

January Term of District Court Will Begin Monday

The regular January term of District Court will begin Monday, Jan. 5th, with a fairly busy civil docket pending.

Twenty-one criminal cases are on the court calendar, with most of the cases having been tried over from previous terms. Divorce actions and non-jury cases comprise the majority of court actions pending disposition. One major civil case scheduled for hearing during the term is the Kent County court election contest, which has been set for hearing on Monday, Jan. 23. This will be a jury trial of the disputed election on the question of moving the Kent County courthouse from Claiborne to Jayton.

Two cases on the criminal docket for defrauding by worthless check and felony theft, both involving the same defendant, have been pending since Nov. 9, 1945. A murder case on the docket which the defendant was given a two-year sentence and which is now on appeal, carries the filing of Nov. 5, 1946.

Other criminal cases on the docket, dating from December, through December, 1951, are offenses of child desertion, possession of narcotics, forgery, and other criminal cases docketed during the period from April 22 to Sept. 23, 1952, are for offenses of child desertion, forgery, and passing.

Forty-nine divorce cases are on the docket, one of which has been on file since August 12, 1943.

The fire was discovered around 9 p. m. Six members of the Haskell Fire Department accompanied a pumper truck which answered the call to Seymour.

G. Robt. Forrester, Former Minister, Is Accident Victim

Word was received this week by members of the congregation of the Christian Church of this city, that G. Robt. Forrester, former minister, was killed in an automobile accident on Dec. 16th, while traveling from Eustis, Fla., to Leesburg, Fla., to attend a church meeting. He had been serving as the minister of the Christian Church at Eustis for the past two years. No details of the accident have been received.

Brother Forrester was the minister of the Christian Church here from 1924 to 1931, and had many friends in this vicinity. He was educated at Milligan College in Tennessee, and came to Haskell from Waynesboro, Tenn. He returned to Tennessee several years ago, after ministering at Coleman, Brenham, Del Rio and El Paso, and later went to Eustis. Last April he returned to Haskell and preached during an evangelistic meeting at the Christian Church. He was noted as eloquent speaker and was much in demand for public addresses.

Brother Forrester was 62 years of age. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. G. Robert Forrester of Eustis, two sons, Robert T. Forrester and Don Forrester, both of whom live in Virginia and are Christian ministers; one daughter, Mrs. Frederick Houk of Lakeland, Fla.; and one grandchild. The three children were born while the family lived in Haskell.

Grey Fox Falls Victim To Two Youthful Hunters

Two 15-year-old Haskell lads, Wayne Conner and Jerry Matthews, had their biggest thrill of the holiday season Tuesday afternoon when their dogs ran down and killed a large grey fox, an animal rarely seen in this section.

The boys were hunting rabbits in a pasture about a mile north of town when they jumped the fox. According to Wayne and Jerry, the animal was first spotted crouched in the branches of a large mesquite tree which sloped at angle from the ground. The boys threw sticks and frightened the fox from the tree and let their three greyhounds, Dagwood, Blondie, and Queenie, take over. The hounds caught and killed the fox after a 200 yard chase, the boys said.

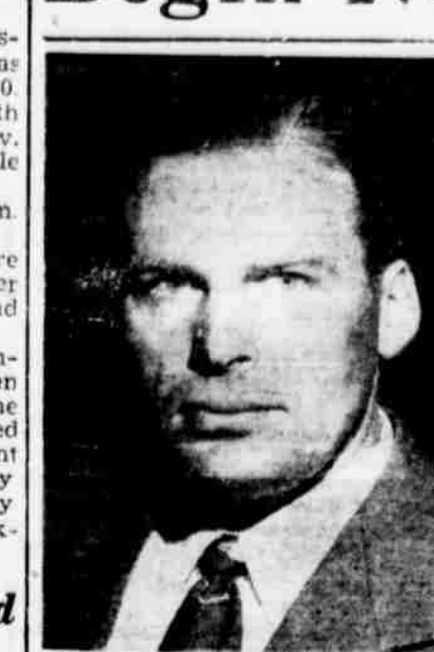
Christmas Baskets Carry Cheer Into 22 Homes

County, District Officials Begin New Terms Today



John Kimbrough, Haskell businessman and rancher-farmer who was elected State Representative of the 83rd District without opposition, will take office when the next session of the Legislature convenes January 13th.

