Truck Drivers Urged to Apply For "T" Books

Truck drivers or persons using "T" cards who have not made application for renewals of coupons, will find themselves without gasoline unless they immediately make application, said R. C. Tevis, chairman of the local rationing board for gas mileage.

"T" cards expire July 1st, and in making applications the applicant must have a certificate showing that his tires have recently been inspected.

Motorists Urged To Keep Backs Of Old "A" Books

Although the actual renewing of "A" mileage ration books is still several weeks away, motorists were urged this week to save their ration book cover (save the front cover for your identification), and turn it in with your application and tire inspection slip, according to Bob Tevis, local gas rationing chairman.

Tevis stated Thursday that the procedure for ration book renewals has been worked out, but that the books will not be registered until sometime in July. He said the forms will be made available to the motoring public through the local filling stations. They must be made out at home and mailed to the local rationing board, together with the BACK COVER of your present "A" book, to obtain the renewal mileage ration purchase coupons.

Tevis further warns that the applications must be mailed in and not brought to the office.

Loose Stamp Rule Stressed

Appeal From Ration Officials to Citizens

Loose ration stamps again were in the spotlight with officials of the local war price and ration board Thursday, when the food and clothing panel of the board issued a statement requesting cooperation on the part of consumers in buying rationed goods.

The board statement:

"The food and clothing panel of the local war price and rationing board has on numerous occasions been notified by various merchants that they are daily confronted with the problem of customers who request them to accept loose ration stamps.

As a result of these reports, the local ration board wishes to emphasize that merchants are not permitted to accept loose stamps except the red stamps with a point value of one.

"Loose stamps are void. The merchants of this county have been notified that they are prohibited from accepting loose stamps. Please do not 'put your merchant on the spot' by asking him to violate the law by accepting loose stamps."

He issued a statement of appreciation to those who have dropped their small change into the bottles and said the campaign would continue.

50,000 Bushels Of Wheat Received In Burkburnett

According to reports from the two elevators here they have received over 50,000 bushels of wheat up to noon Thursday. Most of the wheat is being trucked out of town due to the shortage of railway cars.

An increase of \$1.22 per bushel, government loan was announced this week, which means a net to farmers of about \$1.19 per bushel. Loans vary according to the grade, quality and location of storage with reference to terminal markets.

It is reported from the local elevators that the wheat is very good and is ranging from 60 to 63 pounds per bushel. Combines are working from early to late, and next week should find the harvest at its peak, if it doesn't rain.

AUTO USE TAX STAMPS HERE

Yellow Stickers 'Sell' At Same Price—\$5

Yellow stamps are being issued at the post office for the \$5 federal automobile use tax, payable not later than June 30 for the new fiscal year beginning July 1.

Stamps now being displayed on windshields of motor vehicles for the fiscal year ending June 30 are red. Federal authorities have announced that the new yellow sticker must be on every car, truck, etc., in use on or after July 1.

The purchaser is instructed to put his name and description of the vehicle on the reverse of the stamp.

GASOLINE—"A" book coupons No. 6 good for four gallons each, outside the Eastern gasoline shortage area.

SUGAR—Coupon No. 13 become valid June 1, and will be good for 5 lbs. through August 15. Coupons No. 15 and 16 are good for 5 lbs. each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local boards for additional rations if necessary.

COFFEE—Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) become valid May 31 and is good through June.

SHOES—Stamp No. 17 in War Ration Book One good for one pair through June 15. Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) will become valid June 16.

MEATS, ETC.—Red Stamps J K and L, good through June 30. M becomes valid June 13.

PROCESSED FOODS—Blue stamps K, L, and M good through July 7th.

Save Puerto Rico

There is a bill before Congress to grant independence to the island of Puerto Rico. Anything that suggests independence for any country today has an appeal, and therein lies one of the dangers of this proposal. The people of the United States are totally unfamiliar with Puerto Rico and what it means to this nation. They do not realize it is a territory of the United States and can be the 49th state. It is therefore of the utmost importance that the widest possible understanding of this issue be gained immediately.

Puerto Rico is one of our most important island bases. It guards the Panama Canal and provides a point from which we could intercept an enemy attacking our eastern coast.

