Reward Offered For Hamilton Dead Or Alive

Blankenship May Issue Permits to Oil Men, Truckers

Independent oil men in Eastland county and truckers alike are indebted to Hon. George A. Davisson Jr., representative in the lower Texas house from Eastland county for a new ruling from the state highway department in which it is not necessary for oil men and truckers to go to Abilene or Brownwood for permits for moving.

Through his efforts in a bill introduced by him to eliminate this apparent and expensive procedure through an agreement reached with the highway department, the bill was withdrawn and the highway department has authorized Joe Blankenship, employe of the state highway department of Eastland to issue these permits to Eastland county oil men who do a trucking business as well as all other trucking industries. Mr. Davisson considered this an emergency measure for the relief of Eastland county trucking industries and lost no time in making the proper arrangements for it becoming effective immediately.

'BABY BANDIT' IS RETURNED TO EASTLAND

Paul Dean Barker of Eastland, "17-year-old baby bandit," who was assessed 20 years at Fort Worth Saturday, was returned to Eastland Tuesday night by Steele Hill, deputy, on a bench warrant for automobile theft.

The deputy sheriff said the charge on which Barker is held was allegedly executed some time ago.

Barker pleaded guilty to five charges pending against him at Fort Worth after hearing a jury in criminal court assess the 20-year penalty for one robbery.

Judge Willis McGregor at Fort Worth ordered Barker confined to 20 years for each charge, the sentence to run concurrently.

REPORT HE IS KILLED IS NOT PROVED TRUE

Allred Scores Officers of McKinney For Allowing His Escape.

AUSTIN, Feb. 27.—Governor Allred today offered \$500 reward for information that leads to the capture of Raymond Hamilton, dead or alive.

With bitter criticism of officers from whom Hamilton escaped near McKinney Sunday, the governor said he purposely made the reward for "information" rather than for the actual capture or slaying.

Hamilton's latest escape was described by Governor Allred as "most lamentable."

Federal Housing Plan Explained In Illustrated Talk

R. E. Sikes of Eastland, representative of the federal housing administration, and Mr. Kyle of the same organization, were in Ranger Wednesday morning, where the details about the housing plan were explained to a group of lumbermen, painters, carpenters, plumbers, brick layers and other building trades representatives.

Mr. Sikes was introduced by L. H. Flewellen, who made a short talk pointing out the importance of the housing program being put on in Ranger and the surrounding towns. Mr. Kyle, who also spoke on the subject, stated that in cities where the full benefits of the housing program had been put in force there was no depression and that business was being greatly benefited.

Following the talks an illustrated talk, showing what could be done in the way of improving houses.

The pictures showed in very graphic way how run-down houses could be improved and modernized through the federal loan plan, whereby the home owner could borrow the money at 5 per cent, payable monthly, and have the homes repaired. Figures on the amount of money, the unemployed who were put to work showed in startling figures how much good has already been done.

NEW STORM IS REPORTED OVER THE ATLANTIC

CHERBOURG, France, Feb. 27. A new storm, reaching in the Atlantic, brought S. O. S. appeals from three steamers today. It was feared one of them, the British freighter Hlaigrowie, might already have sunk.

While the great German liner Europa was steaming to the aid of the freighter, there were reports that indicated the freighter had gone down and that its crew of 26 was missing.

The steamship Johanne appealed for aid as did the Spanish steamship Achuri.

Snow and flood was prevalent here. The Seine reached flood level in Paris today and the river docks were flooded.

School Children Hurt In Crash

HOUSTON, Feb. 27.—Six school children and their bus driver were in critical conditions today from injuries suffered when their machine containing more than 40 collided with a heavy motor van near Fairbanks.

All the seriously injured live at Fairbanks. More than a score of others were injured. R. L. Pruitt, 36, Galveston, driver of the truck, told officers who preferred charges against him the crash occurred when a match he had lit, fell to the floor of the truck and he reached for it.

G. W. COLLUM, CISCO BAND MAN, ACCEPTS EASTLAND JOB

CISCO, Feb. 27.—After ten years of service as director of the Lobo band here, G. W. Collum has resigned to accept a position as band of the Eastland high school band, he announced today.

His resignation will be acted upon by the city commission. He expects to take up his duties in Eastland Friday, March 1.

