T. B. O. R. CO. BREAK GROUND FOR FIRST UNIT

Ground stakes were set and

lines established for the build-

ings of a complete unit of a

1000 barrel daily capacity re-

finery during the past week.

Loosening surface rock has

been in progress for several

days preparatory to excavating

with teams and scrapers, this

work being done for the cool-

ing pit which will be 24x24

feet and hold about five feet

of water, the walls will be of

pleted for about \$4,000 of

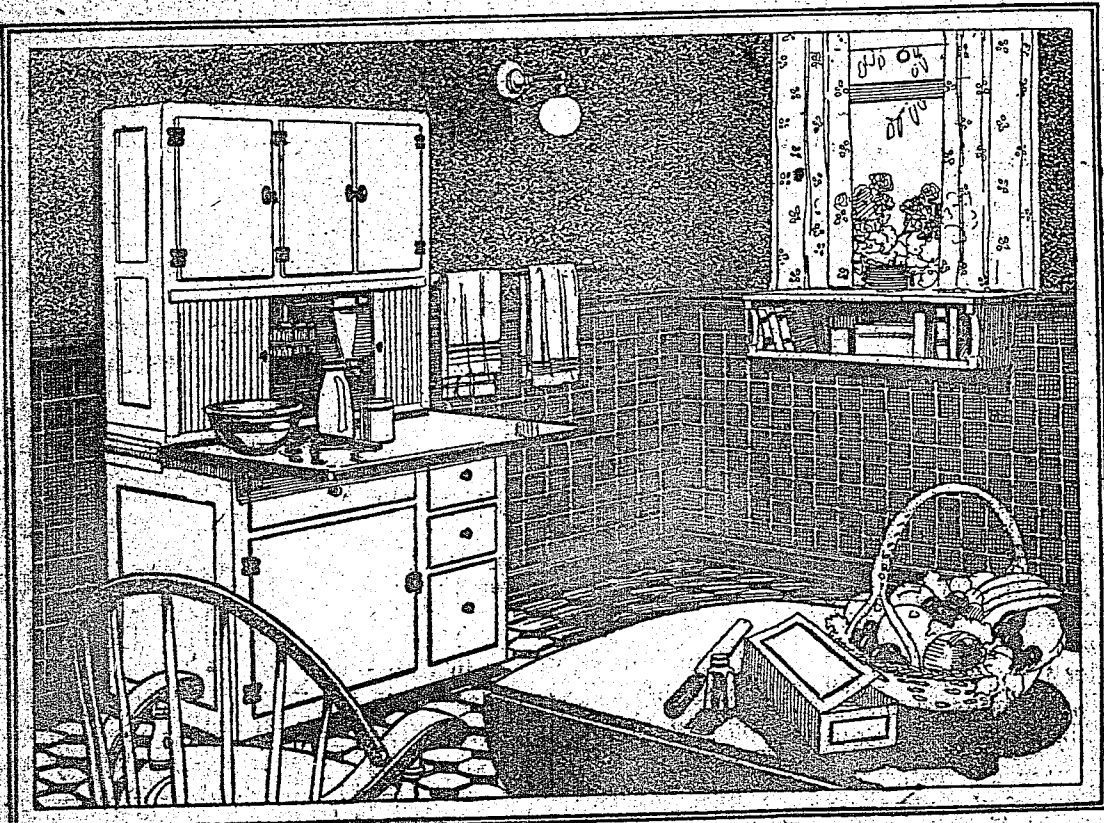

CHINESE HAND LABOR CHEAP

Chief Reason Why It Does Not Pay to Operate a Steam Sawmill in That Country.

All lumber for building in China is bought in the log, writes H. K. Richardson in Asia Magazine. As soon as the logs begin to arrive the contractor tackles them with the sawyers. These men are paid piece rates which average about three cash or one-tenth of a cent per square foot of surface sawed. They average a better wage than a carpenter, getting about 10 cents a day as compared with 8 cents a day for the carpenter. At this rate they are cheaper than any steam sawmill that can operate in China. In fact, the only reason a sawmill can operate in China at all is because it can produce quickly and with a more even thickness than the native sawyers. The necessary doors, frames and window sashes are all made by hand. Three Chinese carpenters at 8 cents a day with their native tools can accomplish about the same work done by one American carpenter with all equipment. The work is well done if well supervised. The American carpenter has all his wood surfaced, so the Chinese carpenter is at a disadvantage. In comparison, I should say that about five Chinese carpenters at 8 cents a day each are necessary to do the work of an American carpenter who receives \$6 a day and has all his wood prepared for him.

