



County Buys Elevator

Underground Sprinklers, Landscaping Also Planned

Mitchell County Commissioners Tuesday in their regular monthly meeting voted to spend \$32,877.33 to renovate the courthouse, including the installation of an elevator.

The low bidder for the installation of the elevator was Virgil Stone with a bid of \$30,863 of which \$12,550 will be the cost

for a Dover 1,500 pound capacity elevator. The cost of the elevator was originally estimated at \$25,000 but commissioners had budgeted in Revenue Sharing Funds \$45,000 for the elevator and renovation of the courthouse just in case.

The commissioners voted for the elevator despite a survey, conducted by the Colorado City Record, which resulted in 103 forms being mailed to commissioners with names of people opposed to the spending of money for the elevator.

There were 46 forms sent in favoring the spending of the money for the elevator. The

Record had opposed the elevator editorially, saying there were better uses for the money.

Several citizens told the Record they believed the money would be better spent to renovate the county jail to bring it up to federal standards.

The fact that the local jail does not meet federal standards came to light recently when

a car loaded with prisoners being transported from El Paso to another prison broke down here.

The prisoners could not be housed in the Mitchell County jail because, it was said, the local jail did not meet federal standards.

The commissioners also ac-

cepted the low bid of \$1,152.78 from Ed Love Plumbing for the installation of an underground water sprinkler system on the courthouse lawn.

Snyder Nursery with a bid of \$861.55 will landscape the lawn.

The elevator in the three-story courthouse will be located where County Judge Bill Carter's office is now. Carter's office will be relocated on the second floor along with the district and county attorney's offices, the law library and the county courtroom.

Construction on the elevator is expected to start by July 1 and is expected to take between 90 to 120 days to complete.

Council Here Has Heated Discussion

The City Council of Colorado City labored long and hard in a four hour meeting Monday night in a meeting marked by heated debate over a number of items.

The first order of business was the annual audit report, presented by Joe Morren, Certified Public Accountant, who found the city's books in good shape.

Following the audit, City Manager presented a bill from Price Construction of Snyder for \$4,890.90 for the paving of Cherry and 13th Streets around the football field. The school is to pay half of that cost.

It was during that discussion

that councilman Rick Perkin made note of his observation of the seal coating in April of Oak Street. Perkin said he did not believe the city got its money's worth on the project as almost all gravel put on the seal coating is now gone and there wasn't even any tar put on part of the street.

In addition, Perkin noted, chug holes in the street were filled with gravel instead of being filled with a paving mix. He asked who's responsibility it is to fill chug holes on a seal-coat project to which City Manager J.A. Sadler, Jr., said it was the city's job.

Perkin then noted that he had

observed that some of the city's filling of chug holes was only half done as after the filling was put in place it was not compacted as is necessary. He then noted that he had done part of the compacting with his own jeep.

Mayor C.C. (Mike) Burt said that a rush job was necessary on Oak Street as it had been almost totally destroyed by ice and weather during the winter and if action hadn't been taken immediately, the street would now be totally lost and would have to be completely repaved at a considerably higher cost than just the seal coating.

However, Perkin countered that the street is now totally lost even after wasting the money on the seal-coating and invited members of the council to drive on the street and inspect it.

Councilwoman Mrs. Tom (Jody) Neff then asked just how the city reaches its priorities on paving. She mentioned a need to establish priorities and make plans to pave blocks of dirt roads that she said are a safety hazard as well as being expensive to maintain.

Burt said the city didn't have any money as the budget has already been made for the current year and there isn't any extra. The mayor noted that he didn't think the city should pave people's streets for them unless property owners wanted to pay their share as he had to do for paving around his home.

Mrs. Neff said governments have to change in order to do what is necessary for the benefit of all the citizens. Perkin added that doing the paving would save the city money on maintenance.

Mrs. Neff then commented that she knew the city doesn't have money to undertake the projects now but a plan should be established so that the funds could be appropriated in the future.

A plan was also the center of debate on a later item regarding the quality of the city's water. Councilman Eddie Pfland brought a sack full of clothes, that were once white and are now off-white after being washed in city water. The city should provide clean water to its customers, Pfland said.

Sadler made note that the city is working as hard as possible to solve the problem of the water and that 10,000 feet of water lines have been put into place in the last six weeks since the city bought a ditching machine.

He said 5,000 feet was put in to extend city water to the country club, 2,680 feet in Ruddick Park and several thousand feet of pipe on the south side.

