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Bogata Clean Up Effort Organized

Most of the organizations in Bogata have joined together in an effort to beautify and clean up Bogata and the surrounding area beginning this Saturday, Oct. 27.

The effort began with an organizational meeting Monday night, in which objectives and goals were defined and commitments made by various organizations.

Saturday, Oct. 27 has been designated as a day for each resident to clean up his own

property, and Saturday, Nov. 3 has been set as the day when the organizations will meet and attack various sources of grime and foliage.

A special effort will be made to clean up the Bogata Community Center, with the Cub Scouts to pick up cans and bottles before A. D. Stephenson mows the area with his shredder.

Trash barrels will be provided in the downtown area for future use. The barrels will be painted by the Rivercrest FHA, assisted by

the Pine Branch 4-H Club.

On Nov. 3, Mrs. A. D. Stephenson and Mrs. David Griffin will be downtown with a list of chores that need to be done, including locations to be mowed and cleaned up.

The Bogata Book Club will furnish refreshments for workers downtown. The nature of the refreshments will be determined by Mother Nature—ice water if hot and coffee and cocoa if cold.

The Rivercrest Young

Homemakers will clean up around the old service station across from the Post Office.

Robert Kennedy, president of the Young Farmers, will see that equipment is available for shredding large areas.

The Boy Scouts are going to wash windows downtown. Everyone in Bogata, whether a member of one of the organizations listed or not, is urged to help with the effort or to donate to the Bogata Area Chamber of

Commerce Clean Up Fund, or both.

The Bogata City Dump will be opened on Oct. 27 for residents to dump old appliances, according to Mayor Clifford Barnard, or the appliances may be placed at

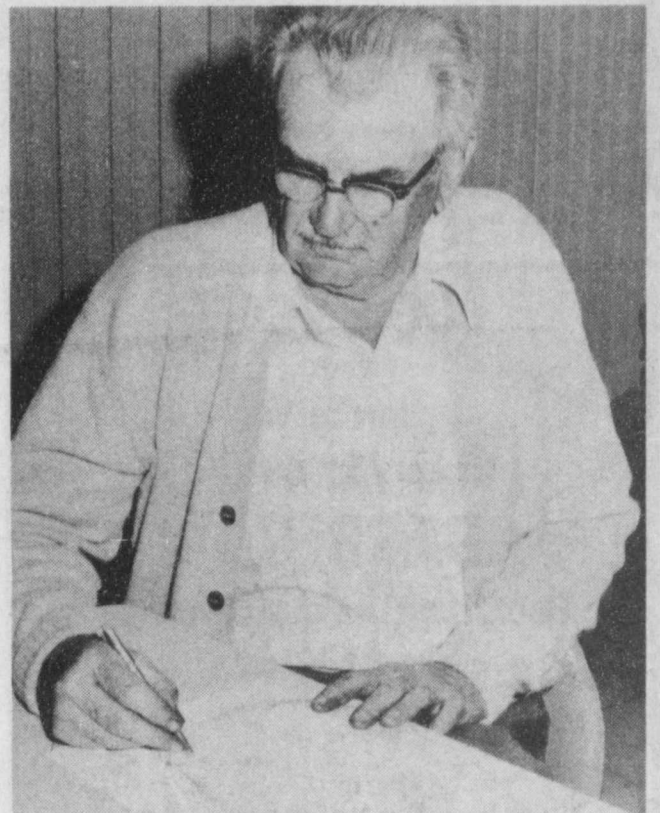
the street and will be picked up by city crews.

Any equipment which can be made available will be appreciated, from shredders and tractors to lawnmowers, organization officials stressed.

Sign List Now For Class Action Suit

Red River County residents who were subscribers to Loyd's Ambulance Service must sign a list, such as one posted at the Bogata City Hall, if they want to be included or excluded in the class action suit which has been filed against the service.

Four members of the original Ambulance Committee have guaranteed the

cost of the legal proceeding, which is being brought by Jim Lovett, a Clarksville attorney, with no legal service fee. There will be court costs, however.

The action under the Texas trade practices act is being litigated by the four citizens for all of the members of the ambulance service without assessment or charge.

Each subscriber to the service must make his

feelings known, however, if he wants to be named in the suit, with the possibility of recovering a part of his membership fee. Either way, the signature of each

member is needed on one of the lists.

Notices are posted at the city halls of Annona, Avery, Bogata, Clarksville and Detroit.