New terms of office begin today for district, county and precinct officials named in the 1952 elections, comprising a majority of the county's "official family."

New terms begin for all except two officials, District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman and County Superintendent Mrs. Iva Palmer. These officials serve four year terms, and were elected in 1950. A majority of the officials starting new two-year terms today were re-elected, or are returning to public office after having previously served in various elective positions.

One district official, State Representative - elect John Kimbrough, who will represent the 83rd District, will not take office until the Legislature meets Jan. 13.

Other newly-elected or re-elected officials taking office today are:

District Attorney Royce Adkins who was promoted to that office by voters of the 39th District after serving two years as Haskell County Attorney.

Adkins succeeds Wm. P. Ratliff of this city, who was appointed District Attorney in April, 1952 following the resignation of John H. Banks.

County Judge Alfred Turnbow who is beginning his second term in that office.

District Clerk Jesse B. Smith who is beginning his fourth term in that office.

Also beginning their fourth terms are County Clerk Horace Oneal and Tax Assessor-Collector R. A. Coburn.

Sheriff R. M. (Bob) Cousins began his fourth term today in that office.

County Treasurer Byron Wright enters his second term in that office today.

County Attorney Curtis Pogue is beginning a new term in that office, one which he previously held for four years. He retired Jan. 1, 1951, to engage in the private practice of law.

Beginning second terms as County Commissioners today are A. C. (Pete) Sego in Precinct 1 and D. S. (Dave) Strickland in Precinct 4, while Commissioner W. A. (Drew) Leonard is beginning his third term in Precinct 2.

New member of the Commissioners Court is Estell Gilliland in Precinct 3, who succeeds M. B. Cobb, former commissioner for six years.

Veteran officeholders among precinct officials is Constable Sterling Edwards of this city, who began his seventh term as Precinct 1 Constable today.

New Public Weigher in Precinct 1 is F. J. (Frank) McCurley, who formerly held that office a number of years ago.

To be filled by appointment of the new Commissioners Court today is the office of Justice of the Peace in Precinct 1, a County Health Officer, and County Service Officer in charge of Veterans Affairs.

Vacancy in the office of Justice of the Peace resulted following the resignation last October of the late C. K. Jones, who had been nominated and re-elected to that office.

Eal Treadwell, former Haskell city marshal, was appointed Justice of the Peace on Oct. 24, 1952, for the unexpired term in that office which ended Dec. 31.

Four applications for the appointment were filed the first of the week, including the incumbent, Mr. Treadwell, and V. A. Brown, R. L. LeClaire, and Basil Murphy.

The position of County Health Officer is now held by Dr. E. M. Kimbrough, prominent Haskell physician and surgeon.

The post of County Service Officer for Veterans is now held by Elmer Turner of this city, who was appointed to the office four years ago.

In their first official session just before noon, Commissioners re-appointed Justice of the Peace Treadwell, County Health Officer Dr. Kimbrough, and Veterans Service Officer Elmer Turner.

Also among the first official acts of the new Commissioners Court will be the employment of a custodian for the courthouse and a yardman for the courthouse and jail properties. The present custodian, Joe Massie, has been ill for some time. In charge of yard work for the past two years has been Roe Langford, who has also served as custodian during Massie's illness.

Horace Crawford Guest Speaker at Lions Meeting

Guest speaker at the meeting of the Lions Club Tuesday was Horace Crawford of this city, who gave a highly interesting talk based on his observations of the Japanese people, their customs and country, gained during a year's stay in the Far East while serving with U. S. Army forces.