PAID FOR LACK OF COURTESY

Boorish Action of Early Churchman Set Back the Cause of Christendom in Wales.

Apropos of the recent enthronement of the new archbishop of Wales, at St. Asaph's cathedral; a writer in the Church Times recalls an interesting historical incident. When Augustine first met the Welsh bishops, 13 centuries ago, he sat in his chair and compelled them to stand up; on the recent occasion, this writer points out, the latest successor to Augustine met the Welsh bishops, and, standing up, courteously and graciously invited the Welsh archbishop to take a seat in a chair which is an exact replica in oak of his own marble throne at Canterbury. The writer might have added that Augustine certainly did not gain anything by his lack of courtesy. For the Welsh bishops sturdily refused to recognize his authority, and it was not until many years afterward that the Welsh church decided to throw in its lot with western Christendom.

NEW RADIO RECEIVERS.

From a German source it is learned that the adoption of undamped-wave transmitters in the Italian navy led to a study of receivers capable of receiving both spark and damped-wave signals. The type of receiver adopted was the so-called "ultraudion" receiver in which a single valve acts at the same time as oscillation generator and as detector. Three types of apparatus, according to the requirements of shore and ship stations, were built, the wave lengths ranging from 300 to 15,000 meters. Scientific American.

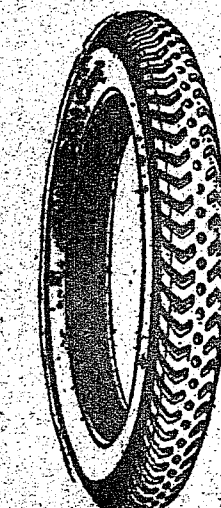

UNION LABOR'S EFFORT TO CONTROL THE AFFAIRS OF THE COUNTRY IS PLAINLY EVIDENT IN THE RACE FOR GOVERNOR OF TEXAS

A writer in the Saturday Evening Post a short while ago made the statement that "In politics there is only one so unscrupulous as the truly good man whose zeal has been warmed by the fires of fanaticism and prejudice. No seasoned politician will stoop to the devices of a pack of earnest, zealous, slightly purling citizens engaged in chasing a hypothetical wolf."

The Situation in Texas.

A small coterie of professional politicians who have been defeated for office every time their name has appeared on the primary ticket, and who have only succeeded in obtaining the party machinery by hand picked conventions, have produced the effect noted above on a large number of good people of Texas. Joined to this class is a number who are so blinded by years of enmity and hate of Senator Bailey that their passions and prejudices make them entirely unreasonable and incapable of clear thought. A third partner in the enterprise of defeating him are the labor bosses of Texas whose enmity arises from pure class selfishness, because the labor bosses know that union labor's domination of the people of Texas will ease the day that Senator Bailey takes the path of office as Governor. These three, in the absence of any logic or argument against the principle of the open shop, have attempted to cover up their deficiency by such a cloud of slander, slime, and vituperation, as to divert the minds of the fair minded voters from the only vital issue in this race.

The personal fortunes of Mr. Bailey or Mr. Neff are a small matter to the people of Texas, but the settlement of the menace of the labor problem is a matter that vitally affects every citizen of the state. The awarding of the Governorship to either individual is not a matter of reward for services performed in the past, or the punishment for omissions, but is to be made solely upon the question as to who will give to the people of Texas as a whole the best service.

From the evidence, we shall endeavor to show that the selection of a man by the people is preferable to the selection of a man who has aligned himself with a small class composing only 8 per cent of the population of the state, against the interest of the remaining 92 per cent. They are asking the people to cut off their noses in order to vent their spite against Mr. Bailey.

Menace of Organized Labor.