Then Perkin proposed "That the city council instruct the city manager to draw up and present to the council for approval and subsequent adoption a master plan to cover a period of not less than 2 years outlining work to be done on a scheduled basis (with emergency clause) on residential water lines, city water storage tanks and lines included."

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

The 63rd Legislature came into office on the heels of the Sharpstown Scandal -- a situation that rightfully caused the banner of reform in government to be raised high in Texas. Citizens demanded a thorough house cleaning and to know more about how their government functioned.

Under the strong leadership of Speaker Price Daniel, Jr., the House undertook and passed the following measures:

--A new code of ethics law that requires public financial disclosure by elected state officials down through district judges and many appointed officials. Personally, I am for the fullest disclosure of finances and will file a complete and open statement on a regular basis.

--A new lobby control law that would require certain disclosures of activities and expenditures of individuals and groups either for or against legislation.

--A major revision and strengthening of the laws demanding full disclosure of political campaign contributions and spending designed to trace the flow of cash in politics. This measure will require politicians to show

who pays off campaign deficits they are left with after winning offices.

--The open meeting law was strengthened and extended to Legislative Committees to give citizens an opportunity to know how decisions are made by their government.

--A new law stating which records are open to the public and which are not.

--For the first time, a law was passed requiring public disclosure of who pays for the election of the Speaker of the House and how the money is spent.

--And a new law that outlaws threats and promises to gain votes by candidates for Speaker of the House.

Clinic For Dogs Set Saturday

A second special clinic has been scheduled for 10 a.m. to noon Saturday at the Colorado City Veterinary Clinic to give rabies shots to dogs before a new city dog ordinance goes in to effect July 1.

The new ordinance requires that all dogs be vaccinated and that all dogs be kept either in an escape proof enclosure or on a leash.

City Council Monday night hired Glenda Love, 30, as animal warden to enforce the new ordinance.

Cost of the rabies shot is \$4 part of which will go to the Mitchell County Boys Club which will help hold the clinic.

Cost of a city dog license is now \$1. That cost will be increased to \$2 July 1 under the new ordinance.

Sylvester Rose To Be Sentenced

Sylvester Rose of Lorraine, will be sentenced Monday in county court after he was found guilty last week of transporting alcoholic beverages in a dry area, namely Mitchell County.

Rose is now awaiting the results of an appeal on his conviction last year of transporting beer in a dry area (Mitchell County). On that conviction, he was assessed punishment of 75 days in jail and a fine of \$300.

Bob Motley To School Board

Bob Motley, rural mail carrier, of 2009 Vine, Monday night was appointed to the Colorado Independent School District board of trustees to serve until the next regular election in April.

He will fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Truman Nix. Nix who was elected to a three-year term in April, resigned from the board after accepting the job of head coach in Lorraine.

Although Nix was elected to a three-year term, the law states that the man appointed to that position will serve only until the next election when someone will be elected to serve the remainder of the term.

Motley was one of the five candidates in the race in April

for two positions on the school board. He came in third in the race.

In other action, the board accepted the resignations of Mrs. Florence Pratt and Mrs. Patsy Edens, whose resignations were necessary so that they could be reassigned to the Plan A program. Mrs. Pratt will succeed Mrs. Betty Richardson and Mrs. Edens is being assigned to the homebound program of the Plan A operation, a new position.

The board also hired Miss Kay Lynn Kelly to teach history and English at high school, succeeding Frank Markwood who resigned. Carl Berry Moore to succeed Mrs. Arnel Smith who retired at junior high; Kent Holder new band director to succeed Dwight Tomb who resigned and Mrs. Holder, to teach in an elementary position.

The board also appointed Mrs. Barbara Gray to be textbook custodian, succeeding Tracey Barnes who has accepted the See MOTLEY Page 4

