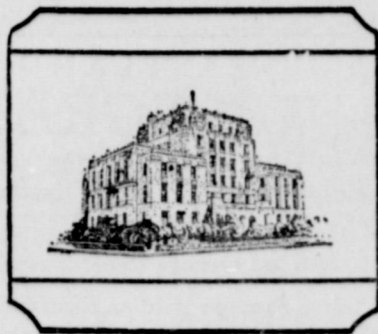

FOR THE first time in many years, Texas Electric Service Co. will hold its annual dinner meeting honoring members of its Quarter Century Club in Eastland. It'll be Tuesday, Nov. 3, at the Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria, Eastland Division Manager Frank Sayre reports.

ARMY SGT. Roy G. Burns, son of Mrs. Edith Tuggle of Stephenville and John H. Burns of Carbon is one of 200 select men from the 2nd Armored Division's 6th Infantry and 67th Armor at Ft. Hood, who is scheduled to fly to Bulford, England for training.

The men, who will be flown to and from England by the Royal Air Force, will receive General Tactical Training in Infantry and Armor with members of the Royal Highland Fusilier Company through Nov. 12.

The Royal Air Force will fly approximately 165 men from the United Kingdom's Coldstream Guards and The Scots Hussars to Ft. Hood on Oct. 5 to train with the 2nd's Infantry and Armor units in the Reciprocal Exchange Program.

Sgt. Burns is a team leader with the 6th Infantry's Company A, 7th Battalion.

He entered the Army in 1968, completed basic training at Ft. Bliss, Tex., and was stationed in Vietnam. He received the Purple Heart Medal, the Air Force Medal, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

Enrollment figures are remaining fairly static, Supt. Wendell Siebert reports for the Eastland Public School system.

The total school census showed 846 on Friday, Oct. 9, and that's not far from the total shown at the start of school.

Bank Shows Nearly \$10 Million Deposits

Deposits, loans and assets are all up at Eastland National Bank according to a third quarter report issued Sept. 30. All indexes are at all-time highs with assets totaling \$10,561,674.91 according to a report. Deposits stand at a whopping \$9,723,193.89 and loans are reported at \$5,578,143.21. The mid-year figures on June 30, read: \$10,339,179.35 assets; \$9,535,007.87, deposits; and \$5,225,718.73, loans. With a third-quarter report so strong, indications are that the year-end totals should really be outstanding, it is generally agreed. The formal bank call for statement of condition had not come. The April 29 call figures showed totals like this: \$9,997,119.53, assets; \$9,199,303.34, deposits; and \$5,003,529.07, loans. Deposits should hit the \$10 million mark soon it was understood. Comparative figures, Oct. 21, 1969, showed the bank with \$9,818,107.10 in assets; \$9,087,606.91 on deposit; and \$4,847,119.78 out on loan.

All public schools in the area will be closed Monday. Classes will be suspended while teachers attend a special meeting of District 14, Texas State Teachers Association to hold in Austin, it was announced.

The meeting is one of the professional in-service work days that are observed by the teachers under the new 10-month schedule, and attendance upon the session is mandatory, it was stated.

There will be no classes in schools at Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Carbon, Gorman or Rising Star during Monday, but the schedule of classes will resume in all of these schools Tuesday.

The Abilene program will begin with a general assembly and program at the Municipal Auditorium in Abilene at 10 a.m. Monday to be followed by departmental luncheons and workshops during the noon period and the afternoon.

The Eastland Mavericks picked up No. Six for the season on a wet, cold field, in Clyde Friday night, downing the Bulldogs 21-0.

It was a standoff through the first stanza, but Quarterback Craig Lund broke it open in the second, when he plowed over from the five-yard line for the first tally. Butch Eidson's kick was true and the Mavericks marched ahead 7-0.

The air was pretty full of balls throughout with Lund connecting on seven of 16, and it was in the third period that he hit Randy Rexroat on a short one that put the fleet runner over for another score. A run for extra points failed.

The final Eastland score came in the fourth quarter when Quarterback Lund kept and plunged a yard to put the ball in the end. Lund kept and ran over the two extra points for a final 21-0 evening.

The first tally for Eastland came with a bare five seconds left in the half after they recovered a fumble on the Bulldog 25. They pushed in for the touchdown situation.

The next Maverick tally came after taking over a Bulldog fumble on the 18 and again came on a fourth down play in the last of the third period.

