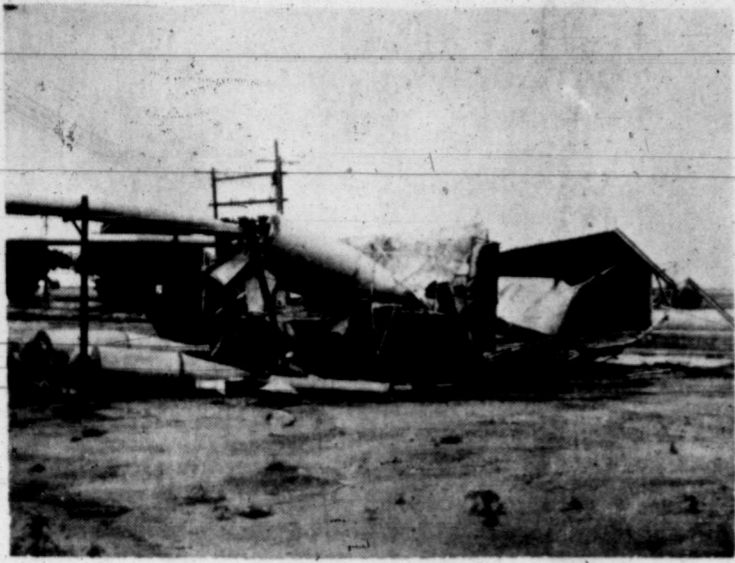
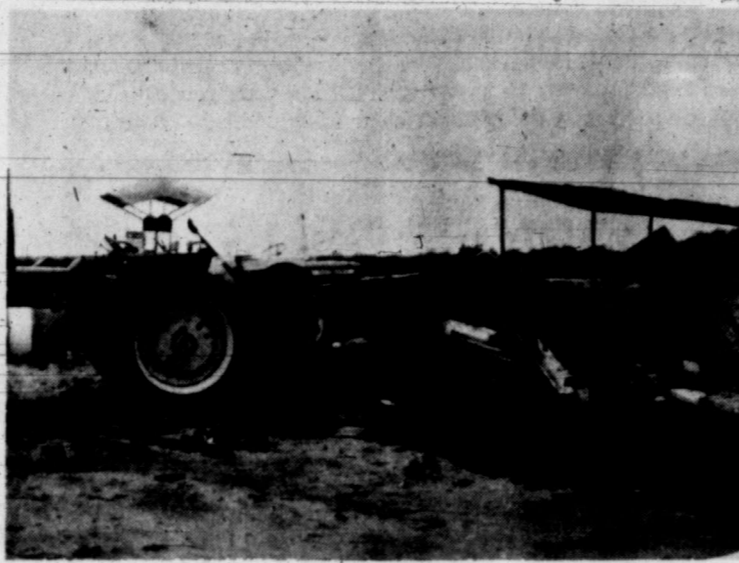


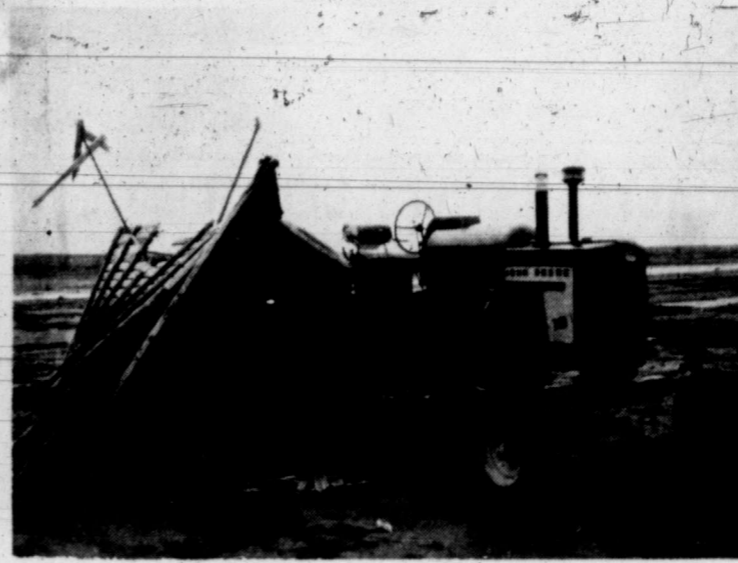

Runoff Rips Terraces

Here is the way destructive water runoff from overloaded terraces ripped through Mitchell County crop land after torrential rains Wednesday and Thursday nights. This view is Friday morning from a field south of Buford. The water, poured through terraces the length of the field, flooding crop land and overflowing onto county roads for more damage.

Losses Climb In Weather's Wake

Mitchell County wiped the weather smile from its face and, at the weekend, counted up thousands of dollars in wind, hail and water damage.

The dollar toll came in road washouts, wrecked farm terraces, smashed windows and paint damage, wrecked buildings and trailers.

And the latest deluge of rain, pouring water onto already soaked crop lands, put the time squeeze on cotton farmers on their planting - to harvest schedule.

Some farmers, already planted, must do the job over. Most fields were so wet and muddy that farmers will be delayed with planting - all of which means a pressure from seasonal weather next fall for maximum crop yield and possible extra expense now of changing seed because of the later harvest date.

