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## Westbrook mayor resigns in wake of citizen petition

A petition has been circulating recently, asking for the impeachment of Westbrook Mayor Ramiro Fuentes. Those behind the petition may have gotten what they wanted, as the long-time mayor has resigned.

Petition backer Sara Petty said she is not afraid to go on record as one of the people seeking Fuentes' impeachment. "I will step up to the plate," she said.

She went on to say that she has

nothing personal against Fuentes and admitted that, in the past, he has been a good mayor of the small town.

According to Petty, problems began to arise after Fuentes was re-elected for his most recent term. She said that, though Fuentes maintains a residence in Westbrook, he has been spending much of his time elsewhere. She said she has heard that he and his

## Annual boer goat cook-off this week

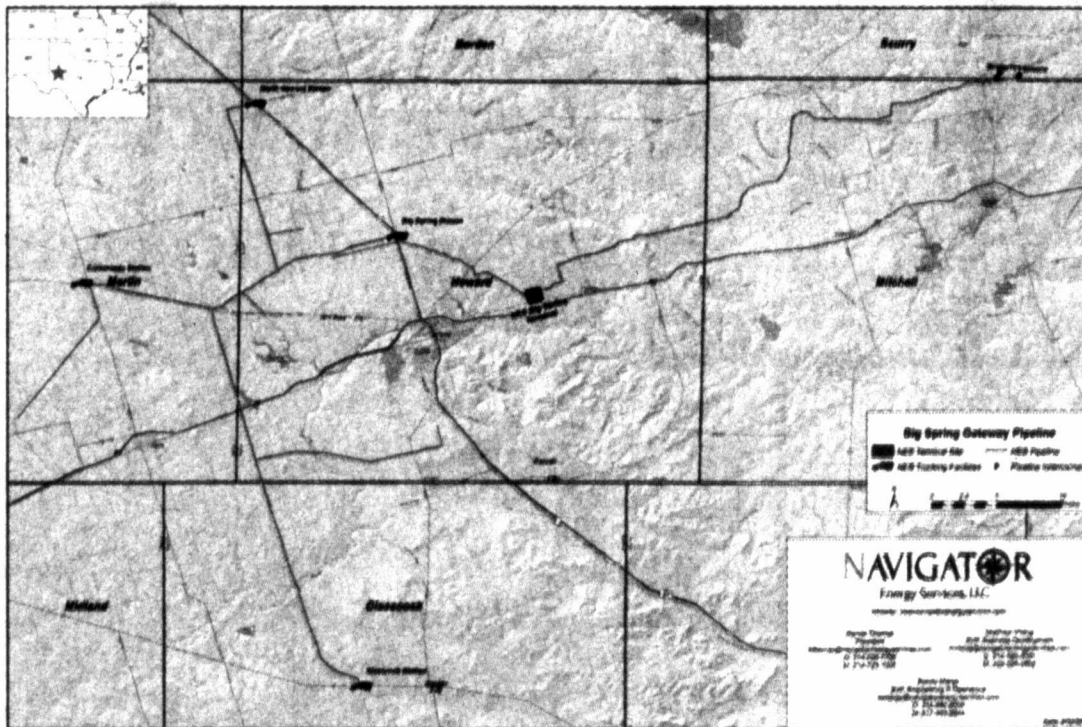

## Pipeline to begin service in 2015

According to a press release from Navigator Energy Services, LLC, its Big Spring Gateway (BSG) system is expected to commence service during the second half of 2015. The BSG includes approximately 125 miles

of new crude oil transportation pipelines, one of which crosses the northwestern part of Mitchell County.

An initial design capacity of up to 85,000 barrels of oil per day was built into the system and is

expected to deliver shipper crude oil into the BridgeTex Pipeline and into Sonoco Logistics-operated pipelines near Colorado City.

The system also includes truck

## Hospital board agrees to purchase Kristi Lee Manor

Following a closed session, the Mitchell County Hospital District Board of Directors reconvened to approve hospital CEO Robbie Dewberry to proceed with the purchase of Kristi Lee Manor, with a closing date no earlier than November 28<sup>th</sup> and no later than December 19<sup>th</sup>. No mention was made of what the nursing home will cost the

district, but Dewberry said he would release details when negotiations are final.

The executive session proved to be worth waiting for, as board member Florence Bodine moved to reject all bids for the construction of the new rural health clinic. Board members agreed with the motion and it passed unanimously.

Cheryl Warren followed Bodine's lead and moved to have the hospital's engineering firm seek a construction manager at-risk to oversee the construction of the planned clinic.

Dewberry said that architects estimated construction costs of the clinic to amount to about \$2.2 million. The lowest bid received for the project was \$3.6

million and the highest was \$4.6 million.

Looking to secure the construction manager at-risk sets the project back about 30 days.

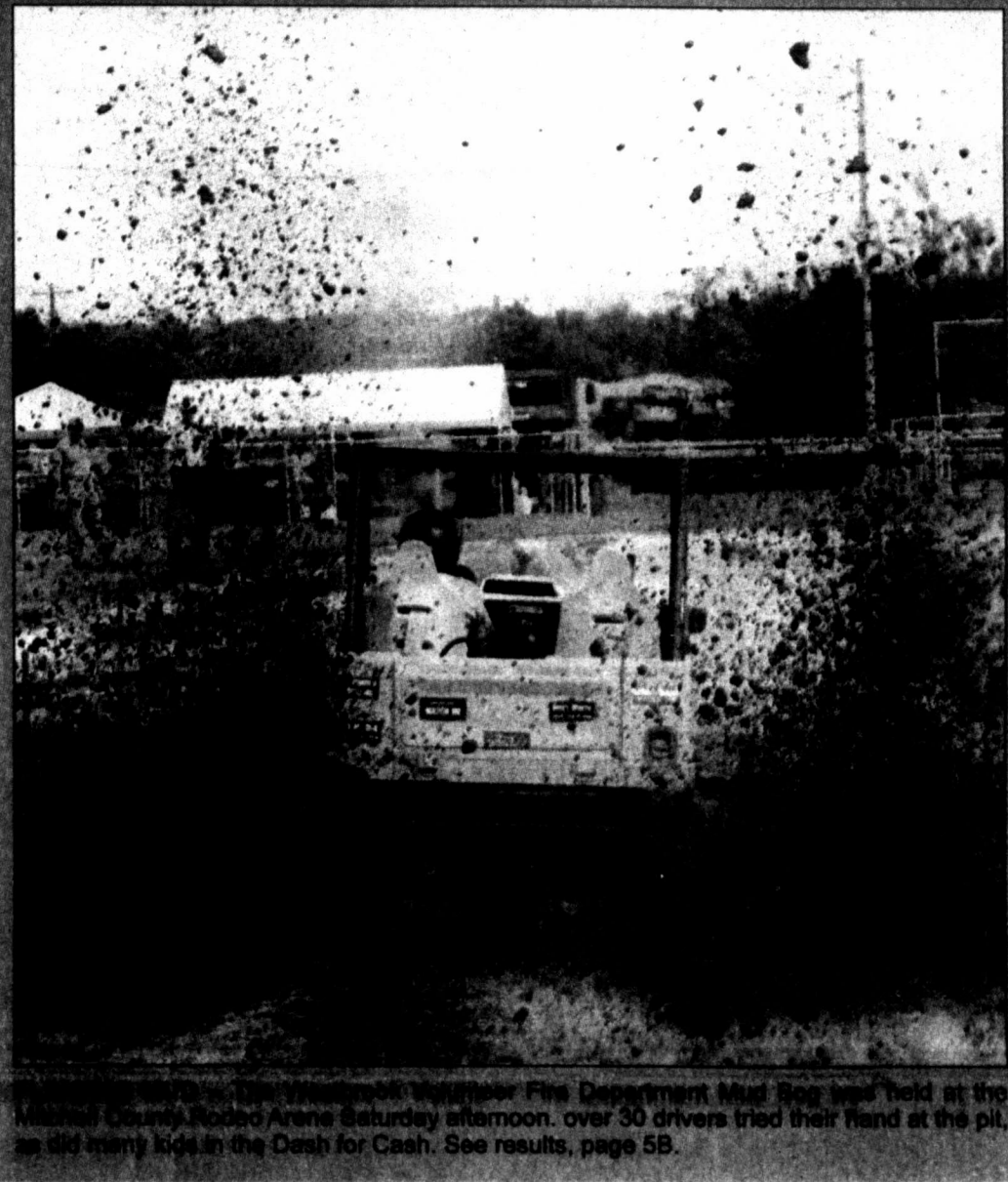
"We think if we hire a construction manager, it will give us more leeway to keep costs down," Dewberry said. He went on to say that the delay will be worth the savings.