The next score came after Lund took a Bulldog pass on the 22. He later worked the ball across the goal line for two yards out. The run for two was good for a 21-0 lead that stood up the remainder of the period.

Endgate Hawk intercepted one pass for Clyde while Lund intercepted two for Eastland. Defensively for Clyde were middle linebackers Walter Burton, all district and second team all area last year, who had 21 tackles, tight defensive tackle Kyle Scott and tackle Wayne Cloud. Philip Smith was outstanding both ways for Eastland at the tackle slot and Eidson also on defense.

In other district action: Ballinger beat Cisco, 28-0. Winters 8, Coleman 7. Hamilton 26, Comanche 0.

The Mavericks host the Hamilton team here next Friday.

looked the one person in Eastland who would know—his own kinfolk, and surviving son of J. L. Tindall, Pete Tindall.

Pete not only knew of it, he knew all about it, from family conversations, and even had an old picture of it buried in an old trunk "somewhere."

It seemed that the La Rue Hotel was located in the northwest corner of the present day square now where the Exchange Bank building and Eastland Drug are located. The hotel, according to Pete, was a rambling two-story structure, of wood construction, and was the center of all activity in the area from the time it was built, about 1880, until the time it burned, at the turn of the Century.

The ledger book, about 12 by 14 inches in size, has hard covers on front and back, with special printing identifying the hotel by name, and owner, done by a firm in St. Louis, Mo.

The first entry was dated May 22, 1894, with the guest being a Mr. C. Ed Simmons, of Chicago, Ill. The last entry showed that J. R. Stubblefield was "paid up to April 1st, 1899."

However, it was between these two entries that all the action took place: Many names, still familiar in these parts, the State, and the Nation, placed in the ledger by the persons themselves, and in their own handwriting, are there for the looking.

For example, one name appears many times on the ledger. That name is "B. W. Patterson," of Cisco. You don't have to be very old to remember Burette W. Patterson, former Judge of the 88th District Court in Eastland, before it was done away with in the late 1940's. At the time of the La Rue Hotel, Mr. Patterson was a struggling young lawyer, living in Cisco, and coming to Eastland often to transact business at the Court-house.

One entry, dated June 23rd, 1894, shows that the "Ross Rifles" ate dinner in the dining room. The "Ross Rifles" then consisted of Henry Van Geem, W. S. Olden (from where the town of Olden later derived its name), H. P. Skelton, Lou Willard, E. A. Parvin, R. S. Peck, and E. E. Wood. The latter name was to be a very common name in Eastland politics in the ensuing years, for E. E. Wood, the father-in-law of Mrs. Harry Wood, on E. Sadosa St., in Eastland, held the post of Justice of Peace, Pet. here in Eastland, probably longer than any other person.

Now, for a few more names at random, from the thousands that are entered in the ledger. See if any of these strike a familiar note: H. P. Brelsford, J. H. Frost, J. A. Rippetoe (New York), D. C. Connelley, who later married Jack Williamson, and just recently, passed away in Houston.

And a few more: H. S. Stubblefield, A. L. Castleberry, L. W. Connelley, C. U. Connelley, Frank Connelley, Judge Ed A. Hill, Rosa Connelley, J. R. Frost, James A. Beard, J. A. Karkalis, Judge Boykins Owens from Cisco, Briggs Owen, E. C. Satterwhite, Ranger, Texas, and Y. L. Dabney, from De Leon.

Apparently there wasn't too much of a shortage of Doctors during the time, for quite a few were shown to be guests, however, it isn't known whether they were medical doctors, "Hoss" doctors, or Ph. D. doctors. Anyway, here are a few that were listed: Dr. W. E. Mandill, Cisco; Dr. J. E. Butler, Eastland; Dr. R. L. McCoy, Carbon; Dr. E. J. Bettis, Cisco; Dr. C. G. Frost, Ranger; and Dr. E. C. Downtain, Eastland.

On Oct. 1, 1897 one "P. A. Sublett" stopped over at the hotel, giving his address as Dallas. The name "Sublett,"

being a familiar name in these parts nowadays, caused me to check with Sheriff Lefty Sublett to see if this was any of his relations, and sure enough, it probably was. The Sheriff says that he had an Uncle Al, whose initials were P. A., and that for a long time he was traveling salesman for a major tractor concern.