Rebels Hold Edge In 0-0 Tie

The Rivercrest Rebels struggled against their strongest defensive opponent of the season Friday night in the 0-0 tie with the Queen City Bulldogs.

The 0-0 tie between the two

top rated teams in district 20-A will be resolved only if the teams tie for the district crown, when the Rebels will be declared winner of the district by virtue of one penetration into Queen City

territory. Queen City did not penetrate beyond the Rebel 34 yard line during the game. Rebel and Bulldog first downs were tied at nine each.

The Rebels also won the

ballgame in yards rushing, but not by the margin enjoyed in previous weeks. The Rebels posted 196 yards rushing as opposed to 149 for the Bulldogs.

The Rebel offensive line, which has methodically blown open large holes in the defense for Rebel backs Jimmy Viua and Billy Froelich to step through, had trouble punching those holes in the tough Queen City defense Friday night.

It was a most frustrating game for both teams, without question. The Bulldogs were able to get into Rebel territory only through a Rebel fumble at the 40 yard line. Only six yards could be gained before the Rebels had possession again, and Rivercrest drove to the Queen City 26 yard line before letting the ball go over on downs.

It was during this first quarter series that the Rebels made their penetration. Billy Froelich carried from the Queen City 23 yard line to the 17 yard line. A clipping penalty on the next snap pushed the Rebels back to the Queen City 26. A pass from Dale Jean to Gregg Norman was incomplete on the next play, and with fourth and 12 yards to go, Billy Froelich carried again to the Queen City 17 yard line. Even though the Rebels penetrated beyond the Queen City 20 yard line twice, Coach Milford Groves said that only one penetration can be counted on each drive.

Four plays later the Bulldogs punted away again, but the Rebels gave Queen City another break by fumbling the football to Queen City on the next play.

Queen City gained their initial first down of the game early in the second quarter, but had to punt on the next series. A nine yard run by Via was nullified on a motion penalty, and the Rebels punted.

The first real Rebel break was made by Roger Edge, who picked off a Queen City pass at the Rivercrest 46 yard line. The series ended in a punt, the Bulldogs made one first down, and Gregg Norman intercepted another Queen City pass. Norman bobbled the pass and Roger Edge fell on the football, but the official ruled the pass complete and put the football in Rebel possession. Again the Rebels were unable to penetrate the Queen City defense, and the half ended in a scoreless tie.

At the half, the Rebels had two penetrations and five first downs. Queen City had no penetrations and three first downs.

The third quarter consisted of five exchanges of possession, one first down by the Rebels and two by the Bulldogs, with no interceptions, no fumbles, and only one five yard penalty against the Bulldogs.

The Rebel offense began to spark some in the fourth quarter, following a Queen City fumble recovered by

Brian Roberts. The Rebels made three first downs in six plays, and then the Queen City defense closed the gap, allowing the Rebels only two yards in four plays.

With 50 seconds left on the clock, Queen City made two first downs, one on a 22 yard pass play complete at the Rivercrest 44 yard line.

Bulldog Louis Halbert passed one more time, but the pass was intercepted by Via at the 30 yard line and returned to the Queen City 42 as time ran out.

To Rebel Rally

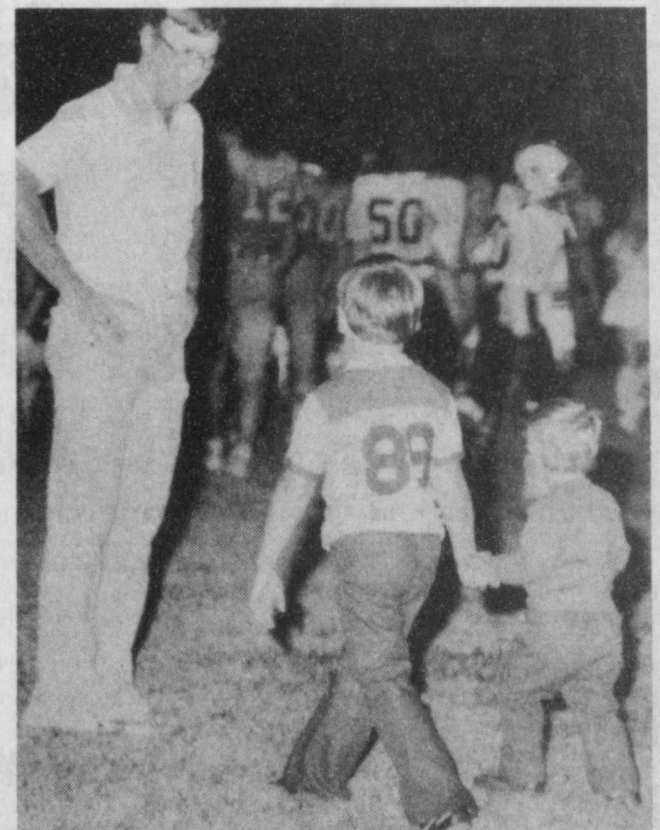
An outdoor pep rally has been scheduled for 2:50 p.m. Thursday, today, at Rebel Stadium at Rivercrest.