The Haskell man, who received his discharge from the service last fall, went to Japan in August, 1951, and immediately began changing his preconceived ideas about the Japanese people, he told the Lions.

Instead of illiterate people he had pictured, he found the Japanese a generous, polite and happy people with a friendly disposition, and well educated. Although the average Japanese laborer makes only about \$20 a month based on American values, Crawford said they spent generously of their meager income to provide small favors for the American soldiers in their midst.

Due to the highly crowded population, Crawford said the Japanese had become highly industrious in farming their land and harvested around 60 bushels of rice and a similar quantity of wheat from each acre of land yearly. The people are natural artists and expert florists, and their artistry is quickly noticeable to a visitor.

One of the most striking things he noticed in Japan, Crawford said, was the fact that Japanese of every station in life were thoroughly "sold" on General Douglas MacArthur, whom they held in the highest esteem.

Spotted Results Reported as Deer Season Ends

AUSTIN.—Spotted results from the current big game season which ended Dec. 31 were reported by the executive secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

He said the harvesting of deer ranged from good throughout the Edwards Plateau area to "light and bad" in the country to the westward.

The executive secretary said seasonal surprises included the abundance of deer in parts of the most severe drought-ridden region of the Hill Country and the comeback of white-tailed deer in restocked areas.

The Commission has received many field reports describing the deer bagged as being unusually fat.

One of the restocked areas covered in first reports of the season's shoot was Freestone County in East Texas. Six years ago that area had no deer. Restocking was begun five years ago. The first legal shoot authorized this fall brought "very satisfactory results" according to the executive secretary.

Similar reports were made from half a dozen other areas which received shipments of deer trapped on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge.

The executive secretary said the wild turkey harvest was "the best in several years." He said that the shooting of gobblers was "good" in the Hill Country where about 90 per cent of the wild turkey hunting was done.

Draft Of 53,000 In February To Be Biggest In Two Years

The military high command at Washington has stepped up its call for draftees for the Army to the highest level reached since early in the Korean War. It asked selective service to induct 53,000 men in February.

This raised the prospect that 19-year-olds would be drafted in increasing numbers. A selective service spokesman said that state draft headquarters have been under orders to fill their quotas with older men whenever possible, but undoubtedly would be told to dip into the ranks of 19-year-olds if they could not get enough men otherwise.

Brig Gen. Guy N. Henninger, Nebraska state director of selective service, said at Lincoln that his state may not be able to meet its anticipated quota of about 700 without calling 19-year-olds. Other states may find themselves in the same position, although officials here indicated that still oth-

ers may not be forced to take 19-year-olds. Officials said there was no prospect of drafting fathers of men who have already served in Korea. Anna Rosenberg, assistant secretary of defense, said recently that it is planned to maintain the nation's present military strength of 3,600,000 men and women through June, 1954, without drafting fathers or Korean veterans.

Officials said the high call for February was necessary to replace draftees whose terms of service are coming to an end.

The February call is the highest for the Army since the early months of 1951. There was a high call for 59,650 men in January of 1952, but this included 1,650 for the Marine Corps. The Marines are no longer taking draftees. The Navy and Air Force are also relying on enlistments. The February call will bring to

1,255,430 the number of men drafted since the outbreak of fighting in Korea.

Draft calls for 1952, month by month, were as follows:

January, 59,650; February, 52,500; March, 28,600; April, 19,000; May, 19,000; June, 10,000; July, 31,000; August, 29,000; September, 30,000; October, 47,000; November, 47,000; December, 47,000.

For January, 1953, the draft call is 48,000.

Although the Defense Department's official explanation for the size of the February call was that many draftees' terms of service are about to run out, there appeared to be other factors contributing to the call.

A check of calls since last spring showed some monthly totals as low as 10,000 men. Why the calls were held down when the department knew that a large number of original draftees would be eligible for release starting this winter and spring was not clear.

