LOW CITY RATE ON IRRIGATION

SUMMER IRRIGATION RATE IS
GOOD ONLY FOR RESIDENTIAL PURPOSES

A lower summer irrigation water rate will probably be approved at the next meeting of the city council which will apply to all residential sections of the city, as an encouragement to better lawns and gardens.

The proposed new rate will offer four thousand gallons of water at a minimum of \$1.75 and a rate of twenty cents per thousand for all water used in excess of this minimum. This new summer irrigation rate will go into effect on the April readings, if approved, and will apply for six months only.

The irrigation rate will not be offered to commercial users of city water, it has been explained, but only applies to the residential sections. The present water rate is twenty-five cents per thousand in excess of the three thousand gallon minimum offered for \$1.50.

Produce Truck Wreck

lision Near Amarillo Last
Monday Night

A truck owned by the Shearer Produce Co., loaded with chickens and eggs, was wrecked near Amarillo last Monday night while enroute from Perryton to the produce company's branch house at Albuquerque, N. M.

FIRST ORDER OF 1,000 TREES
DID NOT FILL DEMAND; TO
BE SOLD AT 25c EACH;
PLACE ORDERS NOW

In order to take care of the unexpected demand for cherry trees, the American Legion, through the Wilson Flower Shop, has placed an order by wire for an additional 250 trees. The first order of 1,000 trees was sold out Saturday and dozens of buyers have been turned away since then.

Parties who wish to obtain trees from this second shipment which should be in this week, should place their orders and pay for same at the Wilson Flower Shop. The Legion, through the cooperation of Mr. Wilson, is selling these trees at the exceedingly low price of 25c each.

These trees are being handled by the Legion and Mr. Wilson at a price just covering actual cost, freight and handling expense in a service campaign for the benefit that a proven fruit bearing tree will do to this naturally treeless plains country.

GRAVES GETS 5 YEAR SENTENCE

JUDGE PICKENS WILL RETURN
HERE SATURDAY FOR FIN-
AL SESSION OF DIS-
TRICT COURT

The trial of John Graves, charged with "hi-jacking" was called for trial by Judge Pickens in the district court last Thursday morning. After a trial lasting through Thursday and Friday, the jury returned a verdict on Saturday, finding the defendant guilty and assessing his punishment at five years in state prison.

Judge Pickens, who is holding court at Stinnett this week, will return here Saturday to pronounce the Graves sentence and wind-up the court affairs. It is understood that attorneys for Graves will appeal.

Guymon Boosters Coming

Will Be Here Next Wednesday Ad-
vertising "Pioneers' Day of
No Man's Land"

A pioneer booster parade from Guymon will arrive in Perryton's main street at 11:00 a. m. next Wednesday, April 18, with a band and specialty numbers.

The string of automobiles will come from Spearman where they appear at 9:30 a. m.

The program will be given in Perryton in connection with announcing Pioneers' Day of No Man's Land, May 2, an annual celebration in memory of the passage of the Organic Act in congress May 2, 1890. Passage of the Organic Act gave the neutral strip law for the first time since left by the wayside in Texas' application for admittance into the union.

The Oklahoma Panhandle is the only territory in the civilized world to have ever passed a period without law.

A 14-piece band will accompany entertainers on an extensive tour through western towns spreading a detailed announcement of the 1934 celebration.

Thirty thousand visitors are expected in Guymon May 2. There were 20,000 visitors last year.

Everything is free from sun to sun on May 2. More than \$250 will be given in prizes for a frontier parade and rodeo.

The parade, more than a mile long last year, is expected to be more than two miles long this year.

A pioneer dance will be held in the evening and a modern dance begins at 11 p. m. The orchestra plays until daylight.

A camp ground is being prepared for wagon trains and lone cowboys who ride in the night before. Old time songs will be sung around the camp fire on the evening of May 1. Pioneers will be in charge of this portion of the program.

