Maurice Acers, prominent businessman, attorney and humanitarian, will speak to the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club on Wednesday, March 10.

Speaking from his experience as past President of the Beautify Texas Council, Mr. Acers will present a program on the functions of the Council and how it can work to help Eastland.

Mr. Acers has a background of almost forty years of experience in government, private business and the practice of law. His academic training includes a B.A. degree from Southern Methodist University, an L.L.B. and Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Texas, and graduate work at Harvard, as well as post-graduate work at the Metropolitan Police College, London.

In government, he served as Executive Secretary to Governor Allan Shivers, also serving as the Texas Representative to the Southern Governors Conference for Industrial Development. During his service in state government, he served as Texas Representative and Vice-Chairman of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, the highest post held by a non-governor member.

Mr. Acers served in the F.B.I. from 1934 to 1947 as Personnel Director, Inspector, and Special Agent in charge of regional bureaus and served throughout the United States. He was also the only official exchange student between the famed Scotland Yard and the F.B.I.

Attorney at Law, Mr. Acers devotes a major portion of his time to the following business affiliations: President, Acers Investment Company, Austin; President, Pearl Beer Distributing Co. of Beaumont and the Sabine Area; Chairman of the Board and General Counsel, Ebby Halliday Realtors; and President, Canada Dry Distributing Co. of the Golden Triangle, Beaumont area.

His wife is Ebby Halliday Acers, nationally and internationally known as one of the world's largest residential realtors. Mr. and Mrs. Acers have homes in Austin, Beaumont and Dallas.

Mr. Acers is a member of the United States Chamber of Commerce, as well as chambers in Austin, Beaumont, Port Arthur and North Dallas; is active in all Masonic activities; served as President of the Austin Rotary Club and District Governor of Rotary International; served as President and Chairman of the Board of the Texas United Fund; and is a member of Central Christian Church in Dallas. While serving as President of the Beautify Texas Council, 1972-1975, he was a recipient of the Bluebonnet Award, only 3 of which had been previously awarded.

City Commission Issues Statement On Annexation

We want to thank Dinah Wilson for opening the door for a complete explanation of the action of your city commission concerning the question of annexation of some acres to the city of Eastland by a letter written to the Editor of Eastland Telegram.

Due to the confusion and many questions in regard to the recent actions of the City Commission concerning the refusal of city services to a local developer the following statement is issued in hope of clarifying the situation and informing the citizens of the facts concerning the decision.

At the regular city commission meeting Monday, Feb. 16, 1976, Mr. Mike Collins asked for permission to tie on to city services and water line in Crestwood and to allow extension of said lines through lot 5 block G of Crestwood. Lot 5 Block G Crestwood Addition being owned by Mr. Walter Hall. Lot 5 is a dedicated lot in a subdivision governed by protective covenants which states "The lots of said addition shall be used for residential purposes only...No structure shall be erected, altered, placed or permitted on any lot of such addition except one detached single family dwelling not exceeding two stories in height...These conditions and restrictions shall be binding on all owners of lots in said addition unless altered or changed by vote or written consent of the owners of a majority of the lots in such addition...These Protective Covenants were filed of record by the original developer of Crestwood Subdivision, Mike Collins.

Referring to the Monday night city commission meeting of February 16, 1976, Commissioner Charlie Marshall made a motion to table Mr. Collins' request until the second reading and vote on the proposed subdivision ordinance. The Sub-division Ordinance passed unanimously. After the passage of said ordinance, commissioner Charlie Marshall made a motion to "Grant Mike Collins permission to tie into water and sewer lines in Crestwood and to allow extension through Lot 5, Block G, Crestwood for a distance of 600 feet south and that all property served would be annexed". Commissioner Dale Bakker seconded the motion. Vote was taken. Commissioner Hoffmann a Siebert voted no. Commissioner Bakker and Marshall voted aye. Chairman H.V. O'Brien broke the tie with an aye vote.

Since the role is the ultimate ambition of every actor, it has often been awarded to mature and famous men whose years have long ago removed the youthfulness which should characterize the student, Hamlet.

"The role has been so coveted by the acting profession that at least two famous actresses, Sara Bernhardt and Eva Le Gallienne, have played it," Mrs. Russell explained.

"But, as every actor dreams of playing 'Hamlet', so every director dreams of directing it," she continued. "For this wonderful opportunity I am very grateful to the ECT Board of Directors. They have been enthusiastic and wholeheartedly cooperative.