Under Pentagon policy, each of the services can submit its estimate of men needed, but the final decision is made by the department's assistant secretary in charge of manpower, Anna Rosenberg. Army sources have declined to disclose what that service's monthly request to the Defense Department for transmission to Selective Service have been.

As has been the case since last May the Navy, Marines and Air Force have made no requests for draftees, depending on recruiting and re-enlistment to keep their strength at required levels.

The Army's current strength is about 1,352,000. But in planning to hold the force at about that level, Army headquarters here and in the Far East obviously have had to consider such factors as these:

1. The effect of the soldier rotation program, under which men are brought back from combat and must be replaced by others.

2. The release, in addition to draftees who were inducted in the first part of the Korean War of a large number of reservists who were called to active duty.

3. Replacement of battle casualties. This has not been a major factor in recent months, although during the fall offensive of the Communists U. S. casualties during a week mounted to an average of about 1,200. For the last few

Annual Physical 'Audit' Important

If you have not had audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done, is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to grown-ups in Texas. It is quite as important to check up on your physical resources as it is to look into the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's directions, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid an accumulation of destructive liabilities.

Everyone starts with a certain amount of physical capital and as a personal business proposition it is worthwhile to preserve. In infancy and childhood our physical resources, as a rule, are safeguards for us. As we grow older the responsibility for doing so rests upon the individual. The critical period for many comes in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being.

The records of health departments and of insurance companies show that from 10 to 15 years have been added to the average length of life. But the same records show that a majority of the deaths are due to the degenerative diseases of middle age.

Nearly all of these diseases have slow beginnings and their onset discovered through physical examinations before they have gained serious headway. Early detection, adjustment of physical expenditures and better budgeting of activities under a physician's direction will shift the balance from the unfavorable to the favorable side of the ledger.

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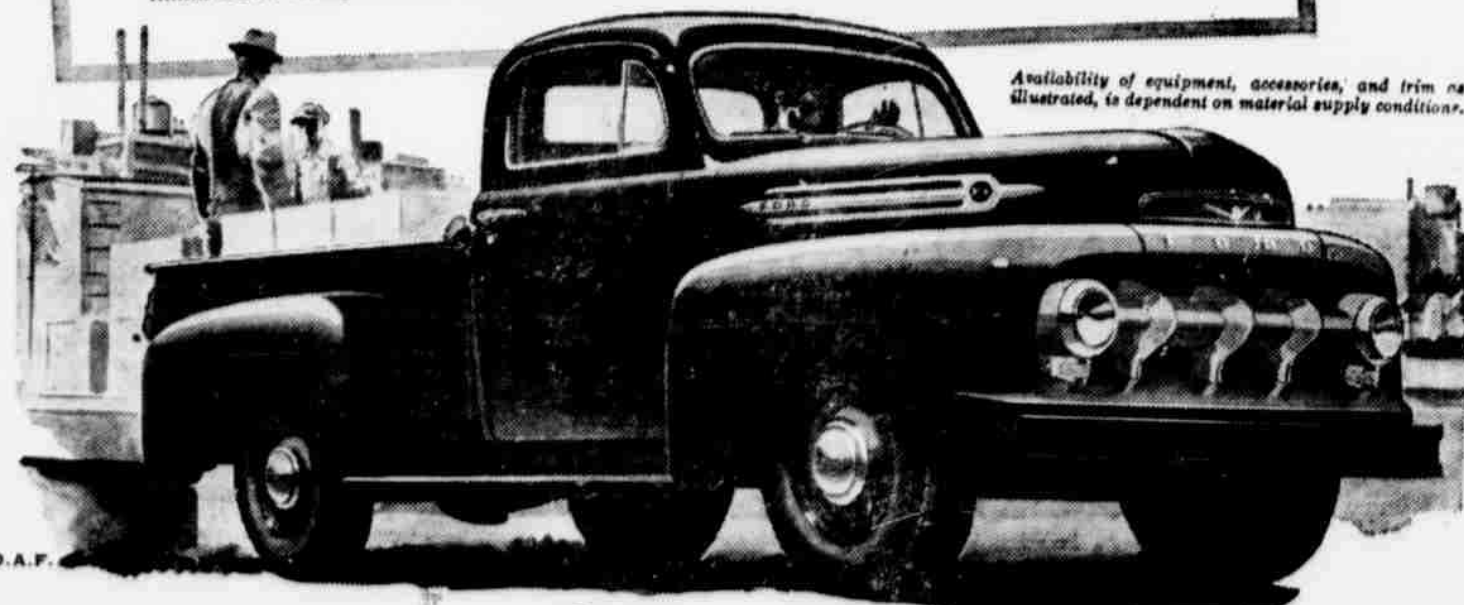