International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church of Christ

Lesson III April 15, 1934
Jesus Teaches Forgiveness

I. How To Deal With An Offending Brother (Matt. 18: 15)

The Duty of the Offended, 15-17. He who is wronged has more to do than merely pucker up about it. Probably the wrong done him was unintentional. Misunderstandings have caused a multitude of sorrows. Hence, a frank discussion, face to face, is both scriptural and sensible. So often people get their feelings hurt only to nurse the undesirable condition until the wound is so sorely probed that it is constant torture. So the Master tells the offended to go to the party who has wronged him and tell him his fault privately. There is no use to blame personal matters abroad, and furnish fuel for the fiery tongues of gossip. Friendship is too precious to be so blighted beyond repair. If however, the one who has committed wrong fails to hear the accusation, take necessary witnesses to protect yourself from misrepresentation. Last of all, tell it to the church. A member who brings reproach upon the body of Christ (the church) and will not reform his ways nor confess his sins, must as a last resort be withdrawn from. (2 Thess. 3: 6; Titus 3: 10).

II. The Duty of Patient and Continuous Forgiving (15: 21, 22)

Jewish Rabbis thought that to forgive three times was indeed generous. Peter Goes them one better by increasing the possible number to seven. But Jesus placed no limit upon the number of times. As often as a brother confesses his wrongs he is to be forgiven. But how hard this lesson for us to learn. How we weary of repeated offenses, and bury the hatchet only to see the handle protruding upon the least hint of provocation.

The generosity of the teachings of Jesus in this particular must not be misunderstood. As the Father forgives only those who repent and

turn away from their sins, so it is unreasonable to expect a brother to forgive us a wrong done unless we confess it and forsake it.

III. The Parable of The Unmerciful Servant (23, 25)

How great is the debt which God has forgiven the sons and daughters of men. The story of the unmerciful servant reveals the forgiveness of Heaven and the utter selfishness of earth. A man owed about ten million dollars. He was unable to pay it. All he could do was to throw himself upon the mercy of the king. This generous ruler was touched with the supplications of the poor debtor and freely forgave him the debt. How like the heavenly Father who gave his Son to purchase the souls of poor, fallen man.

But the picture changes. The forgiven is given a chance to prove his gratitude. Actions are to become more eloquent than words. A much smaller sum is owed him by one of his fellowservants. Now his opportunity has come to do as he had been done by—cancel the account. But instead of doing it, he became vicious in his inhuman treatment and cast the poor debtor into prison.

When it was told the lord what the unmerciful servant had done, he became very angry. Could it be possible that a man who had received mercy would refuse it to his fellow creatures? So the unjust servant was delivered to the tormentors, not merely prison, but affliction. So will it be those who refuse to bear with their fellows. He who refuses his brother who has repented will find his own soul debt with all its stretch of iniquity heaped up before him in the last day. Let us therefore as fellow-pilgrims journeying to the Great Beyond make this world as beautiful as possible as we journey along life's thoroughfare by an ever readiness to forgive and forget the injuries we have suffered, for surely we have need of mercy at the hands of the Redeemer. 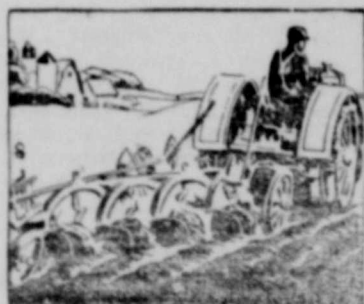

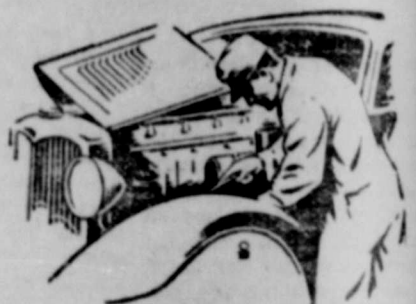

RECIPE FOR PROCESSED CHEESE IN GREAT DEMAND

COLLEGE STATION—A recipe for processed cottage cheese recently given on a Texas A & M College radio broadcast has been in great demand from Miss Lola Blair, extension food specialist. Here it is:

Take 3 gallons of separated milk when it is curdled. Heat to temperature of 100 degrees F. stirring most of the time. This makes the ordinary cottage cheese. Hold at this temperature for 30 minutes and continue stirring. Squeeze drier than customary for cottage cheese. Take 1-2 cup butter, salt to taste (about 1-2 teaspoonful), 1 table-spoonful soda and mix thoroughly into the cottage cheese. Let stand 2 hours. Add 1 cup sweet cream and put all into a double boiler and heat while cooking until a smooth consistency has been formed. Remove from the fire and add 1-2 cup of sweet or sour cream to which has been added cheese coloring as desired (about 1-4 to 1-2 teaspoonful). Beat until smooth and turn into buttered dish to mold.

