## West Texas Cotton Growers to Meet Today to Discuss Program For A Refund On Expenses In Worm Killing

Representatives of Infested Area to Ask State Legislature for Reimbursement On Quarantine

(Special To The Avalanche)  
BIG SPRING, Jan. 16.—The Chamber of Commerce secretaries of the counties in the infested pink boll worm area will hold a meeting in Midland on January 17th to discuss plans by which a program will be arranged to present to the state legislature to have the farmers reimbursed for charges for fumigating cotton and sterilization of cotton seed.

LAMESA, Jan. 16.—According to call of W. A. Wilson, chairman of the public committee for the West Texas Cotton Growers association a meeting will be held in Midland on Thursday of this week of this committee for the purpose of outlining plans for securing favorable publicity for what is known as the "Infested Pink Boll Area" which is a part of the territory of this newly formed organization. Other matters of interest to this section will also be discussed according to Wilson.

A bill has just been introduced in both House and the Senate of the State legislature that will seek to moderate the present pink boll worm law. As it now stands wherever the regulations are imposed the farmers in that section have to bear all the costs of lint fumigation and seed sterilization. This is felt to be very unjust by farmers of this section in as much as the reason for imposing the regulations is obvious for the protection of the cotton growing section the state and the south where it is believed the pest will thrive and make devastation.

No Damage Likely  
According to entomologist both Federal and State the pink boll worm has not and will likely never do any material damage here and this year fewer worms have been found in the area than heretofore. In Dawson county according to authorities in charge of the agricultural station where no worm has been found here this fall and winter. There were only two "dead" worms found here last year that caused the concern which resulted in the establishment of a regulated area here.

The farmers of this section have kept records of all the expenditures that has incurred from the establishment of this regulation and will ask the state to reimburse them for what they have been out this past year. They feel, as it now seems the state and authorities as a whole feel that it is nothing but right that this expense be distributed among the tax payers of the state as this is the only equitable way that the farmers of this state can pay for a "Common Protection." They feel that in as much as this section is not in immediate danger from this pest and the quarantine is placed to protect the "rest of Texas" and the "South" that the most that should be required of the farmers of this section would be the proration of taxes necessary to care for the expense of enforcing these regulations.

Place Burden On State  
The bill as introduced in the present legislature will place the burden of expense of enforcing all pink boll worm regulations on the state. So far it has little opposition, because "it is right" so says our state press and public officials. The people of West Texas are strong for this bill and all of Texas should get behind the representative and Senator and request the passage of this bill, for "rest of Texas" may be placed in the same position as is West Texas now, and it behooves her now to hedge" according to those who are studying the maneuvering of this pest. Then it is a matter of fair play. The farmers of this section are entitled to this state of justice. The farmers of this section are asking for nothing except what is absolutely right. It is

believed at this time that the "rest of Texas" will want to see nothing except fair play in this matter. The bill has been introduced in the House by Webb, Metcalfe and Rountree, all representatives from the section of West Texas affected, and in the Senate by Small and Parrish.

home town. In 1907 he had purchased a controlling interest in the First National Bank there. His strength as a financier and business man was attested by his successful operation in the panic of the same year and in the depression that followed the world war. Two banks closed their doors. Walker notified the public that he would lend to depositors of the two banks with accounts of \$50 and less the full amount of their accounts. When the existence of the town was threatened by lack of a water supply in 1921, Walker and Caldwell built a water works at a cost of \$1,000,000 and operated it successfully until it was sold several years ago to Eastern interests.

He served three years as mayor of Breckenridge. His liberality made possible a large church; he and Caldwell donated land for a High school and Walker contributed and was responsible for the large Y. M. C. A. building. He largely was responsible for getting three railroads into his town, which, when oil came was without a railroad.

When the lean years followed the oil boom Lubbock put up \$400,000 of his private money for the use of the bank, which has always been one of the strongest in that section of the state. He added ranching to his interests several years ago and purchased a large property in Shackelford county. He held stock in a number of banks, controlling three in West Texas. At the time of his death he was chairman of the board of directors of the First National Bank of Fort Worth and a director of the American Exchange National Bank of Dallas. Walker moved to Fort Worth several years ago, but maintained at Breckenridge a home as well-fitted as the one here.