An all-time great in the boxing world, along with his main challenger of the day, frequented the hostelry, too. Twice, once on June 12th, 1897, and then again on Oct. 11, 1897, the name of Robert J. "Bob" Fitzsimmons appears on the ledger. On the latter date, Oct. 11, 1897, he signed the ledger, "Bob" Fitzsimmons, Champion of the World."

His challengers, who also stepped over on the same date in June, 1897, were James J. Corbett, who became the World Heavyweight champion in 1892. Corbett won the title from John L. Sullivan, who also signed the ledger on June 12th, 1897. Corbett later lost his title to Bob Fitzsimmons in 1897, the same year he was here in Eastland at the La Rue Hotel.

One very prominent name in Texas politics in those days visited the area several times, always staying at the La Rue. That person, James S. Hogg, former governor of Texas. He merely listed his address as "Austin." That was Oct. 17th, 1894. But, Gov. Hogg returned to the hotel in April, of 1898, and this time he brought with him former President of the United States, Grover Cleveland. Cleveland was one of the big politicians of the day, in 1891 he had been Mayor of Buffalo, N. Y., in 1892, he was elected Governor of New York State. He served two different terms as President, once in 1882, and ten years later in 1892, he was again elected. He went out of office in the elections of 1896, and came to Eastland four months after leaving office. The ledger shows his name, and address, as "Grover Cleveland, Princeton, N. J." Cleveland died on June 24, 1908, in Princeton.

The ledger reflects that apparently there was "entertainment" at some time or another during meal time, or on Saturday nights, because on Saturday, Aug. 8th, 1896, a group calling themselves the "Serenaders," performed in the main dining room. And, we must say that the instrumentation was not too far removed from today's rock

groups, however I am sure that the music was quite different. At that time, the Serenaders was composed of "L. Miller, Violin; James A. Beard, Guitar; Charles Scott, Guitar; and E. C. Simmons, triangle." Shown on the ledger as "manager", was C. Chastain. Also shown along with the group, perhaps as vocalist, or just for pretty ornamentation, was Sally Day. Aunt Sally Day lived to be 99 years of age, and just recently passed on, here in Eastland.

The ledger is not without its humorous aspects, too. On Jan. 25th, 1897, Ed A. Hill signed the ledger, and placed this addendum after his name, "Eastland, Eastland County, the fucher (sic) County seat of Eastland County."

And, in July of 1896, someone scribbled the following notation three times, very large, and legibly, "Cisco will never get the Courthouse." And, so far, they haven't.

Sometime the same year, and about the same time, four young ladies went to the hotel

to eat, and in signing the register (which was a "must," even for those who just ate there), they decided to give "false" places of residence, and sign it thusly: Rosa Connelley, Turkey Foot, Tex.; Rosy Harris, Gourq Neck, Tex.; Sissy Muse, Coon Valley, Tex.; and Ida Muse, Possum Gap, Tex.

Farther on down, printed and written with a Spencerian flair of the day, is the notation, "Use Sibbs Soap for the Laundry." No one seems to know if there ever was

such a product as Sibbs Soap; at least, Mrs. Ed Castleberry, who remembers some products of the time, says she never heard of it.

And, in keeping up with the trend of the day, the hotel must have had its problems with the youth of the day, for written several times on the back page, as if the author was trying to formulate a sign to be printed and placed in the lobby, was the phrase, "Young Men are respectfully invited to behave while in front of the hotel."

Signed, "Yours for better business, V. C. Bigham," desk clerk.

So, all in all, the ledger takes one back to a more peaceful and nostalgic time in Eastland Country history. A time when the train carrying passengers from East to West Coast stopped to take on water, and cord wood, and on hawkers, salesmen, politicians, and land grabbers, trekked up town to the La Rue Hotel for a bath, some food, and a little rest, paying 25 cents for a Sunday dinner,

and even perhaps listening to the "Serenaders" till late to sleep on the front porch. Some notations in the ledger indicate that Mr. J. L. Tindall, owner and manager, was able to serve his sumptuous dinner for 25 cents, for written in several items, such as "light from C. U. Connelley," pounds of beef, at 04¢ per lb., total 52¢; and 76¢ of feed, at 04¢ per pound. Won't someone please get another La Rue Hotel?