Fortner Wins Chance For Century III Scholarships

Mary Fortner has won the Century III Leaders Scholarship competition at Rivercrest High School, according to Bonnie Hudleston, counselor.

The 17-year-old senior is now eligible to compete with other high school seniors

throughout Texas for two \$1,500 scholarships, two \$500 scholarships, and also for a \$10,000 national scholarship that will be awarded in a conference of state winners in historic Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia.

Miss Fortner triumphed in

the local phase of the Century III Leaders program, a scholarship competition which emphasizes the future concerns of America. Students were judged on the basis of their leadership abilities, community involvement and score on a

current events examination. To compete at the state level, Miss Fortner must now write a brief projection outlining what she thinks is one of America's future challenges and how it should be met.

Runner-up in the competition at Rivercrest High School is Britt Morgan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Talmade Morgan.

Miss Fortner, the daughter of Mrs. Exie Mae Fortner of Bogata, now competes with other high school winners from around the state for four scholarships and an opportunity for the \$10,000 top national scholarship.

The two Texas winners will receive an all-expense-paid trip to the fourth annual Century III National Leadership Seminar in Williamsburg, March 7-10, 1979, to participate in seminars on current issues. In previous years, speakers at these seminars were such notables as news commentator Howard K. Smith, architect-futurist Buckminster Fuller, and anthropologist Rene Dubos.

The program is administered by the National Association of Secondary School Principals and funded by Shell Oil Company.

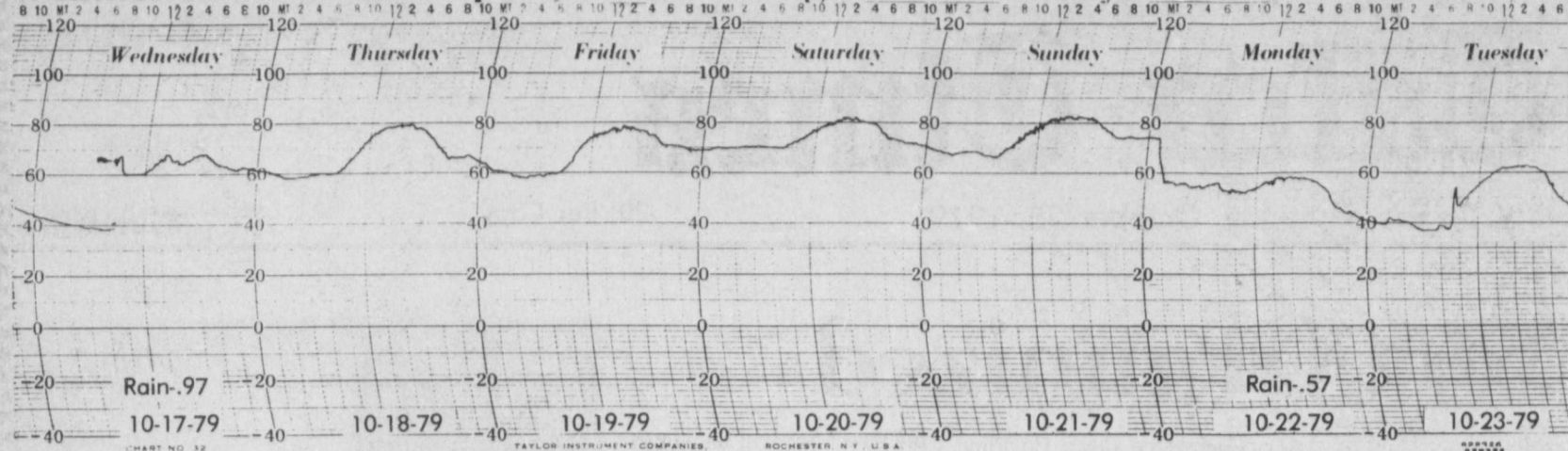

Pros And Cons On Proposed Amendments

On November 6 we will be going to the polls once again to vote on three proposed Constitutional Amendments. I think that it is important for the voters to have some information regarding these proposals.