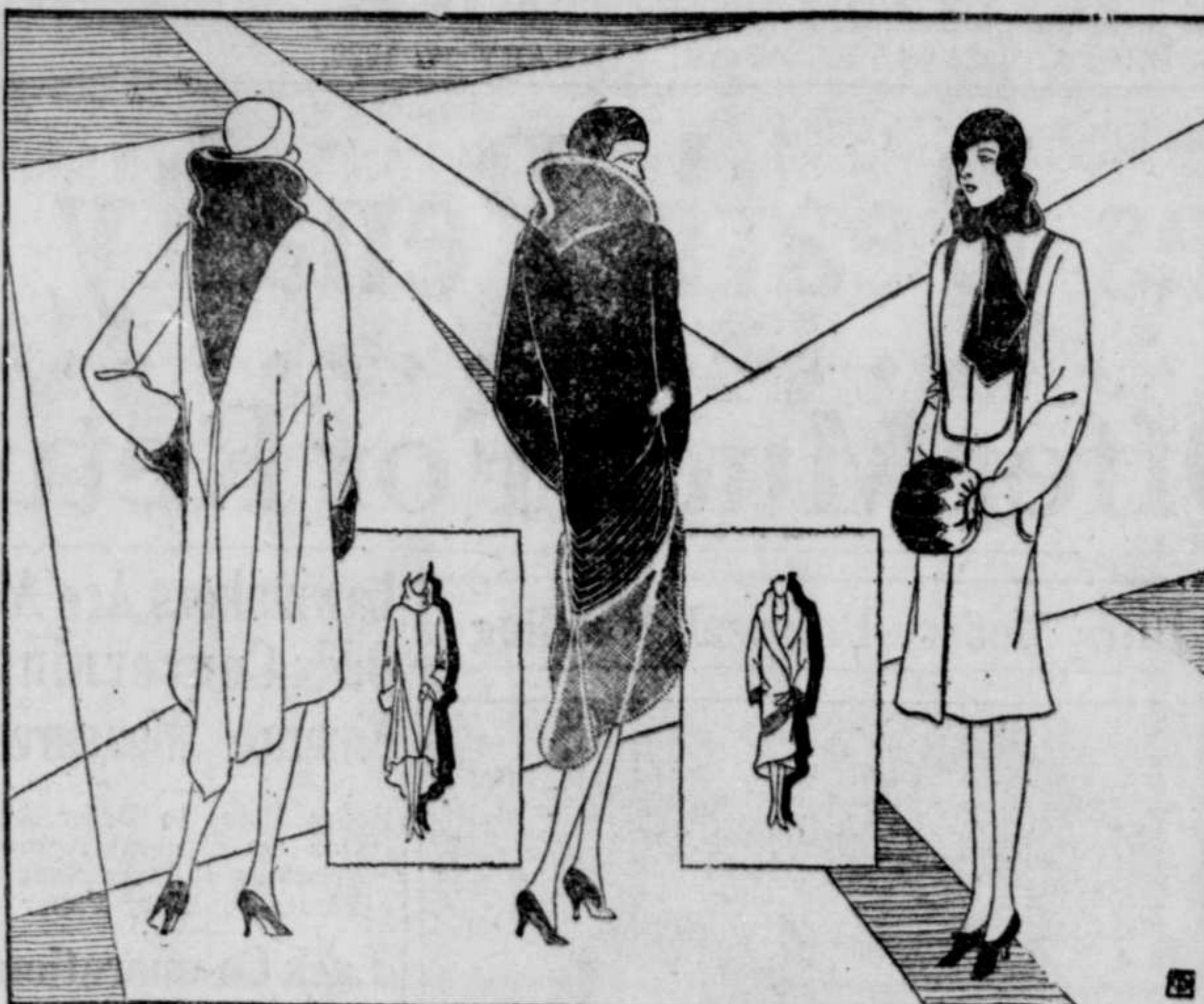

found impossible for Slaton and Lubbock voters to come to some sort of an agreement on a county-wide bond issue, then the petition, now on file, would have priority over any other and this road district number two could then be created. Counter to this comes the suggestion that the county commissioners might have the constitutional right to postpone, or delay, action on creating the road district asked for by the petition on file, but that they can not take any action on either a petition for another road district, or another petition calling for a county-wide road bond election. To call an election, it has been pointed out, without taking action on the petition now on file, would be to ignore the wishes of Lubbock county citizens, and would be looked upon by some as high-handed methods on the part of the commissioners. In any event, the subject of road bond elections, new independent road districts, and kindred topics, promise a good crop of conjecturing in Lubbock county for weeks—perhaps many months—to come.

Another Idea For Use of Old Felt

in which any matter may be introduced, usually has been devoted to general legislation, because such legislation cannot be considered at a special session, unless it is mentioned by the governor in his call. A special session has been called to consider appropriations, and since the call limits subjects to be considered, members can devote most of their time to a study of the financial needs of state supported institutions.

A few advocates of immediate consideration of appropriations bills were found in the house, B. E. Quinn of Beaumont asserting that the legislature could pass all legislation facing it if it would get down to work and R. L. Kincaid of Crowell suggesting that the appropriations committee had no other work to do and should be discharged if it refused to work on appropriations.

Many Bills Bungled  
H. G. Woodruff of Decatur answered this with the assertion that the 39th legislature, which passed appropriation bills at the regular session, "bungled more measures than any other in the history of Texas. I claim it would be folly to attempt to pass appropriations at this session," he said.

G. J. Cox of Paris suggested that the senate's desire to pass appropriations was due to the zeal of "two candidates for governor and one for lieutenant governor" in the senate to establish a record for speedy legislation.

