Roy Smith Charged With Manslaughter New Commission Elected Tuesday

(By International News Service)
AURORA, Ill., Apr. 3.—Roy Smith, deputy sheriff who shot and killed Mrs. Lillian De King in a dry raid recently, today faced an indictment for manslaughter following an investigation by the coroner's jury. Attorney General Oscar Carlstrom is expected to go before the special session of the grand jury Monday and seek an indictment as recommended at the inquest. An indictment will be sought against Eugene Fairchild, whose false affidavit that he bought liquor from Mrs. De King caused the raid. Fairchild admitted on the stand that his sworn statement was a lie. Yielding to a popular demand, State's Attorney George Carbery turned the investigation over to Attorney General Carlstrom after expressing his own support was with the raiders.

Seaman Killer Given 10 Years

HOUSTON, Apr. 3.—John B. Fikes, 26, a seaman, today pleaded guilty to a manslaughter charge. He was charged with the killing of George Leonard, steward, both from the steamship Endicott. He was sentenced to ten years in the federal prison at Atlanta. Leonard was killed after a revel at Havre, France. Both the men previously had quarreled over a girl.

Wisconsin Wets Score a Victory

Baker Tenders His Resignation

AUSTIN, Apr. 3.—Colonel R. H. Baker of Houston, today tendered his resignation as chairman of the State Prison Board to Governor Moody, effective immediately. He expressed disappointment over the failure of the legislature to pass the centralization bill for the prison system.

W. C. McCarver was elected mayor of Ballinger Tuesday and O. L. Parrish and E. Shepperd commissioners. The vote was light due to there being no competition in the race but 172 votes were polled during the day. The three men ran about the same, high man receiving 172 and low man 169 of the votes cast.

The new commission will take oath of office and begin their administration in about 15 or 20 days. Dr. S. B. Raby, retiring mayor, stated Wednesday morning that all matters pertaining to the old commission would be attended to as fast as possible and the new members sworn in.

An audit of the books is being made at present and this will be completed at an early date and made public as one of the last acts of the retiring commission. All other details are fairly well up and very little work will need to be done to get all business in shape to turn over to the incoming commission.

As soon as the new commission is sworn in they will begin one of the busiest administrations here for several years. The new improvements voted by a recent bond issue will be before the new administration and will be a big job to get everything under way during the spring and summer.

The new administration members had no statement to make Monday other than that they appreciated the vote and confidence given them by the citizens at the election Tuesday. They will take office and look into the work before them before they will be in a position to make any definite statements in regard to any part of the affairs of the city.

FORMER BALLINGER MAN IS MAYOR AT MCCAMEY

Leonard Proctor, formerly of Ballinger was elected mayor of McCamey in the election held at that place Tuesday. Mr. Proctor has been away from Ballinger for several years and for the past two has been making his home in McCamey. Mr. Proctor defeated F. E. Gibbons who had been in office for two years by a vote of 330 to 151.

Four are Burned In Detroit Fire

The dead are Bertha Richardson, 57; George Hankins, 38; William Hankins, 7; Freda Hankins, 4; Leon Jones, 3, and Dolma Jones, 2, all negroes. The aged woman was the grandmother of the children. Origin of the fire was undetermined.

Strict Safety Code is Sought By U.S. Experts

WASHINGTON, Apr. 3.—Remember the Titanic in 1912 and the Vestris in 1928.

This will be the watchword of America's representatives who this month will carry to a conference in London the strictest code yet proposed as an international safety standard on the high seas.

Ships honeycombed with airtight compartments, compulsory radio equipment for the smallest vessels, and a general tightening of navigation law—these will be the demand of this group at Great Britain's International Safety Conference April 16.

The meeting, planned in 1927, was called for revision of the 1914 convention for safety of life at sea, a pact agreed to by nations of the world as they recoiled in horror from the spectacle of the iceberg-scuttled Titanic with 1490 souls aboard.

New regulations were drawn, and new standards of construction set. But time passed, and ships grew bigger when the war came.

Cessation of hostilities and the fact all signatory nations were not adhering to terms of the 1914 agreement caused England to call another conference, for April, 1929.

Just as plans for the April meeting were perfected—the world rocked to another tragedy. The Vestris, an English liner, floundered and 111 persons were drowned.

Since then work has been renewed, and now experts of the world have further perfected their devices for increasing the safety element on the ocean. Civil and departmental talent was kept busy working out means of preventing such disasters.

Proposals to be included in the United States demands at the conference were worked out by three committees, on construction, navigation, and communications.