There are foreign powers that would like to see Puerto Rico given so-called independence on the chance they could gobble it up.

Talk about "freeing" our fellow citizens in Puerto Rico, 99 per cent of whom are citizens of the United States, and 50 per cent of whom are natural born citizens of this country, is fantastic.

The representative of Puerto Rico in our Congress recommends statehood for the island.

It would be costly folly to cast our island possessions adrift. They are a fortified ring around our nation. They have real freedom and protection under our government.

Instead of throwing Puerto Rico away under a false banner of independence, we would better give it statehood, as advocated in both the Republican and Democratic national platforms of 1940, and add a new star to our flag.

The danger of allowing any island outposts of the American continent to fall into the hands of another power is illustrated by our loss of Kiska and Attu.

Outstanding Achievement

Americans have good cause to be proud of their industry. In two years a tremendous job of conversion has been accomplished and a powerful war machine has been built up.

Only recently the President revealed that the aircraft industry plans to exceed this year's enormous aircraft production by more than 555 per cent next year; and that our current production rate is greater than that of all the other nations of the world combined. According to War Production Chief Nelson, the 1943 munitions goals will be fully achieved, and in some instances, exceeded by a comfortable margin.

Speaking before the Senate Military Affairs Subcommittee, Malcom Muir, Chairman of the War Committee of the National Association of Manufacturers said: "I only wish the public could know more of this wonderful production record—"

"Of how many bombs we have stored to drop on German, Italian, and Japanese soil . . ."

"Of how many extra shells we have stored for our heaviest guns . . ."

"Of how, as disclosed by the Under Secretary of the Navy, 40,000,000 20 mm. anti-aircraft shells, or more than 1,000 for every minute of the day, were loaded for the Navy during February."

When historians come to view the war to date, along with the defense of Britain, the resistance of the Russians and the amazing performance of our own fighting forces they will no doubt cite the production achievements of American enterprise as one of the outstanding events of the conflict.

Another Sneak Attack

The well planned closing of the nation's coal mines while United Mine Workers' demands were in process of negotiation, is on a par with the Japanese sneak attack on Pearl Harbor.

Words cannot express the contempt of the American people for individuals who are parties to such treachery, and who refuse to work while our soldiers die.

Let us hope that Congress will at last assert its authority and enact legislation providing controls for organized mutiny which endangers public safety for personal gain.

If the enemy had bombed our coal mines, the work stoppage would not have been as complete as when the United Mine Workers deserted their posts. Therefore their action is the equivalent of an enemy attack on this nation.

Will Price Fixers Learn

Will we next see a disastrous oil shortage because our economic planners again try to go counter to the laws of nature?

Oil men state that we are using up our known oil supplies much more rapidly than we are discovering new ones. Wildcatting for oil must precede refined oil products. To promote wildcatting, ceiling prices on crude oil must cover increased cost of labor, supplies and taxes, and allow a profit, or no new wells will be found to offset those being exhausted.

The sane policy is for government to encourage the exploration and development of our oil resources. We face disaster from any other course.

A series of rehabilitation school of instructions are now being conducted at each district convention of The American Legion throughout the state, in order to enlighten Post Service Officers and other members of The American Legion on the new veterans' regulations pertaining to World War II veterans and their dependents. The Department Rehabilitation Committee of The American Legion and the Veteran's State Service Office are supervising the rehabilitation school of instructions being conducted in

different sections of the state, Mr. Brookman stated.

The National Rehabilitation Committee of The American Legion is now working with the Veterans' Administration on a new proposed rating schedule, which will be beneficial to the new group of veterans and their dependents. The aim of the American Legion is to see that the returning disabled comrades are properly rehabilitated so they may assume their normal sphere in life as nearly as possible, and to find their proper place in society, stated Brookman.

JOHN DESCRIBES TRUE CHRISTIANS

LESSON TEXT—1 John 2:1-6; 3:13-18;
4:15-17.
GOLDEN TEXT—But if we walk in the
light, as he is in the light, we have
fellowship one with another, and the
blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth
us from all sin.—1 John 1:7.

