Managing editors of the state's Associated Press newspapers, meeting recently at Hotel Adolphus, Dallas, heard J. Willard Ridings of Texas Christian University's department of journalism report winners of ten writing contests sponsored by the association. Judges with Ridings of the submitted entries were Paul J. Thompson of the University of Texas and Cecil Horne of Texas Technological College.

The Dallas News won citation for the "whimsical, informative, philosophical but seasoned" editorials of Richard West, whose "literary skill lightens the serious tone of the editorial page." Another citation to the News was for the editorial cartoon of John Knott, "No Fairy Tale," depicting the dangers of inflation.

Richard West, known to his many Cisco friends as Dick West, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. West of this city. A graduate of Cisco high school, his first newspaper work was with Cisco Daily News. For a time he was a special writer for the Associated Press, but has been attached to the editorial department of Dallas News for the past year or more.

500 Protestant Religious Heads Meeting in Ohio

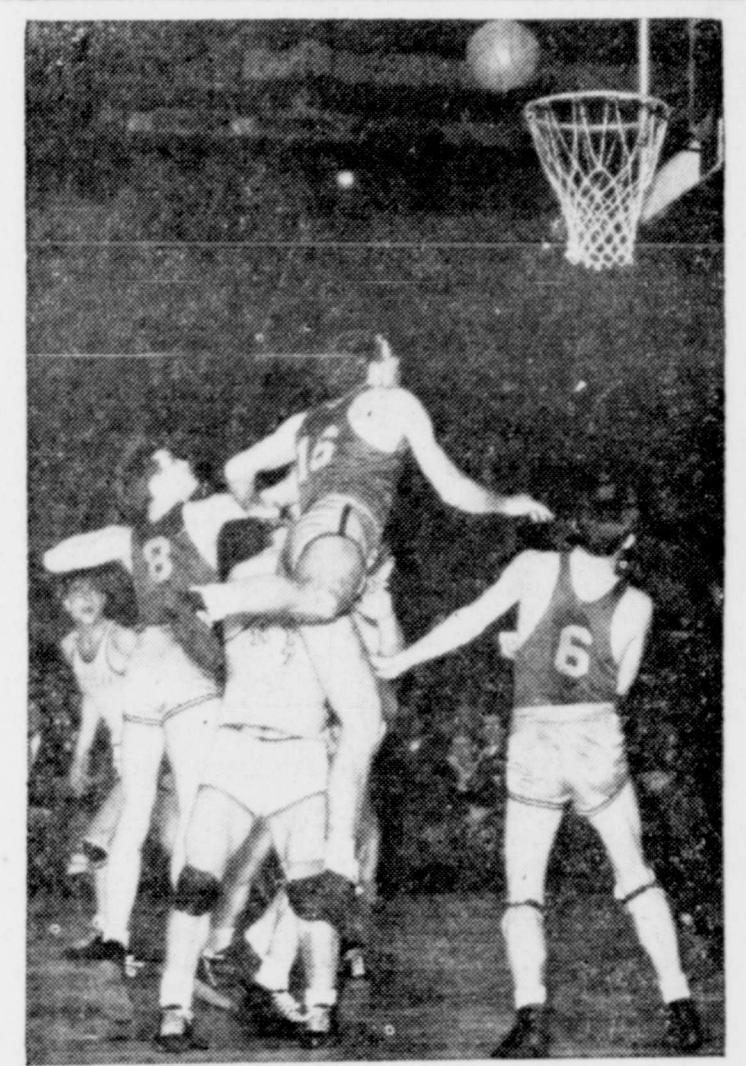
COLUMBUS, O., March 5. — Five hundred religious leaders representing 25,000,000 of the nation's Protestant church-goers convened here today in a special meeting to create what one leader termed a new morale for a confused and cynical world.

The executive committee of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America called the council into session in a recently adopted resolution citing the need "to deal with the needs of the post-war era, especially in the areas of evangelism, world order, community tensions, foreign relief and returning service personnel."