Fort Worth Stock Show Will Hold Press Day, Feb. 2

"Press-Radio-TV Day" will be one of the highlights of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, which opens Jan. 30 and runs through Feb. 8. Newspapermen and representatives of radio and television will have Monday, Feb. 2, as their day, officials of the Fort Worth exposition announce.

The guests of honor will have the opportunity of seeing one of the most important events of the entire exposition, the selection of the grand champion of the open stock show, and will attend the afternoon performance of the world's greatest indoor rodeo.

The Stock Show presented the first indoor rodeo in the world and the visitors will see the biggest grand entry of them all, 600 riders. This year's rodeo may well prove to be the most outstanding in the show's history because producers will be the new partnership of Beutler Bros. and Verne Elliott. The latter, known as "Mr. Rodeo," has produced all but two of Fort Worth rodeos, beginning in 1924, as well as Cheyenne Frontier Days, Calgary Stampede and the Denver, Chicago and Kansas City rodeos for years. Last year, Beutler Bros. presented 28 rodeos. The merger brings to-

gether the two top strings of rodeo stock in the world.

Interspersed with the rodeo contests are horse show events and on the afternoon of Feb. 2 two of the most colorful classes will be presented: the Palomino silver mounted stake in the cutting horse contest, with the horses carrying equipment valued at thousands of dollars, and the children's class of Shetland ponies not exceeding 46 inches in height. In fact, Press Day will be one of the fullest days of the entire exposition, with judging of Herefords, Palomino halter classes open steers, open barrows, lambs, poultry, turkeys and sheep. In addition there will be the Southwestern dairy judging and the general livestock judging for junior A&M and teachers college students.

An all-time high, \$172,272 in premiums is offered at the '53 Show, an increase of almost \$10,000 over the previous year.

Night Hunters Enhance Fines

Austin, Texas.—The Director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission said the monthly arrest report included 42 cases for hunting deer after hours.

The specific charges were hunting deer at night (35) and headlighting (7). Some of these arrests also involved allied complaints such as possessing doe or fawn deer and trespassing.

An Austin man, in one such seizure, was fined \$200 for shooting a doe and \$100 for hunting deer at night plus court costs.

Two Odessa men got equally stern treatment in court. One was fined \$125 for possessing doe meat and \$50 for hunting at night, all plus court costs.

It was \$400 and costs for a San Antonio man under similar circumstances. The court made it \$200 each on charges of headlighting and possessing doe meat.

Twenty-four Texans were fined for shooting illegal deer. Eighteen were charged with possessing doe meat, four were charged for bagging spike buck and two were fined for killing fawn deer.

Hunting from automobiles was another major source of prosecution. Twenty-four such cases were recorded in the monthly report. There were 39 cases for trespassing, 61 cases for hunting without a license, 14 for killing ducks after legal hours, and nine for shooting with an unplugged gun.

Fines and court costs for the 379 cases totaled \$11,581.44, compared to \$12,875.75 for 493 cases last month and \$10,056.20 for 332 cases for November, 1951.

