteenth district, and Orville Zimmerman, in 212 of 410 precincts, the vote was Zimmerman 11,897; Fulbright 10,965.

Frank H. Lee, Democrat, fifteenth district, was leading W. W. Hughes, 196 out of 247 precincts, 6,804 to 4,234. In the sixteenth district, 98 out of 240 precincts gave W. E. Barton a lead of 6,847 to 1,349 votes over S. A. Killian.

### COMMITTEE NAMED

Seek to Hold Cotton Until Twenty Cent Price Paid

## Final Census Report Made

Continental United States Has Population of 122,729,615 According to Figures Compiled Wednesday

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—Continental United States had a population of 122,729,615 on April 2 this year.

The first complete compilation of the nation's population was made possible today when a single townships in Clearfield county, Pennsylvania, which had been missing, was reported.

**Subject To Revision**  
The returns were compiled from official reports of the district supervisors throughout the country. The totals, however, are subject to revision in the census bureau's announcement which is expected soon.

The nation's total population with its outlying possessions numbered 137,502,303 persons as 14,773,430 occupy the various territories and Island dependencies.

The total population increase in the forty eight states and the district of Columbia in the ten years was 17,018,299, the largest numerical growth of any decade in its history.

### SEEK NORMAL PRICES

American Livestock Group in Move Against Low Prices

DENVER, Aug. 6. (AP)—The executive committee of the American Livestock association today took steps to bring wholesale meat prices now at the lowest level since 1922 back to normal.

Increase consumption, the committee said, was necessary for any upward trend, but members said it would be necessary, first of all, for the national retail meat prices to be brought into line with wholesale prices.

The committee adopted a resolution endorsing the recent recommendation of the livestock advisory committee of the Federal Farm Board that urged cattlemen to hold back their heavily laden shipments of cattle and to feed them into the markets later in the fall and winter.

### EXPERIMENTS PLANNED

Shooting Rocket Tests Will Be Made at Roswell

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (AP)—Experiments in shooting rockets to extreme altitudes, financed by Daniel Guggenheim, will be carried on by Professor Robert H. Goddard of Clark university, Worcester, Mass., at Roswell, N. M., that site was selected because of favorable atmospheric conditions.

Prof. Goddard has been conducting rocket experiments since 1912. At Roswell, small rockets will be sent up first at finally one capable of ascending from 30 to 75 miles will be sent up by gas propulsion and with parachutes to regulate the speed of the return to earth. The rockets will carry thermometers, barometers, electrical measuring apparatus, air traps to collect samples of air at various altitudes and other instruments.

### APPEAL TO DEMOS

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 6. (AP)—Dr. A. C. Miller, chairman of the Arkansas anti-Smith executive committee, in an open letter today appealed to Arkansas anti-Smith Democrats of the 1928 campaign to refrain from voting in the August 12 Democratic primary and "to hold themselves ready for independent action in case unfit men should be nominated."

### BOATSWAIN KILLED

BOSTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—Boatswain Lewis E. Pratt of the Salisbury beach coast guard station was fatally wounded by bullets from another coast guard boat out of Gloucester, last night, when his surf boat was mistaken for a rum runner near the mouth of Ipswich river, Ipswich, Mass. Early reports had indicated that the shots were fired from a rum vessel.

### ENTER AGREEMENT

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (AP)—The Baltimore and Ohio railroad today announced that it had entered into an agreement through its bankers, Kuhn, Loeb and Company, for the purchase of a large majority of the Chicago and Alton 3 1/2 per cent first lien bonds and the six per cent general mortgage bonds.

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 6. (AP)—"If at first you don't succeed, try it later"—replied by E. F. Gillis.

Gillis, driving home yesterday attempted to light a cigar. Pulling out his mechanical cigar lighter he snapped it—it clicked, but there was no spark, no flame. Changing hands he tried again with the same result. Then he tried both hands, holding one over the lighter to protect the flame, if any, he gave a vicious push with the other hand.

He regained consciousness in a hospital where they told him he had run into a tree, that he still held the lighter when they pulled him out and that he would recover.

### REDUCTION FORECAST

Lower Number of Sheep Seen For United States

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6. (AP)—A considerable reduction in the number of sheep in the United States and abroad during the next two or three years was forecast today by the department of agriculture, which said this decrease would improve the sheep and wool industries.

The western sheep grower was said to be in a "very difficult" position at the present time, partially because of the drought which had reduced the amount of available feed.

Purchasing power of consumers has been "materially reduced," also the department said, adding that the larger supplies of sheep and lambs for slaughter have been taken at greatly reduced prices.

## NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 6. (AP)—After opening 4 points down and dropping to levels 10 to 11 points under the previous close owing to poor cables and rains in the west, cotton today rallied 27 to 39 points from the lows on a bullish weekly weather and crop summary and a forecast for fair weather in the western belt. As the detailed weather report showed considerable rain in Texas the market eased off 9 to 12 points from the highs. The market ruled steady during the late trading, fluctuating within the earlier range but gradually strengthening. The close was steady, showing net gains for the day of 10 to 11 points.