UNION PHONE WORKERS SEEM SET TO QUIT JOBS THURSDAY AND ADD TO US. CHAOS

DALLAS, March 5. — Strike-wary officials of Southwestern Bell Telephone company laid plans yesterday to "cope with any emergency."

C. L. Stewart, Dallas manager of the company, said supervisory employees would man emergency switchboards starting Thursday at 6 a. m. in event of a strike by the Southwestern Telephone Workers Union.

As indications of a walkout mounted with additional tabulations of strike ballots from every corner of Texas, the Eighth Service Command announced it had perfected plans to see that its calls went through. Details were not announced.

Col. John L. Autrey, chief signal officer for the command, had not been advised of the seizure of the telephone lines in event of a strike.

In January, when service was interrupted by a strike of Western Electric communications equipment installers, President Truman drew up an order for seizure of the lines by the War Communications Board, made up of Federal Communications Commission, Army and Navy and State Department officials.

It was reported at that time that any Texas seizures would be carried out by the armed forces, with Dallas and Fort Worth offices being handled by the Service Command here.

Ray Hackney, Texas plant division president of the STWU, said he did not know what would happen in event of government seizure. The strike, if it develops as threatened, will be directed nationally by the executive committee of the National Federation of Telephone Workers. All settlements will be national in scope, Hackney said.

Hackney reported a five-to-one margin in favor of the strike among plant division workers in Texas, on the basis of nearly complete returns. He forwarded the totals to St. Louis offices of the STWU Monday at midnight.

Mrs. Eva Campbell, traffic division chairman, reported Dallas, Waco, Hillsboro and Longview operators were ten-to-one for strike action.

The threatened walkout would affect 11,000 union telephone workers in Texas, a majority of them women operators.

Military Committee to Hear Rapido River Story

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5. (U.P.) — The House Military Affairs committee agreed today to hear testimony by the war department and officers of the 36th Division Association regarding the 1944 Rapido River crossing in which the division suffered heavy casualties.

The committee said it would hear witnesses at their convenience. No date was set.

ARMY FORCES LOW.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5. (U.P.) — Efficiency of army ground and air forces now stationed in this country is "very low" because of a shortage of trained manpower, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower declared today.

J. A. KRUG CONFIRMED.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5. (U.P.) — The Senate without controversy confirmed power expert J. A. Krug as secretary of interior, succeeding Harold L. Ickes.