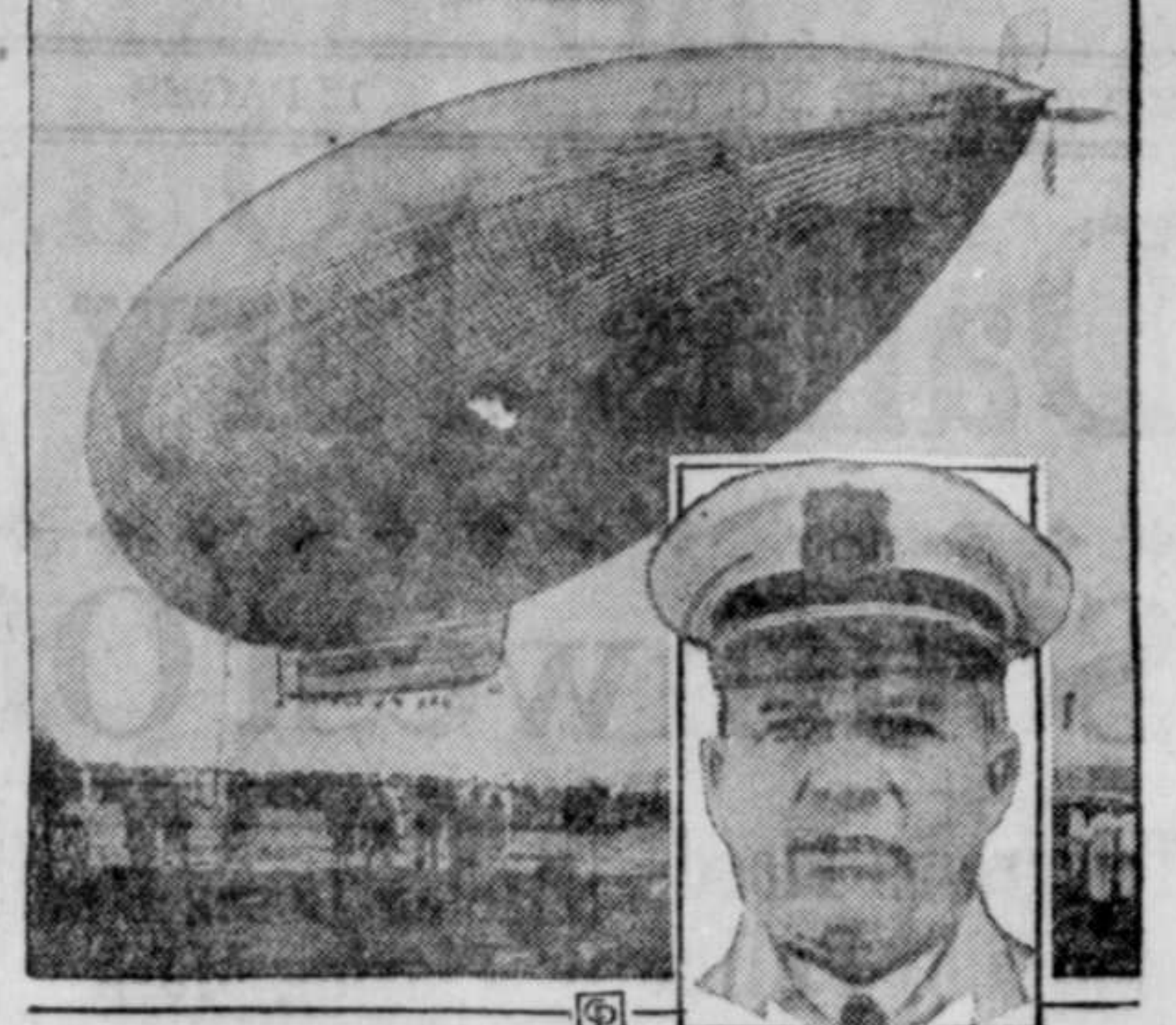
The fight concerns regular appropriation bills only, the two houses being in agreement on the question of passing emergency measures. This session, the senate has heard most requests from state educational institutions for emergency funds and the house committee began that task today.

Emergency Fund Low  
The senate finance committee found itself blocked in consideration of emergency appropriations by discovery that only about \$30,000 would be available for that purpose.

Senator Tomas G. Pollard, chairman, immediately began drafting a bill which would withdraw the \$1,500,000 appropriated by the fourth legislature to insure a \$15 per capita apportionment to the available school fund. This money was not needed in making up the per capita allotment.

The state education department expressed approval of the bill because with its reappropriation

\$400,000 would be available to pay tuition of high school transfers. This would leave about \$1,100,000 for other emergency appropriations and the educational institutions alone have asked for a great deal more than that amount.

Vote Favorable Report  
The finance committee voted to report favorably on two deficiency appropriation measures aggregating approximately \$270,000. One consisted of the deficiencies authorized by the governor, about \$148,000 and the other of deficiencies growing out of law enforcement approximately \$122,000.

An attempt to raise the question of investigating the land office, now on the table in the senate, failed on a point of order. Senator B. F. Berkeley of Alpine, who has moved to substitute for the original resolution his proposal for a joint committee of the houses to study land office affairs, attempted to take this measure from the table for consideration but as the resolution which it amends still is on the table there was no way to accept this unless the senate was willing to take up the original measure again.

In executive session the senate

approved 23 recess appointments of Governor Moody before adjourning out of respect for Frank Patton of Crockett, father of Senator Nat Patton. Resolutions of sympathy for the senator were passed before adjournment. Senator Patton's father died today.