One-Third of State's Highway Funds Required For Maintenance, WTCC Told

This is the second in a series of articles on Texas' road and highway needs, submitted by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and based on data assembled by that organization.

Sources of revenue to the Texas highway department for road construction and maintenance will be presented in this article. The first of the series set out the total estimated cost of construction of all types of roads that now are needed—a figure that topped one and one-half billions of dollars.

One-third of the total of \$122,431,247 received in 1951 by the Texas highway department was spent for maintenance of more than 46,000 miles of roads in the total system, according to information given the West Texas Chamber of Commerce highway policy committee by the highway department.

It was pointed out in the first of this series of articles that the department's planning survey of December, 1951 showed that roads of all types needed by the state would cost slightly more than one and one-half billion dollars.

The funds devoted to construction and maintenance of the system—federal aid primary, state and farm-to-market roads—come from four sources: the state motor fuel tax, motor vehicle registration fees, the general fund for farm roads, and federal aid.

The motor fuel (gasoline) tax provided \$45,187,511 in 1951. This is the principal source of revenue. Contrary to the opinion of many people, all of the 4-cent per gallon gasoline tax does not go into the highway fund. Actually only 2.6 cents is allocated for highway purposes.

One cent of the 4-cent levy goes into the school fund. One cent of the tax has been diverted since 1932 to retire bonds issued by counties and road districts. In 1950, approximately 4-10 of this one-cent levy was needed to retire bonds maturing in that year. As the law now is written, the remaining 61-0 of this cent is divided between counties for road purposes, and the highway department. The last Legislature froze at \$7,300,000 the total to counties out of the one-cent so-called "bond assumption" fund, the remainder going to the state.

Thus, from the 4-cent gasoline tax, a cent is deducted for schools, and approximately four-tenths cent to retire county bonds leaving approximately 2.6 cents for construction and maintenance by the state.

The state department received \$32,561,756 in 1951 from motor vehicle registration fees. A total of \$53 million was collected in such fees. The counties received the balance of approximately \$20 million.

Each county keeps the first \$50,000 it collects in registration fees. After that, it divides the remainder with the state on a 50-50 basis until the county receives \$175,000. All fees collected in a county in excess of \$175,000 goes to the state.

Funds for Farm-to-Market roads come primarily from two sources. The Briscoe-Colson bill provides for the diversion of \$1,250,000 per month from the state general fund and \$7,300,000 per year from the bond assumption fund.

Receipts to the State for Farm-to-Market roads totaled \$20,949,533 in the year ended August 31, 1951.

Federal funds allotted for Texas construction in 1951 totaled \$29,681,979. The Federal government collects this money in the form of a tax of two cents per gallon of gasoline. Federal aid money must be matched by state money.

Area Farmers Doing Work On Terraces, SCS Reports

E. W. Thane, farmer living in the south edge of Haskell County has recently completed maintenance on the terrace ends on his farm, technicians with the California Creek Soil Conservation District report. Thane is building up the ends to protect his terrace system from possible damage by allowing water to empty onto pasture during heavy rains.

B. O. Youngquist, farmer in the Ericksdahl community has five acres of vetch planted to supplement his winter grazing crops of rye and oats. He plans to graze the vetch only if needed, as he believes in turning legumes back to the soil as a green manure. He also has found some interesting facts about Pica-butia (dry land alfalfa). He planted some on clean ground this year and didn't receive a satisfactory growth. While planting the seed a few of them fell on oat stubble land and came up to a good stand. He believes the stubble held enough moisture to bring the seed up. He plans to plant 10 to 15 acres of Pica-butia next year if the season is favorable.

Dude Apperson, farmer in the Tuxedo community is maintaining his terraces using a whirlwind terracer and farm tractor. He plans to build the terraces back to the same size they were when first built. His terraces were 20 feet wide and 1.0 feet high.