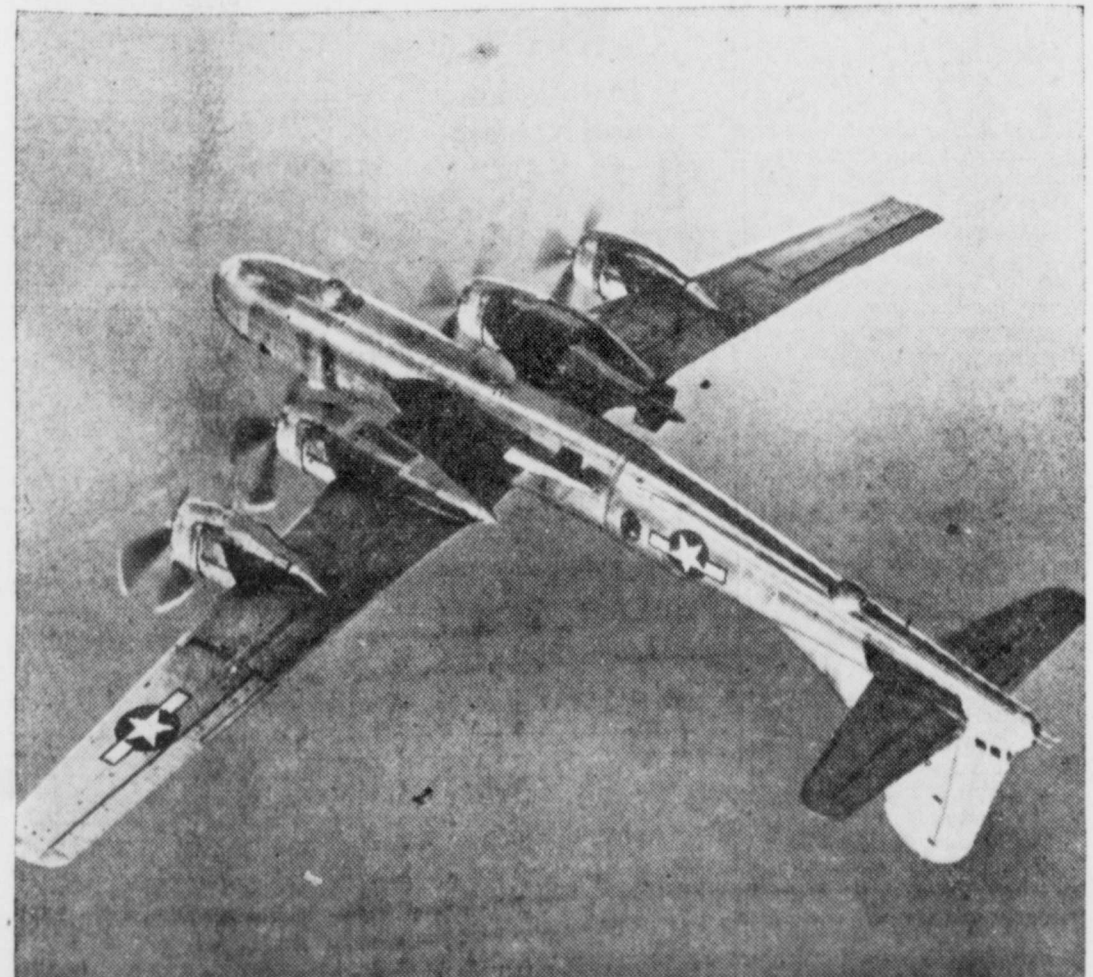

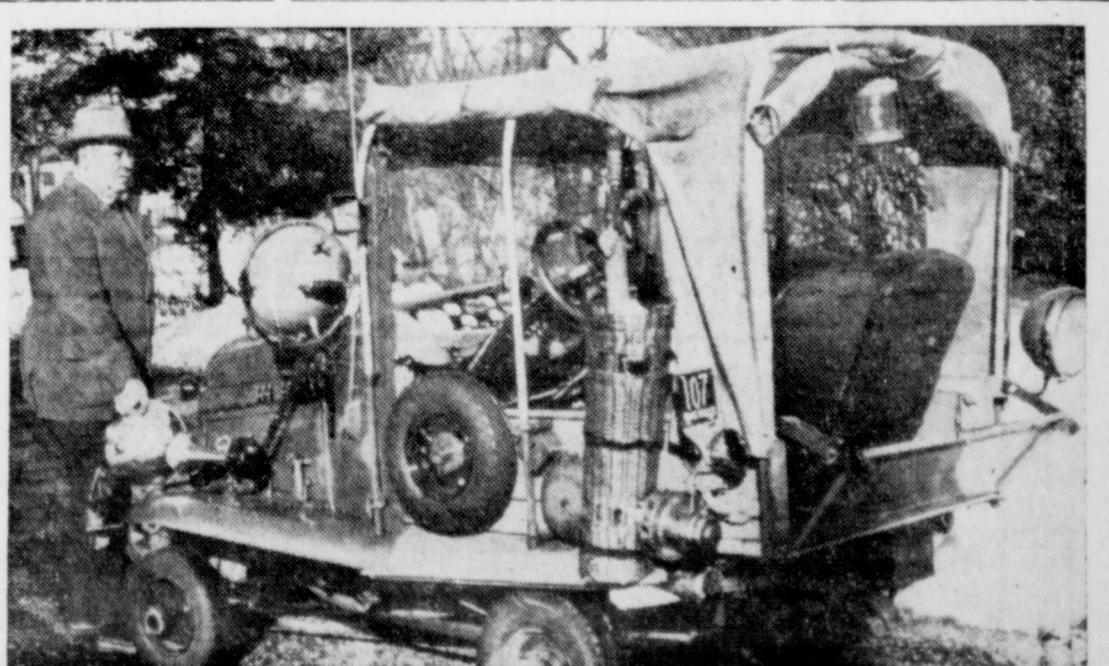

LEADERSHIP.