The grain and cotton raisers of Texas have paid millions of dollars tribute to the labor unions during recent years because of unreasonable strikes which have always been timed to come when the farmer's crops are ready to be moved. The radical element of the labor unions who have believed in force as a weapon have not hesitated to seek to intimidate the farmer by striking at the latter's means of livelihood, in order to coerce the farmer into influencing the government to grant labor's demands. The coal strike in the dead of winter, with the certainty of freezing thousands of innocent women and children to death, was sure proof of the love of the people shown by the radical element of the labor unions, and it is a well known fact that the radical element is rapidly gaining control. They are the "progressives" of the American Federation of Labor, and are disciples of the two greatest and most successful (?) "Progressives" known to the world, Messrs. Lenin and Trotsky. Such old fogies as Washington, Franklin, Jefferson and Jackson have been thrown into the discard. They appeal to you on the grounds of patriotism. We remind you that it is only a short while ago that the country was stirred by the threat of intervention in Mexico. The War Department began preparations for the mobilization of the National guard in Texas, and what happened? The heads of the railroad brotherhoods appeared before Congress and plainly told that honorable body that not a soldier would be moved until Congress passed the Adamson 8-hour law, which was merely a cloak to cover a demand for a big wage increase. With the pistol held at their head by the railroad workers, backed by the American Federation of Labor, Congress was compelled to bow the servile knee, as usual. When your boys were being swept into the army camps of this country, and being shipped to France as fast as ships could be obtained, where were the hosts of organized labor? Instead of serving their country for \$30 per month, they were delaying the work on ships and war munitions in every ship yard and industrial plant in America by striking for higher wages and shorter hours, every demand granted being followed immediately by another for more. That is a sample of patriotism. Now that they have grown so rich and powerful because of the fear of craven politicians, they insolently issue their challenge from Washington boldly stating their intention of defeating every candidate for office, regardless of party affiliation, who refuses to sign a secret contract to carry out the wishes of their legislative committee. Today in Texas, Jos. W. Bailey is the only man big enough and brave enough to raise his voice against such unparalleled audacity, and if the people of this state still that voice on August 28th, then the rule of that body who believes in leaving the people of Boston defenseless against thugs and murderers, who believes in calling out the fire departments of our cities on strike, and even going into the schools and taking the teachers away from their duties, will

have complete and undisputed control of Texas. When they say that the union labor question is not an issue in Texas, they insult your intelligence. Any man with a thimbleful of brains knows that Senator Bailey's defeat would be heralded forth over the entire nation as a great victory for the American Federation of Labor which every few days boldly sends communications to the daily press of the country that it fully intends to control the legislative, judicial and executive branches of the Government. These communications do not mince matters. Such plain words as "The American Federation of Labor will not tolerate" etc. appears in every one of these messages sent out by the labor bosses, which read more like the edicts of the former German Kaiser than the message of American citizens. Who made the issue? Months ago, because of his stand in favor of the people against the unions, Congressman Blanton was marked for destruction, and coupled with instructions to beat Blanton, came the orders from Washington, published in the press of the country, by all means to beat Bailey. The people of his district returned Blanton to Congress by such an overwhelming majority as to leave no doubt of their views, and we believe that the people of the whole state cannot afford to sleep on their rights and allow Senator Bailey to be defeated.

Where Will it Stop?

As soon as the labor unions obtained the 8 hour day, they at once began a movement for the six hour day. When will it stop? There has been considerable agitation for the formation of a cotton chopper's union, and why not? But we leave it to the farmers to say what a six or 8 hour work day by union labor on their farms would result in. Production would fall off so as to cause widespread suffering among the people.

Mr. Neff's Position.