AMENDMENT NO. 1
H.J.R. NO. 108

Proposing an amendment to Article IV, Section 26, of the Texas Constitution to authorize the legislature to provide terms of office of notaries public and to specify the appointment of notaries public for the state instead of for each county.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

1. Extending the term of office of notaries public from two years to four years and appointing notaries public for the state instead of for each county will reduce government personnel and will reduce costs to both government and notaries public by decreasing the number of renewals and reappointments to be made.

2. Processing notary public applications and renewals is time-consuming and costly for county clerks' offices. The personnel in those offices could better spend their time performing other duties, and many county clerks favor the change. Currently, all applications must be forwarded from the county clerks to the secretary of state for approval, and applying directly to a centralized office for appointment as notary public would be more efficient and would avoid the middleman step.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

1. The convenience and personal contact that is found in county clerks' offices, especially in rural counties, would be lost if the secretary of state took over all responsibility for appointing and reappointing notaries public.

2. This proposed amendment would increase state control over a function that has been handled successfully at the local level. It would add to the growing state government bureaucracy and would be an instance of centralization of state government down to the through the office of notary public.

AMENDMENT NO. 2
H.J.R. NO. 133

Proposing a constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

1. The proposed amendment would provide for the close and continuing supervision needed by the state bureaucracy in order to make it more responsive to the people and to the public policies expressed by their legislature.

2. If legislative committees are given the

responsibility of continuing review of agency rulemaking, it is likely that the legislature will learn to be more careful and precise in the way it delegates this power to state agencies.

3. The legislature should review state agency rules because it delegated the specific rulemaking authority to the agencies in the first place, and the rules have the effect of laws.

4. Just as the governor's veto is a necessary check on the powers of the legislature, legislative review of agency rules can serve as an important check on the powers of the executive branch.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

1. The proposed amendment clearly would infringe upon one of the fundamental principles of American government—separation of powers. Under this principle the legislature makes law, the executive branch carries it out, and the courts resolve disputes under the law. Legislative review of agency rulemaking is an obvious encroachment of executive power.

2. If legislative committees get involved in the day-to-day process of agency rulemaking, then special interest groups will have one more chance to impose their will on the public. In many cases four or five sympathetic legislators might be able to block administrative actions that are needed to carry out policies set by the legislature.

3. The people have consistently rejected attempts to expand the time the legislature is in session. If this amendment is adopted, legislative committees may be "in session" on a year-round basis.

4. The legislative committee and staff members who would review agency rules do not have the same level of expertise and understanding as do agency officials who deal with the problems daily. Furthermore, the length of time that the legislative committee would take to review and make decisions could postpone the effectiveness of important and immediately needed regulations.

AMENDMENT NO. 3
S.J.R. NO. 13

Proposing a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas.

ARGUMENTS FOR:

1. The family farm makes an important contribution to the health and economic well-being of the state, but the average age of Texas farmers is reaching 55. This proposed amendment would aid young men and women who have been unable to begin in the farm and ranch business because of the high price of land and the extremely high down payment required on the land (now averaging 20 percent) by making affordable loans available.

2. Because of safeguards concerning who is eligible for loans, the risks to the state from defaults are minimal and land speculators and large corporations will not benefit. Furthermore, in case of a default, the state would be able to resell the land with the possibility of making a profit because of the initial requirement for a fair appraisal before a loan is approved and because of increasing land values.

3. The proposal has been modeled after a successful Minnesota program, and that state's experience shows that the loan security program is a viable way to encourage young farmers

and ranchers.

4. Large corporations are gaining control of more and more agricultural land in the state, and this loan program enables individuals to begin to operate economically efficient and competitive farms or ranches.

ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

1. A state guaranteed loan program financed by bonds means that the state is, with borrowed money, assuming the risk of default for loans made by private lenders. Not only is this government interference with the traditionally free marketplace, but it is also an unreasonable assumption of risk without tangible benefit to the state as a whole. If the presently unstable economic conditions were to worsen, the taxpayers would bear the cost of the defaulted loans. The potential for that default is reflected in current interest rates and down payment requirements; without that potential, state guarantees would not be needed to encourage private lenders to make loans.