"A blind leader can get into a hole just as deep as if he were a malicious leader," says Robert R. Watson, new president of the National Manufacturers' Association. Such a hard fact is very much worth thinking about just now.

This nation of ours has been well called "the world's best hope," and our leaders have generally handled the government and its interwoven business operations rather well. But lately a lot of observant Americans are getting worried about the number and variety of holes that we seem to be slipping into at Washington.

The main difficulty, no doubt, is that the Washington job is too big and complex for any man. Only a brilliant group of men, working in close harmony, can manage it. And such a combination may not come oftener than once in a generation.

DECLINING YEARS.

She is 91. To be sure her step falters, weakness often over-spreads her body, and she lives in a boarding house amidst folk who are no kith or kin. But the people around her are considerate. She gets to the dining room for three good meals a day, hears enough to enjoy her radio and has eyes to read. Yet she bewails the fact that all her friends are dead, that she is "the last leaf on the tree." She dwells on events of 50 years ago—the happy happenings, the slights and tragedies, her unappreciated sacrifices, family ingratitude. Age, of course, improves nothing—except wine, meerschaum pipes and amber. But if she is pessimistic now, the chances are that she always had that point

of view. Many have lived to prove the soundness of Browning's "Grow old along with me, The best is yet to be, The last of life for which the first is made."

Old age is not very different from middle age—except that movements are slower. A richly stocked mind, interests beyond self, vision above pettiness—these can be strong defenses against the encroaching years. If cultivation starts early enough. Happiness in old age depends on having an attitude of faith, hope and lovingness in the early years. Interests and handicrafts help.

PATTERN FOR PEACE.

IN TIME of conflict, then we prayed for peace To bring an ending of war's dreadful power

Of death, destruction; and we craved surcease From tension, and from sorrow, hour by hour;

For war is not the normal way of men. And yet we worked with almost frenzied zeal At such a time, and this is right, but when War ends, we sometimes let our best congeal.

But peace means more than the quiescent state That follows war—true peace means movement, growth—A going forward that does not abate.

With vision, harmony, a blend of both. And if all nations, creeds, could truly see The truth of this, then war might cease to be—Margaret E. Bruner, in Different.

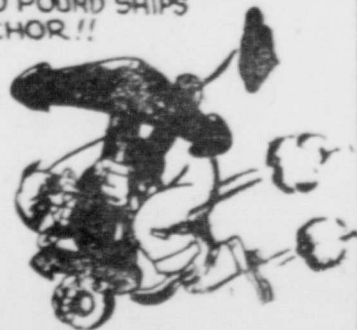

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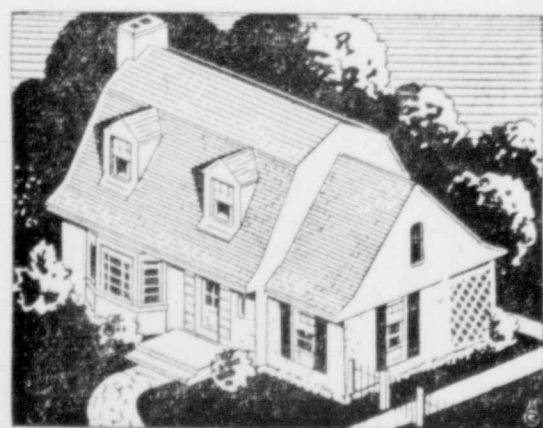

Why Don't We Have Lumber
FOR HOME BUILDING?

There are plenty of trees, plenty of lumber mills, but very little lumber for home building. WHY?

Here are the simple facts behind the lumber shortage—these facts are stopping Home Building:

1. Over 50% of our lumber was once cut by small mills. Thousands of these mills were put out of business during the war by OPA ceiling prices. OPA still clings to wartime policies and these mills are still out of business.

This situation affects all lumber production.
4. The manufacturers of lumber have been provided with a hidden premium on export lumber. The OPA has made it more profitable to produce lumber for export to foreign countries than to produce lumber for home construction.