Social Security Important to Youthful, Too

If you're in the half of the U.S. population that's under 30, you may think social security is something remote and unimportant to you right now. Not so, according to R. A. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager for the Abilene district.

"In this generally healthy and youthful group, nearly 2 1/2 million people receive benefits because they are disabled or are dependent upon disabled workers. Over 3 million widowed mothers and young children get monthly social security checks as survivors of workers," Tuley stated. "Half a million students age 18 to 22 and a quarter of a million people who became disabled in childhood get monthly benefits as the children of retired, deceased, or disabled workers," he went on. "Disabled children get social security benefits as long as they are not able to work."

"The money in cases like these is important, of course," Tuley added. "But for the young worker who knows that his family will be at least partially provided for should he be injured or die prematurely, there is also peace of mind."

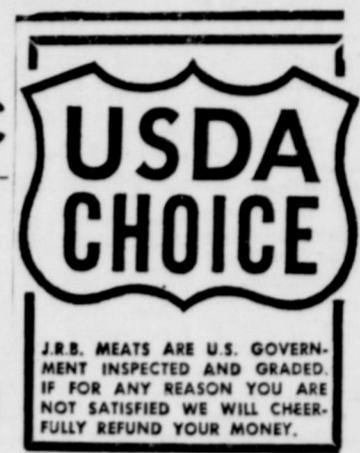

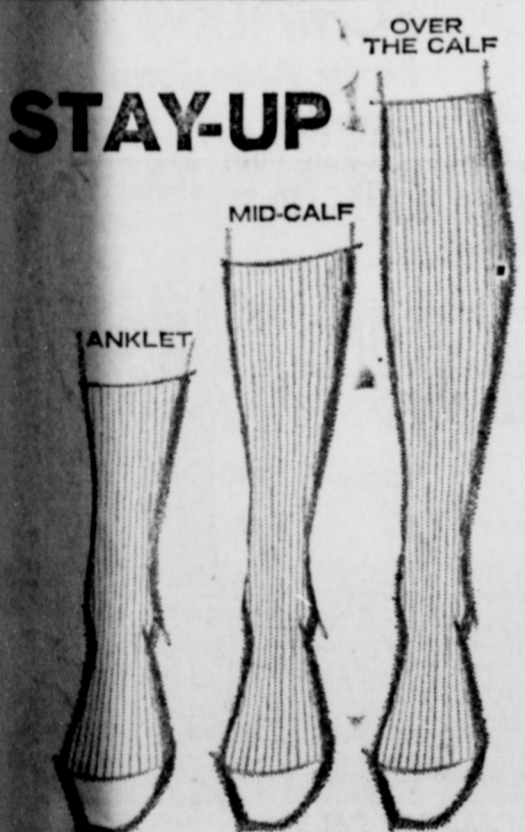

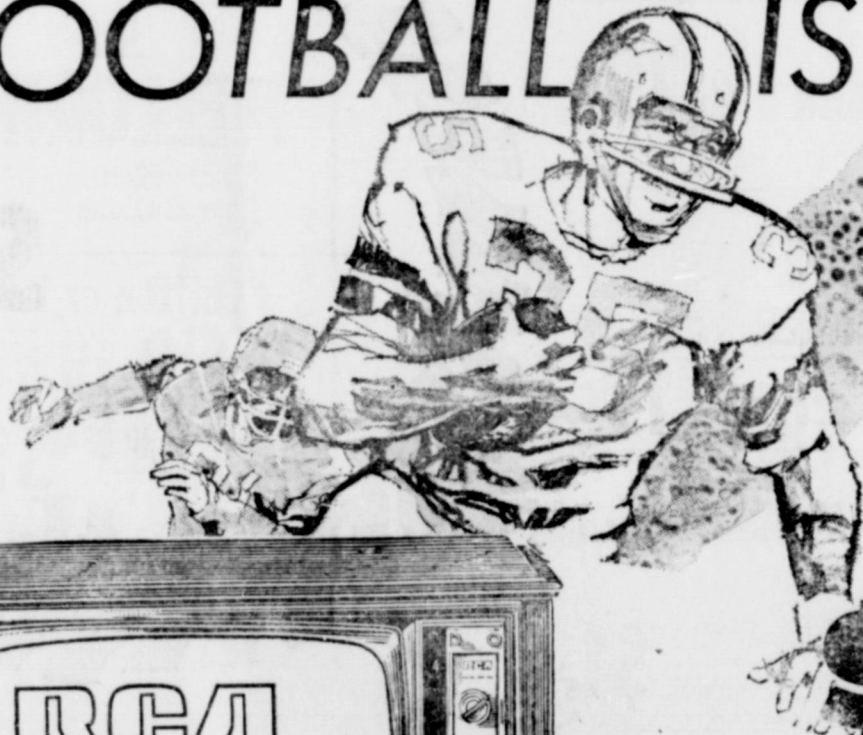

A LOOK AT Amendment 2

The proposed amendment repeals that part of Article XVI, Section 20, Subsection (a), of the Texas Constitution, which prohibits the open saloon and which empowers the legislature to define that term and enact legislation against it. The proposed amendment substitutes a new provision empowering the legislature to enact a mixed beverage law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option basis. The amendment leaves unaffected the part of Subsection (a) which empowers the legislature to "regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a state monopoly on the sale of distilled liquor."

BACKGROUND
During the early days of the Republic, Texas had no restriction against the operation of an open saloon other than the requirement that the proprietor pay a tax and that he be bonded to guarantee that an orderly and reputable house would be maintained. As the frontier atmosphere faded and civilization sank its roots deeper into community life, temperance groups were militant but only mildly successful in attempts to bring about prohibition in the state. In 1887 the voters of the state defeated an amendment dealing with prohibition by a vote of 220,000 to 129,000. Temperance groups found little support during the next 20 years, but in 1911 a similar proposed amendment on prohibition was lost by only 