The bandmaster's move came as a surprise to friends here, although it was known that his services had been sought by more than one other city recently. He said today that he is resigning to accept what appears to be a better position.

Director Collum, during his stay here, has led the Lobo band three times to West Texas Class A band championships, defeating the outstanding bands of this part of the state. The only other time his band contested for the honor was when it was only two years old, and was defeated by half a point in ranking by the Breckenridge band at the Wichita Falls contest.

One other time Director Collum took a band to Tulsa to the national contest, where it received a high ranking over many bands from the largest cities of the nation.

During his career as band director here Collum has trained approximately 300 musicians. Three of his former pupils the now band directors and teachers in other high schools and many more are professional musicians. Two were in the Simmons University Cowboy band which toured Europe a few years ago.

During his stay here, he and the Lobo band have helped in every civic cause in which they were called upon. He said today that he had missed only one football game here, when he was ill, and that the band had missed none.

'Cycle Mounties' Sport New Dress

It's a safe bet to say "Cycle Mounties" Ernest Daniels and Morgan Myers at Eastland haven't been asked when the next bus leaves in the past two weeks.

The motor patrolmen with 118 over the state are sporting a new distinctive uniform.

The men wear a medium blue shirt, with shoulder straps of tan piped in red, and tan trousers with a one-inch stripe of blue piped in red down each side. The caps are a combination of the blue and tan materials with blue visors.

The uniform was adopted instead of the former gray shirt and trousers because of the ease of impersonation.

NEW DEAL HAS LOST A TEST OF ITS POWER

WILMINGTON, Del., Feb. 27.—The new deal today lost the first major test of its labor policies when Federal Judge John Nields dismissed charges against the Weirton Steel company in a case which had aligned much of industry against the administration.

Judge Nields held the Weirton company's relations with its employees did not effect interstate commerce and were beyond the power of the federal government to regulate.

Section 7a of the recovery act, collective bargaining provisions, is "unconstitutional and void" as applied to the Weirton concern, he ruled.

General application of this principle would prevent the new deal from interfering with employer-employee relationships of a majority of American business. Attorney General Cummings prepared for an immediate appeal which he hopes would bring a supreme court reversal of Judge Nields' ruling. The government considered the case a vital test of its powers.

Kite Flying Danger Explained By Lewis

The danger of flying kites in the vicinity of electric wires was explained today by officials of the Texas Electric Service Company, who are appealing to parents to warn youthful kite-flyers to keep away from wires.

"Several fatal accidents already have occurred this spring as a result of boys flying kites too near electric wires," according to J. E. Lewis, district manager of the electric company, "and we want to impress on parents and children the dangers of letting kites and kite strings come in contact with wires. Above all, children should be cautioned never to use metal wire in the place of string when flying kites, for if the wires should fall across an electric line, the current would flash to the person holding it."

"Whenever kites become entangled in electric wires, don't climb poles or use long sticks to remove it. Call the company and a lineman will be sent to get it down, if possible. Another wise precaution is not to fly kites during a rain, as a wet string is almost as dangerous as a wire should it come in contact with an electric line. Kites with metal frames or wood frames braided with wire, should not be used."

"Employees of the company will visit local schools within the next few days and make a further explanation of the dangers of flying kites near electric wires."

The party is expected to leave late in April by special train and visit New Orleans, Birmingham, Montgomery, Jacksonville, Columbus, S. C., Raleigh, N. C., Richmond, Washington, Charlotte, Atlanta, Chattanooga, Knoxville, Nashville, Little Rock and Dallas.

Lowry Martin of Corsicana is chairman of arrangements committee and Ray Nichols of Vernon is vice chairman.

FHA Outlined at Rotary Meeting

R. E. Sikes of Eastland, executive director of the federal housing administration, and A. C. Kyle, field representative presented the program at the Rotary club today, giving a first showing of a sound picture outlining the possibilities for the homeowner, the city and the nation under the federal housing plan.

Raymond Rippey, operator of the sound equipment, was also present to operate the machine.

This is the first time this picture has been shown in Texas, having been released at Washington only last Friday, it was announced by the preliminary speakers. The film was shown earlier in the morning at the Elks Arena.