J. C. Denon, J. M. Stubbs and Otto Steike of the Flat Top soil conservation group have recently started a soil conservation program by placing their farms under agreement with the California Creek Soil Conservation District.

Hiram Olson, chairman of the board of supervisors of the CCSC District has received one of the land leveling machines the district has recently purchased.

These machines will be used to level land between terraces for a better distribution of water and for level border irrigation.

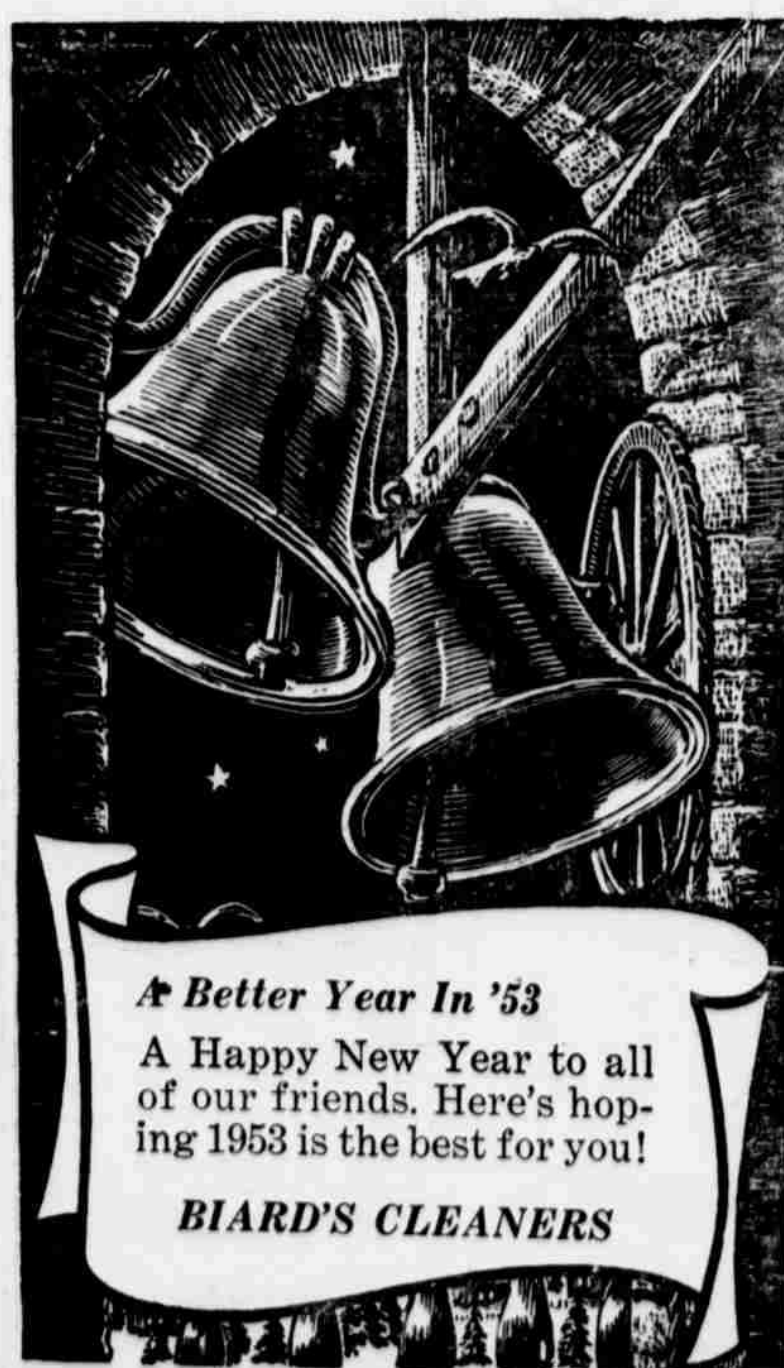