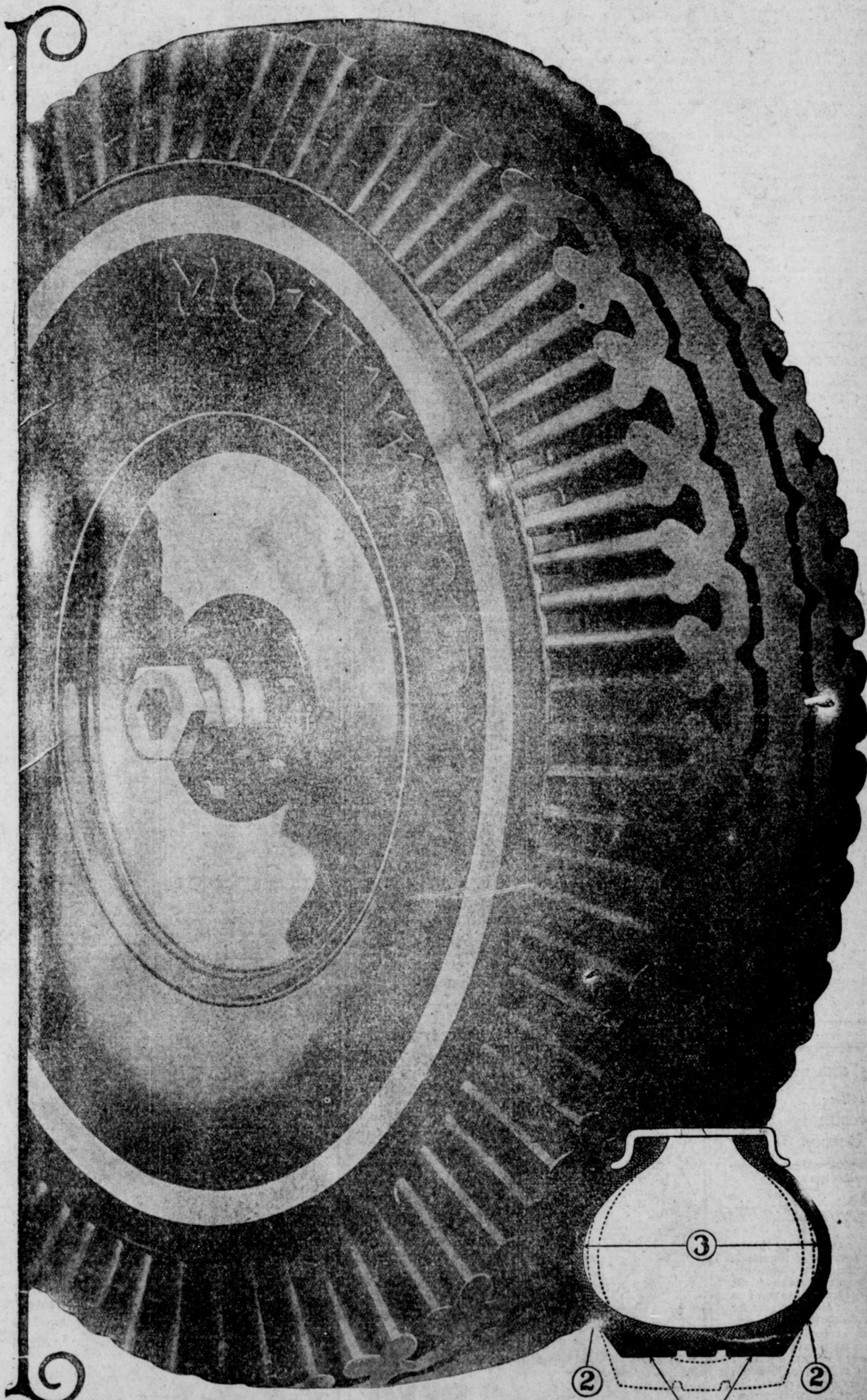

## How to Achieve Beauty

THE FROG

The third step in our evolution exercises takes care of the leg, back and abdominal muscles. This group is next in line for its "evolutionary awakening." The squatting exercises, which I shall classify under "The Frog" are excellent in developing the parts of the body which otherwise might suffer from at least partial disuse.

It's particularly important for you to include some squatting exercises in your daily routine. Most of us spend a great part of our day either sitting or standing. In either case muscles which should receive certain stimulus through regular exercises are comparatively atrophied.

As I've told you dozens of times, you will never attain complete physical health until every muscle and ligament in your body is doing the work that nature intended it to. That really is the basis of my whole series of exercises. I want you to follow, step by step, the road which nature took. Arousing us from complete relaxation to complete motion.

I don't know how many hundreds of letters I have received from women who complain of stiff knees, and painful joints. There's no reason in the world for women becoming stiff. I know that exercising isn't as simple as sixteen as it is before; not from the viewpoint of muscles, but simply because a weird combination of disinclination and dignity makes us forget such limbering up exercises as rope skipping and hopping, knee bending, and

other kindred exercises and sports. Remember age waits upon stiffening muscles, little, springy steps are utterly impossible for the woman whose joints crack every time she takes a step upstairs. While you are young it's easy to retain grace. When youth begins to pass a little hesitantly responsive muscles are your best defense!

I cannot imagine anything much more difficult than to begin knee bending exercises after a long period of inactivity. Don't be alarmed if you "creak" a little at first. It's a condition that you must expect. On the other hand, a "creak" in the intimacy of your boudoir is infinitely preferable to a snapping joint when you climb into a taxi or on the steps of a street car.

One incident which I noted during the performance of a very popular play this season brought these limbering exercises very clearly to my attention. A really youthful star was bending the knee to his "lady-faire," when to his shocked nerves I heard a distinct snap as the unaccustomed exercise centered in the knee joint. I'm sure that the young man was more discomforted than any of his audience, and I'm trusting most sincerely that he will go in for "frog" exercises. They'll do him a lot of good.

To the best of my knowledge, there is only one physical cause for snapping joints, and that is very seldom known in the temperate zone. In the tropics, there is a certain disease called the "break-bone fever." This leaves as its aftermath joints that snap audibly at every motion. It is more uncomfortable than dangerous, and once the fever has run its course, one might easily forget it, were it not for the social liability which it leaves behind.

Practice all the different developments of knee bending, from the simplest movement to the variation which turns into the Cossack dance. Step, hopping on one bent knee,

Add to fish mixture and fold in lightly with fork, taking care not to crush fish. Turn into individual molds garnished with slices of stuffed olives. Let stand on ice to chill and become firm. Turn out of molds and serve on a bed of lettuce.

Telegrams were sent Johnny Farrell, Gene Sarazen, Joe Turnesa and Willie Klein, four Ryder Cup nominees in Florida, regretting their absence and advising them that Captain Hagen hoped to have the 12 together at Pinehurst, N. C., at the north and south open, just before calling time.

Hagen intimated that while his team would do its best to win, that if Great Britain were to come out on top it would not be a bad thing for international golf.

