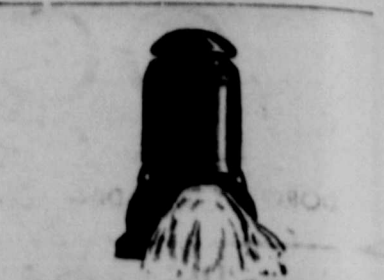

## Rangers Win Over Canadian Cagers Friday, Feb. 4

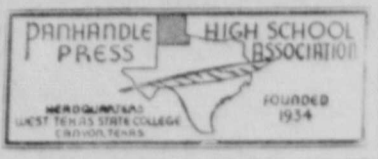

The Herald asks that men and women from this community serving in the armed forces write letters to this department for publication. Letters to relatives that would be of interest to the public will be published under this heading.

U. S. Naval Training Station, Farragut, Idaho

Dear Mom and Dad:  
Well, what a week. We traveled by pullman for four days and nights to get here, and what do we get? A big camp right in the middle of a mud puddle, the buildings are very nice, but it is the climate I don't like. I think that it would be very pretty here in the summer it is all surrounded by pine and fir trees. However, it gets pretty cold now with a damp cold that goes right through you. The navy gave me plenty of clothes though, so I guess I'll be o. k.

When we got to our barracks we transferred our bushels of clothing into a one bushel sea bag, a neat trick if you can do it. I got all but the clothes I have on into it.

How anyone can live out of a sea bag is beyond me. Seems like everything would get so wrinkled, but they say that when everything is folded and rolled correctly, the stuff stays in better shape than it would in a locker.

I'm in a special assignment company and I have met some swell guys. Sure are from all over the country though. Almost every state is represented I like the boys from Texas, Okla., and New Mexico the best, but its all a matter of getting used to the different manners and customs, I guess.

They're asking for men with experience in boiler maintenance. Wish I could qualify. That job is one easy cinch, they don't have to stand watch or anything, just watch gauges.

The food is fairly good and there is plenty of it, so don't have any doubts on that score. Mom, I'm still feeling a little low from my shots but there is no lack of appetite. Say, these shots aren't so bad, only thing about it is the low feeling and the sore arm. 1100 men went through the meat chopper (wed. dept.) the same day I did and as far as I know, not one passed out. It didn't even hurt. All these tales about the rough shots don't seem to amount to anything yet. We still have four more weeks of them to go, one a week, but they aren't supposed to be bad at all.

I'll keep this address until my demerol period is over with, will be 3 or 4 weeks after we go on schedule, which will be the last of the week. Then I'll be moved to another camp or another place in the country.

If I am to be a seaman I will remain here for seven weeks. If I am going to be a specialist I'll move to some other place for training.

Well I guess I had better close for tonight, nearly time for lights out. I like the navy very much.

How is the big city of Perryton? And how are you and Jessie? I am taking this opportunity to tell you how much I appreciate the good old home paper. I enjoy it very much.

I haven't much to tell you about myself. I have been transferred from 120th Guard Section to the 482 Air Base Sqdn., Intelligence Section. So far I haven't made anymore than Pfc. stripes, maybe I am funny, I don't care too much, at the present, all that I want is for the war to be over so I can come home.

If I ever have grandchildren, I can tell them that I fought in the big battle of Hill Field, with Germans and sand storms. The sand blows worse here sometimes than it ever did at home. At the present, its snow thats blowing. I have tried for overseas duty, but somehow they don't want me just now, but I know my time will come. We have lots of boys here that just came back from overseas and they say that its hell there, but a lot better there than here.

I have been working in the Stockade here and we gave two boys three years and two of them ten, and we also have about twenty in for six months.

**Red Cross Aids Millions of War Victims**

In the four years since the start of the war in Europe, 35 million war victims in thirty nations have benefited by aid extended by and through the American Red Cross. Details of this program are contained in a recent statement issued by Red Cross National Headquarters in Washington, and provide a comprehensive view of the organization's widespread wartime relief activities.

Of the \$80,000,000 thus furnished since the war began, about half represents relief extended in the form of government-provided supplies channeled through the American Red Cross. From the Red Cross' own treasury, funds totalling more than \$18,000,000 and articles of wearing apparel, convenience, and comfort (produced in the 3,756 Red Cross chapters throughout the United States) valued at nearly \$20,000,000, went for the same purpose. And this, despite difficulties in transportation and in procuring the necessary supplies, the changing situation due to our entry into the war and numerous other obstacles which had to be overcome.

"The steady flow of relief supplies to war-victims in the United Nations continues," said Chairman Norman H. Davis of the American Red Cross. "We were ably assisted by three million volunteer workers in those nations in carrying out this program."