They will submit reports this week to the state department, through which a new safety agreement, or revision of the 1914 convention, would be negotiated.

The construction committee, International News Service learned, will set out regulations to compel passenger liners to be constructed in an almost unsinkable manner. Under the committee proposals they would be in effect a series of compact boxes. A hole in one section would in no way affect the buoyancy of another. Cargo ships, however, would not have such a stringent regulation imposed.

Stability will be taken into account, and the location of big and little compartments designed to prevent listing.

Communication experts in their studies decided many boats which should be not carrying powerful radio equipment. They recommend, very stringent radio regulations for small boats.

The navigation committee devoted its time to a re-writing of laws of the sea. It will recommend new rules to prevent collisions and new regulations regarding destruction of derelicts, rotting ambassadors of death, charting their course by wind and swell alone.

The American proposals are expected to face some opposition because of high costs of putting them into operation. Delegates will battle for their adoption, however, and they are backed up by a wave of public feeling which swept in the wake of news of the Vestris tragedy, officials said.

The American position is believed to have been strengthened, too, when congress passed the Jones load line bill, to establish safe loading capacities for all ships sailing to or from American ports. Delegates said they believe America desires safe seas at any cost.

Delegates to make the trip are headed by Rep. White, republican, of Maine; chairman of the House of Representatives Merchant Marine committee.

BALTIC SEA FROZEN SO MAN WALKS ACROSS IT

Mexican Rebels Face Annihilation by Federals

Herrick is Called "Beloved Friend"

PARIS, Apr. 3.—Evidences of mourning for "France's beloved friend" are seen everywhere. Flags are at half mast. The late Ambassador Myron T. Herrick lay in the American Embassy directly beneath a picture of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh. The services will begin in the American Embassy where eulogies will be made. The body will then be taken to the American Cathedral through streets lined with troops. Due to the limited seating capacity of the cathedral only a thousand or fifteen hundred of the most prominent personages in France will be permitted to attend.

Governor Moody Vetoes Three Bills

AUSTIN, Apr. 3.—Governor Dan Moody today vetoed the bill restricting the state into 12 supreme judicial districts and establishing a new court at Greenville. The Sunday movie bill, legalizing operation of movies after 1 p. m. on Sunday, and the co-insurance clause bill were also vetoed by the governor.

MEXICO CITY, Apr. 3.—General Jose Gonzalo Escobar's rebel army, which fled Jimenez during the night, today faced annihilation when it was halted ten miles from the position the troops had abandoned. The rebels' flight was halted by burned bridges. A division of federals, led by General Juan Andreu Almazan, hotly pursued the rebels, intending to give battle on the arid wastes northeast of Jimenez. The Mexican presidency predicts the complete route of the rebels today.

NACO, Sonora, Apr. 3.—Rebels claimed a victory in the Siloa area today when the insurgents, under General Leon, were reported to have defeated and dispersed federal troops at Calita, near Durango after a sanguinary clash. There was no report of casualties.

MEXICO CITY, Apr. 3.—The Battle of Jimenez went into its third day today. The federal troops are tightening their net about the city. Rebels are holding tenaciously to the town and railroad station, facing unrelenting artillery fire. This is the fiercest fight of the revolution and casualties are enormous. It is estimated by General Andreu Almazan, the federal leader, that the rebels have lost 600 killed and that the federals have lost one-fifth that number.