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### YOU and BASKETBALL

BY H. C. CARLSON, M. D. University of Pittsburgh Basketball Coach

Practice sessions should include shooting, dribbling, pivoting and to some extent, passing and cutting. The thought of improvement should be uppermost in the mind. Individuals can report early and practice by themselves, but this must be done conscientiously and properly.

In any sport, there is an intrinsic value in lining up everyone at the start for a few calisthenics. There is an initial freedom. There is generated more good will and enthusiasm.

After calisthenics comes the practice of pivots, with and without the ball, with everyone performing the same part of the pivot at the same time.

The dribble should follow. Form and not speed comes first. After exercises in passing, followed by practice of integral parts of the system, including the fundamentals and the system itself, active scrimmage may follow.

The team on the offense should be given the ball, take it back, after it has been lost and repeat the process. The opposition should be in order to permit the offensive team to develop confidence with-out the expenditure of too much physical or nervous energy.

Scrimmage between the first and second teams is not advisable after the season is under way except as an emergency measure to determine the question of ability not previously determined in certain men.

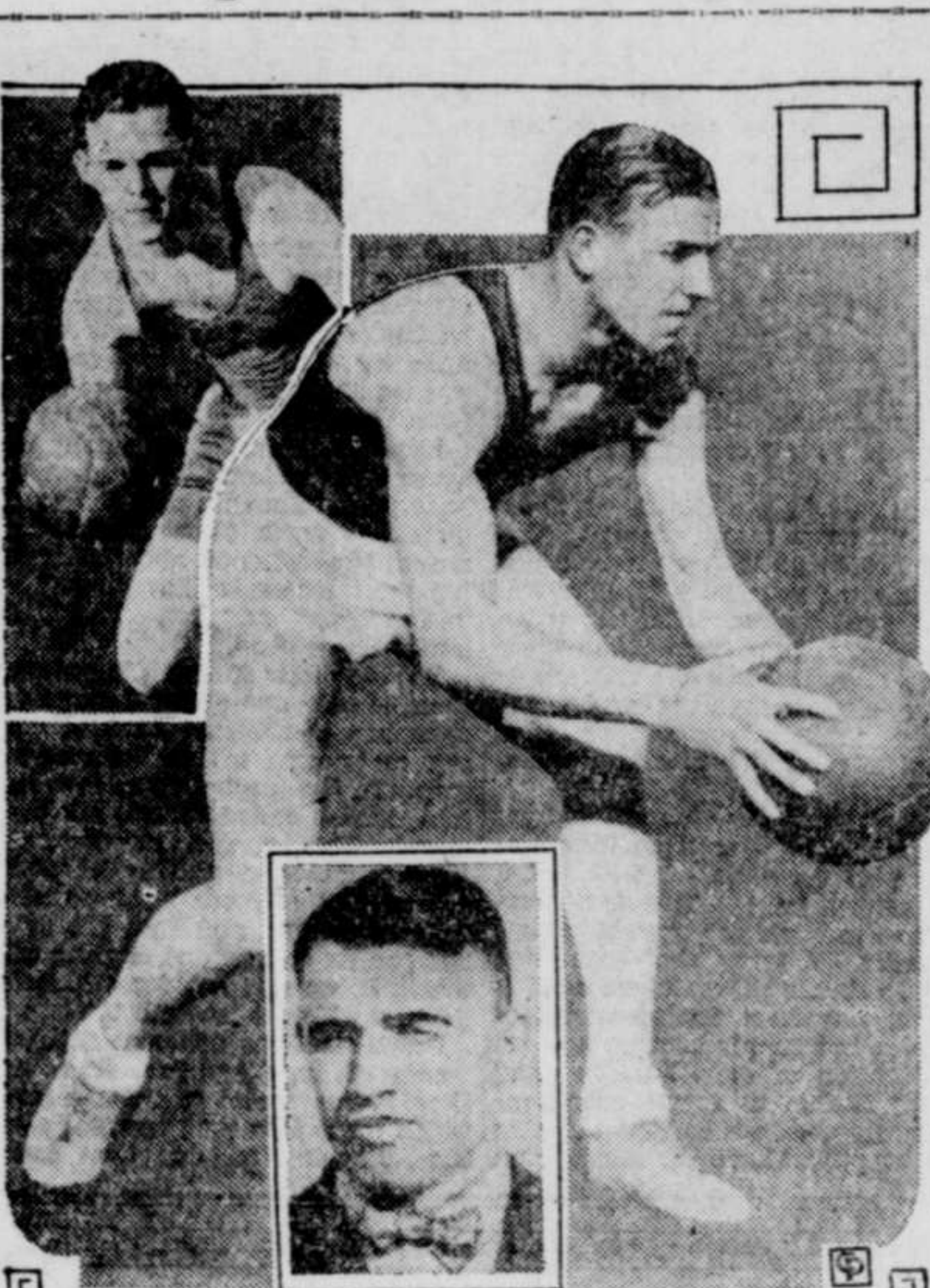
The program for tonight includes a contest involving the Wheelers and Teachers in the men's division of the league and a woman's game between Montgomery Ward and Business College.

