Trojans Lose 35-0 To Mt. Pleasant Tigers on Friday

Fifteen hundred students and schoolboy fans saw the Mt. Pleasant Tigers win over the Talco Trojans Friday night 35-0. The Trojans were completely outclassed, as James Burgin, Neal Hahn, Robbie McCuller and Claude (C. B.) Boyd were out as a result of injuries.

The Trojans were sparked by Thomas (Stump) Jones and Bobby Martin, Howard and E. Frye took the passes of Freddy Rogers beautifully. The Tigers were running mostly under the passing of Hightower.

The Tigers opened the attempt by kicking to the Trojans on the north end. The ball went to Martin, who fumbled behind the line to give the Tigers 2 points. The Trojans kicked from the 20. The Tigers took two first downs, then a T-D via a 10 yard run. The Trojans received the ball, finally punting to the Tigers, who immediately completed a 30-yard pass for another pointer. The Tigers again kicked to the Trojans, who set up some first downs and Mt. Pleasant recovered a Trojan fumble, set up two first downs, then took a 20-yard jaunt for another 6, ending the first half.

The Trojans opened the second stanza by kicking to the Tigers, who took a push downfield and an eight yard jaunt for a pointer. In the fourth quarter the Tigers intercepted a Trojan pass and went 60 yards for their last tally.

Two Locations Staked for Tests Bagwell Area

Oil exploration in Red River County received new impetus this week with announcement that two oil operators are staking new locations for tests in the Bagwell area.

Howard Easterman, Corpus Christi, is reported preparing for an 1,800-foot test in the James Garrett survey, a half mile east and a little south of the town-site. The drilling site is in the same survey as a recently announced test to be made by W. B. Hinton, Dallas.

These will be the first test wells to be sunk in a northeasterly direction, although leasing activity has reached its highest peak in that direction since Frank Stratton, Stratton Drilling Company, drilled the discovery well a mile southwest of Bagwell about two months ago.

The tests will be at the 1,780-1,800-foot depth, in a sand which has been identified as Goodland lime, but which has more generally been reported as the Paluxy.

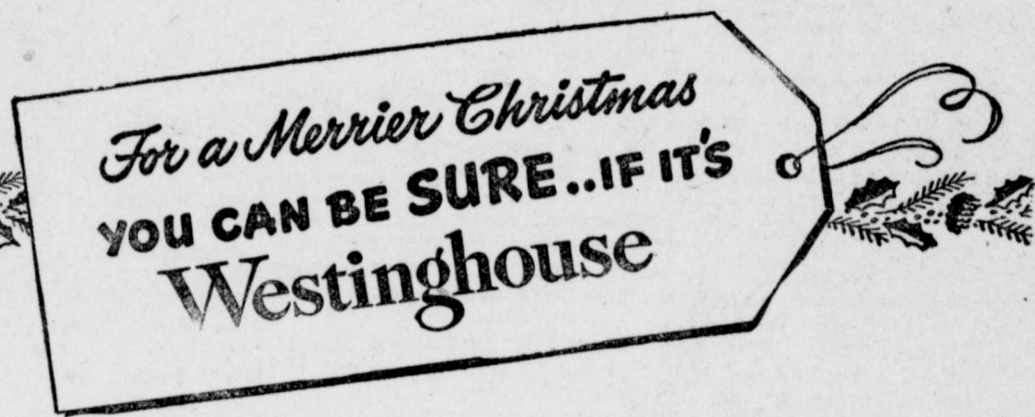
Cotton farmers are hoping for two or three weeks of open weather to permit them to gather the remainder of their cotton crop. It is about 60 per cent picked in this area.

INSPECTORS CAPTURE EIGHT ILLICIT STILL

Texas Liquor Control Board inspectors in August reported the seizure of eight illicit stills. With the stills, which had a cubic capacity of 470 gallons, inspectors captured 1,845 gallons of mash and made six arrests. 17½ gallons of moonshine liquor was destroyed.

Two stills were taken in Red River County, two in Smith County, and one was taken in each of the counties of Titus, Freestone, Nacogdoches and Shelby.