Hospital Bill Signed

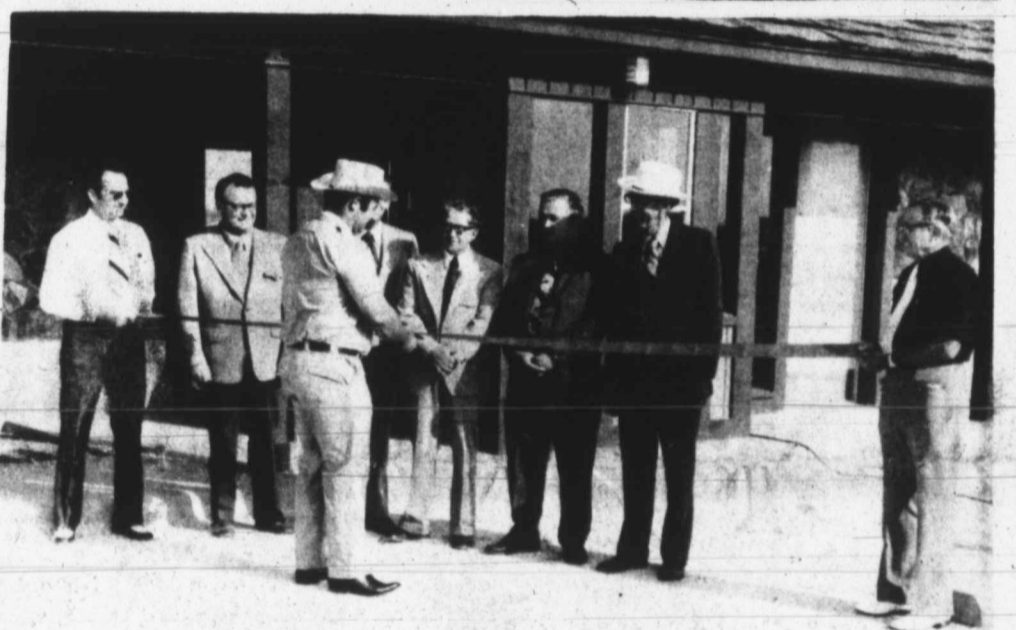

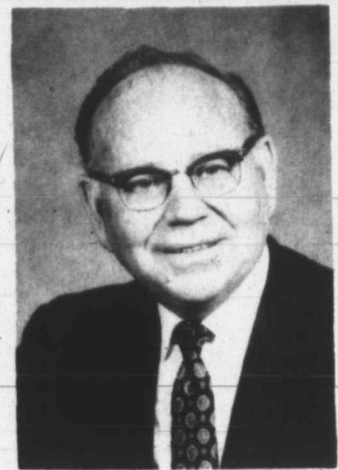
"The Psychological Implications of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs".

Honor To Former C-Citizen

In recognition of his role in the success of the Apollo Program, Colorado City Native, Charles R. Haines, now chief of the Aircraft Engineering Branch at NASA's Johnson Space Center, has been awarded the NASA Exceptional Service Medal.

His citation reads: to Charles R. Haines,

"In recognition of his outstanding contributions to Apollo. The Apollo missions have been the most complex engineering achievement and the most daring and far-reaching expeditions of scientific exploration in the history of man, and

have provided a wealth of information which will help us to understand for the first time, the composition, structure and evolution of another planet--the Earth's Moon."

Haines received a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering from Texas A.M. From 1957 until 1962 he worked for the Air Force as a Flight Test Engineer at Edwards Air Force Base, California.

Since joining NASA-Houston, in 1963, he has worked as a systems engineer in the Apollo Spacecraft Program Office and as the Program Manager for the Lunar Landing Training Vehicle in the Aircraft Operations Office. In his present position,

Haines has the engineering responsibility for all aircraft programs at the Johnson Space Center.

Haines previously received an award for meritorious Civilian Service from the Air Force in 1962.

Married to the former Catherine Eckstrom of Houston, Haines has two children, Vicki Lynn and Kyle Edward, and now resides in Houston.

The following Monday night, June 25, the board will meet with Tommy Huckabay, Andrews architect.

A study of school facilities by a team from North Texas State University recommended that a new high school be built, that Wallace School be closed, that Kelley and Hutchinson Elementaries be renovated, that the high school building be made into a junior high and that the junior high be made into an administrative and warehouse facility.

Total estimated cost of the recommended projects is \$17 million.

Perkin said, is to "establish a priority of work and job completion; to provide a workable schedule based on equitable balance of age and quality of pipe to be replaced, number of complaints and periodical residential tests, to improve completion records of total problem line test, and to speed up the dream and right of the Colorado City taxpayer of pure water."

The city has been doing a lot of jumping around on the water lines and there doesn't seem to be a concrete plan of action Perkin noted.

Burt said the city has priorities and that the plan isn't needed as the city manager has the priorities in the back of his mind.

Then Perkin asked members of the council if they knew what the priorities are. None of the council members could answer.

Sadler said he was willing to draw up such a plan so that people could know what is being

done. However, Burt said the plan wouldn't do any good as there is not any funds and it would cost a lot of money.

Piland said water users are the ones who pay for the water and he believed they would be willing to pay more in order to insure that action was being taken to get good, clear water. Sadler then noted that the local water rates are lower here than most cities.

After the continued objections of Burt, Sadler agreed to draw up a plan and have it ready for the July council meeting.