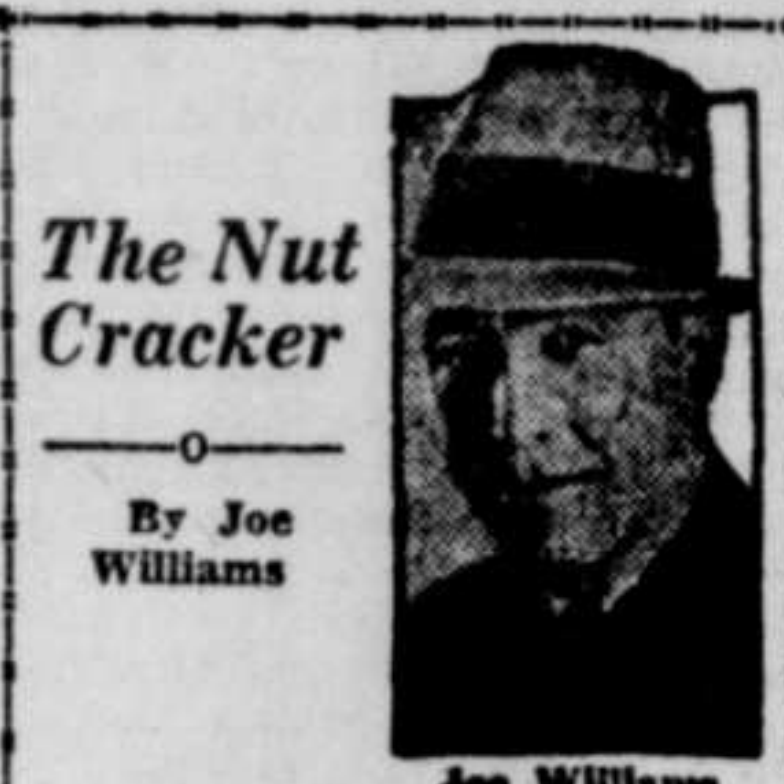

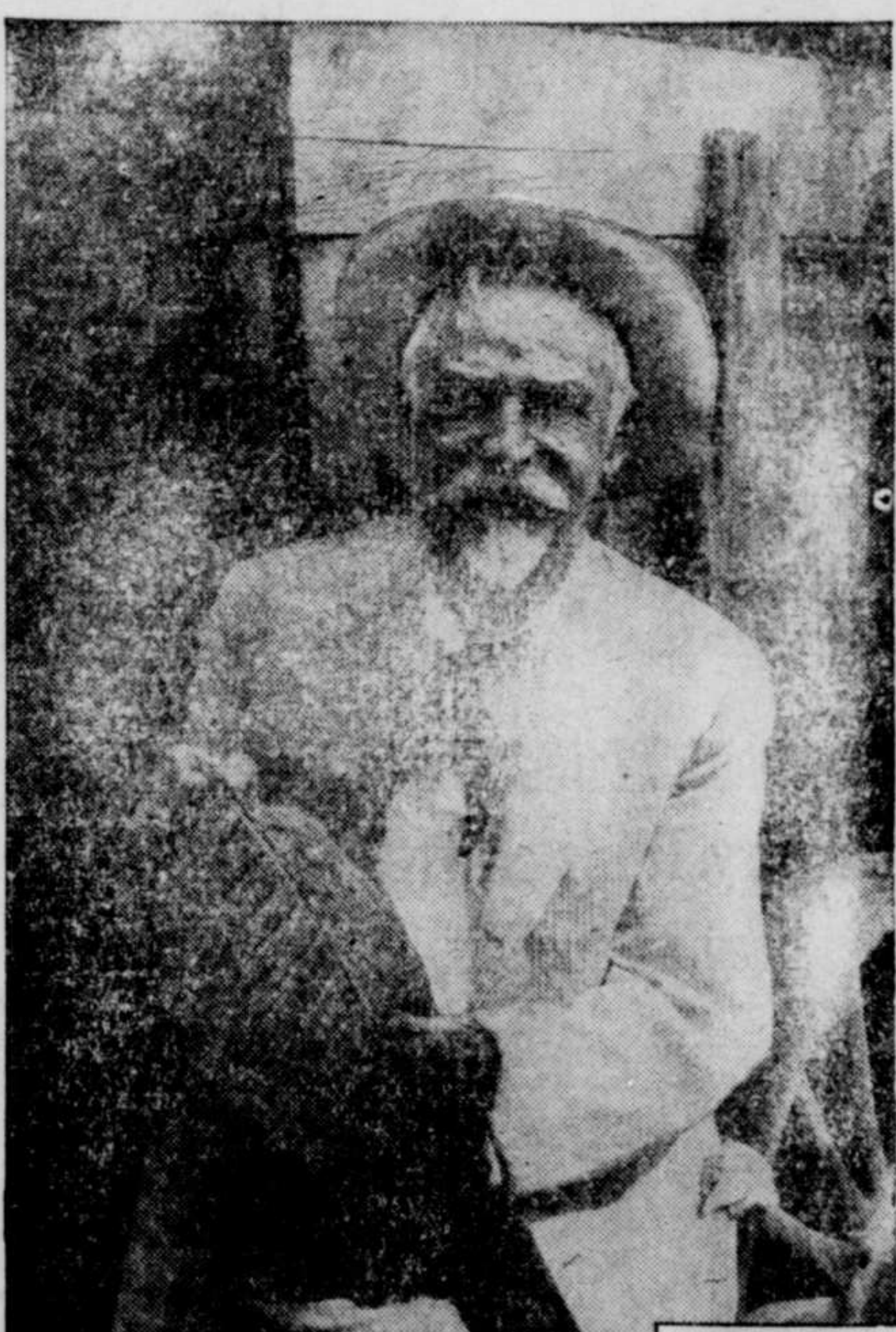
The East and every other sector which has carried the battle into the Midwest, or has been battled by college cohorts of the Central states has met staggering reverses.