Texas Counting Up Crop Damage After Cold Spell

TEXAS sought today to determine the amount of crop damage resulting from the freezing weather of the last few days and the weather bureau announced the cold spell was nearly over.

In Central Texas, Bell county reports showed a considerable portion of the oat and wheat crops were killed.

In the Panhandle area, wheat plants and roots, laid bare by heavy dust storms were believed damaged by the freeze. Late rains enabled much of this crop to get deep roots and it may revive.

Guard Killed In Bank of England

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Private James Baker of the Welsh Guards, was found fatally shot today in the famous Bank of England.

The usual secrecy attaching to the most ordinary accidents in the old bank added to the mystery of Baker's death after the discovery of his body. It was the first violent death in the bank in 150 years.

There were several versions of Baker's shooting. It was certain only that he died in a hospital from a rifle bullet wound soon after he was found dying at his post behind the bank's walls.

League of Nations No Better Than Its Members

If you have innocently wondered why the League of Nations was quite unable to do anything in the least effective along the line of slowing up Japan's seizure of territory in Manchuria, you might profitably read the current cable dispatches about Italy's dispute with Abyssinia.

Just what has been happening in those sun-smitten outposts along the Ethiopian border is not at all clear—won't be clear, probably, until the smoke clears away and a good many young men of both races have died.

But it is evident that the excellent old game of imperialism is being played anew, and the wind-up will probably see a new sector of Africa experiencing the joys of European rule.

One is the fact that Abyssinia appealed to the League of Nations to settle the dispute, and that Italy refused to permit it. Another is that France, according to a recent cable, "has agreed tacitly to give Italy a free hand in dealing with Abyssinia, even to taking over most of the country."

In other words, Italy is behaving toward Abyssinia—with Europe's general consent—in much the same way that Japan behaved toward China; and this need not imply a criticism of either nation, because this the way strong nations almost invariably behave toward weak ones.

Our own nation got possession of California and the other southwestern states in much the same way, incidentally.

Now the thing to bear in mind in this connection is simply the fact that a stream can rise no higher than its source. An international organization cannot impose on any nation a rule of conduct which all its member nations are not ready to accept for themselves.

The league, to be brief, could not keep Japan from taking what it wanted in the Orient because the leading members of the league have done the same sort of thing themselves and are prepared to do it again if they see fit.

The plain fact, then, is that no international league can keep the peace until the nations which compose it are ready to turn over a new leaf, individually, in their own dealings with other nations.

The Italian squabble with Abyssinia is clear proof that we have not yet reached that point. It explains why the league was impotent when Japan raided Manchuria.

A three-year-old child, while playing in a compound at the military barracks at Tanjong Muar was rendered unconscious by a coconut falling on his head and was removed to a hospital in a critical condition. However, he is expected to recover. We have a lot of grown-ups in this country whose skulls are so hard that a tree falling on them wouldn't make a dent in their skulls.

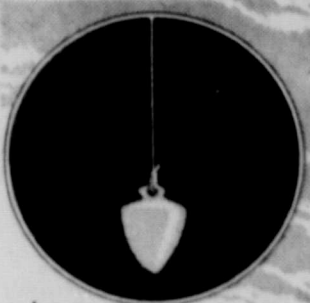

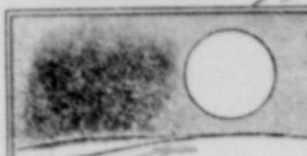

'Dusting the Covers of Texas History' for The Texas Centennial Celebrations of 1936

Crisp orders were being given in the Texas camp. It was the afternoon of April 21, 1936. "Cavalry to the right!" Colonel Mirabeau B. Lamar on his fine horse paced out to the front of his cavalrymen.

"Captain Millard, infantry to the left!" The men quickly stepped into line. Hockley moved the "Twin Sisters" into line of defense. They (the cannons) were gifts from the people of Cincinnati to the cause of Texas.

Colonel Burleson took his first regiment to the center; Sidney Sherman took his men to the left wing.

All was set for the big battle. The band, minus any martial music, but feeling in the spirit of playing, piped forth with "Will you come to the bower?" Over and over again they played as the last recruits were whipped into line, and all was arranged for the conflict.

