Farm Programs Changed No Set-Aside Acreage For 1974

The U.S. Department of Agriculture through the Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service has announced that there will be no government set-aside of crop land for 1974.

In any announcement, USDA said the effect to this announcement will be to free farmers to go all-out to produce feed grains, soybeans, wheat and cotton in order to assure adequate supplies for domestic and export markets.

This announcement will also

permit farmers to begin making plans for 1974 crops.

The maintenance of an established conserving base will not be required as a condition of eligibility to receive price support or program payments, the announcement noted.

Counties shall discontinue all conserving base work and adjustments for 1974 with the exception of conserving use requirements which will remain in effect for CCP or CAP agree-

ments which are not terminated. Don Stewart, executive director of Mitchell County ASCS, said the exact effect of this change is not now known as the Congress is still working on the farm bill for 1974.

However, it appears that there will be a complete change in the farm programs, the first such change since the present program went into effect in 1965. The present program is the best-like program of all programs tried by the government.

Under the anticipated new program, it is believed that Congress will pass a bill that will completely change payments to farmers.

Under the current program, farmers are paid a base support price, with the average of

the past three year's yields taken into consideration.

Now before Congress is a bill that would set a certain price for agriculture commodities such as 38¢ per pound of cotton.

If the farmer sold his cotton for 22¢ per pound, he would receive 16¢ per pound price support payment. The support would be paid only for cotton sold that year. However, that payment would not be made until the farmer has completed his harvest, in late fall.

This would drastically change the financing picture of the farmer, as price support payments are now received in July. Most farmers use the price support payments they are to receive in July as a form of collateral

for loans to plant their spring crops.

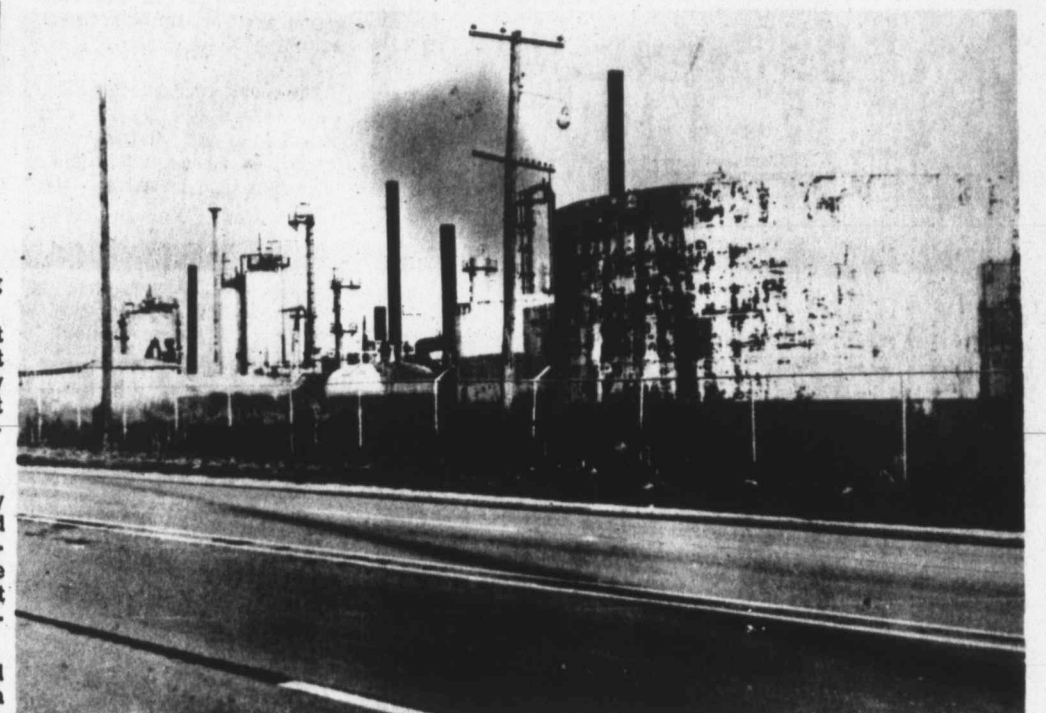
Under the new program, if it is enacted, the farmer will not have any idea how much money he will receive in price support payments and could have problems getting financing.

According to Stewart, the only time the average yield would affect the price support payments would be in cases where a farmer's crop is hailed out or destroyed by a natural disaster.

The removal of set-aside land will have little if any effect on the total number of acres of cotton planted in Mitchell County, Stewart said, as most farmers consider their skip-row planting method as the set-aside.

The total amount of cotton planted could increase somewhat by the use of narrow row cotton but most land will not support narrow row planting, Stewart said.

The removal of the set-aside will increase the number of acres of feed grains by about 10%, as that is the amount of set-aside acreage for feed grains for farmers participating in government feed-grain programs in Mitchell County, Stewart noted.

