WIFE DIES FOLLOWING ACQUITTAL

KANKAKEE, Ill., June 26.—Mrs. Len Small, wife of Governor Small of Illinois, died this morning. Death came suddenly, and a shock to friends of the family.

Mrs. Small was apparently in good health, but was stricken with apoplexy last Saturday night during the excitement incident to a celebration of friends as a result of his acquittal on charges of embezzling state funds. Governor Small was tried at Waukegan and the jury returned a verdict of not guilty Saturday afternoon, and Mrs. Small was stricken a few hours later, and never recovered from the stroke.

4 YEAR OLD BOY DIES IN OIL WELL

FORT WORTH, June 26.—Randall Grady, age four years, met death when he fell in an oil well two miles east of Electra last night. The child was playing near the well when he fell into the hole and lodged at a depth of 180 feet below the surface of the earth. Five thousand frantic persons gathered at the well and tried to devise means of rescue, but all efforts to save the child were unsuccessful and his body was later recovered from the hole.

The body of the child was recovered from the hole by the use of grappling hooks. The body was wedged in the twelve inch hole in such a way as to make it difficult to fish the body out without mutilating it.

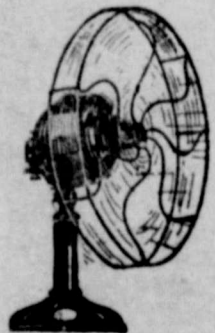

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MAN HELD FOR STEALING CAR

FLOOD SPREADS IN LOWER VALLEY

BROWNSVILLE, June 26.—The crest of the rise in the Rio Grande had passed Mercedes today and is traveling slowly as it approaches the mouth of the river.

The flood centered near Harlingen and San Benito where another levee is reported to have given away today, the break being nearer Lafaria. Additional farm lands were inundated by the break. At Mercedes the water is reported to be receding one inch an hour, relieving farms which were inundated to a depth of two or three feet yesterday.

Train service from Houston to Brownsville on the Gulf Coast Lines has been suspended on account of washouts, and water covers the tracks between Harlingen and Sebastian.

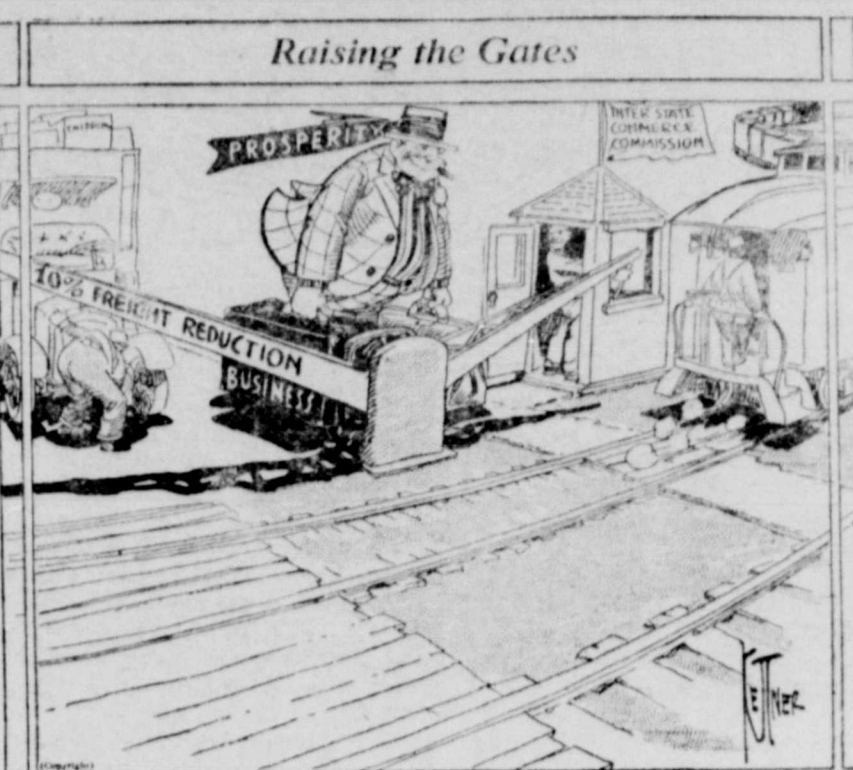

BANDITS HOLD AMERICAN FOR BIG RANSOM

NEW YORK, June 26.—Ten thousand pesos is on the way from Mexico City into the Juravala hills to pay the ransom for the release of Bruce Bielaski, who was seized by Mexican bandits. Frank Sauple, vice-president of the Richmond Levering Company, a concern for which Bielaski is employed and is an official, said that the money had been sent to free the American in response to the demands made by his abductors.