Religion and life go together. To
hold the tenets of Christian truth in
one's head and not to have them
move the heart is to deny the very
faith one professes. Yet this is the
danger which faces the believer—a
temptation before which many have
fallen. The result is that much of
"what passes for Christianity in
these days is very thin stuff, very
remote from the original" (Shoe-
maker).

John was not content with such a
weak imitation, and in his writings
he set up the true standard of a
forgiven and transformed life, liv-
ing itself out in love and sacrificial
service. If we have forgotten what
God meant us to be in Christ, or
are members of a church which has
strayed from the true and living
way, this lesson affords an opportu-
nity for penitence and works meet
thereunto.

The true Christian life must have
I. Sin Forgiven and Life Trans-
formed (1 John 2:1-6).

Not only at the beginning of the
Christian life is sin dealt with and
put away, but day by day—yes, mo-
ment by moment—we have the
cleansing power of the blood of our
Divine Advocate.

This is of the utmost importance,
for God can only use clean chan-
nels for the outpouring of His power
and grace to the world. We know
our own weakness and the defiling
presence of the world. But unlike the
unregenerate man, we do not
submit and go down; we turn to
Christ for forgiveness and cleans-
ing.

The transformation of life which
thus comes to the believer is shown
in obedience to the commandments
of God. In the early church there
were those who said that if they only
believed in Christ as Saviour it made
no difference how they lived—and
they have their followers in our day.

Be sure of this, the essential thing
in Christian profession is not how
you talk about Christ, but how you
walk in obedience to His command-
ments.

Real Christianity will cause us to
be

II. Hated by the World and Loved
by the Brethren (1 John 3:13-18).

The world, that is, unregenerate
mankind, hates a genuine Christian
no matter how kind and loving he
may be. Why? "Because the Chris-
tian believer gives the non-believer
an uncomfortable sense of inferiority.
The presence of high Christian
ideals in marked contrast to his own
selfish policies arouses his anger
and resentment" (Douglass).

The presence of a clean, godly
life in a community makes every
sinner look that much blacker, and
the world, the flesh, and the devil
will do everything possible to break
down and destroy such a testimony.

We, as Christians, should not be
surprised that the world hates us.
In fact, we should be troubled if it
does not hate us, for if our Chris-
tianity really means anything, it is
distasteful to a God-hating world.
Beware if sinners find nothing in
your life which distresses them and
convicts them of sin.

In the midst of enmity the Chris-
tian is not afraid, for he is

III. Indwelt by God and Unafraid
in the World (1 John 4:15-17).

A sincere confession of Christ as
Saviour brings a man into that close
relationship to God which is ex-
pressed in the words, "God abideth
in him, and he in God" (v. 15).

The full depth of meaning of these
words is obviously beyond our lim-
ited understanding, but we accept
the fact by faith and rejoice in it.
We recognize that it means that we
are brought by our faith in Christ,
into the very center of God's love.
Christ, the well-beloved Son, who
stands in that blessed place, draws
us into the circle and there we stand
in Him.

God's love showed itself in the giv-
ing of His Son as the Redeemer of
the world. It was and is unselfish
and sacrificial devotion to the eter-
nal welfare of those who merited
only judgment. We do not love un-
til we reflect that quality in our
lives.

Such love casts out fear. Fellow-
ship is impossible in an atmosphere
of fear, but love rules it out. In
Christ we realize that God first
loved us, and then our hearts go out
in warm devotion to him.

Not only does the Christian no
longer fear the day of judgment,
but he is unafraid in the present
evil world. This is not because of
his own strength or ability, but be-
cause through faith in Christ he is
"in God," and "as He is, so are we
in this world" (v. 17). No more
perfect or blessed ground of assur-
ance could possibly be provided. Let
us recognize our position in Him,
and be strong and unafraid.

Household Hints

Vary doughnuts by adding some
chopped dates, nutmeats or cocoa-

Crop Dusting Display Given

War on flea hoppers, worms, boll weevils and other insects which may endanger the 1943 cotton crop began Thursday morning at the A. W. Ramming farm, north of Cashion School, with a dusting demonstration in charge of Paul Gregg, entomologist for Texas A&M College County Farm Agent G. R. McNeil.