In other business, the board approved hospital privileges for Marijeta Medvrec, APA-C and Calvin Abor, PA-C. Dewberry said the mid-level healthcare providers will be working in the emergency room at night.

According to hospital CFO Joe Wright, the hospital's profit and loss statement shows the fa-

## Munoz chosen to serve on board

Mitchell County Commissioners named a representative to serve as a director on the West Texas Regional Transportation Authority during Monday's called meeting. The agency is being established to govern over a multi-regional water project being put together by V.V. Water Services.

According to project representatives Joe Carter and John Littlejohn, the counties of Ward, Martin and Loving have already named a director for the transportation authority. The men said that Glasscock County is also considering naming someone to the board.

Commissioner Jesse Muñoz asked if there would be costs to the county later down the line, and the men said no.

"If you hook onto that (water) line, you'll pay," Commissioner Bill Preston said. "Yes, if you get water (from the project) you'll

pay \$1 per 1,000 gallons," Carter said.

Munoz wondered if Mitchell County would still be eligible for water even if a representative was not appointed. According to Carter and Littlejohn, purchasing water would still be an option but commissioners would have to seek representation through another party to make the request.

Preston asked the men if the Lone Wolf Groundwater Conservation District should be involved in the discussion of the water project. Littlejohn said that their project doesn't affect the water district, because it will be bringing in new water, leaving Mitchell County's groundwater untouched.

A resolution declaring to support the West Texas Regional Transportation Authority was approved, as was a resolution to name Muñoz as Mitchell County's representative.

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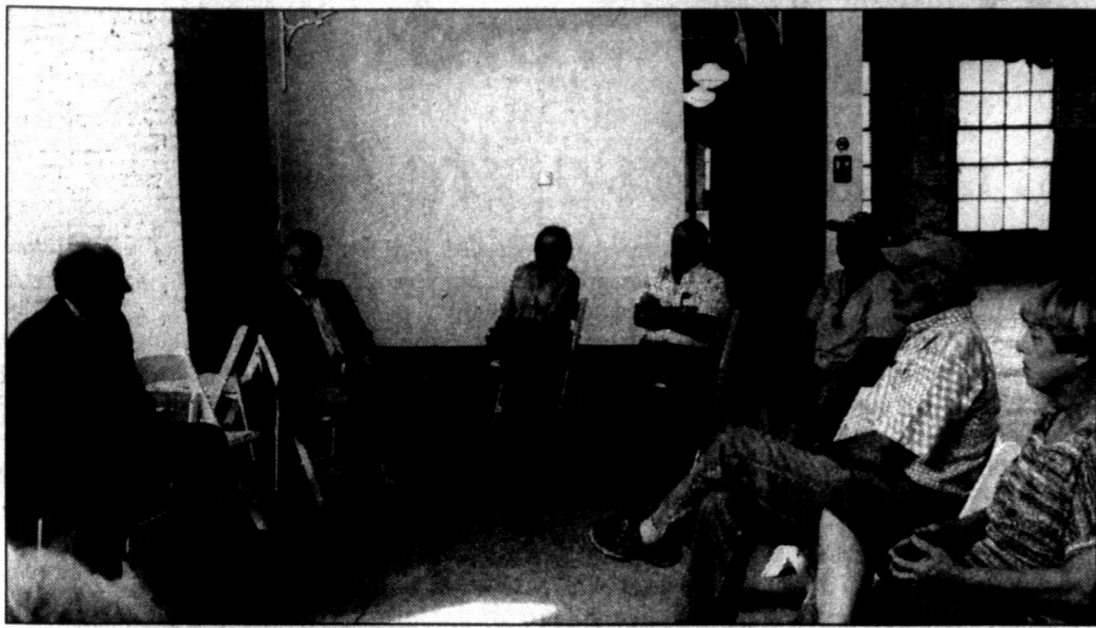

## Conaway visits Colorado City; discusses ISIL among other things

U.S. Representative Mike Conaway visited Colorado City last week for a small town hall-style meeting with local citizens. He presented information about the terroristic group ISIL and the election, as well as answering questions from citizens attending.

Conaway said that ISIL is a legitimate threat to the United States because of how well-funded and well-led the group is. He estimated that the organization makes up to \$2 million per day on oil in the black market. Members of the group literally tap into existing pipelines and siphon off oil.

Voting records will show that Conaway voted to train and arm the Iraqi army, in an effort to avoid putting "American kids on the ground."

Something that makes ISIL an even greater threat to the U.S. is the fact that there are thousands of people from other countries coming in with visa waivers. The federal government can confirm that over 100 U.S. citizens have trained in Syria, according to Conaway.

The upcoming November election was the next topic covered by Conaway. He told citizens that Republicans will keep

control of the House. He said he would like to see 245 Republicans elected for a voting majority.

He also said that Republicans need to win at least six seats to take over the Senate. He said that while Republicans may not have enough votes to control "big ticket things like repealing Obamacare," there should be enough to take care of some small stuff that matters.