"As far as we know, this is the only time a Shakespearean play has been presented in Eastland County. We feel that it is a momentous occasion and a fitting way to celebrate our nation's Bicentennial.

"Not only students in our high schools and colleges, but anyone who has never had the opportunity to see Shakespeare performed on the stage, instead

"Unless and until any such plan, plat or replat shall have been first approved in the manner and by the authorities provided for in this act, it shall be unlawful within the area covered by said plan, plat or replat for any city affected by this act or any officials of such city, to serve or connect said land, or any part thereof, or for the use of the owners or purchasers of said land, or any part thereof, with any Public utilities such as water, sewers,

lights, gas, etc. which may be owned, controlled or distributed by such city."

It was also pointed out that Article 5, Sect. 5.1 City ordinance #431 on Subdivision states that "A preliminary plat of the proposed subdivision at a scale not smaller than two hundred (200) feet to the inch shall first be submitted to the City Commission for approval before the preparation of final plat. Preliminary plat must be filed in the office of the city manager 10 days prior to the meeting at which time the plat is to be considered and will contain the following information:

1. Subdivision name
Name and address of the owner and designer of the plat who shall be a registered engineer or registered surveyor.

2. Date - approximate North point and scale

Commissioner Charlie Marshall who made the original motion Monday night, made a new motion at the emergency meeting to declare his motion null and void due to violation of state law, the city ordinance and a possible violation of an individual's property rights. **This motion carried Unanimously.**

Approval of the plat by the City Commission is no different than the necessary plat approval of Crestwood, Vally View, Air Port Acres, and Indian Hills Subdivision.

He is vice president of the Beautify Texas Council and a member of the Advisory Board of Texas Green Thumb Program.

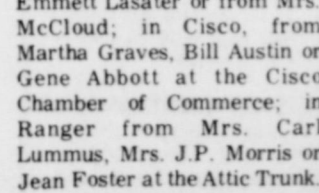
He is past president of Beautify Texas Council and organized and was secretary of Keep Brazoria County Beautiful Association for 18 years.