This complete process must be finished within one day. The cheese should season for about five days. It may be covered with paraffin wax if to be kept. This cheese is mild with very little flavor and for that reason needs an added flavor. Pimientos, caraway seed or a small amount of a strong flavored cheese melted and added, give a good flavor. A small size can of pimientos, or a quarter pound of strong flavored cheese, gives an excellent flavor.

AN ADEQUATE DIET BASIS OF HOME LIVING PROGRAM

COLLEGE STATION—In the talk about using the rented cotton acres to living at home farmers should keep in mind the starting point for figuring such a program is in the food needs of the family, declares Miss Lola Blair, extension nutritionist at Texas A and M College.

Just to plant these rented acres blindly to corn and sorghum and peas and beans and the like won't give the family a good living at home, she says. To give the family good food, of the right kinds, in the right amounts, and for the whole year is a job that requires a lot of careful planning. It means making a food budget and then making garden and orchard and crop plans accordingly. It means planning for fresh food in just as many months as it can be supplied, and then having a canning budget to take care of the unproductive

months. Living at home as developed in thousands of demonstrations all over the state is based on an adequate diet. Such a diet calls for at least 1 1-2 pints of milk per person each day; for at least one serving of butter each day; for at least one serving each day of some kind of cereal; for at least three servings each week of leafy or green vegetables; one serving each day of a starchy vegetable; one serving, and probably two each day of other vegetables; at least one serving of raw fruit every day; at least three servings each week of tomatoes or citrus fruit; at least four servings per week of other kinds of fruit; and two servings each day of such protein-rich foods as meat, eggs, nuts, dried peas or beans, or cheese.

The requirements for a family of five may be obtained from a garden, a 1-2-acre home fruit garden, two good dairy cows, two meat chickens, 50 chickens, a few acres of melons, peas, beans, tomatoes, and cane for syrup. How a family of five with work animals may provide an adequate food and feed supply for year on about 25 acres of land worked out in two demonstration handbooks available from college farm and home demonstration agents. The general production side is covered in C-98 "Filling Farm Storehouse." The planning and balancing and canning home food supply is outlined in 76 "The 4-H Pantry."

Vaccinate for Typhoid

State Health Officer Advises All Boy and Girl Scouts and Summer Vacationists

Austin, Texas, March 28—"If you have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever within the last two or three years, go to your doctor and be protected against it," Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, advises prospective campers, Boy and Girl Scouts, summer vacationists, and all other users of open roads—whether for business or pleasure—as the out-of-doors season approaches. "Typhoid fever," he continued, "is unnecessary and preventable. Every case is due either to community neglect or to the ignorance or carelessness of some individual. A carrier is a person who has had typhoid at some time and who even after recovery carries the germs of the disease in the urine and the discharges from the bowels. Carriers who are careless in their personal habits are likely to infect any food they handle with unwashed hands. Some of the most serious and far reaching outbreaks of the disease have been caused by drinking milk or eating foods that have been handled by carriers. Persons may be carriers without knowing it.

Typhoid germs are hitch-hikers. They are picked up and spread from person to person by water, milk, flies, fingers, food. Every case of typhoid is contracted by way of the mouth and the digestive system. The State Department of Health and the local health department can be depended upon to continue their fight against the disease, but there will still be sources of infection that can be ward off only through the protection afforded by vaccination against the disease."

Need Convenient Water

Texas Farm Housing Survey Shows That a More Convenient Water Supply is Needed

COLLEGE STATION — Water, conveniently located and in plentiful quantity, is the most pressing need of farm homes in Texas according to findings of the rural housing survey recently conducted in the State as a C W A project supervised by the Extension Service under the leadership of Mrs. Bernice Claytor, Extension home improvement specialist. Curiously enough the next greatest need may be roofs that will keep water out of the houses.