Perkin then recommended to the council that a timing device be installed on the tennis court lights at the high school to insure they are cut off at 10:30 p.m. each night and not turned on except at night.

Burt objected saying it wouldn't do any good as the timer would be torn up by kids.

Perkin said the timer would save the city money on electricity and allow residents of the

lights shining into their bedrooms during hours of the night which he said has been the case in one instance.

The council agreed to putting the timer on the lights.

The council then went into executive session.

Lifesaving Course Still Open

Colorado City Annual Audit Report

Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council
The City of Colorado City
Colorado City, Texas 79512

Gentlemen:

We have examined the balance sheets of the several funds of the City of Colorado City, Texas, as of April 30, 1973, and the related statements of revenues, expenditures, and surplus for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Revenues are recorded on a cash basis, with the exception of water and sewer sales which are on an accrual basis. The water and sewer bad debts are charged off annually by a direct charge-off method; therefore, no valuation account for estimated uncollectible accounts is reported. Taxes and paving certificates receivable are stated with allowance accounts for the full amount of the receivables, which has the effect of stating tax and special assessment revenues on the cash basis.

Expenditures are recorded on the cash basis in all funds including the utility (water and sewer operating) fund; therefore, the balance sheet does not reflect the accounts payable, accrued insurance, etc., as of the end of the fiscal year. Depreciation is recorded only on utility fund fixed assets, at the composite rate of 2.5%.

Confirmations were mailed on the Utility Receivables and on the Delinquent Taxes Receivable on a random selection basis. Replies were negligible.

In our opinion, subject to the explanations on accounting for revenues and expenditures in the second and third paragraphs, the accompanying balance sheets and related statements of revenue, expenditures, and surplus present fairly the financial position of the various funds of the City of Colorado City, Texas, as of April 30, 1973 and the results of their operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

"Put It Together With A 4-H Center"

Texas has 2.5 million potential 4-H Club members, and approximately 164 of these young people reside in Mitchell County emphasizes County Extension Agents Janis Choate and Bobby Lemons.

An objective of the Texas 4-H program in the 70's is to involve 250,000 young people, he adds. Another goal is to construct a State 4-H Center.

"To meet the goal of reaching new youth, present programming will have to expand greatly. Many new approaches in involving people will have to be used. More leaders will be needed. The present 14,000 4-H adult leaders will need to expand to 40,000," Janis Choate says.

Further, a well-trained, confident adult leadership is vital to youth programs. "To enable the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to offer adequate leader training and establish new programs, a permanent facility is needed--a State 4-H Center," Bobby Lemons ads.

Such a 4-H Center is on the drawing board for Texas. Presently, about 20 states operate year-round 4-H centers and others have numerous summer camps.

Leadership for the projected 4-H Center is being provided by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, but members need the help of all area citizens. "Put it all together with a 4-H Center" is the campaign theme.

The educational facility will be constructed on a 78-acre site at Lake Brownwood. It will offer many new opportunities and dimensions for programs and activities.

Texas Bats .333... Egg Production Below Earlier Levels... Cattle and Calves Marketed Show Declines.

Of nine selected categories of vegetable production, Texas is first in three of them, giving the state a .333 batting average. Texas is first in the nation in production of cabbage, spinach, and watermelons for the year 1972, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

In production of fresh market vegetables, Texas is third in the nation outranked by California and Florida; in total vegetable production, Texas is in fourth place; California, Wisconsin and Florida are ahead of the state in that category.

Watermelon production in Texas last year totaled 70,000 acres; spinach production totaled 5,500; and cabbage production totaled 19,000 acres.

On a county basis, Hidalgo County is Texas' leading vegetable producer with a total of 60,000 acres. Other counties in the top 10 in total vegetable production are Frio, Zavala, Cameron, Deaf Smith, Starr, Castro, La Salle, Willacy, and Duval.

Hidalgo County is the state's leader in production of cabbage, cantaloupes, carrots, onions. Frio County is the state's leader in production of watermelons.

Other rankings of the state show the importance of Texas to vegetable production for the nation.

Texas is second in cantaloupe production, second in carrot production, fourth in green peppers, second in onions.