Local political activist Woody Anderson told Conaway that it is important to local farmers that he be named as chair of the ag committee.

"I've done the hard work to position myself to be competitive," Conaway said.

The issue of outstanding visas for two much sought-after teachers from the Philippines was addressed. Colorado ISD had no applicants for two positions in math and science, until the application process was opened up to the Philippine teachers.

The prospective teachers are highly qualified college professors in their native country. The visa process to bring them to Colorado City to teach began this summer, and as of Conaway's visit last week, the visas were still pending with no further word.

When asked about the visa process, Conaway said he would like to see it revamped. He said that 55,000 names are drawn randomly each year. He said he would like to see the process be more targeted.

As of press time on Tuesday, word had been received that the visas have been awarded to the teachers. They are expected to be in Colorado City soon.

Ratliff expressed his concern about illegal immigrants crossing into Texas where they are getting amnesty, while qualified teachers are being kept out of the country.

Conaway said that he feels Texas needs to have operational control of the both borders, northern and southern. He said the issue is not partisan, because it's in the best interest of the United States.

Before leaving, Conaway asked a question, "When we ask God to bless America, what are we asking him to bless?" He said he believes that only a moral Christian nation is able to govern itself.

## TUMBLEWEED SMITH The creator of Wednesday's Child

Jack Bowen's start in journalism began while an 8th grade student in Big Spring when the teacher asked him to be the photographer for the school annual. He took to photography in a big way and soon had his own dark room. While still in high school he got a job as a cameraman for the local TV station, KWAB and eventually started doing news and weather. He was 18 years old at the time.

"Back then it was sort of primitive," he says. "I'd be behind the camera, then while a commercial was on the screen, I'd step in front of it and do the weather or news. When another commercial was on the screen I'd get back behind the camera."

Jack, who now lives near Fort Worth, sometimes covered stories with a Polaroid camera and a cassette recorder. "While doing the news live, a still picture would be on the screen and I'd bend down so my lapel mike would pickup the sound bite from the speaker on the portable cassette recorder. Real big time."

After graduating from Texas Tech he did television news on KERP TV in El Paso for three years, then went to the ABC affiliate in Oklahoma City as assignment editor. After a year he started doing weekend news and finally became the prime time anchor for the two major evening newscasts. He always did reporting chores and covered some major national stories outside of Oklahoma City.

He was with the Oklahoma City station 36 years. He says the best thing he did there was to start a program called Wednesday's Child where he did profiles of children who were having a hard time getting adopted.

"Everybody wants a baby, but with an older kid who might be handicapped it's a different story," says Jack. The name came from a line in a nursery rhyme that states, "Wednesday's child is full of woe." "I went to private adoption and child protective agencies and told them my idea. They were hesitant at first, but finally a private agency agreed to let me do a program with a little girl. She got adopted immediately. The program had a profound response from viewers. The state people were watching and called me to say they were impressed."

After the program was on the air for a while, ABC television asked me to appear on Good Morning America. After I did that, television stations all over the country called and said they wanted to start a program like that. I created for each one a press kit with samples of our stories and write-ups about the success of the series. I wasn't getting anything out of it financially, but I thought it was great that so many kids were being adopted. I've run into adults 30 years old or more who would see me out in public and they would tell me, "I was on Wednesday's Child and got adopted."

Jack loves dogs and admits the program developed from his finding homes for dogs. At the end of his 6 PM newscast every Friday he had a segment called Pet Saver. "I would have someone from the animal shelter come in with a dog, put it on the screen and tell the viewers that this animal needs to be adopted. Well, a whole lot of dogs started getting adopted."

Somehow I found out there were a lot of kids waiting to be adopted so I started Wednesday's Child."

I have spoken with several individuals that have authority in this town. I also spoke with an employee at the police department, and she encouraged me to do what I need to do. She said she was going to get right on this particular situation. I also spoke with the police chief. This is so unbelievable!

I am hurt and shaken up. My daughter, who is only 10 year old, has to live with this nightmare the rest of her life.

I believe that one of the officers in the Colorado City Police Department should be suspended until the investigation is over. He has no right to be working at this time, in my opinion.

I spoke with a former chief of police and he also stated, "This is wrong. He should never have done what he did."

The officer showed up after 911 had been called by several people who attacked and jumped us. I couldn't even get to my phone.

As he drove up to the scene, I asked the officer to please help me. I said, "I'm disabled and my little girl is disabled." He told me to stand by the car in a harsh voice, and he walked past me.

He went on to speak with 13 to 14 other people who had been drinking, and he listened to them.

I was crying so hard and yelling to get him to come and talk to me about my daughter. I was shaking terribly and trembling nervously, trying to call for back-up. Finally, I dialed 911 and screamed for the dispatcher to send another officer out. I really respect the dispatcher for what she did.

As I turned around, I saw that my 10-year-old daughter had been put on the ground, as if he was handling some sort of criminal or murderer or even a teenager that wasn't cooperative. It was bad!

At that time, I couldn't believe my eyes. I started to go toward my baby girl. She kept crying and screaming for me to help her. She was saying that he was hurting her bad!

Then the officer put his knee in her back to handcuff her!

It hurts me so bad. Every time I think about it or have to explain, I shed tears. It turns my stomach upside down. Still today, I just want to throw up.

I want justice, and I want him to pay for everything he's done. He handcuffed my daughter after she had been assaulted by an older girl who is well-known for bullying smaller children.

I didn't have my shoes and I didn't have my cane. The officer wouldn't let me move for anything, let alone talk to me. He never heard my side. I had barely driven up before he did. The fight was over.

I am very sick. My health is not that good. I was sick that particular day, so, of course, I didn't attend the birthday party.

But my children wanted to attend the party, so I took them. I politely asked my cousin to please call me when the party was over.

Truth be told, my son called me and said, "Mom, please come get us." He's very sensitive. He's not a fighter.

Remind you, I'm still sick, but I got in my car and rushed to go pick them up. I could tell by his voice that something was wrong. He came straight to the car, ready to get in. As I looked up, I saw the 13-year-old girl dragging my daughter across Walnut Street by the hair.

I could hardly get out of the car I was hurting so bad. It took me a little longer than usual. I screamed, "Elijah, help your sister!" He's so afraid, so when I tried to get my baby, that's when 12 or 13 people jumped me.

I tried to tell the officer. They are known for that. It goes way back to 20

to 30 years ago.

The officer still didn't talk to me. He then put my daughter in the car with a K9 dog. The big dogs were constantly barking, and she was constantly crying and screaming.

Next, the officer tells me that I'm going to jail and he's going to tow my car. I said, "Excuse me!" Then he threatened to call CPS.

He said that I needed to release my children to someone. Remind you, it was my family that had attacked me and my daughter, and I had to choose one of them to take my babies. If that wasn't humiliating, then I don't know what you would call it.