Auction Set Aug. 22

Equipment To Be Removed Soon

Once-busy vessels, pumps, heat exchangers, boilers and assorted other equipment pertinent to a refinery will soon be up for sale at the old Col-Tex Refinery here.

Parks-Davis Auctioneers will conduct an auction on the site at 10 a.m., August 22.

Everything is slated to go on the block with the exception of the acreage itself and the tank farm, which is located on top of the hill at the refinery, just west of Colorado City. It is being stipulated that buyers must have removed all their purchases from the premises within six months after their purchase.

The refinery had come into being in 1924 as the West Texas Refining Co., two years after the first oil well had been drilled in Mitchell County. The refinery was owned and operated by Anderson-Prichard Refining Co.

In the fall of 1925, Standard Oil of California bought controlling interest in the Anderson-Prichard installation and changed the name to Col-Tex Refining Co.

In November 1956, Cosden Petroleum Corporation bought Col-Tex from Standard Oil and Anderson-Prichard. Employment peaked at 149.

On January 28, 1969, the Colorado City refinery was officially closed.

The new wing at Root Memorial provides a well equipped clinic for those suffering from respiratory diseases.

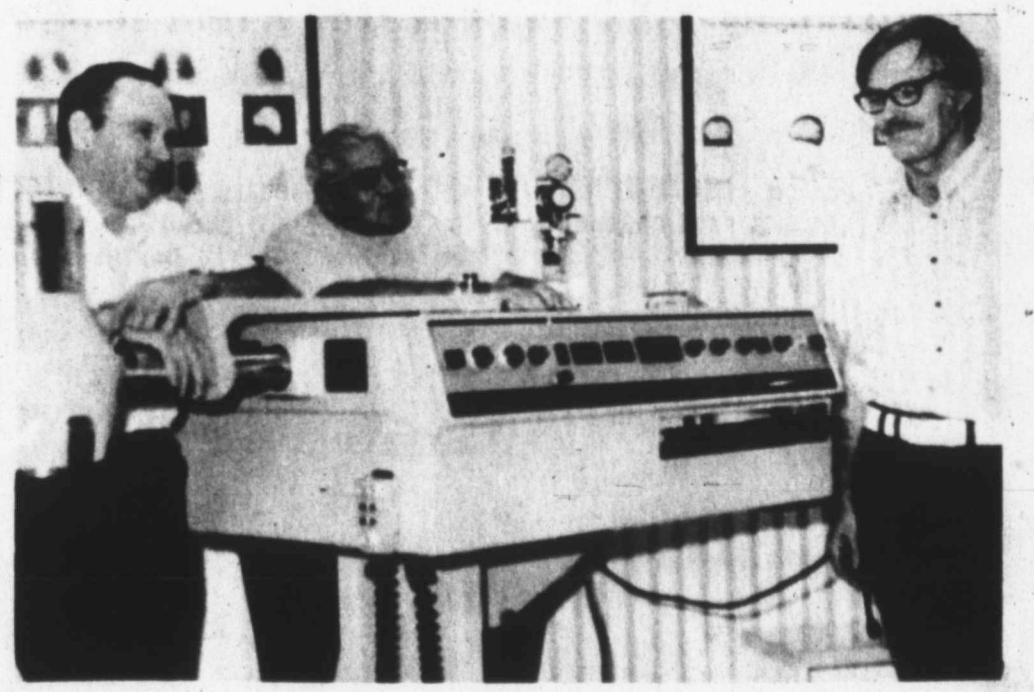
Dr. Cone Johnson makes around three visits a month to the clinic, his visiting days are on Friday.

