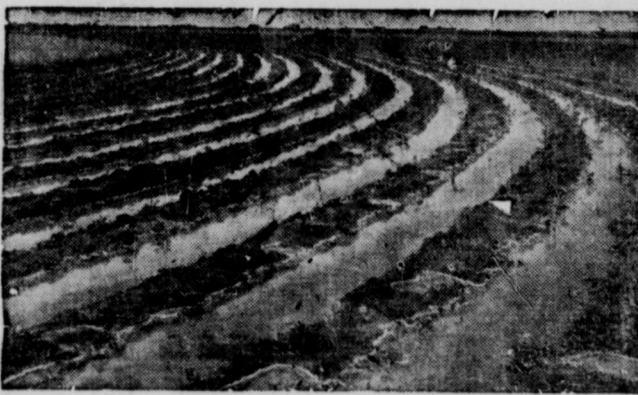

Range Conservation Plan Aids In Getting Range Improvements

Grassland conservation offers ranchers a good opportunity to increase production and safeguard their investment in land and livestock. A sound coordinated range conservation plan serves many purposes such as: a livestock inventory, a business analysis, a record of soil types and range sites, a record of range condition classes, and a blueprint for improvement of livestock, soils, and grass. Improvement of one without attention to the others will result in low profits, financial loss, or depreciation of capital assets. Improvement of depleted ranges to approach the lush grassland of former years offers a great opportunity to the livestock producer today.

The underlying principles governing all range planning are the four cornerstones of a good soil conservation program. These four planks are: (1) sound land use, (2) the right combination of conservation practices, (3) practices to maintain and improve soil productivity, and (4) economically sound conservation farming. Management of native grassland to restore near climax condition will accomplish these results. The original grass cover was the best land use nature could develop over thousands of years. The combination of range improving practices to restore this original cover is the right combination of practices. Restoring nature's balance will maintain and improve all soil productivity through natural biological processes, with climax or the original grasses utilizing all plant food and moisture for the production of grasses and legumes. This represents the greatest production at the least cost and is therefore economically sound conservation. Savings in maintenance and production costs, coupled with greatest production, provides the opportunity for greatest economic gains.

It is generally conceded by grass and range men that the restoration of nature's grassland, with its accompanying benefits, will solve 90 percent of our range problems. We would have grass roots control of weeds, brush, and animal pests. Abundant feed with its resulting healthy livestock will solve the majority of insect pest and disease problems and result in greatest calf and lamb crops with a minimum death loss. Vigorous grasses will eliminate reseeding and erosion problems and reduce needed feed reserves. The other 10 percent of our range problems will be largely management problems such as herd improvement, financial management, labor difficulties, water development, and control of contagious diseases.

The best range management practices are also generally considered to be the best wildlife management practices with its added benefits of recreation, insect control, and financial return. It seems logical to conclude that the primary job in range conservation work is to make and apply a sound conservation plan which will develop and maintain an excellent grass cover. This is the goal of the rancher, the range conservationist, the soil conservation district, the nation, and the world. The range plan has been likened to the hub of a wheel with the various spokes representing the many range practices which are used to improve the range and the rim of the wheel pictured as being the maintenance of the improvement.

Lee Strain, district cooperators 5 miles NE of Colorado City, has harvested his abuzzi rye crop for grain and reports this produced about 800 pounds of seed per acre. This 6 acre patch was planted last fall as a nurse crop for an alfalfa planting and was seeded at the rate of 15 pounds of rye and 30 pounds of alfalfa per acre. It was planted on a sub-irrigated sandy area and has had some supplemental irrigation. He now has a fine stand of alfalfa left which he will utilize for soil improvement, hay, and grazing. This rye has made an excellent land cover, it protected the alfalfa and assisted in getting it started, and it is making a fine cash crop. At present prices the rye alone has a cash value of around \$50 per acre.

Burton Hines, district cooperators in the NE Westbrook area, has recently planted about 8 acres of mixed sandy land to blue panic grass. This was planted in 40 inch rows at the rate of 2 pounds of seed per acre. Mr. Hines rigged up a planter to do this job which may prove to be a help in getting a stand of blue panic grass. He built a seeding attachment from a Planet Jr. seeder mounted this on his tractor. He planted this fairly deep with the idea of using his available moisture to germinate the seed and to secure a stand without a rain following planting. This method of planting works all right provided a heavy rain does not fall during the planting and germinating stages. This grass planting will be used for grazing and soil improvement when fully established.