He said I was going to jail for injury to a child. I told them that the people he had talked to were lying. I never touched her. Me and my daughter were practically underneath and I took all the hits from my attackers.

My mouth was full of blood. I never knew I was bleeding until they took me in to be booked. Sheriff's office employees were upset because I had blood all over my shirt and a busted up left arm. They took pictures of everything.

One of the ladies told the officers that I need my meds now! She was shocked to see me come in to be arrested, when we were the victims. It was like a small riot.

My son fell to his knees when he saw me being taken away from them for the first time ever. The officer still had my baby handcuffed!

I spoke with three other deputies and they were in disbelief when they heard my story.

These new officers don't have any respect for anyone. Just because they carry a badge on their chest and a gun on their side, there's no reason to act like that.

We are all God's people in my eyesight. I don't see color. I guess that's why I'm well-known in the community.

For some reason, besides jealousy and bitterness in some people's heart, they want to see me fall. Like I tell all of them all the time, "I can't fall as long as I stay on my knees."

"Bush-Cheney broke Iraq." USA Today reported that, "Bush-Cheney broke Iraq and created a living hell for the Iraqi People."

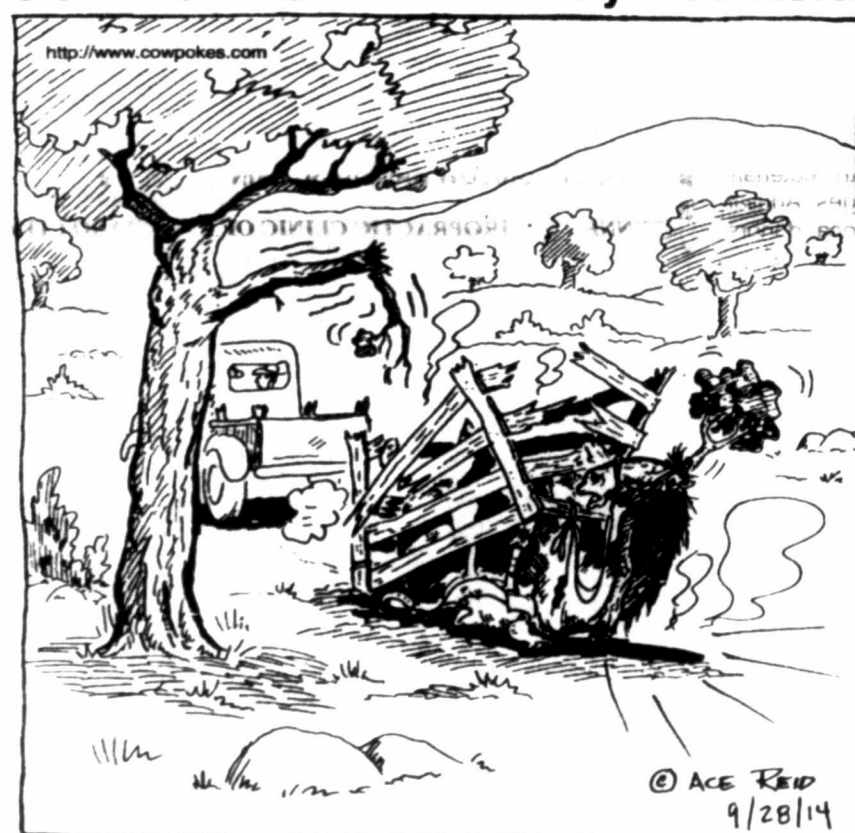

ility made a \$356,000 profit during the 2013-14 fiscal year which ended Tuesday, September 30<sup>th</sup>. Tax revenues made up for an operating loss of a little over \$400,000.

According to statistics, total patient days at the hospital are up by about 14 days compared with last year, and surgeries have increased as well. Last year, there were 86 surgeries performed at MCH and this year that number rose to 128.

Clinic visits held steady, show-

ing an increase of less than 100 visits for the year-to-date. Approximately 74 more ultrasounds were performed at the hospital this year, as compared with last year.

Dewberry presented to board members how various insurance policies have been handled. He said that premiums for the directors' and officers' liability policy had increased by about \$3,000.

Premiums to insure the hospital's vehicles decreased, as did the

cost for workers' compensation insurance. Overall, the hospital has only seen an increase in premiums of about \$2,600 in the last two years.

The board approved the Updated Cardiac Rehab Policy & Procedure Manual, as well as the Rehabilitation Services Policy & Procedure Manuals. No changes were made to the manuals which had already been approved by the medical staff.

Two bids, totaling \$675, made

by the Picciano Family Business for lots on Peach and Vine Streets were approved.

Four bids offered by Alenco Construction and Development were also approved. The bids which amounted to \$450 were submitted for lots on Plum, Peach, Fig and Mulberry Streets, all located in the northwestern part of the city.

Marsha Rickard presented the administrator's report for Valley Fair Lodge. She said that two patients were admitted to the long-term nursing facility in August, and two were discharged.

For September three patients have been admitted while three were discharged. The home remains at 70% occupancy.

Rickard said that nursing homes often serve a different purpose than in the past. More and more patients are coming to nursing care facilities for rehabilitation therapy after illnesses and injury and those patients are released upon completion of the therapy.

wife have been staying in Sweetwater.

"This is a problem because citizens can't get a hold of anyone," Petty said. She said that the petition was circulated to address the issue.

"I don't have a problem with Ramiro, but if he wants the job, he should live here. There also needs to be a contact number posted for citizens," Petty said last week.

She shared a personal story to illustrate the potential for problems. She said that while the city secretary was on vacation, a water leak sprang up down the street from her home. Because there was no one at city hall, Petty said she had to go for over a week with very little water pressure in her home. She said that it took about three hours for the toilet to fill due to the low pressure.

Mitchell County Utility sells water to Westbrook ISD, which is then sold to the City of Westbrook. Citizens have to contact someone from the city to address

water issues within the city limits.

When Petty spoke up last week, it was not known that Fuentes had already submitted his resignation to city officials. She said that when she had plenty of signatures on the petition, the document would be presented before the city council.

However, Westbrook City Secretary Pansy Fernandez confirmed that Fuentes has already vacated the position.

Westbrook has only two council members, Lynn Gaston and Elida Fuentes. Gaston is now filling the mayoral shoes, as she is Mayor Pro Tem.

Fernandez said the council will meet to accept Fuentes' resignation and discuss the possibility of appointing a new mayor in the near future. Fernandez also said that an after-hours point of contact will be discussed at the next meeting as well.

The Westbrook City Council will meet again Tuesday, October 14<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m.