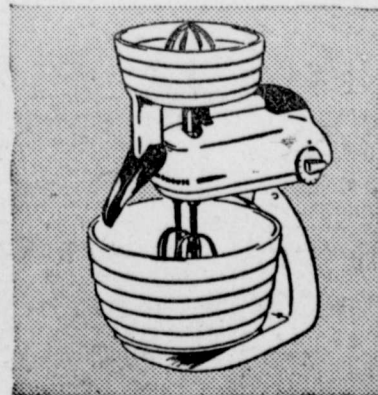

Glover's Comprest Wins in Kentucky

A Comprest Hereford calf that traveled from Texas to Kentucky last June in a crate bolted to the back of an automobile is already a blue ribbon winner in the Blue Grass country.

The calf is TTT Comprest Domino 11th from the Mack Glover herd at Bogata. It was sired by Comprest Domino 22nd, a prizewinner at shows throughout this area.

Mr. Glover has received a letter from F. W. Kerrick of Owensboro, Ky., owner of the calf, stating it had already won a blue ribbon at a show in Calhoun, Ky., two days before the animal was five months old.

Mr. Kerrick's letter said in part, "On June 20, nine days after we arrived here with our calf, he was 32 inches high and weighed 199 pounds. The day he was shown, less than three months later, he was 38 inches high and weighed 475 pounds, a gain of two inches and 92 pounds per month."