The labor unions of Texas comprise 8 per cent of the voters and pay 3 per cent of the taxes. Do you believe that a small class of this size should completely control the 92 per cent of the people, and spend the 97 per cent of the taxes paid by the 92 per cent? Yet that is what they are demanding, and it is exactly what they will do if they win their fight. Every interest of the farmer and every other citizen of Texas is antagonistic to the labor unions. The labor unions want less work and more pay for themselves. Every wage increase to them, and every hour cut off of their working time is paid directly from the pocket of the producer. When the farmer sells his grain or his cotton, of course the buyer has to subtract the expense of handling, all of which handling is done by union labor on the railroads, docks and steamships. When you buy the finished product woven into clothes by short hour union laborers, you pay their wage increases. So shorter hours and more pay for the union laborer means longer hours and less pay for the farmer. How much longer do farmers propose to be the goat? Although granted only a very short time ago another wage increase of more than \$600,000,000, Mr. Gompers says this is only a sop. This wage increase, so the railroads figure, means an increase of freight rates of 36 per cent more. And yet they say this is not an issue! In this same statement by Mr. Gompers, he says that the average pay of the workers under this wage agreement was \$101.00 per month for the lowest paid, the section men, to \$270.00 per month for the engineers. The American farm hand we believe is equal in intelligence to the Mexican section hand, and how many farm hands receive \$101.00 per month, and how many farmers could afford to pay such prices? The most ignorant of all railroad labor draws as high salaries as educated clerks in stores, offices and banks, in many instances, and much more than teachers and yet Mr. Gompers says this increase was only a sop, and the intimation was clearly made that labor was preparing further demands. Do you believe the demands of union labor are reasonable? If you do, you agree with Mr. Neff, according to a speech he made to the stock yard employees at Fort Worth as reported on page 23 of the Star-Telegram of July 23rd, in which he is literally quoted as follows: "I have found that what the laboring man asks is generally about right," he said. "I believe that he is generally reasonable in his demands, and that you here feel that what you ask is reasonable." He then tells them they should have more time to associate with their families away from their work, to read and otherwise seek mental improvement and sociability with their fellows. How many farmers can get away from their work for 16 hours per day, and associate with their families in recreation, etc? Instead of being away the farmer is usually compelled to be at his work 16 hours per day. Another significant fact of Mr. Neff's labor position is an interview in the Dallas News of July 25th by T. N. Jones, well known lawyer. Mr. Jones said: "I shall support Mr. Neff in the second primary. In my opinion the open shop campaign being carried on in Texas and throughout the Nation is nothing except a movement to destroy the labor organizations. I cannot support any one for office who indorses and advocates the open shop." In the News of July 28th W. M. Reilly, president and official spokesman for the Dallas Labor Council, said: "The unions will now combine for the support of Pat M. Neff

for Governor." He said further that Mr. Bailey carried only one town in Texas where the labor unions had a Central Labor Council and that they intended to concentrate on that city in order to defeat him in the second primary election. Does the evidence point to any secret agreement between Mr. Neff and the labor bosses?

Texas Political Machine.

We have no desire to engage in a campaign of hate, because we believe that the interests of Texas in the future lies far ahead of any personal spleen or prejudice caused by past fights. We ask that every voter erase from his mind and heart every atom of animosity for or against either of the candidates, and coolly and calmly reason for himself what the issues in this campaign are, and what is the best solution for the whole people of the state. We do contend that there is a political machine in Texas headed by Tom Love, and that this Tom Love machine has subordinated everything else to the defeat of Mr. Bailey because they know his election spells the doom of machine politics in this state. The same forces behind Mr. Neff have been in undisputed control of the state government for several years, and its record is before you. Your taxes and the expenses of the state government have increased beyond all reason, without giving you an adequate return. We present to you in the person of Mr. Bailey, a man who not only has the brains and ability and experience to give you a real administration of your government, but a man who has the courage to stand up for your rights against any selfish class.

In regard to Mr. Bailey's Democracy, which is questioned by Cone Johnson, it is to laugh. Mr. Bailey has never scratched the nominee of the Democratic party, and in 1896, when Johnson tore Bryan's name from the head of the ticket and stamped on it, Senator Bailey was strenuously engaged in stumping the country for Bryan. Because before the Democratic convention met at San Francisco, Mr. Bailey made a fight for State Rights and for other matters to be incorporated in the platform, and did not in all things follow Mr. Wilson, the Texas clique of political opportunities try to impeach his Democracy. We claim that any Democrat, not only has the right and privilege to point out what he deems the best for the party, but it is his bounden duty so to do. This is all that Mr. Bailey did, and when the convention met and formulated the platform, Mr. Bailey, Mr. Bryan and thousands of other good Democrats, dropped their personal fight inside the party, and lined up with a solid front against the common enemy. Has it reached a pass in the councils of the Democratic party that it is a high crime and a misdemeanor to disagree with the men that the party has rewarded with its highest gifts? While Love, Johnson et al were making "much-a-do about McAdoo" with the foxy trick of making it seem that the nomination was chasing McAdoo in spite of himself, and while the whole nation was snickering with ridicule of the Texas delegation, Mr. Bailey was, and had been for months, steadily advocating the nomination of Gov. Cox for President, and has never opened his mouth in criticism of the action of the convention, but like the true man and Democrat that he is, has accepted the verdict of his party.