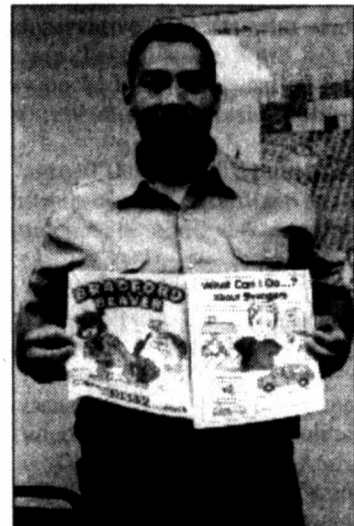

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2013-05, CODE OF ORDINANCES SECTION 13.03.011, TO AMEND AND ESTABLISH POLICIES FOR TESTING AND REPLACING WATER METERS INCLUDING COSTS; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY AND A REPEALING CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

I. Amendment

The City Council of Colorado City declares that Ordinance No. 2013-05, adopted on February 12, 2013, is hereby amended as follows:

**Amendment 1.** Sec. 13.03.011 of the Code of Ordinances shall be amended to include a subsection (h), which shall read as follows:

(h) Replacement of meters. If a meter is tested under subsection (g) above and should it register more than two percent (2%) fast, the City water department will replace the meter at the City's cost. If a meter is tested under subsection (g) and it does not register more than two percent (2%) fast but the customer still demands that the meter be replaced, the meter will be replaced at the customer's cost.

IV. Publication and Effective Date.

The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to publish the caption of this Ordinance in the manner and for the length of time prescribed by law and this Ordinance shall become effective after publication of same as provided by Charter and/or State law.