MEXICO CITY, June 26.—A. Bruce Bielaski, chief of the Bureau of Investigation of the United States Department of Justice during the war, is being held for a ransom by seven Mexican bandits. The American was held up while traveling in an automobile seven miles West of Cuernavaca, in the State of Morelos, yesterday, and the bandits immediately fled with him and sent a warning to friends of the man to put up a ransom or Bielaski would be severely dealt with.

FIVE KILLED IN IDLE COAL MINE SHAFT

HUNTINGTON, Ark., June 26.—The bodies of five victims in the mine tragedy here yesterday were recovered today and preparations have been completed for the funerals of John Roberts, Youney Roberts, Roland Porter, Dolly Robinson and Edith Robinson.

The victims were suffocated in a mine which has been idle since the coal miners' strike began. Four of the dead sacrificed their lives trying to rescue John Roberts, Roberts, who was picking berries, sat down near an air hole of the mine to rest and was overcome by the fumes and fell 160 feet to the bottom of the shaft, and the others were overcome when they attempted to rescue the man.

HIGH MAN WINS IN COKE COUNTY

ROBERT LEE, June 26.—The Coke County Democratic Executive Committee met in Robert Lee at the county court house Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, with the following officers present: Geo. Cowan, chairman; Monroe Parker, secretary; Silas Conner, A. J. Waltrip, Temp. Whitesides, D. P. Key, J. C. Sneed, William Millican and H. L. Adams, committeemen.

A motion carried to hold only one primary to elect county officers.

A motion carried to donate \$10.00 to the State Democratic Executive Committee.

A motion carried that only the Terrell election law test be placed on the ballot.

The chairman appointed the following committee to make up ballots, appoint election officers, etc.: Monroe Parker, Temp. Whitesides, J. A. Waltrip, J. C. Sneed and D. P. Key.

The following resolution offered by Judge H. L. Adams was carried: "Resolved that any person offering for a county or precinct office in Coke county, who voted in any other than the Democratic party at the last election, be required to furnish the necessary petition signed by twenty-five qualified Democratic voters before his name be placed on the primary election ballot."

OFFICERS MOBILIZE TO STOP ATTACK ON JAIL

OFFICERS PROBE FAMILY QUARREL

Up to Monday morning no charges had been filed in connection with the shooting fracas on the Gorman farm six miles South of Ballinger, in which it is alleged that Flynn Gorman shot at his father, W. F. Gorman several times with an automatic shot-gun loaded with buck shot. Officers are taking testimony in the case and declined to state whether any charges would be filed or not.

According to statements made by the parties implicated in the trouble, the shooting was only a part of a long drawn out family quarrel in the Gorman family, in which threats and counter threats to kill have been made, it is alleged, and Flynn Gorman, the oldest of three brothers, accompanied by his two brothers, appeared before the county attorney following the shooting Saturday, and claimed that he was acting in self defense, and charged that his father had threatened to kill him if he entered upon certain premises which the young man claimed that he had rented and had a right to enter upon. The father tells an altogether different story, and the officers are a little "leary" about throwing the matter into court with no testimony to justify conviction.

climax of a family quarrel. Sheriff Flynt was called to the Gorman farm last Saturday following the shooting. The shots went wild, it being alleged that Gorman escaped into another room when his son opened fire on him.