General Houston looked at the sun. Then he looked at his timepiece. Four o'clock. With keen anticipation in his voice he gave the command, "Forward!" So eager were the men to begin fighting that it was all Houston could do to keep them from an immediate attack when they were hardly within shooting distance. Quite suddenly the Twin Sisters were wheeled around, and into the midst of the Mexican camp was poured a volley of cannon and gun shots. Immediately all was turmoil. Cries of pain, audible prayers, and wild screaming roused the Mexicans who had not seen the Texans coming.

Santa Anna, asleep in his tent, turned over and over. His fitful sleep was one of nightmares. He kept hearing his foes screaming "Remember the Alamo! Remember Goliad!" The cries seemed nearer. He fancied he could hear cannon shots. Then, spring from his cot, he was wide awake, and in a glance took in the situation. His dreams were realities. The Texans were in his camp! They were killing his men; they were shooting those who were trying to run away; they were yelling like fiends, stabbing, fighting, giving their hair-raising war cry.

Castillon had tried to form a line of defense. He was killed at once. Santa Anna looked about in desperation. Juan Bringas, servant of his aide-de-camp, rushed up and pleaded with his master that he take his Juan's horse and escape. Without hesitation, he jumped on the horse's back, and fled toward Vince's Bridge, which the Texans had destroyed early in the day.

The Texans with fiery vengeance stabbed at random, crushed with gladius, and killed men right and left. The slaughter was so terrific that in the half hour during which the battle was fought, 630 Mexicans were killed, and 208 were wounded. Only 12 Texans were killed, and 40 wounded. Running over the boggy ground to escape, 730 Mexicans were rounded up and brought back prisoners. Some died in the mud and water of the San Jacinto.

The Lone Star flag that had waved so proudly over Goliad was to wave henceforth over the entire state. Texas was free! The battles were over! Life could begin anew, and the battlefields could be planted in corn, wheat, and oats.

All was well—except for the fact that Santa Anna had not been captured. By another sundown, he would be in the hands of the

Income Tax In A Nutshell

Charitable contributions and gifts made by an individual are deductible within limitations provided by the revenue act. The organization to which the gift is made must meet several tests. The corporation, trust, community chest, fund, or foundation must be operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, literary, or educational purposes, or for the prevention or cure to children or animals; and if a substantial part of its activities is carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, it fails to pass the tests. No part of the organization's income may inure to the benefit of any private stockholder or individual.

Contributions made to a missionary fund, church building fund, and for the benefit of other activities of the church are deductible. Few rents, assessments, and dues paid to churches are regarded as contributions. Gifts to a corporation or association organized or devoted to the advancement of learning are deductible.

Gifts to an individual are not deductible, but if made to a charitable organization, as defined by the revenue act, may be deducted even though the organization distributes funds among the individual beneficiaries.

Contributions made to the United States, the District of Columbia, any State or Territory or political subdivision thereof, such as a city or town, deductible; for example, a gift of real estate to a city to be used perpetually as a public park is deductible. Also al-