2. Even with no or few defaults, the program is not without cost to the taxpayer. Under the enabling legislation, the costs of administering the program through the commissioner of agriculture are paid from appropriated funds. In addition, the guarantees may tend to create higher land prices and add to the inflation rate.

3. Although the number of individual farms and ranches has dropped by 50 percent since 1940, there are no proven ill effects from the decline which justify a guaranteed loan program. Farms have become fewer, larger, and more expensive to operate, but have also become far more productive.

4. The "payment adjustments" provided for under the proposed amendment and the enabling legislation are, in effect, loans to the individual borrowers. The state, therefore, is not only assuming the risk of a private lender on the purchase money loan, but is also assuming the risk of making an indirect loan to the borrower.

Defensive Driving To Begin

A four-week course in Defensive Driving will begin at Paris Junior College on Monday, Nov. 5, from 7 to 9 p.m. in Room 102 of the Grimes Natural Sciences Center, Paul Daniels will teach the course on Mondays, Nov. 5, 12, 19, and 26.

June Jones, director of continuing education at PJC, reminds drivers who have not completed the course within three years that they should re-take it to save 10 percent on portions of their automobile insurance. Fee for the course is \$15, which includes the workbook for classes.

Reservations should be made by paying the fee in advance to the PJC Continuing Education Office, Administration Building on campus, telephone, 785-7661, extension 145.

The driver improvement training, sponsored through the National Safety Council, was established to save lives and prevent human suffering and economic waste by preventing traffic accidents. Research projects covering graduates of the Defensive Driving course indicate that the graduates had fewer accidents the year following the course.

PJC sponsors the course throughout the school year.

Season Approaching For Prussic Acid Poisoning

Prussic acid poisoning is a real threat to cattle grazing sorghums, sorghum-sudans, sudan grasses and Johnson grass, says Dr. Dwight Vines, area dairy specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "With the first killing frost or freeze not far in the future, livestock producers need to be aware of this potential killer of cattle," Vines said. "The toxic material, hydrocyanic acid, does not build up in any great quantity during normal plant growth," the specialist

pointed out. "However, at freezing, the amount of free hydrocyanic acid increases, thus making the plant potentially lethal."

Prussic acid poisoning works very rapidly with severely affected animals rarely surviving more than two hours. In the most acute cases, death occurs in a matter of minutes. Hungry animals are much more susceptible than partially or near-full animals. Cattle that have eaten large quantities of ground cereal grains will be more tolerant of prussic acid since the available carbohydrates from the cereal grains offers some protection. Additionally, full cattle will not consume as much of the forage as hungry cattle.

Death from prussic acid poisoning results from the inability of the animal to transfer oxygen from the blood to the body tissues. Symptoms include slobbering or frothing at the mouth and a gradual increase in respiratory rate. Labored breathing develops in five to 15 minutes with muscle twitching developing into marked generalized spasms. Staggering and blood passing from the nostrils and mouth are frequent symptoms near the time of death.

"The most successful method of avoiding prussic acid poisoning is to prevent exposure of the animals to the poison containing plants," Vines said. "After a freeze or killing frost, the damaged plant must completely die or turn brown before it is safe to be consumed. This may require three to four weeks."

Antidotes are available for treating prussic acid poisoning, but since death occurs rapidly after the ingestion of plants containing prussic acid, time is very critical. Often, when prussic acid poisoning is first noted, the animal is dead before the producer has time to administer the antidote. The antidotes are available from local veterinarians. Antidotes must be administered soon after the first symptoms of poisoning are noticed.