These are merely examples from the lumber field which indicate the type of OPA action that is blocking the production of home building materials in many fields.

The fact remains that homes cannot be built by any industry or Government agency without materials.

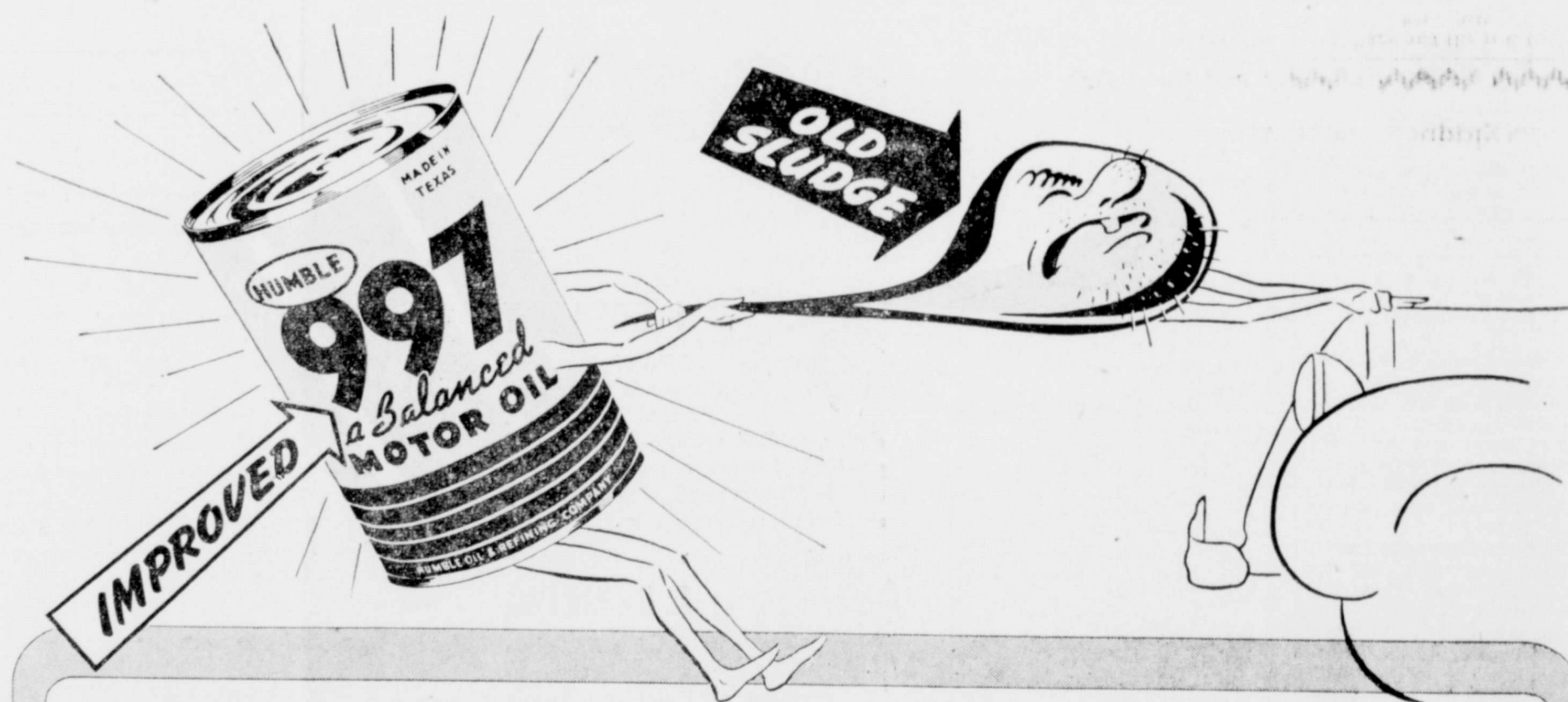
Homes cannot be built without lumber—whether that home be wood frame, brick, concrete, or stone.

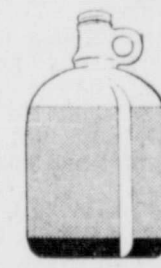