Colorado City's official rain

gauge measured 1.55 inches for Wednesday and 1.80 inches for Thursday, 3.35 inches in all.

But the rain torrents, with whipping winds and marble size hail, was more in numerous areas, especially in the Buford area where washouts and ruined terraces were plentiful. There rains were more... double the count in some spots.

brought Colorado City's May rainfall to 5.35 inches - more than the 4.14 recorded in January, February, March and April. The 1969 total now is 9.49.

The heavy downpours, with ground already well seasoned with moisture, caused heavy runoffs. Tanks and ponds caught good water.

Lake Colorado City gained more than half a foot through Friday - a four foot rise to 2061.95 elevation in the two weeks. Lake Champion gained 2 feet Thursday night and a total of 4.5 feet in two weeks to a 2056.10 elevation.

Tornadic winds Thursday night ripped apart half-inch steel beams, tearing the steel from foundation bolts and wrecking the burr hopper at Buford Cooperative Gin.

Andrews Educators To Principal Posts Here

New principals have been named for Colorado City's two lower elementary schools - Frank H. Kelley Elementary and Hutchinson Elementary.

They are: Esten Blackman, 12 years with teaching

experience, bachelor and master degrees and additional school administration studies, who will be at Kelley Elementary (formerly Primary School).

Jerry Reynolds, 11 years of

teaching experience with bachelor and master degrees and administrative studies, who will head the staff at Hutchinson.

Reynolds, who was a seventh grade teacher and assistant athletic coach here in 1958, succeeds Bob O'Day, who resigned this month to return to Snyder public schools as a physical education teacher.

Blackman will replace T. D. Wiman Jr., veteran West Texas educator, who submitted his resignation as Hutchinson principal this week while recovering from a severe heart illness.

Both of the new administrators will move here with their families from Andrews, where they have been teachers in recent years.

Contracts will set initial salaries at \$9,311.40 annually for Blackman and \$8,911.40 yearly for Reynolds.

Wives of the two principals also will join the Colorado City school staff - Mrs. Blackman, with bachelor and master degrees, assigned to fifth grade in Hutchinson; Mrs. Reynolds, sister of former school board member Warren Anderson, with bachelor and master degrees,

assigned to Wallace Elementary sixth grade.

Blackman has B. A. and M. E. degrees from Texas Tech, plus additional graduate study there. He taught and coached at Ropesville High three years, then moved to Andrews, where he has taught physical education in Elementary School for nine years. He is a native of Abernathy.

Reynolds, graduate of Slaton High, has B. S. degree from McMurry and M. E. from Sul Ross State.

His first teaching and coaching assignment was here in Colorado City in 1958-59. For 5 1/2 years he was in Denver City, teacher in 7th and 8th grades, then high school track coach for 5 years.

Reynolds was head "B" team

coach and assistant track mentor one year at Lubbock's Monterey High, 1965-66. The last 3 years he has been at Andrews High, where he has taught economics and civics, chaired the social studies department and served as assistant coach for varsity football and track.

He has added additional administrative studies at The Odessa Center, affiliated with University of Texas.

Wiman submitted his resignation to Colorado City school board Monday night, "for reasons of health" and effective at the conclusion of this contract year, June 4.

Growers Reject Cotton Transfer

Cotton growers in Mitchell County have failed to approve transfer of 1970 upland cotton allotments out of the county, Curtis E. Latimer, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

Votes totaled 191 FOR; 448 AGAINST - the proposal.

Voting on the referendum took place by mail during the period May 5 through May 9. The transfers were approved by 30 percent of the producers voting. A two-thirds affirmative vote was required to make the transfers effective.

Transfer of 1970 upland cotton allotments in Mitchell County - by sale or lease - may be made

from one farm to another within the county only. Allotments may be transferred into Mitchell County by sale or lease from other counties in the State where growers have voted to permit such transfers.

The transfer of allotments within a county is not affected by the recent vote. Such transfers are already authorized by law. Nor does the vote affect transfers of allotments from one farm to another owned by the same person, which can be made across county lines within the state.

Transfers of cotton allotments for the 1970 upland cotton crop will need to be filed with the ASC County Committee not later than December 31, 1969, said Latimer.

Brush Control Vital Affects Town Citizens, Too

Citizens of Colorado City should be concerned about infestation of brush in Mitchell County, said Giles Birchum, Jr., of the Soil Conservation Service here.

"It is imperative that we have a source of water for our homes, businesses and future expansion," said Birchum.

Champion have high infestations of worthless brush such as salt cedar and mesquite, he pointed out.

Both mesquite and salt cedar are water wasters, he added. "These trees have no useful purpose or use in conservation," Birchum said.

A brush survey made in 1964 showed approximately 5,575 acres in Mitchell County in-

festated by salt cedar, a tremendous user of water, he noted.

"Control of salt cedar would result in a saving of three acre-feet of water for every acre treated. This would be a saving of more than 16,500 acre-feet a year," Birchum said.

"Mesquite is one of the most worthless trees we have in Mitchell County. Research shows that it takes 225 gallons of water to produce one pound of leaves. In comparison, our better native grasses use approximately 75 gallons of water to produce a pound of forage," he said. "With a comprehensive control program it would be possible to grow three times as much grass as we have now."