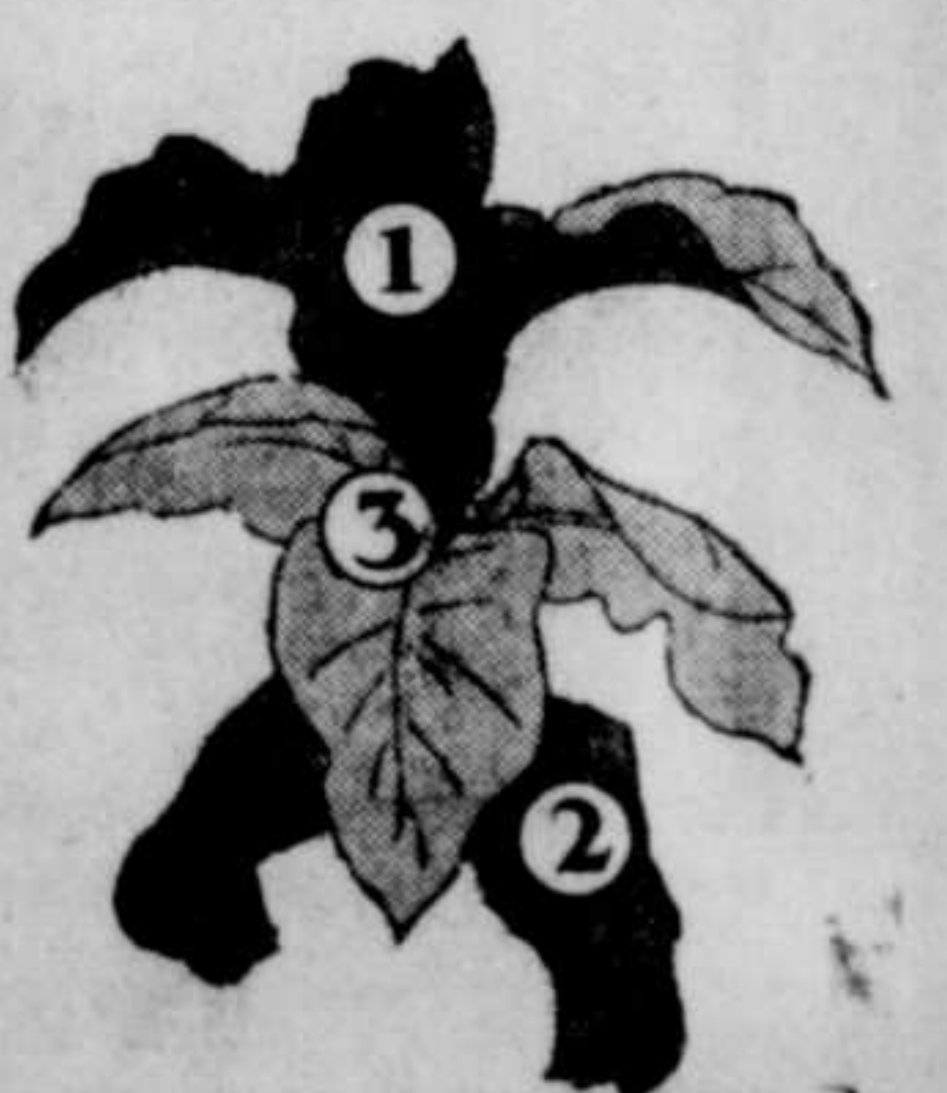

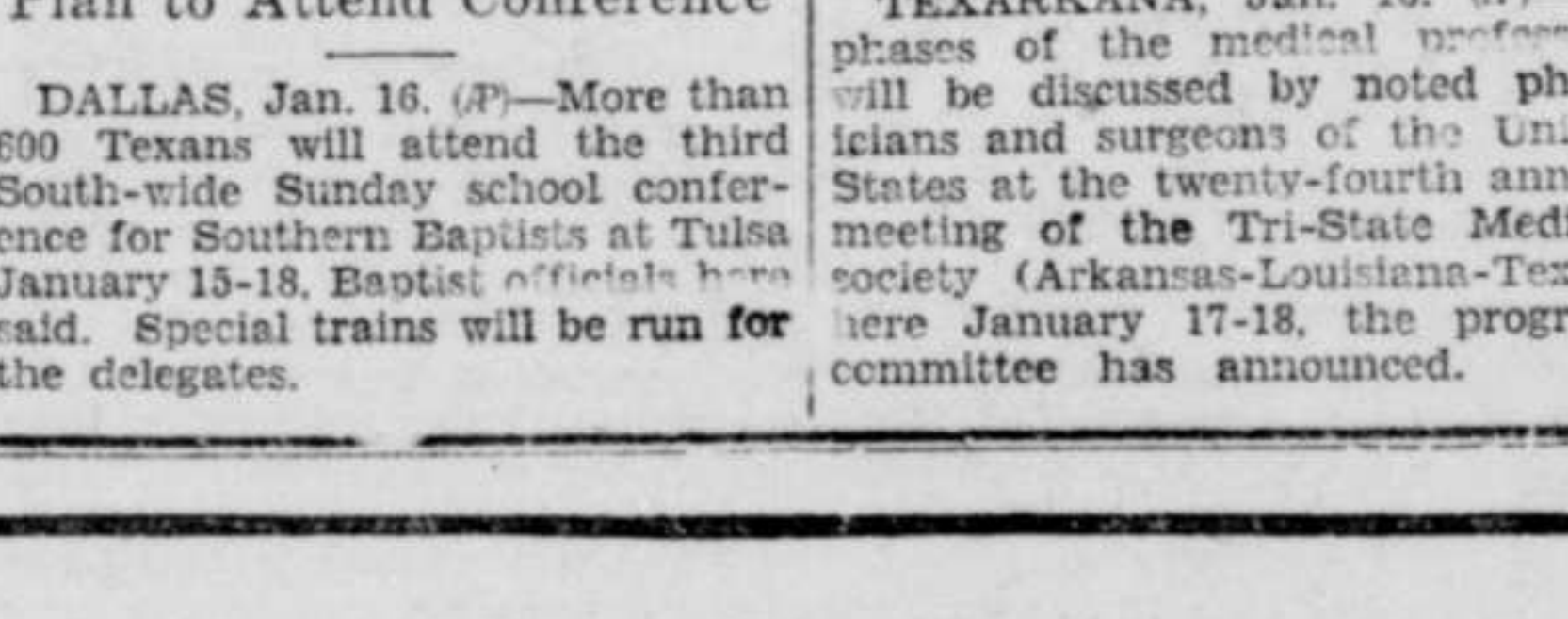

## Fergusons Lose In Tax Suit Decision

Court of Civil Appeals Upholds Decision of Lower Court In Case; Must Pay Delinquent Taxes