6,000 votes. World War I again brought prohibition into prominence, and when the federal government submitted the national prohibition amendment in 1918, it was adopted by the legislature. However, prohibition lacked the public support necessary for enforcement, and when Congress modified the Volstead Act to permit the sale of beer in 1933, Texas adopted an amendment to the state constitution legalizing the sale of beer. The 21st Amendment to the federal constitution, which repealed the 18th Amendment, became effective in December, 1933. The 44th Legislature of the State of Texas then submitted an amendment to repeal state prohibition, and it was ratified

in August, 1935. The 1935 amendment authorized the sale of hard liquor on a local option basis but prohibited the open saloon. Many attempts have been made over the years to achieve liquor by the drink, but the issue did not become a major one until it was endorsed by Governor John Connally in 1967. Connally's proposal for a "minibottle" plan of liquor by the drink failed to receive a majority vote during the 1st Called Session of the 60th Legislature in June, 1968. Many lawmakers contended that the constitution would first have to be amended to repeal the provision banning open saloons. Such a resolution was offered and passed for submission to the Texas electorate during the Regular Session of the 61st Legislature.

ARGUMENTS FOR:
The proposed amendment is not a wet-and-dry issue because the sale of alcohol has already been sanctioned by a majority of the residents of the state; also, a non-binding referendum during the 1968 primary elections resulted in a 40,000-vote margin for mixed beverages out of a total vote of 1.4 million. The proposed amendment would not force mixed drinks on any locality since it requires that any mixed drink law be on a local option election basis. Adoption of the proposed amendment and passage of subsequent enabling legislation would lead to stricter control of liquor sales to minors, and end to the subterfuge of private clubs, a decrease in alcohol consumption a reduced crime rate, and fewer traffic accidents.

AGAINST:
The proposed amendment would make alcoholic beverages more readily available. The proposed amendment would lead to an increase in crime and in traffic deaths. Although enabling legislation for the proposed amendment could be designed to raise needed new revenue through the taxation of mixed beverages, this revenue would be negligible in comparison with resulting problems such as broken homes, juvenile delinquency, drunk-driving, Crises.