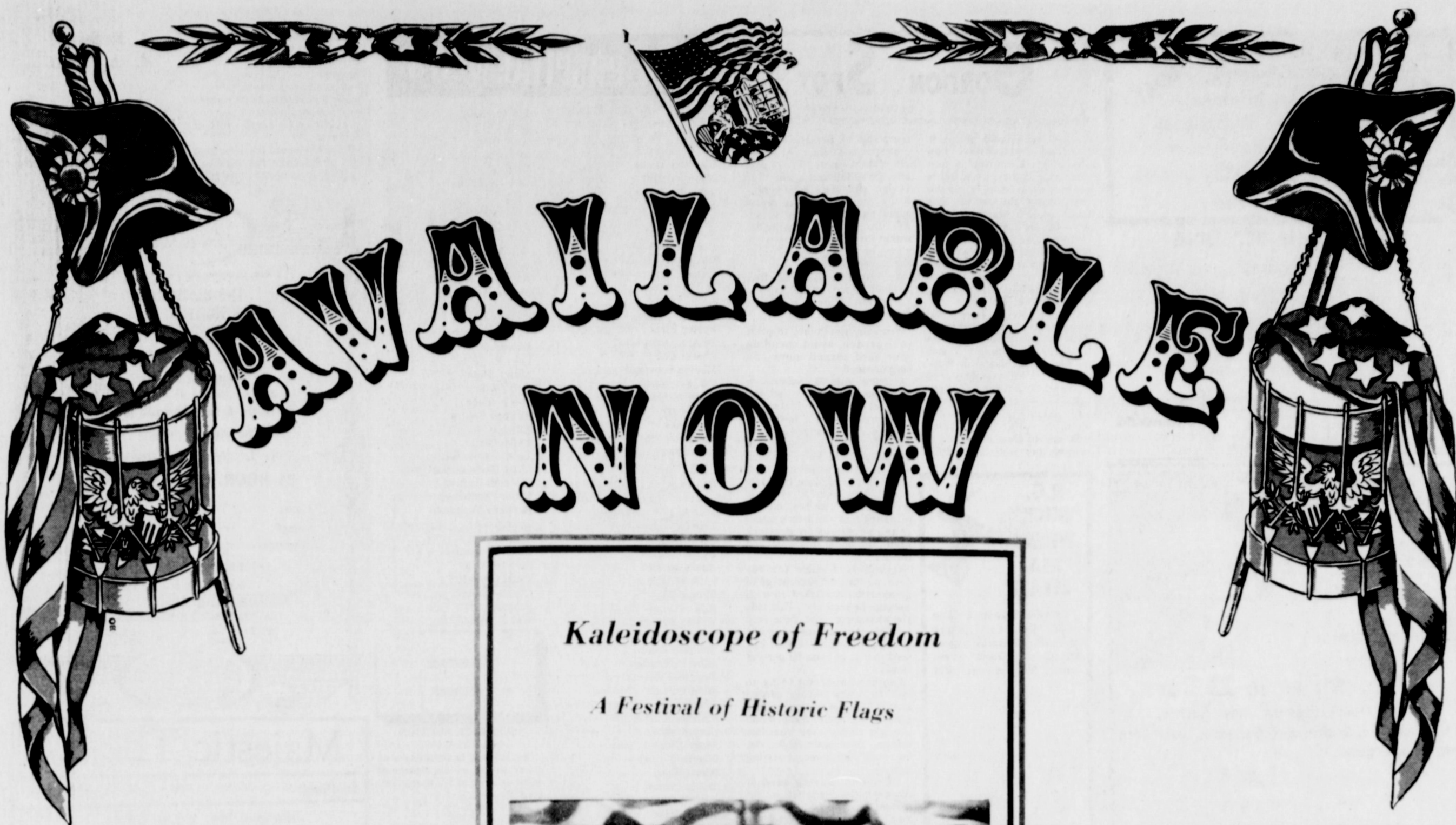

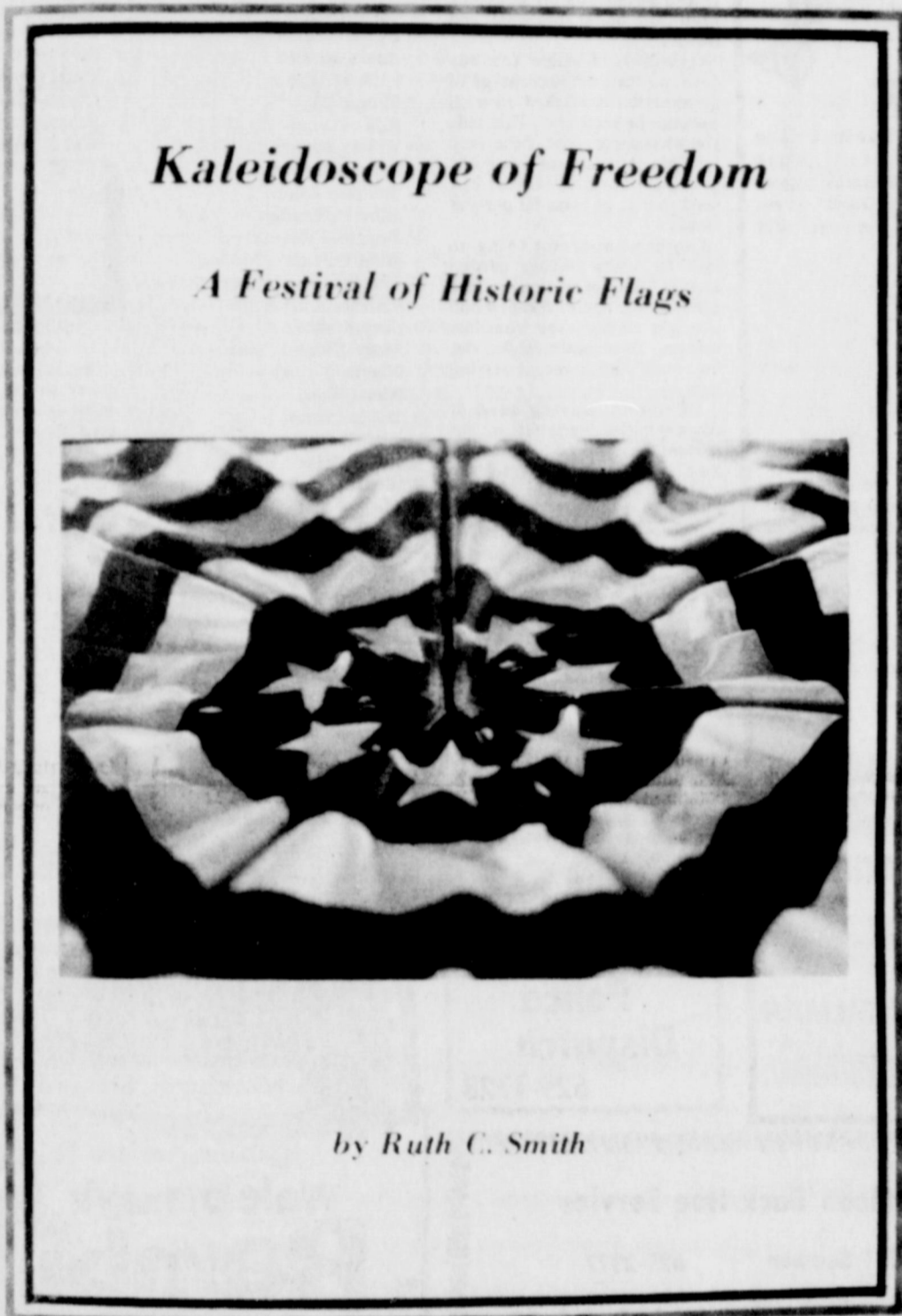

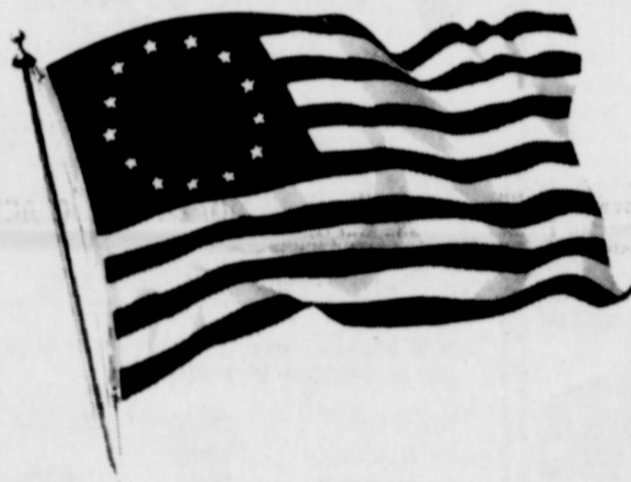

GORDON SPOT

All peaches and plums in Eastland County have now bloomed. Everyone is now wondering if they are going to get by without being frozen this year. Most of the fruit has been frozen in late March or early April for the last three years.

While we wait to see if the fruit is going to make it this year we must take precautions to protect the fruit from insects and diseases. That means getting the prayer out now.

When 75 percent of the petals have fallen spray with 50 percent Malathion plus a fungicide. The fungicide may be Captan, Benlate, or Wett-able Sulfur. Mix six tables of 50 percent Malathion in three gallons of water. You may also add seven tablespoons of wettable sulfur in the same solution. In place of sulfur you may use three and three fourths

teaspoons of Benlate or three tablespoons of Captan.

Repeat this spray 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It may be necessary to repeat again on late-maturing varieties. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches.

We have a homeowner's fruit and nut spray schedule in the Extension office if you want more information.

When the time comes to plant your garden, avoid spending your hard earned money on bargain seed.

A prime rule for success in home gardening is to get the best seed you can. You may have to shell out a few extra pennies, but the added cost will pay off in better yields and better spirits at the year's end.

Because seed, like used cars, varies in quality from dealer to dealer, buy from a reputable seed dealer. The best dealers offer treated seed to protect young seedlings from attack from soil borne diseases and insects.

Regardless of where you buy seed, be sure the percentage of germination is marked on each package or seed bin. This tells you what percentage of the seed is viable or capable of living and growing. For best stands, buy seed that is at least 80 percent viable.

Another important thing to look for when buying garden seed is "date of testing". This refers to the age of the seed and if it was carried over from last season. To be on the safe side, buy seed with a recent testing date.

Of course, buying seed of recommended varieties is important for a successful garden. You may want to try new varieties on a small scale, but do not discard an old variety for something new and untried.

Seed left over from last year is probably safe to use, provided it was stored in a cool place in an airtight container. If you are uncertain about the age or variety of seed, throw it away and buy seed for this year's garden.

Randy Frost To Compete In Merit Scholarship

Randy Frost, by meeting specified requirements has advanced to Finalist standing in the 1976 Merit Scholarship competition.

For over two decades the National Merit Scholarship Program has focused upon one clearly defined sector of the nation's young people, those at the uppermost end of the academic ability scale. The Merit Program is a privately funded endeavor, the only major scholarship competition that is independently supported and national in dimension. The total of Merit Scholarships to be offered in 1976 is about seven times greater than the number offered in 1956, the first year of the competition; further, the value of the awards offered each year has increased from less than \$2 million to over \$10 million.

