while the old building has been  
put in first class condition and  
arranged to conveniently care  
for the other grades. The trust-  
ees have done everything in

of a high school of the first rank.  
They have bought land that joins  
the old property thereby giving  
us a better playground. They  
have placed a house upon this

ground which will give room  
enough until the congested con-  
dition which existed last term  
will not be this year. They  
have elected two more teachers  
for this term than they had last  
and having the increased teach-  
ing force they added the eleventh  
grade to the course of study.  
We are glad to know that a large  
number are going to take advan-  
tage of this opportunity and take  
this higher work. We hope to  
have our course of study arran-  
ged before this term closes as  
to meet the requirements of the  
colleges of Texas and thereby  
have our school affiliated with  
them.

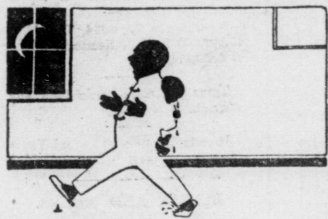

From the time of my conversion which took place in August, 1875, when I was a boy sixteen years of age, I felt drawn to the higher life in the kingdom and service of God. From the day of my birth from above the impulse has grown with me that to be of use to my fellow man is life's happiest high ideal. This finally culminated in my ordination to the full work of the gospel ministry in April, 1905. My ordination was called for by the Perdinale Missionary Baptist Church at Willow City, of which I was a regular member in good standing and full fellowship. My membership at present is with the Missionary Baptist Church seven miles below Menard, Menard County, Texas. I am happy and contented in my church relationship, and unless some charge comes upon me of which I am not now in the least aware and which I do not think is possible, I shall remain where I am until the day of my death.

With reference to the validity of my baptism or church relationship, I have never had the slightest doubt or uneasiness. My church relationship has always been pleasant, happy and agreeable. On mooted points and questions among my brethren, I have ever striven to be conservative, thoughtful and reasonable.

My work since 1893 has been that of a voluntary independent Missionary. The most of my preaching has been done among those who were destitute of the gospel. My field of operations has been Kimble, Menard, Sutton, Crockett and Edwards, and reaching as far westward as Sheffield in Pecos County. Some of the above named counties still furnish excellent fields for missionary operations. Many of the people in some of the western counties have not heard a sermon in one to twenty five years.

I was led as I firmly believe into the voluntary work by the spirit of God, the plain teaching of the Bible, and a consciousness of the moral needs of the people. The work of the early missionaries was confined to those who were destitute of the preached gospel. That the poor, lost, destitute might have the gospel preached to them is the spirit and object of the commission of Christ. That all men might be saved, the poor as well as the more favorably situated was and is the object of the death and resurrection of the Son of God. The preaching of Paul and Barnabas was to those who were destitute of the pure gospel. The coveted custom of the early churches in setting men apart to the ministry was that they might go and preach to the people everywhere in every place.

It requires men to preach the gospel, and they should be paid a reasonable living so that they might give their entire time to the study of God's word and the needs of the people. Unless a preacher can give much of his time to the study and preparation of his work, he cannot give the best that is within him to those who require the best. On this point of ministerial support I refer the doubtful reader to the following scriptures: Luke 10: 7; First Tim. 5: 11, 18; First Cor. 9: 7, 11, 14.

I firmly believe and maintain that the pure gospel should be given to the nations, and this can not be done successfully under the present constitution of things without men and the expenditure of means. Oh why will God's people who claim to have and hold the truth, neglect their greatest opportunities to give the clearest unspotted gospel to the lost world? On the other hand it is equally true that preachers should not be unwilling to take hold with their hands and in this way prove themselves faithful helpers to the truth. A preacher who is not willing to work when it becomes necessary even with his own hands, is not a preacher after the Pauline example and type. To meet his personal expenses every preacher may feel that he is under the highest obligations. A preacher who gives his time, talent, energy and influence to any people has a scriptural right therefore to demand a reasonable support. In this connection I will state that I am no longer in the field as voluntary missionary. I shall

preach that I shall pass my last days on earth as an active worker and watchman in the kingdom of my Lord and Master. The voluntary work has become so burdensome that situated as I am at present it is not expedient or prudent to try to keep it up. He sides my spiritual impressions call me into other lines of work more suitable to my declining years, physical strength and surroundings. This is not a pointer for a ministerial job, but I might say here that I am now open to serve in whatever capacity may seem to meet the demands of the Bible and the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

None need be idle when there is so much to do. Throughout the broad land the cry of God's faithful few is, "Lord, here am I. send me." Work is the order of the day. We should consider each day as another opportunity for doing good; and so of each and every day as they come and go, until God calls us to go beyond the jasper sea.

As I leave the field of voluntary missions, I carry with me the consciousness of knowing that much good has come to both saint and sinner in localities where I have preached. I would like to see the voluntary work more fully carried out, and more greatly appreciated by the people of God all over the land. May God's hand rest in tenderness on every voluntary worker thru out this land and other sections. To those who have opened their doors, their hearts and their hands for me, and thoughtfully administered to my wants as missionary at any time anywhere, I here tender my sincere thanks. I would be glad if it were possible for me to meet you all personally and tell you how much I appreciate your kindness and sympathy. This cannot be, therefore I take this method of allowing you a chance to learn that I have not forgotten your acts of kindness and your deeds of love.