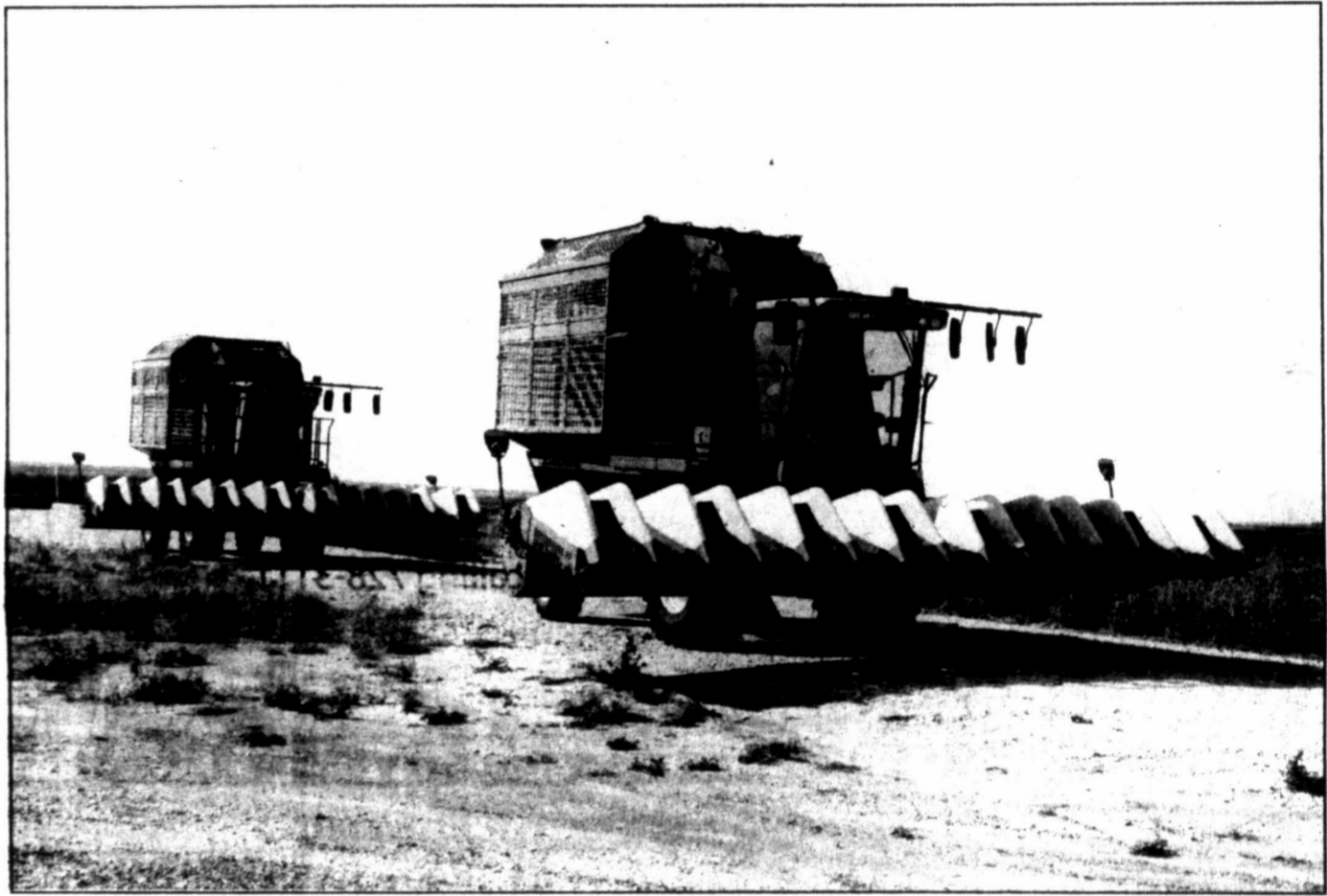

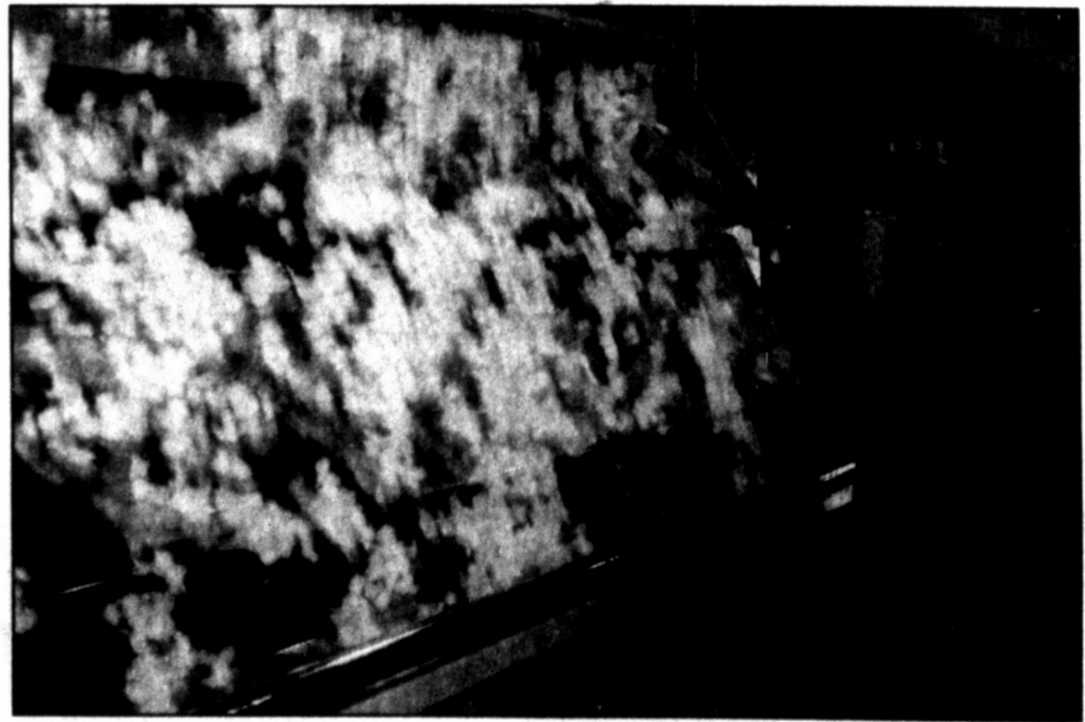

## Houston stops by C-City while campaigning

Texas Attorney General candidate Sam Houston came home to Colorado City last week, taking advantage of being in the area on his campaign trail. Meeting with a group of about 40 citizens, Houston shared the things he says will make him a successful attorney general, if elected.

Houston started out the gathering by greeting and talking with local citizens. He expressed his comfort of being home, as he grew up in Colorado City and is the son of Gaye and the late Corky Houston. "Everywhere I go, I talk about Colorado City," he said.

Houston said it was Colorado City where he first learned to resolve disputes. "I pride myself on being able to solve disputes," he said. "I enjoy working out a solution, and government needs solutions."

Houston went on to say that he learned his core values here at home. "Everybody counted at Corky's (hardware store), and that's the way it should be," he said. He went on to say he would spend less time suing the federal

government and more time looking for a solution.

One of his top talking points was the fact that the state of Texas is taking in more money than ever and funding public schools less. There is work to be done through the AG's office such as ensuring consumer protection and making the child support system fairer to both parents.

The Republican candidate also vying for the position, Ken Paxton of McKinney, has had some problems with ethics during his time as a state representative, according to Houston. Paxton has admitted to a felony, Houston said. However, he will not be indicted until the election in November is over.

Paxton has been disciplined by the Texas State Securities Board for soliciting investment

clients without being registered, as required by law. He was reprimanded and paid a \$1,000 fine. The Travis County district attorney's office will not proceed with an investigation as to whether or not he violated the Texas Securities Act until the election is over, according to the Texas Tribune.

Anyone convicted of a felony cannot hold public office in Texas.

Houston said that he has challenged Paxton to a debate, and Paxton's spokesman said a debate was a desperate ploy. "Aren't candidates supposed to debate?" Houston asked rhetorically.

Houston said that Texas needs an attorney general who is ethical, open and treats everyone fairly.

"Politics do matter and this of

ice matters," Houston said.

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, REPEALING AND REPLACING ORDINANCE NO. 1983-107 AND ORDINANCE NO. 2011-05; PROVIDING FOR A CITY FEE FOR ALL BUSINESSES LICENSED BY THE STATE FOR SALE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES; ESTABLISHING LOCATIONS WHERE THE SALE OF ALCOHOL IS PROHIBITED; PROVIDING A PENALTY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; PROVIDING A REPEALING CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

**WHEREAS**, the City of Colorado City (the "City") enacted Ordinance No. 1983-107 and 2011-05 to regulate the sale of alcoholic beverages within the City limits;

**WHEREAS**, the City is repealing Ordinance No. 1983-107 and 2011-05 and replacing them with this Ordinance, removing sections relating to licensing or permitting by the City, but maintaining the regulations relating to location of the sale of alcoholic beverages and a City fee for vendors of alcoholic beverages;

**WHEREAS**, the City finds that it is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of its citizens that an Ordinance be enacted to regulate the sale of alcoholic beverages as allowed under State law; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS:**

I. Repeal. Ordinance No. 1983-107, enacted on April 15, 1983, and Ordinance No. 2011-05, enacted on February 15, 2011, are hereby repealed.

II. Enactment. The following provisions shall be and are, hereby, enacted and adopted as the "Alcoholic Beverages Ordinance".

**Sec. 4.02.006 Penalty**

(a) A business which sells alcoholic beverages within the City without first having paid the permit fee required under Section 4.02.002 commits a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$200.

(b) Any other violation of this Article shall constitute a misdemeanor punishable by fine as set forth in the general penalty provision in Section 1.01.009 of the Colorado City Code of Ordinances.

(c) Each separate day during which an offense continues shall constitute a separate violation of this Article.

V. Publication and Effective Date. The City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to publish the caption of this Ordinance in the manner and for the length of time prescribed by law and this ordinance shall become effective after publication of same as provided by Charter and/or State law.

## Perry speaks at local Lions Club meeting

Recently-elected Senator Charles Perry was the featured speaker at the weekly Colorado City Lions Club Friday. He was sworn in Tuesday, September 30<sup>th</sup> as senator of Texas District 28 in Lubbock.

Though he had several opponents, Perry managed to win the clear majority in a special election held in September. He was elected to fill a vacancy in the senate left when Robert Duncan was appointed as chancellor of Texas Tech University.

Perry is a 1980 graduate of Sweetwater High School, and he also graduated from Texas Tech University with a Bachelor of Administration degree. He owns and operates a CPA firm in Lubbock and serves on the board of Lubbock's Boys and Girls Clubs.

Perry said that senators will be looking to appropriate a \$205 billion state budget that reflects a \$5 billion increase from last year. He said that approximately \$1.5 billion of that will be spent on Medicaid and public school funding, based on enrollment estimates.

Of the \$75 billion being spent on education in Texas, \$40 billion is spent on public education. "It's not equal and it needs to be fixed,"

Perry said.

He said that Texas is currently spending \$12 million monthly on protecting the southern border. "It's becoming more of a state priority," Perry said.

Apparently, there is a big push to increase transportation funding as urban areas are becoming congested with traffic beyond limits. Perry said that the biggest divide in Texas comes in the form of rural vs. urban, rather than Repubs vs. Dems.

As border security is a hot ticket item right now, Perry said that Texas should expect to spend about \$1 billion in the coming year, as compared to the \$450,000 spent on border security in 2011. He said that besides the children seen on TV, there are bad people coming across our southern border.

Perry said that drug activity is on the rise, and 100-pound methamphetamine busts are common. The Mexican drug cartels are well-organized, well-trained and well-funded, he said.

He also believes that the 4,200 children from South America that have come across the border are just the start. He said that though it's no fault of their own, the children will end

up costing Texans \$50 million and put undue burdens on English-dominant schools.

Chief of Police Luis Aguilar asked if there were any new ideas on border security. Perry said that he is for increasing funding to local law enforcement in south Texas to help deal with drug activity. He said he thinks locals know their situations best and need money to help them fight criminals.

