PERRYTON HAS THREE SOUND BANKING INSTITUTIONS

Financial Statement Shows That Conditions Are Rapidly Getting Better

WORK TO BE RESUMED ON NEW FARMER'S MERC. BUILDING

According to the contractor, Van W. Stewart, work will be resumed on the new Farmer's Mercantile Building next week and rushed to completion as soon as possible. This will be the best building in this section when completed and will be strictly modern and fireproof. The walls are of hollow tile and brick veneer construction, cement floors, and tar and gravel roof. The entire structure will have a sixteen foot ceiling. There will be over 10,000 square feet of floor space on main floor with over 2,000 square feet of basement room. It will probably take till Sept. 1st to finish up these rooms ready for the fixtures.

SIDE WALK WORK ON MAIN STREET TO START AT ONCE

Stakes have been set and actual construction will start in a few days on the cement walks on Main Street. The first walks to go in will be along the new Farmers and Stockmens State Bank and Farmer's Mercantile Company's building. CONTRACT FOR TEMPORARY SCHOOL BUILDINGS LET TO MILT TODD

The school board has let the contract for the erection of these temporary buildings to Milt Todd of this city. Work on these structures will be started at once and be rushed to completion so as to be ready for occupancy by September 1st. Our Public School Staff of teachers will be the very best obtainable and will be under the able supervision of Prof. R. L. Showalter.

CITY COUNCIL NOTES

Our city "dads" met in regular session last Tuesday evening with Mayor C. E. Forbes presiding. The following Aldermen were present, J. D. Wyman, J. H. Neufeld, Chas. W. Calloway and Fred W. Hood.

An ordinance was passed relating to the construction and maintenance of sidewalks. It provides that all sidewalks shall be of cement construction and to be twelve feet wide on Main Street and four feet wide on the other streets. The walks on Main Street shall extend to the property line but on other streets a space of two feet must be left between the property line and the sidewalk line.

An ordinance was also passed relating to cutting of weeds and providing for a fine for those who fail to keep their premises clear.

The bill of Guy E. Holt for \$70.00 for installation of public water tank was approved and ordered paid.

The money derived from the sale of these bonds will be used for the building of cement street crossings and other much needed street improvements. BRUTALITY POPULARIZED

The Dempsey-Carpenter fight attracted as much or more attention as the comet, or the warfare going on in Europe. Most everybody wanted to see Dempsey get a whipping, but wanted an American to do it. Why do people take so much an interest in such a brutal occurrence as a prize fight? It is undoubtedly the latent brutality in us left over from barbarity and savagry—we are still only partially civilized. If he had killed him, or they had killed each other, the crowd would have gone mad and wild with joy. And we as a people spend two millions to encourage such a thing. God help us, we are a long ways yet from civilization.

And we as a people have just paid two pluguglies a million dollars for a prize fight. Dempsey gained \$300,000 in fifteen minutes, what we pay the President of the United States in four whole years. Are we a lot of mutts? we are.

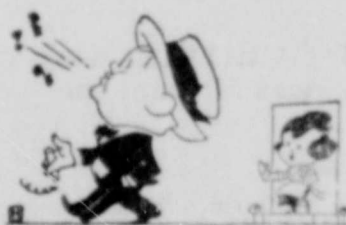

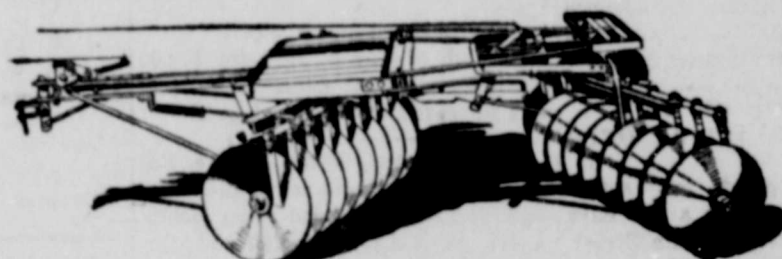

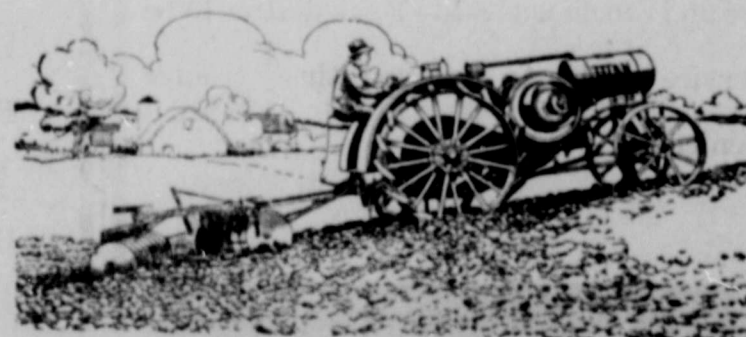

KANSAS BOY WINS MOTORCYCLE RACE

Dirt Track Broke Board Track
World's Record Monday—Very
Successful Meet

Ralph Hepburn, a Kansas boy, won the 200 and 300 mile races at Dodge City Monday, before a crowd of 10,000 persons.

Riding a Harley-Davidson machine he not only won the race but elapsed over several seconds from the world's record made on a board track. The feat was a most remarkable one as the board track is supposed to be faster than dirt.

So wonderful was the record that after the race his machine was taken apart and each piece measured to prove that the machine was regular in every way, which it was found to be.—Liberal Democrat.

BURNING WHEAT STACKS

Woodward, Okla., July 7.—Bloodhounds brought to this city from Concordia, Kansas, were put on the trail of a man believed to have set fire to ten ricks of wheat near this city last Friday night. The dogs arrived in Woodward Sunday morning and before nightfall had led the sheriff's force to the home of J. W. Sparks, farmer who lives in the same neighborhood where the arson was committed. The wheat had just been harvested and ricked in stacks about one-fourth of a mile apart on the farms of Lewis Chandler, Albert Cameron and W. H. Burrows. The value of the grain was estimated at \$1,000. Feeling ran high against Sparks among the neighbors after the bloodhounds had finished the trail and Sheriff H. M. Bowers brought the accused man to Woodward.—Woodward Democrat.

ESTIMATING THE WASTE WHEN BUYING BUILDING LUMBER

Don't forget to estimate the waste in buying your lumber for building a poultry house, barn, or other structure. In figuring on common sheathing add one-tenth for waste, and one-fourth for matched flooring and all kinds of siding. By careful cutting you can save much of the waste; and there are many places in a building where the short pieces can be used.

Don't buy too many nails. If you do they are almost certain to be scattered around the place, especially if there are children. Some specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture prefer wire nails, although the latter kind have greater binding power. Use 10 to 20-d nails for framing; 8 to 10d for sheathing; 6-d finish or casing nails for clapboard, and 8-d for siding. Four penny nails are 1½ inches long, 3-d are 2 inches, and 8-d nails are 2½ inches. It takes about 4 pounds of 3-d nails to 1,000 shingles; 18lbs of 6-d for 1,000 square feet, board measure of beveled siding; 20 lbs of 8-d, and 25 lbs of 10-d for 1,000 square feet of sheathing; 30 lbs of 1-d for 1,000 square feet of flooring and 15 lbs of 10-d, or 25 lbs of 20-d or 1,000 feet of studding.
