## No Solution Yet To Ambulance Crisis

A committee made up of representatives from Westbrook Loraine, city of Colorado City, county, and county hospital district have been struggling to come up with a workable solution to providing ambulance service for the county for two months now.

The committee has been meeting weekly and in some cases, several times a week during the last two months and have studied a number of different proposals to solve the problem.

The committee was formed after Klker-Seale Funeral Home told local governments that it was going to have to get out of the ambulance business due to increasing expenses and increasingly strict requirements imposed by both the state and federal government on ambulance service.

At the time the funeral home served notice that it wanted out of the ambulance business, the date of Nov. 15 was set as the changeover date but representatives of the funeral home said they would not leave the county without ambulance service and would continue to operate ambulances until the local governments could come up with a solution for the problem.

One of the latest proposals discussed by the committee involved having the fire department of Colorado City operate the ambulance service with the aid of the Colorado City police department.

From all indications, it now appears that whatever solution is arrived at, the county will pay about 37 1/2%, the hospital district 37 1/2%, the city of Colorado City, 25%. Westbrook and Loraine also are expected to pay a portion of the expense. The formula for the amount of expense could be anywhere from \$1 to \$2 per year per resident of each governmental body in the county.

The committee is expected to meet again this coming Thursday to study one other proposal which has been drawn up by Root Hospital Administrator Charles Root. There is also still the possibility that a private contractor could be given the job of providing ambulance service.

The committee has been

studying all possibilities in an effort to get the best ambulance service possible at the lowest cost possible.

Members of the committee are Wayne Shaw, hospital district; Eddie Piland, city council; Royce Mahon, Lorraine City council; Paul Hunter, county commissioner and chairman of the committee, and Sam Oden,

Westbrook city council.

Hunter said that the committee is working hard to come up with a solution to providing ambulance service for the county. However, there is no easy solution, he noted.

One thing members of the committee are trying to avoid, Hunter said, is the hiring of people to do nothing but sit and

make one ambulance call on the average of every 2 1/2 days which is the number of ambulance calls made now by the funeral home.

However, there are times, when two ambulances are needed at once, which complicates the problem. Then there are weeks when no ambulance calls are made at all, he pointed out.

Mitchell County has just about used up the blood in reserve at the Blood Bank in Root Memorial Hospital, so all residents are asked to donate blood during the Blood Drive this week, beginning Monday and continuing through Saturday.

The Blood Drive is sponsored annually by the Hospital Auxiliary (Pink Ladies) and needs YOU to make it work.

In the past, contests have been held between men and women, women leading by a large margin year before last and men winning by a wide margin last year. The men are hoping to lead again this year, but all has not yet been settled.

J. W. Hicklin, blood technician at Root Memorial Hospital, will be ready to take blood donations at the hospital any time,

but especially Monday-Saturday of this week, hours from 9 a.m. to 9 or 10 p.m., he said, as long as anyone comes.

Wednesday will be Lorraine Day and a technician will be stationed in Lorraine to take donations.

Also Wednesday, the lab in the hospital will stay open all night, so that late-comers may make their donations.

Saturday a man will be stationed in downtown Colorado City in Montgomery Ward Catalog Store, in order to make it more convenient for donors to give.

The annual drive has a goal of 300 units of blood. This blood is used to re-pay the bank for blood used during the year.

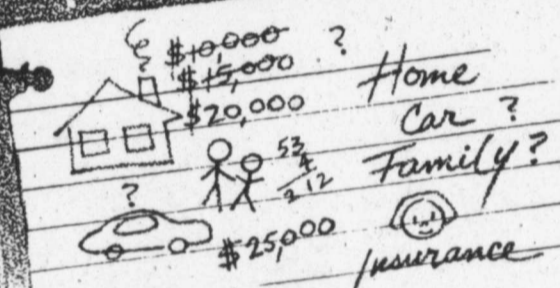

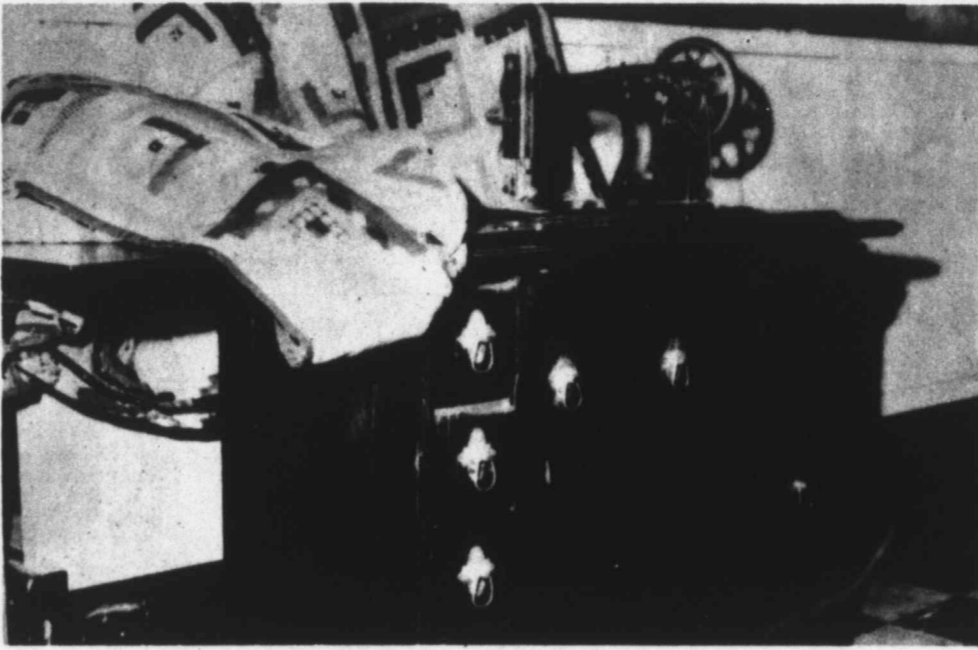

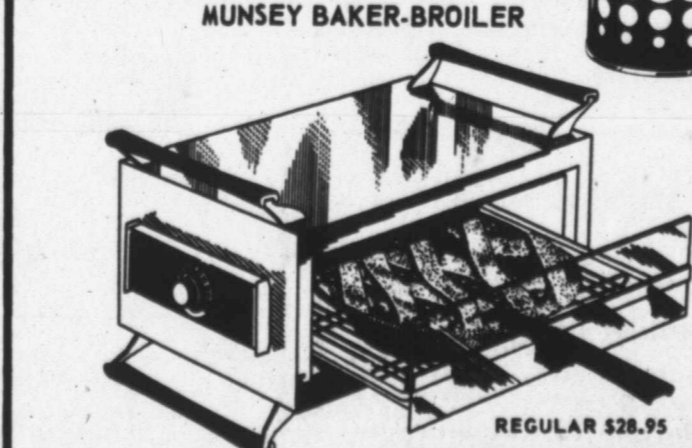