James Williams asked when the deportation law changed. Perry said that, in an effort to fight sex trafficking, George W. Bush authored a bill in 2008 allowing people from South America to come across the border and stay.

"I think it helped with that issue, but I think the law will be changed or repealed," Perry said.

He went on to say that states are too restricted and he thinks the federal government should step in and take an offensive position against the cartels, as sanctions usually only hurt the little guys in society.

"I think we can control our border," he said. "We will spend all the dollars that are needed to protect our citizens."

Perry said, "My legacy is not my title, it's how I've treated people along the way."

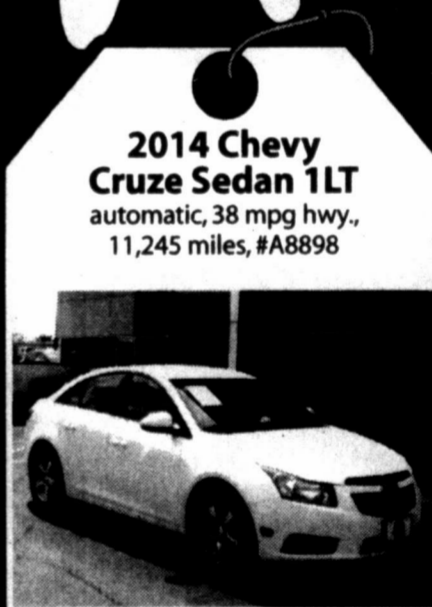

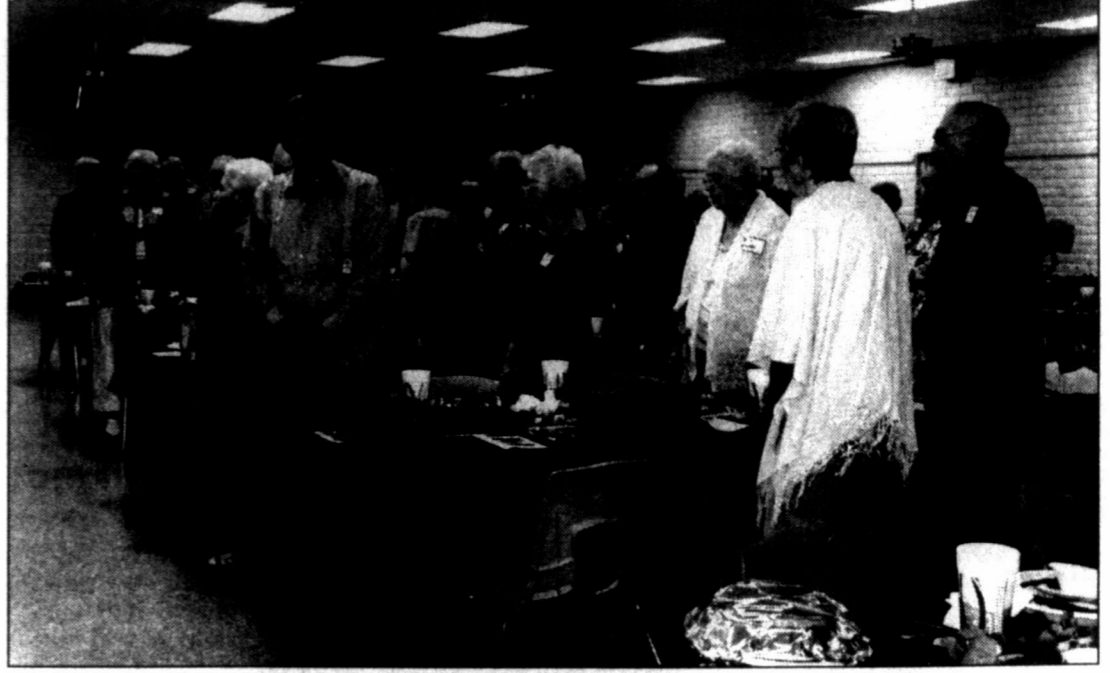

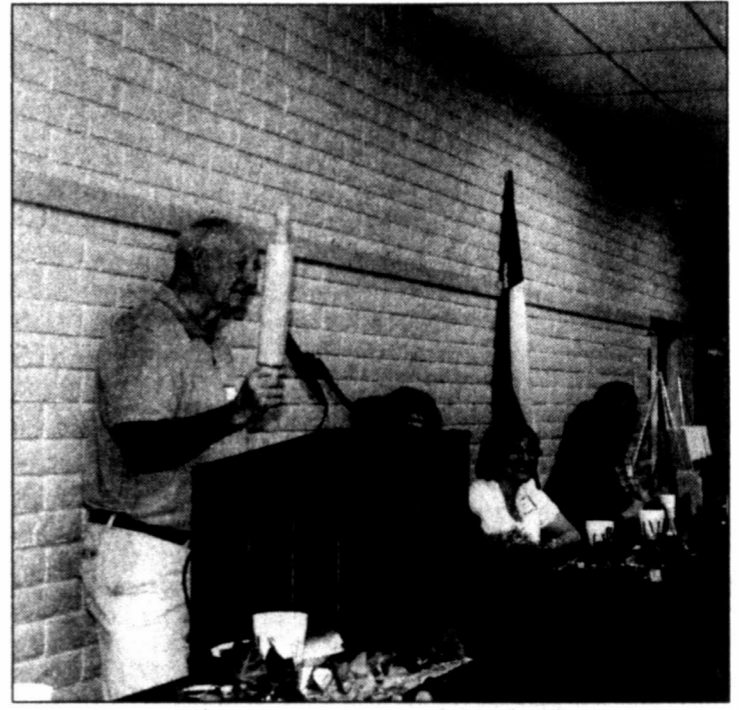

South Plains Fair stock shows. The State Fair of Texas show in Dallas is set to be held through October 19<sup>th</sup>.