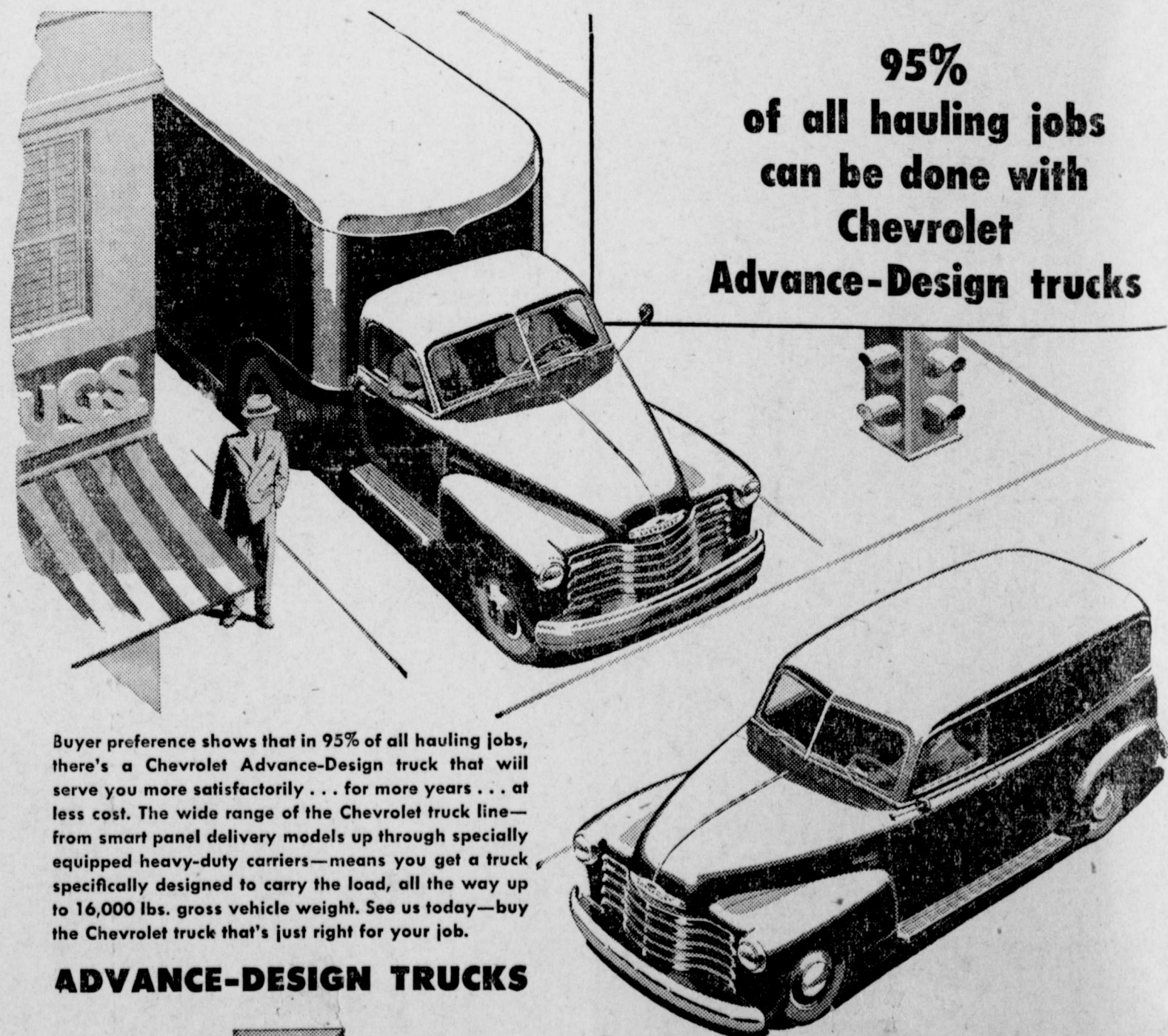


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Vetch Important As Seed and Soil Improvement Crop

Joe Kelsey of Deport, had very good success in harvesting Vetch seed this past year. He tells me that it was just by chance that he harvested the seed. His plans were to use the Vetch as a cover crop, but for some reason it was getting late in the year and the Vetch seed had begun to mature so he just decided to harvest them for seed. On some of his heavier land he harvested as high as 500 lbs of seed per acre and on lighter soil as high as 400 lbs. per acre. Mr. Kelsey says that he will probably make more on his Vetch seed per acre than he will on his cotton.

Mr. Kelsey is a firm believer in cover crops in order to get protection and improvement in crop land. He also said that he thought that fertilizer should be used to balance the strength of the soil for the next crop.

Gordon Isbell, Veteran Vocational Agriculture teacher at Deport, tells me one of his old students, Walter Gifford, says his cotton is about one-third better where he had Vetch and Austrian peas and that he plans to plant more this coming year.

In making recommendations for planting Vetch for seed harvesting purposes, it is wise to use a nurse crop. The rate of seeding is about 15 lbs. of Vetch with 20 to 30 lbs. of Balbo Rye or Abruzzi Rye. Where Barley is used for a nurse crop 45 to 50 lbs. of seed are recommended per acre with about 15 lbs. of Vetch. This should be seeded by the 15th of October.

Legion Debunks Idea 45 Too Old to Work

Chicago, Ill. — Is 45 too old to work? The American Legion emphatically says, "No!"

It contends that physical condition and not an arbitrary age limit should be the governing factor in determining whether the American worker can continue to produce profitably in his mature years.

Through its National Economic Commission, therefore the American Legion urged industry to abandon its growing inclination to discriminate against older workers simply because they have passed 45 years in age.

"In the 45 to 65-year age bracket lies the nation's greatest wealth in human experience and know-how," said Lawrence J. Fenlon of Chicago, chairman of the National Economic Commission. "To junk the American worker when he reaches the age of 45, purely on the basis of an arbitrary age limit, is a short-sighted, wasteful and costly policy that can only contribute to the degeneration of the ideals on which the American way of life is founded."

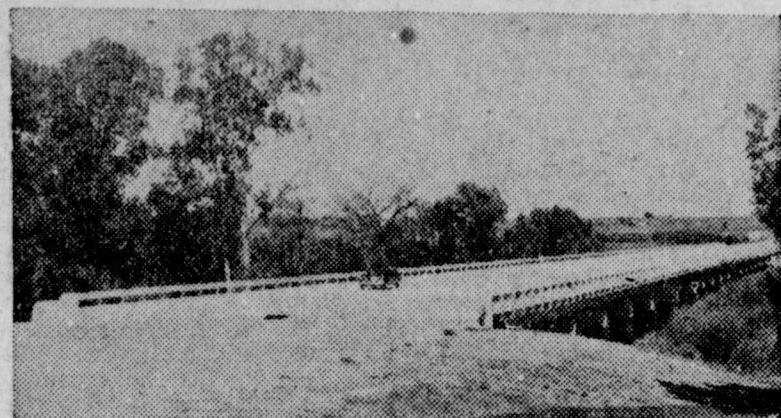

NEW SPAN ON U. S. 67



Rerouting of U. S. Highway 67 from Dallas east to the Hunt County line, now in progress, will provide the state one of its safest and most modern highway stretches. The new route, 26 miles long, will be four-lane boulevard type pavement dotted by wide, divided bridges like that shown above. This span is one of seven major bridges already completed. Structural steel in the bridges totalled 2,400 tons and was supplied by American Bridge Company and Virginia Bridge Company, U. S. Steel Subsidiaries. The first 16 miles of the new highway, in Dallas County, is scheduled for completion next spring. The final 10 miles through Rockwall County will be on a future Texas Highway Department program. General contractor for the above bridge was Austin Bridge Company, Dallas.