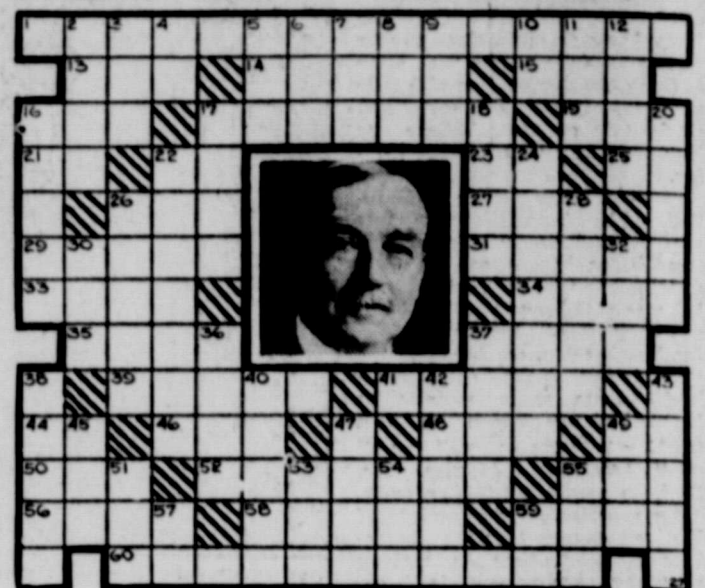

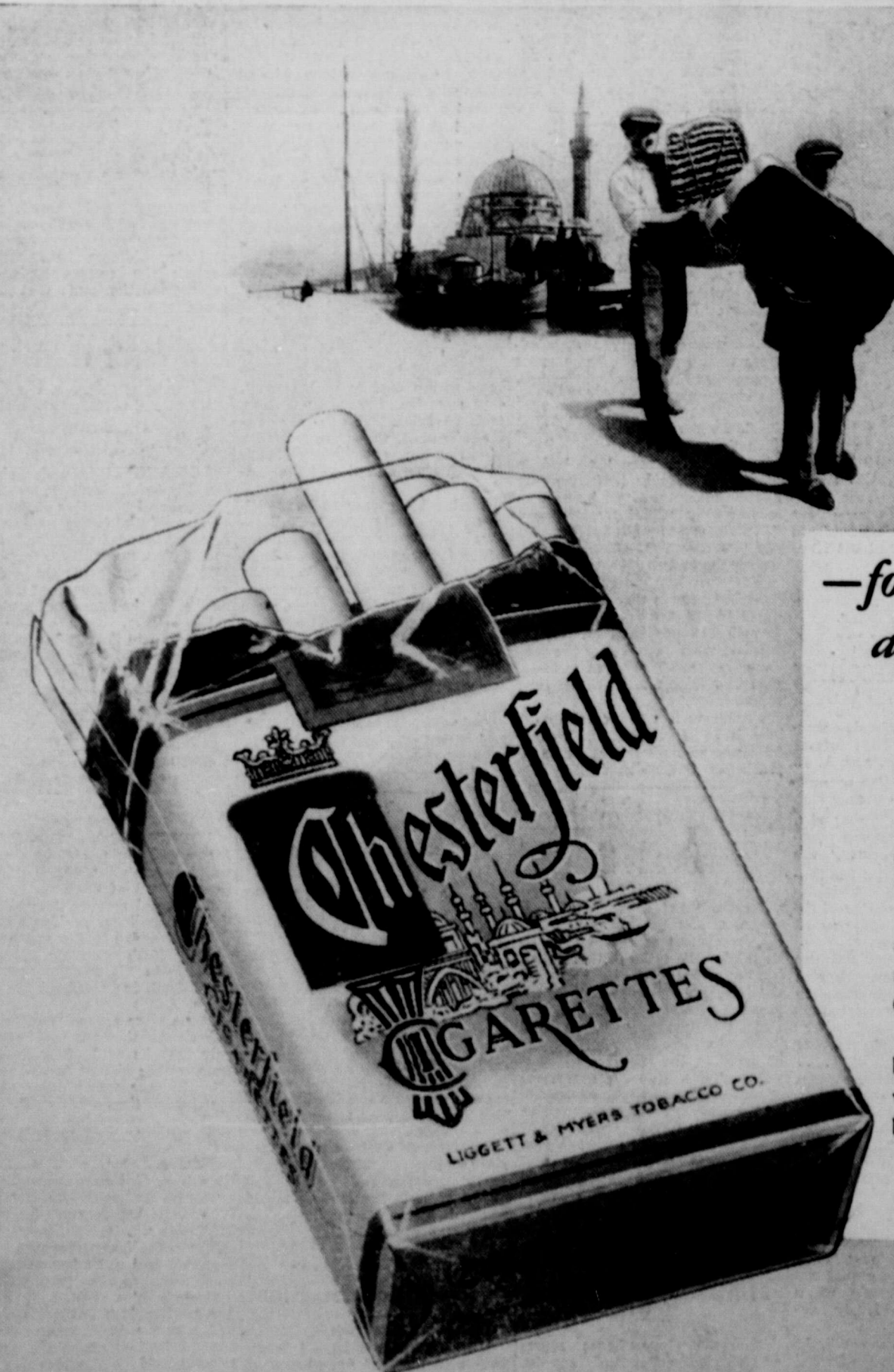

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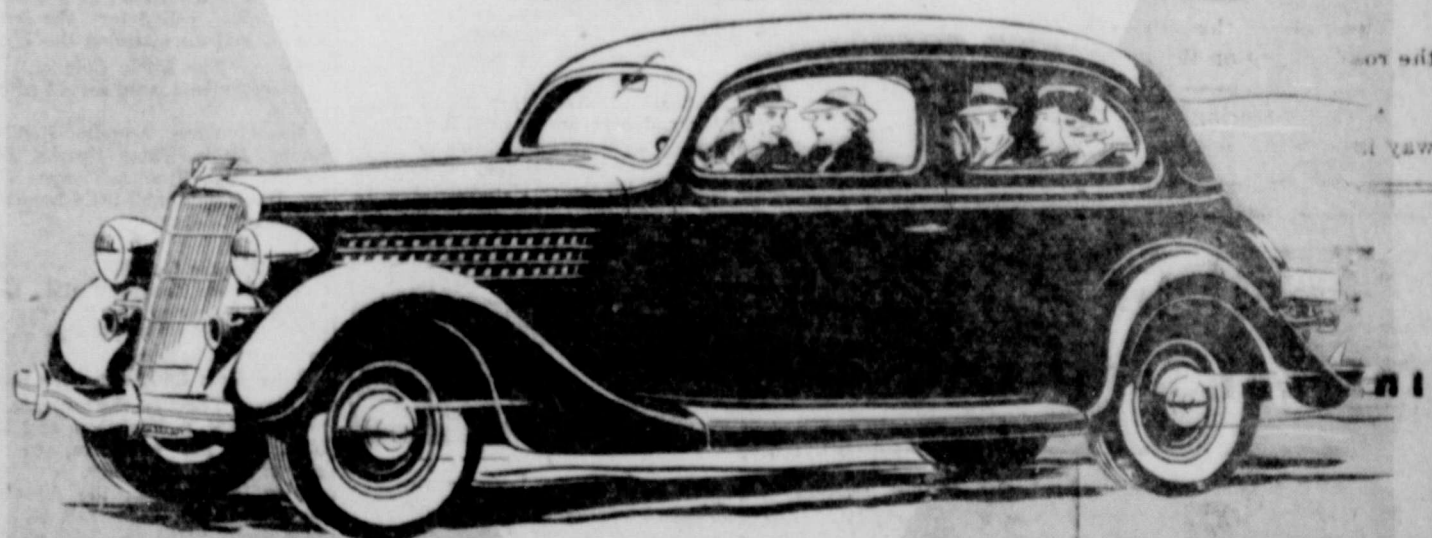

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Under The Dome At Austin

AUSTIN—Depression will leave a lasting mark on Texas—but it will be one of betterment. Employment projects are making a rapid transformation in its physical appearance.

Dikes and dams will harness the Brazos, Colorado and Neches rivers, with resulting changes in areas now subject to overflow.

Irrigation projects planned along the Rio Grande will change sandy, cactus-grown wastes into fields of winter vegetables and fruit.

A 26,000-acre forest is being planted at the northwestern tip of the state, in Dallas county, to check the bleak winds that sweep the plains bare of soil.

A 300-foot campanile on the campus of the University of Texas, part of a building project aided by PWA, will challenge the dominance of Austin's skyline by the state capitol dome.

Depression activity has created a 225,000-acre state park in the Big Bend section of the Rio Grande. New roads in the Panhandle have made Palo Duro Canyon's beauties more accessible to tourists. In addition, 25 smaller state parks have been dedicated and improved and additional work of this kind is planned.

Other projects have included the building of airports, miles of roads and many bridges.

There is much speculation about the capitol concerning the confidential report made to Attorney General William McGraw by Rangers D. E. Hamer and Jim Shown, detailed to investigate the running of "hot" oil.

B. M. Gault's name appeared prominently last week in a list of nominees appointed among the state rangers. Conservation of Soil Is Planned By Relief Head

AUSTIN—A soil conservation program designed to save the agricultural resources of the state is being formulated by the rural department of the Texas relief commission, it has been announced by V. R. Smitham, manager of the rural department.

The plan will make it possible for farmers to preserve their lands and for rehabilitation clients to work on self-liquidating projects which will afford them cash wages to apply on their obligations to the rural corporation.

Under W. M. Burkes, formerly county agent in Upshur county, the conservation service section of the rural department was established last week. Mr. Burkes was named to the place by mutual agreement at A. & M. college, which will cooperate in the program.