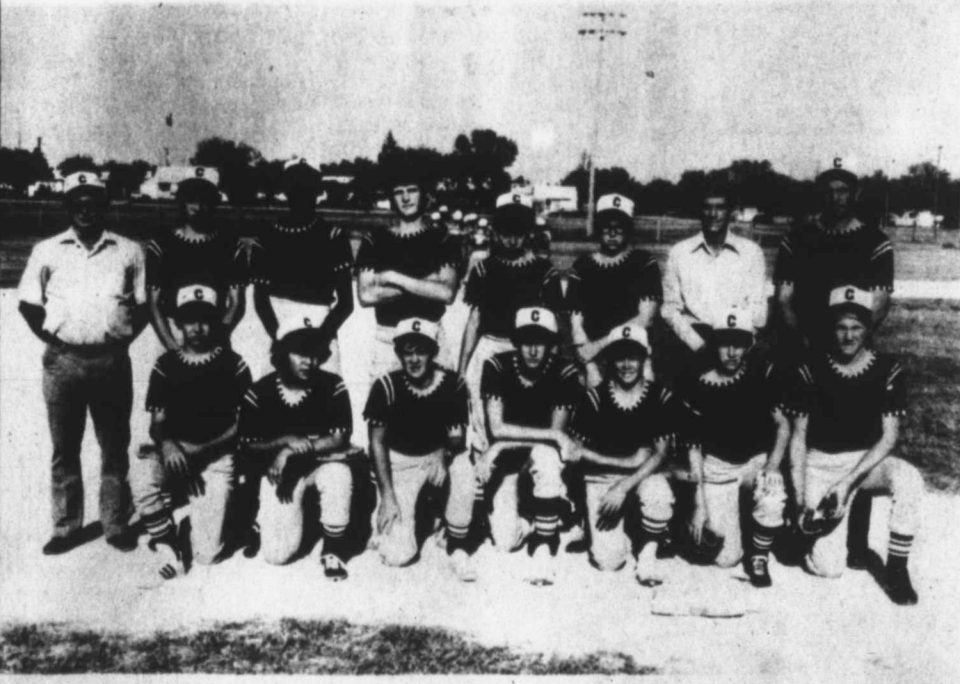

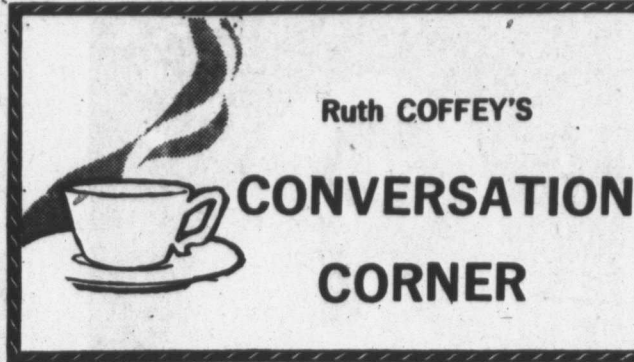

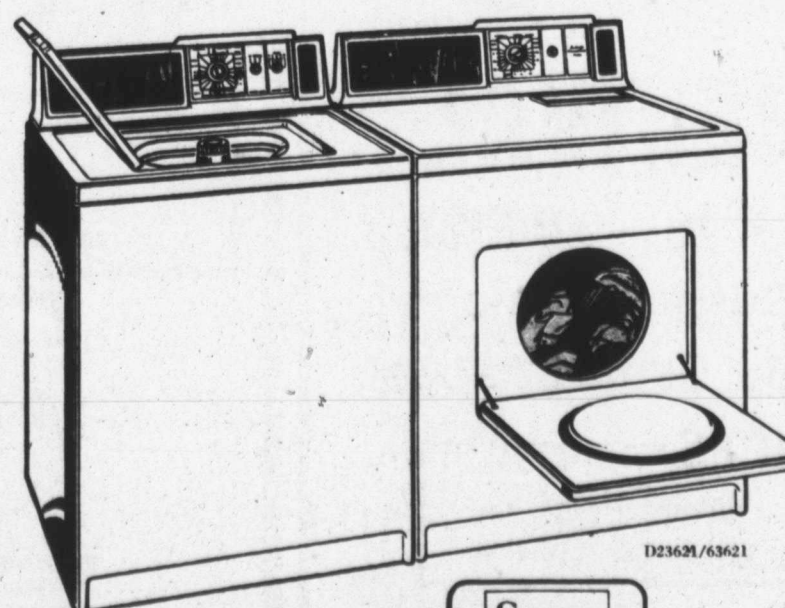

The groom is a 1970 graduate of Westbrook High School and is employed by Allen's in Abilene.

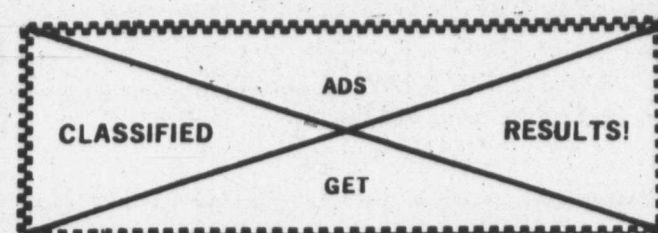

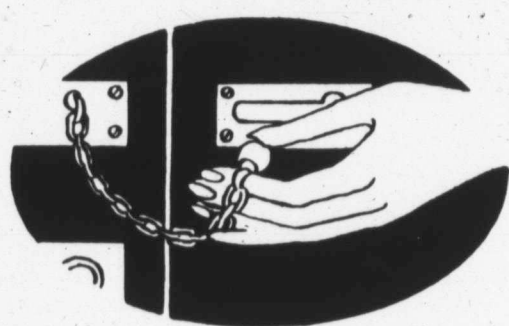

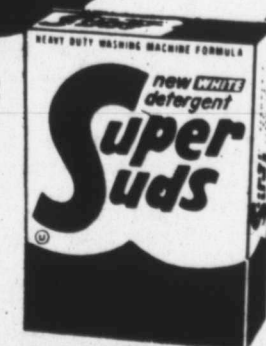