The reports from the 25 areas in each of which approximately 2500 homes were visited by enumerators with a schedule of points to be surveyed are nearly all in, but have not as yet been completely tabulated; however, the supervisor of the survey in each area sent with the schedules a brief summary of high points in that area and practically all of these summaries stress the need for more and better water supplies for rural families. Several counties reported that many of the homes visited were supplied only with open earthen tanks.

Water piped into the house was so seldom found as to be a rarity. In one county it is estimated that owners carry their water an average of 32 feet while tenants carry it an average of 190. Another county supervisor estimates that owners carry it over 100 feet and tenants about 400 feet. In another county the estimate is that for the 2181 homes visited which did not have water piped in (464 did) the combined carry amounted to 533,848 feet. And in still another county it was 1,790,295 feet for 1345 homes, while 1304 had water piped in.

Improved out-door toilets are a great need, too, it was found, with new or repaired screens in the homes in great demand also. The need of paint was so great as to be almost universal and the proportion of houses not in need of some repair was so small as to be negligible.

All supervisors reported practically the same thing in regard to the small amount of money that has been spent for repair in the past three years. Mrs. Claytor said, and several of them stressed the fact that substantial repairs are not made soon many farm homes will have to be replaced instead of repaired.

In general the majority of homes had too few rooms and their arrangement lacked convenience. The chief type of construction was the frame house often made from the poorer grades of lumber even in sections where native stone for suitable building had to be removed from the ground where the house was built.

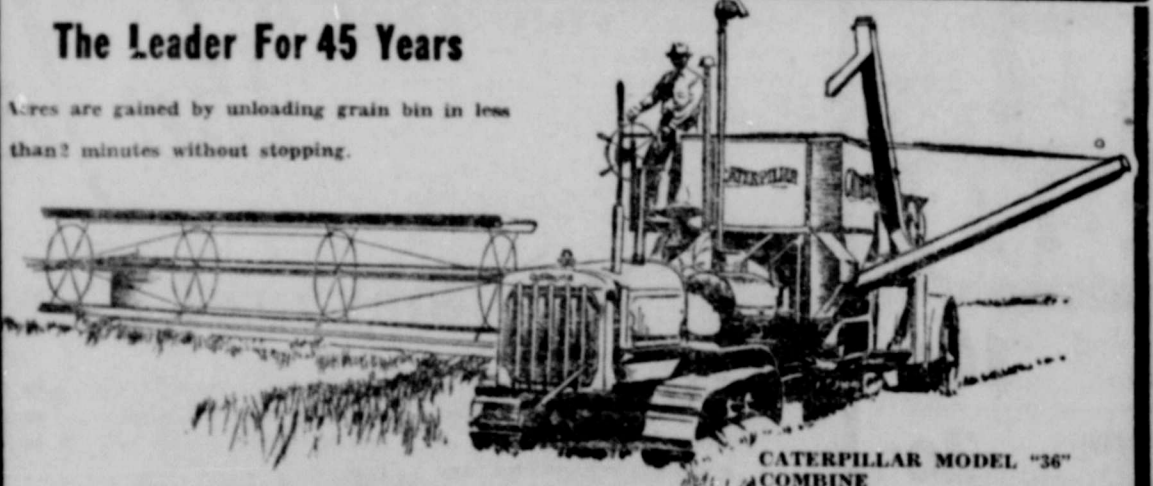

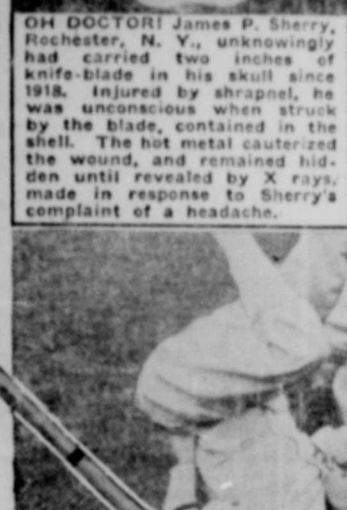

OKLAHOMA FARM HOUSING SURVEY

EVER IS ONE OF SEVEN OKLAHOMA COUNTIES IN SURVEY; FARM WOMEN CARRY WATER 297 FT.