"Terracing alone will not save the soil in Texas," Mr. Burkes declared. "We believe it good practice to take land with an 8 to 10 per cent slope out of cultivation and convert it to pasture or timber land."

The conservation program will consist of erosion control, running terrace or contour lines, building terraces or contours, terrace outlets, spillways, gully controls, dams; planting legumes, grasses, trees or other cover and soil improving crops; water conservation in the form of wells, dams and ponds; building of trench silt and storage houses for crops and livestock; forestry, where work will assist in conserving the soil.

County agents have been asked to help start the program by offering the service to farmers in the various counties. Where requests for running terrace lines on as much as 4,000 acres are forwarded to Austin, a conservation assistant, upon approval of the request, will be sent to a county to supervise work there. From one to four squads of four men each, to be supplied from rehabilitation or relief rolls, will be needed in the work, it has been estimated.

After terrace lines have been run, the conservation assistant will remain in the county to supervise actual construction of terraces. No part of the construction costs, however, will be borne by the rural department.

ment. More students are realizing the necessity of a business education if they would succeed in the commercial world.

Mr. Jarvis states that beginning with this semester a course in office practice is being offered. This course has grown in favor among the students the past six weeks, and they expect to receive much good from the course. For the student to receive credit on this course it is necessary that he or she do actual work in an office. Mr. Jarvis asks that if the business men of Ranger have office work to please call him at his office and he will send a student to that office to work. These students will be trained in shorthand, typing and general office work.

These students will be used in the high school and college offices, but since there are several taking this work it will be necessary for some of the students to do their hours of actual office work in some other office. In case sufficient calls are not received from the business men in regard to this work, the department head will call offices a little later in the year in an effort to give these students the opportunity to do actual office work. Any consideration given on the part of the business men in regard to this work will be business law, 12 for accounting, and 15 have enrolled this semester.

It is not the intention of the college to put students in the office to take the place of regular employees, but this method is being used to acquaint the students with the office as it is operated and managed today.

During the present year 30 students have enrolled for typing courses, 25 for shorthand, five for the course in office practice. These above figures do not represent the second semester, but actually represent the different pupils in the above courses.

At present the following courses are offered in the commercial department of the college: Typing, stenography, office practice and management, accounting, business law and salesmanship.

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Diabetes Shows Steady Increase Over the Nation

AUSTIN—"The general increase in diabetes throughout the United States during the past few years is eloquently reflected in the Texas figures. In 1929 only 367 persons were recorded as having died of this malady, while last year about 700 succumbed. Even making allowances for undiagnosed cases in earlier days, the increasing deadly power of this malady thus becomes apparent. And while perhaps it is the least publicized of the major killers, it nevertheless deserves an appreciation of some of the predisposing causes as well as of the methods to combat them," states Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer.

It can be said that, whatever the exciting cause of its development may be, diabetes is definitely associated with the soft living now so general among the so-called white-collar workers. And it is here that diabetes, potentially and increasingly flourishes.

"Thus it is noted that professional men and women, educators, bankers, business executives, servers of food and drink, laboratory and desk and bench people in general—in short, the sedentary workers, are more likely to become victims of this disease than are those who labor manually. And to this list must be added the housewife to whom electricity and leisure in this connection have in numerous instances proved to be doubtful blessings.

"Therefore, it is plain that adults whose living habits involve a minimum of physical exertion and a maximum of food, including sweets, could profitably determine to 'about face' and gear themselves to a more normal living regimen. The rules involved in this suggestion are: Under the doctor's direction, avoid overweight; eat proper foods in proper amounts; shunning excesses of sugar and sweets; have a physical examination at least once a year; regularly exercise the large muscles of the body either in work or play."

"Things You'll Like To Know About Salads"

There is one especially happy thing that every woman should know and consider about salads—often a salad will make a meal—and as a main course it frequently solves the menu problem on some particularly difficult day.

If the weather be warm, a crisp salad stimulates the lagging appetite, especially if you accent its cool refreshment by serving one contrasting hot dish. This may be merely a cup of heated canned soup, a plate of hot bread, a toasted sandwich, a health-giving vegetable, or an egg or cheese surprise.

Luscious salads are legion—and are tempting the average appetite no matter what the weather or the season. Before suggesting some of my pet versions, I am listing some rules of general and great importance.