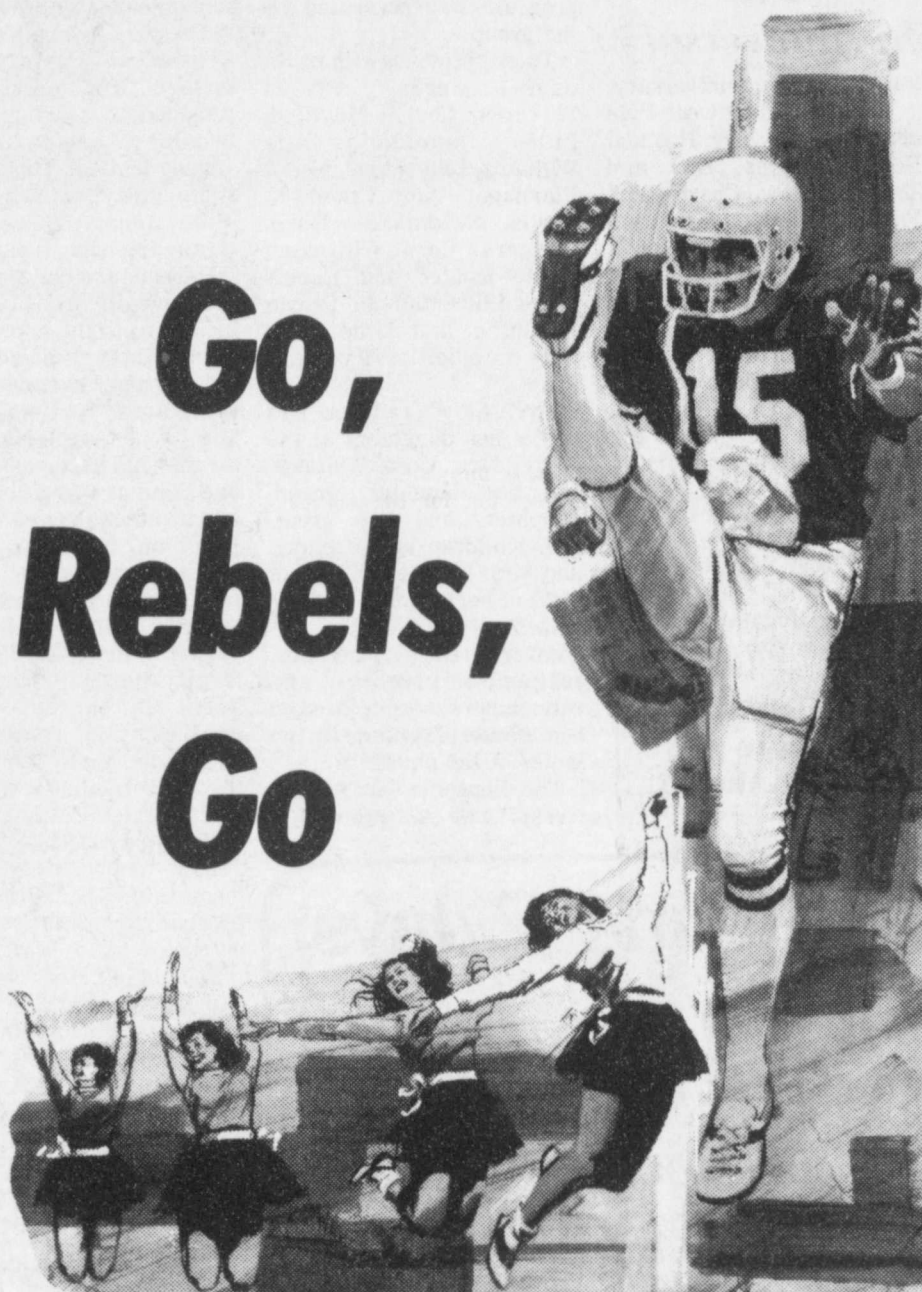

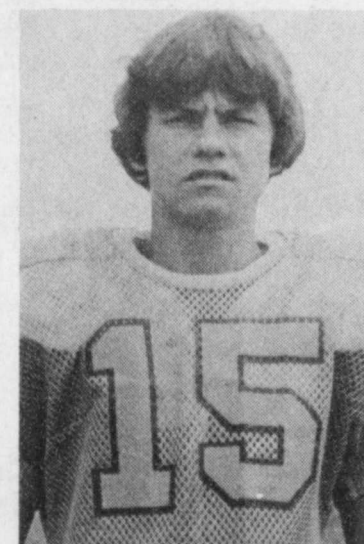

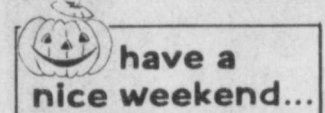

Bullock Speaks Out Against Tax Raise

State Comptroller Bob Bullock labeled a suggestion to raise the sales tax to funnel money into city treasuries as a wild hair and an open invitation to an income tax.

In a statement released to a House Ways and Means Subcommittee and read by Assistant Comptroller Walt Lillie, Bullock said "increasing the one percent city sales tax is nothing short of greed."