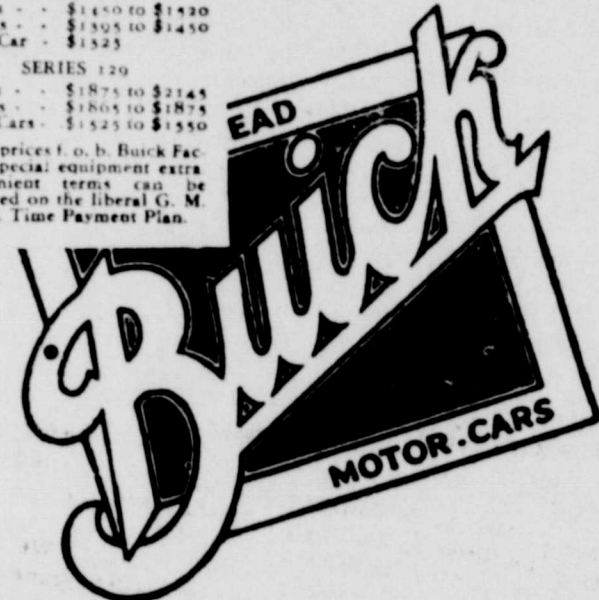

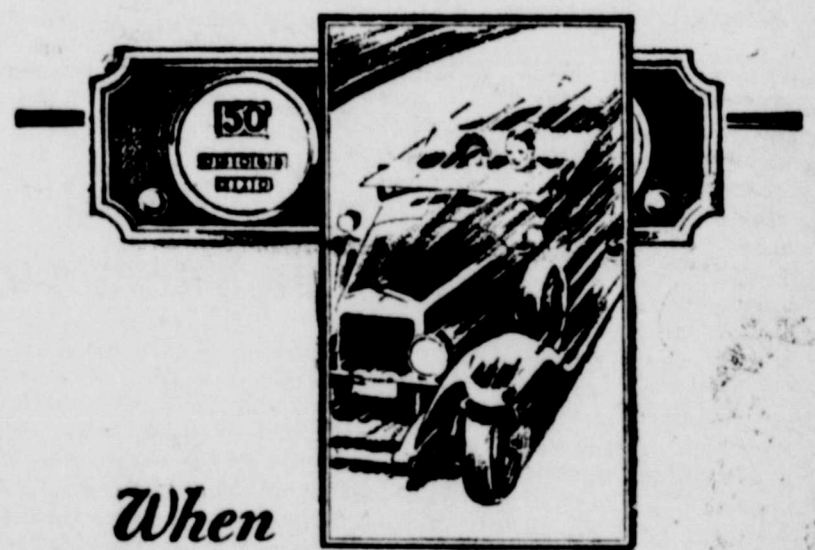

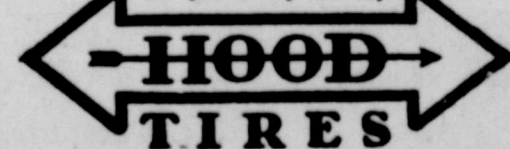

Crystal Jar to Enshrine Names Of Quake Dead

(By International News Service)

TOKYO, Apr. 3.—A crystal jar, within which will be the names of the 104,619 persons who met death in the Japanese earthquake of September 1, 1923, is to be placed on sacred Mount Koya and to remain there for 10,000 years. The jar has just been completed.

Crystal was chosen following scientific investigations because it was believed to be the most enduring substance. It is better able to withstand acids and changes in temperature than is glass. Sheets of torinoko paper manufactured by the Government Printing Bureau will be used for inscribing the names, each sheet bearing 100 names. These will be rolled like scrolls, and each end and the center bound with metal strips.

After the scrolls are placed in the jar, which is 135 centimeters in diameter and 22 centimeters long, the air will be forced out and a vacuum left to prevent the decay of the paper. The jar will be sealed, and placed in a lead casing, which in turn will be placed in a

cylinder of carborundum. The idea of honoring the earthquake dead was originated by Hidejiro Nagata when he was mayor of Tokyo.

Mount Koya where the crystal jar will be buried, is one of the most sacred spots in all Japan to the followers of Buddhism. Kobo Daishi, the great Buddhist leader of the late eighth and early ninth centuries founded a temple and monastery there.

Buddhist rules have been better obeyed on Mt. Koya than at most places, and even today no meat or spirits are obtainable.

The mountain was opened to women pilgrims, and late last year a furious quarrel among the priests raged back and forth as to whether to permit the building of an electric line up the mountain and the erection of a modern hotel.

Shortly after the great earthquake the ashes of all the dead were brought to the site of the old military clothing depot beyond the Sumida River in Tokyo. Buddhist temples, a Shinto shrine and a tent for Christian services had sprung up on the site almost before the ashes of the stricken city had cooled.

Mass was said for 100 days and nights. Gradually the clutter of barrack-temples and tents gave way, and one small, severely plain temple of unpainted wood was

erected and was dedicated to All Religion. Behind the carved wooden figure of the Goddess of Mercy, were placed the ashes of the dead in metal containers.

A campaign was conducted and funds raised for the erection of a charnel shrine. The first design chosen was futuristic in style but this has been abandoned and a temple-pagoda modelled in the famous Horiuji near Nara is to be built. Work was begun about a year ago.

Not all of the ashes of those who perished in the earthquake and the fires which accompanied it rest at Hifukushoato. In October, 1923, a few weeks after the great tragedy, Buddhist priests held a special service on this now consecrated ground and placed a portion of the ashes of the dead in containers to be taken to Koyasan.