The cotton crop at Ramming's farm is putting on squares, McNeil said. A thorough net-check will be made to determine whether flea hoppers in damaging numbers are present. If they are, fields will be dusted with sulphur.

Reports already have been received of leaf worms, the earliest such infestation in the history of this area, according to D. W. Wil-

Beef to Be Set Aside for Army

NEW YORK, June 12.—The War Food Administration in New York said Saturday it had received notice from Washington that all livestock slaughterers operating under federal inspection would be required beginning Monday to set aside 45 per cent of steer and heifer beef for Army consumption.

WFA spokesman here said they were unable to state how great a shortage the order would create in civilian meat supplies. There is no set-aside order now.

"Purchasing agencies have been unable to purchase adequate supplies of beef to meet their urgent requirements," the announcement said, adding that "deliveries of the reserve beef must be made in the form of boneless and carcass beef, which meets Army specifications."

Pointing out that a general order issued last Spring requiring packers to set aside various percentages of meats was suspended, the WFA said:

County Given Judgment For Constable Fees

Judgment will be entered this week by District Judge Ernest M. Robertson for Wichita County in the suit of the county against Constable C. H. (Bud) Clark for \$395.52 excess fees for the year 1941.

Testimony in the case was heard early this month, after which the court took the case under advisement.

Constable Clark claimed that the amount in question was not excess fees, but that it had been expended legitimately for expenses, principally car operation. The county attorney's office contended that Clark had failed to file monthly statements of expense requisite to support such a claim.

In his defense, the constable asserted that annual reports of expenses previously had been acceptable, and introduced affidavits accounting for expenditure of the amount as expense.

Fifteen Dogs For Defense Sought Here

A shipment of 15 dogs by June 20 has been requested from Wichita Falls for the Dogs for Defense program, according to Bill Naylor, who is handling registrations in the city.

Any kind of dog, excluding Great Danes, children's bull dogs and those less than a year old and weighing under 50 pounds, is acceptable, whether male or female.

Five German Shepherds sent by Naylor last week were the "finest received," the registration office in Dallas reported, and the dogs gained recognition as Army Scout Dogs.

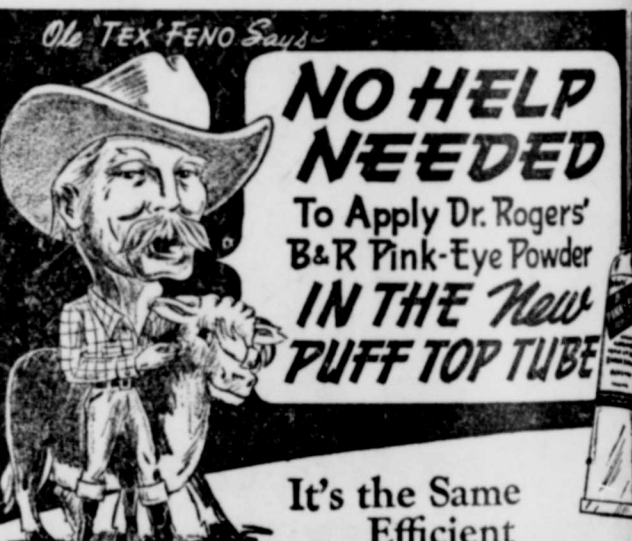
Long Trousers Adopted During French Revolution

War Loan Drive To Open Sept. 9

KINGSTON, N. Y., June 12.—Asserting individual investors may have to contribute about twice as much the remainder of this year as the seven billion dollars in bonds so far recorded, unless the government gets more from taxes. Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau announced today the third war loan drive will start Sept. 9.

"It will aim at raising the largest amount of money from individuals than any drive has raised in the history of the world," he told a Hudson River Valley audience.

At the same time the secretary said "from now on we're planning and attacking and I fervently hope that we can continue to work out financing plans together and keep them on a voluntary basis."

"Our goal for individuals in this September drive will be to get a substantial part of the necessary money," he continued. "In a subsequent drive, and during the four months in which there are no war loan drives, we will aim to get the rest through payroll savings and other continuing sales."