WILLWATER, Okla., March 28—Average Oklahoma farm woman carries water 297 feet for home—unless of course, she can get husband or son to carry it, and they are likely not to be at hand as the water is needed. Needs for improvement, such as lack of water convenience, in homes were revealed by the housing survey, according to Madoune Fitzgerald, Oklahoma A. and M. college, extension agent in home management, who was in charge of portions of the federal C. W. A. project in the state. In Oklahoma, 15,809 homes were visited by the surveyors. The facts they gathered will be studied by Oklahoma and federal workers with the aid of planned improvement and direct assistance in mind. More than 50 per cent of the homes are badly in need of improvement, the survey revealed. In the survey, the apparent need for the day-to-day convenience of water systems, most of the farm people questioned replied that if they had \$250.00 available, they would first repair their walls, ceilings, and floors in their homes. Repair of the roofs and of the exterior walls was the second interest, while doors, windows, and screens ranked third.

"People who would repair the furnishings made up the smallest group, showing plainly that the larger interest is the immediate fundamental requirements," Miss Fitzgerald said. Construction of new homes is contemplated within the next three years in a little over 100 instances. About 3,000 persons are interested in borrowing money to finance construction, repairs, or improvements provided the interest rate is satisfactory and payments can be distributed over 10 years.

Most farm families need additional bed rooms. The number in Beaver county, for instance, was 714 among 1,825 homes visited. The next greatest need for additional space is for storage for fresh vegetables, fruit and canned products. In most cases, water is obtained from wells. Only about 1,000 of the homes visited have water piped cold, and only 300 have hot water piped in the home. About four-fifths of the homes are lighted by kerosene and gasoline lamps, and many of these would like to improve the quality of the lights. About 700 homes use electricity, and others of these having a central lighting system use acetylene or gas.

"There seems to be renewed interest in the condition of the yard," Miss Fitzgerald said. "Since exterior improvement is one type that can be done very largely by home labor and repairs of this kind may be planned and successfully carried out, certainly there is no economy in waiting until large improvements may be done when there are so many small repairs which may be accomplished."

FARM INTEREST RATE LOWERED

DISCOUNT RATE OF FEDERAL INTERMEDIATE CREDIT BANKS IS LOWEST SINCE 1923

Houston, March 16—The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston has fixed its discount rate effective March 16, 1934, at 2 1/2 per cent per annum, it was announced here Friday by Dwight P. Reordan, President of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank. The new discount rate of 2 1/2 per cent is the lowest rate charged by the bank since its organization June 19, 1923. Since December 19, 1932 the rate had been 3 per cent per annum.

Mr. Reordan explained that these rates of discount are governed by the interest rate paid by the bank on its debentures and the favorable market for these securities is due to the recognition by investors of the fact that the Intermediate Credit Bank system has during its more than ten years existence been conducted along sound business lines.

"The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank does not make loans directly to individual farmers and stockmen but extends credit to financing institutions, which make loans for agricultural and livestock production purposes, such as production credit associations, State and National banks, livestock loan companies, and agricultural credit corporations. This bank also makes direct loans to farmers' cooperative marketing and purchasing associations on the security of warehouse receipts or shipping documents covering staple agricultural commodities. The rate of interest which a credit institution may charge the farmer or stockman on a note discounted with the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank may not exceed the bank's discount rate by more than 3 per cent per annum. While the new discount rate of the bank is in effect the maximum interest rate to the farmers and stockmen will be 5 1/2 per cent per annum," Mr. Reordan said.

At the close of business Thursday, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston had outstanding loans and discounts totaling approximately \$22,000,000.

ONE HUNDRED FIFTY DIE IN TEXAS FROM LOCKJAW

Austin, Texas, March 28—Every year there are about one hundred and fifty deaths in Texas from lockjaw, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. Most of these deaths have resulted from

the most trivial or minor wounds or injury. Only recently a small child died from a small wound caused by a splinter being stuck in the toe.

Lockjaw or tetanus patients die an agonizing death following frequent convulsions, which are set forth by the slightest stimulation to the central nervous system. The slamming of a door or the slightest noise may cause a patient to have violent convulsions. Stiffening of the muscles in the jaw is one of the first symptoms, and it is from this fact that the disease gets its name of lockjaw.

Puncture wounds, such as those resulting from sticking a nail or thorn in the foot or hand, are the most dangerous. The reason for this is that the tetanus germs can thrive only in a wound that is closed or in the presence of other germs that use up the air present. Tetanus germs do not thrive in the open air.

