GOVERNOR JOHN CONNALLY ADDRESSES CISCO DISTRICT METHODIST BANQUET

Governor John Connally, in his address to the Cisco District Laymen at the annual banquet in Cisco Thursday evening, stated that "Religion is the only foundation we can build on which will stand." The governor, a Methodist himself, called for a return to the basic religious foundation of this nation. He continued that each person as a "divine creature," has the responsibility in building this religious fiber.

"We can be a moral nation without being a religious nation, but not for long," he told the Methodists.

He said that the leaders — both pastors and politicians — are "mere instruments of your (the people's) desires and wishes." He added that the voice crying for the return to the foundations of freedom that the nation was built on "cannot be the voice of the preacher, rabbi or priest, but must be the voice of the people."

The governor noted that eleven civilizations have been born, flourished and died by losing their religious institutions and going into decay.

"There is no reason to believe that we, as a people, will be able to do it unless we recognize that all progress is founded on religious institutions."

"The Church and Its Role Today," was the theme of the governors talk and he said he found it best not to speak from a prepared text, but to "speak from my heart."

"Our country is caught up in materialism. We tend to think that here in this land people are smartest ever, having done things not done before..."

"One of the things we lack today," he continued, "is reflecting on why we're here... We have