The first and most essential one is the chemistry dictum that oil and water do not mix. Dry your lettuce. Drain your vegetables and fruits.

Emphasize contrasts—in flavor, texture and color. A bland base, like tuna fish, or cream cheese, requires a bit of pickle, a nut, some

celery, an apple, or the like. A golden peach stuffed with cream cheese is improved by surrounding it with bright red cherries. A crisp salad of anchovies on potato-salad hills achieves three contrasts, and thereby delights the palate. Even the salad greens are more alluring if you use a little of several varieties as a base for full-meal salads.

Marinate vegetables, meat and most fish, and set in your refrigerator for an hour before mixing with other ingredients. But lightly, please. By marinating, we mean to let these salad bases stand in a rather tart French dressing.

Avoid lavish quantities of dressing. Use just enough to moisten and coat each component part. Be sparing with sugar in any dressing. Use two ingredients in combining ingredients. Two forks are excellent. Remember to toss your

salads, never to mix with pressure. Don't cut meat too fine unless it is to be used in a gelatine mold. It is used in a gelatine mold. Finely minced meat tends to become mushy when mixed with dressings.

Augment salads by adding canned accessories from your emergency shelf if last minute motoring guests arrive or remain until the dinner hour. Slices of canned corned beef are delicious additions to your mixed salad. A can of boned chicken can be used with your chicken salad. Canned peach halves are elegant, stuffed with mashed bananas, mixed with chopped pecans.

Garnish every salad. Your guests' delight will reward you richly for such efforts. Sliced, hard-cooked eggs, radish roses, capers, sliced stuffed olives and cucumber rings add color as well as flavor.

Bill to Designate Potatoes as Basic Commodity Urged

WASHINGTON.—Representatives of potato growers in 22 states, considering with interested members of congress a bill to designate potatoes a basic agricultural commodity, today struck out provisions for the sale of tax-exemption stamps to finance administration of production control. As the draft of the proposed bill now stands, costs of administration would be met by an appropriation from the treasury and the proposed tax on sales of potatoes in excess of allotments.

The meeting amended its first draft of the proposed control bill by changing from one to two per cent the maximum tolerance to be allowed by the secretary of agriculture in adjustment of state allotments of tax exempt sales quotas to states in accordance with the bill's definite provisions. Upon motion by Representative Boileau of Wisconsin, the growers voted in favor of fixing the national and state production allotments on the basis of production and sales records over three of the years from 1927 to 1933, inclusive. A motion was carried that the method of fixing allotments within states be left to the secretary of agriculture.

A motion to reduce the maximum tax on sales in excess of allotments from three quarters of a cent per pound to one half cent was rejected. This tax is the essence of the control plan, which provides neither processing taxes nor benefit payments.

States from which growers voted in favor of the draft of the bill

were Alabama, Idaho, Illinois, Kansas, Maine, Minnesota, New Jersey, North Carolina, Ohio, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Representatives of Connecticut, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania voted against the bill. Michigan, New York and Nebraska representatives voted present. Florida and Louisiana went on record as not voting; and Maryland and California as absent.

The purpose of the control measure was described as limiting the quantity that producers would sell. Under the terms of the proposed bill quotas that could be sold tax free will be established. Committees working in cooperation with the secretary of agriculture would break state quotas into allotments to individual producers.

The state quotas would be based on the three highest acreages and the three highest yields per acre of any state selected from the years 1927 to 1933, inclusive. The years selected for yield need not be the same as selected for acreage. The average production figure obtained in this manner would be the base for the adjustment program which has as its goal the parity price that obtained in the years 1919 to 1929, inclusive.

B. Drummond Ayres, of Accomac, Va., presided at the meeting, which was held in Washington, in the Department of Agriculture building.

Bumper Grain Crop In Texas Expected

SAN ANGELO, Tex.—A bumper grain crop is West Texas this season is predicted by agricultural observers. Oats fields which were formerly yellow from lack of moisture, are now green as a result of heavy rains.

More oats and small grain crops have been planted this year than ever before, according to Elmo Cook, Rainsford county farm agent.

Farmers, he said, have decreased cotton acreage and are turning increasingly to oats for feed crops as a result of the complete failure of the grain sorghums the past two years.