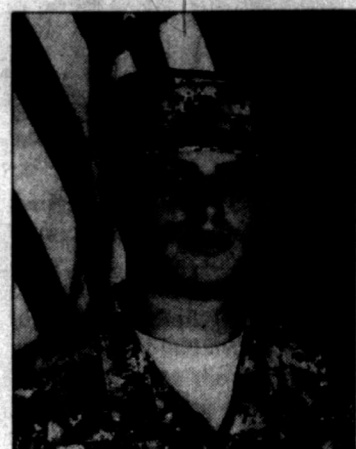

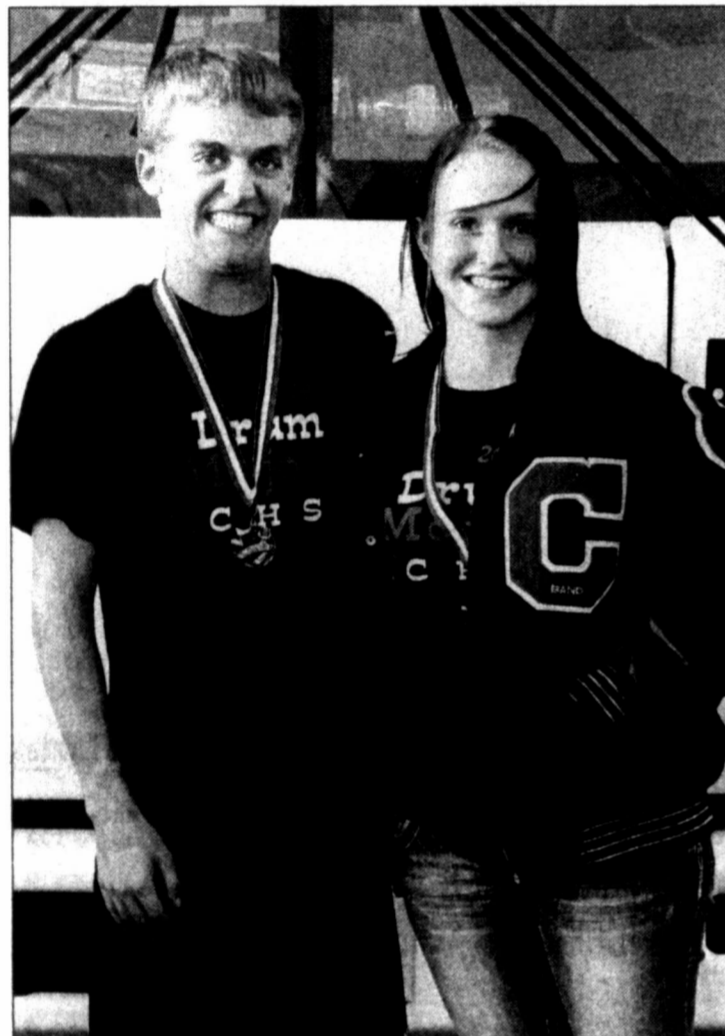

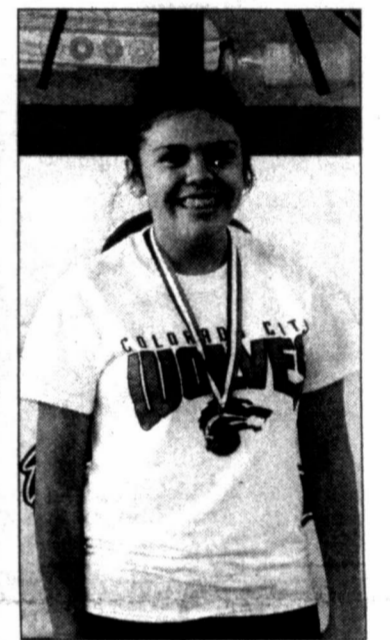

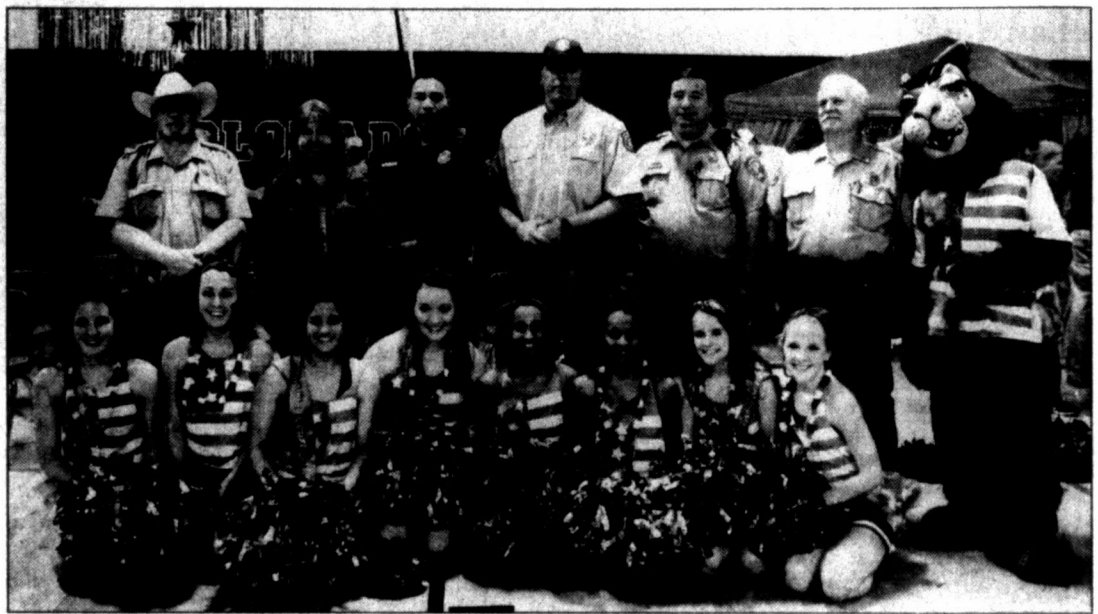

Pip Jackson was on the receiving end of 6 passes for 136 yards and 3 touchdowns. Trinnon Jackson also was over the century mark in receiving with 103 yards on 4 catches and he also scored 3 touchdowns.

Gainey had 2 rushing touchdowns along with one touchdown by Isaiah Jennings. Andrew Burrola picked off a Bearcat

pass and ran it in for a touchdown also. Alan DeSantiago was good on six PATs.

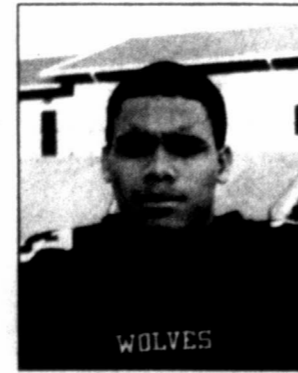

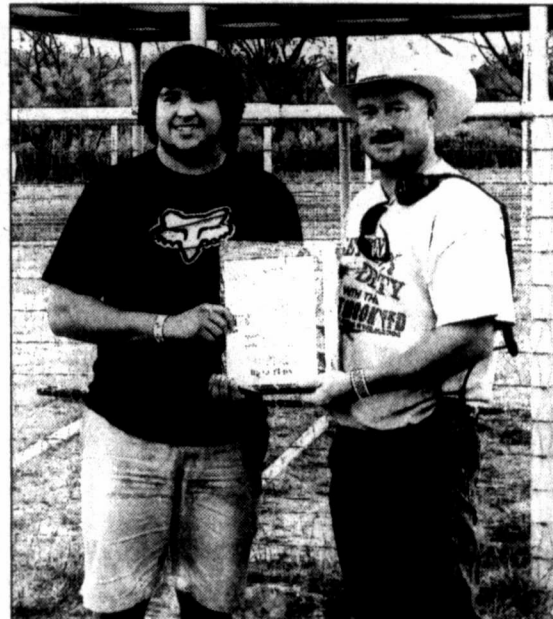