Liverpool came in 2 points worse than due and first trades here showed losses of 4 points. Port receipts 7,936, for week 36,968, for season 43,965, last season, 31,801. Exports 6,785, for week 2,547, for season 25,474, last season 27,569. Port stock 1,962,175 last year 525,007. Combined shipboard stock at New Orleans, Galveston and Houston 23,341, last year 19,233. Spot sales in southern markets, 6,286, against 5,777 last year.

## NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (AP)—Cotton today reflected conflicting influences but, after an early decline, there were rallies on doubt as to the adequacy of western belt rains and the firmness in grain. Advances met considerable selling and, after advancing from 12.34 to 12.50, the new October contract declined to 12.55, but stiffened again on renewed covering in the late trading and sold to 12.83. The close was at 12.71 compared with 12.64 at the close of the previous day with the general market closing steady at net advances of 1 to 17 points.

Reports Published  
Three more private crop reports were published with condition figures ranging from 62 to 64 and figures on the indicated yield from 13,668,000 to 14,376,000 bales. According to a canvass today, New York Cotton exchange members on the average are looking for a crop indication of 14,635,000 bales, the highest of 45 guesses being 15,000,000 and the lowest 13,500,000.

## Share Prices Sag Almost Steadily In Wednesday's Stock Mart; Steel Slumps

NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (AP)—The stock market was weak today to find much cheer in the wild bull movement of grain today and share prices sagged almost steadily in another phlegmatic session. Net advances of more than 3 cents a bushel in wheat and of 1 to 8 cents in corn received bearish interpretation in Wall Street circles, which are speculating on the effects the drought may have on business recovery.

## News Unfavorable

In addition, there was a batch of none too favorable news items, including another slump in steel production, a poor car-loading report and an increase in petroleum production. The combination proved too heavy a burden for the bull crowd to carry, and many favorite stocks slipped off 2 to 3 points. The turnover, however, was only slightly more than 1,500,000 shares.

Money remained firm, although a relatively unimportant factor inasmuch as the current trend is regarded as temporary. High grade bonds continued to display strength. Little Optimism  
Trade publications which report weekly on the iron and steel industry had little to say that was optimistic, "Iron Age" announced the pig production had dropped to 54 per cent of capacity after holding at 56 per cent for four successive weeks.

The heaviness of stocks was well distributed, although the utilities suffered the largest average loss. American Telephone, American and Foreign Power, Western Union, Consolidated Gas and Electric Power and Light lost 2 to 3 points and American Water Works nearly 3.

Farm implements shares again reacted on the prospects of financial losses to farmers. International Harvester and Caterpillar Tractor slumped 2 points and J. I. Case 3. American Can and Continental Can, which would be affected by serious curtailment in fruit and vegetable packing, broke 3 points.

## Livestock

PORT WORTH LIVESTOCK  
PORT WORTH, Aug. 6. (AP)—Cattle and calves offerings today were not excessive but packer buyers were inclined to reduce values. Order buyers added some help. Calves were very uneven. Hogs mostly low higher with not enough sheep on hand to test values.

About 20 loads of slaughter steers offered. California buyers took 6 loads of the best cattle at 7.00, fully steady. Packer buyer bought some light weight plain steers from 4.50 to 5.00, or about steady. Bidding lower on steers that show much weight.

Not many bulls arrived. Common light ones sold from 2.25 to 3.75 with a few in the 4.00 notch. Cows rather plentiful with buyers placing bids 15 to 25c lower with fat cows showing the most decline. Canners sold from 2.75 down with cutters around 3.00. Some good cows around 3.00 with some sales at 4.00.

Yearlings were the exception and sold steady. Two loads cleared at 9.75 with some half fat kind at 6.75. Common packages from 3.50 to 4.50. Calves very uneven with order buyers paying strong prices. The bulk of the better calves sold from 5.50 to 6.25. Order buyers paid 7.00 for some loads with one load of medium weight calves at 8.00. Culls ruled around 2.50.

Some stocker calves sold at 6.75 with two loads of good young cows clearing at 5.00. Rail hogs sold up to 9.30 or about 10c higher. Truck hogs stopped at 8.10 or about steady. The bulk of the 175-250 pound butchers sold from 8.75 to 9.10.

## Plan Creamery At Littlefield

Temporary Officers Selected  
Plans Under Way for  
Starting Building for New  
Cooperative Plant

(By Staff Correspondent)  
LITTLEFIELD, Aug. 6. (Special)—Temporary officers have been selected for a cooperative creamery and plans are under way for the starting on work of the building necessary to handle the business, J. C. Hilburn, president of the First National bank and head of the organization, announced.  
Mr. Hilburn has working with him seven of the leading dairy farmers of Lamb county as a board of directors.  
The board is to meet soon to arrange for the raising of funds to erect a \$16,000 creamery here. Also, a drive is to be staged to sign up 1,000 cows for the furnishing of cream and butterfat for the plant.  
It is expected that a minimum of 1,200 pounds of butterfat or 1,500 pounds of butter, will be the product of the plant.  
Besides the manufacture of butter there will also be handled ice cream and Bulgarian buttermilk.  
Details of the issuance of stock have not been completed but it is understood that each farmer agreeing to supply milk will have the opportunity of subscribing for stock. Bankers will also finance the purchase of additional cows to provide sufficient milk supply.  
A tentative site for the plant has not been definitely announced. However, there are several locations available here.