CHILD RECOVERS FROM SNAKE BITE

The five year old child of Rev. and Mrs. E. W. Wells, of Brownwood, is reported to have recovered from a rattlesnake bite. Rev. Wells was in South Texas holding a meeting and Mrs. Wells and the child were visiting in the country near Brownwood when the child was bitten by the snake while playing out near the house. Speedy home treatment and the quick aid of a physician saved the child's life, although its condition was serious for a time. Rev. Wells was formerly pastor of the Nazarene church at Ballinger.

FAIRMONT, W. Va., June 26.—The entire Fairmont police force and all of Marion county's deputies were mobilized today in an effort to stop a march of striking miners and their sympathizers from Monongah, ten miles South of here.

The authorities said that they had been informed that an attempt would be made by the striking miners to liberate ninety-one prisoners from the county jail who were arrested Friday after a march of strikers through the city.

HERRIN, Ill., June 26.—Williamson county yesterday completed the burial of the dead resulting in the mine war recently, and today turned attention to inquest proceedings in an effort to determine the cause of the deaths and face the responsibility of bringing the guilty to justice.

With no arrests made since the wholesale massacre and with county officials making no visible efforts to place the blame for the outbreak, the investigation now underway is being made by the state and federal agencies.

SIGNAL MEN IN FAVOR STRIKE

Helt, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Signalmen. This branch of railroad workers is balloting on whether to walk out as a protest against additional reductions in wages.

DIES SUDDENLY W. B. PAGE DIES WHILE BATHING IN OKLAHOMA

Undertaker Crews were called to Wingate to embalm the body of A. J. Fitzgerald Sunday night, and the remains were prepared for burial and brought to Ballinger and shipped to Killeen, the home of the deceased, for burial Monday afternoon.

Mr. Fitzgerald, aged about 45, came to this county on a visit a short time ago, and was visiting his daughter, Mrs. Phillips, two miles from Wingate. With others he went in bathing about one o'clock Sunday afternoon, and a short time after coming out of the water he complained of a hurting in his arm something like rheumatism, and in less than an hour he passed away. The cause of death was said to be neuralgia of the heart.

Water 30 Cents a Gallon.

Water isn't quite up to the price of liquor, but it is almost there at Cow Camp, the driest point on the Silver Peak range, near Tonopah, Nev. They are paying 30 cents a gallon for it, and residents are agreeing that it is cheap at the price. There isn't any competition, the water man has a monopoly and no one envies him his job.

The nearest watering place is 11 miles away. For five miles the water is carried in a buckboard drawn by horses. Then the road narrows to a trail and horses are unhitched, the water hogs tied over their backs, and the remainder of the trip is slow. It takes about a day to make the trip.

In the old days, when saloons quenched thirst, there wasn't the demand for water that there is now.—Los Angeles Times.

Arrangements for the funeral of W. B. Page are being made, and the remains are due to arrive here from Oklahoma Tuesday at noon and they will be laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery sometime Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Page died at Grandfield, Oklahoma, about six o'clock Monday morning, according to information received in Ballinger later in the day. J. D. Perkins, who has been in the employ of the same firm for which Mr. Page has been working came in from Oklahoma last Saturday. He stated that aside from complaining of rheumatism Mr. Page was apparently in good health and was at work when he left him last Thursday. The message received in Ballinger announcing his death stated that he was sick but a few minutes, death coming suddenly.

Mr. Page has been a citizen of Ballinger from time to time for more than twenty years. Up until about a month ago his family resided here while he was away at work, traveling for a grocery house, and he came home about once or twice a month while at work in Texas, but since being transferred to Oklahoma he had not been coming home as often. About one month ago Mrs. Page and two children, a little girl about five or six years old and a baby boy less than two years old, went to Oklahoma to join Mr. Page.

Deceased is survived by three other daughters, Mrs. Montgomery, of Eldorado, and Miss Mary, who is at present visiting in Waco; and Jimma Leah, who has been with her step-mother here, but who went to spend the summer with her sister at Eldorado, when Mrs. Page and the two smaller children went to Oklahoma.

Mr. Page was engaged in the real estate business during most of the time he resided in Ballinger. He is well known over this section of the state and leaves many friends who will be grieved to learn of his death and who will sympathize with the wife and children in their loss.