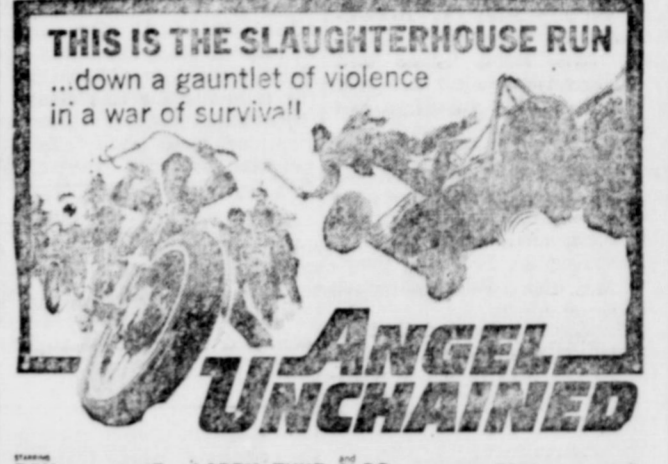

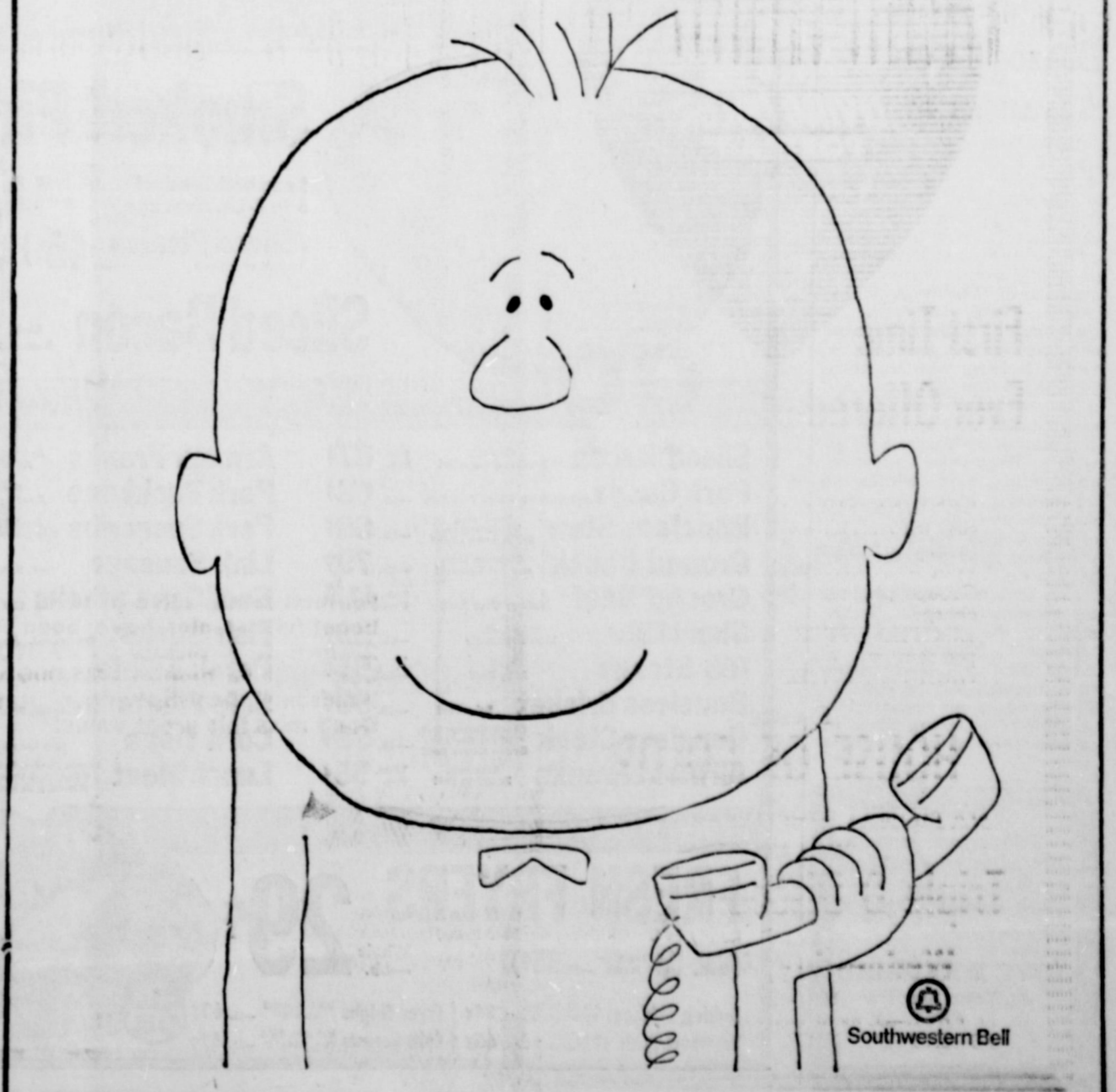