The prevention of lockjaw depends upon the proper care of all minor injuries. Closed wounds

should be made upon wounds and kept thoroughly clean. Anti-tetanus serum should be given after puncture wound; gun powder wounds jaw. The period of time for the disease to develop in man is usually from six to fourteen days, according to the amount of infection. In man, with a short period of incubation, six days or less, the disease is almost always fatal. With a longer period, the disease is usually milder and the chances for recovery greater.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE

Since there is a revival of considerable interest in the city, no doubt the citizens of Perryton and surrounding community would be pleased to know something of the origin and history of the "Church of the Nazarene".

The Church of the Nazarene is in no sense connected with what is sometimes termed "holiness" or "tongues" movements. While they are not a branch of, nor in any official way connected with, the Methodist church, they are in doctrine very much similar to the early Wesleyan movement.

The following is a brief statement of "Doctrine" as recorded in the Church of the Nazarene Manual: "We believe: 1. In one God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. 2. In the divine inspiration of the old and New Testament Scriptures, and that they contain all truth necessary to faith and Christian living. 3. That man is born with a fallen nature, and is, therefore, inclined to evil, and that continually. 4. That the finally impenitent are hopelessly and eternally lost. 5. That the atonement through Christ is for the whole human race and that whoever repents and believes on the Lord Jesus Christ is justified and regenerated and saved from the dominion of sin. 6. That believers are to be sanctified wholly, subsequent to conversion, through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. 7. That the Holy Spirit bears witness to the new birth, and also to the entire sanctification of believers. 8. In the return of our Lord, in the resurrection of the dead, and in the final judgment."

From the above statement, it will be seen that the creed of the Church of the Nazarene is that of Evangelical Protestantism. And, that its distinguishing tenet is that of entire sanctification as a second work of grace wrought in the hearts of believers by faith.

The Church of the Nazarene practices, in common with most Protestant churches, the two ordinances of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Baptism is administered either by effusion or by immersion, according to the election of the candidate.

Last October, the Church of the Nazarene celebrated its "Silver Jubilee Anniversary", its twenty-fifth birthday. In Chicago, twenty six years previous to this time, two branches of "like faith", one from the East and the other the West, united into one body. One year later, this united body met with another branch of "like faith" in the South, at Pilot Point Texas, in October 1908, at which time the southern branch united with the union of the East and West. This formed what is now the Church of the Nazarene.

In the beginning, at the union in Pilot Point October 8, 1908, there were 10,413 church members and 7,780 enrolled in Sunday School. Twenty-five years later, October 8, 1933, there were 102,018 church members and 225,000 enrolled in Sunday School.

LIVE AT HOME PROGRAM SAVES

MANY TEXAS FARMERS PROFIT FROM LIVE-AT-HOME PROGRAM AND SAVE CROP MONEY FOR DEBTS

COLLEGE STATION—One reason the Agricultural Adjustment activities have brought so much prosperity to Texas is because the well developed living-at-home program freed a majority of farmers from the necessity of spending crop money for food. It is pointed out by O. B. Martin, Director of the Texas A and M College Extension Service. Direct cash benefits and increased crop income went for the most part into debt retirement and new buying, he declares.

A systematic plan for producing a complete food supply for a family of five for a year was used in whole or in part on many Texas farms last year under the name "Filling the Farm Storehouse Demonstration." It was promoted by county farm and home demonstration agents to show how 25 acres of average Texas land, about \$200 worth of livestock, and the ordinary work stock, farm implements, fences and building could be used to produce the \$600 worth of food annually require for the proper nourishment of a family of five.

According to Mr. Martin, this demonstration will be pushed again in Texas this year by the Extension Service. The plan is described in a leaflet, C-98, available from county farm and home demonstration agents. He also calls attention to the fact that families which have in the past not devoted enough land to producing for the family needs may take contracted wheat acres to make up the difference, farmers being allowed the use of

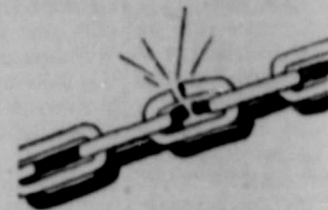