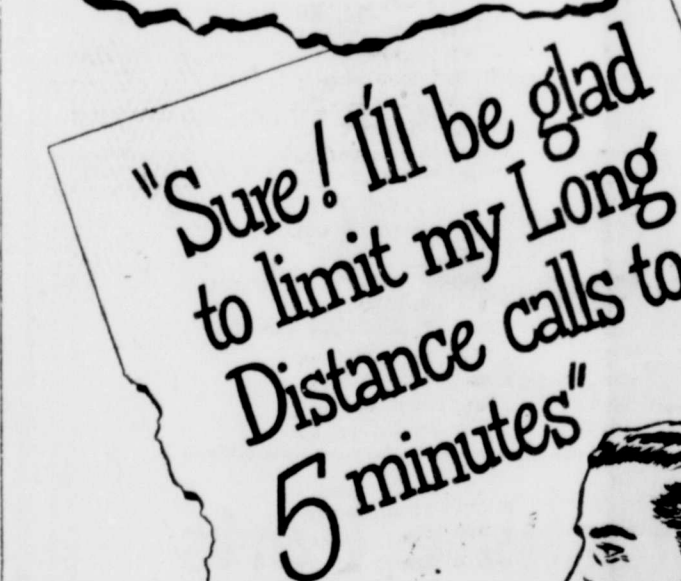
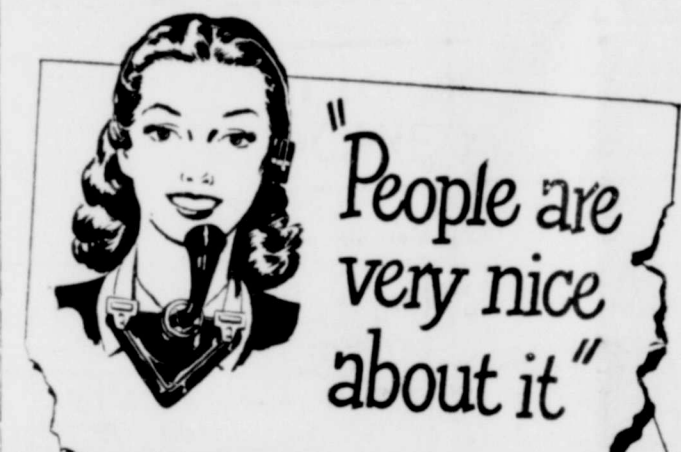

Further Newsprint Cut Appears Likely

NEW YORK, June 15.—The American Newspaper Publishers Association said today reports indicated that the advisability of a recommendation for a further cut of 5 per cent in newsprint paper consumption by newspapers and tighter inventory limitations, effective July 1, would be considered Thursday in Washington.

The ANPA, in a bulletin to member newspapers, confirmed reports last week that a meeting of the War Production Board's newspaper industry advisory committee had been called for Thursday.

Wichita Judges Ban Divorces by Citation

WICHITA FALLS, June 15.—Wichita County's three district courts will refuse divorces to wives with husbands in overseas military service unless the husbands are informed and agree.

Judge Irvin J. Vogel placed that decision on court minutes here Tuesday when he refused a divorce until a waiver was obtained or the defendant returned from overseas and could reply to court service beyond that of citation by publication.

The county's other two district judges agreed.

Baby's Photo May Be Sent By V-Mail Now

WASHINGTON, June 15.—The latest V-mail innovation will permit sending baby's picture to daddy at the front, provided, the regulations emphasize, the child is less than 1-year old and was born since daddy went overseas.

The photograph must not occupy more than one-third of the correspondence space on regulation V-mail form. It should be pasted in the upper left hand portion to avoid creasing when the reproduction is folded, the war department announcement said.

Beef Slaughtering Affected By Ruling

DALLAS, June 15.—Beginning June 14, all livestock slaughterers operating under federal inspection are required to set aside 45 per cent of all steer and heifer meat produced in order to meet urgent Government requirement for beef.

L. J. Capplan, regional director of food distribution administration, in making the announcement said that deliveries of the reserved beef must be made in the form of boneless and carcass beef which meets Army specifications.

The order applies to weekly production of beef and does not apply to inventories.