The selection of Merit Scholars is now in progress, and only

James Wheeler Speaks To Lions

Mr. James H. Wheeler in speaking at the noon meeting of Eastland Lions Club Tuesday, told how the Eye Bank was organized to furnish corneas for transplant operations to restore sight lost due to clouded or opaque corneas of the eye.

The idea was conceived by a Florida Club but was instituted in Texas in 1967, he said.

The Eye Bank is not a storage facility for eyes proper but consists of wills kept on file. These wills are a simple card signed by the donor and a wallet card carried by the donor.

There are currently 500 - 600 wills on file at the central facility in Wichita Falls and there is no charge to the recipient for these eyes. Costs of the transportation of the donor eyes are met by the Lions Club.

First call for the donor eyes are to the local areas, but they can be sent to any place in the world.

The chain of events leading to the using of the donor eyes are as follows: At the death of the donor, the wallet card shows intent to donate eyes; the Eye Bank is notified by authorities; the Eye Bank secretary notifies the doctor of the next recipient; and the patient's doctor notifies the recipient that the surgery is planned.

Age of the donor is not a factor. There is no disfigurement of the donor and the funeral services can in no way be affected, he explained.

There is now a waiting list for eyes and more pledges are sought by area Lions Clubs. Donors can be anyone and in case of a change in desires, etc., wills are completely revocable, he said.

James Smith was program chairman.

NUECES COUNTY — The great cattle drive of Capt. R. King is now underway. The number of cattle, of all grades, that are now on their way to Kansas is roughly 30,000. There are twelve different trail gangs, each with from 2700 to 2900 cattle under their charge. Seventeen men constitute each gang, including the cook and head man. They are paid — the men under \$25 per month, cook \$30 and head man \$100. It takes 800 head of horses, the bulk of which Capt. King had to purchase, to supply the needs of the different parties. Besides the cost of the stock, for the months of travel, etc., the outlay for labor and food alone, in cash, will amount to somewhere near \$30,000.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The Secretary of War, General William W. Belknap was forced to submit his resignation to President U.S. Grant Friday, and was subsequently unanimously impeached of high crimes and misdemeanors after a House Committee on Expenses in the War Department discovered "overwhelming proof of Belknap's selling an Indian trading post at Fort Sill for a large sum."

SAN ANTONIO — There will surely be a general revolution. Diaz and his staff are still in Brownsville. Large revolutionary forces under Nuna and Gonzales are coming up from the South, and will likely join, between Camargo and Matamoros, the revolutionists from this side.

HOUSTON — One of the Direct Navigation Company's barges caught fire and between 300 and 400 bales of cotton were burned. The burning bales were thrown overboard into Buffalo Bayou. Estimated loss, \$15,000.

ROBERTSON COUNTY — Quantities of counterfeit coin half dollars were put into circulation recently at Hearne.

GALVESTON — The Chief of Police has been instructed to enforce the payment of the vehicle licenses, and will proceed at once against delinquents.

DENISON — Lam Gray, a Choctaw desperado, lately arrested here for attempting to kill the barkeeper of Le Grande Saloon and out on bail, "lit out" and got killed in an altercation at Dead Fall, on Red River. Gray was one of the worst desperados and cattle thieves and had killed several men.

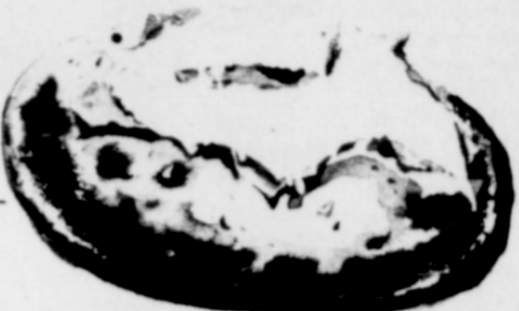

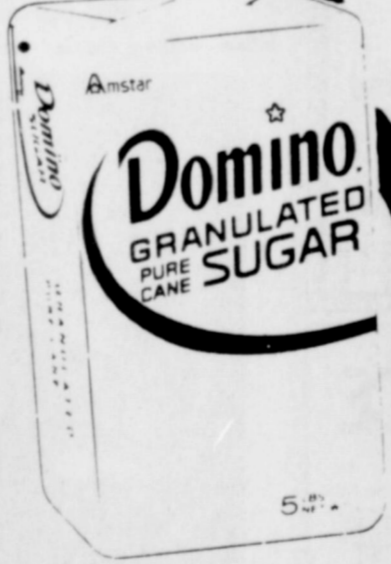
