International Sunday School Lesson

July 12, 1936.
THE ANSWER TO TEMPTATION'S
CHALLENGE

Acts 4:1-12; 1 Cor. 1:21-25

I. CLOUDS ON THE HORIZON

What a great force had the church of Jesus Christ become in Jerusalem! With three thousand conversions on Pentecost and the whole city moved from center to circumference by the gospel of the risen Son of God, we may be sure that the leaders who incited the mob to slay Jesus would recoil with green envy at the success of the Apostles' work. In their very midst a veritable miracle had been performed. A man had been instantly and completely healed of his lameness. As the miracle could not be denied, it was necessary to resort to persecution and threat. Accordingly the apostles were commanded to cease speaking in the name of Christ.

II. THE REJECTED STONE.

Jesus had been rejected by the Jews when they refused him and condemned him to death. But the old prophet (Isaiah 28:16) had said some seven centuries before that the tried stone would be laid in Zion. We thus see Jesus made the head of the church which is his body (Col. 1:18).

Man has often been guilty of substituting his own way for God's. He refuses to use the material placed at his disposal by Jehovah of Hosts. But if we refuse him who is the Way, Truth, and the Life, we cancel our

only hope of salvation from sin and a citizenship in the heavenly realm. There is no substitute for Christ, his blood, his gospel, his commands. He is the author and finisher of our faith. (Heb. 12:2.)

III. LAME PHILOSOPHY AT THE BAR

As Peter told the religious bigots of Jerusalem that the one they had slain was now Lord of Lords at God's right hand, so Paul told the Greeks (1 Cor. 1:21-25) that vain philosophy had as greatly blundered as had Jewish tradition. As the world could not reason itself up to God, it became necessary for heaven's will to be imparted through revelation. So it pleased God through the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe. It is simply impossible to save men and women without the pure gospel of Christ. True, God's ways have seemed foolish to many people in the world. Moses' serpent on the pole might have seemed a peculiar procedure to be connected with healing of snake bites. It seemed foolish to Namaan that he must wash seven times in Jordan before he could be healed of his leprosy. It may even seem strange that our Lord said, "He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved" (Mk. 16:16) when we remember that he died for us, giving up freely his own precious blood, we know he is acquainted with our needs and amply qualified to state conditions of pardon and the law of Christian living.

The Lesson-Sermon includes also the following passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Waking to Christ's demand, mortals experience suffering. This causes them even as drowning men, to make vigorous efforts to save themselves; and

through Christ's precious love these efforts are crowned with success" (page 22).

A MARKED CONTRAST

Hundreds of Ochiltree county voters who heard Senator Clint Small's speech in Perryton last Thursday evening were impressed by his clean, clear cut presentation of his claims for re-election. Many of those who heard his opponent speak in Perryton several weeks ago remarked on the difference in the campaign methods of Senator Small and his opponent. The Senator confined his remarks to his record as a public official and the legislation that he hoped to have passed in the future for the benefit of the Panhandle and Texas as a whole. His opponent, a former district attorney of this judicial district, did not speak of his own record as a public official, neither did he have much to say as to what he contemplated doing if he were elected, but he did devote the greater part of his time to a vilification of Senator Small and his record as a public official. PICKLE HINTS GIVEN BY NEW HOPE CLUB MEMBERS

Some helpful hints on pickling were given by New Hope home demonstration club members at the July club meeting.

Mrs. J. E. Yaden says that too much sugar destroys the flavor and shrivels pickles. All the sugar should not be added at one time.

To crisp pickles, Mrs. John Budock further stated that she leaves sweet pickles in syrup solution over night to plump them before sealing the fruit in glass containers.

In making pickles Mrs. Wayne Lovett states that the sooner she puts up her pickles after gathering the vegetables the better finished products she gets.

According to Mrs. O. E. Carter a fruit jar with sand in it makes a good weight for keeping vegetables in the brine. Care should be taken in not using too heavy weight else the brine cannot penetrate the vegetable very well and, too, the vegetables are apt to lose their shape or become flattened.

To store fruit pickles through the winter months Mrs. Loyd Furnish uses a stone jar. Mrs. Furnish says that by using the stone container that no objectionable odors and flavors are absorbed by the product.

"Proper brining is very necessary in the pickling of vegetables," stated Miss Marie Ludwick, Home Demonstration Agent, at the meeting held July 7, in the home of Mrs. Marvin Groves.

"Care should be taken that the brine be properly tested for the various vegetables to be used," further stated Miss Ludwick. "Stock or dairy salt is the best salt for brining. Be sure the vegetables are thoroughly cured before removing from the brine for pickling."

Brining may be done in four to six weeks. Eighty six degrees is a desirable temperature. Use whole spices to flavor cucumbers when pickled.

FEDERAL WIND EROSION HELP

OCHILTREE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS UNDECIDED AS TO RATIFYING MEMO OF AGREEMENT

Under a plan set up last week by officials of the Soil Conservation Service, Ochiltree, together with Dallam, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Sherman, Moore, Lipscomb and Hansford counties, is eligible to go into an agreement with the soil conservation service whereby the Federal government will participate on a 50-50 basis with the Wind Erosion districts that have already been formed in the above counties.

The government will provide tractor grader units, soil conservationists experts, clerical help, mechanics, and pay for all fuel, repairs and upkeep on the machinery. The county will spend an amount of money from their wind erosion funds obtained by tax remissions equal to the government's expenditures. The county's money is to be expended for labor and other expenses of the program.

Due to the many factors that enter into acceptance of the agreement, the Ochiltree County Commissioners have deferred action on the proposal until they can thoroughly investigate all angles of the new program.

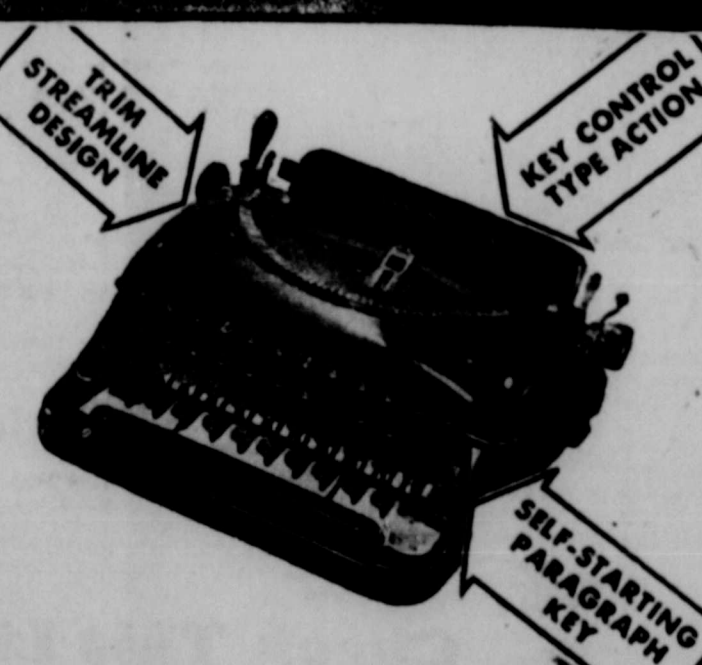

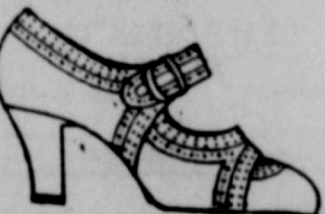

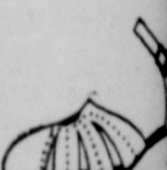