Bullock said the Governor's Mayors Advisory Committee is advocating a ridiculous proposal.

He said the 20 mayors who supported the idea and put it forward this week should first have their heads examined and then be given the "bad idea of the year" award.

Bullock warned that "opening the barn door to a mass raid on the sales tax will lead to an income tax, something I am convinced Texans want to avoid at all costs."

Bullock pointed out that Texas would be on the "same sad slide as New York City" with an eight percent sales tax if Texans had to pay a four percent state, three percent city and one percent transit tax as advocated by these mayors.

"And, it won't stop there, what we'll end up with is a sales tax for the mosquito control district, the drainage district, the navigation district, each city council member and so forth and so forth," he said.

He said by the time the dust has settled it won't be a question whether a person can afford a pair of shoes but rather pay the sales taxes on them.

Bullock said the state has reduced the ad valorem tax to next to nothing so state government won't be competing with property taxing efforts at local levels and that cities shouldn't be lusting after the state's chief tax resource.

State sales taxes last year produced about \$2.5 billion in income—or nearly 42 percent of the taxes collected to pay for state government.

"I imagine that the counties and the school districts will want a sales tax too if the cities are going to continually grab every sales tax dollar they can to meet their budgets," he said.

"It's a rotten idea. Shame on these mayors for even suggesting it."

Grant Awarded

The State of Texas has been awarded a grant of \$191,200 for Training and Technical Assistance in association with the Department of Energy's Weatherization Assistance for Low-Income Persons Program in Texas, it was announced by G. Dan Rambo, Regional Representative for the U. S. Department of Energy (DOE).

The grant will assist the State in improving the quality of workmanship that is essential in realizing the maximum amount of energy savings from the installation of weatherization materials.

The Texas Program is part of a nationwide effort to reduce energy consumption and improve the swelling unit environment of the low-income persons in the nation.

Payments Authorized

Congressman Sam B. Hall, Jr., announced today that the Department of the Interior has authorized payments by the Bureau of Land Management to local governments throughout the United States with certain tax exempt Federal lands. These payments are made annually in lieu of property taxes which could otherwise be levied on certain Federal lands. Current payments are for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1979, and the U. S. Treasury is to mail these checks out September 26.

The Payments in Lieu of Taxes Act of 1976 (Public Law 94 - 565) authorizes payments of up to seventy-five cents an acre for Federal lands classified in the Act as "entitlement lands." The amount of each payment is determined under a complex formula that takes into account population and certain other payments received under various Federal land laws.

The First Congressional District received \$143,744 in lieu of taxes payments as follows: Bowie County, \$31,470.00; Camp County, \$665.00; Cass County, \$20,355.00; Delta County, \$12,366.00; Fannin County, \$7,132.00; Hopkins County, \$7,896.00; Lamar County, \$12,669.00; Marion County, \$15,378.00; Morris County, \$1,020.00; San Augustine County, \$26,851.00; Shelby County, \$5,941.00; and Upshur County, \$2,001.00.

Grant Rules Become Final

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced a change in the rules for awarding food assistance grants to state agencies for the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC).

"We have modified the rule to provide a more accurate count of the children who are potentially eligible for the program, and to make sure that funds distributed can be put to effective use," said Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman.

Foreman said the rule limits all but very small state agencies to a 50 percent increase over their fourth quarter funding. Also, increases of 25 percent or more will be budgeted over the fiscal year, with states receiving more of the increased funds in later quarters.

As under the current rule, state agencies will be limited to a maximum grant equal to the level of funding needed to serve all their potential participants. However, the new rule is designed to provide a more accurate count of low income pregnant women, and to take into account each state agency's average food package costs.

The formula will continue to allocate funds based on a state's infant mortality rate and the number of children in a state agency under five years of age who are at or being twice the federal poverty level. It also takes into account a state agency's previous program funding level as a funding base.

Public comment was invited when the formula was proposed last year. In June, the Department asked for further comments to determine whether any changes were needed prior to distribution for fiscal year 1980 funds. The majority of the comments received supported the continued use of the current funding formula with the adjustments outlined above.

The WIC program provides food assistance for pregnant, breastfeeding and

postpartum women, infants and children up to five years of age who are at risk due to low income and inadequate nutrition.

The rules governing program fund allocations were published in the October 16 Federal Register.