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Jan. 16.—The third court of civil appeals today affirmed the decision of the Academy Consolidated Independent School District against Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson and her husband, James E. Ferguson, involving delinquent taxes, interest and penalties on property in the district.

The Ferguson suit had claimed that the land the board assessed was "so remote and inaccessible with reference to the location of the school houses as not to be benefited by the schools or taxes for an amount in excess of their true and fair market value."

A jury trial on special issues was held in Bell county resulting in a verdict for the school district. The judgment as to delinquent taxes, interest and penalties was affirmed, but remanded as to that part where assessments were increased ten percent as a penalty for non-rendition.

### KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 16. (P)—(U. S. D. A.)—An active trade featured the fat lamb market again today and prices ruled 25 to 50c higher; choice fed lambs reached 17.00 at Chicago while a comparable grade at the river markets brought 16.65; mature classes were scarce and purities were strong at 25c up with best fat going at 10.50 at Chicago; receipts moderate with total arrivals at 41,400 against 71,105 last Wednesday and 54,807 a year ago.

Abroad shipping demand was responsible for a 15 to 25c higher hog market at all points; offerings scaling under 240 pounds had the preference; weightier kinds closed with some weakness in evidence; the extreme top reached 9.45 on 170-200 weight at St. Louis; total arrivals at the 11 markets were 109,600 as compared with 131,749 a week ago and 121,286 a year ago.

Trade in all killing classes of cattle was slow but no material change in values was registered; in between grades of yearlings and heavy heifers met a dull outlet at the Kansas City market with prices somewhat lower; vealers ruled strong to 50c higher with the demand fairly active; best fed yearlings brought 15.25 at Chicago for the days top; limited receipts of stocker and feeder steers at all points held prices on a firm basis; choice yearling stockers scaling around 100 pounds brought 12.25 and choice stock calves 13.50 at Kansas City; offerings totaled 35,050 against 39,912 a week ago and 44,027 a year ago.

### NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 16. (P)—After ruling sluggish all morning and in early afternoon the cotton market strengthened in final trading today making new highs for the day under a demand stimulated by the firmness of stocks. March contracts rallied from 19.53 to 19.70 and closed at the latter figure, net 14 points up. The general market closed steady at net advances of 11 to 15 points.

Liverpool cables were relatively easier and the market here opened at declines of 1 to 2 points. Some further offerings after the start extended the decline to 19.52 for January, 19.53 for March and 19.57 for May or 2 to 4 points under yesterday's close.

The easiness met good trade buying and some covering probably promoted by a reported spot demand at a higher basis and before noon March traded at 19.66 and May 19.71, or 13 to 14 points up from the lows.

Trading was moderate during the morning probably due to the influence still exerted by yesterday's disappointing boll weevil report. Around noon some liquidation and realizing developed and carried the level off 9 to 10 points from the highs to about parallel with yesterday's close.

In the final hour the demand broadened due to the firmness of stocks and active positions made new highs for the day with January selling at 19.65; March 19.70 and May 19.75, or 13 to 18 points above the early lows. Final prices were at the top.

Receipts, 24,413; for week, 116,106; for year, 7,558,411; last year, 6,456,487. Exports, 37,338; for week, 93,017; for year, 5,138,730; last year, 4,167,441. Stocks, 2,331,721; last year, 2,452,955. Stock on shipboard 143,831; last year, 153,872. Spot sales, 24,292, last year, 14,965.

### NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, Jan. 16. (P)—While somewhat irregular, the cotton market was generally higher today on covering and trade and commission house buying, which appeared to be inspired by reports of a better tone in the stock market and of continued steadiness in the spot situation. March contracts sold up from 20.18 to 20.36, and closed at 20.35. The general market closed very steady at net advances of 12 to 15 points.

The market opened steady at an advance of 4 points to a decline of 6 points and sold about 2 to 6 points net lower during the first few minutes under realizing or liquidation and some local selling. The offerings were light, however, and after easing off to 20.08 for January and 19.78 for July, the market turned steadier. There was some trade buying as well as covering or re-buying.

### Farmers Eager for Campaign on Dogs

"Much interest is being shown by farmers who want to rid their lands of this pest, and I think we can expect concerted action when we get ready to start our battle," Mr. Eaton said.

An effort will be made to secure the cooperation of the county commissioners court in ridding the lands of non-resident farm owners, Mr. Eaton said, as the aim is to completely eradicate all prairie dogs from Lubbock county in the drive.

#### ENROLLMENT IS 2,340

Much Progress Shown in Big Spring Schools

(Special to The Avalanche) BIG SPRING, Jan. 16.—A check up of the Big Spring public schools show 2340 pupils, according to W. C. Blankenship. An enrollment of 2500 pupils is expected by second semester at which time the new school building will be in readiness. The building contains 21 class rooms, auditorium, and gymnasium and was constructed at a cost of \$100,000.00.