Estimate Cotton Crop Increased Half Million

The Agriculture Department Monday estimated this year's cotton crop at 15,446,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight.

This is 503,000 bales more than the 14,943,000 bales forecast a month ago. It compares with last year's crop of 14,869,000 bales and with the ten-year (1938-47) average of 11,306,000 bales.

The department said the Texas crop was 93 per cent of normal on Oct. 1 and would run 256 pounds to the acre, producing 5,500,000 bales.

The crop apparently is large enough to require the government to propose rigid marketing quotas on 1950 production to prevent a top-heavy surplus. Quotas would have to be approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting in a referendum.

A decision on quotas must be made by Secretary Brannan by October 15. A referendum, if ordered, probably would be held by December 10.

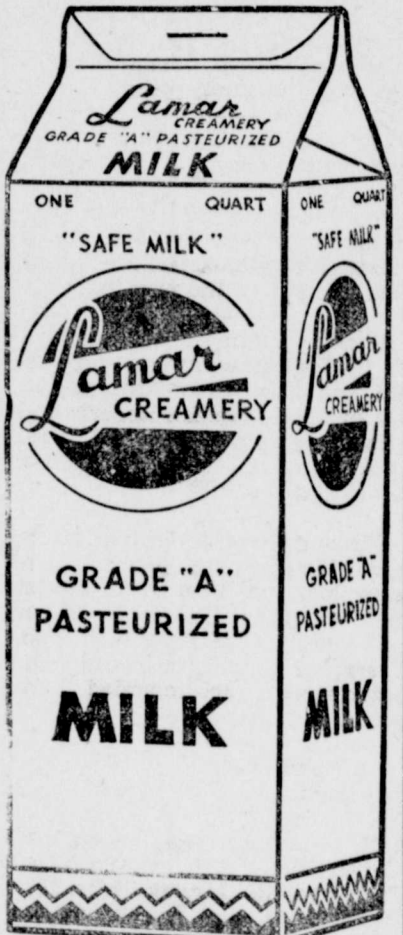

Pecan Growing is Profitable Work

For many years this editor has been kinda nutty about the value of pecans, from a food as well as commercial standpoint. We have pointed out that a match touched to a shelled pecan would cause it to burn like a candle. We've also noticed that pecan cake don't last long on a hunting trip, due to their rich food value.

Now comes J. F. Roseborough, extension horticulturist of Texas A&M College and secretary of the Texas Pecan Growers Association, who gives the food values in comparative terms that will cause housewives to serve more pecans to their families:

"People are finding out that pecans have more food value than most foods. A pound of pecans contains 3,633 energizing calories. That's something when you consider that a pound of T-bone steak only contains 975 calories." Evers said a hospital in Battle Creek, Mich., now serves pecan meats instead of beef, pork or chicken.

"There's real food value concentrated in a pecan." Roseborough said Texas pecans always are in strong demand.

"Every year our grove owners bud and graft more and more trees, but the candymakers are selling more and more candy containing pecan meats. Too, big amounts of pecans are going into salads and cakes. The nuts also are being sold by vending machines," he said.

"One Texas candy company now is using 1,000,000 pounds of pecans a year. This big demand is making Texas the leader as a shelling state. San Antonio, alone, now has six large shelling plants."

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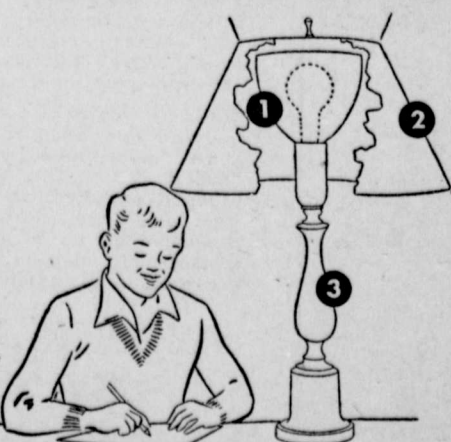