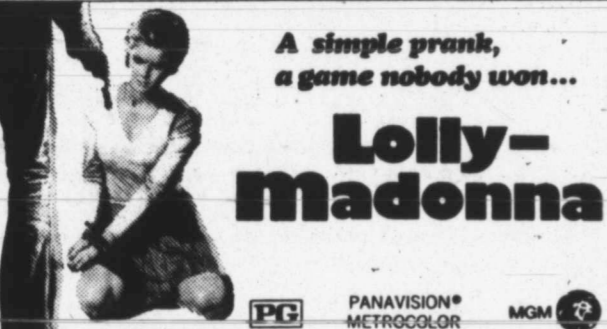

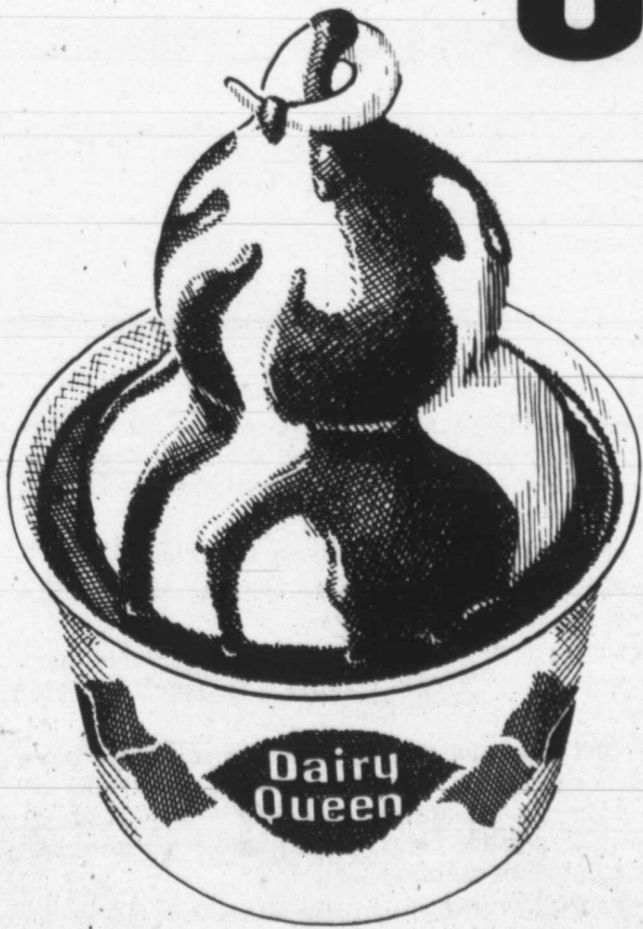

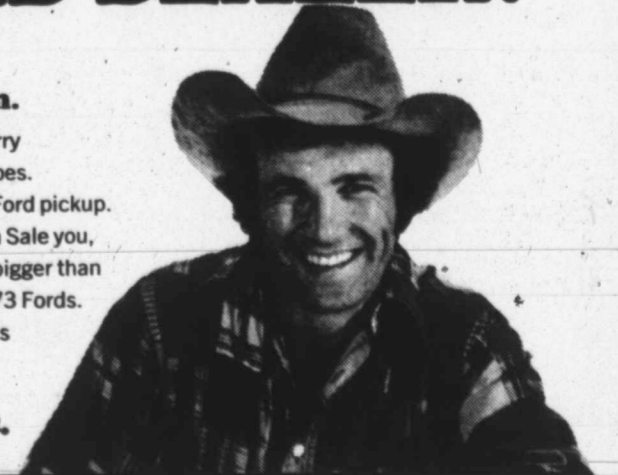

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER: Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER: Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER: Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE: Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS: Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC): Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK/RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. 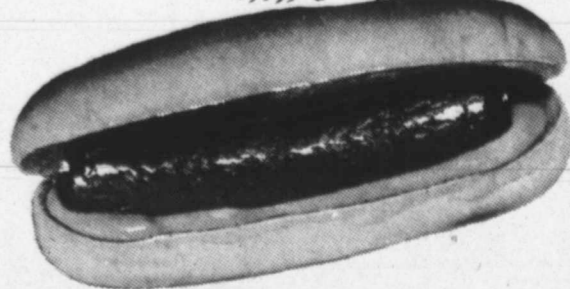
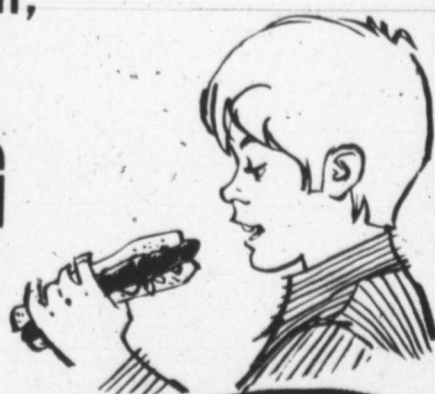
